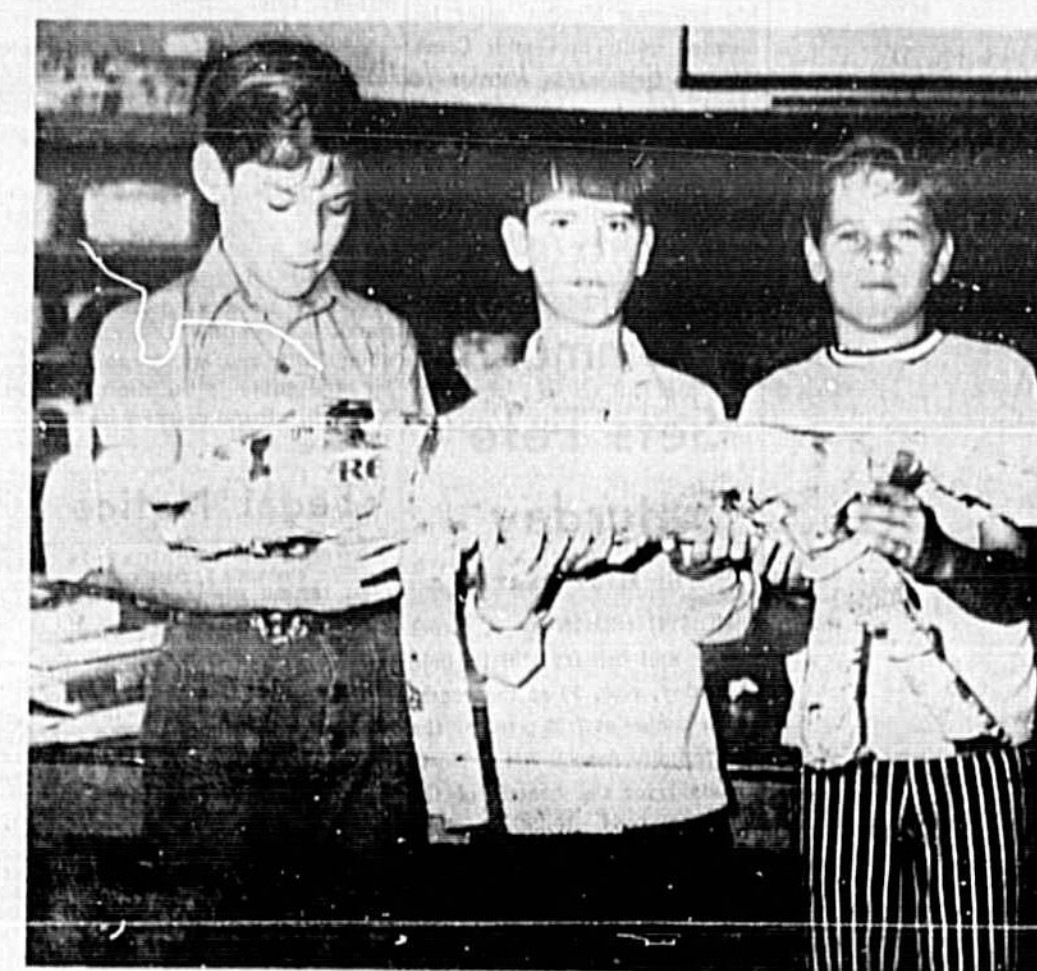

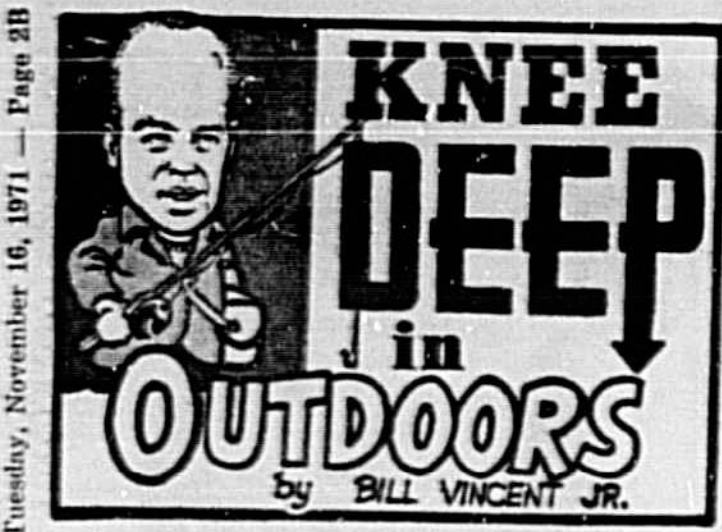

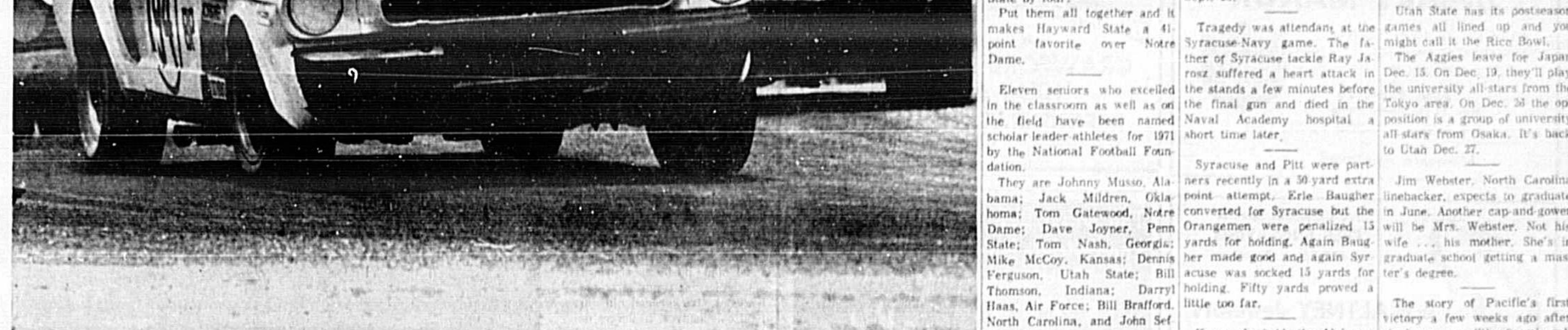

Attack On Nixon Escalates

Labor Waits Pay Board Rule

MIAMI BEACH (AP) — The nation's top labor leaders waited today for a crucial ruling of President Nixon's Pay Board that could determine if bitter union men will continue their reluctant cooperation with new federal wage controls.

But even if they win reversal of the board's ruling against payment of hundreds of millions of dollars in back pay, it isn't likely to soften organized labor's sharply escalating political attack on Nixon's economic and foreign policies.

Vo-Tec Education Battle Is Growing

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) — Sen. Fred Karl said Monday he would bitterly oppose any attempt to persuade the Legislature to put adult and vocational technical education back into the academic systems.

Karl's pledge was directed toward former Florida House Speaker Fred Schultz of Jacksonville during a public hearing of the Senate Vocational Technical Education Committee.

Schultz, discussing a report his committee will make in December to the Legislature, recalled he worked hard to get separate status for vo-tech in order to focus public attention on specialized educational needs.

"I wonder today, however if vo-tech is getting what it needs because it is split off and is out of control," he said.

Schultz decried the "lobbying" of separate divisions without objectively evaluating over all education needs.

He suggested a full-time school board possibly appointed by the governor and headed by an elected official such as the lieutenant governor to evaluate technical education share

equal division status with other divisions involving kindergarten through 12th grades, junior colleges and the state university system.

He said the nation's unemployment total had virtually doubled to some 5 million since Nixon took office.

Meany and the rest of the powerful 33-man executive council met Wednesday to decide the big labor federation's future course under Nixon's new economic policy, and today's expected Pay Board reconsideration could determine whether labor quits or stays on the board.

Meany said the policy-making executive board will make its recommendation to the AFL-CIO convention opening Thursday in Atlantic City.

Some 1,000 delegates will represent nearly 14 million union members in more than 100 unions.

Meanwhile, one union official said rank and file union pressure was building up for the five labor members to quit the Pay Board.

"They don't understand the operation of the Pay Board at all. They tell us 'get off the board,'" said Secretary-Treasurer Eugene Glover of the International Association of Machinists.

Jet Fuel Tax Hike Pictured

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Claiming the nation's big air carriers can well afford it, Florida's Secretary of Transportation Ed Mueller says he will ask lawmakers to increase their fuel tax payments 60 times over.

Major airlines pay a total of only \$50,000 a year to the state in the 4 per cent sales tax on jet fuel, he said, because they're required to pay only an amount over the state.

"As soon as they lift off out of Miami, they go over international waters," said Mueller in an interview. "So they don't pay on that."

A Department of Transportation bill to be submitted to the 1972 legislative session would make the airlines pay the tax on all fuel they take aboard, he said.

Right now, general aviation, consisting primarily of small private planes, contributes substantially more—almost \$900,000 annually—to the state's \$2.8 million a year aviation program.

"I think the airlines should pay it. On a trip from Miami to Chicago, it would only cost them 43¢ that's just half a cent," said Mueller.

Mueller said the average salary of National and Eastern Airlines president is \$105,000 a year, while "the governor only makes \$30,000," he said.
