### Army Spokesman Says Reservists Will Finish Term

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26—(AP)—An Army spokesman said last night there are no plans to release organized reservists sooner than the 24 month active duty term specified in the Universal Military Training and Service (UMTS) Act.

He spelled out the Army's reserve release plans as follows: 1. All organized reservists will serve 24 months. The only exceptions, he said, will be enlisted men whose extended enlistments expire before 24 months. They will be released on that earlier date and have no further reserve obligation.

2. Enlisted veterans and non-veterans called involuntarily from the volunteer and inactive reserve will be released by Dec. 30.

3. Enlisted veterans called voluntarily from the volunteer and inactive reserve will be released 10 months before or when their extended enlistments expire, whichever is sooner.

4. Officer veterans called either voluntarily or involuntarily from the volunteer or inactive reserve may apply for release after 17 months service since the Korean outbreak.

5. Officer non-veterans will serve 24 months, whether called voluntarily or involuntarily.

The Army spokesman said a veteran for these purposes is a man who served 12 months of active duty between Pearl Harbor and Sept. 2, 1945.

He said all enlistments which expired before June 30, 1952, have been extended 12 months from date of expiration but no man's enlistment may be extended more than once unless he consents.

Now that his hair has turned grey, Eden more than ever looks like a movie casting director's idea of a British statesman.

Thirty years ago his opponents taunted him about his good looks. They said it was the "flapper vote" that got him into Parliament.

But Eden can claim more than good looks. He has earned a big reputation for political integrity and the gentleness of his speech.

higher pinnacle than it did today. With the Conservatives back in control, it was certain that Churchill would be chosen by them to resume the post of Prime Minister. This is the office he held throughout World War II and lost in August, 1945, when a Socialist tidal wave swept his government out of office.

He told British voters, during the campaign, that putting an end to the cold war with the Communist world is "the last price I seek to win." This effort, and the modification of Socialist strictures on business and industry, undoubtedly will engage his attention immediately.

He may then step out of office in favor of his closest associate, Anthony Eden, who is reported slated for his former post of foreign secretary. Rumors to that effect were current in London even before the electioneering began.

Atlee now becomes the leader of "his majesty's loyal opposition," a position held by Churchill for the past six years.

King George VI summoned Churchill to Buckingham Palace tonight to ask him to form a new government. Churchill arrived soon after Atlee departed. Atlee called on the King to hand in his resignation ending six years and two months as Britain's Socialist premier. The alliance King saw both leaders personally, his first political visitors since his lung operation of Sept. 25.

Atlee was a solitary figure, slumped back in the seat of his limousine, as he drove to the palace. He was with the King 25 minutes. Only a handful of people—somewhere around 100 or so—looked on as Atlee, unsmiling and looking straight ahead of him, left 10 Downing Street, his official residence, to step into his car. Another handful was on hand as he left the place and Churchill arrived, smiling.

Atlee will carry on while a

new government is formed, but will make no policy decisions without consulting the Conservatives.

All the principal labor leaders were re-elected, even though the party as a whole was defeated. Atlee, Herbert Morrison, Aneurin Bevan, and a large group of erstwhile cabinet ministers and officers in the Labor government have been returned to the House. Depending on the size of the final Tory majority, the Laborites may find themselves in approximately the same position as their opponents were until Parliament was dissolved.

That is, the "working majority," so vital to a government, will be as difficult for the Tories to maintain as it was for Labor.

The popular vote gave an accurate reflection of the sharp cleavage in British public opinion over the success or failure of the great experiment in Socialism.

With virtually all the ballots counted, the Conservatives were running behind Labor by nearly 300,000 votes. Late totals showed Labor—13,561,814; Conservative—13,366,994; Liberals—664,323.

Most probably, the deciding factor that threw this election to the Conservatives was the absence of Liberal Party candidates in more than 500 of the nation's total 625 districts. The Liberals put only 109 candidates in the field.

In those areas where a straight Tory-Labor fight developed, the Liberal voters went to the Tories. It appeared that most of the Liberal analysis of the figures indicated about two out of every three Liberals voted for Churchill's party.

LONDON, Oct. 26—(AP)—British voters gave the Communists the biggest thrashing of their political career in the general elections.

Only ten Reds stood for Parliament. None of them came within miles of the winning post. All forfeited the £150 (£420) deposit which candidates have to post as a precaution against freak candidates. The deposit is lost if the contestant fails to win one eighth of the popular vote in his area.

In 1950 there were 100 Communist candidates, who polled 91,818 votes. Many of them lost their deposits to the state on that occasion too—but not by the margins in yesterday's voting.

In most constituencies it takes around 8,000 votes to save the deposit. Yesterday the Communists averaged around 2,000 votes each. Overall, they got only 21,640 votes—in spite of the fact they were fighting in handpicked constituencies.

The overall Communist vote is only a fraction of one percent of the popular vote.

The struggle was plentiful in North American waters before 1900.

With all the important things swirling about our heads, the following is a very minor complaint. I wish, however, that Dame Fashion and Mother Nature would get back into step.

For quite some time, the current feminine habit of rushing the seasons has been a source of irritation to most of us who are not fashion-plates but do try to look presentable.

travel and other modern improvements have pretty much defeated the onslaughts of heat and cold. Many people habitually travel quickly from climate to climate, blithely adjusting from bitter sub-zero cold in the ski country to the white-shoe warmth of Florida overnight.

In this mixed up world, it's no wonder that the seasons are losing their significance and that Spring is coming on earlier each year as far as fashion is concerned. Pretty soon, in the speed-up continues, the fashion cycle will spin so fast that Spring hats will actually catch up with Spring.

It is only the women who have been getting ahead of the weather in this bewildering fashion. Men stick closer to the calendar than the fair sex. Take a look around the cold weather states next Spring and you probably won't see a straw hat on a male until mid-May—and after that magic date they'll multiply like bottle flies. May 15, or the nearest Sunday to that date, has marked the opening of the straw-hat season for generation—and it's a date the gentlemen observe as carefully as their wedding anniversaries.

Would there were some hard and fast rules like that for the women. As it is now, a girl who wanders around in a cool, shady straw hat in mid-August can feel only self-conscious among her sisters who are aweltering but chic in their new velvet bonnets decorated with brilliants.

It's all very well to be smart in the head, but you can count me out when fashion decrees we have to rush the season whole hog. No matter what Jacques Fath and Christian Dior may possibly emanate some future day.

Theory Of Security

American newspapers seem to have a legitimate com-
plaint against Defense Department policy toward reporters,
arising out of the way it worked out in connection with an
arms demonstration at Fort Benning, Georgia. Under policy
laid down from Washington, local newspaper representa-
tives were barred. Attending the demonstration were
civilian and military leaders from North Atlantic Treaty
countries, and among them were ten foreign newspapermen.

The theory may be justified by a degree of necessity
in the case of military secrecy, although it leads with dis-
concerting frequency to such absurd situations as the re-
cent one at Fort Benning. But it would be tragic for the
American people if the military theory and method of dealing
with the press should spread throughout the entire
government. Under the controversial executive security
order there is a very real possibility of such an extension of
the military theory of security.

The Gambling Tax

\$50 annual head tax on those engaged in the trade of ac-
