# Special event fees set

SANFORD - The City of Sanford has approved a new set of fees for special events that would eliminate the need for individual occupational licenses during short-term functions.

The special events contained in the change to the City Code include exhibitions, shows, festivals, bazaars and other events.

Through a unanimous vote by the City Commission, the ordinance was passed on second reading with no public comments. The ordinance becomes effective immediately, and the change in fees are retroactive to Jan. 1 of this year. It allows for a reduction in charges made on two major events already held during

They include the Arts and Crafts Festival under the auspice of the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, and the Mardi Gras sponsored by All Souls Catholic Church.

According to the changes, an event with one to 10 vendors will pay a total of \$50 for a permit: for 11 to 25 vendors, the cost would be \$80; 26 to 75 would increase the amount to \$200; and

for 76 or more vendors, the cost would be \$500. In the past, sponsors of an event were required to obtain vendors licenses for each participant. Under the change, a blank amount will be charged by the city.

# Sanford cops plan to thwart prostitution



SANFORD - The men who solicit prostitutes in Sanford soon will be getting something they hadn't bargained for - publicity. Acting Sanford Police Chief Ralph Russell is developing a plan which should lead to the publication of the names of the "Johns."

Although the names of men charged in reverse prostitution stings may be published in routine arrest reports. Russell plans to organize the information and provide it to the press for publication.

"It might be in a press conference type of presentation," he explained. Russell and the chief of the vice squad have been discussing the idea since reading about the success of a similar operation in West Palm Beach,

They knew one another.

As she moved toward the vice cop, the driver she'd been talking to slowly pulled onto the street and left in the opposite direction.

A gentle rain was falling Thursday night, but she was out on the streets. A severe thunderstorm watch was in effect until eleven o'clock, but only the steady rain and an occasional lightning bolt flashed across the

night sky.
"I'm bein' good," she told the officer, "Nothing to do. I had a date, but I don't think he's comin' 'cause of the rain."

Asked what she was doing talking to the driver of the old car, she said, "I was just gettin" a light. I'm just goin'a stand over here for awhile."

As the officers pulled away. the sergeant explained the woman had been a registered nurse before she got hooked on crack. "She's been out on the streets ever since." he said. Before midnight, she would be in police custody, after getting into another undercover policeman's car, bearing her breast and rubbing his crotch, offering to perform a sex act for money. The policeman was wearing a wire and the entire conversation was transmitted and recorded in a backup car. When the woman specified an act and set a price. the arresting officers moved in.

In all, three women were charged with prostitution related offenses during the Thursday night operation. The undercover policeman who picked up the three only had \$40 to offer as payment and that came from the chief of the operation. As the police moved out to cruise the streets, the decoy radioed he needed cash.

"I don't think the five dollars I have in my pocket will buy much," he laughed.

Although many of the prostitutes working the dimiy-lit streets along Sanford Avenue know members of the city vice squad and even the unmarked vehicles they drive, officers and cars from other police agencies are regularly brought in and used in making arrests.

Police conscrvatively estimate. about 20 prostitutes work the downtown business district and the city's eastside. There are two known transvestite male pro-stitutes who work the Sanford tititie-

you can't tell they are men," the Although the two have been beaten up on occasion when unsuspecting "Johns" discovered the truth about their gender, sometimes the fact the prostitutes are really male goes undetected.

Many times the clients pay for oral sex by prostitutes," the undercover policeman said, "so they never know the prostitute is a man."

"The majority are crack addicts," the undercover police-man said of the prostitutes. Most are drug addicts and many have sexually transmitted diseases, perhaps even HIV the virus which causes AIDS. Although he said in some circuits in Florida AIDS testing for suspected prostitutes is mandatory, it is not in

Seminole County.

Even if testing was done, he added, because of the confidentiality issue, health department officials could not disclose the results to the police, or anyone.

"When you do this kind of work for a living." the policeman said, "you are going to get scratched or hurt." Officers then must undergo testing. "We re-cently got Hepatitis B vaccinations for the whole department."

Many of the veteran "ladies of the evening" know their way around the system and how to avoid a policeman.

"As law enforcement officers, we cannot expose ourselves to the women," the officer said, "we try to talk our way around it. One of the first things they (prostitutes) do is ask a man to expose himself to show he is not a policeman."

All three of the women arrested Thursday night asked the undercover officer to expose himself before starting any negotiations about sex acts or money. "Let rive see your d..." or "Drop your zipper" he was told. Before indicating they would perform a sex act on the undercover officer, all three women questioned if he was a policeman. In turn, he questioned if the women were undercover police. Sometimes the Sanford police run reverse sting operations where female officers pose as prostitutes and arrest the men who solicit sex on the streets.

Despite the picture brought to many peoples' minds when the word prostitute is mentioned, the women on the street Thursday night were dressed in shorts and blouses or jeans skirts, not an inch of spandex or a pair of spike-heel boots in

During the undercover investigation, several unmarked vehicles were on the streets, crise-crossing through alleys and each taking a turn keeping the car carrying the suspect under surveillance.

When the ex-nurse, the last of the three suspects, was arrested near midnight, she began screaming and kicking. "I didn't do anything man. I

was just asking for a ride home in the rain," she said. Instead, she was given a ride to the Sanford Police Station and then spent the night at the John E.

# Abortion foes ready for legal

21 July Contract Cont

SANFORD - Fifty anti-abortion activists were arrested Saturday in the second straight weekend of demonstrations targeting a clinic protected by a court-ordered buffer zone, police said.

Police officer John Gamerl said 46 adults and four juveniles over the age of 15 were taken into custody. They were arrested for defying a judge's injunction barring protesters from setting foot within the boundaries of the clinic or clinic workers' homes.

Two of the adults were also charged with child abuse for contributing to the delinquency of a minor when they escorted a Juvenile into the boundary area.

Protesters crossed a street up to six at a time every 10 to 15 minutes for several hours and were arrested when they reached the Aware Woman Center for Choice. Many kneeled as police officers approached and walked in short steps as they were led away.

The American Center for Law Justice, founded by religious presidential candidate Pat Robertson, will join with former Volusia County State Attorney John Tanner in defending the 51 people arrested by Melbourne police two weeks ago at the Aware Woman Center for Choice clinic. ACL attorney John Stepanovich will come to Florida from his Washington, D.C. office to assist Tanner.

Tanner is known locally for the controversy he created prior to his re-election defeat last year by his efforts to prosecute tion. "The order is a very common form of

Orlando lawyer Mat Staver will continue his federal appeal of McGregor's order. Last week, U.S. District Judge G. Kendali Sharp refused to grant a temporary stay of the order, but decided he would consider permanently overruling the order.

Staver said he would appeal Sharp's decision on the temporary injunction to the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta this week. Staver's firm is Liberty Counsel, a religious civil rights practice. And Orlando lawyer Christopher Weiss

said Friday he would appeal McGregor's order to the Fifth District Court of Appeals in Daytona Beach. Weiss represented prolife protesters before McGregor last month. A representive of the clinic defenders says

they're ready.

"We're prepared to take 'em on all the way," said Katherine Spillar, national coordinator for the Feminist Majority Foundainjunction. You can't use free speech to terrorize."

The clinics have hired Talbot "Sandy" D'Alemberte of Miami and Kathy Patrick of Houston to defend them. D'Alemberte is past president of the American Bar Associa-

tion. Patrick has been successful in gaining similar protest restrictions in Houston. "We have two of the best," said Spillar,

adding "We're ready for any contingency."

The center of the battle is McGregor's April 8 order restricting anti-abortion protests at Aware Woman. After hearing 214 days of testimony that protesters would walk in front of cars entering the clinic and approach clients at the clinic and employees at their homes, McGregor created a "bubble zone" around the clinic.

The protesters are prevented from entering a 38-foot zone around the clinic and approaching clients within 300 feet of the center. Protesters are also prohibited from demonstrating within 300 feet of clinic employee's homes.

Tanner and chief ACLJ counsel Jay Schulow said Friday McGregor's order was a clear violation of the protester's First Amendment rights to free speech.

"There is a fine line between what he is trying to accomplish and any citizen's right to free speech," said Tanner. "There is a growing movement in the state and the country to restrict free speech rights because we don't like what they say."

and the "johns" in the paper," the undercover officer said, "We hope it will discourage the customers." By cutting down on the number of potential customers, prostitution on the city streets may be reduced, officers hope.

A sting operation is when male police officers pose as potential customers for the prostitutes to arrest them. A reverse sting is when female officers pose as prostitutes and arrest men who

Prostitution is a misdea-meanor criminal charge which carries a maximum sentence of 60 days in jail and a \$500 fine.

Just last week, a transient was picked up for prostitution in Sanford. She served two days in jail. At her first court appearance

at the John E. Polk Correctional Facility, under a negotiated plea with the state attorney, she was sentenced to two days in jail with credit for time served. She was freed.

Jack Scalara, chief of operations in the state attorney's office, said each case is handled on an individual basis. Even if the woman had been given a fine and probation, she probably would not have stayed around to serve the probation. She had no money to pay the fine, he added. The vice officers agree but

reason that because she did not have any money, when she got out of fail she would try to turn "tricks" to earn some. So far, she has not been rearrested in Sanford.

'Sometimes they are out (of jail) before we get back to the station," the vice cop explained.

Some of the same names keep popping up on the arrest sheets. too. About 20 prostitutes work the Sanford streets. Although the majority are black, the number of white prostitutes is growing, according to vice officers. The majority of the prostitutes are drug addicts who engage in the "world's oldest profession" to feed their habits, police say.

Russell said the local state attorney's office does not file habitual criminal cases on misdeameaner charges.

Although cruising the streets in undercover operations can net some prostitution arrests, the police also get tips from neighborhood watch groups and business owners complaining about activities near their homes and businesses.

Many of the prostitution re- prostitution.

lated arrests in the city occur on Sanford Avenue from Third Street all the way to Hwy. 17-92. During 1991, the city recorded 33 arrests for prostitution related offenses, 19 in 1992 and seven so far this year.

The cooperation of various police agencies, including the City County Investigative Bureau, helps in making the arrests, by providing officers and vehicles for the operation which are not recognized by the prostitutes. Sometimes the police get information about drugs from the prostitutes.

One prostitute told a vice officer she was going to get in trouble for talking to him. She said that a man had warned her not to talk with police. She was arrested later Thursday night during a sting operation for

# Trial ends, verdict announced

LOS ANGELES - A federal Jury convicted two police officers Saturday of violating the civil rights of black motorist Rodney King, capping a tumultuous two years that began with his videotaped beating and led to the nation's worst rioting in decades. Two other officers were

acquitted. The convictions of the sergeant who supervised the beating and the officer who struck the most baton blows were announced in an unusual 7 a.m. court session. It lasted only 15 minutes, compared with the jury's agonizing 40 hours of deliberations spread over seven

Churchgoers in riot-scarred South Central Los Angeles greeted the decision with highfives and shouts of "Thank you, Jesus!" and "Justice!" President Clinton praised the jury.

All 7,700 city police officers were mobilized in anticipation of the verdict, and 'Co National Guard troops were standing by in armories. But the streets were calm after the jury's decision was announced.

The outcome was a dramatic contrast to the officers' first trial in state court a year ago. That jury took 32 hours to acquit them of most assault charges, deadlocking on one. The verdicts sparked three days of rioting in Los Angeles that killed 54 and caused \$1 billion in damage, and unrest hit other cities from Atlanta to San Francisco.

The federal jury had heard more than six weeks of testimony, including from King, who didn't testify in the state trial. The jury also repeatedly watched the videotape showing King being pummeled by batons, kicked and shocked with an electronic stun gun.

That videotape - shot by George Holliday, who lived across the street from the beating scene and was testing a new camera — was broadcast worldwide, provoking debate over police brutality and racism.

Sgt. Stacey Koon, the supervior at the scene of the March 3, 1991, beating, was convicted of allowing King's civil rights to be violated. Officer Laurence Powell, who delivered the most baton blows in the videotape, was convicted of violating those rights.

Officer Theodore Briseno and Timothy Wind, a rookie officer fired after the beating, were acquitted. Briseno was shown stomping on King at one point but also appeared to try to stop the beating: Wind didn't appear

to take a major role in it.

King was home with his family as the verdicts were read, said his attorney, Milton Orimes, who expressed regret that two of the defendants were acquitted. Where King lives has been kept secret.

The case sparked racial tensions because King is black and the officers white. The federal jury had nine whites, two blacks, and one Hispanic; the state jury in suburban Simi Valley had 10 whites, one Asian, and one Hispanic.

King gave conflicting testimo-

ny in the federal trial about whether the officers yelled racial slurs at him, and the judge ruled before the trial that prosecutors didn't have to prove the beating

was racially motivated. The Jurors reached their verdict Friday afternoon but asked to go back to their hotel to pack up before it was read.

Shortly after 7 a.m. Saturday, the courtroom was silent as, the Jury foreman rose and handed over to court clerk Jim Holmes a red folder filled with verdict

As the first verdict was read -Koon guilty - the sergeant, who had maintained a stoic attitude throughout the trial, didn't move a muscle and sat staring straight

With the second verdict -

attorney, Michael Stone, scated next to him, waited a moment, then put his hand on Powell's shoulder and squeezed it.

The convicted officers face up to 10 years in prison and \$250,000 in fines. Sentencing was set for Aug. 4. Koon and Powell remained free on \$5,000

The jurors were solemn. Some sat with heads down as the verdicts were read. But they answered strongly "Yes" when the clerk asked if the announced verdicts were correct.


U.S. District Judge John G. Davies thanked the Jurors, who had been sequestered since late February, and promised to keep their identities secret unless

Powell guilty — the officer went they decide to go public. He ashen-faced but didn't move. His warned them not to reveal the identity of any other juror.

In churches in South Central, ministers and parishioners prayed through the night. At the First AME Church, the assembled crowd exchanged high-fives and cheers as the convictions were announced on television, and the Rev. Jesse Jackson wept.

As the acquittals of Briseno and Wind were read, church members reassured themselves. "That's all right. That's all

Jackson said the guilty verdicts would give black Americans "some restoration of confidence in the traditional system."

# Clinton working to form Iran policy

WASHINGTON — For the moment, President Bill Clinton has provided public and private indications that at least one element of his evolving foreign policy — the U.S. relationship with Iran — is distinctly different

from the 12 years of Reagan-Bush flops.

The Clinton administration view is that the Republican administrations strained to find particles of progress from Iran, and then placated that country through secret weapons sales, secret diplomacy and unre-quited wishful thinking.

In the last two years of the Bush administration, the former Texas oliman allowed huge purchases of Iranian oil by the United States, which has die rectly contributed to billion arms butidup in Iran.

Clinton is operating without a compass when it comes to Iran, since there is very little precedent from which to draw. The last three U.S. presidents have watched their administrations self-

destruct in that part
of the world. American foreign policy has been mortgaged on the emergence of the still-clusive moderates in the Iranian regime.

This tortured history explains why Clinton is being guided by some advisers who believe he should reach out to the opposition to the current franian regime headed by Hashemi Rafamjani. A key test down the road will be whether Clinton ultimately plays his trump card by ending American purchases of Iranian oil, and seeking United Nation sanctions for Iran's human-rights abuses. arms buildup and support of international

As status quo as Clinton's foreign policy appears to be in Haiti and Bosnia, there are indications that a new trail is being blazed regarding fran, at least rhetorically. During a recent Senate hearing, Secretary of State Warren Christopher branded Iran as an "international outlaw" for its support of terrorism and feverish acquisition of weapons of mass destruction.

For Christopher, it's partly personal. He had to deal with Iranian hard-liners as the chief American negotiator in winning the release of Americans held hostage during the Carter administration. More important for a

Carter administration. More important for a veteran such as Christopher, the animus is fusied by America's closest Arab ally. Presidented by America's closest Arab ally. fueled by America's closest Arab ally, President Honni Mubarak of Egypt, Regarding Iran, Mubarak is a hard-liner because it hits home. Mubarak has informed the United States that he believes iran is the chief foreign power funding and goading fundamentalists in Egypt into overthrowing his (Mubarek's) government.

Clinton is still sounding conciliatory in public, in a interview on CBS recently, he said he "wished Iran would come into the family of nations." Privately, Clinton's core fears about Iran found expression in a private

fears about Iran found expression in a private communication he sent last December to Massoud Rafavi, leader of the most important and largest Iranian opposition group, the People's Mojahedin. Rafavi has been building a large Iranian military force capable of overthrowing Rafsanjani, and is head-quartered now in Iraq, on the Iranian border. Inside Iran, his supporters foment strikes and other incidents designed to undermine the

government and prepare the stage for an armed, populist overthrow.

"U.S. foreign policy cannot be divorced from the moral principles most Americans share." Clinton began the private letter to the rebel leader. "We cannot diaregard how other governments treat their own people. De-mocracies are more reliable trading partners than dictatorships. They are more likely to protect the environment and to abide by international law."





Children get a Healthy Start

TALLAHASSEE - Some 66,000 pregnant women were screened in the last year for conditions that would make them more likely to give birth to tiny, sickly bables and 45 percent were found to be at risk.

Some 70 percent of those women got extra services, like nutritional counseling and home visits. Gov. Lawton Chiles said Thursday, marking the first year anniversary of his prenatal ini-

That's the good news, Chiles

"The bad news is that 30 percent are not receiving that care," he said. Those women who fall through the cracks are more likely to have bables with health and developmental problems, some severe enough to be

in addition to the women, 123,000 newborns were screened during the last year for signs that they needed special services. Some 13 percent fell into the risk category and 70 percent of that group received extra services.

The goal of the prenatal program is to screen all pregnant women in Florida.

However, only about half of the women who gave birth last year were offered acreenings, according to Dr. Leslie Beitsch, assistant state health officer.

Florida is spending \$91 mil-

lion on prenatal programs this year, with over half the money coming from the federal government. The budget will increase in the fiscal year that starts in July to \$110 million.

CHICAGO - Fresh research supports previous conclusions by AIDS experts that the chance of contracting the deadly virus from infected doctors or dentists is extremely remote.

More than 2,500 patients were treated by two AIDS-infected surgeons and a dentist without catching the virus from them, according to studies appearing in an issue of The Journal of the American Medical Association.

A preventive medicine expert who did not participate in the research said the studies were reassuring, but argued they should have looked at people with the AIDS virus whose infections couldn't be traced to other sources.

"If you are aggressively looking for transmission, you have to start from the other side," said Dr. William Schaffner, chairman of preventive medicine at Vanderbilt University School of Medicine in Nashville.

He cited the case of Kimberly Bergalis, the late Florida woman whose infection is blamed on her dentist, who also died of AIDS.

The infections of Bergalis and four other HIV-positive patients of the same dentist are the only known cases of doctor-to-patient AIDS transmission, Schaffner said in an accompanying edito-

# Scientists change blood types to improve transfusion supply

NEW YORK - Last year, Roberto Fernandez signed up for an experience that normally might have killed him: As a person with type O blood, he got a transusion from a person with type B blood.

But the transfusion did no harm. "Matter of fact, I felt better," the 34-year-old maintenance worker recently recalled.

Fernandez is one of a few participants so far in project to erase the transusion barrier between people of different blood types. Its aim is to turn blood of any kind into type O-negative, the co-called "universal donor" kind that is propriate for almost anybody.

Eventually, blood banks might be able to hold heir stocks in the universal donor type, so they sould no longer have to deal with typical hortages of type O, says researcher Jack loldstein.

The goal of converting blood, being pursued by everal researchers, still faces scientific stacles. And it is not clear whether it would out too much to be feasible.

But converting type B or especially the more mmon type A to type O "would be extremely celpful in allowing you to get around regional shortages, and Dr. Harvey Klein, chief of the separtment of transfusion medicine at the stational institutes of Health.

Goldstein, head of the Cell Biochemistry aboratory at the Lindsley F. Kimball Research

Institute at the New York Blood Center, is now testing in people a process to convert type B blood.

The work focuses on red cells, the component of blood that is of one type or another. Doctors transfuse red cells into patients who have lost a lot of blood from injuries, for example, which is why the Navy is paying for Goldstein's work.

The A, B and O blood types were discovered at

the turn of the century. Type A blood has one kind of sugar molecule on the surface of red cells, and type B has another kind. Type AB has both: Type O has neither.

The problem for transfusions is that a recipient's disease-fighting immune system attacks red cells with unfamiliar sugars. So if Fernandez had gotten ordinary type B cells in his transfusion, they would have been clumped

together and destroyed.

Goldstein's strategy is to clip the offending sugars from the surfaces of the red cells, making them type O. After a decade of work, he still has plenty to do.

The most advanced part of the project is for removing the B-type sugar. Goldstein's lab mixes red cells with an enzyme that clips it off. Then the enzyme is washed away and the red cells are placed in a salt solution for transfusion.

In the current studies, four people with type O blood have been transused with the number of converted red cells contained in two pints of blood. The converted cells have survived normally and the people have shown no side effects, Goldstein said





# O'Neal cleaning up in endorsements

Shaquille O'Neal might be the best big man since Kareem Abdul-Jabbar. And he just might turn out to be a bigger pitchman than Michael Jordan.

Jordan is currently making more money off the court than O'Neal, but the Orlando Magic's superstar rookie is more pre-cocious than "Air Jordan" ever

Before long, the "Shaq" is expected to streak past the ubiquitous Jordan as a marketing force.

O'Neal has a seven-year contract with the Magic for about \$40 million. Even more impressive is the latest estimate from long-term endorsements: \$70 million, with products that include Reebok, Pepsi, Spalding and Kenner Toys, among others.

O'Neal has his own business firm, Management Plus Enterprises, his personalized logo, a signature ball and his own line of clothing.

And he's only 21 years old. "It's been like a thermonuclear explosion," says O'Neal's agent, Leonard Armato, "more than people imagined, I'm sure." Reebok, O'Neal's most lucrative endorsement, seconds

"(O'Neal's impact) is absolutely way beyond anyone expected," says Roberto Muller, president of Reebok Sports which signed O'Neal to a multi-year contract reportedly worth \$20 million. "We were more lucky than we were

Ironically, Jordan's endorsement company, Nike, passed on O'Neal because of the belief that centers don't make good endorsers. The thinking was that big men don't have the flair of players who dribble, run and shoot from all over the floor.

Plus, it's generally thought that the intimidating size of centers make them seem more unapproachable and less relatable to the average fan. Wilt Chamberlain once remarked that "nobody loves Goliath," a statement that has haunted him.

But just about everybody loves Shaq, thanks to a blend of power and innocence that makes him appealing to young and old alike. As Armato says, "He is a cross between the Terminator and

Bambi." At 7-foot-1 and 300 pounds, O'Neal's figure is impressive. But he is more than just a curiosity in the NBA because of his wide-body size. O'Neal has made an impact with the flair of his play and boyish enthusiasm.

A player of the year in college at Louisiana State, O'Neal was good enough to be the first NBA rookie to be an all-star since Jordan. Interestingly, O'Neal scored 14 points in his first NBA all-star game; Jordan only had 7 in 1985, his NBA debut as an all-star.

Good as Jordan is, he never made the impact on the league in his first season that O'Neal

O'Neal is among the NBA's leading scorers, rebounders and shot-blockers, and he has broken hydraulic basket supports and shattered backboards with his powerful dunks. But it's not just O'Neal's often-spectacular play that has marketers cheering. Muller thinks that O'Neal's assets go way beyond physical accomplishments.

"In Shaquille, we have the charisma of Magic Johnson, the talent of the NBA's legendary centers, and a personality that supersedes Michael Jordan," says Muller. "It took Jordan three years to have the same impact that Shaq had in three months."

An indication of O'Neal's popularity was no more evident at the NBA all-star game when his



# Florida facing "

Biologists use the term "biological pollution" to describe the escape and establishment of exotic wildlife. As a result of Hurricane Andrew, dozens of wildlife dealers lost their facilities and their animals. Hundreds of exotic species, including monkeys, parrots, snakes, lizards and amphibians, fled from their wrecked cages and enclosures. Although many of the animals were captured, countless others no doubt will survive and breed in the wilds of Florida.

Many species of wildlife from around the world can adapt to the conditions found in Florida's subtropical climate. Florida already supported a large variety of nonnative animals before the exotics. Florida law makes it a crime to release such species into the wild intentionally.

Exotics can prey on or compete with our native species. Our resources are under enough environmental stress without having to compete with exotics for food or space. Many exotics



also can pose a threat to human safety (venomous snakes) and to our agricultural/horticultural interests (parrots, armadillos).

We must maintain control of exotic species if we are to be successful at managing and protecting Florida's resources for ourselves and future generations. If you have exotic pets or know others who do, please make sure their cages are secure at all times. Exotics are often escape artists" and have a way of taking advantage of any weakness in holding facilities. Help fight biological pollution by keeping exotics in captivity.

Shupe's Scoop We must be especially careful

when introducing exotic species of fish to Florida waters, as most exotics have no natural enemies to keep their populations in check. The Nile perch or Tilapia is a prime example of what can happen when this occurs.







# First lady deputy

# Despite odds, Jacques stuck to her guns

SANFORD - Seminole County's first female deputy is celebrating her 23rd year with the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.

Carol Jaques of Sanford began her career with the sheriff's office Jan. 21, 1971. She started in the accounting department and when the crime lab was brought into Sanford, she took the responsibility for the lab's accounting too.

The sheriff's office was still small at that time. There were about 35 employees on the payroll and that included the crossing guards. The office now totals well over 400 employees on the payroll.

Through working with the road deputies, Jacques became very intrigued over the duties they performed. One day in 1972 she approached Sheriff John E. Polk about taking training to become a deptuty.

His answer at that time was, "No, I don't think we will ever need a female deputy in Seminole County."

Her desire was so great that she continued to let her superiors know that she wanted to attend the Basic Recruit Training School. The sheriff finally agreed to sponsor her but with one stipulation. She would have to attend the classes on her

For the next three months, four days a week, she would report to work at 6 a.m., take a short lunch break and be at Seminole Communly College at 3:30 p.m. to begin classes which lasted until 10 in the evening. At that time the total hours to become certified were 220. Now it takes over 500 hours to get certified. Jacques finished in the top of her class.

She continued her studies and finished off her degree in criminal justice. Once more she approached the sheriff for a chance to become a deputy and his answer was the same as before.

She continued, "I didn't know what was going on. The audit had been completed and I thought it had something to do with that. The captains were in his office, too. They were just sitting there smiling which made me feel a little scared of what was about to happen. Sheriff

Polk looked at me and smiled. Then he said, 'Well, you're going to be the first.' I didn't know what was going on, but he said he was going to swear me in. He didn't that day because he was going off to the FBI Academy for training. However, the next weekend he came back home, and on June 11, 1975, I was sworn

eights, runaways and missing persons. It was that period of time that she and her lieutenant ran into a case that still baffles the entire sheriff's office to this day.

She continued, "My lieutenant and I were just talking about this case again today. He says he is not going to retire until this case is solved. This all started in late 1976. I can't remember the lady's name, but it is in the records. We had an elderly lady disappear from the Lake Monroe Inn. Many, many, many man hours have been put in on it and still have no clue as to where she is."

Her lieutenant was the department's pilot at that time. "The lieutenant and I spent many hours flying over the wooded areas looking for her but never found or saw a thing suspicious. She and her husband and two family friends had gone to dinner. Witnesses say she had become ill at the dinner table and went out to the car by herself.

"When her husband and friends went out to the car, it and she were gone. We have dragged that lake, sent divers down to search it and even flew heat sensors over it to try to detect something or anything. To this day we have found nothing. absolutely nothing on this case. We have not got so much as the first clue as to her whereabouts. We have checked with the state insurance commissioner and even bank accounts in an attempt to pick up something, but so far nothing. She just disappeared. Someday I hope to see this one solved myself.

Ross explained, "You have to play your objective with your voice, with your mouth. That's his biggest weapon. The language he uses, the way he trys to control people, manipulate them or just have fun with them. Depends on how you look at it. A lot of characters have briefcases. They have things they can write down. They can talk and they can move. Dr. Emerson takes a needle and injects it into me without my permission. Things like that can destroy somebody's dignity. It makes you feel real small when someone can do something like that to you."

The only thing the patient can do in defense of the many attitudes he will face is in the form of all verbals. Bogart has to concentrate on getting the most out of each verbal attack that he makes on the different individuals he will encounter.

He explained the hardest thing he had to do. "It is not necessarily staying still, because they told me to concentrate on what I A basket of candy-filled Easter could do and not what I can't do. Now, I know you can't use your hands. You can't use your arms. were served by hostesses Don't even think about things you can't do. What you can do is what you have to use to build the character. He thinks about facts, you're alive or you're dead, and has nothing to do with how you feel emotionally. I try to break him down to make him look at me on my level."

The doctor is similar to the administrator but is also a lot like the patient so Bogart calls her in between. He explained, "I find her very intellectually stimulating. She is a female and very attractive. All these things come into play when you talk to someone you try to make a move on and that is why I have that line. You have nice breasts. I want her reaction and I want to see how she reacts. So I talk to her like I am flirting with her. There are times when she acts like a doctor and then I have to change my approach and begin yelling at her. I always end up talking straight to her telling her it is my choice." The play continues into the





card is more successful than that of a higher one.


Look at today's deal. South wasn't sure what to bid over East's one-spade opening. But he felt he would have successful than the felt he would have successful the successful than that of a higher one. felt he would have some play for four hearts. And his direct leap had the advantage of making life tough for the opponents.

West led the spade six, which South knew to be a singleton. Counting his tricks, South saw four spades, five or six hearts and one diamond. There were no problems; all was plain sailing. He called for the spade 10. But East defended well. Judging the position correctly, he played not his queen but the two. Beginning to feel uncomfort-

able. South continued with four rounds of trumps. West won the last and switched to the diamond 10. Declarer knew he was finished. Whatever he did, he had to lose four tricks: one spade, one heart and two clubs. He didn't have the necessary dummy entries to pick up the spades.

Let us return to the first trick. Suppose that instead of playing the "automatic" spade 10. South calls for dummy's seven. What can East do? It cannot benefit him to duck, so he covers with the nine. South wins with the king and plays four rounds of hearts. West switches to a diamond, but after winning with dummy's ace. South has no trouble finessing in spades through East. Declarer ends with 10 tricks: four spades, five hearts and one diamond.




