# Navy's Mission In State Told To Lawmakers

By Harry I, Johnson What the Navy does for Florida and what Florida can do for the Navy were spelled out Friday afternoon at a toplevel briefing at Sanford Naval Air Station.

Meeting at the base were state legislators and members of the Florida Chamber of Commerce military affairs committee,

They heard reports from the state's highest ranking Navy officers and then witnessed one of the most spectacular air demonstrations ever staged at the local base.

Speaking were Vice Adm. A. S. Heyward Jr., chief of naval air training at Pensacola; Rear Adm. Robert Goldthwaite, commander of Fleet Air, Jacksonville, and Rear Adm. T. A. Christopher, commander of the Key West forc-

Each spelled out the duties of their respective station and told of the economic impact on the state.

Admiral Heyward explained how his officers and . Gree train flyers and and aupport personnel; Admiral Goldthwaite told of his Jacksonville military complex, one which includes the local station, and Admiral Christopher told of his role at the "Gibralter on the Gulf."

Capt. Chandler W. Swanson, commanding officer of the local station, welcomed the estimated 200 visitors and pointed to the hot RASC Vigilante as the best sircraft of its type in the world.

He also expressed warm approval of the community-Navy relations and declared it "unsurpassed anywhere."

After the briefings by the admirals, Capt. James O. Mayo, commander of Reconnaissance Attack Wing One. showed slides of a Vigilante as it approached a carrier and explained what the visitors would see when they visited the flight line,

There they watched simulated takeoffs and landings on carriers, air refueling and a demonstration of the capabilities of the aircraft, some of which were flown here from Key West, Jacksonville and Pensacola for the afternoon.



# Speak Out, Mme. Nhu

"I know too well that though called democratic, the U.S.A. has never cared to give its citizens the right to answer in the press . . ."

Thus does Madame Ngo Dinh Nhu

snip at Uncle Sam's beard while explaining why she did not bother to reply to charges that she and her daughter left this country after their visit in 1963 owing some \$11,000 in hotel and other bills.

Mme. Nhu, outspoken and strongwilled sister-in-law of the late South Viet Nam President Ngo Dinh Diem, was in America at the time to tell us what was wrong with us and what we should do to win the war over there—namely, back up Diem unquestioningly.

Diem, however, was murdered in a coup in November-having been betrayed, said Mme. Nhu as she departed our shores, by "Judas dollars of American foreign aid."

In any event, Mme. Nhu now states that the bulk of the expenses attributed to her were run up by a bunch of high-living Vietnamese body guards assigned to protect her. When she learned about it, she requested the Vietnamese embassy to put a stop to it.

She was also, she says, duped by an American who posed as a philanthropist wanting to serve the cause of Viet Nam and freedom. He accepted money from her for certain purchases he made and was evidently reluctant about forwarding the money to the creditor. All other personal expenses, says Mme. Nhu, were promptly paid.

No one cares very much about all this, of course, but we print it just the same to show Mme. Nhu that occasionally this "phony democracy" does allow people to speak out in the public press.

# Who Loses? UN

Georgraphically, Indonesia is one of the largest countries in the world. In population it ranks fourth. In any other terms, however, the

sprawling archipelago has to be rated small potatoes economically undeveloped, politically immature, militarily second- or third- rate.

Its withdrawal from the United Nations raises the question, not of what will become of that body, but what will become of Indonesia.

The United Nations is not, by any important comparison, the same as the old League of Nations, which was virtually doomed to disintegra-tion, long before Nazi Germany or Fascist Italy pulled out of it in the 1980s, by the decision of the United States not to join.

Unlike the League, the U.N. has grown in strength and prestige since its founding nearly 20 years ago. Until Indonesia, no nation had resigned. or even considered resigning, whereas the first abandonment of the League occurred a mere five years after it came into being.

Membership in the U.N. has proved far more advantageous than nonmembership for both large and small nations. The reasons may be different for each, but the fact re-

mains the same for all. But while its power ranking may be low, Indonesia's capacity for working mischlef is high. Any close partnership with Red China, which is evidently what President Achmed Sukarno is seeking, will inevitably lead to new trouble-though it is hard to see how much more there could be in that part of the world.

An outright invasion of Malaysia would bring overwhelming condemnation from other netions, if not actual war with the "U.N. Si would also bring military defeat to Indonesia.

There are some who predict Indonesia will not stray very far from the U.N. fold, nor for very long. This seems like wishful thinking, though, in view of the growing power of the Peking-ordered Communist party of

The Communists have not quite taken over the government as yet. As long as Sukarno's "guided democracy" is headed in the direction it is today, they really don't have to.



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






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# **PTA Reports** On Proposed \*Legislation

Bear Lake Elementary School, who recently attended a legislative workshop in Tallahassee, reported Thursday to the County Council of Parent-Teacher Associations meeting at South Seminole Junior

High School at Casselberry. He listed laws being given priority by the PTA for setion in this session of the legfalature. Some of the items included under quality education are a minimum foundation program, up-to-date text books and materials, adequate libraries and improved guidance service.

The group also favors the enforcement of reassessment for tax purposes according to the law; the appointing of county school superintendents instead of electing and of setting up a statewide standard of minimum qualifications for the job.

Another ruling favored would be putting private schools in the state under regulations to combat diploma mills and other abuses.

They recommend setting up committees to study such pressing problems as dropouts, vocational technical training, mental health, rehabilitation of juvenile offenders, special treatment for sex offenders, and youth employment.

Educating youth regarding the hazards of using narcotics, tobacco, and alcohol and a program of health education in the areas of physical fitness, immunization, and venereal disease prevention were miso endorsed.

Preservation of religious freedom also was stressed.







U. S. sources indicated they still have seen no evidence through any diplomatic channels of Communist willingness to negotiate an end to the war on terms even remotely acceptable to Washington.


