

## Navy's Mission In State Told To Lawmakers

What the Navy does for Florida and what Florida can do for the Navy were spelled out Friday afternoon at a top-level briefing at Sanford Naval Air Station.

Meeting at the base were state legislators and members of the Florida Chamber of Commerce military affairs committee.

They heard reports from the state's highest ranking Navy officer and then witnessed one of the most spectacular air demonstrations ever staged at the local base.

Speaking were Vice Adm. A. S. Heyward Jr., chief of naval air training at Pensacola; Rear Adm. Robert Goldthwaite, commander of Fleet Air, Jacksonville; and Rear Adm. T. A. Christopher, commander of the Key West force.

Each spelled out the duties of their respective station and told of the economic impact on the state.

Admiral Heyward explained how his officers and crew train flyers and support personnel; Admiral Goldthwaite told of his Jacksonville military complex, one which includes the local station, and Admiral Christopher told of his role at the "Gibraltar on the Gulf."

Capt. Chandler W. Swanson, commanding officer of the local station, welcomed the estimated 200 visitors and pointed to the hot RASC Vigilante as the best aircraft of its type in the world.

He also expressed warm approval of the community-Navy relations and declared it "un-surpassed anywhere."

After the briefings by the admirals, Capt. James O. Mayo, commander of Reconnaissance Attack Wing One, showed slides of a Vigilante as it approached a carrier and explained what the visitors would see when they visited the flight line.

There they watched simulated takeoffs and landings on carriers, air refueling and a demonstration of the capabilities of the aircraft, some of which were flown here from Key West, Jacksonville and Pensacola for the afternoon.

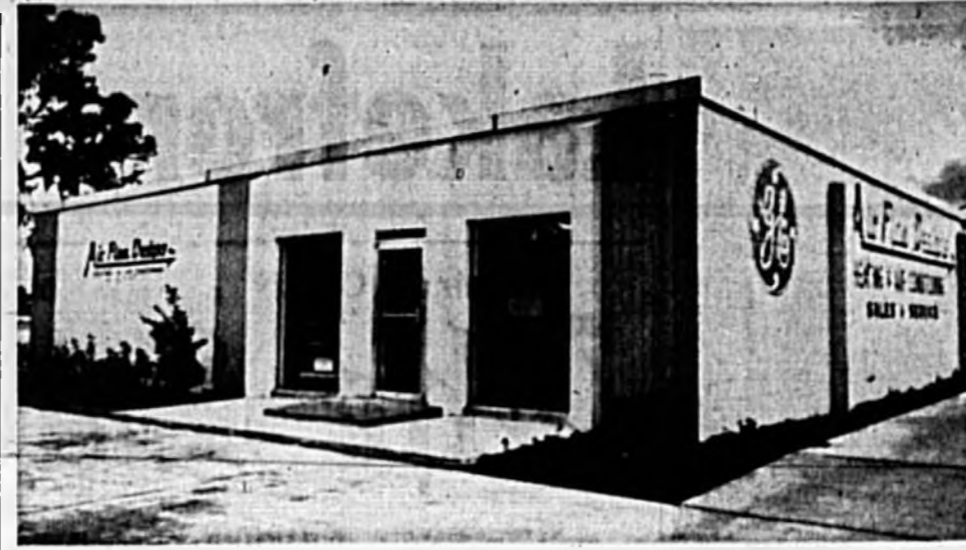

He was a retired general contractor and had lived in Sanford for the past five years. He was a member of the Czechoslovakia Society of America.

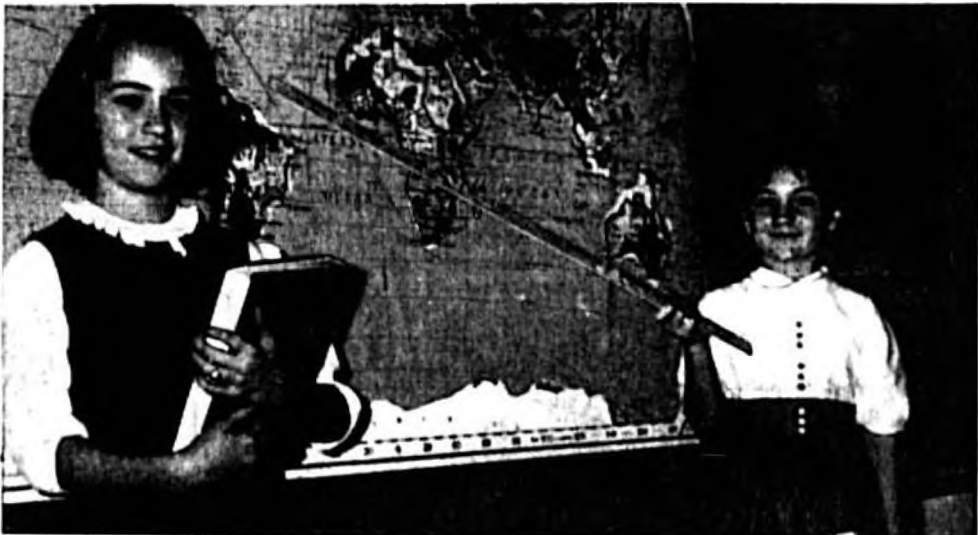

## Sanfordite Guilty Of Manslaughter

A Volusia Circuit Court jury deliberated until 11:30 p.m. Wednesday before returning a verdict of guilty of manslaughter against Walter Payne, of Sanford.

Payne had been charged with first degree murder in the death of Floyd Dodson, of Paola, at a fish camp on the St. Johns River in May 1963. The defendant was remanded for sentencing at a later date.

Herbert Turner of Sanford, is awaiting trial on a charge of being an accessory to the slaying.

Dodson's battered body was found floating in a boat. Police report Dodson, Payne, Turner and others had been drinking at the time of the fatal fight and resultant death. The defendants were nabbed by the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Georgia and returned to Volusia County for trial.

### PTA Reports On Proposed Legislation

By Jane Casselberry  
Principal George Dabbs of Bear Lake Elementary School, who recently attended a legislative workshop in Tallahassee, reported Thursday to the County Council of Parent-Teacher Associations meeting at South Seminole Junior High School at Casselberry.

He listed laws being given priority by the PTA for action in this session of the legislature. Some of the items included under quality education are a minimum education program, up-to-date text books and materials, adequate libraries, and improved guidance service.

The group also favors the enforcement of reassessment for tax purposes according to the law; the appointing of county school superintendents instead of electing and of setting up a statewide standard of minimum qualifications for the job.

Another ruling favored would be putting private schools in the state under regulations to combat diploma mills and other abuses.

They recommend setting up committees to study such pressing problems as dropouts, vocational technical training, mental health, rehabilitation of juvenile offenders, special treatment for sex offenders, and youth employment.

Educating youth regarding the hazards of using narcotics, tobacco, and alcohol and a program of health education in the areas of physical fitness, immunization, and venereal disease prevention were also endorsed.

Preservation of religious freedom also was stressed.

## Parlay Winner 'Gets Even' \$127,552.70 \$5 Million Gate Seen For Fight

**YONKERS, N. J. (UPI)** — The winner of the fourth largest twin double ever recorded—a "working man" who bets the horses six nights a week—said today his \$127,552.70 payoff enabled him to get even—"even worse."

The roly-poly sole winner of the four races comprising the twin double at Yonkers Raceway Monday night refused to make his name public but insisted on taking home the loot in cash.

The huge payoff was counted out by W. Earl Keyser of the mutual division of the track and the big winner was escorted to an exit gate by 12 special policemen of the track.

"I had it alone," said the lucky winner, who admitted that he is 33 years old, resides in Manhattan, bets on the horses six days a week and watches basketball games on Sunday.

"I had no partners." Pressed for how he felt about hauling home the small fortune, he said: "Look, I've got my blood tied up in this place."

"Does this get you even?" asked a reporter.

"Yeah," he replied, "even worse."

The 5-foot, 6-inch, 180-pound better, who showed up at the Yonkers offices unshaven about a half hour after the Monday night program ended, held the only winning ticket on the twin double.

To score his big win, he correctly chose Lockett Queen in the sixth race for a \$16 payoff. Guess Again for \$34.10 in the seventh race, Riegle Byrd for \$9.30 in the eighth race and Midnight Call for \$53.70 in the ninth. The numbers were 7-4-8.

**BOSTON (UPI)** — The lingering odor of a touring circus is the latest reason for delaying the heavyweight boxing championship rematch between titlist Cassius Clay and challenger Sonny Liston.

## Bradley Unanimous All-America

**NEW YORK (NEA)** — Princeton's Bill Bradley has decided to pass up pro basketball for a Rhodes Scholarship, so he'll really never have the chance to test himself against the best.

But if he's wondering what his chances might have been, the coaches of the National Basketball Association have the answer.

They made him the only unanimous choice on Newspaper Enterprise Association's 1964-65 All-America team, announced today.

In their exclusive annual poll for NEA, the nine coaches also selected Cassie Russell of Michigan, Fred Hetzel of Davidson, Rick Barry of Miami (Fla.), Dave Stallworth of Wichita and Gail Goodrich of UCLA to the first team.

Due to another tie, the second team also consisted of six men.

It includes Bill Cunningham of North Carolina, the late Wayne Estes of Utah State, Bill Buntin of Michigan, Matt Guokas Jr. of St. Joseph's (Pa.), the only sophomore on either team, Ollie Johnson of San Francisco and Dave Bing of Syracuse.

Voting was on a 2-1 basis—two points for a first team vote and one for a second.

Bradley, of course, had 18 points. He was followed by Russell with 17, Hetzel 15, Barry 13, Estes and Cunningham 4 each, and Guokas, Bing, Johnson and Buntin 3 each.

Actually, Bradley's unanimous selection wasn't that surprising.

NBA coaches and players who have seen him throughout the last three years all had the same impression—he is the perfectly balanced baller.

"It wasn't just his scoring that impressed me," said Ray Scott of the Detroit Pistons.

"It was the way he handled the ball, passed off and generally took charge of his team."

Bradley, a member of the Olympic team last fall, can play either forward or guard, but has been "up top" more.

One game when he switched to guard—against Michigan in the Holiday Festival semifinals—will be remembered as one of the greatest individual performances in Madison Square Garden.

Before fouling out with a little more than four minutes remaining, Bradley had scored 41 points and had Princeton 12 points ahead of the nation's top team.

Michigan eventually won the game by two points, an even greater (although heart-breaking) tribute to Bradley. He means that much to his team.

Bradley's average this season has been 31 points a game, third highest in the country.

The leading scorer is Barry who has been averaging 37 points a game in addition to a 17.9 rebounds a game, fifth in the nation.

Barry is an exceptionally smooth-moving forward who will go high on the NBA draft.

Dave Stallworth, the Wichita forward, also will be a high choice. He was graduated at mid-semester after playing 16 games for the Shockers and scoring 25 points a game. Like Bradley, this is his second year on NEA's All-America.

The first-team center is 6-8 Fred Hetzel, the sixth-leading scorer (24.8), eighth in field-goal percentage (.579) and 13th in rebounding (15.1).

Hetzel reminds a lot of people of Jerry Lucas (Cincinnati Royals) but his detractors say he lacks the desire to be a successful professional.

"I guess it's because he's sort of nonchalant about the whole thing when he's on the court," Davidson coach Lefty Driesell said.

"He's one of these kids who is so even-tempered that he always holds his poise. A change might hurt his style, Jerry Lucas was that type of ballplayer and they said the same things about him."

Russell and Goodrich are the first-team guards. Russell plays a lot like Oscar Robertson, and he still has another year at Michigan.

Bing (6-6) and strong (218) is an excellent driver and rebounder. He is the seventh leading scorer in the country with a 26.7 average.

Goodrich, meanwhile, averages 23.1, and is the reason UCLA is a strong contender for another national title. He has done a remarkable job running a team that depended so much on Walt Hazzard last year.

Matt Guokas Jr. was the surprise choice on the second team. Only a sophomore, he transferred back to St. Joseph's (where his father was a star in the 1930s) after a year at Miami (Fla.).

He isn't much of a scorer, but due to his excellent team play and defense, St. Joseph's coach Jack Ramsay calls him the key to the fine season the Hawks are enjoying.

Bing, the other guard, is a 6-3 leaper who averages 23.1 for Syracuse. He plays forward, too.

Johnson, the center from University of San Francisco, is fifth in field goal percentage (.589) and sixth in rebounding (17.1).

Before his untimely death early this month when he was electrocuted after touching a downed powerline, Wayne Estes of Utah State was the nation's second leading scorer (33.7).

This may delay his own recognition of his friend's irresponsibility and the realization that his suspiciouness is not directed to us alone but to all adults, his own parents, his teachers.

Our decisions to refuse hospitality to children's objectionable friends must be based on our own limitations, not the friends' faults. If you and I were pure-souled, we would be able to change the insolence of children's friends into trust and affection. We are not. The insolence makes us resentful and uneasy. Sure that is the truth, it is what we tell Steven without apology for our moral limitations.

It is by admitting the limitations that we avoid the danger of tearing the friends down to justify our dislike of them. It's our attacks on the friends which forces children to protect them and enables their influence to triumph. So it's vital that we make our own shortcomings, our resentment of youngsters' insolence—responsible for our refusal to have them around. It's our honest and unapologetic admission of impatience that makes the decision acceptable and human.

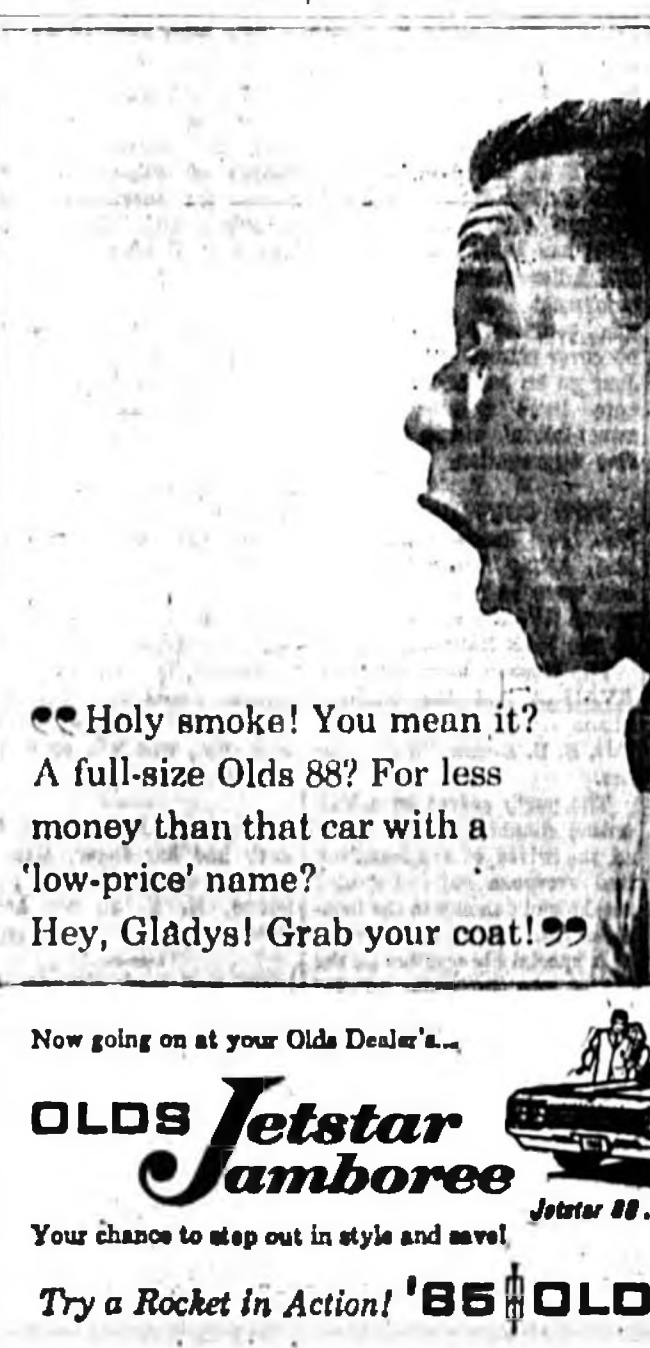

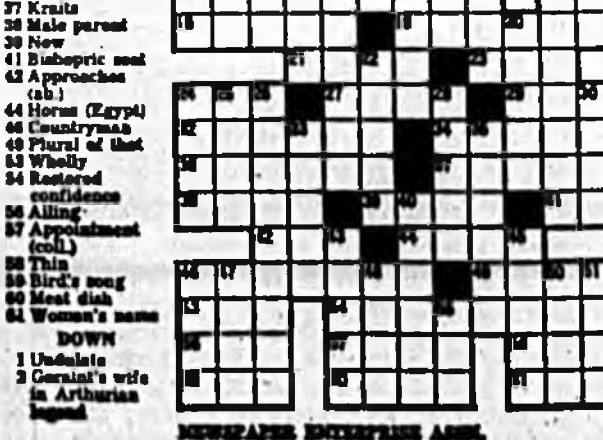
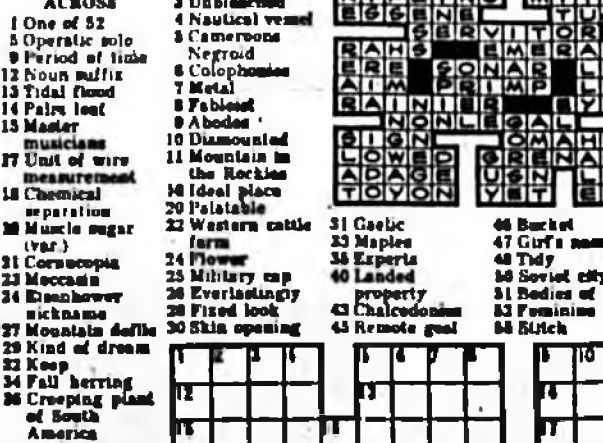
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## Art Newcomers Join With Pros At Local Show

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# President Opens Door For Viet Nam War Parley

## No Evidence Seen Of Red Willingness

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson has opened the door a crack to negotiations in the Viet Nam war—but only to the extent of giving tacit consent to diplomatic soundings by the British. Fundamentally, there appeared to be no change in U. S. policy, which has rejected any negotiations that would simply call for an American withdrawal from South Viet Nam and leave that country vulnerable to Communist takeover.

U. S. sources indicated they still have seen no evidence through any diplomatic channels of Communist willingness to negotiate an end to the war on terms even remotely acceptable in Washington. But the administration threw a somewhat new light on the issue of negotiations when, in effect, it conceded publicly for the first time that diplomatic soundings are going on through other governments.

EXCHANGE  
The disclosure came in an exchange of statements between London and Washington. Prime Minister Harold Wilson told the House of Commons that the British government was "deeply concerned" over Viet Nam and hoped it could play a part "in helping to resolve the present problem and to arrive at a basis for a peaceful settlement."

U. S. BOMBERS HIT VIET CONG  
SAIGON (UPI) — U. S. B57 jet bombers are being used for the first time against the Communists in South Viet Nam. The twin jet medium bombers struck today at concentrations of Viet Cong troops north of Saigon where the Communists mounted one of the most critical drives of the war.

Other efforts are being made to establish a Port Authority, a Riverport Marina and a junior college. All of these have gained considerable momentum in recent months with the Port Authority and junior college programs appearing to be virtually a certainty.

There were indications of new Buddhist-inspired demonstrations against U. S. policies.
