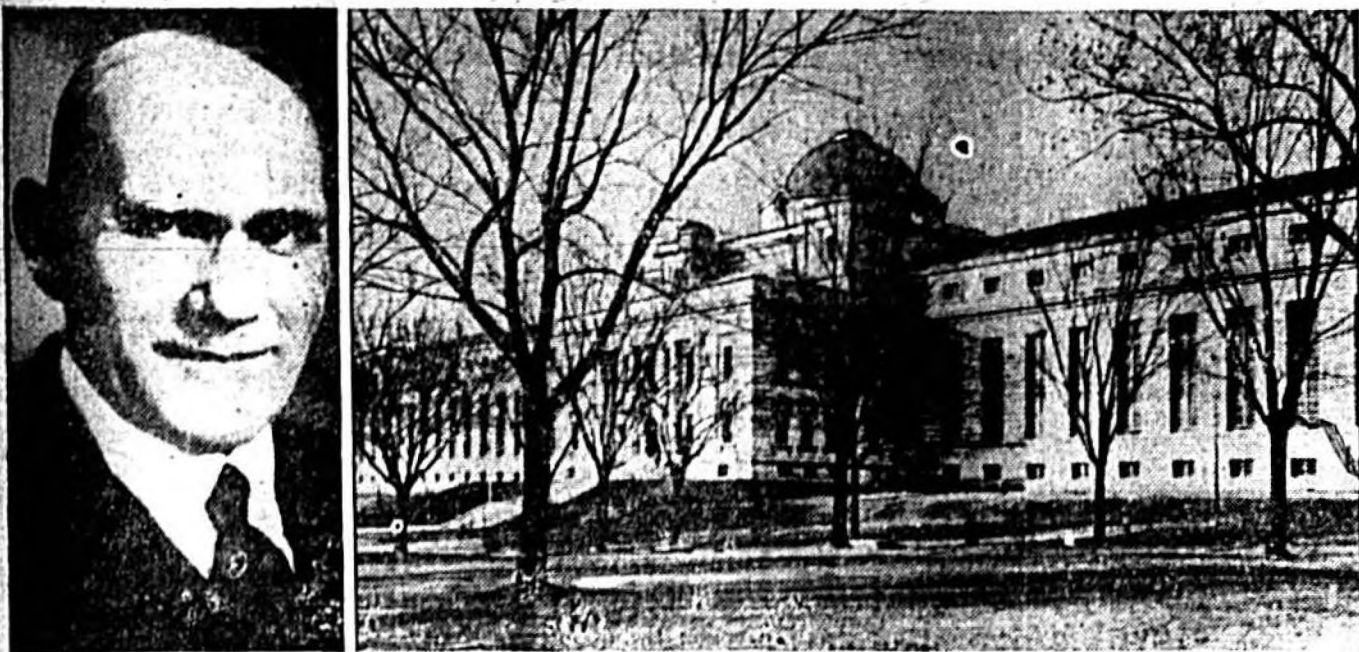


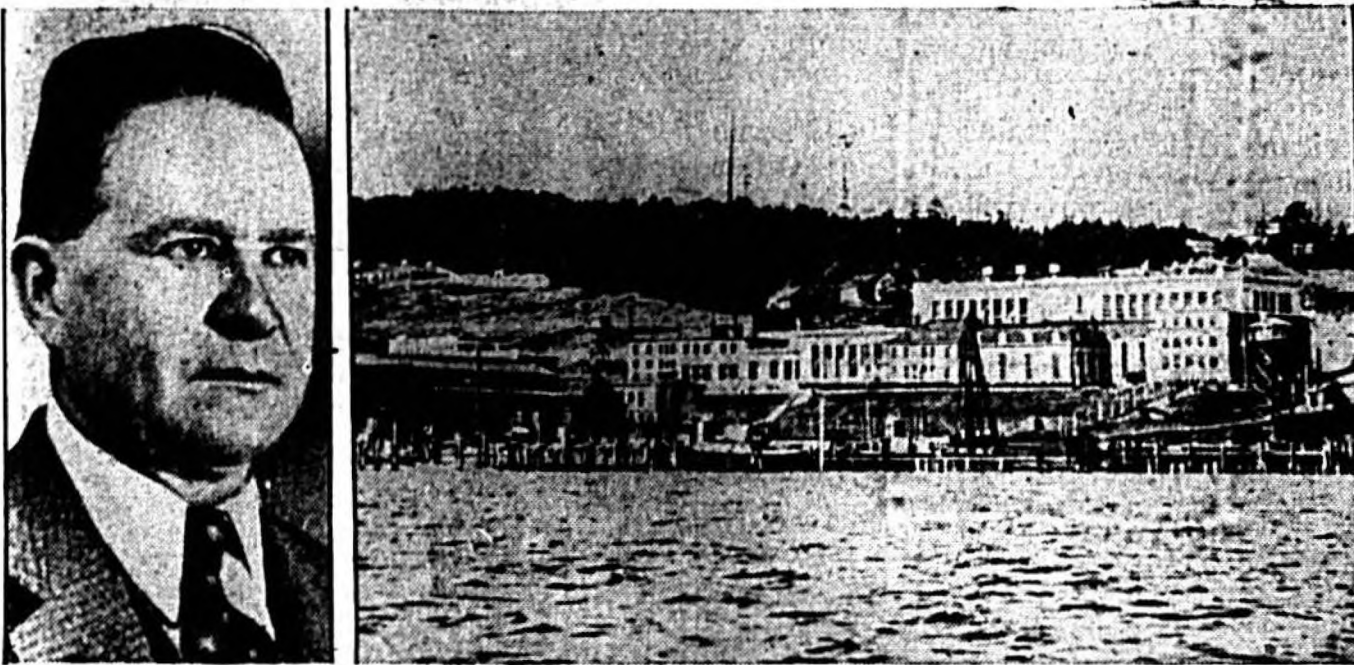

McNeil Island—The Prison Without Walls



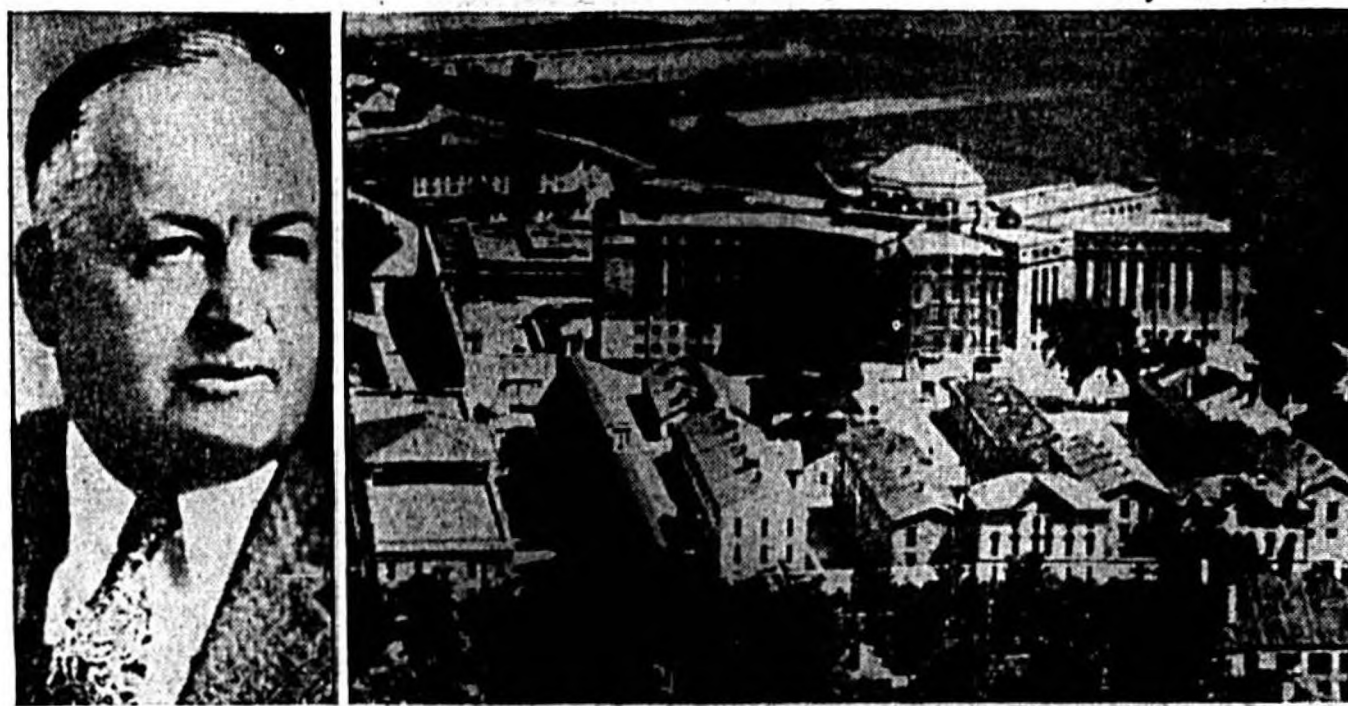

Air View Of Federal Prison At Atlanta, Ga.



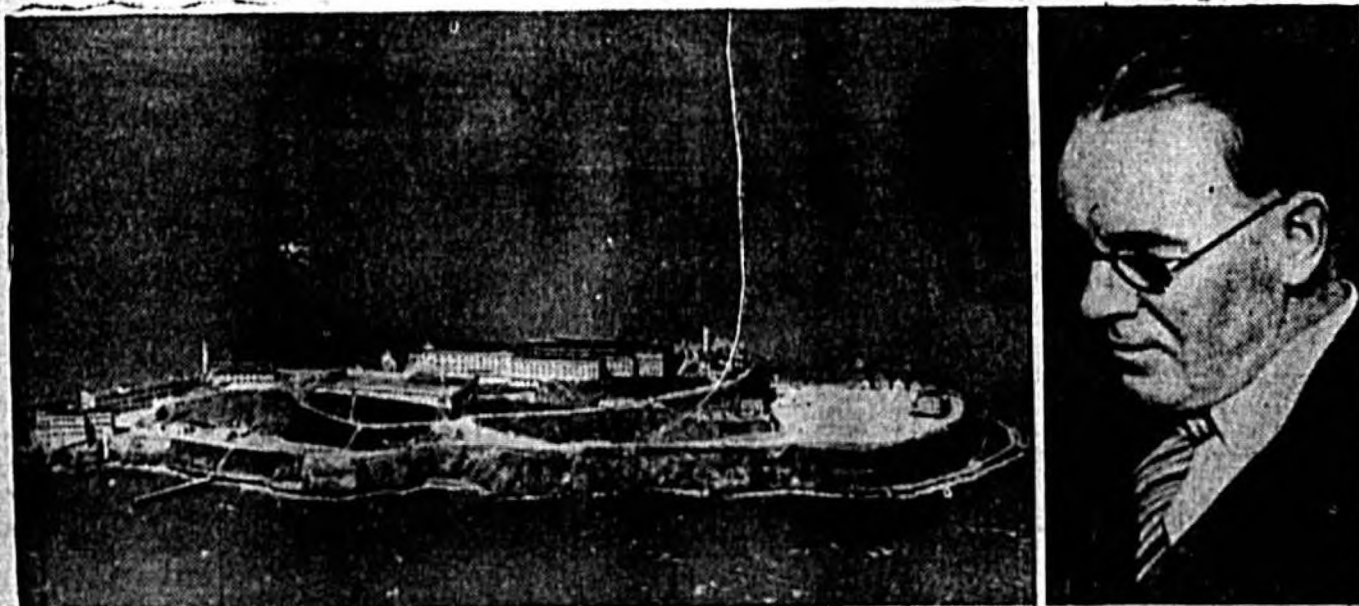

Leavenworth Annex—For Narcotic Violators



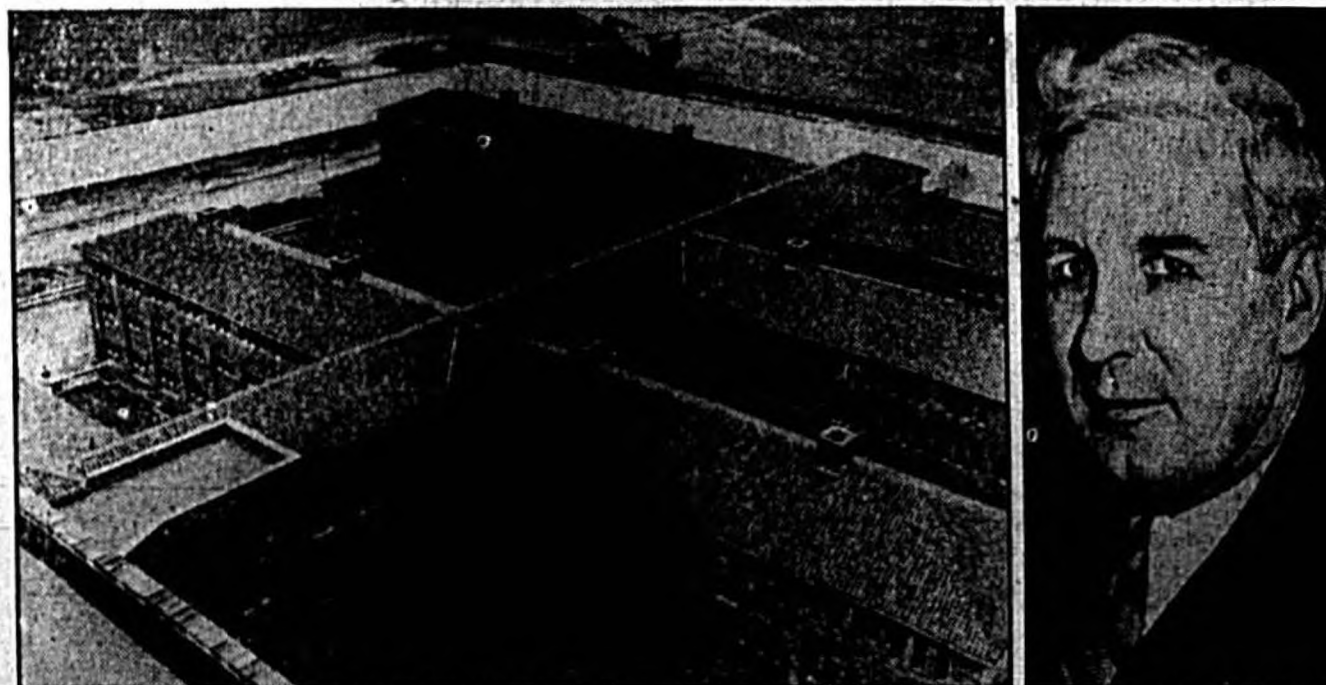

The Water-Bound Prison Of Alcatraz



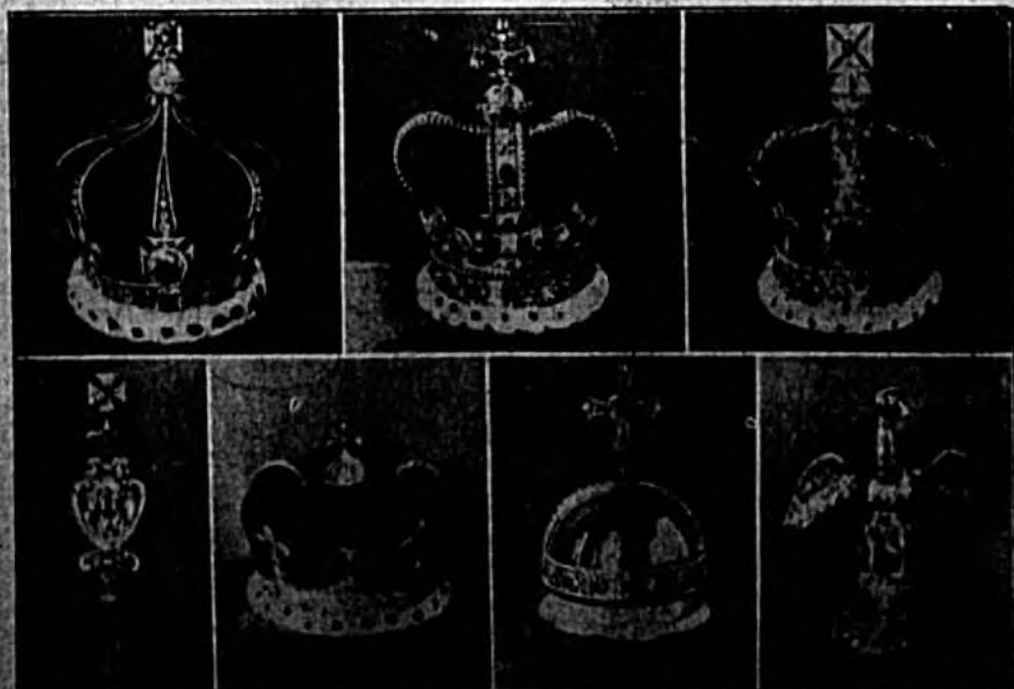

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—(AP)—A mid-summer panorama of broad business revival unfolded today as Wall Street sought to appraise the autumn outlook. Busy steel mills, record electric power output, well sustained automobile production, a high level of retail trade, peak freight movement for the year and a demand for new equipment by railroads were sketched into the July picture.

Business analysts accepted the latest statistical data as evidence that trade and industry, under momentum of a year of almost unbroken expansion, held their recovery stride instead of slowing down for the hot months in customary seasonal style. How long the pace would hold was a matter of conjecture.

U. S. Sweeps To Conquest In Olympics

Ohio State's Jesse Owens Shatters 2 World's Records In Games At Berlin

Glenn Hardin Is American Victor

Helen Stevens Holds Prestige Of Women In Track Event

BERLIN, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Topped by Jesse Owens' record-smashing broad jump victory for his second title of the Eleventh Olympics, the Americans swept all three track and field finals and broke even in two women's events today.

The Ohio State negro bettered the Olympic broad jump record five times, winning the championship with a leap of 26 feet, five and twenty-one sixths inches after twice besting the Olympic 200-meter record of 21 and 2-10 seconds with successive performances in 21 and 1-10 seconds.

Glenn Hardin, Greenwood, Miss., won the 400-meter hurdles. Johnny Woodruff, University of Pittsburgh negro, won the 800-meter run.

The United States thus boosted her point totals to 83, assuring retention of the team championship after only three days of competition before crowds aggregating 300,000.

Helen Stevens, Fulton, Mo., captured the women's hundred meter sprint for the Americans, besting the listed world record of 1:11 and eight-tenths seconds in the third time in two days at Berlin. Stella Walsh, of Poland, Miss Stephens' winning time was 11 and five-tenths seconds.

Crop Loan Blanks Arrive For Local Growers, Farmers

Emergency crop loan application blanks arrived here today and may be obtained by growers and farmers desiring cash for seed and fertilizer, County Agent C. R. Dawson announced.

The forms are lengthy and complicated, including almost innumerable questions relating to the farm and financial activities of the person who seeks a loan.

Emergency crop loans will be made only to farmers who can not obtain credit from any other source, as provided by regulations issued by the governor of the farm credit administration, Mr. Dawson said.

The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediately and actual cash needs for growing his 1936 crop and in no instance may more than \$200 to one person, he said.

Farmer's are not eligible for emergency vegetable loans if they borrow from an individual, production credit association, bank or other concern, regulations state. Growers will be considered ineligible also if they have an application pending with the resettlement administration.

Approximately ten days is required to complete all loan transactions.

Delinquent Tax Collections Hit \$8,274 Monday

Certificates Totaling \$2,435 Are Sold By Jinkins

A last-minute rush by Seminole County property owners yesterday to prevent their holdings being sold for taxes resulted in the payment of \$4,274.07 in delinquencies, according to a statement made today by Jno. D. Jinkins, county tax collector.

Despite the huge volume of activity, there were parcels of property with a total valuation of \$2,435.66 on which tax certificates were sold to satisfy levies that were in arrears.

Mr. Jinkins said the certificates that were not taken at the Monday noon sale will be assigned in the name of the state treasurer.

Persons who wish to redeem their certificates in the future will make applications through the office of the clerk of the circuit court who will in turn apply to the treasurer, the assessor said.

The Florida law provides that tax certificates will draw interest at the rate of 18 percent for the first year. A certificate is held two years by a purchaser, and during that time the owner of the delinquent property may regain full title by settling the taxes.

While Monday's sale activities were not of a large volume, one certificate buyer purchased nearly \$2,000 in paper.

Mr. Jinkins said there would be no more sales until next year.

Comet Is Puzzler; Tail Disappears
WILLIAMS, Wis., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Petter's Comet in the northern sky puzzled astronomers in the darkness before dawn today by losing its tail. All trace of the long, broad ribbon of brightness which streamed from the comet's head as it sped toward the earth disappeared from the telescope at the Yerkes observatory of Chicago University.

Food Prices Reach Peak Of 6-Year Period

Thirty Percent Increase In Living Costs Over 1930; Corn On Big Spurt

CHICAGO, Aug. 4.—(AP)—A survey of rising food prices caused by the drought today showed it cost the average man 30 percent more to feed his family in June than it did three years ago.

Farm prices are at the highest general level since 1930 and retail food prices still are going up. Economists assert food prices at retail counters will show a gradual rise but will go only as high as the general ability of consumers to pay.

An even year high for cash corn and first government purchase of livestock signaled yesterday the prolongation of the three months old drought.

Corn climbed almost four cents at the start of trading on unofficial estimates. July's damage amounted to 70,000,000 bushels. It finished in a burst market, 1 to 3 3/4 cents up from Saturday's close.

Cash No. 1 white corn was quoted at \$1.20 a bushel, the top since 1925 and equal to the best current price for No. 1 hard wheat. The trade had reports that Kansas farmers were getting 7 to 10 cents a bushel more for corn than for wheat.

While other cereals advanced to new high levels in some cases not equalled since 1929, the heaviest rise of cattle received at Chicago stock yards in three years brought inauguration of another governmental measure to aid drought distressed farmers.

Under contracts recently negotiated packers were authorized to purchase for the federal account 4,791 head. Prices on the types purchased broke 25 cents before the government action was announced.

The central forecast office of the Weather Bureau, meanwhile, predicted cooler weather but no general rains for the drought burned north central region.

Tanner Urges Fight For Eradication Of Gulf Coast Ticks

The Gulf Coast tick, ally of the deadly screw worm, has made its appearance along the southern Atlantic and Gulf coasts, it was announced today by Roy C. Tanner, assistant district supervisor of screw worm control in Seminole, Orange, Brevard and Ocala counties.

He said a serious situation may develop unless cattlemen take rigid and prompt precautions to halt the spread of the tick which lays cattle herds to waste.

Pine tar oil is used in fighting the pest, Mr. Tanner said. Since the government has abandoned the policy of giving away this substance, it may now be obtained at the Tuxedo Feed Store.

Mr. Tanner, in answer to a number of inquiries, said it was impossible to eradicate the Gulf Coast tick by dipping methods.

Boom Of Artillery, Crack Of Rifle May Sound Madrid's Doom

Loyalists Recruit Added Troops To Stand In Defense Of Capital City

Rebels Confident Of Quick Victory Government Denies Confiscation Of Convents, Churches

The boom of heavy artillery and the steady crack of rifle fire in the Guadarrama Mountains north of Madrid late today betokened another assault by the Fascist insurrectionists on the gateway to Spain's capital city.

New waves of government units were ordered from Valencia and other points to meet what was expected to be a long-awaited general rebel offensive on Madrid, poured into the mountain passes. Bombers were to be sent out by motor truck if needed, were mobilized in Madrid.

A rebel announcement at the seat of the Junta government, at Burgos said Madrid would fall shortly under crushing attacks from the north and south.

A government announcement in Madrid denied that churches and convents had been taken over to help finance opposition to the revolution.

London and Paris watched Spain's civil war, now in its eighteenth day, with fair that it might lead to a general Europe conflict.

From Languedoc, North African International Zone, came a report that officers of two German warships anchored off Ceuta, Spanish Morocco, had been received by General Francisco Franco, generalissimo of revolution. The nub of the situation apparently is law in the attitudes of Germany and Italy to French and British proposals that major nations keep their hands off the Spanish revolution.

Neither Mussolini nor Hitler has replied to suggestions, although France has not made a formal request to Hitler.

Although not sponsored by the Soviet government, meetings are held throughout Red Russia to raise funds to help Spain's Loyalist regime put down the revolution.

Barnett Shows County Property Value Placed At \$5,548,500 in '36

Commission Slashes Local Valuations; Bridge Authorized

Gordon Barnett, Democratic nominee for the State Legislature, was the principal speaker on the program at the Rotary luncheon at the Mayfair Hotel today. Mr. Barnett, who appeared before the club as a representative of the Junior Chamber of Commerce, defined the evils of lottery gambling and explained the campaign of the Jaycees against "Cuba" and "Bolita."

Mr. Barnett pointed out that more than \$10,000 a week is spent in Sanford on lottery tickets and told Rotarians that this enormous sum of money is being extracted from the normal channels of trade, hurting business, and increasing unemployment. He also said that the usual "take" of the lottery racketeers amounts to 30 percent.

In conclusion Mr. Barnett urged the Rotary Club to endorse the campaign of the Junior Chamber of Commerce and to cooperate with the other civic organizations in demanding that local public officials do their duty in the enforcement of the law.

The matter was referred by the club to the board of directors for further action.

The figure is approximately \$5,548,500 below the valuation assessed two years ago.

Valdez Hotel value slashed from \$21,500 to \$16,000. Puleston Humbley Building, set from \$21,500 to \$15,000, the Bell Coffee Shop corner, now exempted by a seed store, reduced from \$10,500 to \$9,500.

Ten applications for homestead exemptions were refused.

On condition that the drainage loan in the Duval district amount to \$500 of the amount, commissioners agreed to allocate \$1,500 for the construction of a bridge between Slavia and Duval.

Harry M. Papworth presented a suggestion that the Commission allocate \$1,120 as this county's share in the expense of having the Florida Exhibit, now at the Great Lakes Exposition in Cleveland, returned to Rockefeller Center in New York. No action was taken.

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The Board voted to make a contribution to the Harry-Arma Home for Crippled Children in Duval. It also approved the payment of \$300 in bills for the local hospital.

Mrs. Dorothy Lamb, county public health nurse, and Mrs. P. M. Scott, secretary of the Seminole County Tuberculosis and Health Association, asked that the Commission lend its support to the state tuberculosis hospital now under construction near Orlando.

Clerk O. P. Hendon received instructions to prepare bills for the senatorial primary election scheduled for Aug. 11.

A rotary bond for A. M. Webb and a fireman's bond for R. F. Kirk were approved by commissioners.

School Board Will Discuss Problem Of Driver Employment

Arrangements for employing 12 bus drivers for county-operated school routes probably will be made tomorrow morning when the County School Board convenes at 10 A. M. in the office of T. W. Lawton, Seminole superintendent.

There was no indication today that the drivers will be hired immediately.

Two courses lie open to the board, Mr. Lawton said. It will either name one man to supervise all five routes involved, or will appoint one man to direct operations on each route.

July Building Hits \$9,110 Report Says

Fred T. Williams addressed the group on the subject, pointing out a hope that the venture will be authorized by the next session of the legislature.

A state appropriation for a two-year period is sought to finance the project. Federal funds also would help, Mr. Williams said.
