SANFORD - A year ago I walked into the Salvation Army Gymnasium not knowing what to expect.

I had signed up for the Golden Age Games basketball shooting competition.

One of the fellows inside the gym limbering up was 90-year-old Leonard Stone from Bare-

foot Bay. He told me not to be nervous. "Winning isn't everything," he said. "Just have fun. There's always next year."

Stone shot well that day, using the old underhand free throw approach. "It's the one I learned when I was a kid and the only one I ever used," he said. It was good enough to win the Gold Medal last year.

"I wish there were more guys in the 90 and over group," lamented Stone, who was the only in this group last year. He'll be the only 90+ basketball competitor this year, too. "I've outlived them," he said. "Like, I told you, have fun. There's always next year."

My trouble is being too young. There are too many guys my age, and they can shoot. Free throws. Three-pointers. You name it, these guys can pump.

My best chance to succeed, it would seem, is take Leonard Stone's advice and "wait until next year," and the one after that. If I make it to 90, there may not be as many hot shots in the gym who are my age.

Of course, I'm kidding myself. The men who are my age now have a better chance to be 90 in thirty or so years than I do. The way, I see it almost everyone in the group is going to be 90. These guys are in good shape, and can they

shoot.

One fellow made 30 consecutive free throws last year.

"Nice shooting," I told him. "How can you get better than that - 30 for 30?"

"Could have made 100, or 200 in a row if they let me go on," he said.

I didn't doubt him - especially after seeing him hit 90 percent or better from three-point range and do extremely well in the speed drill where a shooter takes a three, hustles in for his own rebound to make a lay-up and accumulate as many points in a certain time - either three or five minutes. It seemed an eternity for me last year.

For the last year, I've thought plenty about this fellow who made the 30 consecutive free throws and will probably do the same today when the basketball games begin.

Cops seek clues in cat mutilations

SANFORD - Four cats were mutilated Friday night at a home in the Hidden Lakes area. Sanford police officials speculated that the crime occurred because of the day it was on: Halloween.

Between 5:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m., unknown persons illegally entered a residence in the 200 block of Ventura Drive. Once inside, they proceeded to head one of four kittens and then broke the neck of the other three.

The remains of the four kittens were taken to Seminole County Animal Control. The suspects if caught will face burglary charges in addition to animal cruelty charges. Police

officials have no other information at this time.

Also this week, a Lake Mary resident has reported two cats missing and claims she has confronted two men in a truck trying to catch cats in her neighborhood.

One of the cats Harriet Boyd reported missing is an all white six month old kitten.

"The Humane Society says anyone can pick up a cat if it's not on it's own property, even if it has tags," said Boyd, the resident who has reported her pets missing.

Boyd claimed that two men in a small pick-up truck tried to take her 10 year old cat "Lazarus" in front of her home.

"One man told me 'I pick up all stray cats,'" she said.

The incidents, at this point, are unrelated.

Award-winning counselor loves her students

Betty Bourne loves her job. Being named guidance counselor of the year by the Florida School Counseling Association was the icing on the cake.

In her 13th year as a counselor at Idylwild Elementary School, Bourne said she was very surprised when she heard about the award about a week ago.

"I still can't believe it," Bourne said. "I feel like it's not just my award. I represent all counselors. We do our jobs because we love kids and want to help them."

David Scott, principal of the 27-year-old Sanford school, nominated Bourne.

"She's very child oriented," Scott said. "Betty interacts daily with the children and she extends herself in the community helping families in need."

Scott recalled a case where Bourne found shelter and food for a woman and her three children. Another time, he said, Bourne organized a drive

to get food, furniture and clothing for a family whose house burned down.

"Betty is a wonderful person. She relates to kids and they relate to her."

Bourne, who will receive her award Nov. 14 in Orlando during the FSCA annual convention, has been a past president of the Seminole Counselors Association. Prior to becoming a counselor, Bourne was a teacher in the county.

She decided to switch careers because she found that counseling was a main part of her job as a teacher.

"I felt there was a need for someone to help the kids," she said.

Up until last year, Bourne was the only counselor at the 960-student school. Among the many programs she leads are daily lunch sessions called the lunch bunch. Bourne invites students into her roomy office where she holds roundtable discussions.

Bourne said she continues her role as counselor after

Pauluccis donate 60,000 frozen dinners to New Smyrna tornado victims

SANFORD - A semi-trailer carrying 60,000 frozen dinners will arrive in New Smyrna Beach Thursday to help feed families uprooted by tornado damage last Sunday, compliments of Luigino's, Inc., and its owners, Jeno and Lois Paulucci, of Sanford.

State Rep. Suzanne Kosmas and New Smyrna Beach Mayor Jim Vandergriff are working with Luigino's, Inc., to coordinate the delivery and distribution of about 5,000 dozen of Michelina's and Yu Sing brand frozen entrees that are produced by Luigino's, Inc., in Jackson, Ohio.

Mayor Vandergriff said 30 to 35 homes were destroyed and significant tornado damage to 300 homes in residential New

Smyrna Beach was "the worst I've seen here in my lifetime. Hurricane Donna wasn't even this bad." The tornado struck about 1 a.m. Sunday.

The frozen dinners will be loaded in Ohio on Tuesday and transported to New Smyrna Beach by Mitchell Transport Co. of Tampa. The products will be stored at Sparkle Ice Company in New Smyrna Beach until they can be distributed to those in need through charitable agencies and church organizations now being assembled.

The Pauluccis are widely known in Central Florida for contributions of food products to charities and agencies assisting the hungry and homeless in the region. Luigino's Inc. corporate headquarters is in Sanford.

Design house featured Lake Mary artists

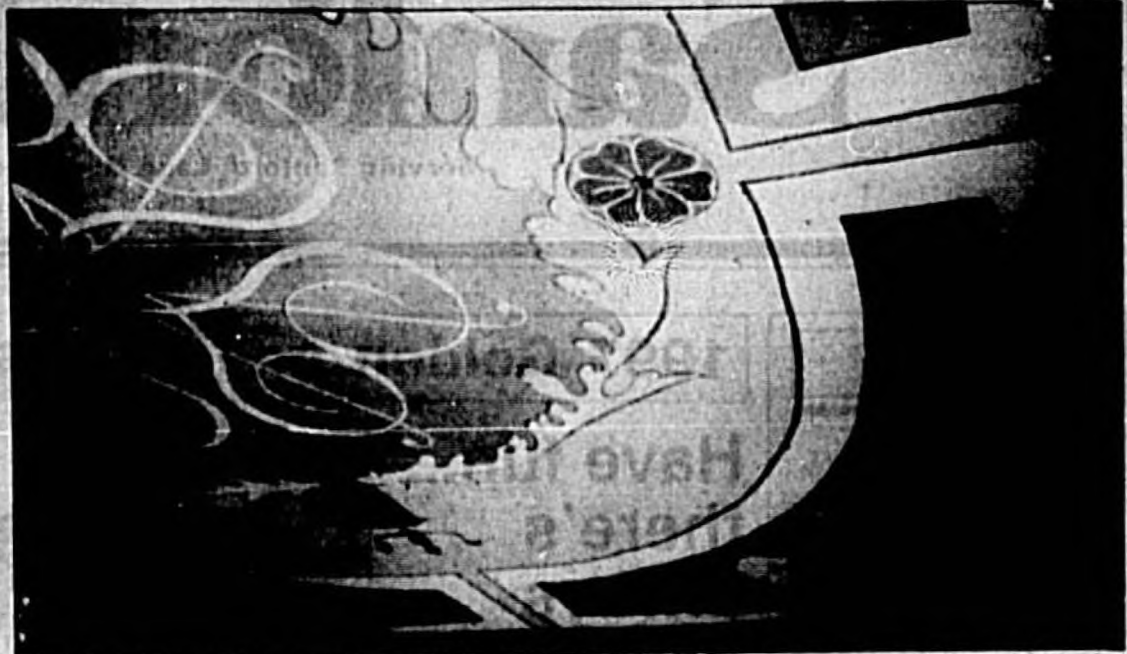
If you didn't get into Orlando to see the Design House, you missed some beautiful work done by some Lake Mary artists. Kemper-Ennis Artists, a Lake Mary company owned by Cindy Grosenkemper and Susan Ennis, was responsible for several distinctive touches in the house.

A musical theme mural on the dining room ceiling used earthy greens, browns and cream colors to enhance the rest of the room. They used trompe l'oeil painting on the floor in the kitchen. Trompe l'oeil is a French term that means "fool the eye". When cabinets were taken out in the kitchen, concrete floor was exposed. The rest of the kitchen was covered in its original circa 1920's brown tile. Finding tile to match was not possible, so Cindy and Susan painted the concrete floor to match the tiles. The painting really does "fool the eye". You can't tell where the tile ends and the painting begins. (Cindy and Susan recently completed another trompe l'oeil painting in a private home. They painted columns on a wall, which, upon entering the room, look like real columns.)

The kitchen ceiling also had their distinctive touch with a beautiful faux finish. Faux finishing usually takes 3 to 5 coats of paint applied with brushes, rags, or sponges. (This particular ceiling took 4 coats.) Faux finishes are done to give depth to the finish and nuance to the color. The trick with faux finishing is to be consistent throughout the work.

The nursery benefited with beautiful ivy and ribbon accents in each of the four corners of the ceiling and around the circular crib on the floor. After these accents were painted, they were aged.

Cindy has been doing design work for about 10 years. When she needed help painting the dolphin mural at Lake Mary

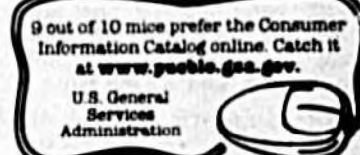

Elementary, she asked Susan for help. Susan helped out with another project after that. The two then decided to form a partnership. They now work for several interior decorators around town, mostly in private homes. Some of their work can be seen by the public. They did the mural in Magus Flower shop in Lake Mary. They also painted the arched entrance to the outside of one of the model homes in Lake Forest on State Road 46.

Wall Fashions of Lake Mary and the Interior Design Department of Seminole Community College also participated in the Design House. Alison Garcia-Del-Busto and Linda Thomas Shores of Wall Fashions were responsible for renovating the kitchen and SCC's Interior Design Department took on the study.

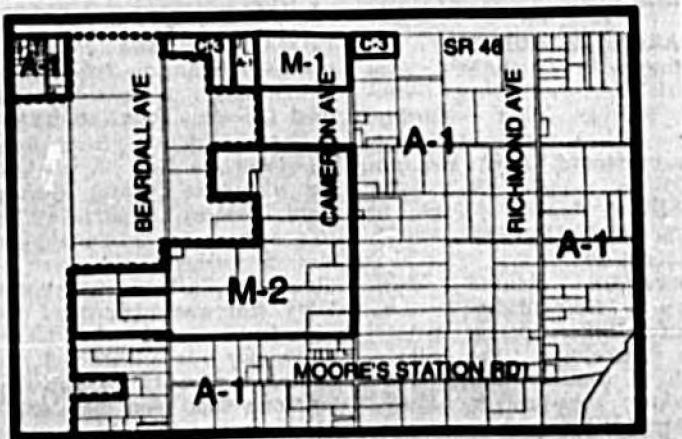

Campaign brochure mistakes were unfortunate, not malicious

Only one spat erupted this political season, when commission seats are up for grabs in several Seminole County cities. Lake Mary Incumbent commissioner Sheila Sawyer was incensed over a brochure circulated last week by her opponent, Al Crump.

Mr. Crump admitted he had received some erroneous information when he published that Mrs. Sawyer had voted against economic incentives for AT&T's 1995 relocation to Lake Mary. She voted for that expenditure, but voted against further incentive money for BellSouth, HTE and GE Capital.

Mr. Crump also said that Mrs. Sawyer opposed the funding of a traffic light on Lake Mary Boulevard near the elementary school entrance. A check of the minutes from the July 10, 1997 commission meeting shows that the vote was unanimous.

The brochure lists a forecasted property tax increase for next year. Although the city works from a five-year plan, Mrs. Sawyer said the millage rate is set each year, according to need. Mr. Crump stands by his findings on this issue, pointing to the numbers listed in the five year revenue

projection of the general fund summary on the proposed budget.

Mr. Crump also said the incumbent opposed the Lake Mary Sports Complex. Mrs. Sawyer said she supported the building of the active park, paid for by a bond issue adopted in 1991. She opposed as a private citizen the expense of burying power lines and beautification of Lake Mary Boulevard, contained on that same bond issue.

We have seen many questionable campaign brochures in our years of political musings. One brochure in the 1996 races probably lost the election for the candidate who sent it. But we think this one is the work of inexperience, not malice or underhandedness.

Mrs. Sawyer was right to defend her record, and Mr. Crump was right to apologize for the errors. We think Mr. Crump has learned a valuable lesson, one he can take to the commission, along with his valuable business experience, should he win. We urge him to remember the next time he receives information that warrants verification: If your mother says she loves you, check it out; make sure it's true.

According to golf coordinator Steve Lawrence, the players average in age from 65 to 70. Lawrence said that ages ranged from late 50's to late 80's. There were nearly 60 men and women who played in the two tournaments on Monday. Today, there will also be two tournaments but it will be handicap play. The top three scores each day will be taken to award medals.

Volunteers were out in force on Monday and will be out again today to ensure the safety and well being of the players. "We are mainly concerned with safety and health," said one of the volunteers.

Players take an application, and then they can list others they would like to be in a foursome with. Most are paired up that come out. And each time is just a single round of 18 holes.

Belec, 82, to tennis foe: 'You're just a boy'

SANFORD - Legs and lungs. This begins to explain why four men and two women well past their 80th birthdays were competing Monday in the tennis events at the 23rd Annual Golden Age Games. They had the legs and the lungs.

They also had the competitive spirit and fine-tuned tennis skills, and had come to Sylvan Lake Park on one delightful morning for some action.

"You're just a boy," Frank Belec, 82, said to Homer Hough, 83.

Hough, an ex-Navy man in the Pacific battles of World War II and a four-time mayor of Mattland, smiled.

They were paired against each other in the one of the first round matches on Tuesday. Frank Bourke, 83, met Edward Barclay, 83, in the other. Of 111 tennis players in the Games, these four were in a class by themselves.

Each of the 80+ men's opening round matches lasted nearly an hour.

Belec and Bourke were winners, with identical 6-0, 6-0 scores.

They spoke to each other just after 11:30 a.m., were told they would play for the gold medal in a match at 1 p.m. "Like to start at 12:45," Belec asked Bourke.

"If they let us, why not?" said Bourke.

Bourke is smiling. "He (Belec) never smoked. Never had to worry about the lungs. I used to smoke but stopped years ago. My lung are fine."

Their eventual championship match was a good one. Belec winning, 6-3, 6-0.

Belec drove to Sylvan Lake Park from Port Orange. He wore a cap and a Le Cog Sportif tennis shirt. He's 5-foot-5, 127 pounds. That's three pounds lighter than he was in 1945 when he was an Army medic serving in the Solomon Islands and at Guadalcanal.

"I've been very fortunate," he said. "Was at the doctor a month ago. Just a checkup. I go in each six months. I told him I felt better than I did at 30."

Belec said he never played tennis until he was 60. Tried a little ice hockey as a kid growing up in Massachusetts but no tennis. Said he didn't do that until he was 60 and he

went out one day with some friends. He played well that afternoon, and never stopped.

"I don't do anything really spectacular he said, 'don't have a big serve or great shots but people tell me I'm like a backboard.'" Belec said. "I keep getting the ball back."

Hough, who had some tough skirmishes at two Jima and Okinawa, was in for a rough morning against Belec. They had some wonderful exchanges - long rallies but Belec would survive each one and win two sets by love scores.

"Sometimes it isn't a case of playing to win," Belec said, "it's being able to avoid losing. You have to cut down on the mistakes. Remember how Chris Evert played. She almost never made mistakes. Others may have had better shots but they weren't able to beat her."

Julien Mousalli, a talented 59-year-old who was winning his age group's gold a second consecutive year, seems destined to be playing another 20 or more years. Yes, legs and lungs are the keys. "So is consistency," he said.

Although he was among the early birds at the tennis site Monday, Bud Steckman, 74, was not able to defend a couple of gold medals he won in last year's competition.

He took a nasty spill at his home in Gettysburg, Pa., three weeks ago, breaking a couple of ribs and twisting the muscles in his right shoulder.

Steckman had to remove himself from the tennis competition.

"I looked into some of the less strenuous games," he said. "They found me a spot in checkers, pinochle and bridge. I'll be back to play tennis next year."

"Look at them go, will you?" Mary Henri Peterson said. "Look at them go."

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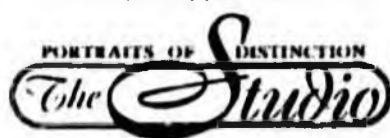
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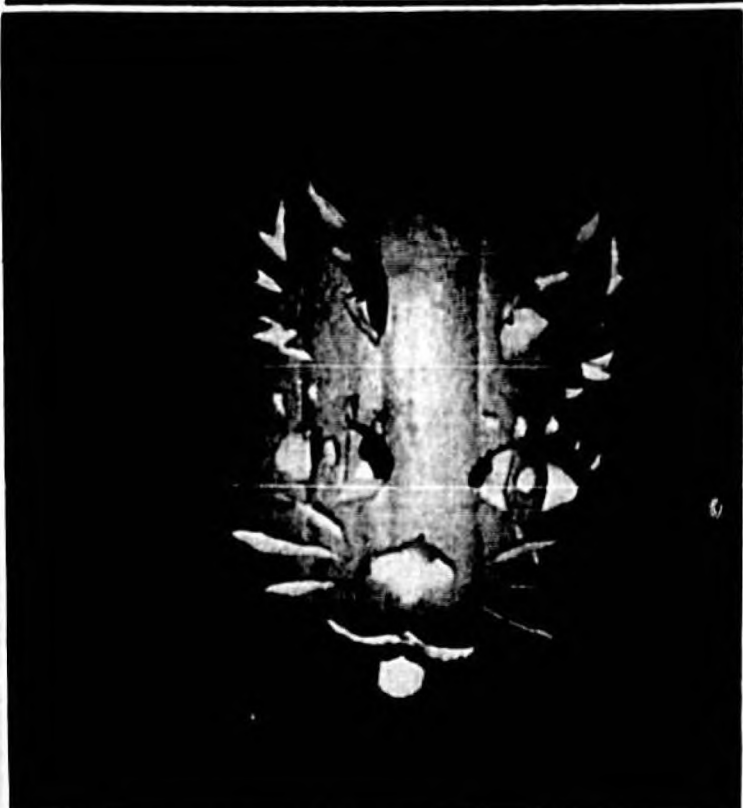

Doctors should explain diseases

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm a 43-year-old man, recently diagnosed with rheumatoid arthritis. What is this?

DEAR READER: Before answering your question, I want to make a plea to you and other readers. If you are diagnosed with a disease — any disease — your doctor has an obligation to describe to you, in understandable terms, the nature of the disorder, its dangers and complications, its treatment, and its prognosis. You should not leave your physician's office until these basic issues have been addressed.

Hardly a week goes by in which I do not receive letters from frightened and dispirited readers that begin: "I've been diagnosed with 'xxxxxxx' and my doctor won't explain this to me."

A major aspect of good medical practice is the involvement of the patient in health matters that concern him. What is this disease? How will it affect my life? What can I do about it? These and other germane questions are a vital part of a good doctor-patient relationship. Therefore, the answer to your questions should come from your primary care physician or, by extension, any specialists he calls on to help with the problem.

Until you can meet with your doctor for an informational session, here is a thumbnail analysis of rheumatoid arthritis for you.

This serious disorder, which is one of many causes of joint inflammation, is a multi-system disease of unknown cause, marked by pain, tenderness and swelling of the joints. It often leads to destruction of cartilage and joint deformities that can be severely disabling. In addition, rheumatoid arthritis can affect blood vessels (vasculitis), the lungs (pleuritis and pneumonitis), the eyes, the spleen, and the bone marrow. The diagnosis is made by blood tests. Treatment includes anti-inflammatory drugs (aspirin, ibuprofen, and prescription medications such as gold salts and hydroxychloroquine), and powerful drugs such as prednisone and methotrexate. Surgery may be necessary to stabilize the joints in severe cases.

Return to your doctor for a full explanation — and, by the way, make a written list of questions beforehand so that you won't forget to ask about some important concerns.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Even though I am in my 90s, I need a circumcision because of chronic problems in that area. Is surgery painful?

DEAR READER: Any surgery is painful, and circumcision is no exception. Before the procedure, your doctor will numb the area with an anesthetic. However, you will be uncomfortable for several days thereafter, once the anesthetic has worn off.

Nonetheless, this may be a small

regarding gelatin. I tried it on my 13-year-old golden retriever — two packages Knox with a couple tablespoons of Mighty Dog. In three weeks I saw a LARGE improvement. Needless to say, I'm sold on it as a first try. She's been on it for a year now with no drugs.

DEAR READER: Whoa! I never suggested gelatin for golden retrievers. You must have me confused with one of those advice-to-the-lovelorn columnists!

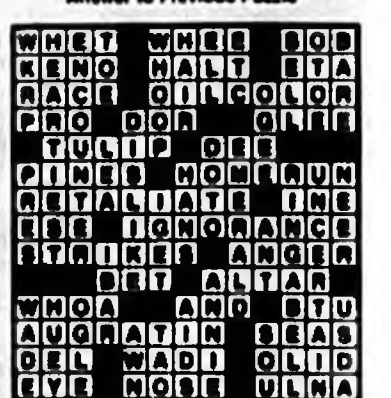

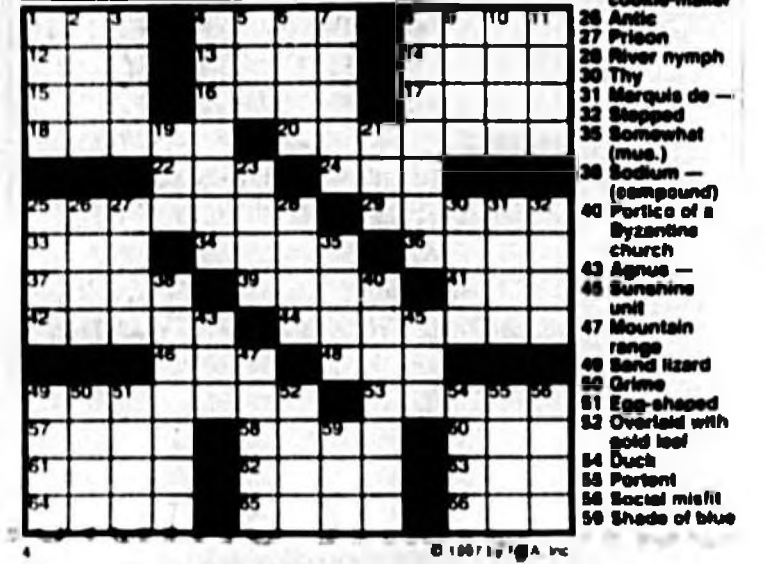

The kings of fiction

Following on from "The Kings of Fiction," the father-and-son team of Robert and Phillip King have written two more splendid books. "Contract Killers" parodies Agatha Christie, John Graham, Margaret Mitchell and Mario Puzo. "Farewell, My Dummy," in which South, Miss Elizabeth Bennet, was playing in four spades. The defense began with two rounds of hearts. What was Elizabeth's line?

As they are laydown for five hearts, who should have bid again for East-West? Although it could have worked

out badly, I think East should have continued with five clubs over four spades.

Declarer saw that if the spades were breaking favorably, she could win 12 tricks. Yet what if they were 4-1? After ruffing the second heart, Elizabeth led a spade to dummy's 10. When the finesse won, Elizabeth cashed dummy's two top trumps, played a diamond to her king, drew West's last trump, and ran the diamonds for two overtricks.

West, Lady Catherine de Bourgh, wasn't happy. "A very strange finesse," she remarked.

"I could not have made the contract without it," replied Elizabeth.

"We all know that now. The wonder is that you seemed to know it beforehand."

The key point, missed by Lady Catherine, is that even if the spade finesse had lost, there still would have been a trump in dummy with which to ruff the third heart or second club. Trump control had been maintained.

Volunteer of the Week

Animal lover found niche at zoo

DIARY - Sondra Carrow has always loved animals. Her volunteer work with the zoo as a docent just renews that passion and her sense of adventure on a daily basis.

This Delbart resident has worked with the Central Florida Zoological Park for almost eight years. Laboring from two to 15 hours a week she says that she can "learn a new fact or something new about an animal every single day."

She discussed how she became involved in this effort. "I have always loved animals," she said. "But being a female in the 50's you weren't expected to get a job. I wanted to be a biologist. One day I saw an ad in a newspaper. I called and found out exactly what I wanted to know. I signed up for the docent class. It was a great biology class. Then I started to work."

Now Carrow can be found going to schools, churches, scout meetings, humaneers as well as ecology and pet fairs to display the animals to the public. She adds that the furry friends used are "animals at risk, reptile reality and Florida natives."

Some time ago Carrow acted as a surrogate mother to a Sumatran. "There was one born in the zoo in 1992," she said. "The mother had been hand-raised and it rejected the babies. So for the next two years I was a surrogate mother. I was the one that was needed to provide physical contact and socialization to the Sumatran. It

was a female. I came in every-day. She was later transferred to Texas and after about a year and a half I went to see her. She was put back with her mother. She recognized me and wuck her little, long arms out to give me a hug. That animal was real special to me."

Presently, Carrow works with a wreathed hornbill. She cited that the bird thinks that its caretakers are its mamma. "This bird is only six months old," she said. "This particular

species of hornbill is very rare. It's hard to raise one in captivity. We hand raised this one. It has a curvature of the spine. It's needed massage therapy. I have been taking it to the field. It is tethered on a crane, which is a long, strong thread with a weight."

With all her enthusiasm, Carrow continued by saying, "I enjoy this more and more each year. We work with eight to 10 animals in the education department. It is so nice to be

around the animals and to always be learning."

Although at times the zoo consumes numerous hours Carrow and her husband of 37 years, Harold (otherwise known to friends as Buich), are active with the community where they live. They help with the community coffee, call bingo and are members of several committees such as the Christmas and a luau held annually.

The couple has one daughter, Lena, and four grandchildren.

Saw plant emblem of plant society

The saw palmetto is the most abundant palm in the State of Florida. This native plant occurs on coastal dunes of Florida and Georgia, along the Gulf coast from Florida to Louisiana. It occupies a variety of habitats forming an abundant ground cover which includes hammocks, pinelands, savannah, and sand dunes in the coastal plain. The plant is a branching shrub that rarely grows more than six feet tall. The saw palmetto is the emblem of the Florida Native Plant Society.

Leaves: Leaves of the saw palmetto are similar but smaller and more circular than those of the cabbage palm and they lack a central midrib. Leaflets are divided deeply into several dozen segments that split at the tip. The petioles on the saw palmetto are much thinner, about 3 to 5 feet long and are toothed at the margins. The tooth-like spines along the petiole account for the common name given to this palm.

creeping, with roots on the underside. The multiple trunks grow horizontally at or below the surface of the ground. Single plants or colonies may have erect stems only at the base. Each trunk produces between 12 to 30 leaves.

Flowers: Flowers are bisexual, small, white and fragrant. They are borne on plume-like stalks as long as the leaves. The flowers produce nectar in commercial quantities and are a source of a thick, fine honey. Flowering occurs in the spring and summer.

Fruits: Fruits are oblong, up to an inch in length. When ripe, their color is black to bluish and contain a brown

spongy pulp. The fruits can be found during the months of September or October. The fruit is edible and used for medicinal purposes. Most likely they were an important source of food for native Indians.

Propagation: Propagation by seeds take a long time to produce acceptable landscape plants. Seeds will germinate between 6 weeks to several months. Plants are best established from containers since they do not transplant easily. Small seedling can be easily transplanted if the plants are well maintained after replanting. It can be propagated by division during the warm months from March to October. This type of propagation requires at least two feet of trunk and some roots. Leaves are cut off completely before planting but leaf buds should not be injured.

Soil and moisture requirements: The saw palmetto grows well in sandy, moist to dry, acid to alkaline soils. It is drought tolerant after established but tolerates some mois-

ture. **Fertilization:** It requires very little fertilizer for normal growth. It can be fertilized once a year with the same fertilizer used for other ornamental landscape plants.

Light: High to moderate light intensity can be used for this plant. It grows well under the canopy of pine and other large trees.

Use: Because of the recent interest in native plants, saw palmettos have great demand as a shrub and groundcover.

The blue-green forms are particularly selected for naturalis-

tic landscapes. Flowers produce a fine honey, and beekeepers move their hives onto areas where saw palmettos begin to flower. Fruits are the source of a kidney medicine widely used in Mexico and often sold in health food stores. Also, a fat soluble extract of the saw palmetto fruit is used to treat enlarged prostate.

As in the case with the cabbage palm, the terminal bud of the saw palmetto is edible and is used much in the same way to prepare soups and used as a vegetable.

Pests: The most important pest of this plant is the palmetto weevil which may cause serious damages to small

plants. Full grown plants can take some damage from this insect.

Diseases: The root and trunk rot caused by the fungus *Ganoderma* is the most serious disease of this plant. Plants infected with this disease should be removed since there is no cure for this problem.

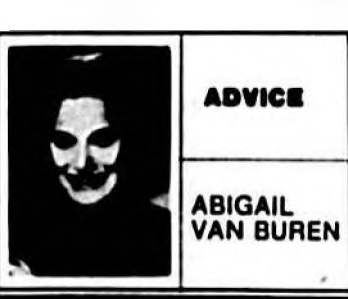

and interest in the concept has even reached Seminole County Public Schools.

There are several areas of hospitality training the Chamber will be developing. The most important being, to generate interest and awareness among current and prospective travel business employees in knowing their community as the traveler sees it or might like to see it. Plus, creating awareness of the tourism industry's positive impact on the area's economy.

Chamber says "NO" to adult clubs in Sanford

The Sanford Chamber of Commerce made it clear last week in a letter to Seminole County Commissioners, that the greater Sanford business community strongly opposes any adult entertainment establishments anywhere in or near Sanford.

Sandra Glenn, chamber president stated in the letter, "The greater Sanford business community strongly opposes the prospect of new adult entertainment zones anywhere in the Sanford area; especially adjacent to the Sanford/Orlando International Airport. It seems incredulous that government would encourage strip joints at our airport's gateway."

The letter continued, "Mistaken legal assumptions appear to have led to

misguided proposals. We implore you to go back to square one, seek new advice, and confine adult entertainment businesses to already impacted areas."

As a result of the Chamber and Sanford Mayor Larry Dale's stand against adult clubs in Sanford, the property being considered for a zoning change allowing adult entertainment establishments was changed to 35 acres. The acreage being considered east of the Sanford/Orlando Airport was previously 158 acres. The land borders the city of Sanford and is currently zoned for agricultural use.

The fight isn't over. Public meetings on the adult clubs issue are scheduled for December 2 and December 16.

In cooperation with Sandra (Sandy) Goard, Seminole County Supervisor of Elections, the Sanford Chamber of Commerce now has Florida voter registration applications available at the Chamber's Information and Business Referral Center located just east of historic downtown Sanford at First St. and Sanford Avenue.

For the month of October 1997, the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce received a total of 744 inquiries (652 telephone and 92 mail) - inquiry breakdown: 54% Relocation; 40% Visitor Information; 3% Seasonal Resident; 3% New Business Information. Chamber staff assisted 230 tourists who visited our chamber office information and business referral center located near historic downtown Sanford. The chamber's tourist information welcome booth at the Sanford/Orlando International Airport assisted British tourists. Visitors to Sanford from outside the state of Florida during October were from Ohio, New York, New Jersey, Michigan, Virginia, North Carolina, Maine, Kentucky, Arizona, California, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Maryland. Foreign visitors were from Scotland, Wales, Holland and England.

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

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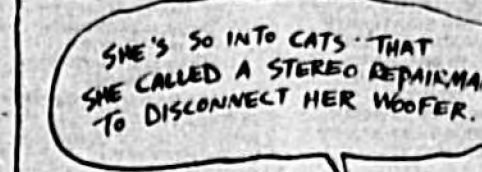
