

Christian Unity

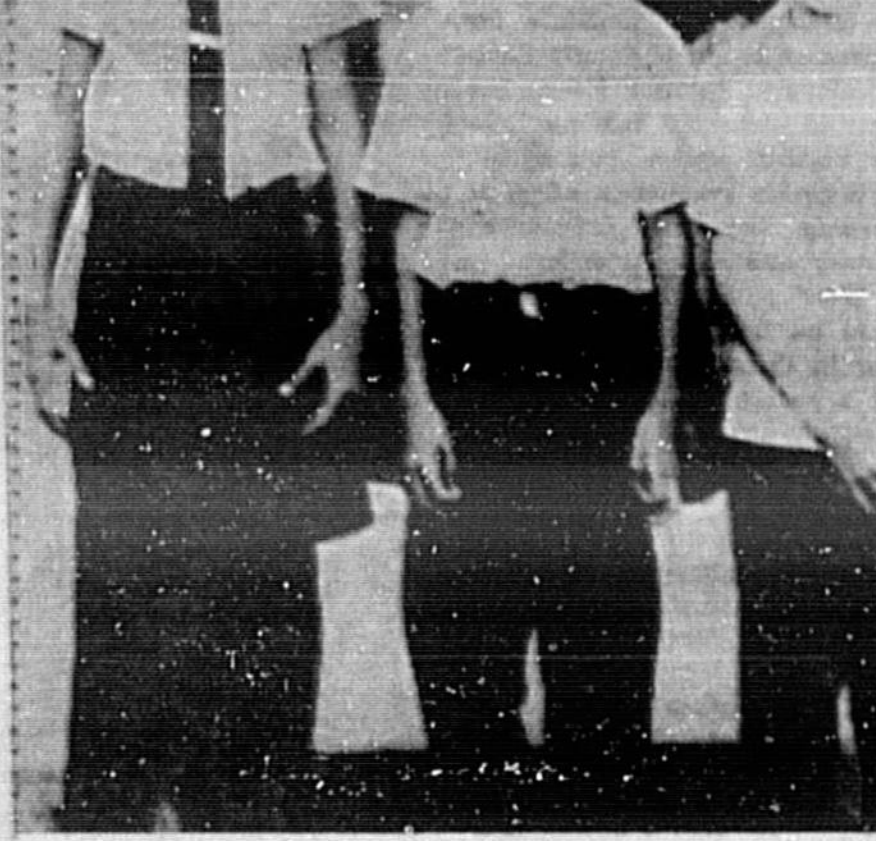

There were Baptists, Presbyterians, Methodists, Episcopalians, Orthodox, and Roman Catholics, and many others. They gathered quietly, discussed amicably, ate of the same table and departed with the intention of meeting again and continuing what had begun.

Has Christian unity arrived? It has and it hasn't. The walls we have built between us are coming down and the bridges of understanding are being erected. We are discovering human beings in other God-fearing, God-loving people like ourselves. It is encouraging.

Christian Unity is a long way off. There are real differences that must be bridged. Theological questions that require agreement, disciplines that must be understood. Despite these divisions, the bonds that tie us together are strong. The leadership of Christ, the spiritual, social and physical needs of man bind us in prayer and fellowship.

In seeking unity it is a question of who wins and who loses? It is the heart of the matter that we will never arrive at Unity. Or shall we sit in judgment on who was right and who was wrong? We only wish to say "let us come together, let us make an end to our divisions."

Any attempt at faith finding will be as destructive to the Christian family as it would be to the private family. Our attempt for Unity and Charity cannot sacrifice truth. We cannot simply gloss over our differences or try to pretend they are not there. Such a mode of acting would be avoiding the reality and only create greater problems.

Churches Blamed For Occult Boom

One of the most curious phenomena of contemporary American life is a tremendous upsurge of public interest in astrology, witchcraft, spiritualism and other occult arts.

The Rev. David H.C. Reed, pastor of Madison Avenue Presbyterian Church in New York, says there is today a great "yearning for the transcendent," particularly among young people who are in revolt against a secular and materialistic society.

Psychologist Ludwig B. Lefebvre, writing in Psychology Today magazine, agrees that vast numbers of people are seeking ways "to get beyond themselves." And most churches, he says, are not responding adequately to this hunger for "direct contact with a supernatural agency."

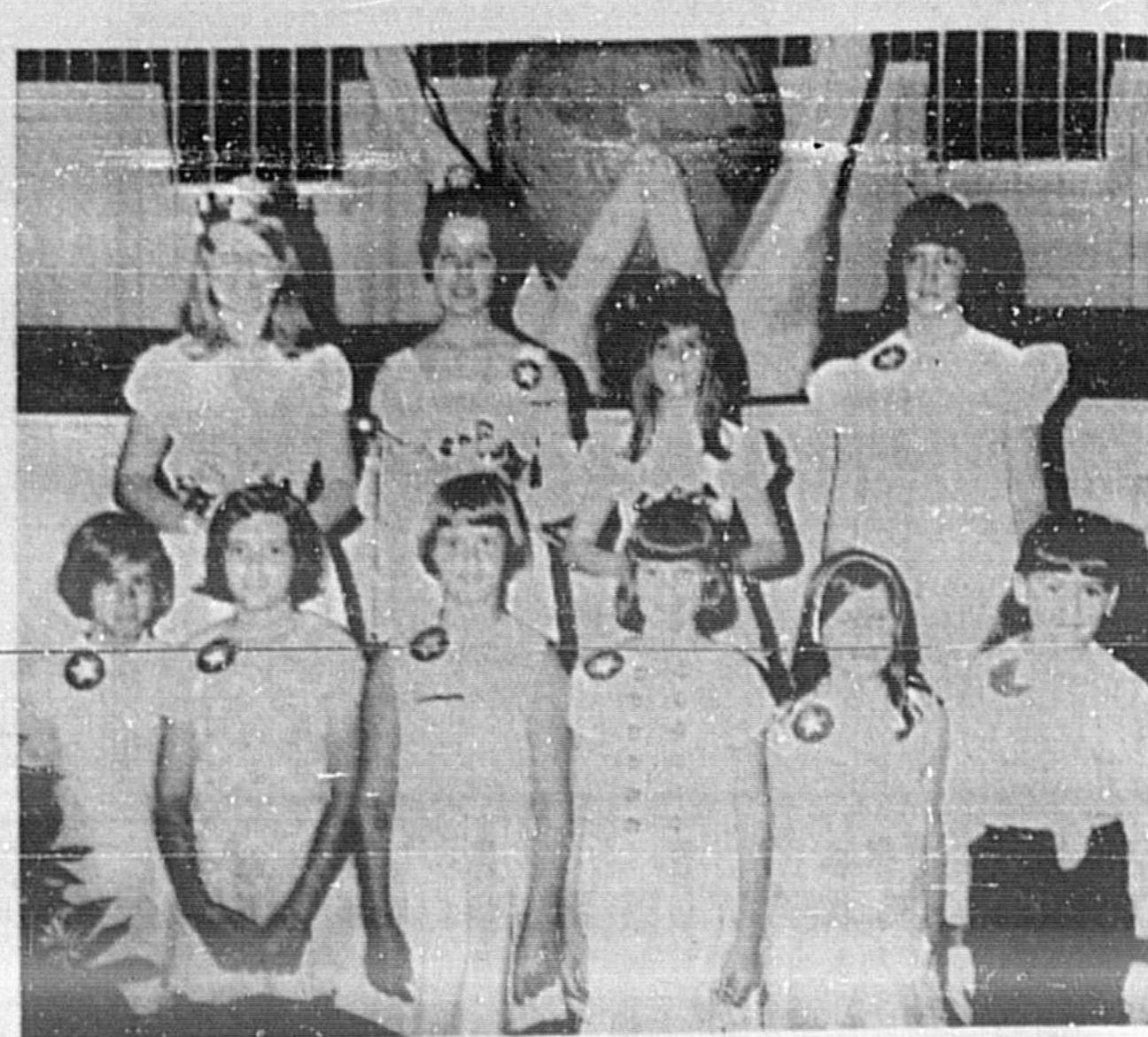
Such a mass retrogression into ancient idolatries should take place in this supposedly enlightened age is a judgment on America's churches. A great effort has been made to de-emphasize the supernatural "other-world" aspect of Christian teaching, and to present religion as a here-and-now aid to ethical behavior, by churches.

But it is beginning to appear that "modern man" is not quite as ready as some theologians thought to reject anything he can't explain on rational grounds. On the contrary, he seems to retain an indefinable faith in the supernatural, and in this world that is a dream of materialistic philosophy and secularized religion.

Dismissed by science and most Western religions as superstition, "direct contact with a supernatural agency" or in communion with God—is precisely what churches are supposed to be offering. It is a very serious indictment to say that most of them are not "responding" to a widespread demand for it.

May Run For U. S. Senate HHH 'Passes' Student Majority

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — After 16 months as a college teacher, former Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey says he's ready to pass a grade to the vast majority of American students.

By and large, he says, they are an active bunch, full of creative dissent and not willing to let a few "rebels of disorder" speak for all students.

Humphrey, 57, will be 59 next Wednesday. In an interview of his filing as a politician in residence" at Macalester College and the University of Minnesota, where he has been a part-time teacher of international relations since January 1969.

He is expected to relinquish that role soon and announce as a Democratic candidate for the U.S. Senate from Minnesota, probably on June 12.

Humphrey takes a hard line against any violence on college campuses—whether by students or government authorities. He does not condone either the killings of students in Ohio and Mississippi, or the student disorders that brought in loaded weapons.

"I think one thing we have to learn is that the use of firearms in civil disturbances can only be justified in the most extreme circumstances," he said.

"I also think there's a tendency to overuse our National Guard in circumstances for which they're not fully trained. Now, this is not to justify at all the violence of the handful who were throwing things and engaging in obscenities."

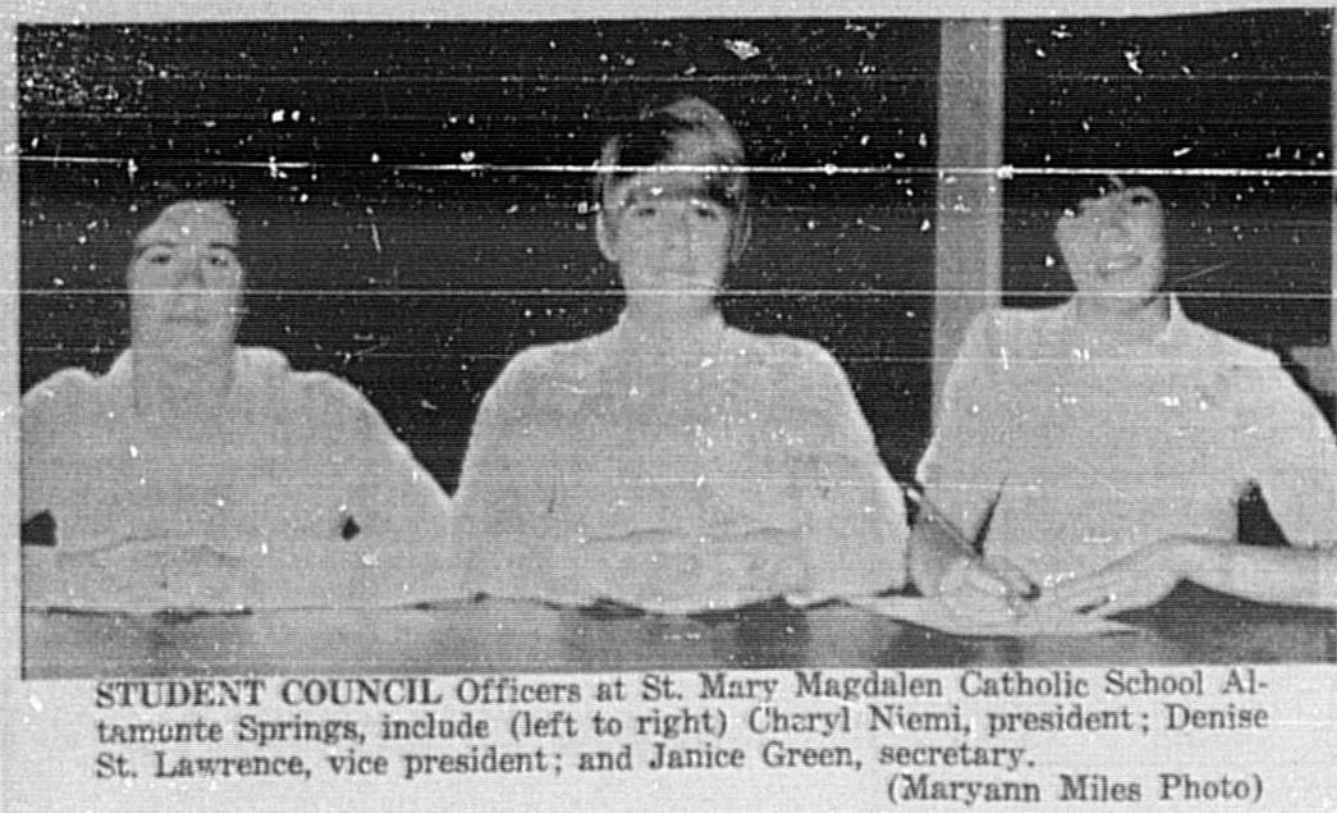

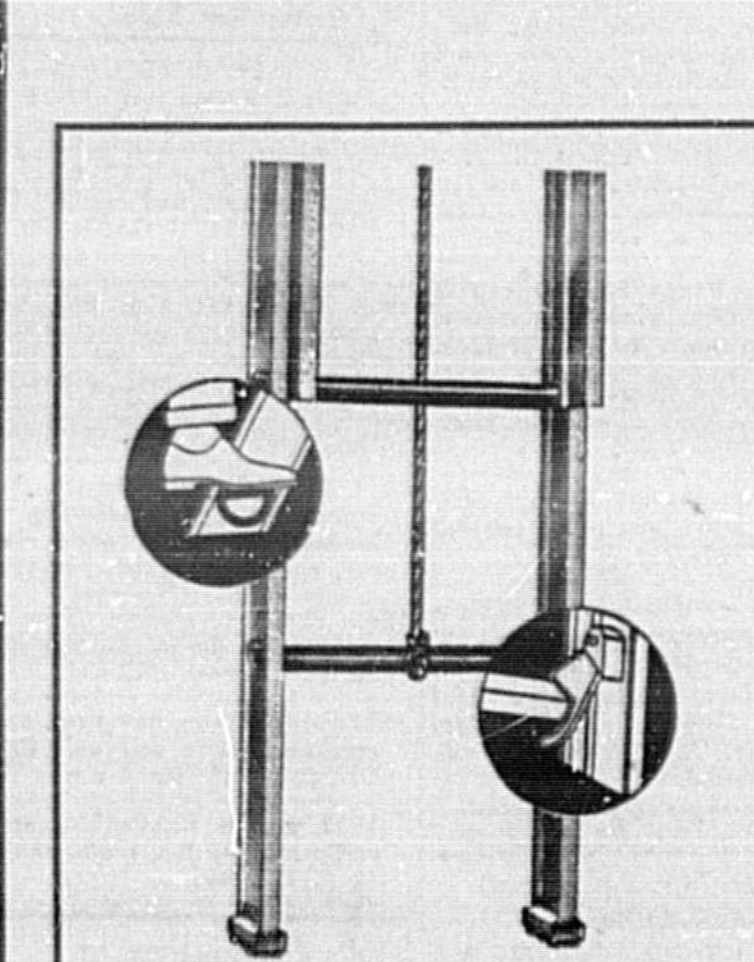
AUGUSTA, Georgia — Three Palm College students from the Sanford area were among recent campus two-makers.

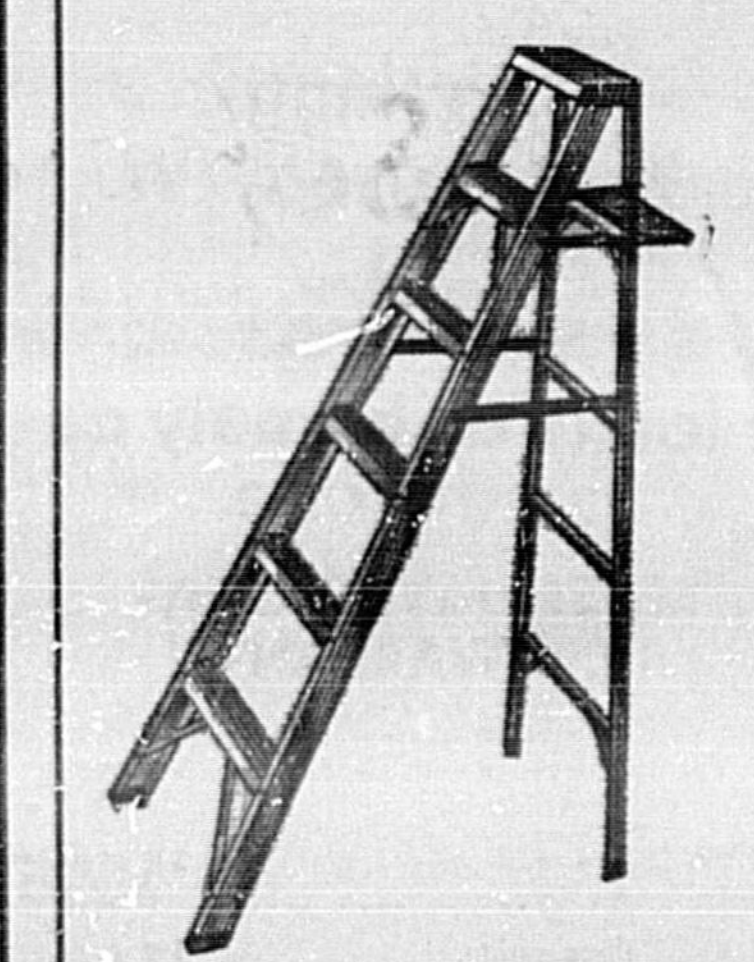

Nixon To Use Education \$ For Integration

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon will spend the bulk of a special \$500 million education fund in the coming academic year to aid integration rather than bolster segregated schools, high administration sources say.

The spending formula, part of Nixon's message to Congress to go on school integration, in effect allocates almost two-thirds of the money to school districts in the North and South that are breaking up segregated classrooms.

Minority students in these districts will count twice in a formula based on the number of Negro and other minority group pupils.

The chief executive disclosed his intention to establish the special fund in a March 24 school desegregation statement. A special Cabinet committee worked out details over the past two months for spending \$500 million in fiscal 1971 and \$1 billion the year after.

A last minute rihubarb, however, had developed between the Budget Bureau and the department of Health, Education and Welfare over how much of the \$500 million would actually flow from the Treasury next year.

According to highly reliable sources, Education Commissioner James E. Allen Jr. telephoned the President in anger Wednesday morning after learning Budget officials listed outlays of only \$150 million in fiscal 1971. J. Stanley Pottinger, HEW civil rights chief, placed a similar call to the White House.

Budget officials reportedly believed that while \$500 million would be committed only \$150 million could actually be spent by the districts during the academic year. Treasury withdrawal commitments by many states often lag behind appropriations.

Guerrillas Ambush School Bus

TEL AVIV (AP) — Arab guerrillas ambushed a school bus today, killing 10 Israelis, at least five of them children, and wounding 21.

Jerusalem protested to the U.S. Security Council about the attack, which occurred near Israel's border with Lebanon. It did not ask for a meeting.

The Arabs fired bazookas and small arms about 15 feet from the bus as it headed towards a border school.

The wounded children, many of whom lost limbs, were flown to hospitals.

Israeli planes and ground troops raided Egypt's major naval base on the Red Sea during the night.

Aboard the ambushed bus, bloodstained satchels and lunchboxes were strewn over the seats.

At least five of the dead were aged 6 to 8. Two teachers and the driver also perished. The driver was thrown 25 feet from the bus.

An Israeli soldier searching the area after the incident stepped on a mine and was wounded.

Two packs of Jordanian cigarettes were found next to four bazooka shells which had not been fired. Footprints indicated eight men were involved.

"The bus had picked up 30-35 persons to take to school."

"This bus goes by here every day, so they must know about it," said one settler. "Also, five minutes earlier a taxi and a truck drove by and nothing happened."

The Foreign Ministry said the letter to the Security Council stressed "the gravity of this crime perpetrated against innocent school children."

The Israeli raiders hit Part Safage, 250 miles southeast of Suez and 87 miles south of Sharm el Sheikh, a nearest Israeli-held point on the Sinai Peninsula, a spokesman said.

All Israeli forces returned safely, he reported.

The spokesman gave no further details. Six days ago, Israeli warplanes sank an Egyptian destroyer and a missile boat.

Arabs Kill 5 Israeli Children

TEL AVIV (AP) — Arab guerrillas ambushed a school bus today, killing 10 Israelis, at least five of them children, and wounding 21.

The Red Sea south of Safage. That attack was retaliation for the sinking of an Israeli fishing trawler by Egyptian missiles, the Israelis said.

The ambush of the bus and the killing or wounding of so many children was certain to touch off a public outcry in Israel for vengeance, and it was considered likely that the Israeli armed forces would retaliate with another major raid into southern Lebanon.

The Lebanese government announced that half an hour after the ambush Israeli artillery opened up on the Lebanese border towns of Bint Jbeil and Yarouk near the site, killing one woman and injuring two women and two children. The Lebanese said their artillery replied, and the duel was continuing three hours later.

A while later, the Lebanese said a third border settlement, Al-Azraq, was under fire and shelled, two miles from Bint Jbeil, was under fire and the toll had risen to four dead and more than 40 wounded.

In Amman the Jordanian capital, the ultra-leftist Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command claimed credit for the ambush on the school bus. It said three rockets hit the bus at close range, destroying it, and that Israeli troops who rushed to pursue the raiders ran into a minefield, suffering more casualties. It said that all the raiders returned safely to their bases.

S-S Benefits, Tax Hiked

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The House has approved a 3 percent increase in Social Security benefits and higher payroll taxes for the nation's wage earners.

It also approved a revolutionary plan to automatically fatten benefit checks and hike taxes, when the cost of living goes up.

The bill now goes to the Senate, where the benefit increase has strong support, but where the cost of living plan faces an uncertain fate.

The higher benefits would start next Jan. 1. A single retired worker now receiving \$101.70 would go to \$106.80. A man and wife receiving \$152.60 would get \$160.20. And a widow with two children receiving \$322.40 would go to \$338.50.

In addition, retirees could earn \$2,000 instead of the present \$1,500 during a single year before their benefits would be reduced.

S. Vietnam Vows To Keep Its Forces In Cambodia

SAIGON (AP) — The South Vietnamese military command said today that its forces will stay in Cambodia as long as necessary to destroy Viet Communist forces and their sanctuaries and remove their threat to South Vietnam.

The announcement came in response to a question whether South Vietnamese troops would pull out of Cambodia by June 30, deadline set by President Nixon for American troops to pull back to South Vietnam.

A spokesman for the South Vietnamese command recalled earlier statements by President Nguyen Van Thieu and Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky that they would stay in Cambodia as long as necessary to complete their mission and that they had the ability to stay there alone.

The spokesman did not indicate whether this mission in Cambodia would be completed by the end of the year, as some White House officials last weekend had predicted.

The South Vietnamese military command also disclosed that it now has 40,000 regular troops operating in Cambodia, the largest number it has acknowledged. They include elements from eight of South Vietnam's 12 regular infantry divisions.

The spokesman also reported that South Vietnamese marines and infantrymen had pushed within three miles of Phnom Penh, the Cambodian capital, in recent operations. He said their mission was to provide security for Route 1, the Phnom Penh-Saigon highway, to protect the movement of supplies to South Vietnamese troops operating in Cambodia.

NEW YORK (UPI)—President Nixon said Thursday the economy would turn upward later this year. Wall Street traders just can't wait.

They were unhappy about the continuing downward movement of the market which again saw the Dow Jones industrial average of 30 select blue chips plunge to its lowest level since March 1, 1962.

The DJ index dropped 11.30 to 862.25 compared to the figure of 873.72 reached more than seven years ago.

In the heaviest trading in two months, the market lost 100 points, touched daily lows for the year, and recorded its 102nd given day. Declines over a 100-point advance since 1962.

According to Nixon's press secretary, the Dow Jones index, which had been held steady by Bernard Lasker, chairman of the New York Stock Exchange, was confident of an upswing in the last half of the year and his budget policies would then allow more credit and lower interest rates.

Analysts, however, were not too optimistic about what they called a crisis of confidence.

Saul Steinberg, analyst for Standard & Poor's, said "Nixon's remark was another in the series of Washington statements that have just lost their power to help the market."

Monte Gabelman, senior vice president of Bache & Co., said "The market is demanding more and more news rather than rhetoric."

Presbyterians OK \$300,000 Plans

A \$300,000 building program was authorized by the congregation of First Presbyterian Church of Sanford at the Sunday morning services. The church owns the area bounded by Third and Fourth Streets and Oak and Park Avenues excepting the Woman's Club property.

A church committee headed by B. C. Conklin had worked with an architect and a professional fund raiser in drafting tentative plans for the construction program.

Conklin explained to the congregation that a new Christian education building will be constructed in the center of the church property at the rear of the Fellowship Building, which faces Third Street. A new addition to the Fellowship Building will be constructed on the east side of that structure (where the Pure Oil service station is now).

Refurbishing and heavy maintenance work will be recommended for the sanctuary building at Third and Oak. Landscaping will be carried out also.

The congregation, in a business session at the close of the worship session, approved the program and authorized a building fund campaign in the fall. Actual construction will be started with funds derived from the campaign and subsequent loan from a financial institution.

The long range program, Conklin stated, includes a new sanctuary in about 4-10 years fronting on Fourth Street.

Pesticide Storage

As more pesticides are banned from use by homeowners, a new problem becomes evident — how to dispose of these pesticides safely. In order to supply a solution, the Institute of Food and Agricultural Services, University of Florida and the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services have launched a joint collection effort.

Starting this week, the County Agricultural Department will serve as a collection point for the banned pesticides. Any homeowners who would like to dispose of their pesticides can bring them by the County Agent's office at 4520 South Orlando Drive during the normal working hours 8 to 5 Monday through Friday.

These materials will be stored in a safe place until they can be picked up by the State Department of Agriculture trucks. These materials will be held until adequate incineration or other methods become available to break them down to harmless products.

Since the County Agricultural facilities are not adequate to handle large amounts of pesticides, anyone with large quantities seeking a method of disposal can call the county Agricultural office and arrangement will be made to have them picked up when the State trucks make their collection.

It is hoped that this effort will reduce the amount of presently illegal pesticides in the homeowner, garage or utility shelves.

Highest Labor Force Reported; Unemployment Climbs To 5.9%

Seminole County now has the highest labor force ever recorded. Latest figures released by the Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce revealed that in April this year, the county's total labor force climbed to 20,460 persons, an increase of 600 persons over a year ago.

At the same time the total labor force was on the increase, the number of persons unemployed in the county went up from 4.6 per cent in April, 1969 to 5.9 per cent, an increase of 1.3 per cent in a year.

The number of county persons employed was placed at 19,300 persons as of April, 1970, an increase of 400 more jobs in a year's time. Figures for 1969 during the same period were placed at 18,600, according to chamber figures.

All types of employment showed an increase over 1969, but most number of new jobs were in the farm type industries.

Agriculture workers increased by 200 persons from 1,300 to 1,400 in a year's time, while non-farm or establishment jobs climbed upward to 14,300 from its 14,200 a year ago.

Other miscellaneous type employment moved to 3,500 in 1970 as compared to 3,600 a year ago.
