



Tourism is on the rise for Florida. This is an industry of an asset which Sanford and Seminole needs to encourage. It is also essential that it be I understood in both broad and specific terms.

Looking at it from the dollar contribution which the visitor brings to the Sunshine State, the figure 2 for 1968 shows that the grand total was \$5,508,-2 151.187. Of this, lodging and amusements accounted for

about 81 per cent. While the travelers left \$1,011,-296,524 for the operators of restaurants, night clubs and taverns to ring up on their cash registers.

Breaking this down into the number of days which the tourist spent in Florida it amounted to about 15 days with each visitor spending \$274.92. These statistics are offered only to point out that this is an economic resource which every effort should be made by our city and county to cultivate o and attract. A responsible estimate for 1970 gives about 500,000 tourists arriving in Orlando and only ■ 15,000 for Sanford.

Airport Visit

This is the day when Sanford's City Commissioners are to go out to the Sanford Airport and look over the most modern of the structures there with an eye to using it as a temporary City Hall.

We believe that this is a proper trip made at a proper time and with an objective which is even more than proper - it is essential. Sanford City Hall is in bad physical shape.

It is overcrowded. Its quarters hinder rather than help the modernization of municipal government which must be done in even greater THPASUTO. Having said this, however, we believe that

such a move as is contemplated raises almost as many questions as it answers.

This is a welcome development. Sanford has come into a situation where the growth which everyone has been talking about, some have contemplated with regret and others have exaggerated is a statistical fact.

We are not referring to the industries of small and large variety which have come into the city's limits and whose need for services increases every year. But we are thinking of the large number of new families who are choosing Sanford for their permanent homes. Most such new residents have chosen wisely in consideration of their home locations. They

realize that modern living requires the protection of life and property which our fine police department and fire department assures. Take a trip into City Hall and there will be

no question in your mind that a new City Hall building is unavoidable. As one visitor remarked ". . . if they don't move it, the termites

But the City Hall is not something which can be considered by itself. It is, by its very nature, a hub of civic activity.

If the move to the modern structure at the airport can be made so that plans for a new Crane's Worry Clinic: structure can be proceeded with allowing all the thought and planning such a move requires. then the visit of our commissioners to the airport will be an event of extreme importance. It is, under any interpretation, a visible wit-

ness to the recognition by our commissioners of the need to proceed at once to solve this too long delayed problem. Growing Sanford needs a growing City Hall complex!

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This is entirely too small a share for our lovely lake-side city. It short-changes the tourist who speeds by witnout any comprehension of what is being overlooked.





WASHINGTON (AP) The Small Business Administration guaranteed a \$135,000 bank loan ; to high-salaried Negro baseball star Lou Brock under its program for disadvantaged husinessmen.

Brock, the St. Louis Cardinals' left fielder, said no one ever told him the guarantee was made through the SBA's minoriv enterprise program rather han the stricter conventional business loan program. "It never even came up." said

A man who had a gun openty displayed in his belt was found not guilty of the offense. Even though the erresting officer-approaching from behind-could not see the gun, it was obvious enough for ordinary observation.

And what does "carrying" mean! Does the person actually have to be moving with the gun?

One man, seeing an officer near by, hastily slipped his pistol into an inside pocket. Arrested and brought to trial for carrying a concealed weapon, he offered this defense to the court:

"Carrying" means transporting the weapon from one place to another. I did not move a single step."
