## Commissioners Skeptical Trouble As Bad As Rose Says

The Seminole County Commission Tuesday was skeptical to County Administrator Tom Duncan Rose's forecast of an \$8 million budget deficit.

Rose told the commissioners at a work session Monday that to maintain the existing level of county services and continue with planned capital improvement projects in fiscal 1993-94, some \$9 million would have to be raised. He asked for discretion, but the commissioners told him to walk a week.

Rose stated that the options for raising the funds, including a 14.8 percent property tax increase, was his fifth preference from the list of options in order of "increasing pain."

"The further down the list you go, the more impact on the organiza-

tion," he said. Rose's first preference, he explained, is to pledge sales tax or other non-property tax revenues to sell bonds to finance capital expansion. This would save \$3.8 million, he said.

Rose asked for a go-ahead for the bond issue in further budgeting. For the bond issue, but commissioners of the plan, but commissioners Robert Glenn, Bill Kirkchouff and Barbara Christensen were in favor of the plan. "I'll go out on a limb," Rose replied. "If you don't like that one, the bond issue option you can hang up."

"If you don't accept that, I haven't convinced you that you have an \$8 million problem, he said."

"Let's be a crew idiot," Rose said. "It's not an independent auditor to look at the books."

"I don't see it as a credibility problem," Mrs. Glenn said. "But we need to look at each department."

"If you've got a lot of dollars paid out of capital improvement projects and I don't know what they are,"

Rose projects the county will receive for fiscal 1993-94, about \$77 million in revenues from all sources. He will need, he forecasts, \$20.3 million for personnel, \$12.1 million for operating expenses, \$4.5 million for capital and \$3.6 million for reserves and other expenses to maintain the current level of service — \$40.8 million.

# Where Will Sanford Go With Trash?

A giant cube 150 feet high, by 150 feet wide and 150 feet long. That's the size of the cube that would be necessary to hold the garbage and trash generated by the nearly 7,000 homes in Sanford every week.

That's a cube large enough to contain about 270 average size houses.

Other cities across the nation have been struggling with the problem of refuse disposal for years as the problem has taken on gigantic proportions.

For some time, Sanford in its effort to save its citizens as much money as possible and still provide the service of refuse collection has been using a private refuse company landfill to its disposal site.

Now the city staff is studying a list of alternatives to disposing of the mountains of trash and garbage generated from Sanford homes. The staff has not announced recommendations yet.

Sanford now is collecting garbage and trash from homes at a fee of \$7.25 per month and the sum is noted on monthly utility bills.

Sanford Assistant City Manager Steve Harrett said using some alternatives is needed out by the city staff to all available and conceivable alternatives, there's no way of knowing whether that fee will be raised or whether the city will stay in the garbage collection service.

There's a possibility the city might find its only feasible way in franchising the service out to a private company, Harrett said.

The city is not aware of allowing businesses who want to dispose of their trash and refuse to be dumped on the site. He said there is no private garbage collection franchise by the city now to provide residential refuse collection. The businesses who want to be removed are going the \$7.25 monthly for the city service can sign a permit to take their trash to the site and they may have their own trucks to take trash to the site using their own trucks and pay the fees there.

Sanford has contract with Seminole County with the landfill. The staff has estimated that the cost of regular commercial disposal of the city's trash is \$101,000 compared to the \$39,100 the city has been paying for the privately owned and operated Lake Mary landfill in Orange City.

Harrett said with DER and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency strict enforcement of regulations concerning the private operation of sanitary landfills, the possibility appears remote that the city will be able to find a reasonably priced private landfill at which city garbage and trash can be disposed.

Harrett in conversations with county staff members was told that using the county transfer station at Ocoee would likely be impossible now because the county would have to make capital investments in trailers and tractors to handle the increased loads generated by Sanford, and until the added equipment is purchased, Sanford would have a long term contract with the county, the city would have to purchase its refuse to Ocoee.

# Soccer Center Denied Beer And Wine Permit

Beer and wine won't be sold at Central Florida Soccer's indoor facility near Longwood if a vote by the Seminole County Board of Adjustment stands. Staff owner William Knott said it's likely he will appeal the decision to the Seminole County Commission.

The board of adjustment voted 3-1 Monday to deny the request for a limited exception to zoning regulations which prohibit the sale of such beverages on the soccer facility, which is located on State Road 19 and U.S. Highway 17-92. The area is zoned industrial.

Knott told the board he wants to have beer and wine available for adult players after their games and promised to keep the alcohol locked up when youngsters play. He also said he wouldn't put signs up advertising beer on the premises.

"We're not trying to run a bar," he said.

Although no one appeared at the hearing, which began after 10 p.m., to speak against the special exception, Ginny Markley, county zoning coordinator, read two letters in opposition to the beer and wine sales and said the county received a petition asking the request not be granted.

The petition was signed by 71 residents of Spring Hammock Trailer Park, which is located across from the facility, now under construction.

The letters said the liquor would be detrimental to the moral environment at the facility and opposed alcoholic beverage service where children, women and young people are present. Knott argued that the liquor would be kept in a secure area and that the beer and wine would be sold to members only. Larry Barr, zoning coordinator, said he was concerned about the problem of alcohol.

### The CIA Linked To Soviet Dissident's Trial

MOSCOW (UPI) — Dissident Valery Resin faced a possible death sentence in his trial today on treason charges arising from his work with the Solidarity Fund, an agency allegedly run by the CIA for families of political prisoners.

Resin, 32, pleaded guilty to the charges on the opening day of his trial Monday in Leningrad. If convicted of treason, he could be sentenced to 15 years in jail and ten to five years' internal exile, or execution. It was not known which trial will end.

The official Tass news agency said Monday two Americans were Resin's chief contacts, providing him with questionnaires on military and political matters that had to be filled out by all families receiving aid from the fund.

The Soviet news agency said the aid set up with royalties from Alexander Solzhenitsyn's book "Gulag Archipelago," was administered by Resin and his wife.

### China Wants Hijackers

Peking (UPI) — China, demanding that South Korea return six hijackers to face possible execution at home, said inadequate airport searches allowed them to stage the first hijacking out of the country.

The director general of China's national airline, CAAC, said a news conference Monday that allowing the hijackers to evade responsibility or to go free would be "unacceptable."

Hijacking is punishable by seven years in prison in South Korea. In China, they would face the death penalty.

In response, South Korea said it would stick to its policy of the 1970 Hague convention but not require repatriation of hijackers but only provides that they be punished under local laws.

# Lebanon, Israel Sign Troop Withdrawal Pact

Lebanon and Israel signed a U.S.-mediated agreement calling for the withdrawal of 30,000 troops from Lebanon to a year after Israel liberates Palestinian guerrilla strongholds.

Despite the signing, implementation of the accord was threatened by Syrian President Hafez Assad, backed by the Soviet Union, which claims the pact is a violation of a peace treaty with the Jewish state.

If Syria agrees to leave, the Israeli cabinet is expected to put the pact to a vote in 10 weeks.

The Beirut suburbs of Khalde, Lebanese and Israeli negotiators signed the Arabic and French versions of the pact. The Hebrew and English versions were to be signed later today in the northern Israeli town of Kiryat Shmona.

The sites of the ceremonies were the alternating locations of high and arduous negotiations to bring the withdrawal accord, finally worked out by the Israeli cabinet, to the Lebanese. The Israeli cabinet also approved the agreement, voting 57-6 with 45 abstentions.

Amintze Patai, head of the Lebanese negotiating team, said the agreement was needed to start the restoration of his country's sovereignty.

"If we today are signing this agreement... it is because Lebanon is in need of urgent tranquility and order and Lebanon wants to survive," said Patai, speaking in Hebrew.

The accord was reached after Shultz stepped in to break a deadlock in the troop withdrawal talks, which began Dec. 28, in a risky round of personal diplomacy.

In Beirut Monday, 80 members of the Lebanese Chamber of Deputies voted unanimously with an show of hands to approve the accord. In Jerusalem, the Israeli cabinet also approved the agreement, voting 57-6 with 45 abstentions.

Israel, which invaded Lebanon last year, has said it will pull 30,000 troops out of Lebanon if Syria does the same. Israel in 1970 in quelled the bloody Lebanese civil war.

Several Arab states — including Egypt, Jordan, Algeria, Morocco, Kuwait and Qatar — are supporting Lebanon's part in the agreement.

Palestine Liberation Organization chief Yasser Arafat also rejected the accord during the weekend, calling for a new Arab war against Israel. There are currently more 12,000 Palestinian forces in Lebanon.

The pact falls short of the peace accords worked out in 1978 at Camp David by Israel and Egypt, but it does call for Israel and Lebanon to exchange Lebanese personnel and in six months begin talks on a possible trade agreement.

Lebanese Foreign Minister Elie Salame argued the agreement was not a peace treaty and that unless the Israeli troops leave, Israel may eventually annex Lebanon. Lebanon, noting the 16-year Israeli occupation of the West Bank of the Jordan River and the Golan Strip.

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# Ex-Teacher's Aide Had History Of Mental Woes

BRENTWOOD, N.Y. (UPI) — A pregnant patient fired from her teacher's aide job for punching a student went on a rampage at a junior high school, killing the boy and the principal and hitting a classroom of hostages before being held.

Robert Wickes, 24, also had threatened Cabinet members and had violent tendencies, including a previous suicide attempt, his attorney said Monday. School officials said they were unaware of his mental problems.

Wickes wore combat fatigues and dog tags and carried a 22-caliber rifle when he took over a ninth grade class at 40 at Brentwood Junior High about 1 p.m. Monday.

"I'm not leaving here alive," he yelled at the hostages when he barged into the room. "You kids messed up my career."

The siege ended nine hours later when the final hostage, Brian Lopez, who acted as the gunman's negotiator with police, ran out of the room and shouted, "The shot himself." After Wickes fired a bullet into his right temple.

Wickes died at 1:41 p.m. at a hospital. Brentwood Junior High was closed today because of the incident.

Wickes' attorney, Gerald Latta, who was brought to the scene of the drama along with a psychiatric social worker and Wickes' mother, said his client was a paranoid schizophrenic and was undergoing mental treatment. He also was investigated by the Secret Service for making death threats against Secretary of State George Shultz and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger.
