

Program Branded 'Kiddie Pornography'

Orange Ponders Sex Education

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Sex education in the classroom — branded kiddie pornography by opponents and heralded as a way to human understanding by supporters — forced the Orange County School Board into a heated session today to hear the views of parents.

For five months last year, the seven-member school board offered each individual twelve in 16 county schools to be exposed to a program named Schools Health Education Study, a commercially produced program of slides aimed at introducing sex education to each grade level on a graduated scale.

Both sides of the furor have friends on the school board which has the power to extend the program to the county's 142 schools, or banish it altogether.

The most sensitive issue between those who want the program to be extended and those who want to banish it is whether the program should be enforced at the elementary level.

"It is not a favorable kind of sex education at the elementary level," said Board member Stewart Shaffer, father of four. "Above that, only with parental consent."

One of the two women on the board disagrees.

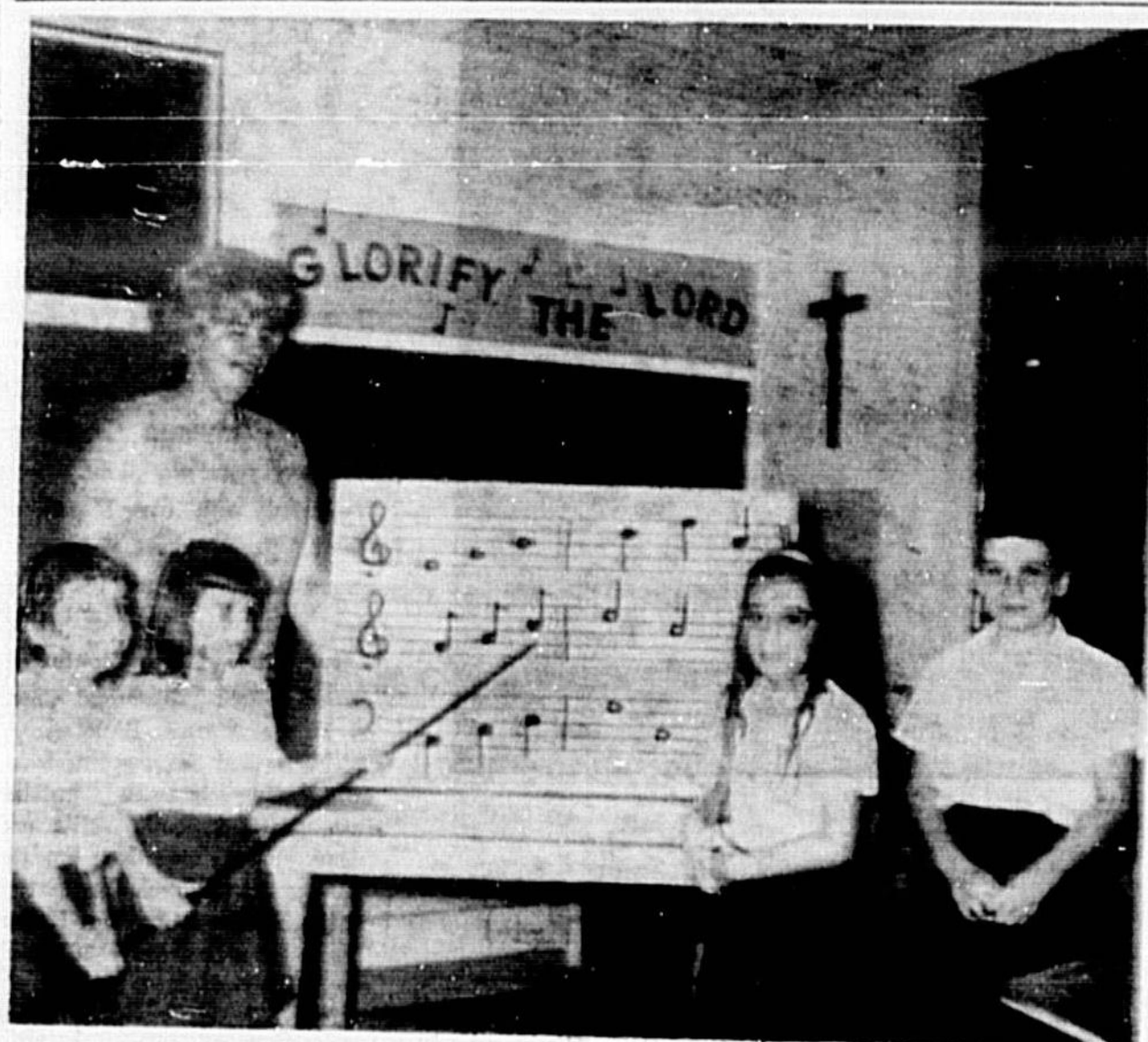
"If we could keep the children from being introduced to sex up until the sixth grade, this could be great—but we can't," said Mrs. Lisa Davies, mother of two. "If Johnny stands up in the first grade and tells the class his mommy is going to have a baby, it's there—right there in front of all those young minds," she said. "What do you do then?"

"The program should be run by clergymen and doctors, because it is difficult for the teacher to bring morality into the sex education because she can't bring the religious aspect in," said Shaffer.

But Mrs. Davies said she is very satisfied with the current program.

"The type of program opponents want to introduce is the Sunday morning sermon preached every time sex is mentioned in the classroom," she said, "but today's children just don't respond to hellfire and damnation morality."

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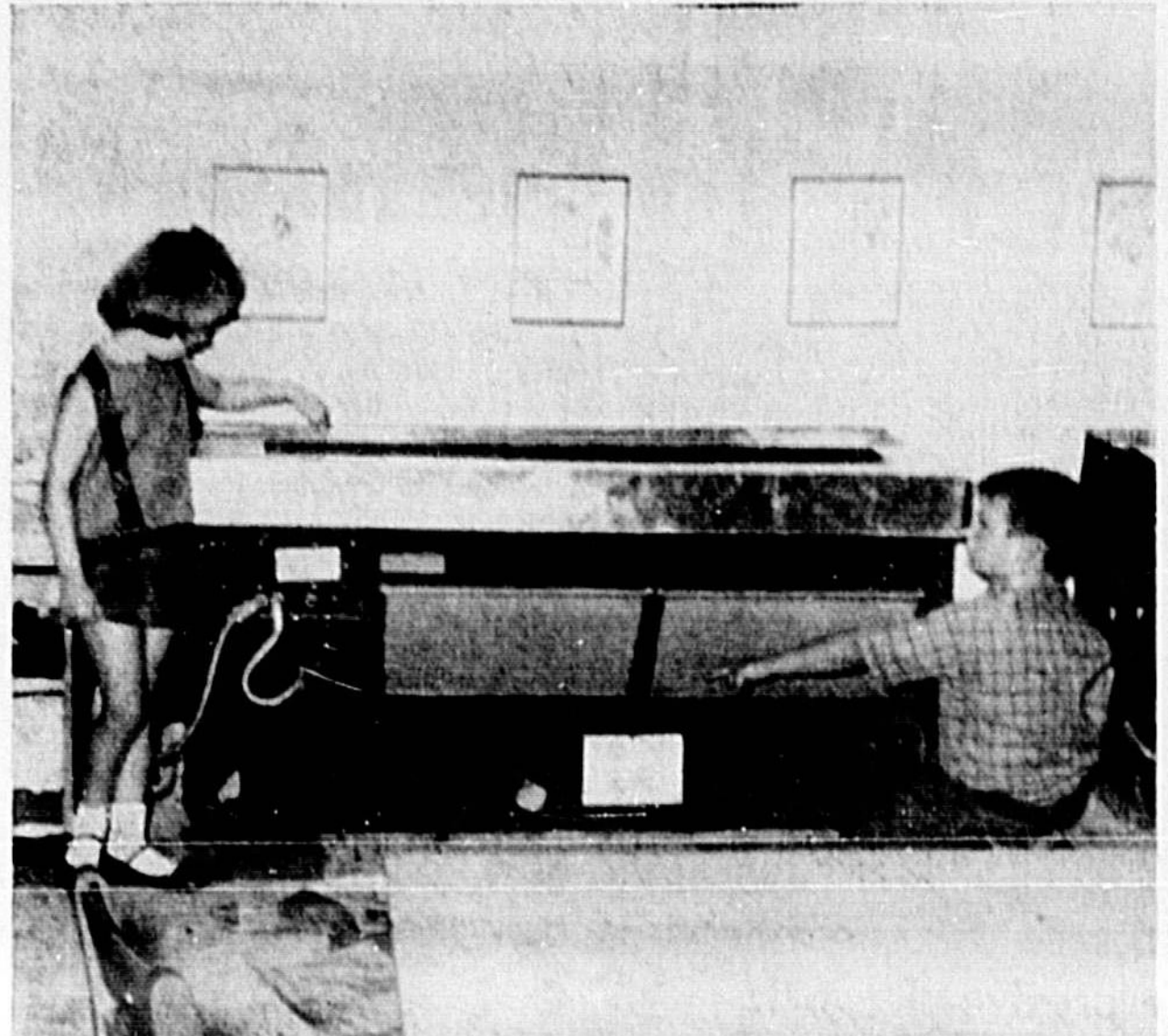

Giant Snails Infest Miami Area

MIAMI (AP) — A lush area in north Miami is infested with fast-moving snails that are eating about everything in sight—even the paint on houses.

"They're real African snails," said Art Calvert, area administrator for the Florida Agriculture Department. He estimated there were up to 20,000 of them in a 13-square-block area.

Calvert said the snails thrive on foliage and calcium and present a threat to South Florida's cash crops if they aren't contained. The infestation is unique in the United States, he added.

Calvert and a dozen agriculture experts—including state Agriculture Commissioner Doyle Comer—visited the area Thursday in the Miami Shores section and collected hundreds of the large, brownish colored snails.

"I saw some shells bigger than my fist," said Calvert. "Inside, the snails were almost a foot long."

Calvert said the snails can't be sprayed from a plane because they are in a populated area. "So we're going to put a granular substance on the lawns," he said. "Conventional poisons don't bother them."

The snails, capable of producing 600 offspring each year, chomp on the lush foliage and eat paint from the houses to get calcium.

"We found them on roofs, clinging to walls and hiding beneath eaves," Calvert said. "They were everywhere."

\$100 Million In Art Donated To Museum

NEW YORK (AP) — The famous Robert Lehman art collection, which experts say might have brought \$100 million if sold, has been given to the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

It includes approximately 1,000 objects, among them paintings by Rembrandt, Duccio, El Greco, Goya, Van Gogh, Renoir, Gauguin, Matisse and Picasso.

Other works, covering the 12th through the 20th century, are Western European bronzes, tapestries, jewelry, furniture and ceramics.

Thomas F. F. Howing, director of the museum, described the collection as priceless and said it was "practically without parallel in the history of private collecting."

The collection was assembled by Robert Lehman of the New York investment banking family, who was the museum's board chairman when he died Aug. 9 at the age of 77.

The gift to the museum was announced by his son, Robert Owen Lehman, and Edwin L. Wild, president of the Robert Lehman Foundation, at a dinner Thursday evening off the Metropolitan's year-long centennial celebration. The 10th anniversary is next April 13.

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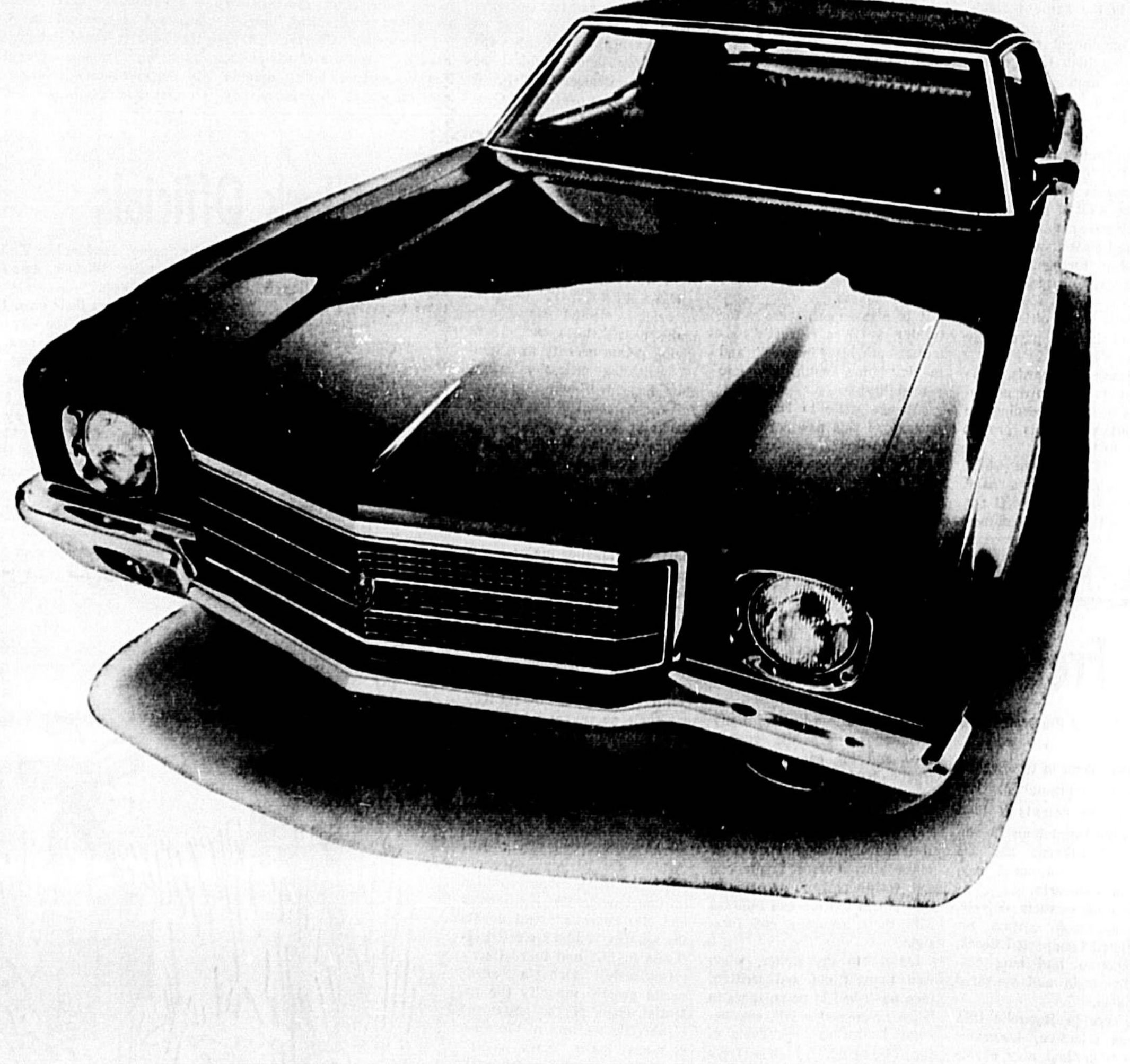

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Lobbyists May Be Ousted For Violating House Rules



ALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Ninety-four lobbyists who pleaded their cases at the last legislative session may be barred from ever again appearing before a legislative group because records show they violated House rules.

None of the 94 had filed an expenditure report in accordance with House rule 13 at the time of an Associated Press inquiry last week. Rep. John Savage, chairman of the Standards and Conduct Committee, said his group may decide to strike the lobbyists' names from the eligibility list.

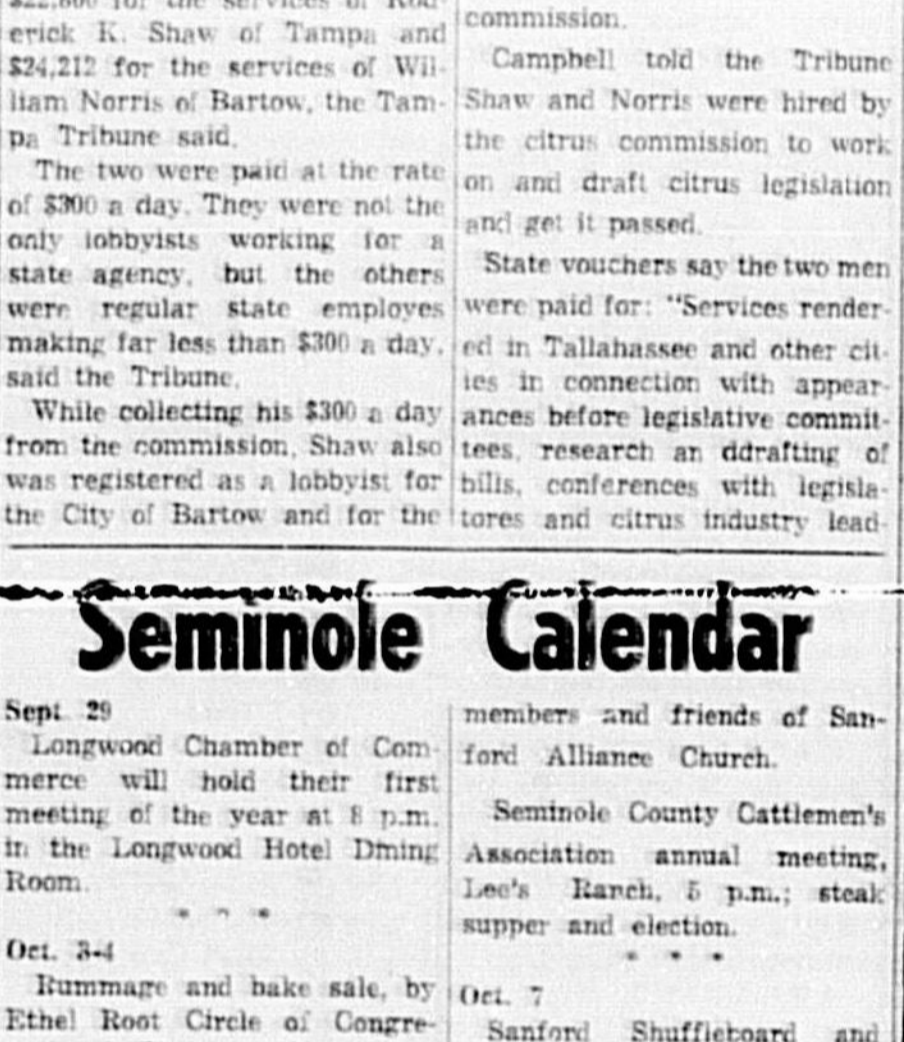

An audience of 2,400 watched what had been billed as a battle of defenses turn into an offensive slugfest with both Seminoles and Palatka setting cracked up. In the end, Palatka quarterback Art Amis spoiled the difference as the Seminoles went down to defeat 26-21, Friday night, at Sanford Memorial Stadium.

Palatka was presented the first scoring opportunity when they pounced on a Seminole fumble 34 yards from the goal line. Tommy Whigham misjudged a fair catch of a Braves punt. Palatka, directed by signal-caller Art Amis, moved the ball 75 yards in the first quarter. Amis, on the try, ripped through right tackle for the touchdown from one yard out. Amis kicked the point-after and Palatka led 7-0 with 6:25 left in the first quarter.

Palatka couldn't get in high gear, however, and punted from their own 25 up to their 20. The Seminoles, on a fourth and six situation at the

Whigham hobbled to the 25. After Tim Perrin was cut down at the line of scrimmage, Barka found Voltoline for a 29-yard scoring pass, narrowing the score to 15-7. Sanford Migrant School Is Vetoed

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The federal government has vetoed a proposed training school for migrants operated by private industry at the old Sanford Naval Air Station, a state official said today.

Don Meiklejohn, director of the Division of Commercial Development said the state is "starting a new ball game" in an effort to revive the migrant training program.

He said he didn't know whether it would be at Sanford, if put into operation.

"I would think that if it makes sense for it to be at Sanford, yes," he said. "I suppose Sanford is reasonably centrally located."

Meiklejohn said Gov. Claude Kirk received a letter from Robert Fish, secretary of health, education and welfare, which said "they didn't seem to think they could fund" the program as originally proposed.

Two of the nation's biggest firms, General Electric and Aeco Corp., offered competing proposals which would have entailed a federal outlay of about \$6 million.

"We're trying to devise some sort of plans which will meet the criteria of HEW," Meiklejohn said. "It may fit into the Department of Commerce ... into an ongoing program so we're not heaping one program atop of another."

'A Lie Was Told' Lawyer To Sue School Board

 Orlando Attorney William D. Rowland said today he intended to file a suit against the Seminole County School Board after a meeting Monday with a number of plaintiffs, who are opposed to the freedom of choice desegregation plan adopted by the board for the 1969-70 school term.

Rowland, in an exclusive Herald interview today, said that the "choice" plan as implemented by the board was not a choice plan and that a "lie was told to the public by the board through their attorney Douglas Stenstrom."

Rowland stated that in Stenstrom's reply to the U.S. Department of Health Education and Welfare's (HEW) allegations that resulted in the county's federal funds being deferred, was the statement, "while the words freedom of choice were used in the board's school plan for 1969-70, in truth and in fact, the plan of the board was a modified zoning plan."

This statement to the federal bureau is interpreted by Rowland as an admission that the county tried to pass off a freedom of choice plan on citizens while in reality it was a modified zone plan, and as such was never considered by the board in deliberations of three plans.

Rowland said that Pat Buis, board member, was willing to give an affidavit attesting that at no time was a modified zoning plan considered by the board.

Rowland accused the board of calling it a freedom of choice plan, but all the time they knew it was not.

The attorney stated he had been in contact with HEW and was told by that body the county could not safeguard deferred funds by getting the case before a federal judge.

This confirms a Herald story reported last week when an attorney from HEW called Stenstrom and said board could possibly lose federal funds thought to have been approved for this term.

Two relatives of slain Sanford Fireman Bobby Thompson came to The Herald today and advised they were told to collect information to submit to the office of President Richard M. Nixon, after they contacted the chief executive's office Sunday by phone.

Dorothy Brooke, 244 Orange Avenue, and Evelyn McClary, 610 W. Ninth Street, sisters and cousins to the dead man who was found by police stuffed in a closet at his Sanford home, said they had contacted the President's office for help in seeing that justice was done in the upcoming murder trial of Mable Frances Thompson, wife of the deceased.

The women maintained that unless there is some outside action to force the trial of Mrs. Thompson, it is possible the woman may never face prosecution.

Citing the county's murder conviction record, the women noted that it had been 29 years since a first degree conviction has been obtained in the county's courts.
