# PHILADELPHIA WINS SERIES

**MACDONALD IS ON HIS WAY TO CANADIAN CITY**

Premier Is Cheered By Throngs At Station Upon His Departure; Will Visit Niagara

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—Leaving a rainbow of goodwill behind him, Prime Minister Macdonald, of Great Britain, departed for Canada at 8:30 A. M. today accompanied by his daughter Ethel, and the rest of the entourage.

As the Prime Minister and his daughter waved farewell from the observation platform of the train to some 2,000 well-wishers gathered at Grand Central Station to wish them god-speed, they received a most unique send-off.

Their going more resembled the departure of a victorious college football team than that of one of the leading statesmen in the world and his daughter. An important cheer-leader somewhere in the throng led systematic "Hip-hip-hooray" and "three cheers for Macdonald" and the Prime Minister, to say the least, just beamed.

"I can only say that I truly regret to leave," said Mr. Macdonald before the train pulled out. "I will issue my farewell statement when I leave America tomorrow."

Isabel, wearing a black ensemble with an abalone green blouse, red beaver hat and fawn colored gloves, was radiant as she stood beside her father and exchanged numerous "good-byes." Before leaving, the Prime Minister shook hands with 60 members of the British consulate here, each one of whom Sir Harry Armstrong, British consul, introduced personally.

Two automobiles were filled to overflowing with high banks of chrysanthemums and other flowers sent to the train by friends of Mr. Macdonald and his daughter. The special train consisted of two private cars, a parlor car, a club room and a dining car.

The train will stop at Albany at 11:31 A. M. Ulster at 1:18 P. M., Syracuse at 2:21 P. M., Rochester at 2:45 P. M. and will reach Buffalo at 5:15 P. M. From Buffalo the party will motor to Black Rock and then to Niagara Falls, arriving at 6:25 P. M. They will stay over night and leave for Toronto tomorrow afternoon.

The Prime Minister and his party will make a brief stop at Niagara Falls, a community full of sentiment for the departing visitor as it was the scene of his honeymoon many years ago. He will remain in Canada 11 days.

In the company of his daughter, he spent an ideal Sunday in the hills of Connecticut and Westchester, at the country home of Miss Lillian D. Wald, of the Henry Street settlement, near Westport, Conn.

Forrester, father and daughter, were canoeing in a pond near their guest house. They tramped about in country-side in virtual seclusion. The Prime Minister even climbed an apple tree and threw down a few apples to Isabel.

Later they drove to White Plains for tea with Felix Warburg, the banker. Returning to this city in the evening they dined at the Henry Street Settlement, where 23 years ago the Prime Minister was the guest of Miss Wald for the first time.

**STEAMER FLOATED**

**THRASHER PUTS HAT IN RING FOR COMMISSION JOB**

Pioneer Resident Will Seek Place To Be Vaccinated By S. O. Chase

W. L. Thrasher, pioneer resident and prominent business man, announced his candidacy for the commission of the American Legion. The convention of the American Legion, to be held in connection with the 1930 national convention of the American Federation of Labor, is to be held Nov. 5.

Mr. Thrasher will seek the place, which will be left vacant by the expiration of Commissioner S. O. Chase's term.

In his first official address as new national commander of the American Legion, O. L. Hodges, of Atlanta, Ga., said:

"The construction of cities and

destroys the power of any nation on earth because we believe that such destruction will bring parity, and that only in parity is there safety and guarantee of continued peace."

"For the first time in history, the two leaders of our English-speaking peoples, the Prime Minister of Great Britain and the President of the United States, have met in mutual effort to set aside for all time a vexatious problem—the problem of naval protection."

"A real competition

to the end that war may be out-

solved in fact as well as in name."

"I have lived in Sanford for many years and everyone knows how I feel about a public trust. If the people feel that I have the qualifications for the place, I pledge myself to an administration of looking after the affairs to the best of my ability."

"I have filled public offices before and my record is known to everyone. Upon that basis I offer myself as a candidate for nomination as commissioner in the coming primary election."

Mr. Thrasher has resided in Sanford for 21 years. He served two terms as a member of the city council under the older democratic form of government and was mayor of Sanford for one term.

"I can only say that I truly regret to leave," said Mr. Macdonald before the train pulled out. "I will issue my farewell statement when I leave America tomorrow."

When Seminole County was a part of Orange County, Mr. Thrasher was a member of the school board and served as its chairman. When Seminole County was organized under a legislative act he was appointed the first superintendent of public instruction, a place he filled for four years.

Negro Is Murdered In Early Morning Stickup On Sunday

"My God! If these things continue in the Capitol! If there is no peace in the capital, if there is no freedom and no law keeps rampant, it won't be safe to live here. The President owes it to the nation to have a house cleaning in this city."
