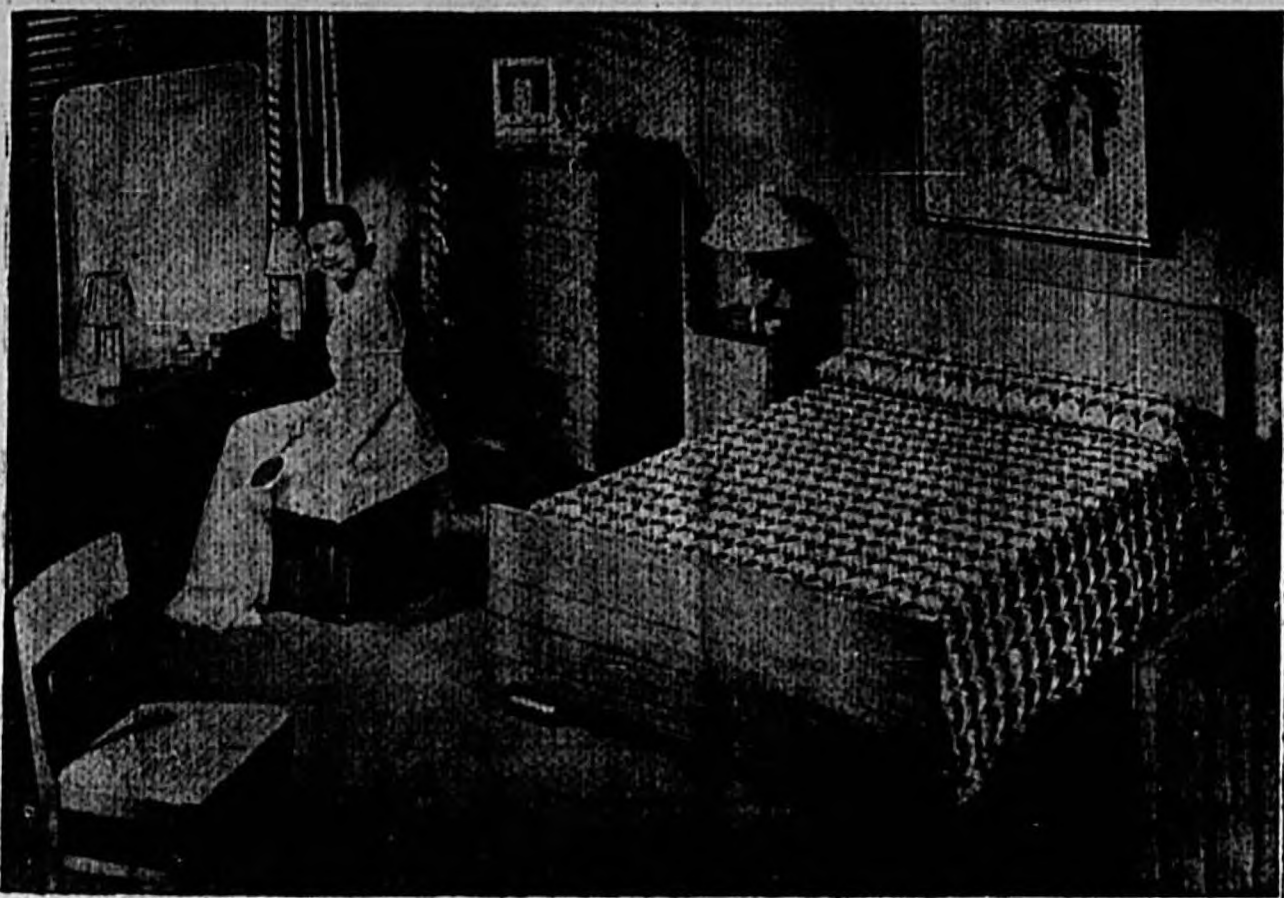

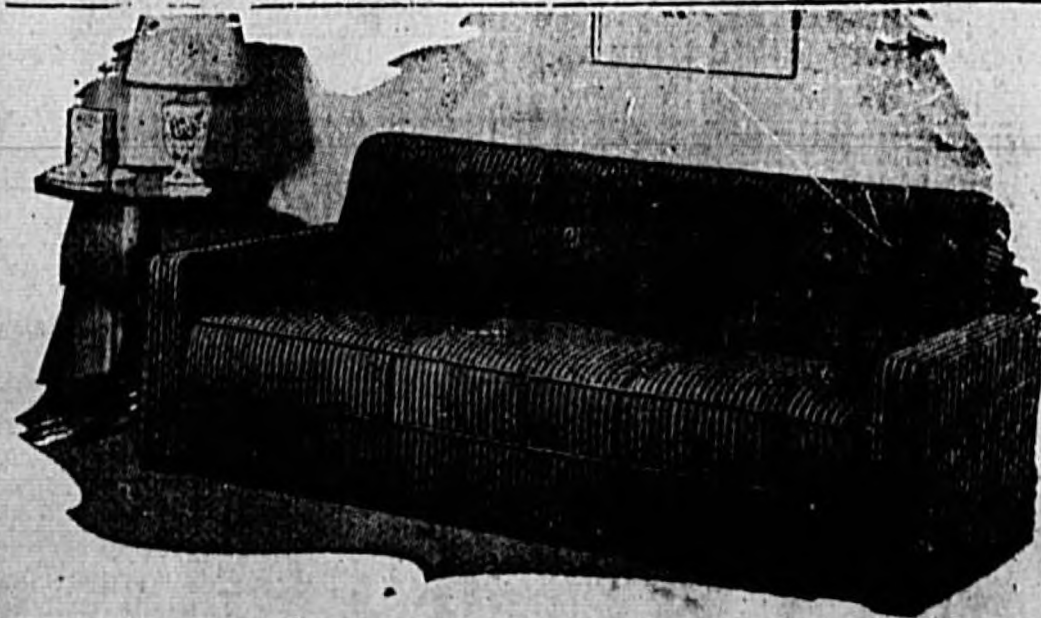

## Japs Handed Two Setbacks In 24 Hours

### Four Power Control And Stripping Of Emperor's Power Hit Hard In Japan

(By Associated Press)  
The people of Japan are swallowing hard today. They've been handed two stiff doses of medicine within a single 24-hour period. Yesterday they learned of the forthcoming changes in occupation machinery for their conquered land—changes dictated by the Big Three in Moscow. Today they are contemplating a proposed change in their constitution which would completely strip their Emperor of all political powers, leaving him simply as a figurehead.

For the Japanese, the second dose, that concerning the Emperor, doubtless is of greater personal interest than the big three decision on occupation policy. After all, the might reason, the occupation will end some day. While it is upon them, there's nothing they can do about it. Whether they serve a single master in Tokyo or a four-power control council and the 11-power far eastern commission probably will not make such a great deal of difference.

But the Emperor and his position in the state—that's something else again. The whole orientation of Japanese life has been determined during recent history by what is called the Tenno System. That is, the whole body of doctrine upholding the divine rule of the Emperor. It is quite true that the Emperor's divinity is a comparatively recent one in Japan. And it also is true that it was foisted on the people by ruthless militarists intent on winning complete power in order to carry out their own plans. Thousands of educated Japanese, thousands of scholars, know this and will be disappointed to see the Emperor's divinity die hard.

## Economists Oppose Present Price Support Program

CHICAGO, Dec. 28, (AP)—Three hundred of the nation's agricultural economists are opposed to the government's present price support program. This disclosure was made today by the American Farm Economic Council, following a poll in which various alternatives were suggested.

More than three quarters of the economists favored a plan to have the Government either announce support prices in advance, or else some new method to buttress farm income during depression without attention to individual commodities.

## OPA Plans To Cut Furniture Prices

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28, (AP)—The OPA has put into effect a program to cut some current furniture prices substantially by Spring. The agency said dealers will have to absorb up to 12 per cent of the price increases granted manufacturers.

AURICH, Germany, Dec. 28, (AP)—A Canadian military court today sentenced German Major General Kurt Meyer to be shot for war crimes. Meyer was a former SS regimental and divisional commander. He was found guilty on three of five charges in connection with the deaths of 48 Canadian prisoners of war.

## Curfew Placed On Residents Of Jerusalem

### British Enforce Restrictions After Nine Killed By Bombings, Gunfire

JERUSALEM, Dec. 28, (AP)—A curfew has been clamped on Muslims and Jewish residential quarters in Jerusalem while investigations of bombings and gunfire are being carried on. At least nine persons have been killed, and many have been injured. British troops are enforcing the restrictions, which are keeping thousands of people in their homes. Only military forces and government officials are exempt from the curfew.

Early in the day truckloads of civilians were seen rumbling up to quieted streets for queuing. Buses, taxis, radio cars and military vehicles are patrolling the streets. In Tel Aviv, where the whole city is under Curfew, similar precautions have been taken. Parachute troops armed with machine guns are standing guard, some of them in concealed rooftop positions.

Witnesses are quoted as having said that, also, young men are being taken to the Jerusalem police building, where they played explosives which turned the place into a shambles. Some of the intruders were carrying pistols. Others were equipped with bomb-filled haversacks.

A Jerusalem communiqué says that a British assistant police superintendent, two British constables and four South African military police were among those killed.

At the same time, terrorists attacked the district police headquarters at Tel Aviv and attempted a raid on the Royal Engineers' armaments depot at the same grounds north of the city. An Arab telephone operator was reported killed in the attack on the district headquarters and a British sergeant was wounded. An assistant superintendent of police was hit by machine bullets while inspecting a telephone near a movie theater several blocks from the scene of the main blast.

## Legislation Urged To Curb Petrillo Power

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28, (AP)—Chairman Clarence Lea of the House Interstate Commerce Commission has urged that early Congressional action be taken on legislation designed to curb the powers of James C. Petrillo, head of the American Federation of Musicians.

Like his predecessor—General Eisenhower—and other American officials, McNarney took issue with the French refusal to treat Germany as a single economic unit and have blocked all efforts to the other occupation powers to do so.

**Not In The Dictionary**

The learned say language is being made every day, new words sneaking in, old words going out of speech all the time. Every now and then Mr. Average Man catches some of these change-overs in the act of entering or leaving the language. Two brand new words bandied about recently are "compartmentalization" and "lespedeza." They have no bearing on each other.  
 Compartmentalization has been carried on by the atomic bomb-makers. After all the other work these scientists have tossed off the matter of making a new word wasn't much of a job. It was used by them to describe the separated units of research in which experts operated without relation to each other. Often geographically far apart, each group pursued its own segment of the whole experiment. This compartmentalization was necessary for military secrecy, but it slowed fusion of the whole undertaking and delayed use of the bomb as a weapon of war. Possibly without compartmentalization, the bomb might have been available in time to shorten the German war.  
 The other word, lespedeza, is the name of a variety of hay enthusiastically endorsed by many farmers — a good many farmers, apparently, for it is said to cover 40,000 acres of farmland. A teaspoonful of its seeds was sent to this country 25 years ago from Korea by a medical missionary — and the seeds caught on.  
 Two chunky new words are added to American English.

**Fleeting Fame**

"The deceased was the father of Rube Marquard, a noted pitcher of a generation ago, now living in Baltimore." This newspaper obituary illustrates the fleeting character of fame.  
 A generation ago Rube Marquard was front-page news; now he has to be defined for readers, even baseball fans. His spectacular rise from a bad beginning, which caused him to be called "The \$15,000 Lemon" (referring to his purchase price), to a run of 19 straight victories which has never been equalled in the ensuing 33 years, won him more attention than some pitchers who might have been more skilled. Yet Marquard was a good one, as New York and Brooklyn fans will testify.  
 Athletes' fame is perhaps more lasting than the memory of most successful performers in other lines — actors for instance. Any collector of old stage programs must recognize the blank look that comes over his friends' faces when he displays a program honored by some one-time star. There was a realistic episode in the movie life of George M. Cohan, successful actor, stage manager and author of "Over There." In his old age he had occasion to give his name to several supposedly well informed young people. They had never heard of him.

**Advertising Still Pays**

In 1929 when America had a national income of \$2 billions, two and one-half billions were spent in advertising. In 1944 when the national income was 161 billions, only two and one-quarter billions were spent in advertising — because, of course, industry was concentrating on war products rather than consumer needs. It is expected by statisticians that the post-war national income will reach 200 billions, and advertising experts are advocating that six billions be spent in advertising appropriations.  
 In the face of the fact that for some time there will be fewer automobiles, washing machines, radios and houses available than are wanted, it might seem foolish to advertise goods when supplies are shorter than demand. But one sales manager, urging the importance of maintaining wide advertising budgets, ended his plea by saying: "I realize that customers for years will be standing in line to buy goods, but I want to be sure they'll be in OUR line."

**Travel Habits**

The Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad Company is inviting bids for 1,000 new sleeping cars, and other companies are lining up for similar expansion. The cost of this string of cars is a little item of about \$70,000,000. And taking the railroads in general, it is presumably only a starter.  
 Evidently American transportation and travel are very far from taking to the air en masse, as some observers have suggested lately. People will continue traveling in sleeping cars as well as airplanes, and probably more so in spite of the strong appeal made latterly for aviation facilities. Both above and below, there is room and opportunity enough for all.

**PLANT A TREE**  
 Fort Myers News Press

On Jan. 17, 1946, the first statewide Arbor Day ever celebrated in Florida will be marked by the planting of hundreds of thousands of trees by school children, garden clubs and civic groups. The 1945 legislature set aside the third Friday in January each year for tree-planting, beautification and reforestation.  
 In Fort Myers the city will take the lead by offering over 3,000 coco palmosa palms for sale at a nominal sum in the hope that many home owners and prospective home builders will take some and beautify their lots. This palm tree, regular applications of fertilizer and a reasonable amount of water are needed to achieve satisfactory growing results.  
 Supt. E. P. Greene will sponsor Arbor Day observation in Lee county schools. He will confer with principals on plans for appropriate ceremonies at the school grounds and there will be programs stressing beautification by planting and reforestation.  
 The state forest and park service gives the Arbor Day program its full support at Tallahassee and it was approved by J. Colin Enslin, superintendent of education, E. A. Stannard, state editor and authority on horticulture, was the originator of the plan which was backed by the tree-planting committee of the Florida Press Association.  
 The first January date was chosen for the annual Florida Arbor Day. A uniform date was needed for the state-wide celebration.

**President Truman Is Nominated The Man Of The Year**

 America's "man of the year" for turbulent 1945, the outstanding newsmaker of the newest year of the century, is President Harry S. Truman.

The former Senator from Missouri has served as President for only nine months. In that time he formally announced the complete defeat of the Reich and the end of the war with Germany. He stepped easily into the "Big Top" and emerged with greater stature from the post V-E day parleys at Potsdam. He announced the harnessing of the atom. He told the news of Japan's willingness to surrender. He made news he sought to halt strikes across the country.

The nation's newspaper editors, voting in a poll conducted by AP Newsfeatures, appraised this record and gave President Truman the title of "man of the year" and an accolade as "outstanding political figure of the year" as well. Editors also were asked to select the "woman of the year" and leading personalities in military and science.

Lise Meitner, Top Woman  
 Top choice as the No. 1 newsmaker among women was Lise Meitner, physicist whose calculations played an important part in the development of the atom bomb. Dr. Meitner worked at the Kaiser Wilhelm Academy of Science in Berlin but was driven from Germany. In Denmark she broke a deadlock in atom bomb experiments by participating in preparation of a formula suggesting that many puzzling questions could be answered by splitting a uranium atom in two approximately equal parts. This formula was of prime help to the scientists who developed the first atomic bomb this year.

Among editor's other choices of the outstanding women were Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt; Esp. Clara Boothe Luce; and Eva Braun, Adolf Hitler's girl friend.

Eisenhower Leads Military  
 Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower was acclaimed the outstanding military personality for the second consecutive year. The architect of the Anglo-American victories in Europe was followed in the voting by Gen. Douglas MacArthur, supreme commander in the Pacific; Gen. George C. Marshall, Army chief of staff; and Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, commander of the Pacific fleet.

Eric A. Johnston, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce and world "good will" traveler for American business who was elected this year as head of the British Picture Producers and Distributors Association of America, was chosen as top man in business. Runner-up were Andrew J. Higgins, who built thousands of invasion boats during the war and then closed up his business when postwar labor strife began; and Sewall Avery, chairman of the board of the Montgomery Ward mail order house.

The 1945 field in science was monopolized by the atom smashers. For the designation as outstanding, a majority of the editors grouped the entire body of scientists who contributed to the first atomic bomb. Of those named individually, however, the most conspicuous was Dr. J. R. Oppenheimer, University of California physicist credited by the War Department with planning the atom's energy to work for war.

Votes for individuals in this classification went to Dr. Meitner; Dr. Vannevar Bush, director of the Office Scientific Research and Development; Dr. Ernest O. Lawrence, and Dr. Robert Serber, who was credited with the discovery of the atom's energy.

Peterson, 6-foot 7-inch center, was the Big Six's number two scorer on Nebraska last year.

Six of last season's reserves are back and the tall-timbered freshman crop is the best in years.

The Iowa State Cyclones, champions for the past two years, and the Oklahoma Sooners threaten to make the going tough.

Iowa State, under Coach Louis Menze, lost all of its starters from last season, but picked up Ronnie Norman, a regular guard in 1943, from the Army and has considerable talent from 1944-45 reserves.

Coach Bruce Drake's Sooners, who won the title in 1944 have nine returning lettermen. Jack Landon, unanimous All-Big Six last season, is their key man.

The Kansas State Wildcats and Nebraska Cornhuskers can be rated as "trouble makers" at best. Jay Payton, All-Big Six guard, is back at State and Coach Fritz Knorr's Wildcats will have to get along with a freshman-dominated team.

Coach Pop Klein says Nebraska will be much like the Cornhusker football outfit—tough late in the season. His squad includes letterman Fred Decox, 6-foot forward.
