It can also be due to a loss of more than an optimal amount of water from various tissues, particularly from the legs. Fatigue, weakness, headache are commonly associated with such problems. The loss of potassium also increases the irritability of the heart muscle. Many patients who have a delicate level of potassium may develop irregular heart beats in its severe form, this can cause dangerous heart irregularities.

'\$5 Million' Aircraft Firm Being Wooed To Seminole By SEEDCO

Negotiations are expected to be concluded by Feb. 1 to relocate a manufacturing facility for amphibious aircraft in the Seminole area which would employ 150 in the first five years of operation.

Horace Orr, president of the Seminole Employment Economic Development Corp. (SEEDCO), said today the aircraft would be fully fabricated and assembled at a Sanford plant for both national and international marketing.

"We have four to six more weeks of work to do before a formal announcement can be made, giving details and the name of the manufacturer," Orr said.

SEEDCO is sponsoring the industry and will be a stockholder in the firm, he said, adding SEEDCO is raising capital in excess of \$500,000 currently for the firm.

"We have an option on one of the buildings at Jungle Laboratories, a facility on Silver Lake Road near Cardinal Industries," he said.

Iran: Closings, Shortages As Collapse Nears

TEHRAN (UPI) — Troops fired today to crush an estimated 1,000 protesters staging a hunger strike in the riot-ridden southern town of Ahwaz, and four persons were reported killed.

Witnesses reported four persons were killed today in Tehran, including a middle-aged man whose head was blown off by a bullet from an automatic rifle fired by protesting troops.

The soldiers fought off yet another attempt by screaming youths to crowd around the U.S. Embassy, whose parking lot was filled with an angry mob.

In Ahwaz, witnesses said four persons were killed and seven wounded in the shooting, all outside the hospital.

The diplomats said under 1,000 oil exports and dependents could leave Iran shortly under an existing plan approved by the Oil Services Company of Iran.

Ethics: It's Public Business

Sen. Adlai Stevenson has come away from his two-year stint as chairman of the Senate Ethics Committee with some thoughtful observations on the limitations inherent in any effort by Congress to police the conduct of its own members.

Stevenson admits to serious doubts about the effectiveness of self-policing. Such doubts are not without foundation.

To be sure, public opinion and the climate of post-Watergate morality have stirred in Congress a heightened awareness of the need to enforce some ethical standards.

Capitol Hill is not blind to public opinion polls that reveal the staggering lack of confidence in Congress as an institution.

But somehow, this sensitivity doesn't seem to translate into vigorous action against the minority in Congress whose conduct is an affront to even minimal ethical guidelines.

The three sitting House members judged by that body's Ethics Committee to be guilty of official misconduct in the Koreagate scandal escaped with mere reprimands, the mildest form of congressional discipline.

The House Democratic caucus even refused to consider stripping two of the three of their leadership positions.

Indeed, Congress' perfunctory performance in investigating the shameful Koreagate affair is a major reason for the candidly expressed doubts of people like Sen. Stevenson.

The Illinois Democrat came close to identifying the root problem in self-policing when he offered this description of the pressures that confront those appointed to judge their colleagues:

"It is very delicate. Make one mistake and you wipe out a career. Make another mistake and you injure the Senate."

Considering the club-like atmosphere, the elderly network that permeates most legislative bodies including the Congress, the temptation for those who must judge friends and associates is to err on the side of forgiveness. It is human nature.

Stevenson favors a continued role for ethics committees even while he recognizes that their performance will be uneven at best.

But he would vest real responsibility for investigating corruption in the office of a special prosecutor shielded from all political pressures, whether from Congress or the White House.

It's an intriguing suggestion and not one to be dismissed lightly.

With or without a special prosecutor or ethics committees, Stevenson places great faith in the salutary effects of strong campaign contribution disclosure laws.

We agree. The enactment of this legislation constitutes the most significant political reform of recent years.

And it is no less significant on the state level — especially right here in Florida.

That's why, while empathizing with Sen. Stevenson, we also support Attorney General Robert Shelin's appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court to dismiss a lawsuit brought by six state senators seeking to throw out our state's Sunshine Amendment.

The amendment, approved overwhelmingly by the voters, requires reporting of net worth and assets.

In the end, of course, the public is the final arbiter of ethics — on the national and state levels — it's called the ballot box.

Seventy-eight is running late... So get in line for '78. As I glance back at this year, I wonder where it went.

It just seems like yesterday that I was in the same mess I'm in today. The usual holiday dinner still addition. Some of my resolutions from last year didn't materialize this year — so to a person over really prepared?

About this New Year's resolution. Last year this time I wrote down a list of resolutions I hoped to accomplish this year. I did make a rather large dent in the list in January — but that's it.

Resolutions experts point out that we should forget making the same old resolutions over and over every year. They weren't successful in previous years — so forget them and establish a new list.

I don't do that much cooking. Fixing for two is for the birds. Oh, I whip up a fancy dish sometimes, but if I need help I count one of the 70 or so cookbooks in my kitchen library.

Why do I keep buying cookbooks? I suppose one might look at me and wonder if I ever had a spare minute. I can take time for it alone. A few bites or gulps and I'm well-fed for several hours.

So why bother with cooking? I have become an expert at rigging the superautomatic toaster with assorted packages of frozen pre-cooked foods.

When chow down arrives, I stand with the toaster door open, select what my mood demands and dip the poaches in boiling water, until I discovered that I can slip them into the microwave for about five minutes — not in a hurry — and discard the cooking containers.

Who, then, needs recipe lists and a library of cookbooks? I resolve to find the answer in 1979.

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ANGLE-WALTERS Sun Belt Chill?

WASHINGTON — Promoters of the booming western area of the Sun Belt have been heralded as the saviors of the Sun Belt in recent years as they watched the big cities of Northeast and Midwest experience sharp population declines.

Newly released figures from the South, Southeast and West show that the Sun Belt's 140-million population is still growing, but at a slower rate than in previous years.

That surprising development is documented in a recently issued Census Bureau report on urban population trends between 1970 and mid-1978.

Nowhere is the pattern more evident than in California, the state that long has been a mecca for refugees from the "Frost Belt."

If the Sun Belt has a symbolic capital, it surely is Los Angeles. Yet the newly released government report shows a slight population decline (0.3 percent) in Los Angeles County.

In San Francisco, the drop is a far more substantial 7.1 percent. Even if that city's still-growing suburban counties are included, the growth rate for the entire Bay Area is a lopsided 1.8 percent.

The only two counties in the entire state of California with a declining population are Los Angeles and San Francisco. If that's a surprise, take a look at the list of the fastest growing counties in the Golden State.

At the top of that list are Mono (up 22.9 percent) and Alpine (up 21.9 percent) Counties both located in a sparsely settled region of the state between Yosemite National Park and the Nevada border.

With only one exception, every county in the state with a population increase of 20 percent or more is in the New Orleans metropolitan area.

In the New Orleans metropolitan area, Orleans Parish — the city — has lost 5.4 percent of its population, while outlying Jefferson, St. Bernard and St. Tammany Parishes are growing at a healthy rate.

In the Memphis metropolitan area, Shelby County, Tenn., which includes the city, has experienced only a nominal population increase of 1.1 percent. But to the south, in DeKalb County, Ga., the growth rate is a phenomenal 48.8 percent.

The pattern is repeated in Houston; Dallas; Fort Worth, Texas; Albuquerque, N.M.; and Oklahoma City. In all metropolitan areas, growth has slowed markedly in the county in which the city itself is located.

VIEWPOINT Plucky Little Romania

Three Westerners cheer for Romania. That plucky little East European nation has not only held the Soviet big brother where to get out of the Balkans in 1988 and Czechoslovakia in 1989, it seems to be getting away with it.

The Soviets so far just do nothing more menacing than glare in response to the outrageous Romanian performance at a November meeting of the Warsaw Pact. Alone among East European powers to the Soviet east, President Nicolae Ceausescu refused to go along with demands for increased spending on arms and military integration under Soviet auspices.

Were he to vent home and tell everybody about it.

"We are an independent Romania and we will always remain an independent Romania," he declared in a television address to the nation. "I signed no piece of paper committing Romania or its armed forces to any course of action that is not approved by the nation as a whole."

It was a great performance — David vs. Goliath never falls — and the appreciative audience was not merely local. Washington decided to dispatch Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal on an official visit. One on the Blumenthal heels came French Foreign Minister Jean François-Poncet, making the point that Romania has very good connections outside the Communist camp.

It stacks up as the most dramatic display yet of the independent foreign policy Romania has been pursuing for some years now. It is the only Soviet-bloc country that did not break with Israel during the 1973-74 Arab-Israeli war, but made Israeli trade or a communication channel between Israel and Arab. It has remained on good terms with Peking, to Moscow's displeasure, and has cultivated ties with the West. Alone among the Soviet bloc, it has never permitted Soviet troops on its soil.

Impressive so far as it goes, but there is another aspect of the Romanian spirit of independence — it stops at the border. It is for internal use only, not suitable for international consumption. Romania remains one of the most rigidly authoritarian Communist regimes of all. There has been no loosening of controls, no experimentation with a free economy as in Hungary or Czechoslovakia, elsewhere in East Europe. Romania may seek Western connections, but Westerners are not welcome in Romania and are closely watched.

There is nothing about the way the Romanian Communist kept their own house in order that the Kremlin could feel that it is in that that the maverick Romanians differ decisively from their Hungarian and Czech predecessors.

The Soviets, taking into consideration such obvious facts as the Romanian-Czech coalition as the damage to détente with the United States and loss of face in the Third World, logically may conclude they are better off settling for the substance of an ally's ideological fanaticism rather than dealing with a show of independence in foreign policy.

Here Are Errors In All 'Facts'

DEAR DR. LAMB— I read your column about the intelligent lady who uses lecithin. I think you owe her an apology for telling her that lecithin doesn't contain iodine and B vitamins. There are lecithin products that are sold that prove you are wrong. I'm sending along some ads for them.
DEAR READER— Well, your first misstatement is that the person who wrote was an intelligent lady—that was no lady, that was a man. From there the rest of your remarks are all down-hill but they emphasize a fundamental error in judgment in how people interpret labels on health food products.
You can buy preparations that contain lecithin plus vitamins and even minerals. You can also buy milk that contains chocolate, called chocolate milk, but that doesn't mean even give chocolate milk. You can buy whole grain flour and it contains a lot of starch. Starch is made from combining glucose molecules. The whole grain flour also contains important vitamins and iron for bulk—but that doesn't mean pure starch made from glucose contains either important vitamins or iron. That is why refined flour has vitamins added to it to enrich it.
If one followed your logic that because a soybean product contains lecithin and other substances that means lecithin contains vitamin B and iron, one would also assume that starch contains vitamins, bulk and minerals. Obviously, you are off on the wrong foot.
Let me give you another simple example. Pure sodium chloride salt contains only sodium and chloride. That's all. It contains no iodine. In fact, since you are from Kansas, you might be interested to know that it was once a gopher bait because salt from that area was deficient in iodine.
Now iodine is added to

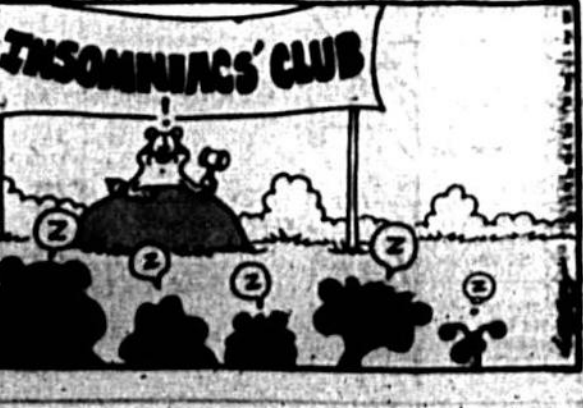

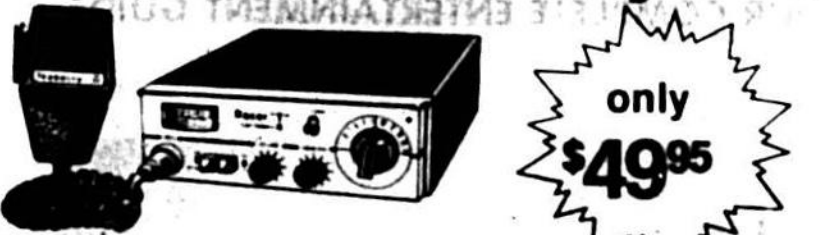

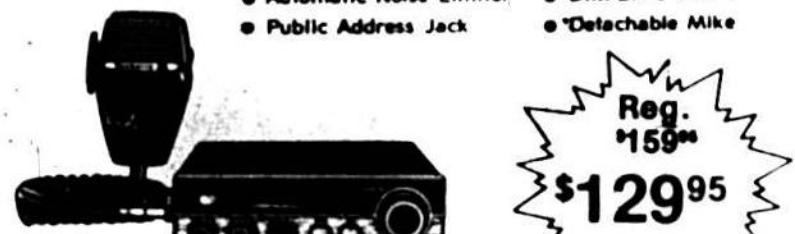

R.S.V.P. is a group of initials usually seen at the bottom of an invitation. But another R.S.V.P. is being seen and its influence felt all over Seminole County.

The Retired Senior Volunteer Program is a national organization and part of ACTION made up of more than 300 local people who are at least 60 years of age doing very important volunteer work for their community.

When Is A Turk Really Not A Turk?

HOLLYWOOD (NEA) — Down the years, Hollywood has given us dozens of people we have loved to hate. The roster of Hollywood's heavies—Peter Lorre, Sydney Greenstreet and

their colleagues — is long and impressive and lovable. Maybe we have a new one, because Paul Lawrence Smith seems to be cut from the classic mold. He has a unique form and a unique face and he can act and — you just love hating his guts. In fact, the public seems to love hating him so much that they have shown signs of wanting to do it personally. Smith is the number one villain in "Midnight Express," the huge mountain of a man who plays the head Turkish jailer, a professional sadist.

"I think I may have played the part too well," Smith says. For one thing, he spoke only Turkish in the film. He learned each line phonetically, of course, because he is an American, born and bred in Boston.

But he did it so smoothly and so convincingly that Hollywood's producers think the film company hired a Turk to play that part.

He is having to go around telling everyone that he did it, not some Turkish actor. And, for another thing, the people who see the film come away with such a hatred of him for what he does to Brad Davis (the actor who plays the hero, Billy Hayes) that they stop him on the street and want to get physical about it.

"Recently," Smith says, "I had to talk my way out of a street brawl with a half-dozen toughs who took it personally what I did to the Billy Hayes character."

He did talk his way out of the fight — which was probably a good thing for those toughs. Paul Lawrence Smith is not the ordinary actor, physically. First, his dimensions are impressive—he's 6 feet 4 and 300 pounds.

But even more than sheer bulk, Smith is a powerful man and a trained one. He has a black belt in karate. He was a Little All-America as a defensive (and he also played offensive) tackle. And he is one of the strongest men around.

His life has been eventful enough to provide subject matter for a few movies. From Boston, he comes from a family of doctors and dentists — a grandfather was chief physician to the czar.

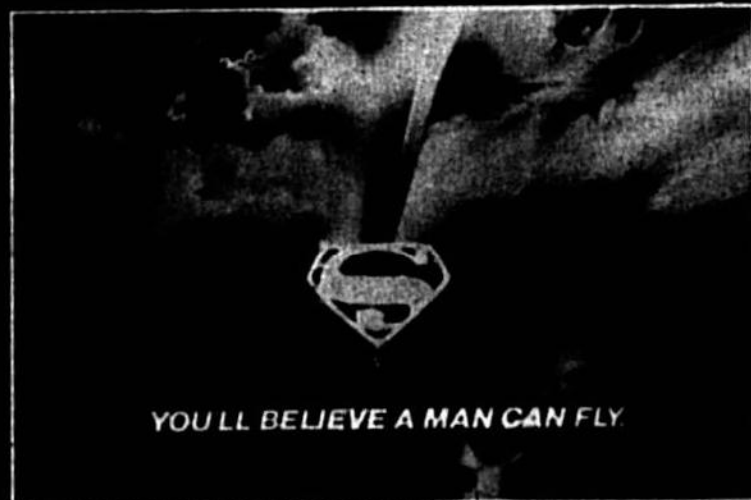
He went to Brandeis where, in addition to football honors, he majored in philosophy and psychology. He went on to Harvard, where he got a master's degree in motivational psychology.

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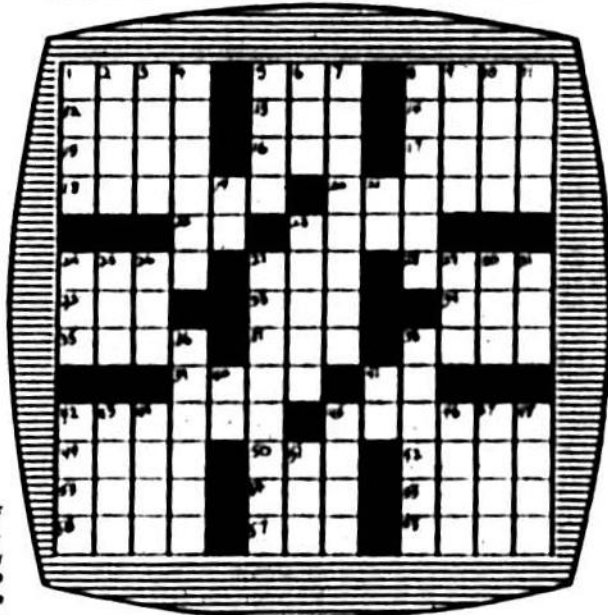

The 'Hillbillies' In Blackface - Boo!

"Diff'rent Strokes" is the only new show that NBC held onto in its recent Operation Clean Sweep.

I'm hard pressed to figure out why.

It's a half-hour comedy dimly devoid of believability, character development and comedy. Perhaps its only redeeming social value is that it's a show both blacks and whites can hate.

Drummond (Conrad Bain) is a blue blood with nothing but time and money on his hands.

Out of the Ozzie Nelson-Fred MacMurray mold of sitcom fathers, he has no evident job or responsibilities, other than to putter around the house in a cosy cardigan sweater, searching for a chicken drumstick and acting cheerfully befuddled at the zany tomfoolery of the younger generation.

The twist here is that Drummond's kids are a pair of black ghetto youngsters; they were his maid's children and he has adopted them.

The idea is to watch them

wander about in Drummond's splendid town house, innocent of the ways of the white aristocracy. Drummond, in turn, is supposed to gain some street smarts.

Yes, you're right — it is "The Beverly Hillbillies" in blackface. Instead of the Clampetts we have Arnold (Gary Coleman), the resident half-pint cutie, who sounds like he's been doing a lounge act in Vegas for the past 25 years.

Older brother Willis (Todd Bridges) must swallow any personality he might have to serve as Arnold's straight man. He has no other reason for existing. Nor does Drummond. The dialogue is straight set-up and punchline. Arnold steps constantly out of character to deliver the blows. "Why are you reading a 'Superman' comic?" asks Drummond.

"Because I'm too young to appreciate 'Wonderwoman,'" responds Arnold, who is also too young to make that remark.

"Am I interrupting something, boys?" asks Drummond when he comes in on Arnold and Willis locked in heated debate. "No," snaps Arnold. "We're just sitting here resisting temptation."

For stories "Diff'rent

Strokes" leans to fresh fare like Arnold hiding under the kitchen sink to avoid a spanking.

Everyone thinks he's run away. Panic ensues. The police are called.

They did that one on "Father Knows Best" in 1957, except Bud hid in the cellar because he had just experienced a growth spurt and was too big to fit under the sink.

One of the episodes I saw actually sought to score a serious point. Drummond tries to get the boys into his old prep school only to discover that the entrance exams are discriminatory.

However, he reaches this insight while dressed in his old prep school uniform, complete with beanie cap. Anything for a bad gag — it's the sort of lack of creative discipline that sank Jerry Lewis' last 10 movies.

For subsidiary characters, "Diff'rent Strokes" features a cook with a fondness for sherry and Drummond's Typical Teenage Daughter, Kimberly, who bears as much resemblance to your basic teenager as Arnold does to Mamie Eisenhower.

I would shrug this show off if it weren't the only one the network considered "hot" enough to keep on the air. If "Diff'rent Strokes" is any indication of the programming to come in January and February — and we have no alternative but to take it that way — then we're all in for a long, cold winter.

New Year's Day: It'll Bowl You Over

For many, New Year's Day means sleeping late and recovering from all night parties.

But for football lovers, Jan. 1 means an all-day session in front of the TV, watching topnotch college football teams battle in the bowl games.

CBS kicks off the morning and the New Year with two parades: "The Cotton Bowl Festival Parade" from Dallas, and the "CBS Tournament of Roses Parade" from Pasadena, Calif.

Bands, elaborate floats and lovely young ladies help build suspense for the ensuing games.

After the streets are cleared, the Dallas Cotton Bowl will fill up for the Cotton Bowl classic between Notre Dame and the Houston Cougars, also on CBS-TV.

ABC carries the ball in the early afternoon with the 65th Annual Sugar Bowl telecast live from the New Orleans Superdome. Top ranked Penn State, the only undefeated major college team, takes on No. 2-ranked Alabama.

The outcome will decide the national championship.

The Penn State Lions became No. 1 for the first time in history on Tuesday, Nov. 13, following Oklahoma's loss to Nebraska.

Penn State Coach Joe Paterno says, "We have obvious respect for Alabama. It is a team which has great balance between the running and passing game, and we recognize that Coach Bryant's team will be a very tough one for us to lick."

ABC Sportscaster Keith Jackson will be handling the play-by-play Sugar Bowl game. Former Arkansas head coach Frank Broyles will be the expert color commentator, and ABC Sportscaster Jim Lampley will provide reports from both the Alabama and Penn State sidelines.

College football's oldest and most storied post-season bowl classic, the Rose Bowl, will be telecast exclusively by NBC Sports in the late afternoon.

University of Michigan quarterback Rick Leach and USC tailback Charles White lead their teams into action in the 65th renewal of the Rose Bowl. Curt Gowdy and John Brodie will commentate.

For senior quarterback Leach, the most prolific

scorer in collegiate football history, the 1979 Rose Bowl marks his third and final shot at victory in the Pasadena Classic.

A starter at QB since his freshman year, Leach has completed 240 passes for 4,147 yards and 34 TDs.

Junior Charles White has rewritten the USC rushing record book, having surpassed such former Trojan running greats as Mike Garrett, O.J. Simpson, Anthony Davis and Ricky Bell in career yardage

totals.

Heading into the Rose Bowl, White's season rushing totals for the 10-1 Torjans stood at 1,894 with his career total at 3,940.

NBC will wrap up the day's pigskin festivities with the 1979 Orange Bowl game. Big Eight rivals Nebraska and Oklahoma will clash in the Miami game.

For the Oklahoma Sooners, the only blemish on an otherwise perfect season (10-1) was their Nov. 12 clash with the Nebraska Corn-

huskers in cold and windy Lincoln, Neb.

Fulfilling quarterback Thomas Loti's prophecy that the only way they (Oklahoma) could lose was if they beat themselves, the Sooners lost six fumbles including the final crushing miscalculation only three yards from the Nebraska goal with 3:27 left in the game.

They were left to look on hopelessly as the Huskers ran out the clock for a 17-14 win and a share of the Big Eight championship.

Woody Hayes Fired As Coach After Punching Incident

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — Woody Hayes has been fired after 28 years as head football coach at Ohio State University. OSU Athletic Director Hugh Hindman said, "Coach Hayes has been relieved of his duties as head football coach at Ohio State University. This decision has the full support of the president of the university."

He said he was leaving Jacksonville shortly to return to Columbus, Ohio, and would have absolutely no further comment on the firing.

The action was seen as the result of Hayes' behavior in Friday night's nationally televised Gator Bowl game when he apparently struck Clemson noseguard Charlie Bauman in the face.

Bauman thwarted a Buckeye drive with an interception with less than two minutes remaining, saving Clemson's 17-15 victory. Several Clemson players, including Bauman, when questioned about the incident afterward, told reporters Hayes punched Bauman in the face after the player was tackled out of bounds in front of the Ohio State bench. Bauman reportedly taunted the 61-year-old coach by waving the ball in his face.

Hayes, in his 28th season at Ohio State and his third as a college head coach, is well known for his fiery temper. Pictures of him flinging down his glasses or baseball cap in anger are famous. But up to the Gator Bowl, the Hayes temper has been directed against photographers and other newsmen.

He was reprimanded by the NCAA last year for hitting a network television cameraman who turned a camera on him as the coach angrily threw his earphones to the ground. The crucial moment came as the Buckeyes fumbled away the ball while in

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position to score in the 1977 loss to Michigan. That loss cost the Buckeyes the Big Ten championship and a trip to the Rose Bowl.

Famous for his effective if dull 3-yards-and-run-again offense and a talent for recruiting, Hayes had only two losing seasons in his 28 years at Ohio State.

In 1959 his team went 3-4-1 and in 1968 it was 4-8. The 1978 Buckeyes, the most lackluster of recent years, were 7-3-1. During the Hayes era, the Buckeyes had a 188-87-9 record, including four unbeaten teams, seven Big Ten championships and six co-championships.

His coaching victories rank him second only to Alabama's Paul "Bear" Bryant among active coaches and fourth in the history of college football behind Glenn "Pop" Warner, Amos Alonzo Stagg and Bryant.

Hayes' 1977 swing at an ABC-TV cameraman drew him a one-year probation from Big Ten Commissioner Wayne Dube, but it was neither the start nor the end of his public tantrums.

Tot Dies In Fire

SMH Boss On Cost Guidelines: No Way

Seminole Memorial Hospital Administrator Charles Bentley contends proposed federal guidelines to control hospital expenses are based on a fallacy.

Joseph Califano, secretary of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW), plans to send Congress a cost containment bill that would limit the rising cost of medical care. The Califano proposal calls for voluntary guidelines in 1979 to hold the increase in hospital expenditures below 9.7 percent. If the guidelines are not met, Califano said, mandatory controls should be instituted. The cost controls were mentioned because most hospital

charges are based on reimbursement.

"The fallacy has always been that hospitals are supposed to control costs when those costs to us are not controlled," said Bentley.

He explained that the Califano proposal does not put restraints on the cost of medical supplies. Those costs are continually on the rise, according to Bentley.

"I don't think it is fair to single out the hospital industry. We don't control most of our costs, because most of our expense comes from buying medical supplies," said Bentley.

Another factor to be considered is the increase in population, according to Ken McGee, economist for the

Florida Hospital Association.

"That is going to be tough to meet," McGee said of Califano's proposed guidelines.

He's talking about limiting total expenses and you have to recognize that in Florida and Seminole County we have a great population increase. That means we will have to treat more people. To try and treat more people and keep in-

creased expenses below 9.7 percent is going to be tough."

Florida hospitals reduced expense increases from a 15 percent increase in 1977 to a 12 percent increase in 1978, according to McGee.

Seminole Memorial Hospital's expenses rose 14 percent in fiscal 1977-78, according to Bentley.

The Police Beat

Brian Schultz Tragedy Made Biggest Mark In 1978

No other story involving police and courts directly affected as many Seminole County residents in 1978 as the disappearance of six-year-old Brian Schultz.

Hundreds of volunteers spent two days searching the area surrounding the youth's home in Lake Kathryn Estates near Casselberry. For three days it was believed the youth had run away from home and at one point in the search two youths reported

speaking with the youngster. The massive search included helicopters, K-9 units, deputies on horseback and divers searching area lakes.

Three days after he was reported missing, two movers discovered the child's body in a refrigerator in a mobile home not far from where the youth lived.

Sheriff John Pelt announced the following day that Brian had been playing in the trailer with two younger friends the night before he was reported missing.

Brian climbed into the refrigerator and one

of the youths closed the door. Pelt revealed. When the youths couldn't get the refrigerator door open they left the trailer without notifying anyone that Brian had been left inside.

Possibly the most controversial story of the year was the manslaughter trial of Albert Dallabrida Sr. of Sanford.

Dallabrida's wife and three of his children died after the van he was driving collided with a truck on U.S. 17-68 in Sanford. He was charged with manslaughter by driving while intoxicated.

Following a three-day trial at the Seminole County Courthouse, Dallabrida was acquitted by a jury of all charges.

The year began with a major story that has occupied law enforcement authorities throughout the year and will continue to do so next year.

On Dec. 29, 1977, reserve deputy George Piel, 44, walked into the Longwood Village Pharmacy. Unknown to him, two robbers were in the store holding 11 persons including several children at gunpoint.

Shots were exchanged and Piel was killed.

In January 1979, the man accused of firing the shots that killed Piel, Terry M. Sims, 36, will go on trial in the Seminole County Courthouse for the murder.

Two men involved in the robbery pleaded guilty to an assortment of lesser charges in 1978 in exchange for testimony at the Sims trial.

The only man still at large in the Piel murder is the alleged gang leader of 20 to 30 men who specializes in robbing and burglarizing drug stores: Clarence Eugene See THE POLICE BEAT, Page 2A

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
