Housewife's Worth Fixed At \$8,300

CHRISTOPHER MINICLER, NEW YORK (AP) — What is a wife worth?

She is priceless," many a happily married man might respond.

A survey released Tuesday attempts to be a bit more exact. If your wife is an average housewife she is worth \$8,300 a year, based on a wage survey of 12 occupational roles she fulfills.

An awesome thing for her to keep in mind when she asks for a new fur coat.

However, if her husband is an ambassador she is worth more because she works longer hours or fulfills more roles, but because the extra job she does assume pays more.

These conclusions are drawn in an article appearing in the first edition of *Envy*, a new monthly magazine published in New York for the diplomatic and consular community.

Envy related the role of Metropolitan Life Insurance Co. economist, the Chase Manhattan Bank, and the Restaurant & Hotelmen's Agency to compile a table of hours worked in different tasks and wages which would be paid for these tasks.

The average American housewife served 44.5 hours a week as a nursemaid, 22.1 hours a week as a cook, 17.5 hours as a housekeeper and lesser periods as a dietitian, food buyer, dishwasher, laundress, seamstress, practical nurse, maintenance man, gardener and chauffeur. The study said.

Her highest salaried roles are dietitian, seamstress and cook at \$2.10 an hour. Even in the worst of times she works only 1.6 hours a week at these tasks. Her major role is nursemaid, 44.5 hours out of a 99-hour work week, pays only \$1.25 an hour.

The survey concluded that a housewife does not serve as a compensable housewife.

Turning to the ambassador's wife, the survey deleted the rules of dishwasher, laundress, seamstress, maintenance man, gardener and chauffeur — on the theory the ambassador's wife would have domestic help. It was assumed she would do a substantial amount of entertaining — rated at 12 hours a week at \$3.57 an hour for a hostess.

The survey concluded that the ambassador's wife worked only 92.2 hours a week, but earned \$6,700 a year, thanks largely to her hostess role.

The least-valued woman in the survey was the diplomatic attaché's wife. Assigned a hostess salary of only \$2.15 an hour and deprived of the payrolls of dishwasher, laundress and seamstress, she would earn only \$8,000 a year for 94.5 hours a week.

The survey noted that education, common sense, and discretion were among the less financially measurable, but vital attributes of any wife.

Fire Ban Crackdown Opens Here

Law enforcement officers of Seminole County and fire department officials began strict enforcement of the fire ban today. Claude Kirk's proclamation prohibiting open burning of all kinds... According to the proclamation "it is unlawful for any person to set fire to any forest, grass, woods, wild land or marshes, or to build a campfire or bonfire or to burn trash or other material that may cause a forest, grass or woods fire." Penalty for conviction of setting such fires is \$200 fine, 90 days in jail or both.

Longwood Mom Gets 20 Years In Tot's Death

A Longwood mother was sentenced to 20 years in prison in the death of her seven-year-old son. The woman, Latonia Hupp, 22, of R. I. Longwood, had been accused of beating her son Aaron in November of last year. An autopsy revealed the young boy died of a fractured skull. The tiny body also showed bruises and abrasions. At the time of the incident Miss Hupp denied the charge. On Nov. 28, she brought the baby to Seminole Memorial Hospital. He died on arrival. Hospital authorities became suspicious because of the battered condition of the body and notified law enforcement officers. She was then arrested.

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'Head Start' Involvement Is Stressed

Jim McKay, executive director of Orange County Economic Opportunity, stressed the importance of "citizens of the community becoming involved in a Headstart program to insure its success" in a speech given before the membership of Seminole Community Action Thursday evening. The local Headstart program is expected to be funded by federal monies. Two hundred children will be included in Seminole's program. McKay reported Orange County's Headstart program had begun with 10 centers serving 600 children with 10 per cent local volunteer contributions and 90 per cent federal assistance to the point it now enjoys of serving 1,600 children with 40 per cent local contributions and 60 per cent federal monies. "The goal is to eliminate the necessity for federal funds," McKay said. "Community Action is becoming involved. We have gotten children who never had a chair to sit in, who had a vocabulary of only 15 words and they have been helped tremendously with this program. Teachers have gone so far as to bathe the children while others made new clothes for them. Seventy per cent of the children we serve have never seen a doctor, never had an examination, never had a shot. When Headstart children go into first grade they will now be on a par with the other children," McKay declared. During the business meeting, Glenn Humes of Altamonte Springs, who had organized the recently completed tutorial assistance program was honored "with expression of appreciation of the membership in formal way for his singular efforts" in making the program successful. Humes reported only cost of the tutorial assistance, which had 100 volunteer teachers serve without pay, was \$10 for mailing materials. Frogs Are Jumping In Calaveras County

ANGELES CAMP, Calif. (AP)—Frogs from California, the nation and the world are putting in their final practice leaps today for the annual celebration of Mark Twain's classic yarn.

The winner will be adjudged "The Celebrated Jumping Frog of Calaveras County," a title first bestowed upon a frog called "Daniel Webster" in a Twain tale published in 1865.

This prestige event of the Calaveras County fair annually draws upwards of 50,000 onlookers.

There's no betting. Officially in California you can bet on horses—only only the winning frog.

Such entries as "Number 1 Adviser" entered by Gov. Earl Warren, and "Tyrannosaurus Rex" submitted by Gov. Calvin L. Rampton of Utah are ready for the Governor's event Saturday.

Three frogs arrived Thursday via Pan American's Polar route from U.S. Army units and dependents stationed in Frankfurt, Germany. Eight other frogs arrived via Japan Air Lines from the Tachima Elementary School, Tachima, Japan.

They are the only legitimate foreign frogs through a ruse Twain might have appreciated, there will be other foreign entries, from Ecuador, Switzerland, Canada, Great Britain, Malaysia, Australia and Norway.

The difference is that entry blanks and Japan really sent frogs. The other nations sent entry blanks and asked local officials to pick them an entry from the Angeles Camp frog pond.

But, as Twain said, "A frog's a frog."

The international event and the overall finals are Sunday.

So far 20 states and a number of cities are represented. The Baltimore (Md.) entry ran into tough luck at the outset—he was named because he's a toad. A replacement was obtained, however.

Nebrauka has had the toughest luck. Its first entry jumped a fence and landed, and the second croaked. The third, a female named "Admiral Nobby" in honor of Gov. Richard T. Tamm, was delivered safely by the Governor's personal entry by automobile.

Florida Faces Inundation If Glaciers Melt

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. Geological Survey researchers predict that if all the world's ice were melted, much of the country's coastal regions and many of its major cities would be inundated.

Survey experts estimate the world's ice and glaciers contain about 7.2 million cubic miles, or about 1.1 trillion gallons of water that would raise the sea level between 200 and 250 feet.

James T. Lee, a survey cartographer, said Thursday a 250-foot rise would inundate about 267,000 square miles of Atlantic and Gulf Coast states, including all of Delaware, Florida and Louisiana.

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Abortion, \$\$ Bills Breeze Right Along

TALLAHASSEE (AP)—Abortion and appropriation bills breezed along in the Legislature Thursday, with Senate committees approving the controversial medical measure and a \$284 million raise for junior college instructors.

Meanwhile, the House's \$123 billion main appropriations bill was introduced. Appropriations Chairman Henry Land, D-Appoka, said seven smaller bills totaling \$132 million fractured into "tissues" on which the Democratic leadership and GOP Gov. Claude Kirk disagree would be introduced today.

The Senate Judiciary Committee passed, in a quick 52 vote, a liberalized abortion bill which would be vetoed by the governor. "I just don't think we have the money to do that extra mile," he said.

In floor action, the House voted 104-1 in adopting a bill which would create a \$100-million-per-year planning and programming division under the newly reformed Cabinet Planning and Budget Commission.

The agency would be responsible for developing a "Florida state plan," a six-year capital improvement plan and yearly budget for the state.

Rep. Fred Schultz, D-Jacksonville, the sponsor, said it could save the state up to \$30 million per year in wasted governmental duplication.

With less agree in mind, the House passed, 68-48, a bill which would hike the election qualifying fee for House and Senate candidates from \$60 to \$200.

Rep. Richard Pettigrew, D-Miami, said it would curtail "frivolous candidacies." Opponents pointed out that the added cost would bring the total to one million for most other state offices amounts to only five per cent of the annual salary.

The Senate, meanwhile, approved a bill to the governor, a bill creating a "Florida Construction Industry Board."

The regulatory agency, said backers, would curb "fly-by-night contractors" who bill homeowners. Opponents said it would force companies and force contracting rates up.

Israeli-Egyptian Frontier

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—The 2,400-man U.N. Middle East force today was reported ordered to withdraw from the Israeli-Egyptian frontier as Egyptian troops continued to mass along the border.

With Egyptian infantry, armored columns and field artillery massing in the Sinai Desert along Israel's southern frontier, Maj. Gen. Abdel Mohsen Morjani, commander of the Egyptian front, declared his troops were "ready for a secret march into Israel."

Morjani indicated, however, that Egypt would fight only if Israel attacked Syria or some other Arab state.

There was no immediate word of what counter measures the Israelis were taking, but the Israeli army announced Thursday that it had taken "suitable steps" to meet the Egyptian threat.

Reports from Cairo said Egyptian forces have taken up defensive positions along the Egyptian-Israeli demarcation line which the U.N. Emergency Force—UNEF—had been patrolling for 11 years.

Delegates at U.N. headquarters in New York said Secretary-General U Thant told them Thursday night he had given the order to pull back the peace force.

They said Thant told them he had no other choice while the regular removal of UNEF from its soil.

An Israeli source in Tel Aviv said Egypt has moved a "huge force" into the Sinai Peninsula. He said his government was in constant contact with the big powers over the situation.

Agricultural News And Views

For all life, water is essential. For most plants, are constituted of 90 per cent or more water. This is one reason water is so important to the farmer and his crops.

Water plays three other very important roles in the life of plants. In the first place it maintains the form and position of younger stems, leaves and flowers of plants; that is, osmotic pressure within the cells maintains turgor, which enables them to keep their shape.

Water is equally important for animal life, both wild and domestic. Like plants, most of the animal body is water. Water is necessary for the solution of food materials and for the passage of nutrients into and out of the tissues of the body. Other internal reactions in the animal body, likewise depend upon water.

Normal life processes require daily about 12 gallons of water per head of cattle and horses, 25-35 gallons each day for dairy cattle and about two gallons each for smaller livestock.

Home Hints By Sandra

Little fingers and chocolate candy often add up to stubborn stains on clothes and linens, and successful removal of such smudges may call for special treatment.

If the fabric is washable, soak the stain in cool water for 30 minutes or longer. Then, wash thoroughly, and allow the article to dry. Any grease stain that remains can be removed with a grease solvent.

If a brown stain persists, use a bleach. Chlorine, sodium perborate, and hydrogen peroxide bleaches are effective in removing chocolate stains, but be sure you select a bleach which is safe for the fabric and dye to be treated. To remove chocolate stains from nonwashable cloths, sponge with cool water, water detergent or a fully into the spot, and rinse well.

The most critical time of the swing comes just at the end of the downswing. It is most commonly referred to as the release and impact area. It begins several inches above the waistline and continues until the ball is struck.

Another way of illustrating this is cracking a ball whip. The whip is popped with an exaggerated delay in the uncoiling of the wrist. At impact, the wrists are never fully released; they are still slightly cocked to insure that you have not expended all of your power before you contact the ball.

The best way to insure this is to keep your body moving through the hitting area so that the hands are always behind or in other words, they are always trying to catch up. It is obvious that if this condition exists throughout the swing clubhead speed will always be increasing through the impact.

State Lottery And Taxes

Now that a house committee has reported out a bill to increase the Florida sales tax, it might be well to examine how the people feel about this and other potential sources of revenue.

In a recent statewide poll by First Research Corp. and paid for by newspapers in Miami, Jacksonville and St. Petersburg, the sales tax boost drew a nod from slightly less than 25 percent of those questioned.

It may surprise you to learn the poll indicated almost a third of the public likes the idea of a state lottery much more than any other suggested way to raise money to make the Florida more go.

Least popular among the levies suggested was an income tax, which drew just 4 percent approval.

It was almost a dead heat at a little more than 16 percent between groups in favor of extending the present sales tax (5 percent) to items presently exempt and a severance tax on minerals.

Not so surprisingly, the state-connected lottery idea drew much heavier support in the Gold Coast area of Dade, Broward and Palm Beach Counties than it did in the state at large. The figures were 42.4 percent there as against 31.2 elsewhere.

It would be expected Southeast Florida would go for the "painless" lottery suggestion.

In the Panhandle and other heavily rural areas, the lottery drew less than 19 percent of the votes.

Many of those questioned felt a state lottery, because voluntary, was the best answer because it also might help eliminate some private, organized gambling.

Another surprise was that Florida Negroes, generally considered to be the heavy players of the poor man's lottery—bolita—favored the state lottery by barely 2 percent of those queried.

The lottery proposal crossed party lines with no discernible difference. But the breakdown by sex showed a vast gap. Men said yes, 53.3; women said yes by just about half as many—27.7.

People who would extend the present sales tax—but not raise it—said they felt this was fairest, since "everybody would pay."

Probably the least understood of the taxes on the list was the severance levy. Florida is the only state in the union which has no tax on solid minerals. Yet the Sunshine State supplies almost 70 percent of all the phosphate the country's industry uses, plus vast amounts of limestone and crushed rock as well as gravel.

New Hampshire, first state to try a lottery, has raised considerable money with it but not without a multitude of headaches.

Before Florida gets into the same game, there are a goodly number of questions to be asked and answered.

But if it does get it right, and most of our people want it, eventually they probably will get it.

Washington (AP) — How Chi Minh no doubt has had to endure the same thing that plagues President Johnson, the backs and doves swooping around him, but now the North Vietnamese leader has some additional troubles.

He's caught between the Red China and 16 U.S. senators.

For 21 years he has been fighting outsiders, first the French and now the Americans, without any sign of letting up. He has the backing of the Soviets and Red China which could be pretty comfortable support.

China's premier, Chou En-lai, has just been quoted as saying he would send hundreds of Chinese troops into North Vietnam to help out any time he asked for them. Apparently he hasn't asked.

He has good reason for not asking, so long as he thinks he can get by on his own. Up till now the United States has been willing to limit the fighting to South Vietnam.

It has put no troops in North Vietnam although it has bombed the North on selective basis. But if the Red Chinese moved in the north end of the country were accepted for maintenance many years ago. About ten years ago a policy was set up that the county would not accept any more troops unless they were contracted according to certain specifications. Since then, all developers have built roads, drainage, sewage etc. and the home buyer has paid for all these improvements. This has been for homes that cost \$8,000 and up.
