





Go Easy On Tires

Earlier optimistic predictions that the worst of the rubber shortage was over and that the Japs would be blasted out of the Pacific in three months have been somewhat exploded in the last few days with Price Administrator Henderson's ruling that rubber even for retreading must be rationed and with the loss of Malaya by the British.

Since the prohibition on new tires for the civilian population, most of us have been counting on recaps for our automobiles, but now they are out too for the duration of the emergency unless we happen to have some priority classification. For most of us when the present tires on our cars are worn out, we will have to walk or find some other means of locomotion.

If Japanese successes in the Far East continue until the rubber in the Dutch East Indies is lost to enemy hands, the United States will have a virtual monopoly on all the rubber in the world not controlled by the Axis powers. But most of the rubber which the United States has consists of reserve stocks. The great rubber producing plantations of the Philippines, Malaya and the Dutch East Indies will belong to Japan.

Thus it will be up to the United States to supply rubber to the armies and air forces of our Allies as well as to our own. Britain, Russia and China produce no rubber whatever and have virtually no reserves of rubber either in government hands or among the civilian population. In order to supply the armies of the world which are fighting aggression, the United States will need all the rubber it can get, synthetic as well as old tires.

Hence it behooves those of us who still have something left in our tires to be just as sparing of our rubber as we can. Prudence dictates that we put our car in the garage and leave it there until dire emergency impels us to get it out. Our monthly mileage should be reduced at least 75 percent.

If this is done we may still be able to drive our car a little two or three years from now. If it is not done, we may be walking, even in the rain.




Washington Office Is Set Up To Aid Public



Farm Youths In State Can Win Scholarships

AMHERST, Mass. Feb. 12.—(Special)—A \$5,000 national scholarship program, planned to help support Florida farm youths with sufficient marketing methods, was announced today by the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association.

J. F. Williams, Jr. of Tallahassee, Florida, State Supervisor of Agricultural Education, has been appointed State chairman of the national program. It was reported by Professor Grant B. Snyder of Massachusetts State College, the association's advisory chairman.

Entries between the ages of 14 and 21 will be eligible to compete for \$500 grand national prize, four regional awards of \$250 each and 35 individual awards of \$100 each from a scholarship fund established by the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company for the National Vegetable Growers Association. It was brought out, Cash awards must be used to help defray agricultural college expenses of winners or to purchase farm equipment.

The four objectives of the program were listed as follows: 1. To stimulate among young people an interest in the growing and marketing of vegetables. 2. To provide an added income for young people to acquire the knowledge and develop the skills essential to the growing and marketing of vegetables. 3. To stimulate an appreciation of the importance of vegetables in the diet and to increase their use by the farm family. 4. To develop better methods of vegetable marketing.

The program is built around an extension course in produce marketing, designed to provide students with the opportunity to make first-hand studies of various methods used in moving food from growers to consumers, Mr. Snyder explained.

Registration for the current year's program must be completed within the next two weeks, he said. Registration cards and further details regarding the program may be obtained from Mr. Williams or from any other member of the southern states scholarship program committee, headed by G. L. Herrington of Knoxville, Tenn., state 4-H club leader at the University of Tennessee.

Government Obtains Gifts For War Usage

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. (AP) The Treasury Department wants Congress to permit the use for war purposes of small cash donations including two enthusiastic boys and an irate Chinese.

Receipts of gifts, totaling with thousands of others coming in at the rate of \$1,000,000 annually since Pearl Harbor, was disclosed by the department during House hearings on the second war powers bill.

Existing law, Department officials explained, prevents the acceptance of conditioned gifts for the purpose for which they are offered. All such donations now must go into the general treasury fund.

An example of the public's response to Pearl Harbor, the department exhibited several letters from unidentified donors, including one from "a Chinese" living in Montana who sent \$25 in new "order" to help kill the Japs, and added "my buy bonds later."

(AP) The Long-va... scientist, the Dr. Ernest Sheng Nung who wrote the first record of the soybean in 2838 BC, never suspected that some day it might be used to produce rubber or even automobile tires. But scientists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in Washington believe soybean meal can be transformed into a substitute for rubber, according to a recent announcement of Science Service, one of the outstanding scientific news services in the Nation's capital, which is noted for the authenticity of its releases.

For military reasons a detailed description of the confidential process cannot be given, but it involves a series of chemical changes, which finally transform the protein molecules of soybean meal into molecules of similar in structure to those of rubber. Science Service says that soybeans are good for humans and animals and can be used in such a tremendous variety of ways that no one should be surprised to learn that it is ready "possible on paper" to produce a substitute for rubber from soybean meal.

British Flag Waves Over Singapore As Japs Enter Suburbs

Invasers Are Within 2 Miles Of Heart Of City Despite Fierce Resistance

One Of Two Water Reservoirs Taken

Large Troop Ship Is Sunk In Harbor, 10 Others Are Hit

(By Associated Press) The Union Jack waved through another of its evidently numbered days over Singapore city today as Japanese shock forces crawled toward the city's heart. The Japs reported "severe offensive and defensive" fighting all day on the northern suburbs, while the British artillery concentrated its fire on the invaders from the southern section of the city.

(By Associated Press) Britain, reporting on Singapore, declared that the Union Jack continues to wave over the island metropolis as Japanese shock troops fought in the city's suburbs.

The Japanese seemed to be in control of one of Singapore's two biggest water reservoirs and threatened the other. They claimed the Japs sank a 10,000-ton troop ship and damaged 10 others in Singapore harbor.

Singapore still grimly resisted the Japanese invasion forces today, many reports from the British acknowledged heavy enemy attacks from the west, strengthened by air and artillery reinforcements. The Japanese admitted stubborn resistance and said their drive is still two miles from Singapore's center.

The last radio message from the beleaguered city was a defiant "we shall win." That came many hours after the Japs naval base, which ring 750,000 persons, had been written off as lost.

The Tokyo radio said: "Singapore city reverted to its role of frontier town in the final phase of the Malayan campaign. Its streets can with blood and its tropical palm was shattered by the swarming roar of rifle, machine gun and artillery fire as Japanese forces ran the British defenders out of the city in desperate street fighting."

"Helmeted Japanese units which penetrated a corner of the city yesterday morning were moving slowly but steadily toward the Singapore lock area in an effort to cut off the British regiments before they could win their way to evacuation boats waiting for them."

Heavy firing is still going on around the center part of the island where attackers and defenders are mixing it up furiously.

Dive-bombing and machine-gunning Japanese planes were sweeping at will over defenders who had earned in blood their right to glory. While a rain of bombs, shot and shell was making the city a hell for men, women and children alike.

News knew how many of the thousands of European women and children remained in Singapore city, but they hope that many more of them could be evacuated virtually as abandoned.

Men May Register For Selective Service At Draft Headquarters

Saturday and Sunday from 7:00 A.M. until 9:00 P.M. have been designated as registration days to accommodate male persons who would be inconvenienced by going to some public school in their locality Monday, the date set for the third registration under selective service. Ralph B. Chapman, chairman of the local Draft Board, stated today, adding that only men who cannot go to the schools Monday should register at the headquarters on the corner of Magnolia and Second Street.

All men, both aliens and citizens, between the ages of 20 and 44, inclusive, not previously registered, must register. This includes men who have attained their twentieth birthday on or before Dec. 31, 1941, and who have not attained their forty-fifth birthday on or before Feb. 16, 1942. If in doubt, register. It can be canceled later.

Registrants will be required to answer nine questions which give name, address, age, date and place of birth, mailing address, name of person (other than wife) who will always know address, name and address of employer, type and address of employment.

Men who register will be added to registrants of two previous registrations for selective service, then qualified and called for military service in accordance with selective service regulations.

The families of persons who are physically unable to go to any of the registration places should contact E. B. Carter, of the Draft Office on Second Street and a teacher will register the ill man. Mr. Carter disclosed that some one will go to both the hospital and the City and County jails to register men confined there.

British Hunt Huge German Battleships

English Suffer Heavy Losses After Great Fight Off Dover; Nazi Boats Escape

(By Associated Press) British long-range bombers are believed to be searching out the German battleships, Scharnhorst and Gneisenau, and the cruiser Prinz Eugen, escaped through the Dover Strait yesterday. The Germans claimed a British destroyer was sunk and another set afire and 45 R. A. F. planes downed in a great running battle.

The long-refuged German battleships Gneisenau and Scharnhorst and the cruiser Prinz Eugen slipped away from their French coast anchorages Thursday with a strong air and surface escort and engaged the Royal Air force and the British Navy in the greatest land-sea-air battle off the Dover coast since the fall of France.

After the furious battle, to which even the shore guns on the Dover cliff added their thunder, the German ships were last reported escaping to new bases in the Heligoland light.

The cost was great to both sides in this tremendous gamble to free the 26,000-ton battleships and the Prinz Eugen, a survivor of the Bismarck-hooded sinkings for new Nazi implements in the battle of the Atlantic.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. (AP)—The War Production Board today ordered the \$100,000,000 radio industry to convert its entire facilities to arms production within four months.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12. (AP)—A bill appropriating \$300,000,000 for aid to China was signed today by President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

In the Philippines, the War Department today reported an upsurge in the tempo of fighting on the Bataan peninsula and credited American anti-aircraft gunners with destroying two Japanese dive-bombers. Jap planes mistakenly bombed and machine-gunned their own infantry, causing heavy casualties.

British defenders of the Bataan Road clung steadfastly to the consolidated positions in the Pan area, 30 miles above Japanese-occupied Marikina. With the aid of British-American fighters, land forces ward off Japanese attempts to cross the Salween River from the Pan jungles.

The Japanese slackened their invasion drive on the Netherlands Indies, the Dutch reported today and the defenders' scorched earth tactics were said to have hindered further enemy penetration.

Gen. Douglas MacArthur previously advised the War Department the Japanese legions in the Philippines are getting ready to deliver an all-out blow against his heroic Bataan defenders.

"The enemy," he said, "is evidently reorganizing his forces and awaiting additional supplies and reinforcement, before resuming the offensive."

He likewise hinted that native farmers, balking "harsh treatment at the hands of the Japanese soldiers," are sabotaging enemy efforts to feed off the conquered lands of Luzon.

Evicted from their homes by the invaders, the Filipino farmers have crowded into occupied Manila or are hiding out in the mountains—refusing to harvest crops that would only fall into Jap hands.

Food supplies are becoming scarce, Gen. MacArthur reported, and the situation has so alarmed enemy military headquarters that the Jap commander-in-chief, Gen. Yushaku Homma, has issued a prohibition calling upon the agrarians to return, and harvest their crops.

Meanwhile the Navy Department announced last night that the recent Pacific fleet raid on Japanese bases in the Marshall and Gilbert Islands had resulted in destruction of five enemy warships, including a converted aircraft carrier, and 11 auxiliary vessels and that numerous shore installations had also been destroyed.

The fact that the raid had been made on the Japanese naval and air bases previously had been announced but information given out tonight constituted the first disclosure of the terrific blow dealt the Japanese.

In addition to the wreckage of ships and shore establishment, the Navy said, the enemy lost 28 airplanes including 21 bombers.
