

Tension Increases Between Nazis And Czechs In Europe

Hitler And Henlein Are In Accord On Policies Regarding Sudeten Germans

British Undertake Polish Agreement

Local Opposition To Daladier Work Week Studied By Cabinet

As expected, rising tension between Germany and Czechoslovakia pivoted on a second momentous conference at Berchtesgaden today while France, still fearful of European peace, struggled against internal discord and Italy clamped new restriction on Jews.

At his mountain retreat, where much of Europe's recent history has been made, Chancellor Hitler of Germany conferred again with Konrad Henlein, leader of Nazi-supported Sudeten Germans who seek autonomy from Czechoslovakia.

After Henlein left, an official announcement said, Hitler "took cognizance with interest" of the Sudeten leader's report on the crisis in Czechoslovakia and the two were "in complete accord in their judgment of the situation."

Increasing opposition of the workers to Premier Daladier's decree extending working hours beyond the 40 hour week was given attention by a French cabinet meeting.

Judge Ware Urges Public To Assist In Curtailing Thefts

Faced with the prospect of having to sentence three small boys children for stealing automobile batteries and selling them, Judge R. W. Ware spoke out Thursday against what he regarded as the real cause of the situation.

Declared Judge Ware: "If the person who bought those batteries from the little fellows had refused to buy them, the chances are 100 to 1 that such petty stealing would cease."

"The people who bought those batteries from those boys are just as guilty and in my opinion, even more guilty for buying what they were selling."

He pointed out that when the judge boys offered to sell batteries at a give-away price that anyone should have known immediately the batteries must have been stolen.

"Last year," Judge Ware asserted, "we had much the same sort of trouble but after an appeal to the public it was stopped."

"Let me again appeal to the public to halt such illicit traffic which helps make criminals out of young children," Judge Ware concluded.

Florida Old Age Pensions Upped By Over 18,000

Cost To State Hiked By Over \$300,000 In 12 Month Period

JACKSONVILLE, Sept. 2.—(AP)—A year's progress in the extension of Old Age Assistance to needy Floridians 65 years of age or more is revealed in the annual report of the State Welfare Board, now in the hands of the printer and soon to be released for distribution.

The report shows that the total number of persons receiving OAA increased from 10,835 as of July 1, 1937 to 29,469 on June 30, 1938. The aggregate amount disbursed during that period was \$428,795 and the average grant for \$11.56 to \$14.55.

In Seminole county the increases were: Number enrolled from 89 to 301; amount disbursed, from \$1,008.00 to \$4,700.00; average grant, from \$11.20 to \$15.98.

"The substantial sum sent back to the county has considerably relieved its categorical relief obligations and has put it in position to liberalize its grants for direct relief, for which no provision is made by either the state or federal governments," it was stated here today by C. C. Colington, state welfare commissioner.

In addition to Old Age Assistance, the State Welfare Board also administers Aid to the Blind, a program that is now well advanced, and Aid to Dependent Children, a program that is in its infancy on account of a rather lack of funds, he said.

Books Will Be Open For Registration In Precincts Monday, Thigpen Says

Moughton Gives Outline Of Plans

Three-Story, Brick Building Will Measure 150 x 41 Feet

Only little more than 20 days remain before Seminole County freeholders decide for or against a bond issue of \$70,000 and a tax levy not to exceed two mills for the payment of the bonds and maintenance of a county-owned hospital.

At present, Supervisor of Registration W. J. Thigpen announced there are 2,495 freeholders registered in this county. He declared, however, that this figure would be changed somewhat before the referendum on Sept. 26.

On Monday, Sept. 5, the registration books go to the various precincts for registration for the general election on Nov. 5, and Mr. Thigpen pointed out that those who are eligible to vote in the hospital election and who are not registered as freeholders may do so while the books are in the precincts. He stated that the books would be in the same places as they were during the registration period for the primary election in May.

The \$127,000 project which has been submitted to the Public Works Administration provides for the construction of a three-story, 47-bed hospital building and a six-room nurse's home. The hospital building, the exterior of which will be brick finish with stone trim, will be 151 feet in length and 41 feet in width, according to the specifications of Architect Elton J. Moughton.

The building will be absolutely fireproof. The outer walls will be constructed of concrete and brick. The floor and columns on the interior will be made of concrete while the partitions will be made of gypsum. A tile roof will cover the building.

According to the plans which were drawn from specifications for modern hospitals, the first floor will contain a waiting room and lobby, business office, private office, isolation ward for contagious diseases, covered ambulance entrance, accident room, x-ray room, laboratory, boiler room, main kitchen, sever, nurses' dining room, help's dining room, welfare dental room, two six-bed wards and one private room for colored patients, accidental storage rooms and other utility rooms.

The second floor will contain men and women's wards, ten private rooms, linen supply rooms, sever, nurses' station, chart room and solariums.

The third floor will contain additional men and women's wards, two private rooms, maternity ward, nursery, babies bath, delivery room, linen storage room, utility room, nurses station and chart room.

The main operating suite will also be located on the third floor and will consist of a main hall with a doctor's scrub-up, major operating room, minor operating room, sterilizing room, nurses work room, doctors' dressing room, nurses' dressing room.
