Judge to be publicly reprimanded

SEMINOLE COUNTY - The Florida Judicial Qualifications Commission has recommended the State Supreme Court administer a public reprimand against 18th Judicial Circuit Court Judge Leonard V. Wood. Wood accepted sole responsi-bility in connection with charges against him and for unfortunate occurrences which transpired in the courtroom which led to the commission's decision.

In early June, the judge was informed that an inquiry had been conducted by an investisative panel and that at least five members, meeting in Or-



lando on March 27, had determined probable cause existed for formal proceedings to be conducted against him.

as the basis for complaints. Most were connected to what the committee indicated were comments made by Wood during a trial, several of which were divorce proceedings.

The document submitted to the judge states, You have fallen into a pattern or practice of making rude, intemperate, and inappropriate comments in open court relating to certain witnesses, counsel and types of litigants, and this conduct evidences an absence of judicial temperament and

inappropriate bias or prejudice in matters pending before you."

In conclusion, the notice indicated the acts, if they occurred as alleged, "impair the confidence of the intention of this state and the intention of this state and the integrity of the judicial system, and in you as a judge, and constitute con-duct unbecoming a member of the judiciary in violation of the Picaco Bos Wood, Page 4A

Don't be scammed into paying for job

You don't have to pay for information about job vacancies with the U.S. Government or

U.S. Postal Service. Scam artists are victimizing many Americans by selling information about federal job opportunities. These scam artists advertise in the classifled sections of newspapers and offer--for a fee--to help job seekers find and apply for federal jobs. Some fraudulent companies even try to confuse consumers by using names like the "U.S. Agency for Ca-reer Advancement," or the or the "Postal Employment Service," which sound like federal agen-

Scam artists may lie about the availability of federal job openings in your area. For example, the Postal Service has few vacancies for career posttions. For many of the entry jobs you must take a written examination first, Test 470. Postal Service hiring takes place through 85 district offices at the local level. If a private party tells you that postal jobs are available, check with the Postal Service to determine if hiring is taking place and if the exam is required for eligibility. Because of the high volume of applicants taking the test, it is only offered every few years in any given district.

Information about U.S. government jobs is available free. Federal agencies and the U.S. Postal Service never charge application fees, or guarantee that an applicant will be hired. If positions require a competitive examination--and many do not--hiring agencies typically offer free

sample questions to consumers who sign up for the exam.

It is deceptive for anyone to guarantee you a high score on Tests 460 and 470, the postal entrance exams for rural carrier associate, clerk, city carrier, mail handler, flat sorter machine operator, mall processor and markup clerk. These exams test your general aptitude, not your knowledge of facts. Attending workshops, studying exam techniques, and taking practice questions will not assure you of a top score

test. Veterans receive hiring on any postal exam. Indeed, a top score does not guarantee preferences that you will be hired. You must meet other requirements, including passing a sonnel-Management say cerbackground check and a drug-Please see Scam, Page 4A

Greene to present Lake Mary names for airport board

TAKE MARY With many of the large aircraft flights presently required to approach the Orlando Sanford Airport over take Mary residential areas, the city is pressing to insure that it has the capability of putting its two-cents-in during incetings of the Sanford Airport Authority

At tonight's city commission meeting, Commissioner Thom Greene has announced he plans to submit the names of three individuals who he believes are qualified to be considered by Sanford for board membership. The board presently has no representation from the Lake Mary/Heathrow communities

Greene had previously convinced the city to pass a resolution regarding to request Sanford to consider including a Lake Mary resident on the board. It was approved during an April 2 meeting. Sanford's commission appoints members to the board which governs the operation of the airport with the exception of the Federal Aviation Administration which has authority over flight opera-

The three persons to be suggested by Greene include Richard Weir, Cecil Thompson and Brenda Williams. Wetr is vice chairman of the noise abatement committee, Thompson is president of the Hills of Lake Mary Homeowners Association and Williams serves on the homeowners' committee in Carrington Park. Heathrow. She reportedly has

been asked by the Heathrow governing homeowners' association to represent them on airport Issues

There is to be a vacancy on the Airport Authority coming up on Sept. 30 of this year.

Greene said he intends to present the three names for consideration during tonight's city commission meeting under the Reports from Commisstoners portion of the regular meeting agenda-

Red Cross assesses wild fire damage

With the increasing rainfall in Central Florida, the wild fires which have plagued Volusta. Seminole and surrounding counties are considered gone Federal and state officials are still investigating the amount of damages crop and woodland losses as well as determining residential and commercial destruction in physical numbers as well as the financial impact the fires have had.

According to the American Red Cross, 66 countres have been affected, 40 of which are set to receive federal assis-The organization's Damage Assessment workers have studied all of these counties to determine future operations in similar situations.

The purpose of Red Cross assessment separate from other organizations is to determine the scope of Red Cross response. How much damage noted determines what kind of material assistance and how much human resource assistance is needed.

Stan Standorth, Damage Assessment Officer said. "The potential for damage assessment crews to be trapped behind the advancing fire lines was a huge

concern. As the first were put out damage assessment crews would move in For those who think the fire is over, on July 8, lightning struck again igniting over 60 new tires?

Damage Assessment Coordi nator Leo Batzer said. "We used street sheets which showed the addresses and locations of homes on each street Street sheets are especially critical in incidents where homes are totally destroyed."

This damage assessment was said to be different than he had seen in the past. It was quite eerie," he said "Because of the mandatory evacuation and the fact that the roads were blocked, no one was there. No people... no children no pets ... just the smell of smoke On any given street, we would see a home standing completely intact while the homes to either side of it were entirely destroyed. In many instances after a disaster, we see people cleaning up their yards. cleaning up their homes, beginning the process of putting their lives back together. The fact that no one was there allowed us to be able to conduct the assessment fairly quickly.

Beloved artist, teacher dies at 78

Well-known local artist Joseph Mathieux died Tuesday leaving many grieving family and friends in the Geneva and Sanford areas. He was 78.

Mathieux and his wife, Elizabeth, were prominent supporters of the arts in Seminole County. "He was an excellent artist," recalls Ashby Jones, member of the administrative counsel of the Seminole Art Association. "We all looked up to him because of his knowledge."

According to Jones, Mathicux was the only remaining original member of the Sanford/Seminole Art Association. Mathieux helped to form the association in 1959 and had served for two terms as president. He was very active as an art competition judge, teacher and artist. Mathieux, with his distinctive bearded appearance, even sat as a model for watercolor classes.

Members of the association valued him for his constructive critiques of their work. Two years ago the association dedi-

cated their yearbook to Mathieux and Elizabeth in honor of their outstanding contributions. "Joe was highly regarded by the whole association," said Jones. "It is terrible to lose him."

Fellow artists described Mathieux as a soft spoken, genteel man who liked to work with youth. Mathieux taught art, history and arithmetic in Seminole County schools for 39 years. He continued to teach art to students, young

Many of Mathieux's works of art had religious themes. Jones was particularly impressed with Mathieux's one renditions of Christ in various walks of life. Mathieux's art work could often be seen on display locally. His work was most recently exhibited at the Bettye nith Cultural Arts Center in Sanford in a show sponsored

by the art association.

Born in Geneva, Mathieux lived there most of his life. His family was among the first set-tiers in the Geneva area. Mathieux was a member and past president of the Geneva Historical Society, and along with other society members helped to set up the two-room Oeneva Museum. Several pieces of Mathieux family memorabilia are on display at the museum including a chair fashloned from grape vines by Mathieux's grandfather.

"Joe was very interested in maintaining and preserving the history of Geneva," said Lorraine Whiting, member of the historical society. Whiting, whose grandfather along with Mathieux's had helped to settle Geneva, had known Mathleux all of his life and recalls that Mathieux worked diligently and helped in any way he could, with the local cemetery and

with the historical society. Mathieux was also a charter member of the Historical and Genealogical Society.

Mathieux was also very active in his church, First Baptist Church of Geneva where he served as a deacon, Sunday

school teacher and lay pastor. Mathieux and his wife had been married for 56 years. In addition to his wife, he is marvived by their daughter Jeannene Jones of Altamonte Springs and their son, Lennard, a Chief Engineer for Mobile Oil Company and currently living in Thailand, his sister, Eva Markowicz of Geneva, four grandchildren and nine greatgrandchildren.




Will ineffective until admitted to probate

in the past two weeks we have discussed the requirements for a legal will; that the testator be 18 years or older and of sound mind at the time of signing, that the will be in writing, signed by the testator, signed by the witnesses, and that the will's execution be performed according to statute performed according to statute. Once these requisites have been satisfied a will is valid. However, a will does not become effective until it is admitted to probate.

A will may be admitted to probate upon the oath of any one of the attesting witnesses taken before any circuit judge, a commissioner appointed by the court, or the ciert. However, finding witnesses is oftentimes difficult because witnesses themselves pass away, move, disappear, become incompetent, etc. Therefore, Florida law provides two different ways through which a will may be admitted to probate.

If it appears that the attest-

If it appears that the attest-ing witnesses cannot be found, they have become incompe-tent, or their testimony cannot be obtained within a reason-able time, a will may be admit-ted to probate upon the cash of



the personal representative if he or she believes that the writing offered as the will in the last true will of the decedent. The other way through which a will may be admitted to probate is upon the oath of any other person having no interest in the estate if he or she believes that the writing offered as the will is the last true will of the decedent.


It is not very complicated to have a will admitted to probate using any of the above described procedures. However, there is an even simpler way of having a will admitted to probate; using a self-proving affidavit.

strument was the testator's will, that the testator signed in the presence of the witnesses, that the witnesses signed in the presence of each other, and the witnesses signed in the presence of the testator.

A self-proving affidevit obvi-ates the need to track down witnesses and arrange for their testimony in probate court af-ter the testator's death beter the testator's death because, by statute, a self-proved will may be admitted to probate without further proof. Therefore, its use makes the admission of a will to probate simpler, quicker, and less coath.

Failure to adhere to those requirements may result in a disposition of assets on or after death, pursuant to the intestacy statute, which may be contrary to that intended by the testator and/or may lead to increased costs. In the following weeks we will discuss in more depth the other tools that abound be part of an estate plan as well as other aspects of estate law.
















Curbing blood sugar in diabetics

DEAR DR. GOTT: After reading your column in which you identified Life Savers as the culprit that caused high blood sugar in a diabetic reader, I thought that you might benefit from a personal observation.

I thought that you might benefit from a personal observation.

Although diabetes was in my family. I have never had high blood sugar. Nonetheless, my triglyceride level was very high (over 400). I had regularly enjoyed sucking on breath mints.

After seeing your comments, I decided to experiment. For two months, I gave up my breath mints. Then I had a blood test that showed triglycerides of under 200. This level has stabilized — as long as I forego the mints. I had no idea that dietary sugar reduction would have such a profound effect on the triglyceride fat. Perhaps my experience will help others, although it is a mystery to me.

DEAR READER: Diabetics usually have high triglyceride levels. In fact, so do people who have a diabetic tendency, without the full-blown disease. I suspect that you are a mild diabetic and, by diadaining sugar in the form of breath mints, you lowered your blood glucese as well as your triglycerides. Such a pettern is not a mystery and is far from being unusual. You should continue your present strategy because, by eliminating dietary sugar, you may be able to avoid eventual treatment for diabetes. Conversely, eating sugar will undoubtedly stress your system and bring on frank diabetes as you age.

Because elevated triglyceride levels increase the risk of heart and vascu-lar disease, you were fortunate to have found an easy method to keep your levels in a more normal range (about 136 milligrams per deciliter).






