## Chief: We need more cops!

SANFORD — Police Chief Joe Dillard has asked that 27 police department employees, including 21 officers, be added to the city ranks. Fiscal year 1997/98 budget preparation time is now officially under way for the city of Sanford. One of the first requests made to various

department heads was to determine the number of new personnel needed for this coming year.

Initial requests have now been revealed. In all, department heads are seeking to hire 50 new employees. The largest number is from the Sanford Police Department, which is asking for 27 additional employees.

According to the initial budget request to be considered, the estimated cost for the new of-

ficers would be \$732,882, with salaries and benefits to be taken from the city's general fund.

In his budget request submitted to the commission for consideration, Chief Dillard has outlined reasoning behind each of the proposed hirings.

Two additional communications operators are requested, Chief Dillard said in 1996, present

## 'Let me die in peace'

Charles Hall, a 35-year-old AIDS victim simultaneously fighting for his life - and the right to end that life with a physician-assisted suicide - wheeled himself into action Thursday at the state Supreme Court in Tallahassee.

"Why not just let me die in peace?" he asked at the conclusion of the day. "I just don't understand where the state feels they have the right to do what they're doing to me."

Saying he was in much pain and taking liquid morphine "like it's going out of style," 35-year-old Hall sat in a wheelchair and listened intently to oral arguments before the Supreme Court, whose judges gave no indication when they would make a ruling.

Hall's head jolted when Parker Thompson, a Miami attorney representing the state, said Hall shouldn't have a problem with physical pain "because of all the morphine he takes."

Hall, a Central Florida resident, is one of three men who filed a 1996 lawsuit, challenging the state constitution on the right to die. The other two men have since died from cancer, and Hall vows he'll battle until his last breath.

SANFORD — With a period piece like *The Secret Garden*, it is really important to capture setting. Part of the set is costume and the Ritz Theater production is lucky to have a young lady with seven years experience at the task.

Amy Eckenwiler is a graduate of Florida State University with a bachelor degree in fine arts. Yet costuming was not what Eckenwiler was initially interested in. She had never worked with the drama department for her high school, but said that she did work backstage on a voluntary basis on school projects. Her first "major" decision was to study German. She followed a friend to the University of Oregon to help in a stage play. Her friend, who was

interested in theater at the time, fell out, but she stayed with it.

Eckenwiler has had experience in wardrobe, design, wigs and stitching. She is the principal costume designer for *The Secret Garden*. She has seen the musical and she has seen bits of the movie. But the design is mostly her own.

The play is set in the early 1900's and Eckenwiler admits that it is her favorite period. The play is set during the winter and spring seasons so she had to coordinate the fashions with the setting. She has had three weeks to work with the production and said that it was tight. "Fred [the play's director] has let me do what I wanted with the design of the costumes," said Eckenwiler. 

It's time to look at Friday and Saturday again. My, how time is flying. Friday, May 9, is Veterinary Appreciation Day. I guess it's in keeping with this past week being Be Kind to Animals Week and National Pet Month.

John Brown and David Hunter are noteworthy today. Both tried to free the slaves.

Brown was born May 9, 1800. He was considered an Abolitionist leader who led an attack

on Harpers Ferry in 1859, intended to give impetus to his self-proclaimed freedom and for freedom of slaves. His aim was frustrated. One history book calls him the "legendary martyr of the abolitionist movement." And now, as the song says, John Brown's body lies...etc.

David Hunter was a General for the Department of the South during the Civil War. On May 9, 1862, at Hilton Head, S.C., he issued an order freeing slaves in South Carolina, Florida and Georgia. The problem was that he did it on his own, without congressional or presidential approval. His orders were countermanded by President Lincoln just 10 days later.

Speaking of that war, Belle Boyd was born on May 9, 1843. She was a Confederate spy during the war and later became an actress. She was author of a book *Belle Boyd in Camp and Prison*

Tomorrow, May 10, is Confederate Memorial Day in North and South Carolina.

Talk about dress codes: On May 10, 1889, a group of people started a riot outside Astor Place Opera House in New York City all because gentlemen were required to wear coats and ties. Also at odds were comments by a British actor appearing at the theater who suggested that American life was vulgar.

Over the next two days, citizens led by Ned Huntline attacked the theater resulting in the calling out of the troops who were told to open fire if it was believed necessary. In all, 22 persons were killed and 26 others severely wounded.

On May 10, 1869, at the meeting of Union Pacific and Central Pacific railroads at Promontory Point, Utah, a golden spike valued at \$400 was driven between the two railroads

to celebrate the linkage.

## CD-ROM program designed to pump up math readiness skills across the state

For most people, there seem to be no practical applications for the mathematics skills they are taught in school.

As a result, most students learn little of what they should in that area. Test results in Florida have long mirrored that disturbing fact.

This week, Education Commissioner Frank T. Brogan introduced an interactive CD-ROM for both teachers and students in an effort to help them master the Sunshine State mathematics standards.

It was announced that 8,000 copies of the CD-ROM will be distributed to every school, school district, college of education and professional development center in Florida.

The schools will be able to use the innovative teaching/learning

tool to help students get up to speed on mathematics skills where they have often lagged behind.

"This CD-ROM represents cutting-edge technology for educator training and student learning," Brogan said. "This puts the Sunshine State Standards into a practical, hands-on format for teachers and students."

Brogan, a former public school teacher and principal, is pleased with the possibilities the new CD-ROM provides for teacher and students.

The CD-ROM, *Mathematics Best Practices*, was developed jointly by the Florida Department of Education's Office of Educational Technology and the Bureau of Curriculum, Instruction and Assessment. They had some assistance from Illuminative Multimedia, Inc.

The Department of Education

contributed content and instructional design while Illuminative provided programming and graphics support.

The release of the mathematics CD-ROM follows the *Florida Writes!* test CD-ROM that has already been distributed throughout the state to teachers and students. The *Florida Writes!* test scores increased across the state this year.

The DOE is working to develop a similar CD-ROM program based on the new Science and Language Arts standards.

"This CD-ROM and other technology tools we are developing allow teachers to access the information they need to work on the standards at their convenience," Brogan said.

"Instead of limiting teachers to participating in fixed professional development activities offered at certain times, in cer-

tain places, CD-ROM technology frees teachers to access critically important information as their schedules permit.

The CD-ROM features an interactive classroom environment where a teacher presents problems and students explain step by step how they arrived at the solution. Animated characters and graphic presentations are used to demonstrate the solutions, which incorporate best practices for mathematics.

The CD-ROM contains 25 mathematical activities for kindergarten through 12th grade and contains multiple examples of ways to arrive at the correct answer. It is designed for teachers to use in the classroom or in developing lesson plans.

In addition, students can work independently on their math skills using the CD-ROM program.

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



## New in theaters: *The Fifth Element*

**The Fifth Element** (PG-13): On the way out of the screening for *The Fifth Element*, a film friend commented, "If they took the nudity out, they could sell this to kids." He was no doubt referring to the cartoonish buffoonery that runs rampant throughout the film. It may be the best reason out of many to call *The Fifth Element* one of the worst movies of the year.

I will not bore you with a long, drawn out description of the synopsis. Here is an abbreviated version: Bruce Willis plays a retired, multi-decorated soldier turned taxi driver in 23rd Century New York re-commissioned for the assignment to recover four sacred stones and combine them with a "fifth element" to halt the advancement of an evil sphere barreling toward Earth. Trust me that is the bare minimum you need to know to get through this disappointing sci-fi fantasy.

*The Fifth Element* is directed by the French filmmaker Luc Besson (*The Professional*) from a screenplay by Besson, who also wrote the story, and Robert Mark Kamen (*A Walk in the Clouds*). Besson has no problem achieving a borrowed visual style from other sci-fi movies like *Blade Runner* and *Judges Dredd*. But there is this incongruous corniness to the whole production that is excruciatingly irritable. A sci-fi fan-



asy/comedy? In the context of this story it doesn't work. A great example of this goofball idiocy is the character of Zorg played by Gary Oldman (*Bram Stoker's Dracula*). Aside from the obvious joke that this guy is the chief executive of a large corporation and is described as "the embodiment of evil," Besson has made this character into one of the worst screen villains in film history. You could almost make the argument of this guy being a white supremacist with his Nazi-style image and his Southern drawl, but he is just another stock loon set on world domination. What I didn't get about this character is that instead of being the "embodiment of evil," he turns out to be the "embodiment of stupidity." The character is certainly no credit to the talent of Gary Oldman.

The film's special effects are impressive, but it was George Lucas who said, "Special effects without a story is a pretty boring thing." How right you

are George, Besson seemed to be so caught up in the look of the picture that he forgot to give it an engaging story. I think that even if he did, it See Element Page 5A

## Move commission meeting downstairs

The Sanford City Commission work sessions held prior to almost every regular commission meetings, take place in the city manager's conference room, in the second floor of Sanford City Hall.

For the past many years, these work sessions contained only five to ten items which were only presented when clarification was needed, or special presentations were to be made. Of course no final decisions are allowed during these meetings.

Nonetheless, the commissioners often take what is called a "consensus vote." Generally, the consensus is to determine whether or not an item is deemed important enough to bring forward at the regular meeting for a decision, or whether the city manager or other department head should pursue a matter further and return with additional information.

Those work session meetings for years have often started at 5:30, 6 p.m., and occasionally were not even required.

Now however, the meetings are almost regularly scheduled to begin at 3:30 or 4 p.m. Agendas are lengthy, with possibly 20 or more items listed, plus the city manager's report. Although it is not listed, it often contains an additional five to ten items.

With so much commission discussion, it should be evident that the public needs to know about what transpires in the work sessions.

The work sessions, of course, are open to the public. Anyone who wishes may attend these sessions.

The problem however, is in seating. With the mayor, four commissioners, city manager, city clerk and deputy clerk at the meeting table, (often the city attorney), plus two chairs for persons wishing to make a presentation, the center of the room is full.

Around the walls of the city manager's conference room are a number of chairs. But with every department head, and often second-in-command personnel on hand, the chairs are also packed.

When citizens turn out to hear discussion on a certain matter, chairs have to be brought in from outside offices and the hallway. But with all the people already in the room, there is little space left. And in such a crowded room, air conditioning and/or heating and ventilation is often a problem.

Often, guests who have come to make presentations, find it necessary to wait out in the hallway before entering the chambers because there is no room.

There is no question that these work sessions are important. They allow commissioners the opportunity to hear their fellow commissioners' viewpoints on certain matters, and are able to obtain opinions on important topics from department heads, special consultants, and often applicants.

Let it be known, public input is not allowed at these work sessions, although, with the approval of the commission, some comments are occasionally allowed. We are not suggesting this be changed in any way. Work sessions should be for the people who govern the city.

We believe however, that the time has come for the commission to move on. Move on to a larger location where the general public will have the opportunity to hear what is going on in the city government.

The Sanford City Commission has outgrown the good-ole-days when just a few items were brought up for discussion at work sessions, and hardly anyone other than department heads attended these meetings.

Sanford has grown, and the decisions made by the commission are highly important to everyone. As a result, we believe everyone needs to know exactly what is going on at all levels.

When a commissioner votes in opposition to others on an item during the regular meeting, the people should know why. If a proposal is considered not worthy of further consideration (at the regular meeting), the public should know what happened, and again, why it happened.

The population of the city deserves the opportunity to hear these work sessions. We believe it's time the commission took steps to give them this opportunity. Let's move these work sessions down into the commission chambers where there is adequate seating, and a public address system which will allow the public to hear what is going on.

## The charmer and the press

A huge ideological struggle is under way over the Chemical Weapons Convention that may decide whether superhawks or moderates dominate the Republican Party's foreign policy -- and which group Senate Majority Leader Trent Lott, R-Miss., will join. Potential 2000 GOP presidential candidates are lining up on the issue, with Jack Kemp and Steve Forbes joining the hawks and Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., and former Joint Chiefs Chairman Colin Powell helping lead the moderates.

The CWC is scheduled for a vote in the Senate, with a group of 33 undeclared Republicans -- led by Lott -- holding the balance in determining whether the United States joins the rest of the civilized world in declaring a ban on chemical weapons.

All 45 Senate Democrats and eight Republicans are expected to support the treaty, leaving the Clinton administration 14 votes short of the two-thirds necessary to pass the Senate.

With President Clinton making daily calls to Lott and others, administration vote-counters figured recently that 11 GOP senators were leaning in favor of the treaty, 12 were genuinely undecided, and 10 were leaning against, three of whom were considered

persuadable.

The opposition is led by former Pentagon official Frank Gaffney, who is trying to convince Republicans that the CWC is to the late-1990s GOP what the Panama Canal Treaty was in the late 1970s for the party -- the key to victory for future presidential contenders as it was for Ronald Reagan.

Actually, a better parallel is a Democratic one. In the 1970s, extreme doves forced presidential candidates in the aftermath of the Vietnam War trauma to oppose nearly every new weapons system and military involvement and to support such wrong-headed ideas as

the nuclear freeze.


As a consequence, the Democratic Party came to be viewed as unreliable on defense and foreign policy issues, helping to doom such Democratic nominees as Walter Mondale and Michael Dukakis.

Republicans now are in danger of reacting to the end of the Cold War in an extremist way that mirrors the Democrats after Vietnam. Superhawks want to sustain a sense of high-alert and are looking for new enemies to do so.

That partly accounts for the tendency of hawk Republicans to make China, certainly a difficult country, into America's new strategic adversary. It is definitely behind the anti-CWC campaign.

Senate Foreign Relations Chairman Jesse Helms, R-N.C., is the congressional point man on superhawk politics, roughly equivalent to ex-Sen. George McGovern, S.D., or ex-Sen. Alan Cranston, Calif., on the Democratic side.

On CWC, the hawks have gained the support of such luminaries as former United Nations Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick and former Defense Secretaries James Schlesinger, Dick Cheney, Cap Weinberger and Don Rumsfeld.

## On-line moms tell it like it is

When the talk turns to internet surfers, one usually pictures a teen-age boy -- a boy who should be out playing softball or mowing the lawn, but who instead has spent the past four hours chatting in the Luke Skywalker room or trying to navigate into www.angry.com.

A boy who, in other words, is making his mother very, very angry.

Mothers are certainly justified in their concerns that their children are spending too much time in the virtual world and not enough in the real one. And no one would argue with the mom who doesn't want her child downloading this month's Playmate.

But that's not to say that all mothers see the Internet as an evil destroyer of family life. Quite the contrary. Some of the most sophisticated sites on the Internet these days are designed by and for mothers.

Whether it is a slick, professional site like The CyberMom Dot Com (www.thecybermom.com), where the discussions range from cloning sheep to making pot roast, or a more home-spun affair like Angry Mothers (ourworld.compuserve.com/homepages/RF/ankel), where visitors are invited to "complain away," the Internet provides a virtual water cooler for moms of all stripes. Moms Online (momsonline.com), for example, hosts discussions on hot topics such as "To Work or Not to Work" and "Martha Stewart: Clean Angel or Attila the Home Maker?"

The Internet also offers a community for those with special needs. From deadly serious topics such as coping with a rare childhood disease, to more mundane problems such as handling a toddler who diaries in public, no problem is so obscure that the inquiring mother won't be able to find other parents with similar experiences.

"There's a great community out there of parents who share their knowledge, tips and secrets," writes the editor of Bored Mom (www.cyberus.ca/~7Ecmclaren/karen.html), who uses her page to inform parents about the recalls of baby- and child-related goods. And perhaps best of all, the Internet has mothers' voices, uncut and unexpurgated: -- "I seem to be mad at the whole world," said a recent visitor to Angry Mothers. "And I think it's because I feel there is no method or system for my life around me. I have an 11-month-old son and a husband of nine years who really annoys me sometimes."

-- "Before I had the baby, I mouthed off about how I wanted to be the one who worked because I didn't think I would have the patience to stay home with a baby," said a Moms Online member. "Needless to say those words don't taste too good."

-- "As a stay-at-home mom, I find the days can get quite long even with the constant entertainment of my small son," writes the editor of Bored Mom.

Of course, the joys of parenting are discussed as much as the frustrations. A typical sentiment was expressed by a visitor to Parent Soup (www.parentsoup.com): "No matter how much I feel that it is me against the world, I can always look by my side and see that lovely smiling face telling me, 'I love you, Mommy.'"

## Chemical weapons vote is key

I am not surprised to see the nation's leading anti-Semite being legitimized by the media and some politicians. Last year, for example, Minister Louis Farrakhan was named by Time magazine as one of the 25 most influential Americans. Recently, columnist Robert Novak, not previously known for being easily impressionable, has said that the Republican Party would be strengthened if it opened the door to Farrakhan.

This does not surprise me because it has happened before. When I was a boy in Boston -- in the time of Father Charles E. Coughlin -- our mayor, James Michael Curley, proudly declared Boston to be "the strongest Coughlin city in America." This did not make the Jews in town feel wanted, but that was nothing new. During those years, as historian Alan Brinkley has noted, "in churches around the country, pastors rescheduled Sunday services so they would not conflict with [Coughlin's] radio discourses."

Coughlin preached that Jews were, by nature, conspirators and their aim was power -- over everything. I listened to him every Sunday afternoon. As angry -- and fearful -- as I was, I had to admit there was a musicality to his expression of hatred. The qualities of his voice were inviting and he was a master of dynamics.

Farrakhan is an even more musical speaker. When he was a calypso singer -- before hearing the call to pursue Jews -- he named himself The Charmer. Indeed, I have a recording of his then, "A White Man's Heaven is a Black Man's Hell," and I confess that when I first heard it, I was impressed by The Charmer's lyrical phrasing.

Farrakhan is also more skillful than Coughlin in defusing what might be a hostile situation. Last month, Mayor Edward Rendell of Philadelphia invited Farrakhan to speak at an interracial and interfaith rally. The city's Jewish and Christian leadership refused to join the ecumenical celebration and were chastised by the mayor for their resistance to racial harmony. Farrakhan benevolently said that as a Muslim, he is also Jewish and Christian, since the three faiths all come from Abraham.

Mayor Rendell is Jewish, and the front page of the New York Jewish weekly, the Forward, showed The Charmer, and the mayor, hand in hand, singing, of course, "We Shall Overcome."

As he is increasingly cleansed of being a pariah, Farrakhan appears more often on television shows where he is usually questioned rather gingerly. Once in a while, when a question does appear threatening, Farrakhan slips around the minefield, leaving it in front of his questioners.

Farrakhan, who cherishes his First Amendment rights, enjoys these interviews. At last, however, on the April 13 "Meet the Press," he met a journalist -- the host, Tim Russert -- who was not in the least intimidated by him.

Russert had done an impressive amount of research. Farrakhan, in addition to his customary riffs on the Jews (they control black people in this country) had to explain his cult-like beliefs to a national audience. Russert asked him if he does indeed believe that Yacub, a decidedly erratic black scientist, created the white man 6,000 years ago. That was the ex cathedra teaching of the previous leader of the Nation of Islam, Elijah Muhammad.

"I subscribe to every word," said Farrakhan, "that the Honorable Elijah Muhammad taught us." If Farrakhan gets to speak at the next Republican presidential convention, that illuminating history of how the white man came into existence should enliven the proceedings.

Farrakhan also believes that a spaceship the size of a city and bristlingly armed will, in time, pour destruction on white America, saving only the faithful followers of the Nation of Islam. Robert Novak and Mayor Rendell better duck when that happens.

Russert asked Farrakhan a question that I've been longing to put to him. Does he still believe, said Russert, "there's a small Jewish cabal that meets on Park Avenue or Hollywood and tries to shape our culture?"

Defensively Farrakhan answered: "I don't know why you would put that on me. I was quoting a Jewish movie producer in Jamaica, producing the movie 'Lost in the Stars,' who told me this. I didn't ask him."

But when Henry Louis Gates, in the New Yorker, asked Farrakhan the same question, he answered flatly, "I do believe that." Farrakhan had swerved round Russert, but Gates nailed him.

would have been muffled by the clownish tone of the picture. Yes, Bruce Willis is the star of *Fifth Element* and, in terms of his career, this film could be described as *Hudson Hawk, Part II*. Willis seems to be the blue collar hero again here. It is a typecast part he knows by heart. I was extremely happy to see him branch out in independent fare with *Pulp Fiction*, but, in this effort, he has regressed. The simply awe striking form

that is Russian born model Mila Jovovich (*Dazed and Confused*) plays Leeloo, a key to the destruction of the evil entity in the film. She is sort of a punkish looking Raggedy Ann with her orangish locks and she speaks in a rapid foreign language throughout the film that becomes a distraction. Speaking of distraction, Chris Tucker (*Friday*) wears thin after a few minutes into his performance as a squeaky, flamboyant deejay. Ian Holm (*Big Night*) as Cornelius and

Tommy "Tiny" Lister Jr. (*Barb Wire*) as President Lindberg round out the cast. Also Luke Perry (*Normal Life*) and John Neville (*The Adventures of Baron Munchausen*) make cameos.



operators received 82,684 calls for service. The center has five 9-1-1 lines, seven business lines, and four 9-1-1 public safety answering positions. The communications operators also monitor up to five different radio frequencies and dispatch from 20 to 40 various police units.

Also at the administration level, he is requesting one Clerk Typist II and three reclassifications/regrading of police communications operators to police communication lead operators.

Dillard is asking for 21 uniformed officers. Four each would be added to the bicycle patrol, community policing team and uniform squads. Others would be added to such operations as traffic, community relations, airport, and others.

Three officers are being requested under the classification of investigations. Two for investigations and one as property custodian/supply clerk.

For the bike division, Dillard wants four officers split into two-man teams, assigned primarily to the historic residential district and downtown Sanford. He said he feels the downtown assignments are necessary to help reduce the incidence of crime downtown, especially bur-

glaries and storage areas.

For the community oriented patrol officers, again, the four would be split into two teams, with assignment primarily in the 13th Street area of Goldsboro from French Avenue to Persimmon Avenue and adjacent neighborhoods, considered as a high crime area especially in street narcotic sales.

For the uniform division, there are presently four squads operating 24 hours a day, each consisting of seven officers. He is requesting one additional officer for each of the squads. The additional officers would prevent a loss of personnel due to illness or injuries. Dillard explained that at one point, through a combination of injuries and a resignation, one shift was left with only three officers, requiring a transfer and temporary assignments.

The Fraternal Order of Police has also recommended improved manpower for the police force in a number of areas.

The police proposal is included in other department requests for new employees, scheduled for discussion during Monday afternoon's Sanford City Commission work session, beginning at 3:30 p.m., in the city manager's conference room at city hall.

**Gypsies scheduled for bond hearing in burglary scams**

SANFORD — A bond hearing was scheduled for this morning for two gypsies arrested last March by sheriff's deputies.

Krystyna Ciborowska, 36, and Beata Budner, 35, have been held without bond in the John E. Polk Correctional Facility since their arrests. Ciborowska is charged with fleeing and attempting to elude and resisting arrest without violence. Budner is charged with burglary to a dwelling and possession of a fictitious ID card.

According to Ed McDonough, public information officer with the sheriff's department, the two women are considered as members of a gypsy clan that is believed responsible for a series of residential burglaries, mostly in southern Seminole County during the first three months of this year. Both claim to have emigrated from Poland to the United States, however no record of their entry into this country can be located.

Sheriff's office investigators have reportedly found that Ciborowska and Budner have each used possibly as many as 16 aliases since they have been in the United States. Records indicate Ciborowska has been arrested five times dating back to 1988 in California. Budner has been arrested nine times in New York, dating back to 1996.

McDonough said the Quebec, Canada Provincial Police are holding outstanding warrants on both of the women for property crimes. Police in New York City and Suffolk County, N.Y. also hold outstanding warrants on Budner for failing to appear.

In January, Judge S. Joseph Davis of Lake Mary, said that Hall, as a competent adult who is terminally ill, had the right to physician-assisted suicide despite a 119-year-old statute that outlaws helping someone commit suicide. Davis based this ruling on the privacy provision in the state constitution.

The state appealed the ruling, and four months later continued to search for a solution. This issue is also before the U.S. Supreme Court. Is there a federal right to assisted suicide? Could the right be recognized in Florida, where one of every five residents is 65-years-old or more.

Hall seemed pleased Thursday when Chief Justice Gerald Kogan asked state attorney Thompson whether people who want to commit suicide because they are dying in great pain and have no hope for recovery have the right to die the way they desire. Thompson's reply was that he believed a person can do things himself.

That's the crux of the issue. Yes, Charles Hall can commit suicide on his own but he can not get a lethal injection from his doctor. That would be against the law. Dr. Cecil Melver, an internist from Jupiter, agreed to help Hall, but cannot do so unless the state rules in favor of physician-assisted suicide.

There is strong opposition to physician-assisted suicide. Most religious groups are opposed as are those who argue that thousands of terminally ill people might be pressured to seek an early death because they feel like burdens on their families or society.

Robert Rivas, a Boca Raton attorney who represents Hall, believes his client has articulately enlightened the public and those in the legal profession. His case has produced a historic decision made by Judge Davis and is a definite power for the state Supreme Court. Justice Harry Lee Anstead withdrew from the case Thursday without comment.

underwear, I sailed forth on my bold adventure.

Down dusty, pot holed roads. Through towns so small the welcome sign faces both directions, my trusty 4X4 carried me. (Actually I own an Escort Wagon, but I have it convinced that it's a 4X4)

My method is simple. I drive, I stop, I look. If a place appeals to me I stay. On this particular trip, I found a lot of places I did not want to stay.

One "town" in particular frightened me. The name of the place has been buried in my subconscious. (no doubt an act of self preservation) Still, the image is as clear in my mind as it was the day it was etched there. Four teen-age boys, no doubt related by both birth and marriage, standing in the middle of the dusty street. Two pairs of boots, three pairs of jeans, one set of overalls and maybe 32 teeth between them. They turned and stared as I drove by - "Ain't from round here, is ya?" Sorry boys, no time to stop and chat. (Are my doors and windows locked?) Yup.

Forward now, across Highway 40 to the campground that isn't. The sign says "Campground" yet I would swear no one on the property had been there less than 10 years. A miniature zoo stands in front of the registration office. A parrot, a rabbit and a couple of chicks round out the collection. A dog scratches himself then rolls on the dusty street. I check the available tent sites. Too crowded. Too strange. Still, strange in a nice way. Sort of like Mayberry before it got to be such a big city.

North now, up Highway 415 to Fort McCoy. The sun is setting. A huge orange ball backlights the trees creating a million tiny blazes. A kind old woman has called ahead to the Oklawaha River Outpost, warning them of my impending arrival. Funny, this is a place I know. For nearly a year I have been planning a trip here and never found the time. I hadn't planned on coming here this trip - too far from home for an overnighter. Still, here I was.

After a brief look around, I set up camp. Following the mandatory camp meal of beanie-weenies, I strolled

down to the river. The water was dark, but the sky was brilliant. The stars were so bright, so beautiful, they seemed placed in the heavens for my own personal enjoyment. After what seemed like hours of staring at the sky, I returned to my tent.

In the morning, the owner of the campground drove me up stream about eight miles to Gore's Landing, a public park along the Oklawaha River, about midway between the Highway 40 bridge and the Highway 415 bridge, where I was camped. After unloading my rented kayak, we spoke for a few minutes before I slipped in to the cool, clear water.

Having spent a good deal of time on the "rivers" in Central Florida i.e.: the Wekiwa, I was thrilled by the idea of floating on a river which did not require me to get out and push the canoe because the water was low. The Oklawaha averages about 30 feet in depth along the stretch I was traveling. It is a beautiful river for touring and there are a number of ideal campsites along the banks.

The waters of the Oklawaha are crystal clear for the first several miles after the influx of the Silver River near the Highway 40 bridge. The bridge is an ideal put in point for a two or three day trip, with a take out point at the Oklawaha Canoe Outpost. The Outpost will provide canoes, kayaks, camping gear or whatever else you require for the trip. They also provide drop off and pick up service for those with their own canoes.

As I drifted with the gentle current, I reflected on my journey. I had left behind not only a physical place, but also a state of mind. No longer burdened by the cares of "modern civilization" I was free to enjoy the beauty of the Earth the way God intended.

Once again, the road trip had set me free - both physically and spiritually. If you have never experienced the joys of road trippin', I encourage you to do so. Not some day - today. Don't plan, don't pack, just go.

For those of you who just have to have a destination, Oklawaha Outpost is located on County Road 316 in Fort McCoy. To get there from Sanford, take Highway 17 north to State Road 40 and go west

about 30 miles to the intersection of CR 316. Follow 316 north to the Outpost, which is located just before the 316 bridge. For more information call (352) 236-4606.

### PHARMACY TOPICS

Why do we forget? Neuroscientists at Stanford University found that prolonged stress actually can shrink the hippocampus by as much as 20 percent. That's the part of the brain that helps people recall names and addresses. Damage can be permanent in some.

Patients with heart disease, blood pressure or angina can be helped to avoid cardiac complications after noncardiac surgery if they are given the beta-blocker atenol before and after surgery, the *New England Journal of Medicine* reports.

Dental alert: because the hormones in birth control pills may cause gums to swell and bleed, it's smart to schedule oral surgery during a menstrual period, when pills contain no hormones.

Covering a cut seems to improve healing and reduce infection, say researchers at Stanford University. Greasy creams like petroleum jelly, with a bandage wrapped over, lock in moisture and keep the cut more flexible.

First, take two sheets of paper and write down all the reasons you are better off staying here with your dad on one sheet, then why you'd be better off living with your mom on the other. Then, on the back of each sheet write

down the disadvantages of living with each one. Let the decision emerge as you review the sheets.

If you decide you want to live with your mom, call her and tell her that you will tell your dad as soon as you receive an airline ticket from her. You may want to have a trusted relative or adult friend with you when you tell your dad. Be sure to tell him you love him, but a teenage girl needs her mom. Remember, as we grow up, it becomes our job to look after our own well-being. Your parents will learn to cope with whatever you decide.



The antibacterial clean-up

DEAR DR. GOTT: For routine hand-washing, what is the advantage of antibacterial cleansers over just plain old soap?

DEAR READER: Soap merely loosens oil on the skin and allows it to be washed away. Because bacteria and dirt are embedded in this oil, soap cleanses the skin — but it doesn't necessarily kill micro-organisms.

On the other hand, some cleansers containing anti-bacterial compounds act both as an antiseptic and an oil-remover, a useful combination in certain instances where thorough cleaning is essential, such as in preparation for surgery.

For routine hand-washing, plain soap is appropriate. For additional, special anti-bacterial cleansing, the more "high-powered" products are preferred.

DEAR DR. GOTT: Following successful radiation treatments for prostate cancer in 1992, I did well. However, about two years ago, I began experiencing episodes of painless bleeding in my urine.

After performing kidney X-rays and cystoscopy, my urologist assured me that nothing is wrong. But the bleeding persists — for about two days every month or so. Should I get a second opinion?

DEAR READER: Bloody urine (hematuria) is always a concern to doctors because it could reflect a growth in the urinary tract, infection or kidney stones. Patients taking anti-coagulant drugs may have hematuria. Also, many blood disorders, such as leukemia, can cause bloody urine.

Your urologist has appropriately investigated the possibility of tumors, both benign and malignant.

However, I believe that he prematurely reassured you. The investigation is not complete. You should have blood tests and a urine culture, at least, along with periodic determinations of PSA, a blood test used to detect prostate cancer.

Because two heads are usually better than one in diagnosing challenging ailments, I endorse your idea of a second opinion. If no other good comes from it, at least the consultant will be able to confirm that nothing is wrong and that the cause of your bleeding is probably insignificant, such as an irritated blood vessel.

DEAR DR. GOTT: I'm concerned that my daughter, who uses the tip of her finger as a pacifier for her new baby, may be putting the child at risk. Am I an overanxious grandmother?

DEAR READER: Many new par-

ents engage in the practice you describe. While not necessarily a health hazard, it could — in theory — introduce dangerous bacteria into the baby's mouth, especially if the mother's finger were dirty. I'd point this out to your daughter and then back off.

My personal opinion is that using an adult finger for a pacifier is probably unwise; perhaps a regular pacifier (which can be kept clean) is a more appropriate option.

DEAR READER: It works. Thanks for writing.

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



WIN AT BRIDGE

Which day was that?

Here is a joke from the British comedy duo of Eric Morecambe and Ernie Wise.

Ernie: Why don't you wash your face? I can see what you had for breakfast this morning!

Eric: Oh, yeah? What did I have?

Ernie: Bacon and eggs and tomato sauce (ketchup).

Eric: Wrong! That was yesterday morning!

How far back do you remember bridge deals? One minute, one hour, one day, one month, one year, one decade, one lifetime? Play some deals, then take a break and see how well you can remember the locations of the key cards. If you can recall most or all of them, you were concentrating properly.

South needed to remember how of-

ten West followed in three suits in today's deal. That told him how to play the fourth, spades.

North's four clubs was the Gerber convention, asking for aces. This should be used only when partner's last bid was either one no trump or two no trump.

After winning the diamond lead in the dummy, South played a club to his king and West's ace. Back came another diamond. Correctly leaving spades to last, declarer cashed his remaining winners in hearts, diamonds and clubs. He learned that West had started with two hearts, five diamonds and two clubs. This meant he had exactly four spades. The way home had become clear. Instead of taking the a priori percentage play for four tricks of playing out the three top honors, South cashed his ace and queen before leading a spade to dummy's 10, knowing the finesse would work.

South remembered to bore people for weeks about this deal!
