





Is the nation losing its sense of humor, its ability to asp and appreciate a pointed bit of satire? Sen. Ralph E Flanders of Vermont may wonder. Intending to illustrate to fellow members of the Senate Finance Committee how silly he thought it would be to aprove a proposed federal "luxury" tax on mechanical pencils, he proposed that a similar tax be put on neckties. He said he was only being satirical.
