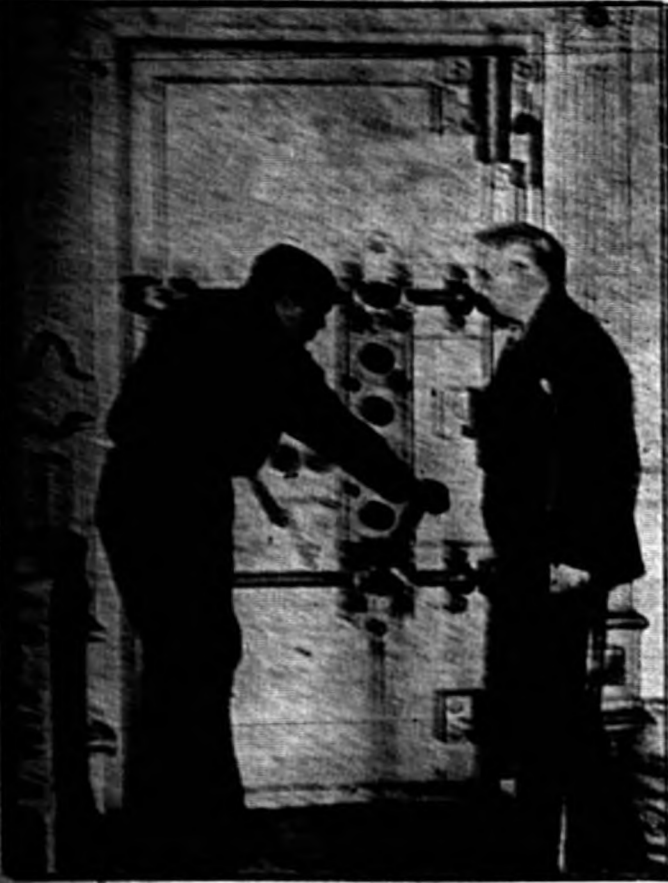

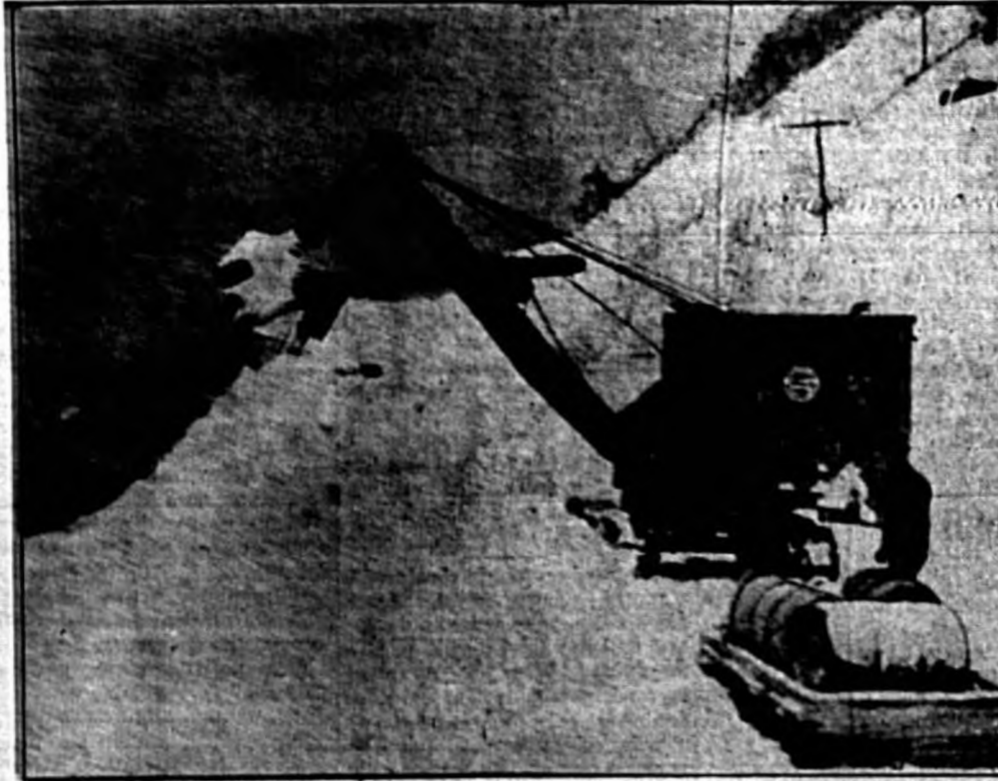

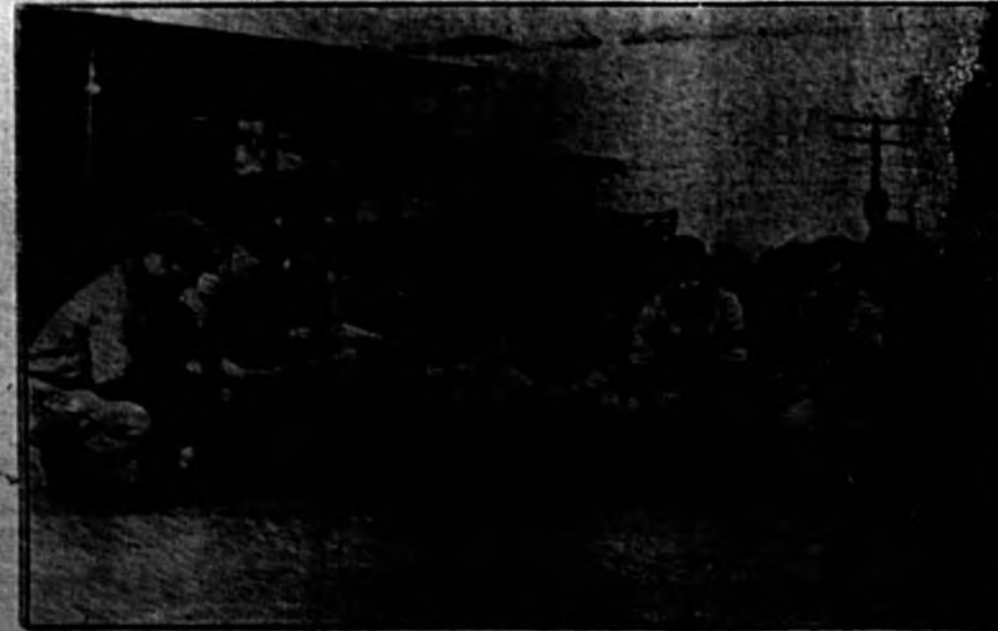

## Tax Adjusting Success Is Up To Lot Owners

New Board Will Not Function Long If Only Slight Interest Is Apparent

## 21 Applications Being Considered

Those Delinquent In Payment Of Taxes Are Urged To File

Readjustment of delinquent tax assessments will be tried by the Sanford City Commission, sitting as a tax adjustment board, as long as there is apparent interest on the part of those who are delinquent in the payment of their back taxes, but the life of the new board will depend to a large extent upon whether citizens avail themselves of the opportunity offered.

This was the decision reached last night at the first meeting of the Municipal Tax Adjustment Board, composed of members of the City Commission.

"If there are very little signs of interest showing the board will simply cease to function," was the explanation of the board's position as given by City Clerk F. S. Lamson. "For this reason the Commission strongly urged prompt action by those who wish to make applications for adjustments."

Twenty-one applications for adjustment of back taxes owing to the City were considered last night. All were gone into thoroughly, but action was deferred for a week, after which time it is expected that many more applications will be filed. Blank forms on which such applications are made can be had at City Hall.

## Paty For Change In Constitution On Two-Man Jobs

Declaring against "waste, de-politization and two-man jobs" in Florida, B. F. Paty, first to announce his candidacy for governor in this year's election, told an audience on the streets last night that he favors writing into the State Constitution an amendment which would prohibit any member of the State Legislature from accepting any office or position with the state during the period to which he was elected. However, he does not intend to ask legislators to propose such an amendment as he declared that "I am not asking favors of a member of the Legislature or of any other man."

While the State Supreme Court has recently held that a legislator can legally hold another state office, Mr. Paty said that the position is indefensible and that he will "debate the question with any man, anywhere." He asserted that the edge that he can carry two masters "is true today, and that it is 'positively wrong' for a lawmaker to create a position and then himself take the job he created.

## Control Over Shipments Of Citrus Asked

Granting Of Federal Power To Board In Regulating Industry To Be Sought

LAKELAND, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Grant of federal powers to the Florida Citrus Commission to regulate marketing of fruit in other states was requested by the citrus industry of the state in an all day conference here. As finally adopted, the new agreement would empower the commission to act as a control board and say how much fruit can be shipped in any given period to bring the highest price, and to limit shipment of small size fruit when it would endanger the price of higher quality citrus.

As the hearing ended late yesterday a staff of 10 representatives of the Federal Department of Agriculture, armed with a transcript of the complete proceedings, planned to return immediately to Washington. If Wallace approves the agreement, it will come back to Florida for ratification of the industry. To become effective, it must be approved by at least 50 percent of the citrus shippers and two-thirds of the growers.

There was little indication from the floor of flat opposition to any system of regulation, although two citrus men telegraphed the federal men that they disapproved.

"Any regulation will be headed straight for Federal Court," telegraphed A. M. Prevatt of Seville, "that takes away the constitutional right of the grower to sell and move his fruit as he sees fit."

## Rebels Refuse To Return To Army Barracks

Authorities Hope To Avert Bloodshed In Tokyo; Appropriate Measures Are Taken

TOKYO, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Lieutenant General Kohsei Kazumi, assigned by the Japanese government to put down the military rebellion with martial law announced tonight that his forces, surrounding the rebels, were taking "appropriate measures." Meanwhile the rebels were still holding the Nagaticho section of Tokyo. The city was quiet except for that section, and peace and order prevailed throughout the country, the general said.

The soldiers who assassinated four of the nation's leading elder statesmen defied the deadline set for their return to their own barracks and held their ground in the heart of Tokyo. Breaking their agreement to evacuate by 8 A. M., 1,000 rebels maintained their grip on government buildings against a force of more than 4,000 loyal troops.

Emperor Hirohito persisted in his negotiations for a new government to replace that of the assassinated Premier, Kamekida Okada, with Imperial princes and officers of the army in high command wielding predominant influence.

## Mid-Season Fruit Is Cleaning Up Rapidly

ORLANDO, Feb. 28.—Mid-season fruit is "cleaning up" reasonably fast and Valencia oranges are beginning to move to market in "a small way," R. A. Fender, citrus sales manager for American Fruit Growers, declared this week after a survey.

He said that bloom in groves was beginning to "open wide" on his trip about the state and declared he found this condition particularly noticeable in the groves of Valencia oranges.

## Wilentz Won't Halt Reprieve To Hauptmann

Attorney General Of New Jersey Will Allow Governor To Make Own Decision

TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 28.—(AP)—An authoritative source said today that Attorney General David T. Wilentz, chief prosecutor of Bruno Richard Hauptmann, will not oppose a second reprieve for the convicted slayer of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's first son, Wilentz, the source said, will neither oppose a reprieve nor consent to it, but will stand aside and let Governor Harold G. Hoffman make his own decision whether to delay further Hauptmann's death sentence, without interference from the attorney general's office.

Wilentz will remain passive on the governor's contention that more than one person was implicated in the crime, that testimony of some state witnesses would bear closer scrutiny and that prosecution officials have withheld important information in the case.

Hauptmann's sentence will be executed during the week of Mar. 30, unless the governor grants another reprieve. The first stay came Jan. 16, just 29 hours before Hauptmann was scheduled to be executed. Governor Hoffman yesterday attacked the testimony of another identification witness against Bruno Richard Hauptmann and, through that man's statements, the testimony of Dr. John F. (Jafese) Condon, Lindbergh ransom intermediary.

Dr. Condon testified he saw the kidnaper only three times: First, when he talked to him at Woodlawn Cemetery, The Bronx; again when he paid the ransom at St. Raymond's Cemetery, The Bronx, and the last time through the window of a bus in The Bronx.

## 'Fall Guy' Won't Be Sentenced By Judge In Miami

MIAMI, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Declaring he would "quit the bench" first, Judge B. C. Willard refused to sentence Thomas Hurley, New York race horse trainer, on doping charges in criminal court here because he said it was admitted Hurley was the "fall guy" for a horse owner.

After Hurley pleaded guilty in charges of using caffeine to stimulate the horse Payrack at Hialeah Park Jan. 24, Glenn C. Mincer, assistant county solicitor, said similar charges would be dropped against Benjamin Davidson of Brighton, Mass., owner of the horse.

Mincer then asked the court to fine Hurley the minimum of \$1,000 for violating the state racing law. Judge Willard declared "I am not going to fine this trainer the minimum of \$1,000 when it is admitted in court that he is the 'fall guy,' and that the owner is guilty."

"If the owner is guilty, I'll quit the bench before I will fine this man with such facts before the court?"

Afterwards, Mincer said the horse owner would be tried. Both Hurley and Davidson were ruled off Florida tracks for life by the State Racing Commission.

## President Projects Billion Dollar Tax To Take Up Deficit

Committee Named To Inquire Into Hagood's Removal

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The Senate military affairs committee today named a sub-committee of three to consider the metalf resolution proposing an investigation of the removal of Major General Johnson Hagood from command of the Eighth Army Corps area after he criticized federal spending policies.

Senator Logan, Democrat, Ky., was given the chairmanship. The other members are Senators Duffey, Democrat, Wis., and Caryl, Republican, Wyo. Chairman Shepard, Democrat, Tex., said the decision to send the resolution to a sub-committee followed a general discussion but "without arguments on the merits of the case." The sub-committee reports Friday.

General Hagood formally relinquished command of the Eighth Corps Area and the Third Army at San Antonio, Tex., yesterday as congressional friends here failed to have his "punishment" set aside or modified.

Hagood requested—and was granted—permission to remain in San Antonio one month to settle private affairs and make final reports as commanding general. Under the original orders Hagood was ordered to his home in Columbia, S. C., to await further instructions.

In a two hour conference with Secretary Dern and General Craig yesterday, Senator Byrnes, Chairman McSwain, of the House Military Affairs Committee and Representative Blanton, a frequent critic of the War Department, made an unsuccessful effort to have Hagood's "punishment" mitigated.

## Scotti, Metropolitan Opera Star, Is Dead

ROME, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Antonio Scotti, 70, noted baritone, died Wednesday. Death came to the former Metropolitan Opera star at Naples, his winter home, to which he retired after he made his final bow on the Metropolitan stage three years ago. Scotti was buried today in the Naples cemetery. He had suffered from a complication of diseases.

Strangely enough, no Italian newspaper published the news story of his death, although friends said there was no trouble between him and the Fascist regime.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Miss Josephine Roche, assistant secretary of the Treasury, heads the list of speakers announced for a Democratic women's conference to be held in Tampa, Fla., Mar. 19 and 20.

Mrs. James H. Wolfe, director of the women's division of the Democratic National Committee also will speak, and Mrs. Charles W. Tillet, Jr., of Raleigh, N. C., will lead the discussion. Mrs. Horstene K. Wallis, Florida's national committeewoman will sponsor the meeting.

## Favors \$500,000,000 Permanent Tax And An Equal Amount On Temporary Basis

\$1,125,000,000 Hole In Treasury New Borrowings Will Shove Debt Above 31 Billion Dollars

WASHINGTON, Feb. 28.—(AP)—A combination tax program to raise \$500,000,000 annually on a permanent basis and \$500,000,000 more on a temporary basis of from one to three years was projected today by President Roosevelt. He told the press conference that the form of taxes and the rates will be left to Congress, but emphasized his view that temporary levies could be met through means taxes. Taxes are necessitated, he said, because of the passage of the bonus law and the Supreme Court decision invalidating the AAA. These actions, he said, opened a \$1,125,000,000 gap in the treasury. The President said he believed a retroactive tax would work a hardship and would not be constitutional.

The tax program was drafted at a conference last night between the President and congressional leaders. Those trying to talk over the program with the Chief Executive were Vice President Garner, Speaker Hynes, Senator Barkley (D., Ky.), Chairman Harrison (D., Miss.) of the Senate Finance Committee, Representative Bankhead (D., Ala.), majority leader in the House, and Representative Samuel B. Hill (D., Wash.).

Secretary Morgenthau announced that mid-March would find the Treasury borrowing not only \$1,000,000,000 to retire maturing securities, but an additional \$800,000,000 of ready cash. The new borrowing will shove the national debt to a new record peak—roughly \$31,300,000,000.

This is for the reason that on Mar. 15, the treasury plans to borrow \$559,000,000 with which it will retire an equivalent amount of securities maturing on Apr. 15. On the latter date, the debt will revert to \$31,300,000,000 level. In addition to the \$800,000,000 in new borrowing and the \$559,000,000 to meet Apr. 15 maturities, \$450,000,000 will be sought to meet an equivalent amount of securities coming due then.

## Thrilling Rescue Is Watched By Hundreds

MIAMI, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Frank H. Allen, his son and two other Elmiras, N. Y., fishermen, were rescued at considerable risk last night by a cutter from the U. S. Coast Guard, after their cabin cruiser was holed by waves of Baker's Hall-ofer, exposing them to imminent danger of capsizing.

M. Simmons of Benson, Ill., and L. E. Ogle of Oklahoma, offered the rescue, in their cabin cruiser El Puma.

Roaring up to the channel mouth in their own boat, the two men found the other craft being dashed helplessly between pilings and bridge foundations, seemingly unable to capsize. A rope they got placed her broke, nearly upping both craft over, and it was not until Ogle managed to swing the cutter rope over that the distressed crew could be towed to safety.

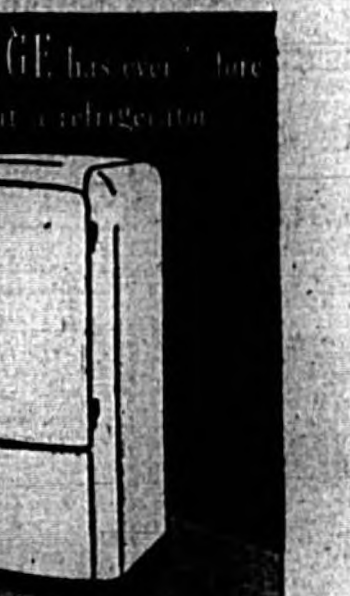

Shorter Hunting Season Proposed By State Council

Bears And Alligators Need Protection, In Opinion Of Member

ORLANDO, Feb. 28.—(AP)—The Florida Conservation Council recommended that the state hunting season be shortened to end Jan. 20. It named as an objective statewide protection for alligators and the establishing of a closed season on black bears.

Other objectives named by the group included:

- 1. Establishing a closed season on black bass during two months of the spawning season, the dates to differ in various parts of Florida.
2. Reduction of the bag limit on black bass from 12 to eight.
3. Legislation making it compulsory for every Florida citizen 15 years of age or older to purchase a fresh water fishing license including his home county.
4. Legislation banning the sale or transportation of tarpon, channel bass and snook.
5. Legislation making it illegal to use a seine or net in fresh water except with permission of the State Conservation Department.
6. Legislation making it illegal to carry a shotgun or rifle in Florida woods after the hunting season is ended.
The group decided to establish headquarters at Leesburg, home of Chairman, David Newell.

...of declaration made by Mr. Paty in his address which touched on many angles of state government, but he laid particular stress on the two-man jobs and his "unqualified opposition" to making "deals" with legislators who are sent to Tallahassee as agents for the people and not to seek their own personal advancement.

Before the political speech the candidate's sound apparatus carried to people on the street the strains of "I Am Your

### Lucky Star" which Mr. Paty said is his "theme song."

"I have but one pledge to make you," he said, "and that is a decent, honest administration of this state's affairs. I haven't run around all over this state consulting the politicians to see what I could say and do, and so far as I know no one has urged me to run. I have just come out with the idea that a candidate who did not make so many false promises that cannot be kept and who has honest aims and intends to give this state a decent, clean administration would be refreshing to the voters."

"I do not intend to bombard you with political claptrap or promise you \$3 or \$5 some tags," he said. "The last is a thing within the province of the legislators and not the governor, who can, by recommending passage of laws to the legislature, I do say in this connection, I would like as much as any of you to see a low priced tag, but I will not interfere with any proven source of revenue for schools, and the tag money goes to schools, unless another sure, adequate source to supplant it is found. None of the constitutional amendments I favor will become law, however, if I have to buy the legislature to do it, for I don't intend to pay legislators to do their duty."

If elected, Paty said, he will be the biggest tattletale that ever sat in the governor's chair, carrying the story about the state's business to the people by radio or some other practical means of communication. If the legislators act in bad faith, I shall tell it on them," he said.

### Hitler Not Present At Sister's Wedding

RADEBEUL, Germany, Feb. 22. (AP)—Chancellor Adolf Hitler's sister is a bride, and the reichsheer did not get to the ceremony.

For six days, it was disclosed, the former Frau Angela Rabinowitch has been the wife of Dr. Martin Hammanich, director of the State Architectural School.

Officials denied the marriage had taken place, but the Rev. Mr. Straube, who officiated at their ceremony in Berlin Feb. 20, let out the information that presence of state business prevented Hitler's attending.

### Tiniest Star Of All Discovered Nearest To Earth

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Feb. 22.—The tiniest heavenly body known to astronomers, only one-third of a mile across, has been photographed by the Harvard College Observatory, according to an announcement by Dr. Harlow Shapley, director of the observatory.

The body, only 1-30,000th as large as the earth, was discovered Feb. 15 by a European astronomer, but news of the find was not made public until Dr. Shapley's announcement.

The tiny body when first observed was within two or three million miles of the earth, which, with the exception of one or two comets, is closer than any other such object has ever come. Harvard astronomers estimate its weight to be 400,000,000 tons, or about that of a small mountain.

### Government May Get Forgotten Vault Cash

CHICAGO, Feb. 22.—(AP)—The government—state and federal—stands to benefit nearly \$100,000 in forgotten cash and valuables here.

The treasure is being retrieved from 400 safety deposit boxes, some of them unopened for almost a score of years, at workmen demolish steel vaults erected in the Capitol building in 1892.

According to Attorney Bernard Allen Fried, counsel for the wrestling company, the property will be turned over to the federal or state governments, unless the owners fail to identify it.

## \$15,947 Added To School Fund Of The County

This brings the school year's total of state funds to \$75,962.97, as T. W. Lawton, superintendent of schools, reports that previous allocations amounted to \$59,985.82.

The total appropriation today of state funds to the public schools was \$1,153,056.34, bringing the current year's total distribution to \$6,014,555.00.

Payments so far to the public school fund have not included any revenue from chain store taxes, although \$375,000 has been collected and held in trust, pending the Supreme Court decision. Estimates here placed the chain store revenue at \$2,750,000.

While the chain store law was still in the courts, Governor Phelan and other state officials pledged payment of \$6,000,000 of the Legislature's appropriation of \$10,500,000. If the \$9,000,000 is paid, \$2,500,000 still must be provided.

Approximately \$1,000,000 of this is expected from automobile license.

Among the estates on which tax payments become due this year is that of Alfred J. DuPont, Jacksonville financier, who died last April.

The state's general revenue fund, out of which state governmental expenses are paid, was drawn upon for \$600,000 of today's school fund. Previously \$500,000 came from this source.

Other sources of the appropriation were \$493,157.08 from an excise license, and \$19,902.76 from the one mill tax. Amounts to each county will be determined today by the Department of Education.

There have been no transfer funds, the state comptroller's office said, in order to make the school appropriation. There are surpluses available for transfers in several state funds, including about \$400,000 in the Confederate pension fund. Such transfers can be made, however, only on subject to appropriation.

## Most Rain In February For Sixteen Years

Precipitation More Than Three Times Normal For Month In This Locality

February of this year has been the wettest February in 16 years, it was reported by G. P. Paxton, custodian of the United States Weather Bureau thermometer. The precipitation this month was 6.77 inches, more than three times the normal February rainfall. Normal is 2.16 inches. The excess above normal for the month was 4.61 inches, or nearly two inches more than three times the usual rainfall recorded for February.

The only other year in which the February rainfall exceeded six inches was in 1923 when a precipitation of 6.48 inches was recorded, one-quarter inch less than the precipitation in February of 1936.

The driest February was that of 1929 when the rain gauge showed a precipitation of only .26 of an inch. February, 1923, had only .35 of an inch rainfall. The months of February in the years of 1931-32-33 were all dry, .57 of an inch in February, 1931, only .34 in February of the following year, and .98 in February of 1933.

## Impeachment Proceedings Against Judge Ritter To Be Called In House Next Week

Four Charges Filed Faces Impeachment Against U. S. Judge Sitting In Miami

WASHINGTON, Feb. 29.—(AP)—Impeachment proceedings against Federal Judge Howard L. Ritter of Miami probably will be called up in the House of Representatives during the first week of March. Chairman Sumners of the House Judiciary committee who introduced the impeachment resolution for the committee said it would be brought up next week.

Four articles of impeachment are made against Judge Ritter, who is charged with accepting large fees and gratuities from persons who had business in his court. If the House adopts the resolution it will go to the Senate for consideration on whether it is to be made final. Impeachment was proposed for "misbehavior, and for high crimes and misdemeanors" in office by Judge Ritter, a Republican who was appointed by President Coolidge and was qualified as a United States judge on Feb. 15, 1929.

NEW YORK, Feb. 29.—(AP)—A \$30,000 Stradivarius violin, mysteriously stolen from a Carnegie Hall dressing room, was sought by police today in the belief it had been snatched for ransom.

The "Strad," favorite instrument of the Polish violinist, Bronislaw Huberman, disappeared from a double case in the artist's dressing room while he was playing a concert last night.

Because of the conspicuous design of the instrument, insured by Lloyd's for about \$30,000, and its small disposal value to the thief, police said they were sure it was being held for ransom. It was the second time the "Strad" has been stolen. In 1919 a thief made off with it in Vienna, but it was promptly recovered and the thief sentenced to three years in prison.
