Holdup may be 9th by polite robber

LONGWOOD - A brazen intruder looking for a pot o' gold picked St. Patrick's Day to rob the First Union Bank at State Road 434 and U.S. Highway 17-92.

Lt. Butch Yelvington, commander of the Investigative Unit of the Longwood Police Department, said the robber is a suspect in 9 holdups in the Seminole, Orange and Osceola county area.

"No one knows his name but we've got some good surveillance film on him," Yelvington said. "He's a black or Hispanic male with a mustache and close cropped hair - and is the same suspect in a string of robberies."

SANFORD - A 13-year old Sanford girl has been the target of sexually oriented letters as a result of an ad placed in an adult magazine. Jamie Howington has been inundated with correspondences from men across the state including St. Petersburg and Wildwood.

Commander Ray Bronson of the Sanford Police Department said that police are currently tracking down the publication and who took out the advertising. The police are also contacting the writers of the letters to ascertain if they knew Jamie's age.

According to Janet Howington, mother of Jamie, there are seven letters in all. One man has stated that he would set

Lake Mary focuses on neighborhood amenities

Park gains pine trees

LAKE MARY - One of the prettiest parks in Lake Mary is Liberty Park, located off south Country Club Road. Work is now under way to make it even prettier with the addition of more trees.

"We lost a lot of pines because of the high water out there," said Parks and Recreation Director John Holland. "Now we are putting in some new trees which, in some cases, will be replacements, but in others, will add to the natural appearance of the park."

Holland said parks crews are presently adding as many as 75 different size pine trees. "Many of them are being used as replacements for posts we've had at the park," Holland explained. "What they will do is help control vehicular traffic; to prevent vehicles from being driven off the main paved parking area, but we'll use trees rather than the posts which are much more attractive."

Liberty Park is considered as both active and passive. There is a lengthy side-railed dock for walking, many children's play areas and several covered picnic areas. Additionally, there are picnic tables elsewhere in the park as well as modern restrooms facilities. There is also an open field where softball or other field games can be played. There are also many areas for fishermen.

Sanford airs concerns over school proposal

LAKE MARY - Government approvals for the proposed private school, Learning Unlimited International, still have not been finalized. Ordinances and requests pertaining to approving the development are scheduled to come back before the commission this Thursday night for the sixth consecutive meeting.

The area being proposed in-

volves 10 acres of land on the west side of Rantoul Lane, approximately 2,000 feet north of Country Club Road and adjacent to the Lake Mary Sports Complex. Directly across Rantoul Lane is Sanford's Mayfair Country Club golf course.

The 10 acres is presently designated to accommodate cluster and patio homes, duplexes, single family mobile home subdivisions or single-family detached housing units. Most of the changes now being requested involve changing the future land use map to allow the establishment of schools, libraries, government buildings and other facilities.

The city's Local Planning Agency (LPA) has recommended the concept be approved, but not until a commitment is made to pave Rantoul Lane within three years after the school is open.

Meanwhile, Sanford City

Manager Bill Simmons has submitted a list of concerns Sanford's Engineering Department has determined connected with the proposed school development. As the property is across from the Mayfair, there is concern regarding drainage improvements, right-of-way use for paving, the intersection of Rantoul with SR-46A (W. 25th Street), and other matters.

The developer has submitted a number of proposals to the city in hopes that the agreement may finally be resolved for the school.

Another long-standing matter coming back for the commission's consideration once again is a request for Sandy Ridge, a planned unit development of 23.58 acres at the southwest corner of Rinehart Road and SR-46A. That request has been postponed at the

Take a step back in time at DeBary Hall Spring Festival

DeBARY - This weekend's Spring Festival at DeBary Hall promises to be the largest event of its kind held at the historic DeBary Mansion. "We have many new events scheduled this year," said Ann Fetters, vice president of the DeBary festival event.

The DeBary Hall Mansion is located on Sunrise Boulevard with the event to be held from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. this Saturday and Sunday, March 21 and 22.

The celebration has been going on for a half dozen years, and Fetters estimated possibly 3,000 persons visited the hall during last year's program. "We have had the festival for a two-day weekend for the past two years," she said, "and this year we expect probably the largest

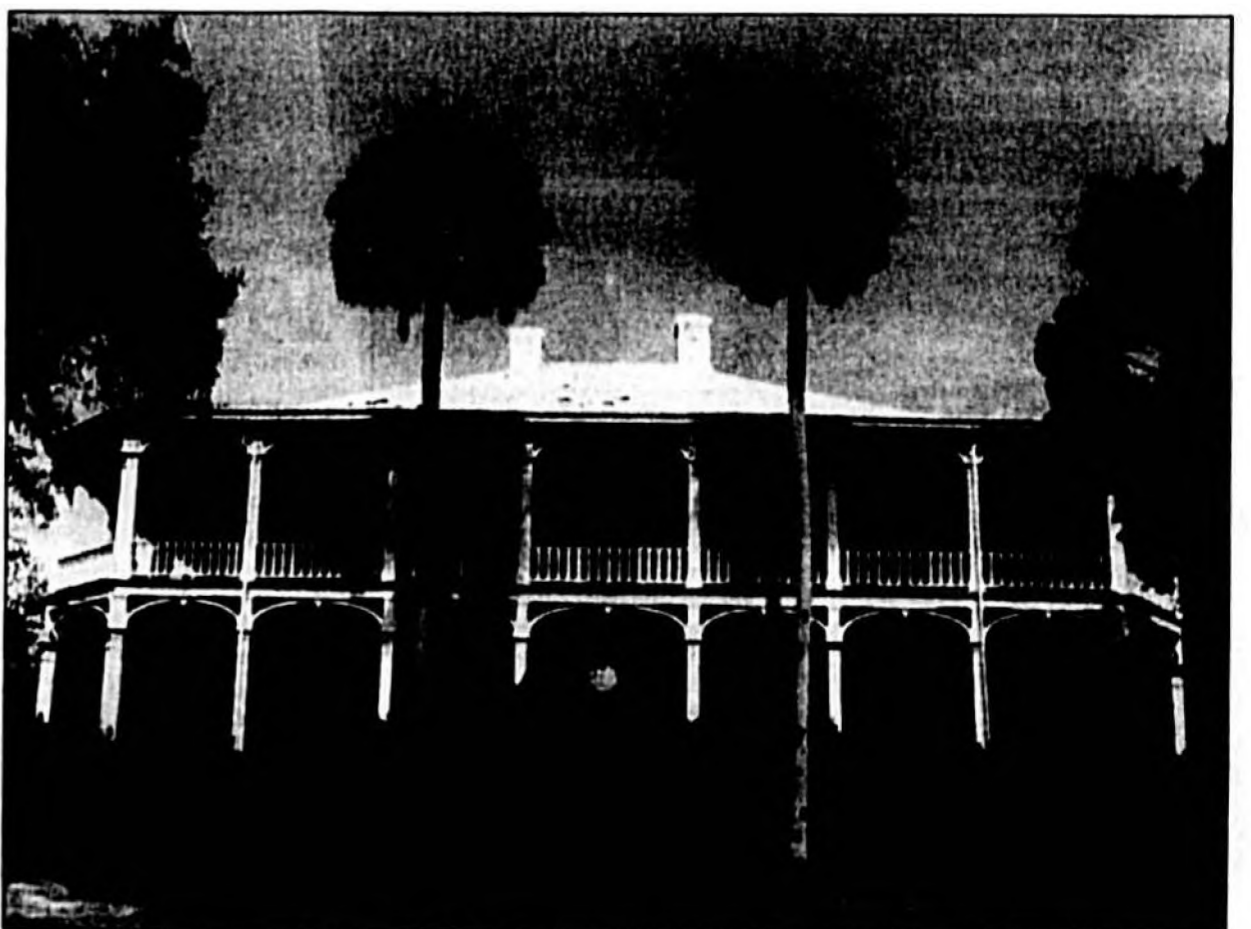
group ever."

The festival will feature historic demonstrations, displays, crafts, a mansion tour and many new events. To provide for adequate parking, bus service to the hall has been arranged from a parking lot at Buena Vista Drive and Dirksen Avenue. Parking and admission are both free of charge.

Funds derived from the event will go to continuing restoration efforts at the historic structure, built in 1871 by Frederick DeBary as a winter retreat and hunting lodge.

According to Fetters, there are some exciting additions to this year's event. The Florida Time Trail offers a walk through history. People will be able to visit a French Knife Hunter, Indian encampment, or a cow camp to see through a

Yelvington said the subject wears a baseball cap but no mask. He is described as being 5-foot-8, 170 pounds. He uses a demand note and to date no weapon has been seen. "He's almost always polite, calm and efficient," Yelvington said.

Within minutes of the robbery at 12:30 p.m. Tuesday, the intersection of S.R. 434 and 17-92 was swarming with Longwood police, Sheriff's Office deputies and FBI agents. The suspect, last seen on foot, was not captured.

The amount of money stolen is not known. First Union officials here and at corporate headquarters did not return calls Tuesday. Police said that no one was hurt during the robbery.

Law enforcement agencies are concerned that robbers who may have concentrated before on convenience stores are now holding up banks. There's no money at the convenience stores, and plenty at the banks, said Lt. Jack Cash of the Seminole County Sheriff's Office.



Yelvington said Tuesday's robbery was the first bank hold-up in Longwood since July, 1997. "It broke our streak," he said.

Because the robber has worked in three different areas, the law enforcement agencies are working together to find him. On Tuesday afternoon, sheriff's deputies showed a photograph of the suspect to many shopkeepers in Seminole

County. The robber has been successful nine times and it is expected he will hit another bank and then another until he is apprehended.

Jamie up with members of a professional sports team. Bronson said that they have to prove intent in order to prosecute any of the letter writers. Howington said that all envelopes were self-addressed and that the letters had the phone numbers of the men.

Howington has no idea who would submit an advertisement about her daughter. She said she has not seen the magazine, but the ad supposedly comes with Jamie's address and a picture. Howington said that

someone had submitted a similar type of ad with a company called Contact Advertising about her in November. "Somebody could be mad at me," said Howington.

Howington said that she felt this advertisement may have something to do with the recent stalking at Sanford Middle School by a man in a red Ford Ranger. Jamie's name appeared on the school's marquee the day prior to the first appearance by the truck. Howington believes that someone could have seen the name

on the marquee.

The report of the mailings was filed with the Sanford Police Department on February 17. "We are doing everything possible in the investigation of this case," said Bronson.

There could be a possible civil suit brought about by Howington against the publication. She has said that they have been approached by the Sally Jessie Raphael Show pertaining to the incident as well. "I don't want her [Jamie] to constantly have to look over her shoulder," said Howington.

For a structure to be eligible, the following criteria must be met:

1. The original structure must be at least 50 years old and be located within the boundaries of the City of Sanford including structures outside the Sanford Historic District.
2. The applicant must be the principle owner of the structure.
3. All work to be considered must be completed and must conform to Schedule S guidelines if the building is in the historic district, and/or the Secretary of Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation.

4. A completed application along with supporting photographs and other documentation must be submitted on or before April 17, 1998.

Winners will be chosen based on the above criteria as well as other considerations. Those are: impact on the neighborhood or community, and the depth and scope of the project.

German influence flavors French dish

Baked Stuffed Boneless Pork Chops (or loins) With Orange Gravy (Roti De Farcil Porc L'Orange A La Bourgeoise)

My introduction to this, one of my personal favorites, was in the Moselle district of France. This explains the "German influence" in this family style French country dish. The recipe can be prepared and cooked in about 1 hour and provides a filling dinner for four. If you prefer, you can prepare the dish the day before, refrigerate it in a covered dish overnight, then just pop it in the oven when you get home.

Ingredients:
* 1-1/2 lb. boneless pork (chop or loin) cut about 1/2 inch thick. Trim all but 1/8 inch of fat off outer edge. 8 separate



pieces
1 medium Spanish onion chopped fine (approx. 1/4 inch)
1 medium green bell pepper chopped fine
2 large cloves garlic chopped

"sandwiches" in a covered baking dish add 1/2 cup very fine (approx. 1/8 inch) 2 cups seasoned bread crumbs or stuffing
1/2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1 large egg
1/2 cup orange juice
1 tbs. butter
1 tbs. olive oil
1 tbs. corn starch
1/4 tsp. each allspice, ginger, nutmeg, black pepper, cinnamon
1 chicken bouillon cube

Stuffing: In a large fry pan sauté onions, green pepper, and garlic in olive oil and butter until onions are translucent. Do not clean fry pan yet, you'll use it again soon. In a large mixing bowl combine bread crumbs, egg, all seasonings, and Worcestershire sauce. Dissolve bouillon cube in 1/2 cup of hot water and add to stuffing mix. Mix all ingredients together completely, stuffing should be a sticky dough consistency.

Pork: Sprinkle both sides of all 8 pieces of pork lightly with allspice, nutmeg, cinnamon, ginger, and black pepper. Using 2 pieces of pork make a "sandwich" with about 1 inch of stuffing in the center. Make 4 "sandwiches" using the 8 pieces of pork. Place orange juice to bottom of pan. Cover and bake in a pre-heated

oven at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes or until internal temperature reaches 170 degrees.

Gravy: Four all drippings from roast pan back into fry pan when pork is done cooking. Dissolve 2 tbs. corn starch in 1 cup of cold water and add to fry pan. Bring gravy to light boil stirring constantly until gravy thickens.

Serve: Place pork in center of large serving platter and surround with egg noodles. Garnish with thin slices of orange.

Noodles: Cook and drain 1 lb. egg noodles, season with 2 tbs. butter and 1 tsp. chervil.

Tasty roast chicken in a bag

Orange Basil Roast Chicken

1 oven bag, large size (14"x20")
1 tablespoon flour
5 to 7 pound whole roasting chicken
8 large fresh basil leaves
1 large orange, thinly sliced, divided
1 medium onion, sliced
Vegetable oil

1 teaspoon cracked black pepper

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Shake flour in oven bag; place in 13x9x2-inch baking pan. Loosen skin of chicken over breast area by slipping your fingers or a knife under the skin. Place basil leaves and 4 orange slices under the skin. Divide onion slices and remaining orange slices between

cavity of chicken and bottom of oven bag. Tuck the wings under the chicken and tie the legs together; if desired. Brush chicken with vegetable oil; sprinkle with pepper. Place chicken in oven bag on top of onion and orange slices. Bake until chicken is tender 1-1/4 to 1-1/2 hours. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

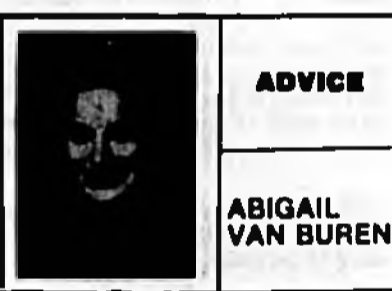
Husband tired of his position in cleaning up the home pigsty

Should prep athletes take time off???

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - There's nothing like the Big Blue Bonanza baseball tournament at Lake Brantley.

Every year, some of the best teams in Central Florida get together during Spring Break to match up with the best.

Sounds like a great idea, right?

Let's think about it. The Big Blue isn't the only tournament taking up students' time during their spring break. Oviedo and Lake Howell are off in Cypress Creek at a similar tournament.

Basketball teams routinely play ball during the holidays when school is out.

But let's remember who it is that is playing. They are high school kids. A typical high school baseball player at a big time program - and most of the teams in Seminole County are big time - will play fall baseball, AAU baseball, legion baseball and other tournaments and camps 12 months at a time.

Where's their spring break?

Basketball is another issue. In addition to AAU and the regular season, some of which extends into the spring sports season making sure that no one ever gets a break, there are almost mandatory camps for anyone looking to play college ball, and all sports have year-round conditioning.

Of course, it isn't mandatory, but there's almost an unwritten rule that makes it a year-round sport if you want any chance of competing with the others who are out there all year.

Pity the baseball player who is equal to another player at the same position if one plays summer ball and the other doesn't.

Coaches will deny that off-season ball and conditioning is mandatory. That's not the case at all schools, but it is at others.

For instance, why is there such a thing as spring football, which starts in about a month? First of all, several of the best athletes are involved in track, baseball or lacrosse, so it's not a definite indication of what the team will be like in the fall. All it does is give coaches a chance to keep an eye on their players and make sure they've been slavishly working in the weight room all year.

What benefit do the players get out of running around all April, knowing that it will be followed by more conditioning, then spring practice in August?

The year-round work has started to take its toll. At least two high profile athletes in Seminole County have said, off the record, that they will not play their sport in college because they are burned out. Both are players who practice their game all year at camps and leagues separate from their high school.

Both athletes are capable of playing college athletics.

Others are concentrating on one sport instead of playing a variety because of the commitment to their main sport. There are several at every school.

Fact is, though, that for about 99 percent of all high school athletes in Seminole County, it's all a game. Very few of them are going to be going on to college for athletics. It's all about participation to them. Getting the letter or the pin, saying you were part of the team.

That's as far as it goes for most of them. But there's also the one percent who will go on to Big Time University. Is that who it's all for?

Let the kids have a break, especially Spring Break. Students at five of the seven Seminole County schools - Lake Brantley, Oviedo, Lake Howell, Seminole, Winter Springs - are playing in week-long tournaments when they could be taking their last vacation before college. Knapp works OT in Lion win

ORLANDO - When you've been bestowed with the mantle of being a team leader, sometimes you have to give a little extra, do a little bit more, for the benefit of the team.

Ben Knapp, the ace pitcher of the Oviedo High School baseball team, found himself in that situation, pitching the equivalent of nearly nine innings in a seven inning game.

It's not as confusing as it sounds. Knapp (2-2) tossed a two-hit complete game Tuesday as the Lions (7-3) defeated Bradley Central (TN), 6-1, in the first round of the Orlando Baseball Class at Cypress Creek High School.

His effort is even more impressive when you consider that he had to overcome four inning-prolonging errors in the process. As a result, Knapp worked the equivalent of 8-1/3 innings in just under 100 pitches.

"I know he hasn't been pleased with the way he's pitched so far this season," said Oviedo coach Kenne Brown. "Every time he pitches, there are at least a dozen scouts with radar guns watching his every move. Not only that, but Ben knows how important he is to the success of this team. He's putting a lot of pressure on himself."

Against an overmatched Bradley Central team (the two hits the Bears got were both of the infield variety while the run was unearned), Knapp turned his most solid effort of the season, striking out six and walking three.

Coming into the game, Knapp had a 1-2 record with an earned run average of 5.88. He has averaged one strikeout an inning (24 in 23 2/3 innings pitched through Tuesday) but he has also walked 14 and given up three home runs.

His Lion teammates were baffled for four innings by the offerings of Bradley Central lefthander Chris Davis, who permitted Oviedo just two hits over the opening four frames. But Davis' defense abandoned him in the fifth, when the Lions exploited three Bear errors and a walk for three unearned runs.

Bradley Central reliever Derrick Stephens was touched for three runs on four hits in the sixth.

ORLANDO - Brian Hill tried to hide the emotion.

As he was introduced to the Orlando Arena crowd last night in his first game back after being fired as Magic head coach last February, the cheers rained down on him just as they did five minutes before when he walked out to supervise his team's warm-ups.

His former team, the Magic, beat Vancouver 99-92 to make it 19 losses in 21 games for the Grizzlies. Hill has little to work with in Vancouver and hasn't had many bright spots all season, but he said afterwards that he appreciated the fans' response to his return.

"It was very touching," Hill said after the game. "I certainly appreciated it. It was strange sitting on the other side of the court but once they threw the ball up, it was just a basketball game."

It was more than just a basketball game to the Magic. Orlando came in last night with a three-game losing streak and a tenth-place standing in the Eastern Conference playoff race, one-and-a-half games behind Cleveland for the final spot.

The Magic struggled and played sloppy throughout, but Vancouver was worse and the Magic escaped.

Nick Anderson led the Magic with 21 points, including a 6-8

night from the free throw line. Horace Grant (15), Bo Outlaw (11), Danny Schayes (14), David Benoit (11), and Mark Price (11) all scored in double figures for the Magic.

The Grizzlies jumped out early, running out to a 27-21 first quarter lead. They broke a team record for the fewest turnovers in a half, turning it over only once in the first half, but Orlando came back to cut the deficit to 55-52 at the half.

In the third quarter, Orlando broke the game wide open, outscoring Vancouver, 27-15 and were never threatened again. Orlando was helped when Grizzly center Bryant Reeves picked up his fourth foul early in the third quarter and Schayes was allowed to go to work on Vancouver's inexperienced front line.

Harper (9 points) said the team was happy to get out of its losing streak which followed a six-game winning run.

"We were becoming too cautious instead of just playing our regular game," Harper said. "We just have to go for it."

Schayes said the game wasn't about Hill's return and most of the Magic said there were no hard feelings towards Hill, despite that his ousting last year was led by a player revolt. Anderson and Grant both embraced Hill at the end of the game.

Next up for the Magic is a Thursday trip to New Jersey and a Friday home game against Portland.

New treatment for vascular disease

DEAR DR. GOTT: I've heard that some Boston doctors have discovered a way to treat patients with vascular disease by helping people grow new blood vessels. Is this possible?

DEAR READER: As hard as it is to believe, this novel technique shows great promise.

Researchers from St. Elizabeth's Medical Center and Tufts University School of Medicine will soon publish a report in which they describe a revolutionary treatment to bypass clogged arteries in the legs. They injected a substance called vascular endothelial growth factor DNA (VegF DNA) into muscle tissue near blocked blood vessels. Miraculously, nine out of 10 patients developed a new network of veins that markedly improved blood flow around the narrowed arteries. Four patients, who were scheduled for amputation, no longer required surgery; six others experienced a dramatic improvement in pain.

This method of gene therapy will be a major breakthrough, provided the Boston results are confirmed by further, independent testing.

Here's the really good news. The Boston doctors have successfully injected VegF DNA into the heart muscle of pigs with severe coronary blockages, indicating the possibility that this therapy may eventually help millions of men and women with cardiac disease. Our grandchildren may well see the day when patients who are at high risk for heart attacks can be treated with gene therapy and won't have to take medicine or undergo coronary artery bypass grafting.

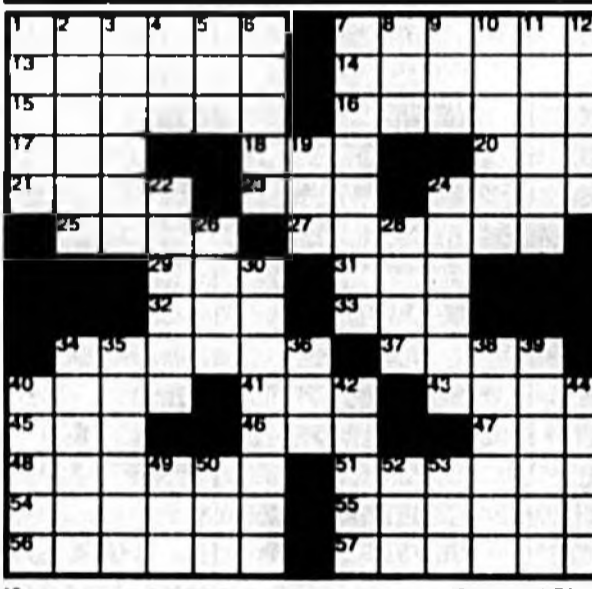

WIN AT BRIDGE

A push over the edge

By Phillip Alder

There are certain deals in which, from the viewpoint of all 52 cards, it appears that declarer cannot fail to make his contract. But in the real world, not blessed with X-ray vision, he finds the task less easy. In this deal, from last year's World Junior Camp in Italy, how do you think the play should go in the poor six spades after a heart lead, or the club-10 lead, or the diamond ace followed by a switch to the club 10?

It looks as if South must succeed because of the lucky trump position. However... when West led a heart, declarer took his ace king, played a club to dummy, and discarded his diamond king on the heart queen. Now he just needed to play the trump suit for one

loser. Low to the queen is theoretically best, but South finessed his 10. West won with the jack and tried to cash the diamond ace, but declarer ruffed. Now South knew East had the spade king because West would have led the diamond ace at trick one if he had had that king. So, planning to enter the dummy to take the trump finesse, declarer led a club — but West ruffed!

After the club-10 lead, which looks like a lead from a doubleton, you might win in hand, cash the spade ace, unblock the ace-king of hearts, and lead a low club toward the dummy. That often succeeds, but not here.

Finally, if West cashes the diamond ace before exiting with a club, declarer will win in the dummy and play a spade to the queen. Fine — until West smoothly drops the jack. Thinking East still has king-doubleton of spades, won't South lead a low club to the dummy to repeat the trump finesse?
