Air Corps Accidents

Bailing out of his spinning plane near Montgomery, Ala., a young lieutenant had his legs cut-off by the propeller of his own plane and died two hours later.

Accounts of such tragedies have become increasingly numerous in the newspapers during the last few weeks.

All in all the accident curve is rising rapidly as American plans progress to train some 30,000 Army pilots this year.

Serbs Revolt; Refuse To Merge With Axis Powers

Belgrade and the Bosnian city of Sarajevo where a student assassin touched off the last great war, were the scenes last night of violent street riots led largely by students inflamed against Yugoslavia's new membership in the Axis.

In Sarajevo, where Gavrilo Princip assassinated Archduke Franz Ferdinand of Austria-Hungary in 1914, more than 1000 rioters battled with police who tried to put down demonstrations against Germany.

Soldiers and police, armed with every weapon they could carry, hastened to guard against threatened bombing of bridges across the Danube and the Sava Rivers, which meet at Belgrade.

Rioters raged through the streets from one disturbance to another.

Disturbances among students resulted in closing of the schools at least until Monday.

Reports from Montenegro, one of the diverse elements in this heterogeneous kingdom of ancient races, creeds, laws and loyalties, told of vigorous demonstrations, particularly in Cetina.

The government press office called all British newspapermen in to tell them they would be ejected from the country if they continued to write about the disturbances. Their telephone connections to foreign countries were cut off all day.

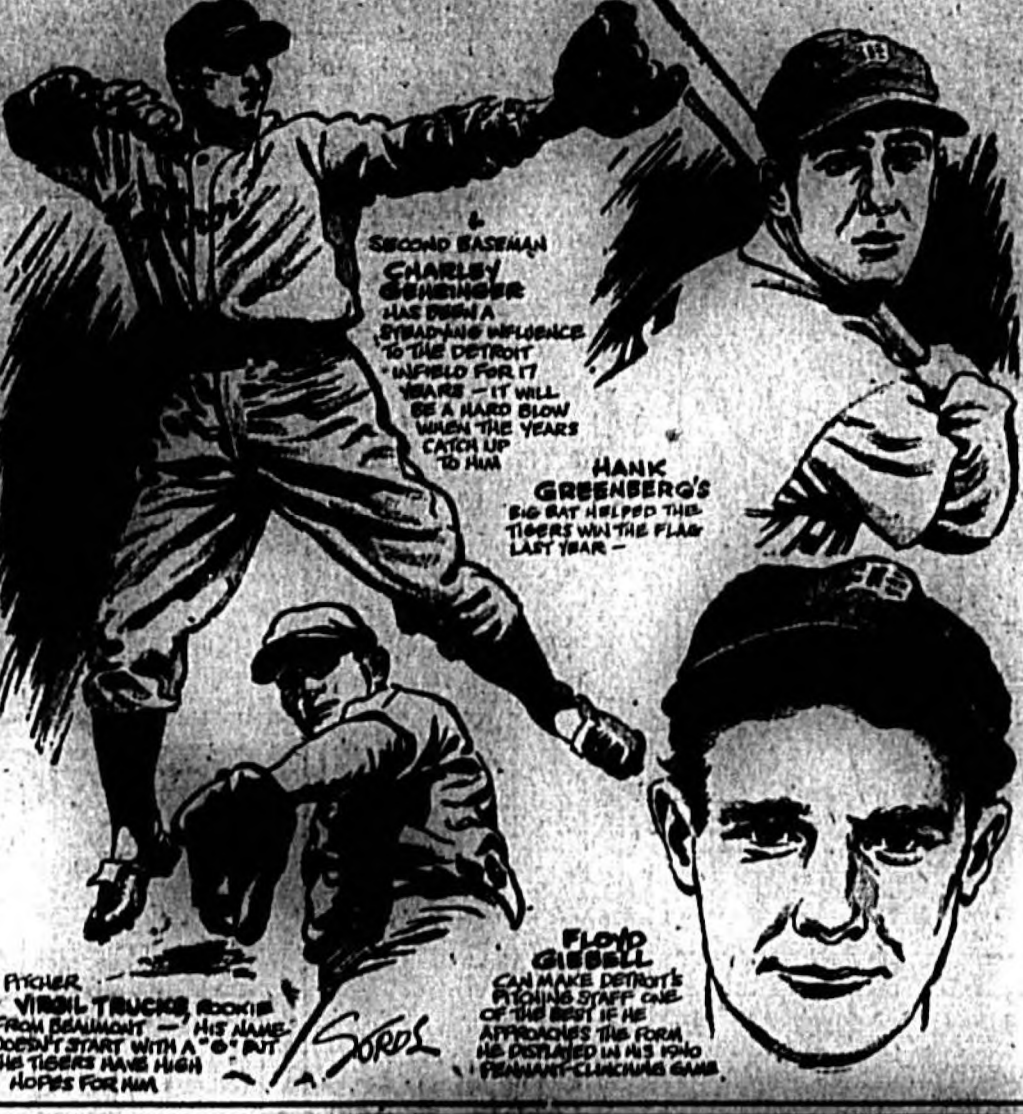

Fascists Flee For Asmara; British Pursue

Many Of 35,000 Italians Stationed At Cheren Are Captured By English Army

Vital Railway Is Next Goal

R. A. F. Bombs Nazis; England Gets Another Calm Night

CAIRO, Egypt, Mar. 28.—(AP)—British troops are in hot pursuit of the Italian forces retreating headlong toward Asmara, the capital of Eritrea, in the Middle East Command reported today.

The larger number of the 35,000 Italian defenders of the African "Verdun" were said captured by the British who stormed Cheren after a seven-week siege.

In Ethiopia, the British were reported pressing on toward Dire-dawa and the vital Addis Ababa-Jibuti railway after capturing a seven-mile strip.

Covering the rail line in Jibuti would cut the last link between the Ethiopian capital and the outside world except by air and probably would result in a speedy downfall.

Regional news another night of freedom from German aerial attacks, while the R. A. F. struck at key industrial centers.

Attacked for more than a month by British columns which advanced from the north and west, Cheren, a naturally strong defensive position on the Italian plateau was defeated by some of Italy's finest troops, including the Condottieri, and Central Force, led by the Duke of Aosta, Duke of Ethiopia.

Just before a British Middle East headquarters communique said British troops had captured British arms, it was disclosed that a new front in the empire campaign against Ethiopia had been opened in the far west, where British African and Belgian troops smashed from the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan and occupied Gambela, 50 miles inside Ethiopia.

British Announce Taking Of Cheren

CAIRO, Egypt, Mar. 28.—(AP)—The British announced last night they had stormed and occupied Cheren, East Africa's major stronghold of Italian resistance, and captured Hara, second city of Ethiopia.

This crumbled what may prove to be the last real ramparts of Italy's African empire.

Cheren, mountain key to Eritrea's capital, Asmara, 48 miles to the southeast, had been defended for seven weeks by 25,000 crack Fascist troops under command of the Duke of Aosta.

It fell to British and Indian troops after two weeks of the heaviest fighting, on tortuous terrain and in treacherous climate.

Nazi Forces Rush To Yugoslav Frontier

SOFIA, Bulgaria, Mar. 28.—(AP)—German occupation forces in Bulgaria were rushing today toward the Yugoslav frontier, apparently as the result of the news there of the Axis government's recent seizure of power.

An informed source in the capital said the Nazi command was moving to occupy Bulgaria, which had been overrun completely by a rush of Nazi reinforcements sent in the direction of the Yugoslav frontier.

The source said the German forces were moving in great numbers and that the Yugoslav government had fled toward the south.

Allis Chalmers Factory Opens After Strike

About One-Third Of Men Take Up Jobs; Those Who Return Get C. I. O. Warning

BETHLEHEM, Pa., Mar. 28.—(AP)—A four-day strike at the huge parent plant of Bethlehem Steel ended today, and the union announced that workers would return to their jobs "as fast as they can." The company employs 18,000 production workers.

MILWAUKEE, Mar. 28.—(AP)—The Allis Chalmers Manufacturing Company, closed by a C. I. O. strike since Jan. 22, reopened today in compliance with the government's demand, and announced that about one-third of the normal day shift of production men reported for work.

The C. I. O. warned those who returned to work before the union voted its sanction would lose their jobs when the strike ends.

Chairman Dykstra of the National Defense Mediation Board last night ordered immediate board action in four labor disputes holding up production of vital armaments.

Yugoslavs Shout For War; France Cheered By Events

Citizens In Marseille Said Enthusiastic; Long Live Yugoslavia Is Cry Of Crowd

MARSEILLE, France, Mar. 28.—(AP)—Yugoslavia's militant defiance of the Axis fanned tumultuous enthusiasm in German-occupied France today.

About 10,000 citizens of Marseille streamed through the Palace de la Bourse where the late King Alexander of Yugoslavia was assassinated in 1934, and shouted "long live Yugoslavia."

They heaped flowers at a monument to the father of Yugoslavia's young King Peter II.

The United States struck a powerful diplomatic blow when it threw its moral and material support behind the new anti-Nazi Yugoslav government.

The sensational action was discussed by Secretary of State Welles. It was by far the most open and significant step taken by the United States in the explosive Balkan situation.

It was the first open admission that the United States and promised aid to Yugoslavia. Axis newspapers previously had printed and bitterly commented on reports that such promises were made in an effort to dissuade the deposed Yugoslav government from signing up with the Axis.

Specifically the United States' action was commensurate with the new Yugoslav government.

The American minister to Yugoslavia, Arthur Bliss Lane, was instructed to advise the new government at Belgrade that, in accordance with terms of the Lend-Lease Law, President Roosevelt is enabled in the interest of this country's own defense to render effective material aid to nations striving to ensure their independence and integrity against aggression.

Welles instructed Lane to convey the United States' assurance to the Yugoslav government.

Lane also was instructed to tell the new government that it was warmly welcomed in the United States by every liberal-loving man and woman.

Welles also was instructed to call the Yugoslav government to the attention of the United States' assistance in the form of Lend-Lease.

LONDON, Mar. 28.—(AP)—German nationals in Britain since the start of the war total 28,859 and those seriously injured 40,168, it was announced today.

Military fatalities in Britain were about one-fifteenth of the civilian total.

With a pledge of full United States aid, King Peter II's new military regime was reported to have informed Germany today that Yugoslavia's adherence to the Rome-Berlin-Tokyo alliance was "impossible"—and rushed 1,200,000 troops to battle stations.

High Balkan diplomatic quarters said the cabinet decided in an all night session to return Yugoslavia to "full and absolute neutrality" because co-operation with the Axis was contrary to the will of the Yugoslav people.

This was reported as Yugoslavia's blunt answer to the "urgent request"—a virtual ultimatum—by Germany demanding an explanation of the coup d'etat which disposed the pro-Axis government.

Wildly enthusiastic Yugoslavs shouted in the streets for war, and cried: "Down with Germany and Italy!"

Germany sent an official protest to Yugoslavia on the alleged heading of German citizens in Belgrade, Yugoslav capital.

The Turkish minister at Belgrade conferred at length with Premier General Simovic, and diplomatic quarters reported he proposed a mutual assistance pact with Yugoslavia.

German couriers in Belgrade said most of the 3000 Nazi economic experts, newspapermen, and trade delegates in Yugoslavia were being for the frontier or packing for a quick exit.

German troops in Bulgaria were reported moving toward the Yugoslav border.

Yugoslavia sped its army of 1,200,000 to battle stations today on the staff pace of an anti-Nazi pro-British coup that overthrew the regency government for joining the kingdom to the Axis, placed the boy King Peter II in full power, and held the deposed Regent Prince Paul under military arrest.

The military revolt against the Axis alignment began at 2:00 A. M. Thursday, and took control with the force of the army behind it.

The public, vigorously disapproving the Axis pact, hysterically cheered the new regime and called with increasing fervor for (Continued on Page Four)

Growers Bring In Large Stalks Of Celery To Market

The stalks of celery, which were described as the largest, healthiest and prettiest seen in this section in some time, were brought to the Sanford State Farmers Market today by H. M. Panworth and Ira Southward, whose farm is located in Mecca Hammock south of Sanford.

Several of the biggest stalks were weighed at the market and H. J. Lehman, manager, reported that they tipped the scales at 3.2 to 3.4 pounds each. The choicest stalks were 15 inches in circumference after being stripped and stood from 30 to 35 inches high.

The whole field is of superior quality, Mr. Lehman said, and the celery brought to the market was "flawless"—there wasn't a single blemish on the leaves," he declared.

Chase and Company is packing the celery, and is putting it in standard crates so that the tops will not have to be cut off, as is usually done. It will be shipped north, Mr. Lehman said, where he believes it will bring premium prices.

Strawberries Are Damaged By Rains

D. E. Norwood, who operates a farm on the westside with J. H. Tindel, said today that strawberry picking in a number of places in this section was nearly at a standstill because of damage by rain early this week.

The ripe berries on the plants were either injured by the rain or washed away, he said, adding that another crop would be ripe in about 10 days.

At the Sanford State Farmers Market, H. J. Lehman, manager, said some damage had resulted to the berries, but it seemed to be in spots rather than general. He said the market expected to continue shipping strawberries for another month yet.
