

# Ajax America players lead US to victory in Milk Cup

Ajax America prides two of their own for bringing an international championship to the U.S. Dax McCarty and Lee Nguyen, both members of the Ajax Prospects Premier Development League (PDL) team, traveled to Ireland where they lead the U18 US Men's National Team to a Milk Cup Championship. The Milk Cup tournament was founded in 1983 and is regarded as one of Europe's premier soccer events attracting national teams from all over the globe.

"This is an incredible accomplishment for the US National Team," stated Barry Hulahoff, Ajax America's Technical Director. "The Ajax coaches are especially pleased to see our players succeed on an international level and we believe that they have a promising future in professional soccer."

The tournament kicked-off August 1, 2005 with the United States earning a difficult point as they tied the Brazilian National Team (1-1). The lone US goal was scored by Ajax PDL team member, Lee Nguyen who plays upfront as an attacking midfielder/forward. Dax McCarty, midfielder and Captain of the U18 US National Team, played much of this game in a defensive role trying to equalize the aggressive attacking style of the Brazilian team.

The US team qualified for the Milk Cup finals after a 1-0 win against Serbia & Montenegro. Ajax's PDL players drove the offense for the United States once again as Nguyen opened the night with a shot on goal in the 4th minute of play. The combo of Nguyen and McCarty worked together to create 3 shots on goal for the United States in the first half of the game. The winning goal was scored in the 65th minute of the game by Boston College's Charlie Davies.

The Milk Cup finals between the United States and Northern Ireland took place on August 5, 2005 at the Coleraine Showgrounds. The US brought the Cup home to America with a 4-2 win over the hometown favorites. The US fell behind in the 11th minute of the game, but Charlie Davies scored 2 goals to end the first half and completed his hat trick on a second half penalty kick. McCarty struck from deep just over the crossbar in the middle of the first half and set Nguyen up for a corner goal just 5 minutes later. Nguyen missed a well-deserved goal in the 78th minute of the game.

Earlier this summer Lee Nguyen represented the US U20 Men's National team in the FIFA Youth World Cup Championship in Holland and McCarty played with the US U18 National Team in Portugal this July.

## MELISSA BATTISTA TO PLAY 2 WEEKS FOR ODENSE BOLDKUB IN DENMARK

Melissa Battista, 16 years old, joins her club coach George Sasvari for a true international experience representing FC America Soccer Academy (FCA).

Her FCA Kumba Under 17 girls team in Orlando have loaned her to Odense Boldklub (OB) to help solve their short-term injury problems. Battista is expected to fill in at midfield and play a role in getting the season started until OB gets their full roster back.

"I am excited for her to learn how special Danish Women's football can be as I have for the past 2 weeks," said George Sasvari, Head Coach for OB and also Battista's club coach for FC America Kumba. "Melissa should be able to take a lot out of this experience to both help her improve her game and learn from a very pleasant culture."

OB is out several players due to injury from off-season surgery including Stella Godwin, who represented Nigeria in the 2004 Olympics.

"It would be great if Stella can make it back as it would be a neat experience for Melissa to train and play along side her talent."

In the meantime Melissa will see some old faces from the United States as three players on OB participated in Sasvari's International Academy in 2004. Stine Kristensen, Maria Clausen, and Rikke Kronberg all trained under Sasvari in the U.S. at Lake Highland Prep for 10 days. They will join team captain Maria Juul in welcoming Melissa to Denmark.

"I don't know what to expect, but I hope to add whatever I can to the team," said Battista. It will be a different experience than playing back home - a little culture shock probably."

"It will be a challenge for Melissa to keep up with the speed of play at this level just as it will for all our younger players," according to Sasvari, "but I know she will adjust as will the rest of our team. One of the things I see in common between our Kumba players and our OB team is the fighting spirit in their personality. They both want to be winners."

# UCF men's basketball team now 4-1 on European trip

Playing its third game in as many days, the UCF men's basketball team dropped a 78-57 exhibition contest to host Vanves Basket on Sunday evening.

The Golden Knights, who are 4-1 on their six-game European tour, were led by senior guard Troy Lindbeck, who tallied a double-double with 13 points and 10 rebounds.

Entering the third quarter, UCF trailed by only 3 points, but then went cold as Vanves outscored the visitors, 44-26, in the second half. The hosts shot 53.7 percent from the floor, compared to 35.4 percent for the Golden Knights.

Sophomore guard Dave Noel paced UCF with 14 points. Junior forward Josh Peppers added 12 points.

The hosts led by five points after the first quarter, but UCF recovered in the second, tying the score at 16 with 8:14 on the clock after Peppers grabbed an offensive board and scored. When Lindbeck nailed a trey with three minutes left in the first half, the Golden Knights claimed a 29-27 edge, their first

advantage since the game's opening minute.

UCF was dominant on the glass, outrebounding Vanves, 41-23. Senior forward Marcus Johnson totaled six boards to go with 10 points.

Samir Driss led Vanves, scoring a game-high 26 points on 8-of-11 shooting from the field.

On Saturday, sophomore center Adam Gill scored 15 points on 7-of-10 shooting from the field as the UCF men's basketball team improved to 4-0 on its European tour, claiming an 85-77 exhibition victory over Poissy in Poissy, France. The Golden Knights had five players finish in double-figures in scoring, led by junior forward Josh Peppers with 18 points.

After numerous lead changes, the Golden Knights grabbed the lead for good at the end of the third quarter when senior forward Marcus Johnson grabbed an offensive rebound and dunked to put UCF ahead, 64-63. Poissy was unable to regain the lead in the fourth quarter and the visitors went up by five with 5:43 to play when senior forward Anthony Williams connected on a layup. Senior guard Justin Rose had

14 points and added three assists in the win. Williams grabbed a game-high nine boards to go with 13 points and three assists.

Gill paced UCF early, connecting on a three-point play and hitting a jumper to score the first five points of the contest. Poissy rallied with a 20-6 run and led 20-11 when Derrick Durham scored with 3:39 on the clock in the first quarter.

Johnson finished with 12 points and six rebounds, including four on the offensive end. Peppers totaled seven boards and three steals.

The Golden Knights opened the second stanza on an 11-2 run and took a two-point lead at the 6:49 mark after Rose nailed a pair from the charity stripe. Poissy again mounted a rally, eventually grabbing a 10-point edge before sophomore guard Mike O'Donnell drained a long three at the buzzer to cut the deficit to 47-39 at halftime.

Durham paced Poissy with 13 points. Richard Macalou finished with 13 points.

UCF had rallied from a slow start Friday, pulling away in the fourth quarter to record a 91-73 victory over the Gent

Dragons in Gent, Belgium. Junior forward Josh Peppers (20 points) led five Golden Knights who finished with double-digits in scoring as UCF improved to 3-0 on its six-game European tour.

Starting the fourth quarter with a three-point lead, UCF pulled away from the hosts during the early stages of the period, using a 10-1 run. Peppers started the stretch, nailing a three. Sophomore center Adam Gill had a pair of layups during the run, which was capped by a basket by senior forward Marcus Johnson that handed the Golden Knights a 77-64 lead with 6:29 remaining in the con-

test.

Sophomore guard Dave Noel totaled 16 points and a game-high five assists. In addition to three blocks, senior forward Anthony Williams recorded 10 points, eight boards and four assists. Sophomore guard Mike O'Donnell finished with 12 points.

UCF trailed most of the first and second quarters, but went up two points with one minute to play in the second stanza after O'Donnell found senior guard Troy Lindbeck (nine points) who connected on a wide open triple. The hosts answered right back as Sam Rotersat hit a trey of his own as the buzzer sounded to put

Gent up, 43-42, at the break.

The Golden Knights won despite finishing the 40-minute game with 27 total fouls. A pair of players, Johnson and senior guard Justin Rose, both fouled out and three players completed the game with four fouls.

Rose registered 10 points as he rounded out the UCF double-figure scorers. Off the bench, Gill had eight points, six boards and a block.

Rotersat paced Gent with 18 points and eight rebounds. Jovan Rouzcan chipped in with 17 points.

UCF plays its final game of the tour tonight (Wednesday), facing Golfe-Juan in Southern France.

Special-Opportunity Turkey Hunt Permits now are available from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC).

Special-Opportunity Spring Turkey Hunts are custom-made for sportsmen yearning for an Osceola turkey. All hunt areas are in the Osceola turkey's range. They are a highly prized subspecies of turkey, which occur only in peninsular Florida. These hunts pair up large areas of land loaded with turkeys with a low number of hunters.

Hunters interested in going on one of these hunts can apply now. Applications are on the

FWC's special-opportunity hunt Web site at [MyFWC.com/soh](http://MyFWC.com/soh) (click on "2004-2005 Spring Turkey Application") and at FWC regional offices. A random drawing will determine who will receive the limited number of permits.

Demand for the hunts is usually greater than the number of available permits. Hunters can submit as many applications as they want to increase their odds; however, each application requires a \$5 nonrefundable application fee for each person named on the application.

Applications must arrive at FWC's Tallahassee office by U.S. mail or a licensed delivery service by 4:30 p.m. Oct. 15 to be included in the random drawing. Faxes and hand-deliveries are not accepted.

If selected, hunters will pay an additional \$50-\$175, depending on the special-opportunity hunt area selected. Selection rules limit out-of-state participants to one permit per hunt. Non-residents should not apply as a group, since only one non-resident per hunt can be selected.

### DOVE CLUB PERMITS STILL AVAILABLE

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) still has Dove Club Permits remaining for some of their special-opportunity dove fields throughout the state.

Permits are available for Caravelle Ranch (Putnam County), Hilochee (Polk County), Lake George Dexter/Mary Farms Unit (Volusia County), Parker Road (Alachua County) and Schneider Farms (Escambia County).

Permits are available on a first-come, first-served basis and allow one adult and one youth (under age 16) to participate in all scheduled hunts for a designated dove field (up to 8 days). These half-day hunts cost \$150 and enable the permit holder and youth to both take a daily bag limit of birds.

## Public forum part of city manager search

An error in counting led to a mistake in Tuesday's article about Sanford's six city manager candidates.

The sixth candidate, who was left out, is Michael Stampler, former city manager of Portage, Mich., population of 45,000.

He was city manager for 20 years. He has also served as airport director for the city/county of Kalamazoo.

In addition, his local government career spans more than 30 years with other duties for the city of Kalamazoo.

Sanford interim City Manager Eugene Miller said Thursday that since there are only six candidates, and two of the six are from Florida, the commissioners will have on site, face to face interviews with all six, instead of phone interviews.

"Face to face interviews are more effective," Miller said.

The candidates will arrive on Wednesday, Sept. 7. On Sept. 8, they will have interviews with each of the commissioners.

Then, on Sept. 9, they will have an interview with all of the commissioners together in a public meeting.

Miller said shortly after that, the commissioners should be ready to pick one of the candidates to begin negotiating an employment agreement.

"It looks pretty good," Miller said.

# Plans proposed for 24-tier tower

SANFORD — Developers unveiled Rivers Edge, a 24-story residential tower with commercial retail space that would face Lake Monroe, at Sanford's Planning and Zoning Commission's work session Thursday night.

Rivers Edge is proposed to contain 468 residential condominium units, 42,000 square feet of retail space on the bottom, a restaurant and public meeting space near the top with the very top of the tower

serving as recreational space for pools and a fitness room.

Jerry W. Mills Sr., AIA, of Burke Houge & Mills, unveiled the project at the Community Awareness and Participation Plan (CAPP) meeting.

Planning and Community Development Director Russ Gibson explained that a CAPP meeting allows the public an opportunity to learn about large scale proposed projects well in advance so that any problems or concerns

## Hornbills, spot-nosed guenons and Maximillian's vipers, oh my

SANFORD — While some of the new baby animals at the Central Florida Zoo have faces only a parent could love, all of them began life in a most special way as a rare or endangered species.

Three of the babies — a wreathed hornbill, a spot-nosed guenon and a cotton-top tamarin — are on public display at the zoo, and the others — Maximillian's vipers, red-fronted macaws and blue poison dart frogs — will be at some point in the future, according to keepers.

The new wreathed hornbill was born on April

5, but didn't emerge from its birthplace until July 2, said avian expert Cindy Dupree.

The chick does not emerge until it is nearly as big as its parents, making it difficult for zoo guests to determine which is the baby. Dupree said that is a defensive trait so the baby can avoid predators when it emerges. The endangered, colorful birds with enormous beaks and wingspans are native to Asia.

Also on public display is the spot-nosed guenon. Primate keeper Tanya Scheidegg said the baby was born June 5 as one of less than 20 in captivity.

Any truck over three tons, or 6,000 pounds, is not allowed to drive on 1st Street. Instead, the trucks are supposed to take 3rd Street and deliver through the back streets, or bring a dolly cart with their deliveries to the restaurants.

Crapps said Thursday that a delivery driver he just pulled over and wrote a \$115.50 ticket for the

# Police bust area check fraud ring

SANFORD — Two Central Florida men were arrested Thursday for their alleged roles in an organization involved in check fraud scheme.

Marc Agulla, 32, the head of the organization, and his associates allegedly developed an elaborate scheme to defraud banks. They used leftover business checks from Agulla's closed business to open fraudulent accounts with local banks. Agulla was arrested in Sanford.

According to the Seminole County Sheriff's Office, they would then obtain personal checks for the fraudulent accounts and share them with one another in order to open more accounts with different banks.

Members of the group then went to other banks and withdrew sums of money from the fraudulent accounts before the checks were returned as

# Stormwater inundates joint committee discussion

SANFORD — Stormwater surfaced Wednesday as the first report from several groups working to supply the Joint City /County Advisory Committee with ideas for consolidation.

The committee also heard a report about parks and recreation and an announcement of a new festival in Oviedo. The joint committee includes mayors and city representatives, two county commissioners and a handful of business representatives.

Kim Ornberg is principal engineer for Seminole County and the recently elected chair of the Stormwater Technical Working Group. She told the

committee that the group had met every week for the last six weeks.

Ornberg began by telling the history of government relationships as they pertain to stormwater. A working group had been established in 1998, for instance.

Current collaboration includes working on the Total Maximum Daily Load, or TMDL, Program. This federal program is administered by the Florida Department of Environmental Protection.

The department works with local governments to reduce pollutants loading into bodies of water. The object is to restore the water to its designated use, which could be drinking water, fishing, swimming, etc., Ornberg said.

In Seminole County, most bodies of water have a designated use of swimming and other recreational activities, she said. If a body of water is termed impaired, that means it does not meet standards for its designated use.

Each body of water is re-evaluated at the beginning of a five-year cycle. The next cycle begins in 2006.

Stormwater plays a big role in impairing some lakes. Many lakes and other bodies of water are shared by more than one

municipality or with the county, Ornberg said. In other words, it is imperative that the local governments work together and there are many opportunities for collaboration and consolidation.

Fifteen water bodies have been removed from the "impaired waterbody" list, Ornberg said. Those include the Wekiva and Little Wekiva rivers, Soldiers Creek, the Lake Jesup drain, and Cranes Roost in Altamonte Springs. Five other lakes were prevented from becoming impaired, she said.

While the joint committee felt this information helped and was good to know, some members wanted different information and direction from the staff.

Casselberry Mayor Bob Goff wanted to know how the committee should select which of these collaborative opportunities to pursue.

"I want to know what they're recommending that we do as a joint committee," Goff said. Others said flooding during and following storms should be a priority.

Commissioner and county chairman Carlton Henley said flood control would be his number one priority followed closely by water quality.

Longwood Mayor H.G. "Butch" Bundy agreed.

"Flooding is probably the most pressing issue especially if you ask the residents," Bundy said. "I think we need

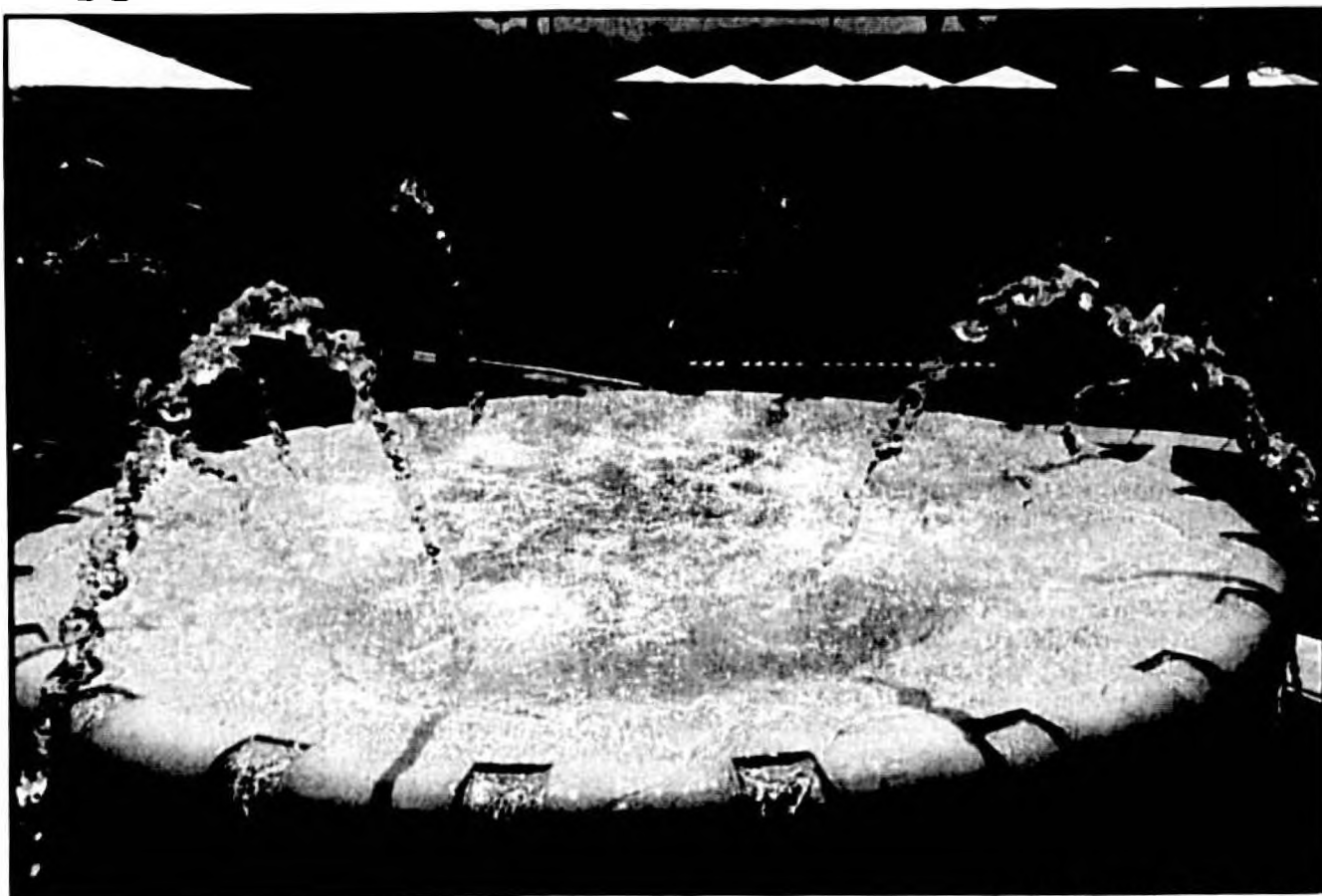

can be addressed before the project is approved and underway.

"We're specifically here to learn more about Rivers Edge," Gibson told the approximately 16 people in the audience.

Mills, the architect for Rivers Edge, presented the project to the commission and to the audience. The architect has lived in Sanford almost his entire life, and said that he was "extremely proud" to be presenting a project of "substantial quality". His firm has been involved in projects such as Sanford's Cultural Arts Building and the restoration for the downtown Wachovia Bank, to name a few.

The Rivers Edge project is proposed to be built on 9.36 acres at 750 Fulton Street behind The Herald building and would span out like a fan to Seminole Boulevard and U.S. 17-92/French Avenue.

A few ideas the group had were to extend the city in extending the RiverWalk from French Avenue to the end of their property line. Gibson explained though that currently the city does not run that roadway, the Florida Department of Transportation is in charge right now, but there were discussions of the city of Sanford taking over the road.

The project would also include a traffic circle that would provide major access to the project, and also to the RiverWalk. A pedestrian traffic circle would also be encompassed to encourage walkers to go to and from the retail stores and restaurants inside Rivers Edge to the RiverWalk and downtown shopping.

Access to parking is underneath in a raised two story parking structure that includes 820 covered spaces and 466 upper level spaces.

Richard Huber, a member of the Planning and Zoning commission, was concerned about soil testing.

"I'm not an engineer. Have you done any samples? Will the property support 24 stories," Huber asked?

According to Mills, a soil report has been done and preliminary tests show that it will withstand 24 stories. The report also showed five feet of fill that was done in the 1950s that is believed to be construction debris.

Planning and Zoning Vice Chairman Andy Kutz wanted to know who the major players were for the project. Those players are George Hart and Menhub Marjji. Marjji is of Quality Real Estate Developers LLC, in Longwood. Resumes of the two applicants will be distributed to the board at a later date.

Other board members seemed to agree that they thought it was a great project, but they agreed with some of the concerns staff had outlined.

Gibson told the commission that some of those preliminary concerns for the project were the height and scale of the project; access and traffic circulation; and land use. Studies would also need to be performed for roadways, drainage, solid waste, fire, schools, water and sewer, and parks and recreation.

"I'm in favor of this, but I think you're going to have problems with these roads," Huber said.

Gibson explained that these problems could be addressed during a later dated formal engineering review.

Two members of the public addressed the Planning and Zoning commission, one who did not support the project and one who did support the project.

Steven Myers of Oak Avenue said that it was an interesting project but that he had a problem with the city overlooking previous studies. According to Myers, the Sanford Historic Trust specifically warned against projects that walled off the lakefront. The city has "paid dearly" for studies, he said.

"It wouldn't take long to realize this project doesn't measure up," Myers said. "I would encourage you to look long and hard at this."

Myers said that his main concerns were the size, scale and proportion of the project.

Chris Kelly, of Lake Mary, who has been a lifelong resident of Sanford, said his father built the circular building on the site plan.

Kelly said when he saw the plans for this project: "It took my breath away."

Although he agreed there were traffic issues, he said that his father and he would be willing to foot the bill to have some studies done.

"We'd be happy to pick up the tab," Kelly said. "We'd like to help make this a win, win, win, for everyone."

The applicants requested a conditional use for an urban infill redevelopment project. According to Gibson, the city staff will continue to review the application submitted and work with the applicant toward a required Public Hearing. All property owners within 200 feet of the subject property will be notified by certified mail of the hearing and a legal notice of the meeting will be published, too. The date of this hearing has not been determined at this time, Gibson said.

The Planning and Zoning commission has board meetings usually on the first and third Thursday of each month at 7 p.m. at City Hall in the commission chambers.

to have staff ... determine where the problem areas are" in regard to flooding, he added.

In many cases, if the flooding problems are alleviated that would take care of some water quality problems, Bundy suggested.

Committee members also discussed how many stormwater problems affect more than one government agency. Water in a city lake, for example, may receive runoff from a county road and that drains into a creek flowing down to a lake in another city.

Lake Mary Mayor Thomas Greene said some of these lakes are private. Crystal Lake in Lake Mary is one such lake. Although the city owns some property along the lake, there is no public access, Greene said.

Keeping the quality of private lakes ought to be the financial responsibility of the property owners on that body of water, he said.

Henley brought up health issues as well and agreed that flood prone areas should be identified.

At this point, Goff said the committee is again telling staff what to do. He said the committee ought to be listening to staff.

"I want to hear their list of priorities," Goff said. They know what issues are coming up in the near future, and he wants to know how to address them.

"If we're going to set here and order them (to do things) then this is a waste of time," Goff said.

County Commissioner Randy Morris, who is also chair of the joint committee, said everyone at the table deals with stormwater. Ornberg continued with her presentation talking about additional opportunities to partner on stormwater issues.

Morris and others talked about the problem of paying consultants. Each city and the county has stormwater consultants, who have to consult with each other's consultants to let them know what can be done on an issue.

The stormwater technical working group may have the makings of a stormwater authority. Before going there,

the committee sent Ornberg and the working group away with a list of work items to bring back to a future meeting.

Included among them is developing a priority list for stormwater problems and an assessment of consultant services.

"Personally I think this is a great start," Morris said.

The committee also heard a report from the Parks and Recreation Technical Working Group led by Joe Gasparini, manager of Seminole County Parks and Recreation.

He gave an overview of park and sports facilities throughout the county.

The working group would like the committee to look at securing land for recreation, reviewing fees by making them more equal across the board, open school sites for public recreation and including a representative on the group from the school district. They also want the committee to look at establishing a senior center.

Morris said in general city parks are better maintained

than county parks and that is a difference that collaboration might address.

The discussion turned to business opportunities, specifically for attracting regional and national sports tournaments to Seminole County.

Henley said it is short sighted to use facilities solely for recreational purposes because there is "big, big money" in these tournaments. He said the tournaments could have a large economic impact on hotels, restaurants, and other businesses.

The need for sports marketing and making an inventory of all the recreational facilities in the county were discussed.

Before the committee started on its agenda, Oviedo Councilman Todd Russell told members about his city's first Oktoberfest planned for Sunday Oct. 23 at its new aquatic center on State Road 426 and Division Street.

Bratwurst, sauerkraut and a parade with the traditional tapping of the keg were mentioned as highlights.

## Florida ID Card

People have been asking, "If I don't have a driver's license and someone asks for a photo ID, what can I show them?" While some folks may know the answer, I admit, I didn't. So I investigated.

Photo ID's are issued by the Florida Driver's License Division of Florida Highway Safety. The driver's license office used to be located at the Sanford airport property, but it has moved to Winter Park, at 940 West Canton, off Highway 17-92. As I see it, it is inconvenient for most folks in Sanford and Northern Seminole County. But, as it's in Winter Park now, and we'll just have to live with it.

In talking to a representative of that division, it sounds relatively simple. You show up at the Winter Park office on Canton, and are required to present a birth certificate, and one other form of identification such as a social security card, marriage license, or other document. Then, at a cost of only \$3, they take your photo and present you with an official Florida ID card.

The problem (as I see it) is that you will have to wait in line along with the dozens of other people who will be applying for a driver's license or a renewal. From some folks I have talked to, this often requires standing in line for several hours.

So, the people at the License Division said they now take reservations, which will cut the time down considerably. All you have to do is phone 407-623-1147 for an appointment.

Another problem, this phone number is almost ALWAYS busy. It took me 11 calls over a period of two hours, before I got an answer. They said their office is quite busy and the phone is always ringing. (Do they only have one phone line?)

The above is only for citizens of the United States. If you are not a citizen, the forms of identification you will be required to show include an immigration document showing why you are in Florida, and other papers to prove your legal presence. If you reach them by phone for an appointment, tell them you are not a citizen and they will tell you what you will need to bring along.

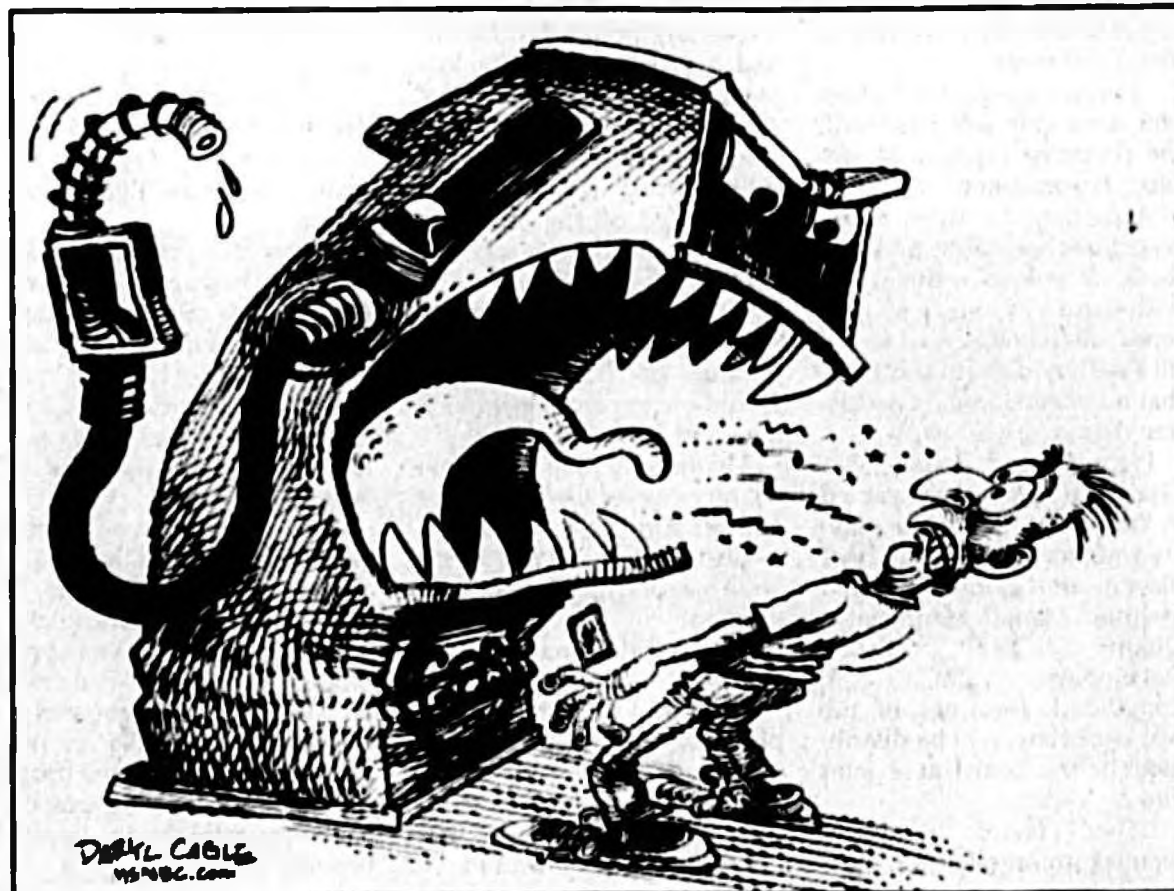
Keep in mind, these photo ID's are not to be construed as a driver's license. Seminole County Chief Deputy Sheriff Steve Harriett said often, deputies, stopping a vehicle and asking for a driver's license, are shown one of these photo ID's. "I don't know why they think they can get away with this," he said, "but they will try anyway."

The photo ID card is a different color and specifically says "For Identification Purposes Only." If you don't have a driver's license and need to show a photo ID, this is the way to go. It takes time to get one, but as photo ID's are often required, it's the only way to go.

So now I know, and you have been informed. Speaking of driver's license, have you ever noticed on the Herald's "Police Blotter" (usually on Page 2A), the number of people who are stopped by Sanford police and charged with driving with a revoked/restricted license, or not having one at all? From examining these reports, most of the traffic stops were made because their vehicle had a light inoperative, broken window, were speeding, making illegal turns, or other reasons. Hey, if you don't have a legal license, at least you can keep your car in proper order. Neff said.

### Reading running to find a cure or end to strokes

To the Editor

Firstly, let me take this opportunity to thank you for taking the time to read my letter. I am Ruth Traber. I am writing in the hopes that I might get a little local news coverage with the objective in mind that I might be able to realize a dream. I have joined the "Train To End Stroke" running team and now dream that I will be on the running

team that represents Central Florida at the "Rock 'N Roll" half marathon in Arizona this coming January.

I am 53 years old and have been running 5K runs for other charitable courses for a year now. The reason I have chosen my biggest challenge (this half marathon) is for personal and community reasons.

Did you know that here, in Central Florida, approximately 10,000 people will die from strokes? Do you personally know the risk factors for stroke? Do you know how many more of our neighbors will be crippled by this horrible sad night-

mare? This hits home for me in two ways.

No. 1 - I am a nurse at South Seminole Hospital and watch these horrible events unfold before my eyes. Loss of independence, I think, is among one of the cruelest blows that Mother Nature can deal to us. And strokes happen to anyone. Not just the old, but to infants, children and young people. Rehabilitation is long and expensive.

And No. 2 - I myself am at a terribly high risk, in spite of taking very good care of myself, exercising like a fiend. I carry a

gene mutation that causes my blood to clot unusually fast - not good at all. Because of this gene, I look into the face of death everyday.

I'm looking for pledge donations, emotional support and a cure in my lifetime. Anyone in the community that is touched by stroke, I would love to hear from so that I have raised enough funds to run in Arizona. My deadline is Oct. 19.

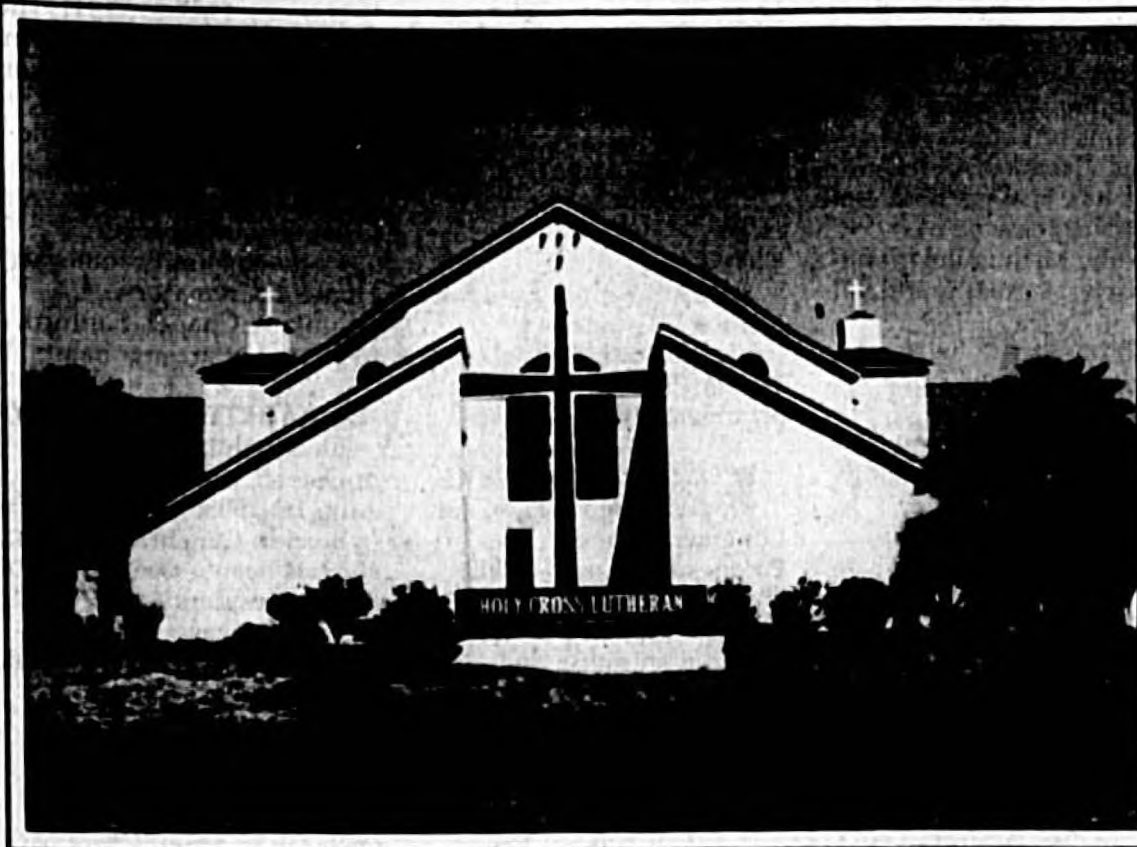

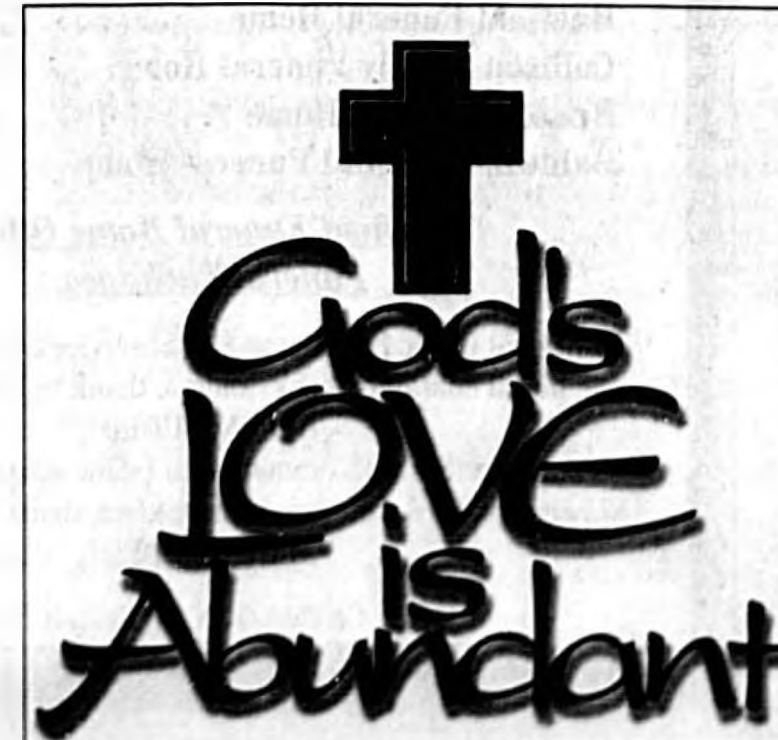

Dinner is on your own at one of the many nearby restaurants.

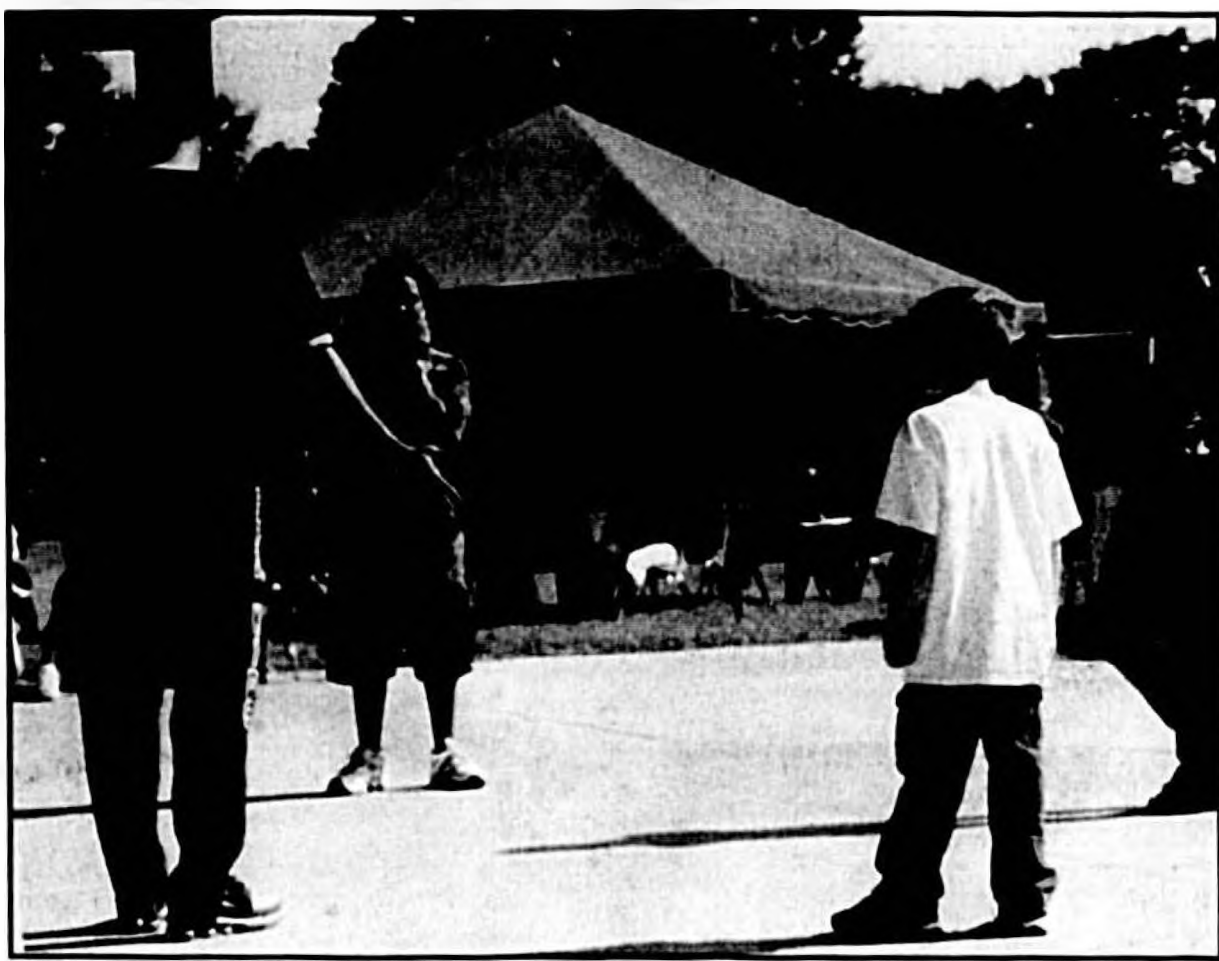
Saturday, Sept. 24 there will be a Luau featuring a Polynesian buffet beginning at 7 p.m. Cost is \$20 per person.

## Former Globetrotter brings skills, dreams to Hopper Center School

Tyrong Brown, basketball player for the Harlem Globetrotters, paid a recent visit to Hopper Center School, where he spoke and demonstrated many of the Globetrotter's ball entertainment tricks.

Brown is a living example that dreams do come true.

A native of Savannah, Ga., his goal since the age of nine, was to play basketball for the Harlem Globetrotters team.

"This opportunity didn't come until he finished Beach High School, Draughons Junior College, and Savannah State where he majored in Physical Education where

he was a 3.0 grade point student.

To motivate the Hopper Center students, he encouraged them to select a goal for their life.

He told them to always have determination, be persistent, trustworthy, respectful, responsible, be fair, play by the rules, and always work hard to achieve their goals.

## Stetson's Corner What's next for park

This is the second of two parts about Deputy Eugene Gregory's dream of a park in Geneva. This column features comments from Sheriff's Deputy Todd Moderson, future park options, and conclusions.

In light of last year's hurricane season and recent flooding, concerns have been expressed again about flooding at the park site.

The engineers involved with the park layout had addressed this and included raised walkways and boardwalks a couple feet above the hundred year flood plain in the design. They felt the park might be closed two months of the year at most and viewed it comparable to the flooding that occurs at other recreation areas like Mullet Lake.

Commissioners Henley and Morris, although clearly unhappy about the landowners' position, unfortunately never fully supported a park in Geneva, characterizing it as a sparsely populated area, and hard to get to. They pointed out that the County does not build parks with facilities in rural areas "where no one lives", and that they had given direction for the Natural Lands Acquisition committee not to add more land to rural areas, especially land that could not be used or developed.

The two options that Commissioners Morris and Carey are now looking at are 1) a "naming opportunity" somewhere in District 2 or 5, naming something after Deputy

Gregory to honor him and/or 2) building a real memorial monument in a more central location like Five Points site of the new Criminal Justice complex on 17-92.

A few days after the vote, I caught up with Deputy Todd Moderson who has been spearheading the park initiative for almost six years. Although understandably disappointed at the turn of events, Todd will be working with the Sheriff's Office to find alternatives for a substation in Geneva and possibly enough land for a playground.

Deputy Moderson told me that he cannot thank the individuals and businesses in the community enough for their generous donations, pledges, and contributions of money, labor, and services to support the project. Once a new plan is in place, he envisions re-contacting these contributors to redirect their donations toward the new plans. "The initiative would never have gotten this far without this grass roots effort to make improvements for our kids and the community," he said. "I am so appreciative for the community support."

The community support of the park in terms of \$450,000 donated labor and services happened because people felt an intimate connection to Deputy Gregory, and clearly saw this as a way to honor him by continuing his vision. As of this writing,

I had not received a comment from the landowner's attorney Steven Dunegan. I did speak with some residents on Lake Harney Road who were in full support of the park and were disappointed to hear this news.

I disagree with Commissioner Morris that Geneva's kids and families don't need a park because they live in one. More than 500 chil-

dren attend Geneva Elementary, not including the children who go to private schools and are home schooled. I think that is more than a handful. To conclude that because we live in a more natural setting we don't have a need to gather families together or need playground equipment for kids, makes no sense.

I also don't understand why the County opposes adding more rural land to the Natural Lands designated area. The reason that Seminole County has "urban" areas like Red Bug Lake Road and Oviedo is because developers were allowed to bulldoze thousands of acres of once rural land, and replace it with concrete subdivisions.

Let's check the score between Seminole County and Geneva: Landfill - YES. Sewage spraying - YES. Possible \$16 million Lake Jesup Muck Removal project - YES. Possible prison location - YES. County park for families and children - NO.

My opinion is that this is another example of Seminole County, Florida's Natural Choice, choosing not to support its most natural location.

tivity. The zoo actually has six of this extremely rare species from western Africa.

Among the smallest of monkeys is the cotton-top tamarin. Guests can see the white-maned baby at the zoo, but they have to look closely. The thumb-sized baby usually clings to the back of its father. The whole clan takes part in raising the little one. Scheidegg said the tamarins usually have twins, but just the one baby was born July 14.

The tamarins are found in a small area of northwestern Colombia. Their habitat has shrunk and less than 3,000 are thought to live in the wild, Scheidegg said.

Behind the scenes in the reptile and amphibian area are blue poison dart frog tadpoles and five baby Maximilian's vipers.

The snakes are also called lance-headed vipers, according to herpetologist John Thompson. He explained that the vipers are deadly venomous even at a week old. They were born live, but their venom is probably not enough to kill a person yet.

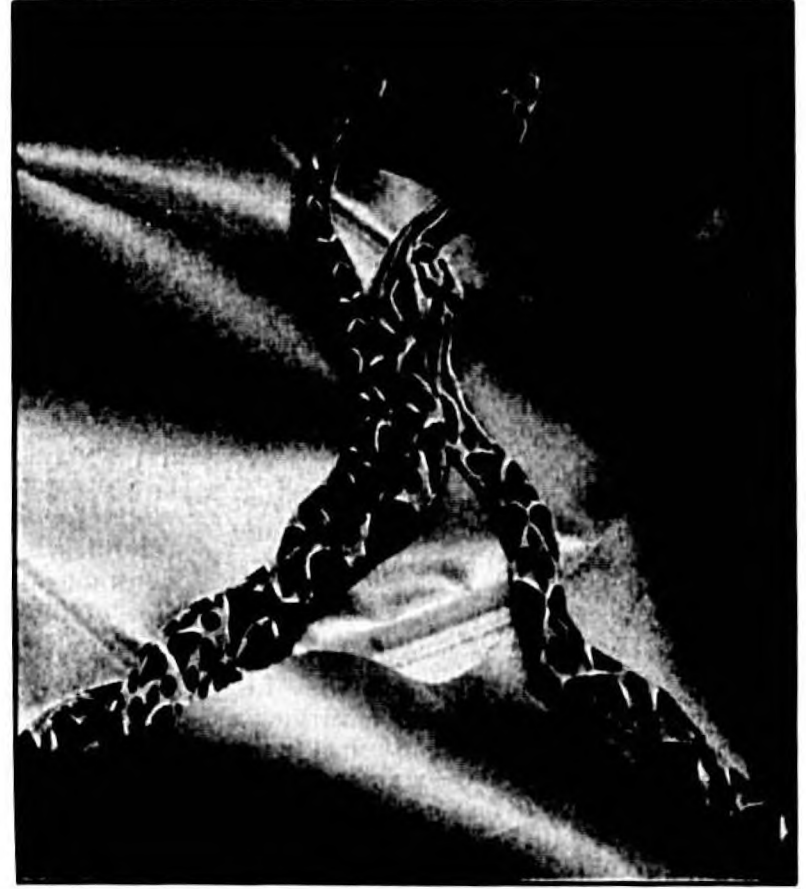
The blue poison dart frogs come from South America and were once used by native people to poison darts for hunting. Some of the tadpoles have turned into tiny versions of the frogs, which remain fairly small in adulthood. Thompson pointed out the difference between poison and venom. The frogs are poisonous because a predator would ingest the poison, but the snakes are venomous because they inject it into prey or an attacker.

Born in late June, the red-fronted macaws have their first feathers. Bird keeper Heather Holtz said the macaws come from Bolivia, but are not on public display yet. There are about 3,000 left in the wild. The bright green birds have a distinctive, large red spot on their heads. Right now they have orange feathers under their wings and overly large feet to grow into.

To see some of these creatures, visit the zoo on 17-92 along Lake Monroe in Sanford.

They were born just more than a week ago. Lastly, below is a tiny blue poison dart frog just over his tadpole stage. All these babies were born this summer at the zoo.

violation told him he'd been driving down 1st Street "forever".

"But, now he knows to come down 3rd Street," Crapps said.

In a month or so, all the truck drivers will probably have spread the word, Crapps said. The officer said all of the merchants have his cell phone number and he is more than willing to direct traffic for them on 3rd Street if they need help while loading and unloading.

"Everybody seems pleased to have a foot patrol down on 1st Street again," Crapps said.

Libby Ferrell, owner of Miss Libby's Antique Emporium and Arts and Ends, said that 1st Street used to have an officer assigned to 1st Street, but when that stopped traffic became a nuisance. Some of those complaints regarded the trucks driving down on the brick, drivers not stopping at stop signs, and people not obeying the 15-mph speed limit.

"We are absolutely delighted that Ofc. Crapps has been assigned," Ferrell said.

Her husband, Carey Ferrell, agreed: "Trucks were a real problem."

According to him, the bricks are just in a sand base, and the semi-trucks can be damaging.

"We're just glad to have a police officer down here," Carey Ferrell said.

Ofc. Crapps actually began his career walking the streets of downtown in 1987 until

1994. He said back then there wasn't a truck problem, because it was a paved road. He then became a DUI officer working the midnight shift for ten years. When Chief Tooley told him the force was looking to put somebody on 1st Street Crapps hoped to change his career with the police department again.

"I told him, I'd sure be interested," he said.

Iona Brown, owner of Beatty Hearing Center, is also glad Ofc. Crapps is downtown now.

"This is a nice asset downtown," Brown said.

In addition to controlling the traffic, owners of Magnolia

Square Treasures, John and Debbie Oriel, said that it also helps deter any illegal activity from happening such as shoplifting and pan handling.

"I think it's great," Debbie Oriel said.

Ofc. Crapps arrives on 1st Street at 8 a.m. and leaves around 4:30 p.m. everyday. He spends most of the day walking up and down the street and popping his head into the businesses to chat with the merchants, all the while keeping an eye out for traffic and other problems.

"I pretty much know everyone down here, and they know me," he said. "We're all working together."

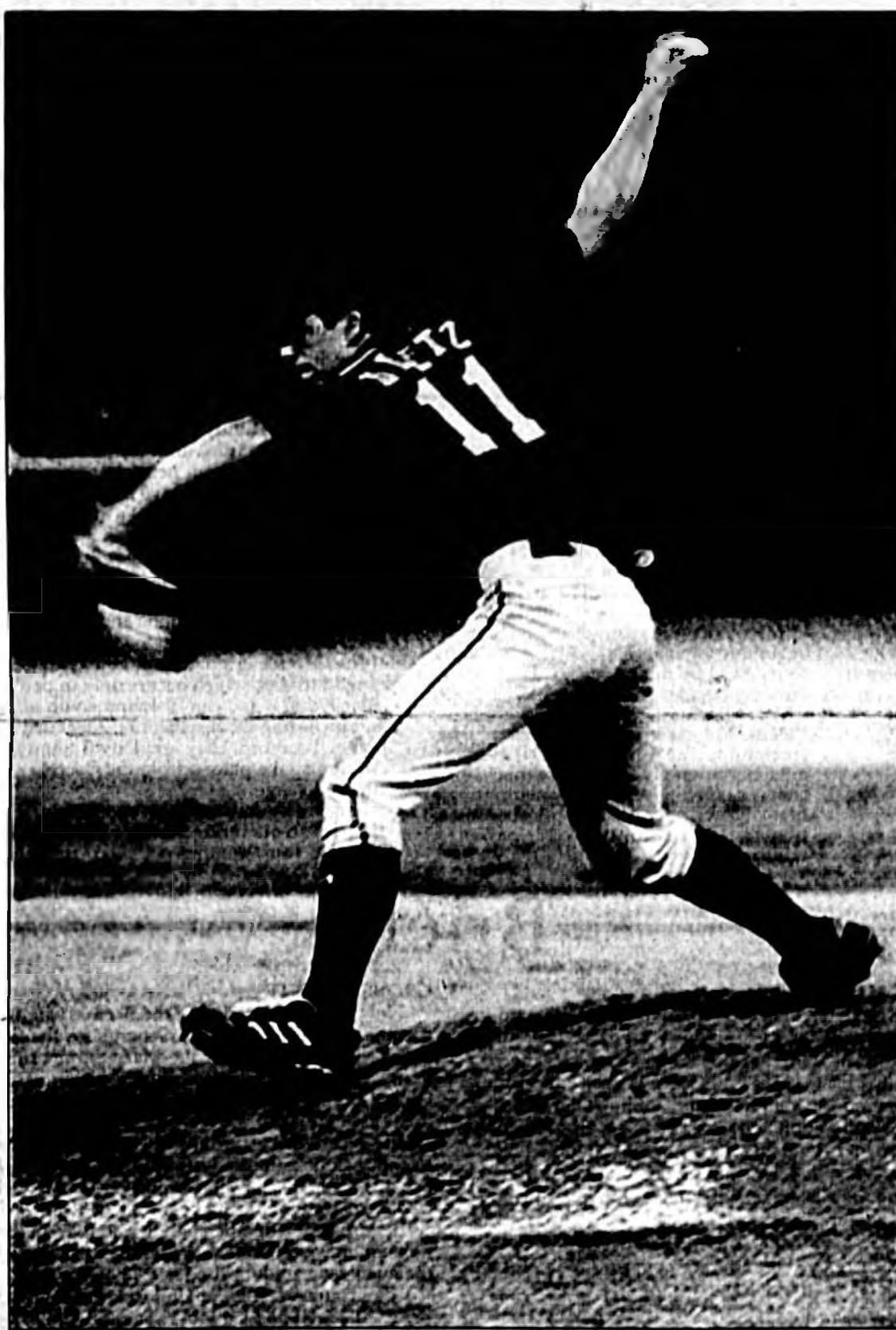
The regular season may not have gone as usual, but in the end, the Sanford Campbell-Losing American Legion Post 53 baseball team wound up in a familiar place.

## Alligator hunting permits available

Since 1988, the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has offered thrilling, hands-on, face-to-face alligator hunting opportunities that are unlike any other hunting experience imaginable.

If this type of hunting adventure sounds exciting to you, the FWC still has nearly 1,300 alligator harvest permits remaining for the upcoming season, available on a first-come, first-served basis through Sept. 20.

Permit holders are authorized to take two alligators from designated areas during specific harvest periods that run Sept. 1 through Oct. 8. Alligator harvest areas are listed at MyFWC.com/alligator under "Alligator Harvest Permit Availability."

Applicants have the option of applying at any county tax collector's office, license agent (retail outlet that sells hunting and fishing licenses), online at MyFWC.com/license or by calling toll-free 1-888-HUNT-FLORIDA (486-8356) from anywhere in the United States or Canada.

To secure a permit, applicants must submit payment for an alligator trapping license and two alligator-hide validation tags, or provide proof of a valid alligator trapping license (must be valid through Oct. 8), plus pay the fee for two hide validation tags. No other hunting licenses are required.

The cost for a resident alligator trapping license and hide validation tags is \$272, and non-residents pay \$1,022. For each alligator taken, the hunter must complete and send in an alligator harvest report form to See Outdoors, Page 2B

County Sports Hall of Fame, has a career record of 1,148-888 (.564) in 14 major league seasons as a manager with the New York Mets (1984-90), Cincinnati Reds (1993-95), Baltimore Orioles (1996-97) and Los Angeles Dodgers (1999-2000). He was named the 1997 American League Manager of the Year after leading the Orioles to the A.L. East Division title. As a player, he collected three Gold Glove Awards and was a four-time All-Star second baseman over 13 seasons with the Orioles, Braves, Phillies, and Cubs.

"I'm looking forward to the opportunity to wear the uniform of the United States, and to the challenge of trying to bring the Baseball World Cup back to America for the first time since 1974," said Johnson.

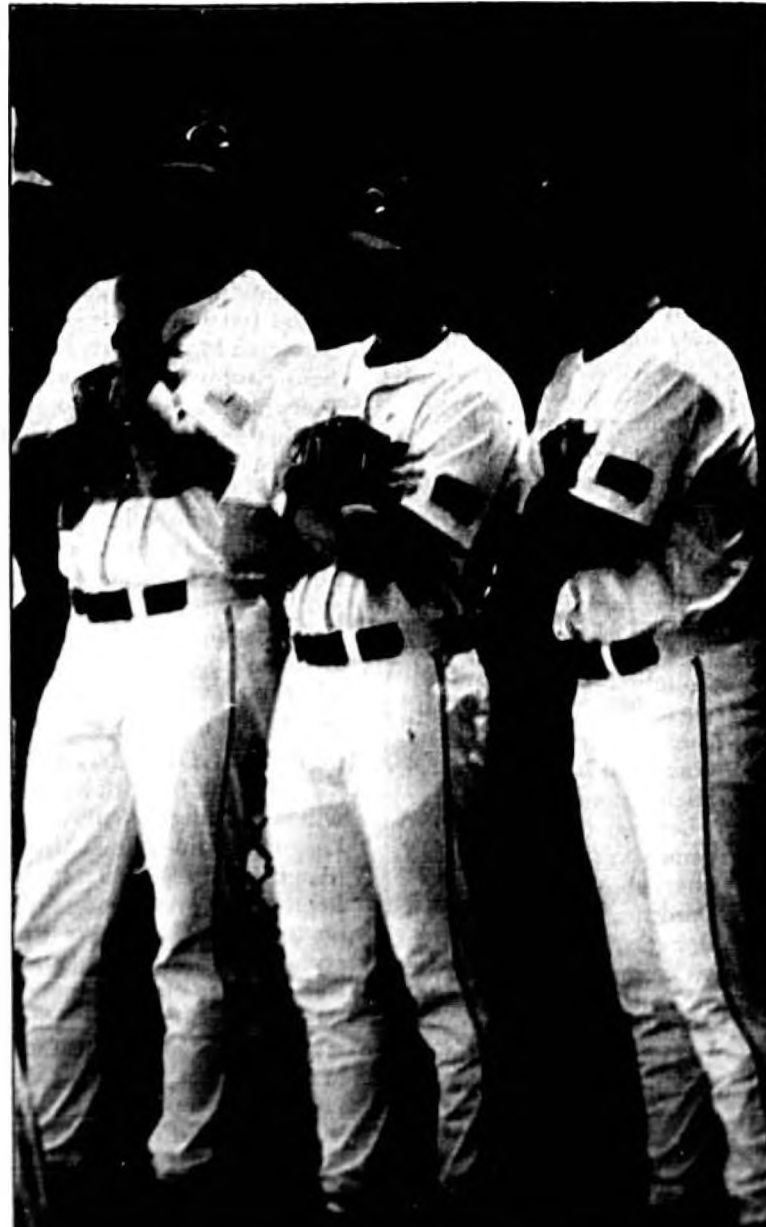
"Davey brings a great managerial style and major league experience to the position," said Bob Watson, USA

"We are very pleased to have more of our football games on television and distributed to a wider audience than ever before," said Conference USA Commissioner Britton Banowsky. "Our fans around the country will be able to watch nearly all C-USA football games during this historic season."

CSTV will air at least 20

national and regional telecasts of C-USA football during the 2005 season. The first four weeks will feature exciting regional inter-conference rivalries with the next four weeks highlighting key C-USA league match-ups. The network's debut Conference USA game is Saturday, September 3 when Duke visits East Carolina. Other non-conference rivalries on the docket include TCU at SMU, Mississippi State at Tulane and New Mexico at UTEP. Six different C-USA schools are featured over the first four weeks of the Conference USA league game portion of the schedule.

The ESPN schedule kicks off with three games on the opening night of the 2005 col-

lege football season, Thursday, September 1. the FWC. Data gathered from these forms enable FWC biologists to monitor population trends and impacts on the annual harvest.

A resident or nonresident alligator trapping agent license is also available to consumers for \$52. This license allows the holder to assist a trapper in taking alligators, but only in the presence of the permitted trapper. All persons seeking a harvest permit must be at least 18 years old by Sept. 1, and only one harvest permit per person will be issued.

## OSCEOLA TURKEY HUNT

Special-opportunity Osceola turkey hunt applications, for the 2006 spring turkey season, are now available from the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC).

To apply, hunters can obtain applications at MyFWC.com and at all FWC regional offices. Applications will be accepted online at MyFWC.com, at county tax collectors' offices or at any license agent beginning 10 a.m. (EDT) Sept. 1 and must be received by midnight Oct. 17. A random drawing decides who will receive the coveted permits.

Demand for these hunts is typically greater than the number of available permits, but hunters can increase their chances of being selected by submitting as many \$5 nonrefundable applications as they like. Successful applicants pay an additional \$50 - \$175, depending on the

## special-opportunity hunt area selected.

Participation rules limit out-of-state hunters to one permit per hunt.

These special hunts have been created for sportsmen looking to take an Osceola, the "crown jewel" of the turkey hunters' Grand Slam. The FWC designs special-opportunity turkey hunts to take place on large tracts of land, with great habitat, healthy turkey populations and with a limited number of hunters.

The Osceola is a highly prized subspecies of wild turkey, which occurs only in peninsular Florida, and can be found south of and including Dixie, Gilchrist, Alachua, Union, Bradford, Clay and Duval counties. All hunts take place within the Osceola turkey's range.

# First on TV

Here's another historical sports fact. It seems that baseball fans have been watching games on television for much longer than many people may believe.

The first Major League Baseball game was televised on Aug. 26, 1939, 66 years ago this coming week. It was a double-header between the Cincinnati Reds and Brooklyn Dodgers, played at Ebbets Field, and broadcast over WKBS-TV in New York City.

It was in black & white naturally, and as there were no networks until May of 1941, the broadcast was only seen in metropolitan New York City. The Reds made it into the World Series that year, but lost 4-0 to the New York Yankees.

Perhaps we could say that Sanford played a part in it. Walter Lanier "Red" Barber was the announcer for that game. Although he was born in 1908 in Columbus, Mississippi, his family moved to Sanford in 1918, and he graduated from Sanford High School in 1926.

Between those two games on TV, Barber interviewed Leo Dorocher, manager of the Dodgers, and William McKechnie, manager of the Reds.

Earlier in his career, Barber broadcast the first play-by-play Cincinnati Reds opening day game on radio in 1934. Barber died in Tallahassee on Oct. 22, 1992.

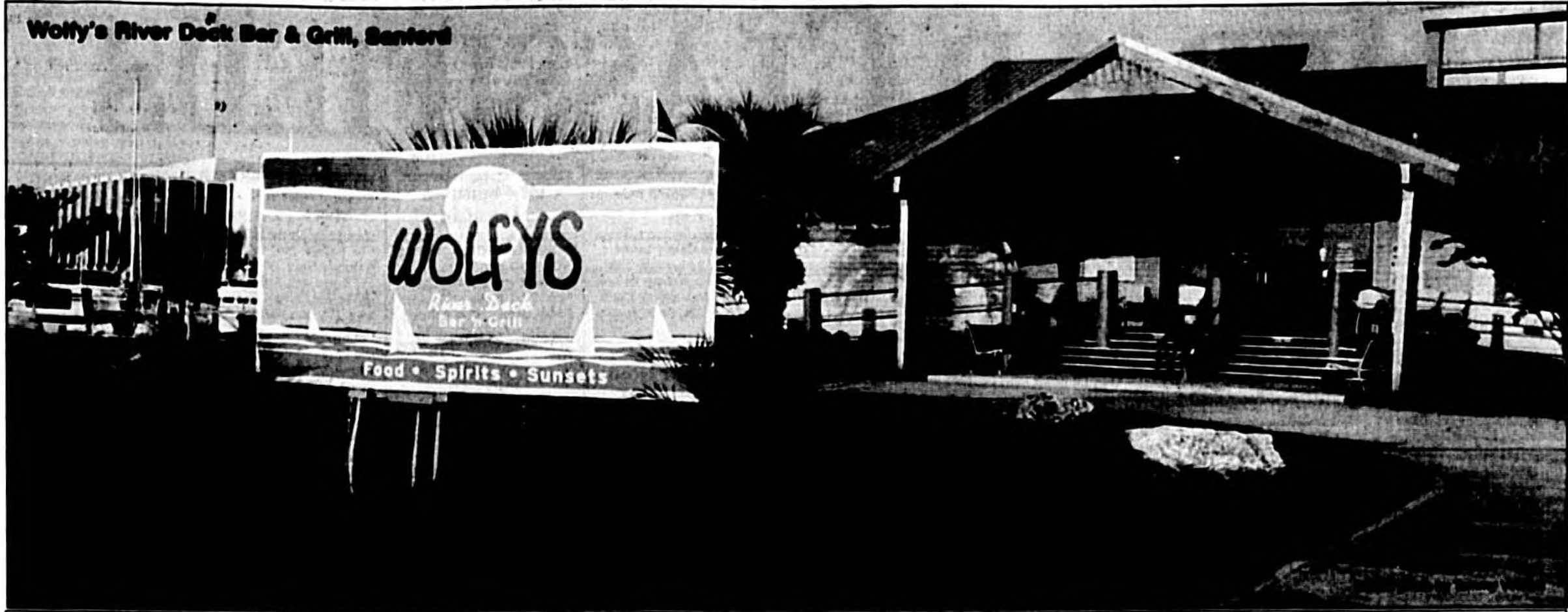
