

LINDY LEAVES WITH WIFE ON LONG AIR TOUR

Takes Off From Roosevelt Field In Speedy Plane For Miami

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Sept. 18.—The Lindberghs took the sky road again today. For their 7,000-mile air tour of South America, Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and his wife took along a small leather grip, two big suitcases, a camping outfit, a camera and a cushion for Mrs. Lindbergh.

Smiling like a pair of youngsters, the world's most noted flying couple took off for Miami at 8:55 A. M. They will bring their Lockheed Vega machine down to south in Washington and stop again somewhere between Washington and Miami for refueling.

"We leave Miami Friday for South America and I expect to be back in about three weeks," said the Colonel.

Colonel Lindbergh will survey and inspect existing and projected routes for the Pan American Airways Company, of which he is technical adviser. The flight will inaugurate a new mail line to Panama, Dutch Guiana.

The flying route covers the circle the Colonel blazed on his goal flight a year and a half ago. However, this time he will reverse the direction and fly over partially new territory.

When the Lindbergh plane took off the weather was hazy and a slight northeast wind was blowing. Deep clouds were visible in the field, the ship rose smoothly and zoomed away into the mist in the south.

The Colonel was hatless, as usual. He wore a blue suit, white shirt with collar attached and a pullover. A small red flag was attached to a gray sweater. He also wore a limited gray cap, tan shoes and knitted stockings.

The trip through the West Indies, Central and South America will be made with frequent stops. A co-pilot and a radio operator will accompany the Lindberghs in their plane. For the first time on any long distance flight made by the Colonel, he will use two-way radio communication.

The weather and other information will be relayed every 15 minutes. The plane will report to land every fifteen minutes.

W. T. Trippe, president of the Pan American Airways Company and his wife will accompany the Lindberghs from San Juan to Panama, the Colonel said, and may make the entire trip.

Bomb Blasts Cause Panic In Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Sept. 18.—(INS)—A bomb explosion threw East Side Cleveland into a panic early today and imperiled the lives of 10 persons who were sleeping in their homes. The blasts, all three of which were set off almost at the same instant, first of windows and damaged plastering in homes for blocks around. They are believed, according to police, to have been the result of a neighborhood quarrel.

Two bombs, which were placed under the house of John Gince, 61, tore a hole in the house. Gince was thrown from his bed by the force of the explosion. Three other men were in the house. Six persons were in the second house which was bombed. All the occupants of the bombed homes were taken to police headquarters for questioning.

ANALYSIS SHOWS SANFORD WATER PURE, HEALTHFUL

State Health Board Finds Content Okey In Extensive Report

There isn't anything wrong with Sanford City water. In fact, a recent analysis, authorized by the City Commission and made public today, shows the water to be of pure quality and possessing many healthful qualities.

Complaints have been lodged recently with the City heads about the color of the water at times and about the presence of alleged impurities. In a detailed analysis, the Southern Testing Laboratories furnish figures on the proportionate part of each property found in the water.

The report says about the iron content, "We believe the amount is about 1.66 parts per million, excessive and is the cause of the discoloration of the water, otherwise the analysis of Sanford water is about what one might expect for that section of the state."

A supplementary explanation of the 16.71, prepared by the State Board of Health, lists as follows: The water is rich in mineral and organic matter. Total solids are 467 pounds in every million pounds of water. Organic matter amounts to 72 pounds on the same basis, while the sodium and bicarbonate content amounts to 78 and 170 pounds respectively. Sulphate totals 39.5 pounds and chloride 112 pounds.

Following is the analysis, based on the content of each property found in a million pounds of water: Organic matter 72, silica 11.6, iron oxide and alumina 7.6, total iron 1.66, calcium 42.8, magnesium 19.8, sodium 78, bicarbonate 170.3, sulphate 39.5, chloride 112, total solids 467, hardness 179, ammonia (free) 0.1, ammonia (combined) 0.2.

Organic matter means the amount of vegetable or mineral content. The Board of Health report says the organic matter found in the specimen of local water is of vegetable origin and the amount indicated is "within reason."

FOREST FIRES STILL RAGE IN WESTERN AREA

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 18.—(INS)—With three persons missing, another near death and 500 homeless, forest fires which already have caused a property loss of \$2,000,000 continued unchecked today.

Continued dry weather was threatening increased damage in Ventura county where flames swept through an oil field and destroyed the homes of 400 of workers. The flames continue to threaten Santa Paula, numerous other towns and several of the richest Southern California oil towns.

A heat wave which bore over the southern part of California for the past few days is causing the firefighters to be exhausted. Six of the five firefighters have been prostrated from the heat.

Now flames were spreading through Orange county, sweeping down Santa Ana Canyon, threatening citrus groves, farms and the villages of Olive and Petaluma. Ranch buildings, a summer resort in Goose Valley and thousands of dollars in crops were destroyed by a forest and brush fire in San Diego county. The flames were still out of control early today.

Santa Barbara is endangered by another uncontrolled fire in the Santa Barbara National Forest which was slowly working its way toward the city. A heavy bill of smoke hangs over Los Angeles like a dense blanket of fog.

SEATTLE, Sept. 18.—(INS)—Exaggerating flames continued today to sweep the forests of the northwest, taking a heavy toll of property.

Solon Asks Hoover To Assist Tobacco Growers In South

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 18.—(INS)—President Hoover was asked by Senator Simmons, (D) of North Carolina, today to come to the aid of the tobacco growers of that state who he said, are confronted by wholesale bankruptcy because of a late market.

The North Carolina tobacco market, Simmons told the President, did not open this year until Sept. 1, and buyers are offering prices which do not even cover production costs.

He already has conferred with farm board members, particularly with James Stone, tobacco member of the group, he said. There is little hope of help from that source, however, since the board makes its decisions in farmers' entirety by the high cooperative marketing associations. Simmons pointed out that it is too late, as far as this year's crop is concerned, to form a cooperative through which to deal with the board.

He asked the President to take emergency steps to relieve the situation.

Japan To Join Italy, France On Navy Issue

GENEVA, Sept. 18.—(INS)—Japan intends to join hands with France and Italy in opposing the suggestion that submarines be abolished. It was strongly indicated today.

Delegates of those three powers are holding numerous conferences upon naval affairs, especially the future status of the submarine. A member of the Japanese delegation informed International News Service that his country is "very firm" upon retention of submarines as a weapon of defense. He called this agency of warfare "the poor man's defence," adding:

Illinois Is Given Best Chance To Championship Of Big Ten

CHICAGO, Sept. 17.—(INS)—The annual conference football got off to a flying start yesterday as the Big Ten universities began their practice on the fields. The first week is expected to be taken up by issuing uniforms, space and mental instruction. Bertrams probably will be resorted to until next week.

With the exception of Michigan University and Ohio State, the head coaches who acted in the capacity last year will return to their posts. The Wolverine will be directed by Harry K. Wells, former All-American back, and the Buckeyes by Dan Williams, a former Ohio State player.

Illinois, who formerly was an assistant coach at Michigan State, "Tad" Wilman, Wisconsin replaces Dr. John Wilce. A. Stagg at Chicago, Dick Hanley at Northwestern, "Glimmy" Clark at Wisconsin, "Red" Cross at Purdue, Bert Ferguson at Iowa, Dr. C. W. Spence at Minnesota, Bob Sapp at Illinois and Pat Pace at Indiana are the head coaches of the other schools.

Illinois, champions of last year, and Minnesota are conceded to have the best chances for the Big Ten.

Michigan, Wisconsin, and Northwestern and possibly Indiana loom as outside championship possibilities in present calculations. Purdue, Ohio State and Chicago appear to trail the others somewhat, judging from their present material.

Plenty of reserve material and many veterans from last year's teams place Illinois and Minnesota among the most powerful teams in the conference. Wisconsin, despite reports that reserve material is low, figures in the fight up with the leaders. Purdue has some excellent backfield material, but the line is reported to be in need of strengthening.

Needling but one game, the Cubs should be in before dark. For should they miss the Robins with both barrels the Pirates have but to lose to Philadelphia to give Chicago the pennant. For the second successive time Washington and Detroit were halted by darkness at the end of the eighth inning. But the Senators managed to squeeze in a 10 to 9 win. The Red Sox, 4 to 3.

Giant Oil-Electric Locomotive Said to Herald New Rail Era

TORONTO, Ont., Sept. 17.—A giant oil-electric locomotive that can travel across the continent without a stop at sixty miles an hour, operating at one-fourth the fuel cost of a steam locomotive, recently hauled the second section of the International Limited from Montreal to Toronto. The International Limited is the last through train of the Canadian National Railway between these two Canadian cities and Detroit and Chicago in the United States.

The Nine Thousand, as the locomotive is officially known, consists of two self-contained units generating from Diesel motors the electrical power consumed. It covered the 133 miles from Montreal to Toronto at a scheduled speed of 55 miles an hour and at one time the speedometer in the car of S. J. Hungerford, vice-president of the Canadian National, pointed to 76 miles an hour.

Leaving Gananoque, an intermediate station, the Nine Thousand made sixty miles an hour in two minutes from a standstill. A steam locomotive, hauling the same train of eight cars, would require about four minutes to attain a similar speed. The new locomotive's rate of acceleration, railway officials explain, is due to the fact that it utilizes its full power at any speed, whereas a steam locomotive reaches its maximum power only when it is traveling close to its maximum speed.

Engineering talent of England, the United States and Canada has combined with that of the Canadian National Railway to develop the present Nine Thousand. The Canadian National already has a number of smaller cars, operated on the same principle, running on many of its branch lines.

Railroaders say that the Canadian National oil-electric, hauling a train more smoothly than a steam engine is able to do and at a fraction of the cost, and requiring no overhead wire or third rail equipment, heralds a new era in rail transportation on the continent. At present the Nine Thousand is the most powerful locomotive of its kind in operation. It is intended that in the near future it will be put on a passenger line, possibly the Grand Trunk, which is to be operated by the Canadian National.
