## LINDY LEAVES WITH WIFE ON LONG AIR TOUR

Takes Off From Roosevelt Field In Speedy Plane For Miami On First Leg Of Flight

ROOSEVELT FIELD, N. Y., Sept. 18.—(INS)—The Lindberghs took the sky road again today. For their 7,000-mile air tour of South America, Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh and his wife took along a small leather grip, two big suit cases, a camping outfit, a camera and a cushion for Mrs. Lindbergh.

Smiling like a pair of youngsters, the world's most famous couple took off for Miami at 8:55 A. M. They will bring their Lockheed Vega machine down to earth in Washington and stop again somewhere between Washington and Miami for refueling.

"We leave Miami Friday for South America and I expect to be back in about three weeks," said the Colonel.

Colonel Lindbergh will survey and inspect existing and projected routes for the Pan American Airways Company of which he is president. The flight will inaugurate a new mail line to Parámaribo, Dutch Guiana.

The flying route covers the circle the Colonel blazed on his good will flight a year and a half ago. However, this time he will reverse the direction and fly over partially new territory.

When the Lindbergh plane took off the weather was hazy and a slight northeast wind was blowing. Deep, gray clouds were scattered in the field, the ship rose smoothly and zoomed away into the mist in the south.

The Colonel was batless as usual.

He wore a blue suit, white shirt with collar attached and a necktie. Mrs. Lindbergh was dressed in a gray velvet dress with a knitted grey vest, tan shoes and radio stockings.

The trip through the West Indies, Central and South America will be made with frequent stops. A co-pilot and a radio operator will accompany the Lindberghs. For the first time on any long distance flight made by the Colonel, he will use two-way radio communication. The weather will be relayed every 15 minutes to the plane. The marcher's radio operator will report to land every fifteen minutes.

W. T. Tripp, president of the Pan American Airways Company and his wife will accompany the Lindberghs from San Juan to Parámaribo, the Colonists said, and may make the entire trip.

Aside from the danger of flying over water, mountains and jungles the Lindberghs will face the hazard of a smallpox area in Panama.

Colonel Lindbergh was reported as planning to spend tonight at Winston-Salem, N. C., and hop for Miami tomorrow.

## Thrashing Fails To End Taking Ways Of Two Negro Youths

Sometimes a vigorous application of the rod or strap has a good wholesome effect upon the conduct of a youngster, and sometimes it doesn't.

Local police found that out today after taking into custody two negro boys, Anderson Bradley and Richard Groghan, for the robbery of a store last night at 804 Locust Avenue. The pair, nabbed last week for the theft of two bicycles and a quantity of groceries, was given a sound thrashing on the order of Municipal Judge W. E. White.

While their parents strapped them severely, the boys promised to "turn over a new leaf." Last night policeman R. L. Kennedy treated the pair shortly after they had rifled the cash register of J. Dimandia and made away with \$100.

Chief of Police Roy G. Williams, his partner worn and frazzled decided upon a more strenuous line of action. He turned the boys over to County authorities. Their fate will be decided later, but it was believed that efforts would be made to place them in the State reform school at Marianna. Bradley and Groghan are believed to be responsible for several petty thievery which have been reported recently to police.

## Bomb Blasts Cause Panic In Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Sept. 18—(INS)—Three bombs exploded in a panic early today and imperiled the lives of 10 persons who were sleeping in their homes. The blasts, all three of which were set off almost at the same instant, shattered windows and damaged plastering in houses for blocks around. They are believed, according to police, to have been the result of a neighborhood quarrel. Two bombs, which were placed under the home of John Glince, 61, tore a big hole in the house. Glince was thrown from his bed by the force of the explosion. Three other men were in the house. Six persons were in the second house which was bombed. All the occupants of the bombed houses were taken to police headquarters for questioning.

## ANALYSIS SHOWS SANFORD WATER PURE, HEALTHFUL

### State Health Board Finds Content Okey In Extensive Report

There isn't anything wrong with Sanford City water. In fact, a recent analysis, authorized by the City Commission and made public today, shows the water to be of pure quality and possessing many healthful qualities.

Complaints have been lodged recently with the City about the color of the water at times and about the presence of alleged impurities. In a detailed analysis, the Southern Testing Laboratories furnish figures on the proportionate part of each property found in the water.

The report says about the iron content, "we believe the amount even 1.06 parts per million is excessive and is the cause of the discoloration of the water, otherwise the analysis of Sanford water is about what one might expect for that section of the state."

A supplementary explanation of the report, prepared by the State Board of Health, indicates that the water is rich in minerals and organic matter. Total solids are 467 pounds in every million pounds of water. Organic matter amounts to 72 pounds on the same basis, while the sodium and bicarbonate content amounts to 78 and 170 pounds respectively. Bicarbonate totals 39.5 pounds and chloride 112 pounds.

Following is the analysis, based on the content of each property found in a million pounds of water:

### Biggest Investment Trust Is Formed By Powerful Bankers

NEW YORK, Sept. 18—(INS)—Clearing a wave of gigantic mergers, the world's first billion-dollar investment trust has been formed by a group of four of the most powerful banking houses of the East, it was learned today.

The merger, sponsored by Stone & Webster, Inc., investment unit of the banking and engineering company, will also include Behnke, Hirsch & Co., the New York investment bankers, and Marine Union Investors, Inc., the investment section of the Marine Trust Company of Buffalo, N. Y.

The Marine Trust is the largest of 16 New York state banks which will be acquired in this merger and its president, George F. Rand, will be president of the new investment trust corporation.

The report discusses the total iron content as follows: "The iron results given as 1.66 is approximately five times what it should be for satisfactory water supplies in the state. Nevertheless in untreated water supplies in Florida this amount is found."

The calcium part is described as normal and the magnesium content is declared "not excessive." The amount of sodium and potassium is what might be expected for well supplies in a locality near the coast, the report goes on to say. The bicarbonate part is within the "normal limits" and the sulphate proportion is normal.

The presence of chlorides does not indicate pollution and the total content is declared to be in keeping with the content of other supplies for municipalities. "The hardness of Sanford water," the Board declares, "is about the average for untreated waters in Florida." The ammonia content is well within the limits allowed by the Board.

## FOREST FIRES STILL RAGE IN WESTERN AREA

### Deaths And Property Damage Mount With Continued Advance Of Raging Flames

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 18—(INS)—With three persons missing, another near death and 500 homeless, forest fires which have caused a property loss of \$2,000,000 continued unchecked today.

Continued dry weather was increasing increased damage to the southern part of California for the past few days has seriously hampered the fire fighting crews. Six of the fire fighters have been prostrated from the heat.

New flames were spreading through Orange county, sweeping Santa Ana Canyon, threatening citrus groves, farms and the waters of Olive and Patella.

Johnson, who has been a widow since her husband was killed in the Tumtum district, was reported destroyed.

They crept into the town of Yacolt, Wash., and destroyed a factory, a power plant, school and rock crusher before it was driven back. A lumber camp, transmogrified into a fiery hell, was toward the city. A long pall of smoke hangs over Los Angeles like a dense blanket of fog.

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### Search Is Continued For Fugitive Negro

ABERDEEN, Miss., Sept. 18—(INS)—Search was continued in this vicinity today for Will McDonald, negro, wanted in the killing of Ted Miles, and the serious wounding of two other persons near here.

The wounded were Landon Bowen, 28, and his brother, Cooper, 18. The shooting occurred at the negro's cabin. The negro fled following the shooting and a posse was organized to scour the woods for him.

### PARMER KILLS WIFE, BELE

MACON, Ga., Sept. 18—(INS)—Health was today reported to have been the motive that caused Walter Bryant, 40, farmer, to shoot and kill his wife and himself at their home in Twiggs county yesterday. Neighbor said Bryant had complained frequently of feeling bad.

CHICAGO, Sept. 17—(INS)—The conference football got officially yesterday to its quest for the coveted championship. Afternoon practice of the Big Ten universities was with drills on the fundamentals.

The first week is expected to be taken up by issuing uniforms, space and mental instruction. Scrimmage probably will be resorted to until next week.

With the exception of Michigan University and Ohio State, head coaches who acted in capacity last year will return to their posts. The Wolverines will be directed by Harry Kipke, former All-American back, and the Buckeyes by Fred Willaman, a former Ohio State player.

Kipke, who is an assistant coach at Michigan State, succeeds "Tad" Wieman, Williams' replacement. Dr. John Wilcox, A. Stagg at Chicago, Dick Stanley at Northwestern, "Gloomy Gus" Thistlewhite at Wisconsin, George Phelan at Purdue, Bert Morrison at Iowa, Dr. C. W. Powers at Minnesota, Bob Sponars at Illinois and Pat Pace at Indiana are the head coaches of the other schools.

Illinois, champions of last year, and Minnesota are conceded to have the best chances for the 1929 season.

Michigan, Wisconsin, and Northwestern and possibly Indiana loom as outside championship possibilities in present estimation. Purdue, Illinois, Indiana and Chicago appear to trail the others somewhat. Judging from their present material.

Plenty of reserve material and many veterans from last year's squads place Illinois and Minnesota among the most powerful teams in the conference. Wisconsin, despite reports that reserve material is low, figures to be right up with the leaders. Indiana has some excellent back-field material, but the line is reported to be in need of strengthening.
