Sir Ronald Lindsay, the British ambassador, called today upon Assistant Secretary Bundy of the state department. Neither would reveal what was discussed.

Roosevelt has indicated he desired to negotiate directly with the British chief delegate or delegates and thus assume responsibility to Congress for any arrangement reached.

The convention opened during the morning and was marked by an address from Governor Dave Sholtz at the noon day luncheon session. Congressman-elect Mark Wilcox spoke during the afternoon.

The governor told assembled Democrats that he wanted his four years as governor to be given in "unselfish service" to the state and called upon members of his party to put aside "selfish gains" and to give all their energy and thought to making Florida a better place to live.

"In this room my fortunes in the political field changed," said the governor, recalling a political gathering here last summer. He said he had a warm spot in his heart for Orlando.

He revealed that his campaign for economy in government has already effected over 50 per cent savings in some departments.

The governor urged young men and women to take an active part in public affairs and called for intelligent and sound leadership. About 70 per cent of the people of Florida don't know which way to turn, he pointed out, explaining, however, that he had faith in the Democratic party to solve existing problems.

Attorney General Cary D. Landis spoke briefly, recalling that the people "had high hope of help" from the Democratic party and that Democrats have a tremendous forward to victory over all problems besetting the country. W. V. Knott, state treasurer and R. A. Gray, secretary of state, were introduced at the luncheon, along with other prominent Democrats.

The athletic temperament of our heroes on the grid-iron, golf links, boxing ring, polo field, or baseball diamond has always been an interesting subject to contemplate and often reveals apparent traits which belie their true character.

Bobby Jones is an excellent example of this. Cool, collected, apparently a machine hitting the little round golf ball, without any human emotion, the Atlanta wizard is moved by the same paroxysms of anger, joy, and fear which affect the ordinary run of duffers.

It can be recalled that when Jones was making his way towards the golfing pinnacle he was given to sudden bursts of temperament which saw many a golf club broken over his knee. Today during the big tournaments he never so much as blinks an eye when he misses a shot.

The sombre-faced Tommy Hitchcock, who plays polo with the same reckless abandon which characterized his war days, when, at the age of eighteen, he was shot down behind the German lines, and had plenty of thrilling experiences making his escape, also has an anomalous temperament.

Gene Tunney's temperament has been given credit for making him one of the most unpopular, albeit misunderstood, fighters of all time. Because he refused to be one of the "pugs", which he was not, and when he sought to improve his mind with literature, and his social life with special friends, he was called "high hat".

Babe Ruth is often accused of being a grandstander, of playing up to popular fancy. When he autographs baseballs for the neighborhood kids, or plays with the babies in his apartment, the charge is sometimes heard that he is merely doing it to catch the public eye.

Most of our athletic idols have many legendary tales woven around their names, some of them authentic and some of them made out of thin air, but in the temperament and character of most champions there usually runs a decided trace of human emotions which make them seem like any of the rest of us.
