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
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


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

Mr. Felime reassured him, however, telling him that the inflation of the currency had only begun and pointed out to him a scheme whereby he could profit greatly. The American promised to finance the German in the purchase of the hotel providing he would do exactly as told. The German promised and these were his instructions: "Very well," said Filene. "When I finish my dinner I'll give you a ten-dollar tip. Now, go tomorrow morning to

rive you a ten-dollar tip. Now, go tomorrow morning to the man who has this hotel for sale, take a lawyer with u, and draw up an option to buy the place at the lowest price you can get. Be sure to have in your option contract e that you shall be permitted to pay for it, whenever rou see fit and in marks, regardless of how plentiful or cap marks may b come. Then, as soon as the mark so cheap that you can buy enough marks for four can dollars to buy the hotel, proceed at once to close the deal and pay over the money. That will leave you six dollars for capital, and I am sure two dollars of that will be mough to furnish and properly equip the place. You will still have four dollars left with which to stock your wine cellar and larder and to pay your employes until a decent

venue begins to come in." This may sound foolish to the average person who variably fails to appreciate the extent to which currency

flation is almost inevitably carried. It did to the German raiter. Nevertheless, he had promised to do what he was old so he proceeded to secure the option.

Not long after that the great inflation of German cur-rency went on, until a bushel of marks was required to buy a loaf of bread. Mr. Filene forgot all about his talk with that waiter until five years later, when he was in

Germany again and visited that same cafe. He inquired the waiter whom he had previously known there.





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
