Civil Service Has Openings For Pupils

Federal agencies of the United States Civil Service Commission will train persons to do scientific and mechanical work in government laboratories while paying them as much as \$140 a month.

The positions are called trained scientific and technical aid, and requirements are few. Applicants must be at least 18 years of age, and must have completed one unit of high school study in physics, chemistry, mathematics, biology, or general science. They must pass a written test designed to measure aptitude for learning and adjusting to the duties of the position.

The positions to be filled are in Washington, D. C., and vicinity. In such agencies as the National Bureau of Standards, the Weather Bureau, the Bellville Research Center and the Bureau of Home Economics of the Department of Agriculture, the Bureau of Mines and others. After a brief training period, trainees may become eligible for promotion to higher grade positions with prospects of further promotion.

Most of the positions pay \$1440 a year plus overtime, but some may be filled at \$1260 and \$1820 a year. For a lengthened work-week of 48 hours (including 8 hours of overtime) the added pay increases. A \$1440 a year salary to \$1782; \$1320 to \$1678.92; and \$1260 to \$1532.88.

Any student interested in Civil Service should see Mr. McKay, who has additional information.

Nazi Document Outlines Rules For Executions

LONDON, March 9. The correct procedure to be followed by the German Army in the execution of civilian hostages is outlined in a German military document that has fallen into British hands...

"When a large number of persons have to be dealt with they are to be distributed for shooting among units.

"If the bodies are to be buried in shallowly deep graves, burning of bodies is to be avoided. The placing of flowers on graves is to be prevented.

"In order to avoid unnecessary contact with the bodies, those to be shot are to be led directly to the 'edges' of their graves. In the case of mass executions it is allowable to cause the hostages to kneel with their faces towards the graves.

"The execution is to be carried out in a very regimental manner with an officer in charge. Two to four men are detailed for each man to be shot.

"I have carefully looked to the admission in the Russian press that they receive material from America," said Stanley.

The ambassador said the Russians were getting numerous things from the United States.

Eleanor Says It's Too Soon To Talk Of Fourth Term

WASHINGTON, March 9. (AP)—Mrs. Franklin Roosevelt remarked yesterday that "one must live day by day in a job one has chosen." She is to think about a fourth term.

"It stirs political feeling which may hurt the war effort," she explained to her press conference. "We may all be dead two years from now. I believe in thinking ahead on constructive things but I don't believe in thinking about things which hold back one's efforts."

The discussion arose when Mrs. Roosevelt was asked to comment on the completion last week of 10 years in the White House. Her comment:

Wallace Brings Russian Issue Out Into Open

Another War Looms As Possibility Unless Allies, Reds Come To Understanding

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9. (AP)—Undersecretary of State Sumner Welles today said Ambassador William Standley's statement in Moscow that the Russian people were not completely informed of American lend-lease aid so the Soviets was made without prior consultation with the Government in Washington.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 9. (AP)—Vice President Wallace's warning of a possible third World War unless Russia and the Allies reach an understanding is regarded as bringing the knotty United Nations peace-making problem out into the open.

The subject has been a matter of official concern for some time. But until Vice President Wallace's speech the tendency was to avoid any public mention of it.

"I find no political motive to this," Standley said. "It is only an effort to create the impression with their own people that they are pulling themselves through by their own boot straps."

Pointing out that a new lend-lease bill is now before Congress in Washington, Standley said that the American Congress is high-spirited and generous, but if you give it the impression that their help means nothing, they might be a different story.

Other states are circulating proposals to regulate business. A Missouri bill calls for a limited concentration of all labor contracts, including terms of contracts, dues, financial statements, annual, district, and general meetings. Other bills would prohibit persons convicted of crime from being in positions of trust or office.

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"I do not feel that the American people have any opportunity to know they are being helped by the American people," he said. "I mean the plain American people who are disgusted with the present government."

It was pointed out to Standley that recently several Russian generals told foreign correspondents they were getting no American help at the front except trucks.

"They are getting plenty of other kind of war material," Standley said. "If it's not at the front I don't know what they are doing with it."

The ambassador said there had been no obvious change in the exchange of information between the United States and the Soviet Union since the Washington agreement last year.

"There's no question about the political, but world situation that people thought him better fitted for things, unpremeditated, like that don't happen unless events call for them."

Mrs. Roosevelt wore a green jade pin given her by Mrs. Chiang Kai-Shek. She reported that the wife of the Chinese generalissimo will return to the White House before she returns home.

The first lady's far-ranging press conference also touched on these topics, but world situation, Mrs. Roosevelt said, was not her theme.

"It's a wonderful thing for city people to go into the farms and learn something about farming before they do."

The chief needs of the time in this country today, aside from the war effort, are moderation and cooperation. And James F. Byrnes, in his talk to the nation, has made the latter very clear.

"We must all prepare to adopt for the duration a spirit of moderation in living," he said. "Do not let patriotism blind us. This last point is very important, and means a reversal of our usual attitude.

"There is no way of giving to any one group of our people a substantial additional part of the nation's goods or income," he added, "without hurting all the rest of us." If we are a nation of patriots and sportsmen, as we like to think, we shall not attempt anything like that.

"General and indiscriminate wage and price increases will not solve any of our recent problems," he insisted. "There will be no general wage or price control, but we will give us increased production. They are advantageous to the groups that get them only so long as other groups are kept from getting them. For there must be a substantial increase in the goods and services that we produce. The groups benefited will prove short-lived and illusory during the war, and will bring retribution, even on these groups when the war is over.

Farmers, coal miners, mine leaders and all others who may seek special advantages at the expense of their fellow citizens will do well to heed this warning. "We are all members one of another," and we win or lose together.

The Great Cleansing

Withdrawing Reds Fight Desperately To Hold New Gains

Germans Advance 100 Miles With Fresh Replacements And Take 8 Key Cities

(By Associated Press)
Swept back 100 miles with the loss of eight key cities, Russia's armies battled desperately to save the great prize of the winter offensive as the Germans threw approximately 375,000 reinforcements into a counter-drive against Kharkov and the upper Donets River valley.

Soviet dispatches claimed, however, the German rush was being held despite violent attacks, saying the Nazis were forced to retreat in at least one sector.

On the central front the Red army got within striking distance of the tip of the German salient at Vyazma and farther to the north the Germans were pushed close into the fortress of Staraya Russa. The Nazis admitted the loss of Bely of the Moscow front.

The Germans, after withdrawing westward across Southern Russia, launched a giant counter-offensive in the Donets basin and in a 100-mile march have recaptured eight key cities south and southeast of the big fortress of Kharkov, the Russians acknowledged early today.

The German offensive was launched late in February with 25 divisions, and approximately 375,000 men, including 13 divisions which had been replenished after previous action and 12 fresh ones rushed from the west to this vital sector of the long German-Russian battlefield.

MOSCOW, Mar. 10. (AP)—Representing the most inclusive light thrown here on United States aid to Russia, the government newspaper Izvestia printed on the back page today a Tass article based on a magazine story by Lead-Letter Administrator Edward Stettin.

CHICAGO, Mar. 10. (AP)—Joseph Stalin's friendship with the United States will be tested within a month when the fishing treaty with Japan is decided, said Rev. Bernard Hubbard today. Rev. Hubbard asserted: "If Stalin in a sign that treaty again it is a sure sign that he wants a strong Japan and weak United States and China in the Pacific."

The Administration, through Acting Secretary of State Sumner Welles, disavowed Stettin's sensational remarks made at a Moscow press conference Monday. Welles, making no effort to conceal his displeasure, not only accused the sailor-diplomat of talking out of turn but said he did so without consulting Washington.

The rebuke, virtually without precedent in American diplomacy, was believed to foreshadow replacement of Stettin.

There was no comment from the White House where the ambassador conferred with President Roosevelt scarcely two months ago, before his return to Moscow. Mr. Stettin, however, spoke at a news conference after a press conference, without explanation.

Administration leaders in Congress deplored Stettin's statement. Chairman Tom Connally (D-Texas) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said on the Senate floor that the statement was "most unfortunate."

Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg (R-Mich.) said he was "amazed" at Stettin's remarks.

Chairman Robert R. Reynolds (D-NC) of the Senate Military Affairs Committee said he believed "Stettin's statement is a gross violation of the high standards of conduct which are expected of our representatives."
