Commission takes step to change charter

SANFORD — A split city commission approved the first reading of an ordinance that would change Sanford's form of govemment.

ernment. The ordinance passed by a 3-2 vote and will be up for a second reading Monday, Dec. 23. If approved at that meeting, the ordinance will be put on the ballot and Sanford voters will decide on March 4 whether to adopt a strong mayor form of government or keep its current city manag-

Woodruff said. "I think the language for the charter change should have come out of a citizens' committee.

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein joined Woodruff in voting against the ordinance based on his distrust of strong mayor form of government. A strong mayor would have too much power, the District 4 commissioner said.

"Wait until you get a mayor with no city commission background," Eckstein said. "I wouldn't be a commissioner under this form of government. I don't think we need a

Board decides to proceed with suit

SANFORD — On the same day members of its staff met in mediation with Lake Mary offi-cials, the Seminole County School Board Monday voted to initiate litigation against the city. Board members agreed to move forward with legal action that challenges the city's refusal to allow the relocation of an alterna-tive school in an industrial park off Lake Emma Road. Earlier in off Lake Emma Road. Earlier in the day, however, officials from both parties began the negotiation process that could resolve the con-flict before it is taken to court.

flict before it is taken to court. "We were pioneers this mom-ing," Superintendent, Paul Hagerty said Monday, "I think this is the first time the interlocal agreement on mediation has been invoked in Seminole County." Hagerty was referring to the county's 1995 "Interlocal Agree-ment on Mediation and Intergo-vernmental Coordination," which asks municipalities and the School

asks municipalities and the School Board to try to resolve disputes through a three-step mediation process before turning to the court system. On Monday, city officials and School Board staff gathered for the first meeting, which was facilitated by former Seminole County Commissioner Sandra Glenn. The dispute between the School Board and City Commission is over the relocation of Excel Alternatives Inc, a learning facili-ty for expelled students. The school is currently located in Sanford's Reflections shopping plaza on Lake Mary Boulevard. Last month, City Commission denied the Board's request to amend the city's land use designa-tion for property in Technology Park saying the school is incom-patible with the industrial use of the complex. City staff believe the school will pose traffic and safety problems if it moves to the facility. The city has also received more than 100 e-mails and letters from businesses and residents in the area who don't support the school's relocation to Technology Park. Glenn. Park.

The Department of Environmental Protection's Division of Law Enforcement arrested three people in Orlando Friday afternoon for alleged improper disposal of raw human waste behind the Baywood Center in the 1600 block of North CR-427 in Longwood. The Morse, 42, of East Orange Avenue, Longwood, was charged with one felony violation of the Florida litter law. David Delgado, 43, of Oxford Street, Longwood, and Carol McKay-Nilles, 58, of Terrace Drive, Oviedo, were each charged with one felony violation of principal in the first degree, to the Florida litter law.







and that the city has no basis in denying the land-use amendment. They believe the school's reloca-tion is allowed under the city's comprehensive plan.

For two years, School Board staff has been searching for a new location for the school in order to purchase a building rather then continue leasing the current facility for \$350,000 per year. The purchase would eventually save the school system money. City officials and School Board

staff said Monday's negotiations were productive. Staff from both parties were directed to meet in order to discuss a possible resolu-tion concerning two issues — traffic and public safety — before the next mediation meeting scheduled for Jan. 13.

The third step in the interlocal agreement's mediation process will be for all members of the School Board and City Commission to meet. Hagerty, however, said this last meeting is contingent on an agreement

between the two staffs.

"The mediation can only be successful if there is agreement of the two staffs," Hagerty said. "In absence of that, I don't think the third step will be productive."

Both parties said they were optimistic a resolution can be found concerning traffic and pub-lic safety. It's the remaining issues, compatibility of the school within the industrial park and the intermetation of the citu's cominterpretation of the city's comprehensive plan, which may go unresolved.

"I was encouraged by the atti-tude of the School Board to work on the issues of public safety and traffic," Lake Mary Mayor Thom Greene said Tuesday. "However, it's the issue of compatibility that is not something the School Board can deal with unless they decide not to move the school to the site. I could be optimistic about a resolution of the first two issues, but the third issue is still Important. The third issue will have to be examined fully before I re-examine my own decision."



Daytona Prototype finishes 28straight hours of testing at DIS

DAYTONA BEACH — The crew and drivers of Brumos Racing celebrated in the pits of Daytona International Speedway on Saturday afternoon as David Donohue piloted the team's Porsche-powered FABCAR Daylona Prototype across the fin-ish line to conclude a hugely successful 28straight hours of testing.

This weekend Grand American Road Racing for the Daytona Prototypes, which will be the pre-mier class of the Rolex Sports Car Series begin-ning at the Rolex 24 At Daytona, Feb. 1-2. The endurance test began with a six-hour session on Thursday, and the 28-hour session started at 10 a.m. Friday and wrapped up at 2 p.m. Saturday. The Brumos Racing Daytona Prototype per-formed close to flawless throughout the entire weekend of testing. The only problem suffered by the team was a minor oil leak during the middle of the night that was quickly repaired. "It's a real testament to Dave Klym and FAB-CAR. I just told him when I got out (of the car) that he over built the thing. Because anyone can come and buy one of these now and go finish a 24-hour race," said Donohue after wrapping up the 28th straight hour of testing. "I've been a part of several development programs that were pretty high-end manufacturer programs. We've never had this close to a turnkey. Donohue was one of eight drivers who piloted the Brumos Daytona Prototype during the test, which included five-time Rolex 24 winner Hurley Haywood as well as Scott Sharp, Scott Goodyear, J.C. France, Mike Borkowski, Wayne Jackson and Chris Bye. "The car is very impressive right out of the box to be this reliable and steady," remarked Sharp, who will take a break from Indy racing to run the Rolex 24 in February. "The brand new gearbox from EMCO has been doing great. We're really pleased with that. The Porsche engine has obvi-ously been running great. This is the kind of night that we need to have in a month and a half." "We liked to believe that testing would go this good. We had a fantastic crew running the car. We good. We had a failuant citer. There wasn't any-felt very confident with that. There wasn't anything on the car that we felt uncomfortable with. You always hope that you have a test like this," said FABCAR designer Dave Klym. Cegwa Sport also had much success with the first-ever outing for the Toyota-powered FABCAR Daytona Prototype. Darius Grala led a lineup of drivers in testing that included John Lloyd, R.J. Valentine, Doug Peterson and Josh Rehm. After running consistently well throughout the

day on Friday, the Cegwa team brought their car into the garage in the evening to inspect it for wear and tear. After finding its mechanics working perfectly, the Toyota Daytona Prototype returned to the track for additional late-night test-

ing. However the car spun into the guardrail just before 2 a.m., sustaining some suspension dam-age. While the damage was easily repairable, the team was missing a suspension part needed to get the car back on track. Because of the late hour, the car back on track. Because of the late hour, testing was put on hold for the Cegwa Daytona Prototype until morning when local race team Flis Motorsports could assist in locating a replacement "We just had a little accident last night that sat us out. We attribute the accident to the fact that it got so cold, so fast that the driver was just not repared for the changes in the track conditions. He made a small mistake and that cost us all night. If it weren't for that, I really don't think we would have had any more problems," said Cegwa crew chief John Shapiro, who has three Rolex 24 overall wins to his credit. "Honestly, it went better than we had expected. The ideal would have been if we were able to do the full 24, but the problems that kept us from doing it are not ones that we are concerned with for the race," noted Grala.



At 10 a.m., the program kicked off with the acting chairman of the Goldsboro Front Porch Council.


