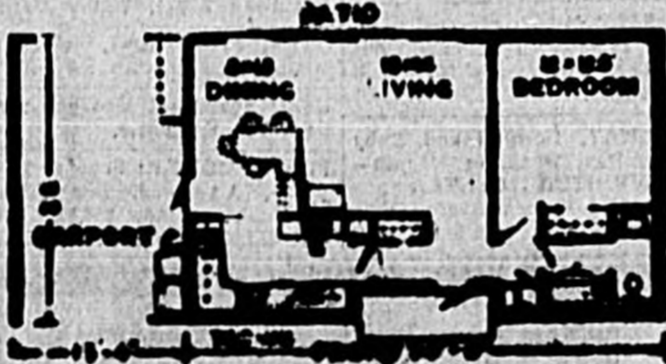
BUILD IT YOURSELF OR BE YOUR OWN CONTRACTOR — PLANS AVAILABLE

This one-bedroom home which contains only 790 square feet, boasts deluxe features customarily expected in high-priced residences. For instance, there is the decorative corner fireplace anchored in the midst of the 21-foot long living-dining area; there is the masonry barbecue pit centered in the 7 by 14 foot kitchen; there are the two sets of sliding glass doors which connect the living area with the terrace and the garden (see picture above); and there is the well-lit entrance foyer (with a coat closet) from which all rooms are accessible without crossing the living room.

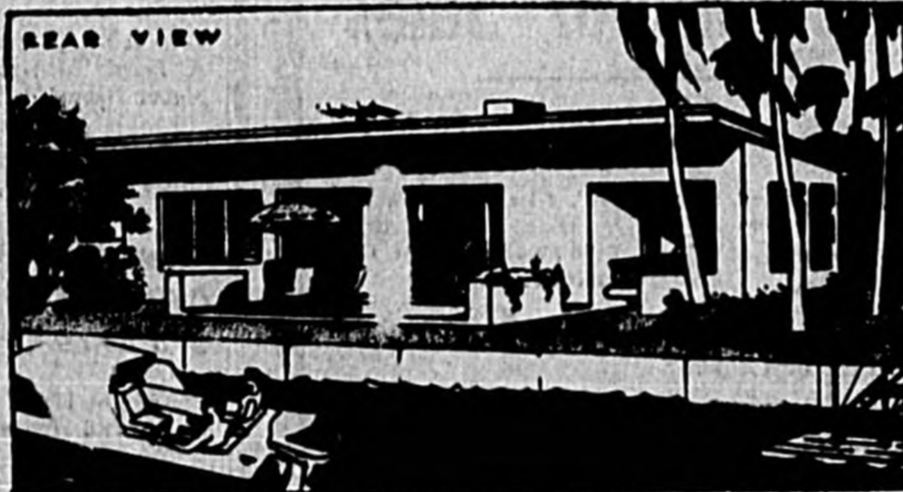
Another "Plus" of this 22 by 36 1/2-foot retirement home is its shed roof. This is the cheapest roof one can build today, and yet it offers a unique design bonus—a 8-foot high ceiling for the spacious living-dining area, and an 8-foot ceiling for the smaller kitchen and bathroom (making them look more "in scale").

Optically, the brick barbecue is "connected" with the built-in dining table by the storage cabinet mounted on the brick wall (shown dotted on the floor plan) but, from the practical point of view, a folding door (see arrow on floor plan) also separates the kitchen from the dining area. Incidentally, the refrigerator is just half way between the kitchen sink and the dining table a welcome item in a small family.

Cuban, U.S. Tensions Heat Up

HAVANA (UPI)—Cuba's revolutionary government, bolstered by support from Red China and Russia, heated up its diplomatic and economic war with the United States today by an angry rejection of U. S. complaints about seizure of American-owned property.

A 10-page note issued by the Foreign Ministry Thursday night rejected as "false, hypocritical and malevolent" a Washington protest against expropriation of the Esso and Texaco oil refineries.

"World opinion mobilizes justly indignant against the shameless economic aggression planned, organized and effected by the government of the U. S. A. against Cuba," the note said.

Premier Fidel Castro's government also rejected a British protest over seizure of the Shell refinery but in what appeared more moderate tones.

Castro was scheduled to make radio-television speech tonight at which time he may announce retaliatory measures for President Eisenhower's \$56,000,000 cut in purchases of Cuban sugar. Castro now has authorization to seize any and all U. S.-owned property in Cuba by decree.

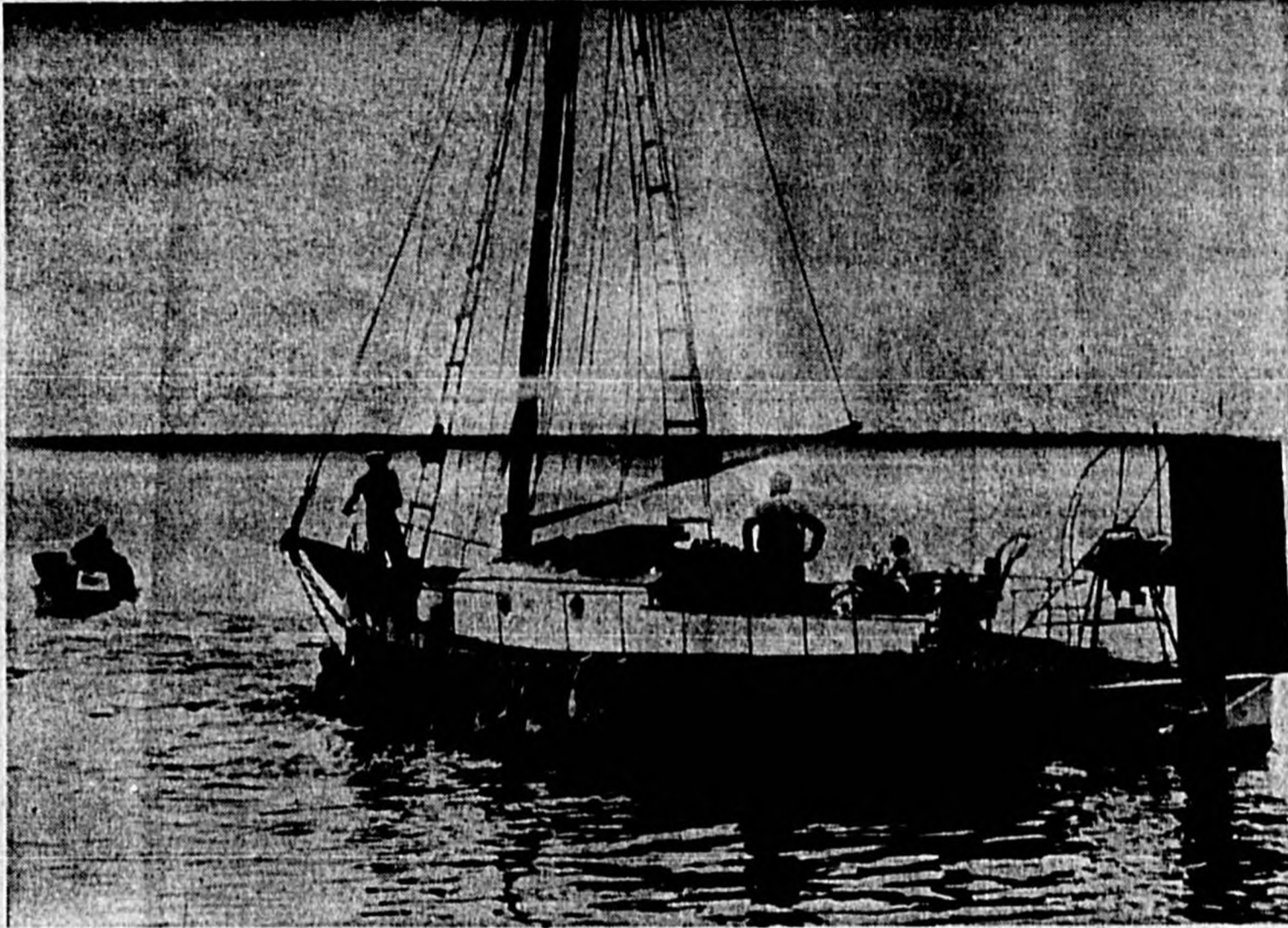
Communist China today branded the U. S. sugar cut a "dirty and shameful act." The Soviet mass news agency and Radio Moscow accused the United States of exerting "rude pressure."

The first Soviet tanker arrived in Havana Thursday with a load of crude oil to help the Castro regime stave off a fuel shortage brought on by the refinery seizures.

Two anti-U. S. demonstrations broke out in the provinces.

About 150 persons milled outside U. S. Information Service headquarters in Santa Clara for two hours shouting "Yankos, out!" in Plaza Del Rio, high school students paraded with placards reading "Cuba, Yes! Yankos, No!" before the approving eyes of Education Minister Dr. Armando Hart, a one-time card carrying member of the Communist Party.

The demonstrations, plus the increasingly militant tone of the Cuban press and radio, were expected to spur the exodus of American residents, already departing in large numbers. General Electric Co. was among the American firms which have sent the wives and children of Cuban-passed personnel packing.

Europeans Flee Congo

BRUSSELS, Belgium (UPI)—Mutinous African soldiers roamed through the Congo capital of Leopoldville today shooting at automobiles and almost anything else that moved. Europeans fled for their lives.

Reports received here through the semi-official Belga news agency said the new mutiny broke out shortly after midnight, among native troops in two camps near Leopoldville.

It said they surged into the town with arms, firing at European cars and other targets. A body of troops camped near the Leopoldville golf course and started ambushing any-

Longwood Council Turns Thumbs Down On Backing Bank

The move by Southwest Seminole County businessmen to organize a Savings and Loan Bank in Casselberry failed to receive the endorsement of the Longwood Town Council Thursday.

Action was also deferred on the paving of Orange Ave., the road passing by the new Longwood Elementary School.

Councilmen voted against a resolution presented by the organizers seeking their favor.

"The council took that stand because it did not want to show favoritism, as another group is attempting to organize a bank in the same area," Mayor A. R. Lormann said.

Councilman, R. C. Carlson's motion to have Orange Ave. paved died for a lack of a second from either councilmen, E. C. Williamson or E. B. Hopkins. H. A. Scott, the only other councilman able to second the motion was absent from the meeting.

Orange Ave. is presently a clay road running from Hwy. 17-92 through the town of Longwood.

County School Supt. R. T. Mills could not be reached for comment on the issue.

Carlson, following the death of his motion, asked Williamson and Hopkins if they are willing to accept "full responsibility for Orange Ave. not being paved."

Hopkins replied that he didn't like the "paving the town was getting." Williamson made no comment on the question.

Nikita Apologizes For Anti-U. S. Talk

VIENNA (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev today apologized publicly to his Austrian hosts for making anti-American remarks during his nine-day "goodwill" visit and then promptly attacked U. S. "monopolists" for blocking world disarmament.

But the Soviet Premier reserved his harshest comments for West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer at a press conference before flying back to Moscow.

He warned Russia might sign a peace treaty with East Germany if the West German Parliament convened in West Berlin this fall. He hinted at Soviet determination to react forcefully to any "violation" of Austrian neutrality. He said Russia could not remain "indifferent" and would "take such measures we then think necessary."

Khrushchev said that Adenauer, like Hitler, outlawed the Communist Party when he came into power and added, "If Adenauer would touch the Socialist countries with one finger, we would smash him."

There was a brief echo of Khrushchev's tumultuous Paris conference in the wake of the summit collapse at his news conference today.

Commies Threaten Italian Premier

ROME (UPI)—Italian Communist Leader Palmiro Togliatti today demanded that pro-Western Premier Fernando Tambroni resign or face a massive lead campaign of strikes and rioting.

The ultimatum appeared to represent an open bid of the largest Communist party in the free world to seize power from a government already shaken by mob violence that has left five persons dead and hundreds injured.

Togliatti, just back from a trip to Moscow, issued his challenge as the huge Red-led General Confederation of Labor called a 10-hour strike to protest police action Thursday night against mobs in Reggio Emilia.

The Christian Democratic mayor of the town of Villa Litterna near Naples was assassinated today. The reports said that the murder had nothing to do with the present turbulent political situation.

Four demonstrators were killed and 20 wounded in the town as police opened fire for the first time since rioting flared on a nationwide basis earlier this week.

DeBary VFW Gets Top State Award

The Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary, Post 8093 of DeBary learned Wednesday they had received the state's highest award for service to Florida hospitals.

The local auxiliary, with less than 20 active members, bested other VFW groups throughout the state who boast of 50 members and more.

The letter praising their work was read by President Mrs. Lamard Schnabel, during their monthly meeting.

In other business, the auxiliary members voted to send the proceeds of their white elephant sale to the Lake City Hospital.

Betting Gain

MIAMI (UPI)—State Racing Supervisor Kenneth Noe Jr. said Thursday Florida received \$27.2 million from parimutuel betting during the past fiscal year. Noe said the money, a gain of \$2.1 million over the previous year, was divided so that each of the state's 67 counties received \$188,700.

Platform Planners Call In Advisors

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Democratic platform planners, embroiled in North-South sparring on a civil rights plank, called in a battery of governors, mayors and labor leaders today for advice on this and other pressing issues.

Stevenson OK's Draft

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Adlai E. Stevenson said today he would "of course" accept a draft for the Democratic presidential nomination. He promised to campaign with vigor and a sense of real purpose "if he gets a third try at the White House."

Stevenson's pledge and renewal of his statement to accept a draft were read to a news conference by Lt. Gov. Glenn Anderson of California, who endorsed the former Illinois governor two days ago.

Anderson quoted Stevenson as having told him by telephone: "Under circumstances which are understandably difficult, I headed the Democratic national ticket in two campaigns. I have, therefore, felt that it would be presumptuous and arrogant for me to claim squatter's rights or to seek actively a third nomination."

"However, if selected by the convention, I will, of course, accept the draft and campaign with vigor and a sense of real purpose since the issues we face are of such great importance."

Anderson said he obtained the statement in a telephone conversation with Stevenson Wednesday from the Stevenson's home at Libertyville, Ill., and was authorized to make it public.

The Californian appeared at a news conference flanked by Sen. A. S. (Mike) Monroney of Oklahoma, leader of the draft-Stevenson organization, and James E. Doyle, director of the Stevenson headquarters.

The statement appeared to be the strongest yet from Stevenson indicating an interest in the 1960 presidential nomination.

California Gov. Edmund G. Brown is expected to announce Sunday that he will withdraw as

a favorite son candidate and throw his support to front-runner Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts.

The Walker Amoco station in Casselberry was entered Thursday night. Entry was made by smashing the window with an empty box. The inside was ransacked but nothing was reported taken.

Noisy Nights

The air traffic pattern over the Sanford Naval Air Station will be full of low flying aircraft every day and most of the nights for the next two weeks.

According to Capt. F. G. Edwards, commander of Heavy Attack Wing One, there are 22 pilots who must be ready for carrier operations aboard the USS Saratoga by July 25. This will require carrier landing practice at Ramey Field both day and night.

From Monday through Friday and from July 18th until finishing about July 23rd, the planes may be flying as late as 11:45 p. m.

Board To Receive Jail Plans Tuesday

Winter Park architect James Gamble Rogers will submit his long awaited master plan on the new Seminole County Jail to the County Commission Tuesday.

Rogers will present the plans at 2 p. m. and County Commission Chairman John Krider today asked all interested citizens attend the meeting.

D. Kirk Gunby, fiscal agent, will be present at the meeting also. Gunby's job will be to pave the way for a bond issue, setting the millage and validation proceedings.

According to preliminary plans the two-story jail will have a capacity of 116 prisoners and cost approximately \$490,000.

Preliminary plans pointed out that the first floor will be used for administrative purposes and will be airconditioned. The second floor will be the cell-block.

Preliminary plans also revealed adequate parking facilities in the area near the jail which will be located adjacent to the courthouse.

The board had indicated previously that it plans to award the contract on the jail within 90 days.

The new jail will have separate facilities for juveniles. At the present time all juvenile violators have been transferred to the Brevard County Jail on the orders of Circuit Judge Volle Williams Jr.

Breakthrough

NEW YORK (UPI)—Scientists today dismissed the idea that development of a means to amplify light could be used soon as a death ray, but they hailed it as an important scientific breakthrough.

Cotton Up

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Agriculture Department today reported farmers have planted 16,306,000 acres of cotton this year, up 3 per cent from last year. The department is forbidden by law to make a cotton production estimate until later in the season.

ROSELLE, N. M. (UPI)—A 16-year-old Florida girl died and five persons were injured in a one-car crash 28 miles west of here today on U. S. Highway 70-50, Sally Brock of Jacksonville, died of head and internal injuries.

St. ANDREWS, Scotland (UPI)—Arnold Palmer of Ligonier, Pa., charged to within four strokes of the lead with a three-under-par 70 in the third round of the British Open golf championship today, but a gutting blow-up on the last two holes blocked him from moving clear.

Good News

CHICAGO (UPI)—The human heart can be massaged without opening the chest, three Baltimore scientists said today. The action "requires only the human hand," the doctors wrote in the current issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Mixed-Up Mayor

MIAMI (UPI)—Miami Mayor Robert King High disclosed Thursday he pleaded guilty to a recent speeding charge and paid a \$20 fine. High said he stayed off a bench warrant, issued for his arrest after he failed to appear at the first court date set by dropping into court himself and asking for an immediate trial. "I was mixed up on my dates," he said in apology.

Reversed Decision

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)—The State Supreme Court today reversed the Dade County Circuit Court and refused to order payment of \$75,000 in real estate commission on the sale of a Miami hotel which did not go through John Forte brought out against the McMillan Hotel, owned by J. Meyer Schless. The commission which he said was due him for finding a buyer willing to purchase the hotel, Louis Schless.

Navy Recovers 1st Body In Disaster

BARNEGAT LIGHT, N. J. (UPI)—The first of 17 bodies believed trapped in the gondola of a Navy blimp that crashed in the Atlantic was recovered today by salvage crews.

The body was identified as that of Air Controlman Henry V. Godbold, 19, of Conway, S. C.

The Navy said a request for 16 body bags had been received from the salvagers.

It was not immediately known whether the body had been found in the blimp gondola resting on the ocean floor about 60 feet below the surface.

The men were presumed entombed in the broken gondola when the airship collapsed Wednesday and plunged into the ocean 15 miles off Barnegat Light.

A spokesman said some parts of the cabin had been recovered, but thick folds of the airship's rubberized envelope hampered divers.

Convict Slashes Self As Trial Recedes

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)—The brutality trial of 14 former Raiford State Prison guards recessed for the weekend Thursday with violence outside the court room causing more stir than the testimony inside.

Convict Robert Mott, about 30, slashed his arm with a razor blade Thursday afternoon while in court waiting to testify.

A U. S. deputy marshal told the court that another convict witness, Frazier Peterson, had "obviously" been beaten up by other prisoners at the jail Wednesday night. Defense attorney Chester Bedell said Peterson was beaten because he did not want to testify against the accused guards.

Peterson, about 31, denied he was beaten. He said he suffered cuts on his nose, tongue, and chin, and a black eye—when he fell in the shower.

The trial is to resume at 9:30 a. m. Monday with convict James Strickland, 29, on the stand. Strickland said he was in Raiford's maximum security building in 1958 when the 14 guards allegedly inflicted unduly severe punishments on 21 convicts.

The guards are accused of conspiring to violate the prisoners' constitutional rights by such punishments as chaining them to their cells with handcuffs and leg irons, sometimes without food or clothing, and hitting them with water from high-pressure hoses.

Mott was taken to Duval Medical Center after gnashing his arm.

Johnson Plans Personal Appeal For More Delegates

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson plans a personal appeal to the undecided Alabama and North Carolina Democratic convention delegations in an effort to swing them into line with the rest of the pro-Johnson South.

A Johnson aide said the Texas senator would meet with the Alabama delegation Sunday afternoon at its first caucus. He plans a similar overture to the North Carolina group when it meets.

The two states are not bound by the unit rule and there currently is support in both delegations for Johnson, Sen. John F. Kennedy, Sen. Stuart Symington and Adlai E. Stevenson.

Alabama National Committeeman Charles McKay indicated that many delegates from his state still had not made up their minds.

Kennedy will have to pass up the Alabama caucus due to a reception he is giving for the delegates and a television show on Sunday afternoon.

A Kennedy assistant said she also doubted that Robert Kennedy, the candidate's campaign manager and delegate acout, would be able to attend.

Symington's headquarters said his schedule had not been fixed but that he planned to meet with as many groups as possible.

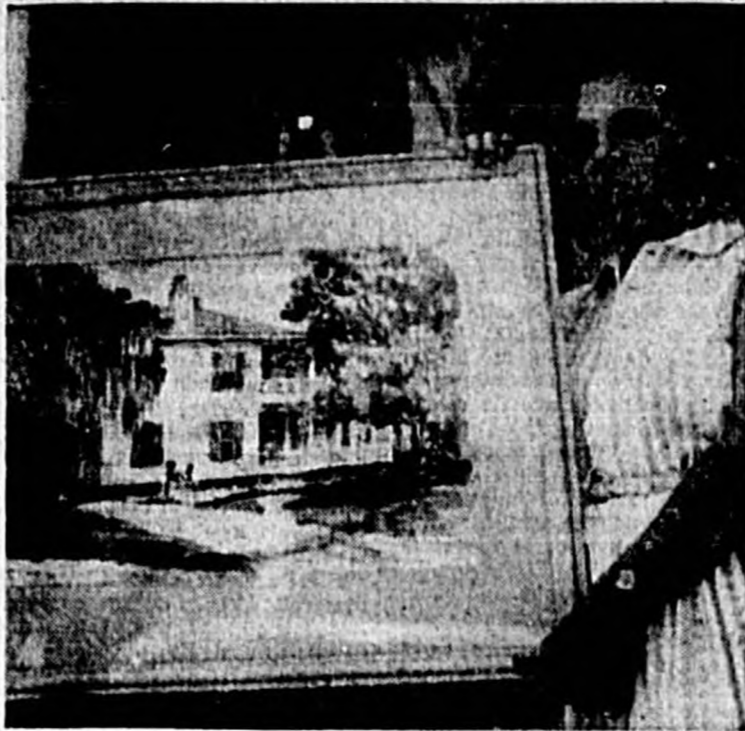
Alabama holds special interest for the candidates because it could yield its No. 1 spot in the alphabetical roll call and thereby determine which candidate will be placed in nomination first.

McKay said this will happen, however, only if one of the candidates has a majority of the state's delegates.

The Johnson aide who said the Senate leader would meet with Alabama and North Carolina added that the other southern states apparently were sticking with the Texas.

South Carolina, Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Arkansas and Louisiana and Tennessee will enter the convention uncommitted but Johnson is expected to get their first-round votes under the unit rule.

Virginia is committed to Johnson. Florida is committed to its Sen. George A. Smathers on the first ballot.

Rockefeller Trying To Keep Labor Happy On Issue

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller is trying to

shape the Republican Party's platform on medical care for the elderly into a form acceptable to organized labor.

This is one of a number of major issues on which there is public disagreement between the New York Republican and the man who is expected to run for president on the platform—Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

Rockefeller is arguing that a good many other GOP governors agree with him that organized labor is right in insisting that medical care should be added to the Social Security program with the new benefits financed through higher Social Security taxes.

Nixon has contended that President Eisenhower was right in rejecting this approach and recommending instead a program financed jointly by federal and state treasuries.

Chairman Charles H. Percy of the Republican platform-drafting committee confessed Thursday that "at this stage I have no idea" whether the final platform will be acceptable to Rockefeller.

Percy, who sounded out the New York governor's views on the platform at a three-hour meeting in

New York City Wednesday, arranged for a breakfast meeting with Nixon today to go over similar ground. Percy said in advance of this meeting that the final platform, of course, must be one that Nixon "will be glad to run on."

Other GOP developments: —Nixon's office announced he received a thorough medical checkup at Walter Reed Army Hospital on April 25 and the findings indicated his health was "excellent in all respects."

Man Weighing Over 800 Dies

NORTHRIDGE, Calif. (UPI) — A man weighing an estimated 800 to 1,000 pounds died Thursday at his sister's home where he had been confined to bed for several months, police reported.

Police were called in when the coroner's office was unable to find stretchers to support the body of Arthur Knorr, 46. His height was 5 feet, 10 inches.

It took nine policemen and firemen about three hours to remove Knorr's body. They had to take a solid wooden table, cut off its legs, strap Knorr's body to it and then slide it out the door.

Heinsius Family In DeBary Boasts Skill In Trade That Few Can Equal

DeBary, a community filled with colorful history and residents with interesting backgrounds, can especially boast of Eugene G. Heinsius, whose work has been carried from father to son since the late 1780's.

Heinsius is a wallpaper designer and draftsman. So delicate and technical is his profession that in America today there are hardly 10 men who can create and make the designs done so well by the Heinsius family.

The 77-year-old DeBary resident has in his possession a wallpaper block floral design with gold imprint, made with such precision, that today, 53 years after he made the wallpaper, it is still in perfect condition.

The first Heinsius to start the profession was from Luxembourg in 1785, and the craft continued when the family moved to Germany. The art was transferred from father to son until the present Heinsius of DeBary came to America and sent his son to college to become an electrical engineer. So precious and so rare was their

work that when wallpaper was selling at a few cents a yard, the designs made by the Heinsius family cost \$5 per yard.

Heinsius came to America from Heidelberg, Germany when he was nine and has since designed patterns for national firms such as the Dennison Napkin Co. and the Congoleum Rug firm.

The elder draftsman said it is his belief that most wallpaper today could easily last 30 years if it was put on the proper way.

"All you have to do is add two tablespoons of molasses in the paste and it will never come off," Heinsius said.
