

County's Growth Outlined To Methodist Men

Statistics showing Seminole County has a youthful population were cited by John Krider, executive manager of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce, in an address on growth and development of the county for the Men's Club of Bear Lake Methodist Church.

"A total of 74 per cent of residents in Seminole are less than 44 years old while 40 per cent are under 18 years," Krider pointed out.

Touthing upon problems of education in the county, Krider stated school enrollment has increased from 5,114 in 1950 to 17,000 this year. Population in 1950 was 25,888 and this year is 77,000. By 1980 the county is expected to have 176,000 residents and by 1990 the population will increase to 302,400, projected statistics show.

Purchasing income has increased from \$76 million to \$184 million and bank deposits from \$38.7 million in 1960 to \$66.4 million this year.

In closing statements, Krider said he "sees South Seminole County as a choice spot to live as it is favored by location and growth."

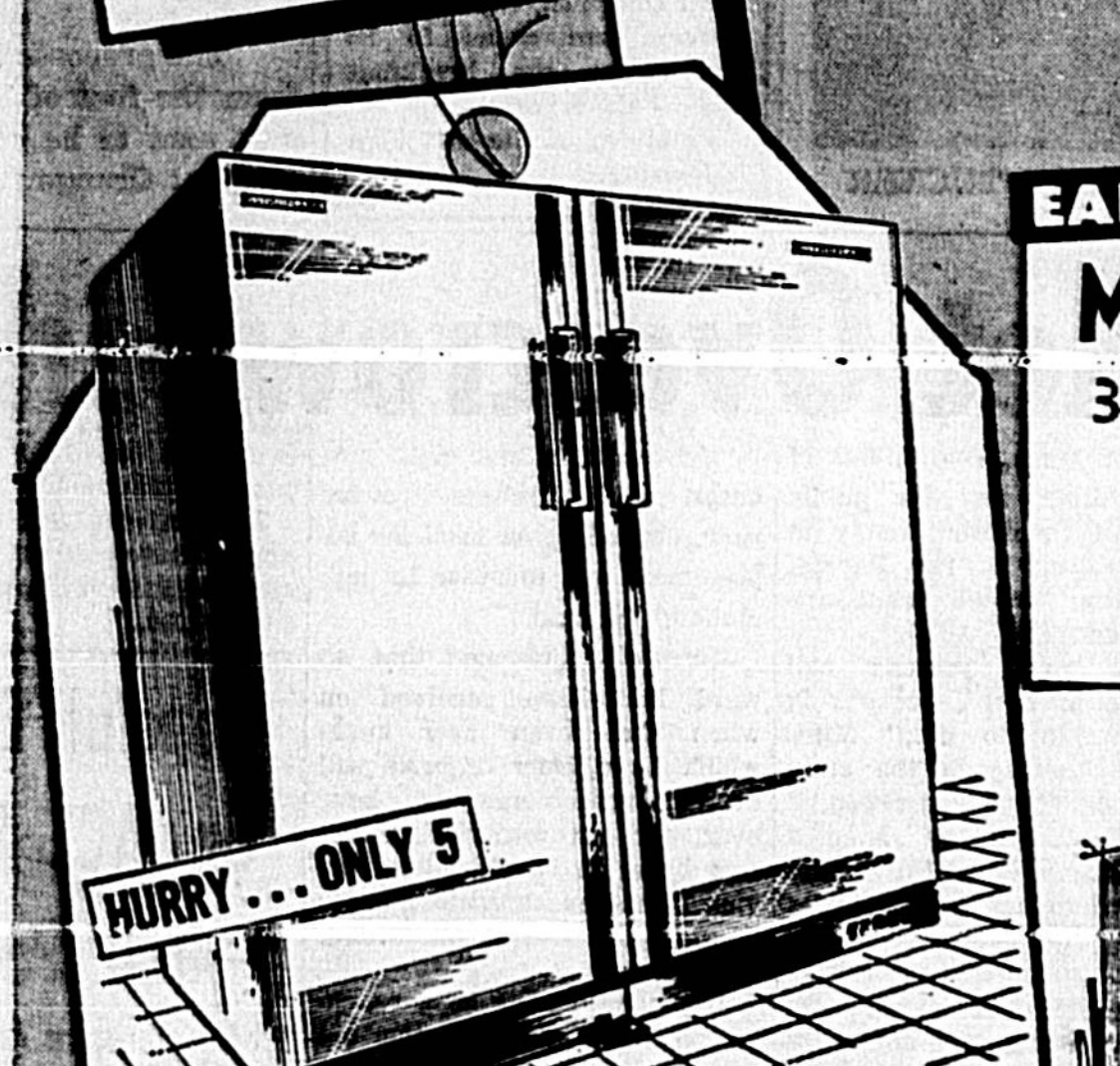

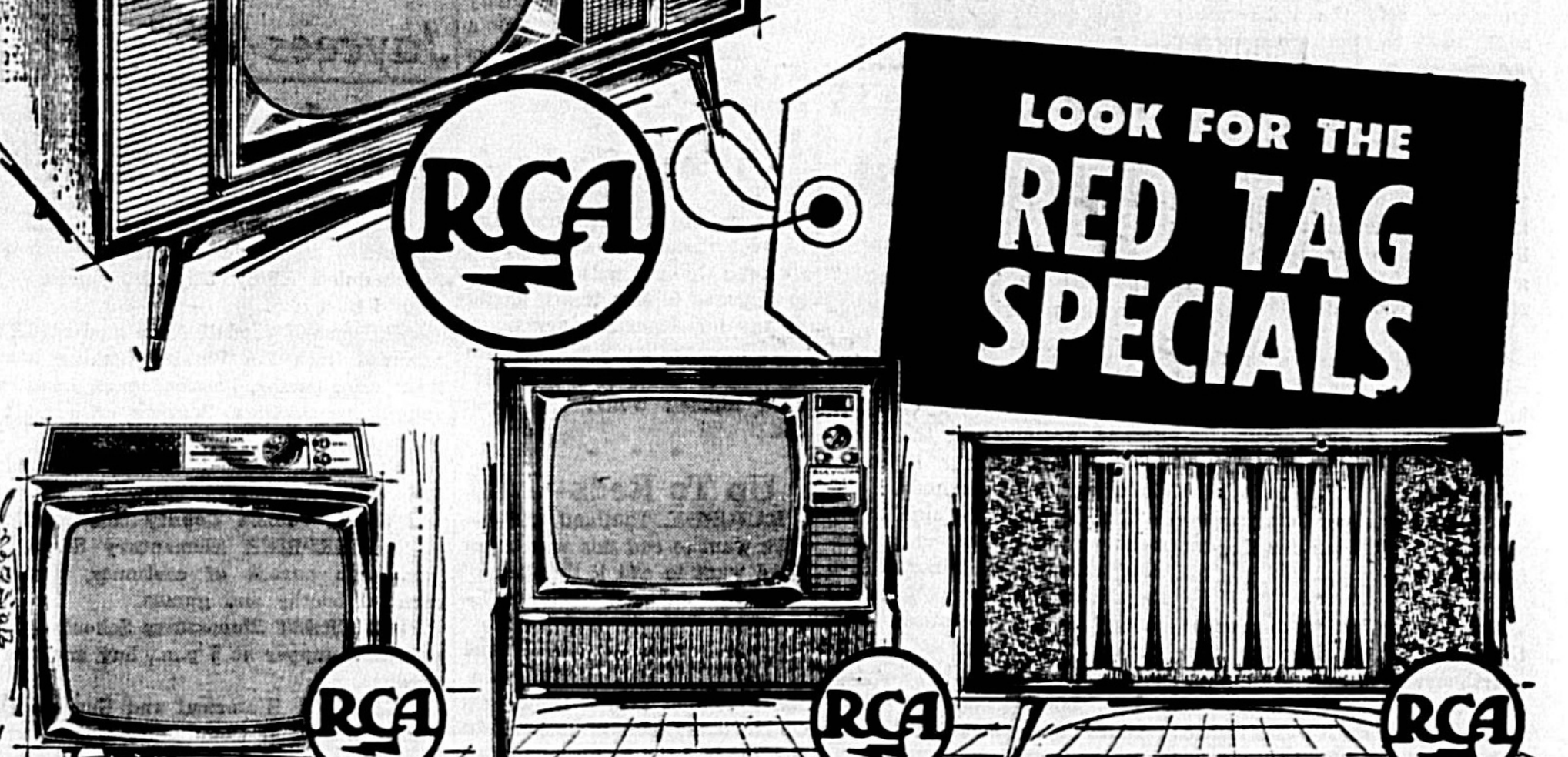

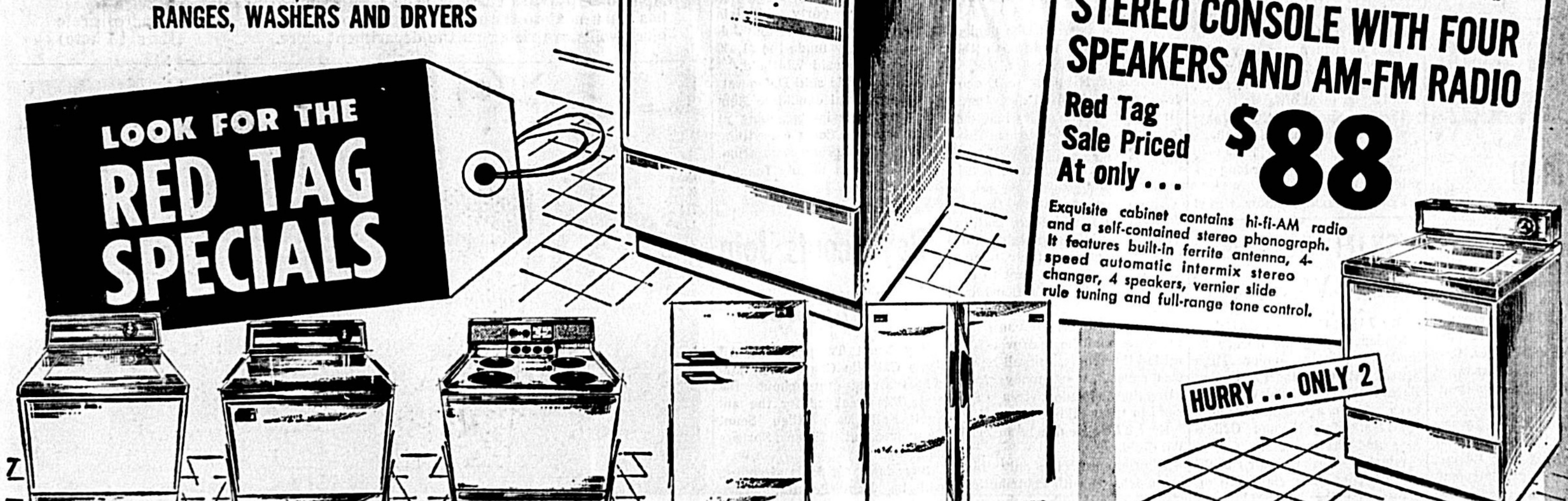

An oven favorite, completely different from grilled sparrers, includes dried lima beans and apple cider.

If desired, cook, covered, 1 1/2 to 2 hours or until ribs are done.

It's pretty enough for a party, a ham loaf mixture that's been packed into a pan to top pineapple rings or halves.

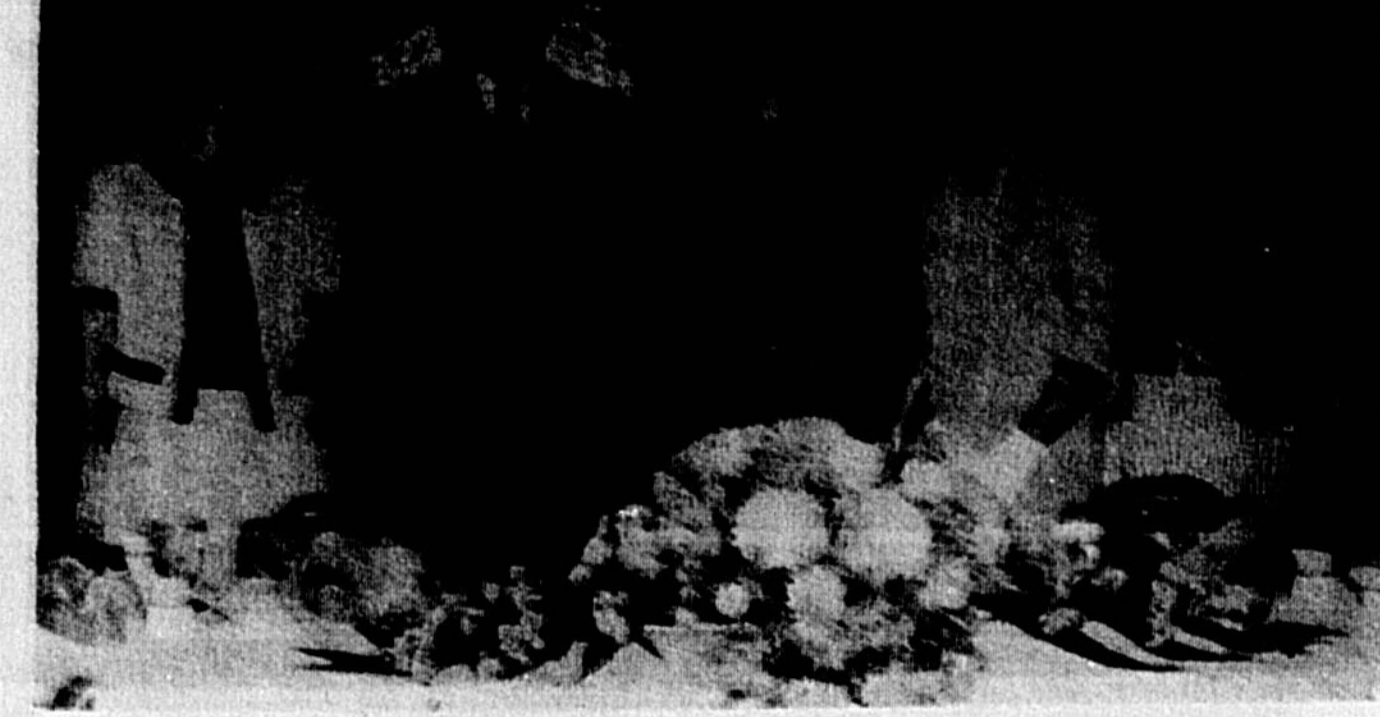

MEAT MIXTURE, patting smooth. Sprinkle with pepper. Cut into 1/2 inch squares. Cook over moderately high heat until brown on bottom; turn and brown underside. Serves 6.

BAKED BACON
1 egg yolk
2 tbsps. worcestershire sauce
1/2 tsp. dry mustard
8 slices bacon
1/2 cup fine cracker crumbs
Beat egg yolk with Worcestershire sauce and dry mustard. Dip bacon into egg mixture; roll in cracker crumbs. Lay bacon slices on a rack placed in a shallow pan. Bake at 325 degrees for 15-20 minutes. Serves 4.

PORK CHOPS AND SCALLOPED POTATOES
4 to 6 pork chops
3 cups thinly sliced uncooked potatoes
1 large onion, sliced
1 can cream of celery soup
1 cup evaporated milk
Season and broil pork chops. Cook potatoes in boiling water (salted) for 5 to 8 minutes; soup and milk; pour over potatoes. Cook chops and onion in large buttered baking dish. Mix cup and milk; pour over potatoes. Bake at 350 degrees for about 45 minutes or until potatoes are done. Serves 6-8.

SOUR CREAM CRUNCHES
2 cups flour
1/2 tsp. baking soda
1/2 cup soft butter
1 cup sugar
1/2 cup dairy sour cream
1 egg
1 tsp. vanilla
4 cups Sugar Frosted Flakes
Cut together flour and soda. Blend butter and sugar; add sour cream, egg and vanilla. Beat well. Add sifted dry ingredients; stir until smooth. Crush Sugar Frosted Flakes slightly. Shape dough into balls, using 1 heaping teaspoon dough for each. Roll balls in Sugar Frosted Flakes. Place on greased baking sheets. Bake in 350 degree oven about 12 minutes. Cut fish into serving pieces. Combine corn flake crumbs with salt and pepper. Dip fish pieces in evaporated milk, then in seasoned corn flake crumbs. Place in shallow pan lined with aluminum foil. Do not crowd. Bake in 375 degree oven about 20 minutes or until fish flakes when tested with fork. Serve with lemon slices or sauce, if desired. Serves 4-6.

LBJ Reported Planning Western Political Tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — The hopeful word is spreading from Democrats that President Johnson plans a western campaign swing the weekend before the Nov. 8 election. But as usual in this campaign, there was no immediate presidential staff confirmation of the reports, which center around a Nov. 5-6 California visit. The President is still in Asia and not due back in this country until next Wednesday night.

Wednesday, the political winds of a campaign overshadowed right now by the Johnson trip were stirred by Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey's declaration that when the Viet Nam war is over, Americans should shift the full amount of war spending to domestic problems. Former Republican presidential nominee Barry Goldwater's claim that what he called "LBJ" from Washington will swing more votes to the Republicans than anything else.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits, R-N.Y., who gave another of his indirect boosts to Michigan Gov. George Romney for the 1968 GOP presidential nomination. Strongest reports of a Johnson western tour came from an aide to California Gov. Edmund G. Brown, who said, "We can't confirm it officially, but President Johnson is expected to visit California before the election." Brown is running slightly behind according to pollsters in his bid for a third term against Republican Ronald Reagan.

The California source said Johnson probably would fly to other states before returning to Los Angeles at the end of the weekend. There were reports the stops could include Nevada, Oregon, Montana, Wyoming and Colorado.

Chicago Mayor Richard J. Daley said he expected the President to appear Nov. 4 for a nonpolitical speech — possibly a report on his Pacific Asian tour.

Word of virtually all Johnson's campaign visits this year has come first from local sources.

After a fast start in late summer, the President slacked off surprisingly from campaigning, then embarked on his scheduled 17-day trip out of the country.

While the President was in Asia seeking an end to the war, Humphrey was saying low the war money should be spent after peace comes.

He told the Westinghouse Broadcasting Co.'s urban of fair conference in Philadelphia that if the United States fought urban problems with half the amount of money it spent on the Korean War, "We wouldn't be in the predicament we are today."

He said slum areas should be treated the same way as underdeveloped countries are handled under foreign aid.

Goldwater, campaigning for Republican candidates in New Orleans, said he didn't always agree with presidents in the past, "but I always trusted statements on inflation are 'a lie. I hate to say it today but the coming out of Washington.'"



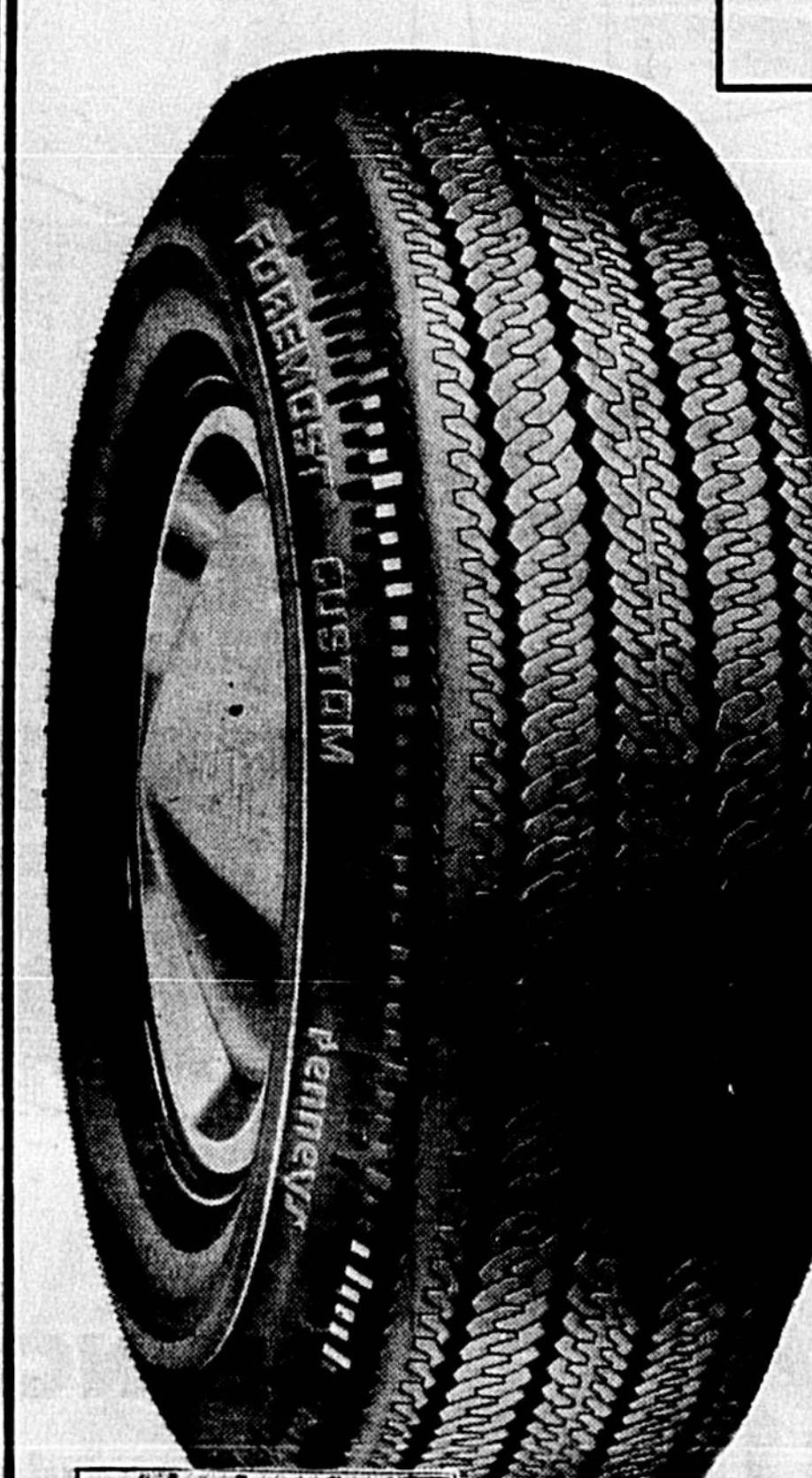

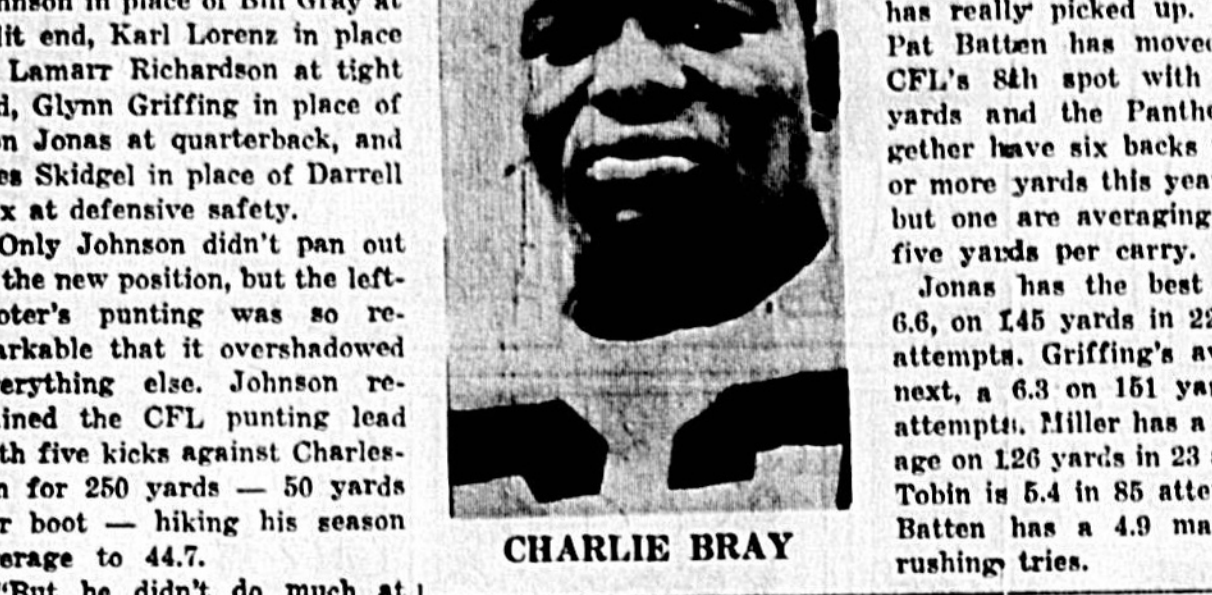

Combat Pilots Die In Fire Aboard Carrier

EDITOR'S NOTE — Free-lance photographer James H. Pickett, 36, of Wilmington, Ohio, was the only civilian aboard the U. S. aircraft carrier Oriskany Wednesday morning when fire broke out, taking the lives of 43 men. He is Pickett's exclusive report.

ABOARD THE ORISKANY, South China Sea (AP) — Until flames belched from the flight deck of this 42,000-ton carrier just after dawn Wednesday, we thought there was nothing to worry about.

Only a few wisps of smoke had appeared after a hollow explosion two decks below us. The men were moving with no great rush to meet the fire hoses; there had been similar flash fires before.

But the great blob of flame was a startling indication that this was worse, much worse, than anything else previously aboard the huge carrier. Within minutes we knew just how bad. A locker room containing 600 magnesium flares had somehow exploded as sailors were replacing some of them. The explosion blocked off the main exit from a labyrinth of corridors leading from "officers' quarters," the Navy term for officers' quarters.

There were mostly pilots sleeping in the forward part of the great carrier. The explosion and the initial explosion was not loud enough to alert them to danger, on the smoke blocked them in the corridors, or there were not enough exits. Within the hour, 43 men were dead from suffocation, all but nine of them pilots. They were pilots who had been daily risking their lives flying jet planes against targets in North Vietnam.

The Oriskany was prowling on " Yankee Station " in the Gulf of Tonkin with two other U.S. carriers, launching strikes against North Viet Nam, when the disaster hit.

I was on the flight deck taking pictures of the activity when the muffled sound of an explosion came from two decks below. As the flames belched upwards and the immensity of the danger was realized, the general quarters alarm was rung, sending the crew to battle stations.

Men poured out onto the deck, some in shorts, others in pajamas, some in nightgowns.

Thirty-four tons of bombs, mainly 500 pounders, were stacked just 100 yards from where the flare locker was exploding. Water was poured into the bomb stacks.

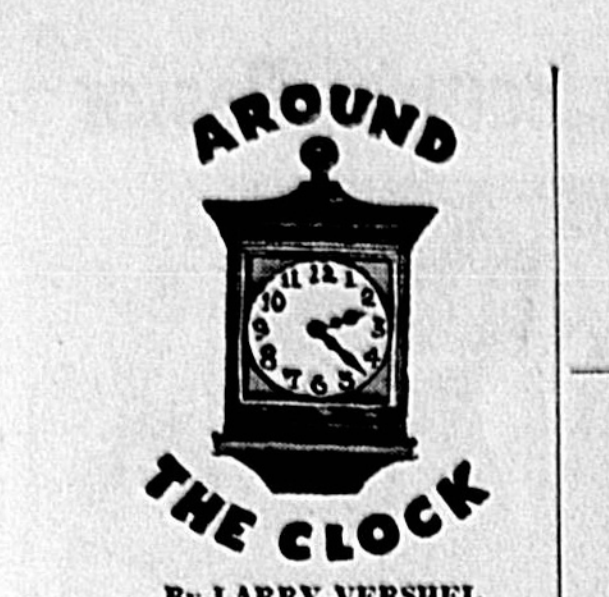

The number of farms in the county had increased from 680 to 726 in this period - an increase of seven per cent, with the number of acres farmed up 30 per cent.

Diversification is responsible for part of this increase - new products, such as carrots, cucumbers, sweet and field corn, radishes, lettuce and squash are now being grown on farms that were once used for celery, exclusively.

Butner reported that citrus fruits are being harvested and going to market at this time, and a good variety of vegetables started rolling Oct. 15.

Chief Warns Drive Carefully On Halloween

Seminole County law enforcement officers and the Sanford Police Department today urged motorists to "drive with extra caution" in the early evening hours during this Halloween weekend.

"These little children with their masks and costumes, running around trick-or-treating create dangerous traffic hazards as they dash across streets or stumble along roadways," Sheriff Luther Hobbs declared and his warning was echoed by Police Chief Arnold Williams.

"They can't see as well as they should. Their vision is restricted by these masks and things and this is our biggest worry," the law enforcement officers said.

They also cautioned motorists to be on the lookout for children, especially boys, on bicycles. "It is unlawful to ride a bicycle without proper lights," Chief Williams declared.

Both law enforcement officials warned older children and youth about thievery, vandalism, destroying property and general "unfunny" tricks.
