

Postal Service stinging porno buyers

MIAMI - The Postal Service is operating a mail-order child pornography company that solicits business by mail then arrests the customers when they receive the graphic videotapes they ordered, a published report said Sunday.

The Miami Herald, quoting assistant U.S. Attorney David Lichter, said about 20 people in south Florida have been arrested through the sting operation in the past year.

The undercover operation is the outgrowth of Operation Looking Glass, a nationwide child pornography sting that netted about 100 arrests last year.

Run with the help of the U.S. Customs Service, the operation solicits business only from people whose names have surfaced on mailing lists of child pornographers or through other means, the Miami Herald reported.

'We are not out to get the average citizen. We don't just go to the phone book," Lichter said.

Investigators said at least two sources of information, such as mailing lists seized from child pornography suppliers, are needed to begin a solicitation.

The undercover company then mails out a questionnaire to the target, asking the person to describe his or her preference of kinky sex.

Orlando, others question sticker law

ORLANDO - Orlando police will not enforce a new state law banning obscene bumber stickers, and other law enforcement agencies have expressed services reservations about the ban.

The law, which took effect Oct. 1. makes it a second-degree misdemeanor to possess an obscene bumber sticker or decal. Violators could be sentenced to up to six months in jail and fined up to \$500.

But many law enforcement agencies question both the constitutionality of the law and how it can be enforced.

The law says a sticker is obscene if it appeals to lewd sexual interest, depicts sexual conduct in an obviously offensive way and lacks serious artistic, political or acientific value.

Babies in wrong cribs, nurses aide says

WAUCHULA - A nurse's aide working at Hardee Memorial Hospital when Ernest and Regina Twigg's baby was born says she found their daughter and another baby girl in each other's cribs one day and switched them back.

The Twiggs have charged in a \$100 million lawsuit that nomebody deliberately switched their healthy newborn baby for the sickly child they brought home and raised. The girl raised as Arlena Twigg died in August of a congenital heart defect that had kept her bedridden most of her nine years.

The Twiggs believe their real daughter was adopted shortly after birth and now lives with a Sarasota man whose identity has been kept secret to protect the family's privacy

The unidentified aide, who worked in the hospital nursery when both babies were born, said it was the child who now lives in Sarasota, not Arlena Twigg, who was born with a heart defect, the Tampa Tribune said Sunday.

The other child had a "grayish look," the aide said. "I remember most of my bables," the newspaper quoted her

The aide also said she found the two babies in the wrong cribs one afternoon. She said each was in the other's crib, but their identifying wrist bracelets were intact, and she returned the girls to their proper places.

Disney laces fine for water pollution

ORLANDO - Walt Disney World may face fines of up to \$25,000 a day for dumping wastewater containing poliution levels up to three times the legal limits into an Orange County

Disney has dumped treated wastewater into Reedy Creek for years, water that often carried more phosphorus than allowed by the EPA. That water often has not contained enough oxygen, Peter McGarry, director of the Environmental Protection Agency's water management compliance unit for Florida, said.

The pollution levels have increased markedly since this summer, when Disney started using artificial wetlands to help clean the wastewater. The wastewater now sometimes contains phosphorus and nitrogen levels that are double or triple that allowed by the EPA.

Disney's sewage plant dumps an average of 5 million gallons a day into Reedy Creek. The creek flows into Lake Russell about 10 miles south of Kissimmee. Disney planned to ask the Kissimmee City Commission for

FTC questioning Florida doctors

MIAMI (UPI) - Hundreds of Florida doctors have been questioned by Federal Trade Commission inveligators still trying to determine if antitrust laws were broken during a rash of emergency room boycotts two years ago.

"We're intimidated," said Dr. Charles Lipman, a thoracic surgeon in North Miami Beach. "It's kind of like you're up against the big boys and that's scary."

The FTC will not discuss its growing investigation, but Lipman and Dade County hospital officials said hundreds of doctors have been questioned, either voluntarily or under subpoena.

The agency is asking doctors why they stopped taking emergency room calls in January 1987 and whether they were acting as individuals or as a group. Federal antitrust laws prohibit businesses from acting in concert for financial gain.

Dade County doctors began the unprecedented action of refusing emergency calls to protest malpraactice insurance premiums that had jumped 33 to 42 percent. Some doctors who canceled their insurance saw eliminating emergency calls as a way to reduce the risk of being sued.

Because of the boycott, six hospitals withdrew from Dade County's eight-hospital truama network, leaving Jackson Memorial and Miami Children's hospitals to treat all trauma victims in the county, a problem that remains unresolved.

In the months that followed, emergency room boycotts were carried out by surgeons in Broward, obstetricians in Palm Beach, neurosurgeons in Duval and cardiovascular surgeons in Hillsborough County.

The protests captured the attention of legislators, who passed a law last spring making it harder to sue doctors who work in emergency rooms. Injured people must now prove the doctor showed reckless disregard for their care. The law also provides relief to obstetricians by taking all lawsuits involving brain-damaged babies out of the courts and putting them into a state compensation system.

The new law stabilized insurance premiums and brought many doctors back to the emergency rooms, but some are still holding out. They want to be paid for treating indigents and want the public to damages that will be on the ballot next

month. The doctors' protests caught the FTC's attention, and a year ago the agency began investigating whether the doctors were trying to change the law, which is allowed, or trying to help their pocketbooks, which is

not allowed. The agency has forced some medical societies to hand over minutes of heated meetings and all written communications among its members. That includes the identical letters Palm Beach obstetricians wrote to area hospitals announcing their refusal to treat emergency cars.

"My guess is had they had something, it wold have developed by now and something would have been done about it," said FMA general counsel John Thrasher. If don't see any smoking guns."

FTC spokeswamn Dee Wiltson said that if the agency finds doctors violated antitrust laws, it would attempt to work out an agreement where doctors would stop refusing emergency room calls.

If an agreement is not reached, the agency can put people on trial.

Oriental mushroom may grow in Florida

PERRY - A Taylor County man thinks he may have found a profitable new Florida agricultural product that grows on trees - dead trees.

Clay Olson, who heads the Taylor County extension of the University of Florida's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences, is researching the profit potential of the shittake, a mushroom considered a delicacy in the Far East.

The mushrooms seem to grow well in Florida's climate. With a retail price of \$15-\$20 a pound, Olson thinks shiitakes may someday become a popular cash crop for small-scale farmers. Olson has been growing

shiitakes since 1986, planting them on the side of 3-to-4 feet long hardwood logs. The mushrooms rot the wood and use it for the nutrients they need

Olson now has shiitakes growing on about 300 logs on a farm just outside of Perry, and expects to soon expand to 1,000 logs. Shiitake projects are also

under way in Live Oak and in Marion and Madison Countles.

Olson uses a "warm weather" strain of shittake that takes about four to six months to colonize a log. Olson said that when the mushroom fruits. about twice a year, a grower will be picking for several days.

Shiltakes are relatively new to the United States, but in Japan they are a booming \$1 billion a year business. Japan produces about 90 percent of the world's shittakes, which are prized throughout the Orient for their meatlike texture and a taste some compare to chicken or lobster.

In Japan, the mushrooms are also believed to reduce cholesterol levels and boost the immune system. Some reports suggest the shiitake may have qualities that could be useful in fighting AIDS and cancer.

The mushroom was named for the shil tree it commonly grows on in the wild. Shit is a genus of oak that has more than 100 species in eastern Asia. "Take" is Japanese for mushroom, hence "shiitake."

New Lotto jackpot now at \$18 million

TALLAHASSEE - The 810 million jackpot for this week's Lotto drawing went unclaimed, boosting the estimated grand prize for next week to \$18 million. Lottery Secretary Rebecca Paul said Sunday.

While the Lotte drawing has gotten most of the attention. the scratch-off games are still drawing their share of players. Paul said.

She announced plans to hold a preliminary drawing Tuesday to choose seven finalists from a drum full of "entry" tickets for the current \$1 million prize in that game.

The winning numbers drawn Saturday for the Lotto game were 12, 17, 30, 43, 44 and 46. While no one matched all six numbers, more than 239,000 players won smaller prizes, with payouts as

-95 players matched five numbers to win \$12,563.50 -8,702 matched four numbers to win \$200.50.

-231,148 matched three numbers to win \$7.

The last Lotto winner, Elynor Purcell of Miramar, will receive the first of 20 annual payments of \$502,000 by midweek. The 67-year-old widow won the \$10 million jackpot last week, but still showed up for work Saturday at Calder Race Course, where she is a turnstile cashier.

'I'm just a low-key person and I intend to stay that way." Purcell said. "I think things will simmer down."

Co-workers greeted her with applause and a cake decorated with the winning lottery ticket numbers. Track patrons also congratulated her and several rubbed her arm as they went through the turnstile, hoping a little of Purcell's good luck would rub off on them.

George, U.S. Navy ghost, gains fame on carrier

JACKSONVILLE - The story of George the Ghost, who some say roams the passageways of the aircraft carrier USS Forrestal, has brought the Navy publicity, letters from supposed relatives and even cans of anti-ghost spray.

George has been making his presence known to Forrestal crewmen for two or three years. George became something of a national celebrity in July, when the ship's public affairs officer, Lt. James Brooks, sent out a news release about him and a photograph of a ghostly pair of khakis entering a hatch while the Forrestal was patrolling the North Arabian Sea.

Brooks says the publicity has brought some interesting responses, including several cans of mint-scented "Boogerchaser" from a Spartanburg, S.C., man who guaranteed the product would chase George and any other ghosts off the ship.

A Navy widow from Atmore. Ala., wrote that George might actually be "Hank," the nickname for her husband, a Navy pilot who was buried at seaoff the Forrestal in April.

And a writer from Blaine, Wash, warned the Forrestal "is endangered by poltergeists acting within your computer systems.

Tales of George, including mysterious noises and voices. objects falling for no reason and sightings of an unknown man in khaki uniform, abound aboard the Forrestal, according to Sunday's Florida Times

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

United Press International Deng warns party misfits WASHINGTON - A five-year

BEIJING - Chinese leader Deng Xtaoping has threatened to dismiss provincial leaders who ignore central orders in a bid to regain control of a nation slowly breaking into regional power centers. Chinese sources said

Deng's sternly worded warning came as part of an ongoing effort to put his troubled house in order and save the ambitious capitalist-style economic reforms he launched nearly a decade

The Communist Party's Central Committee last month announced a two-year economic plan that was geared to reduce China's worst inflation under communist rule and stamp out corruption by government and party officials who exploit an economy trapped between central planning and market

freedom. Chinese sources quoted Deng as warning in a major speech to provincial party secretaries during a crucial working conference last month that they might be dismissed if they ignore

Beijing's policy directives. "The Central Committee has

assigned power but it can also take back that power," Deng. 84.

was quoted as saying.

The address by the communist leader has not been publicized and details have been released only to state and party officials above vice ininisterial rank.

In a statement released after the Central Committee plenum Sept. 30, the party demanded obedience from its 48 million members, urging them "to unite still more closely and unify thinking."

"At present, the party's role as the core of the leadership and party discipline should be stressed, local interests must be subordinated to those of the

whole," the statement said. The state-run press has carried a series of articles and editorials calling on officials of all ranks to heed policies and directives issued by Beijing, marking the latest attempt by the central government to reassert control over wayward provinces.

To encourage the sweeping market-oriented reforms aimed at freeing much of the economy from rigid Soviet-style central controls. Beijing has granted increasing levels of autonomy to many of China's 29 provinces.

Contras seek peacekeeping force

WASHINGTON - The U.S backed Contra retiels, prepared to take "the first step to ending the bloodshed," are seeking a regional Central American peacekeeping force in Nicaragua as a prelude to new talks, a Contra rebel spokesman

Contra spokesman Bosco Matamoros said in an interview last week that rebel leaders asked the governments of Costa Rica. Honduras and Guatemala recently to establish "a United Nations type force" and offer its services to the Marxist government of Nicaragua

The regional peacekeeping force would separate the Contraforces in the north and south from the Sandinista government troops and establish the order necessary for the resumption of domestic peace talks. Matamoros said.

Icebreaker faces difficult choice: travel disputed waters or stay put

ANCHORAGE, Alaska - The U.S. government must decide whether to abandon a powerful Coast Guard icebreaker for the winter or sail it through a disputed waterway after it failed again to break through rock-solid ice north of

The 399 foot Polar Star, which was sent out to help two Canadian ships, cannot break through the 20-foot thick ice choking the Chukchi Sea northwest of Alaska

As a result, it now must either travel east through the politically tcy waters of the Northwest Passage or spend the winter in the frozen arctic, Chief Petty Officer Ed Moreth said Sunday from Alaska Coast Guard headquarters in

The last time a U.S. Coast Guard teebreaker sailed the Northwest Passage - the Polar Sea in 1985 - it raised a storm of protest in Canada, which claims the route between its mainland and its northern Islands as Canadian territory...

The United States does not recognize Canada's claim to sovereignty and considers the Northwest Passage an interna-

The situation has put the United States in a quandary, and an internal debate was going on in the Coast Guard over what to do with the Polar Star, Lt. Cmdr. Sue Kinner said at operations headquarters in Washington.

"A decision has been made that they cannot go westward," said Lt. Pete Marsh from the Seattle operations center-"They're going to have to go cast if they're going to get out of there."

The Northwest Passage is frozen most of the year, but was reported still open and passable, although officials said the Polar Star must move fast if a decision is made to travel the route.

On Sunday the Polar Star was in the Beaufort Sea, offshore from Prudhoe Bay. Alaska's giant oil field, while its officers consulted with officials in Alaska and at the Pacific command in Alameda, Calif., Kinner said

"This is a sensitive issue politically and geographically," Marsh said.

Kinner. Marsh and Moreth said the situation was more than the Coast Guard could handle on its own and likely would be settled at the Cabinet level by the departments of Transportation, Defense

Marsh said no decision had been made Sunday whether to seek permission from Canada for the Polar Star to sail the Northwest Passage

If the government asks for permission. it might appear to be tacit recognition of Canada's sovereignty over the waterway, but when a Coast Guard icebreaker last sailed the route without permission it chilled relations between the two nations.

There have been low-level talks between the United States and Canada about the possibility of using the passage. Kinner said, but she was unaware of any overtures by Canada to invite the teebreaker through the 1,000-mile passage as a gesture of thanks for trying to help Canada's ships.

The Polar Star's troubles started when it went to the rescue of two Canadian icebreakers, the 322-foot Pierre Radisson and the 288-foot Martha L. Black, which called for help Sept. 28 when they became stuck in heavy ice near Point

Traveling in a convoy with the larger American ship in front, the three vessels could not break through Chukchi Sea ice off northwest Alaska.





Mileage standards should not be cut

The administration wants Congress to repeal mandatory fuel-economy standards now that gasoline has gone down below a dollar, but Congress says no. So instead, the Department of Transportation wants to use its administrative authority to cut back the required fuel-economy standards for the 1989 model year. It has the power to do so under the Corporate Average Fuel Economy program enacted by Congress in 1975. It shouldn't use it; indeed, the power should be taken away.

Under CAFE rules, average fuel econmy on American roads has risen from 12 miles a gallon in 1974 to 26 in 1988. Automakers — not only the big three American companies — admit they can do better but don't want to because buyers don't care about fuel economy when gasoline is cheap. In fact, the number of gas guzzlers — cars exceeding existing fuel-economy standards and so requiring an extra tax be paid by buyers — rose this year from 18 to 24 and will be 45 in 1989.

This is a classic case of the free market's failure to reflect the long-term interests of the economy, the right and proper justification for government intervention. The community has a vital interest in reducing America's dependence on foreign oil and in curbing the poisonous auto emissions in our air that result in part from fuel inefficient automobiles.

The car companies and the administration want to pursue ideological principles regardless of their practical effect. Should they prevail, fuel economy on American roads will stagnate; it certainly fails to approach the far higher levels now achievable — 50 miles per gallon and above.

Congress should not only continue to refuse to repeal CAFE; it should toughen its standards and forbid the administration to waive the rules.

Seal of smallness

Beauty may be in the eye of the beholder but the size of a small business is strictly a matter of government vision.

"Small business" is defined differently for each of 850 industries by the Small Business Administration.

For example, if their revenue is less than \$3.5 million, jewelry stores and bakeries are "small." Department stores and groceries are "small" if that figure is \$13.5 million. With fewer than 50 employees, a cigar maker is "small." but cigarette manufacturers remain "small" with twice that number.

Bigness or smallness determines whether a firm qualifies for certain federal loans or contracts. For eligibility to receive such benefits, "small is beautiful."

Some economists — especially those of the laissez faire school who give the free market more than lip service — ask a question that goes deeper than mere word definition. They ask if it is government's function to grant preferential treatment to one industry over another in the first place.

Human nature being what it is, those being treated preferentially will reply "yes." Those not so favored by Uncle Sam will say "no."

Will history repeat with Boston-Austin II?

WASHINGTON — Here is a presidential

The Democrat carries every state on the Atlantic scaboard but loses the New England trio of Maine, Vermont and New Hampshire plus Virginia and Florida.

He carries the western bank of the Misaissippi River from Minnesota to Louisiana, with the exception of lowa. He wins Illinois on the eastern side of the river and neighboring Michigan, but the Republican wins all the rest of the states bordering the river on the east plus Indiana and Ohio.

In the West, the Republican wins everything but Texas, New Mexico, Nevada and Hawaii.

Who wins the election? In 1960, when that happened, John F. Kennedy carried 22 states to win the presidency with 303 of the 537 electoral votes, 56 percent of the total.

Richard Nixon won 26 states with 219 votes and Sen. Harry Byrd of Virginia got all eight electoral votes of Mississippi, six of 11 from Alabama end one from Oklahoma for a sotal of 15.



Even if Bentsen pulls Texas's 29 votes into the Democratic column, there are very few observers who believe Dukakis can come out of the South with more than one of the other Southern states Kennedy carried. That difference alone would give the election to Bush.

Democratic strategists are well aware of the situation and know the quickest way to make up for the Southern states Kennedy won in the 1960 scenario would be to win California. Its 47 electoral votes would permit Dukakis to lose the entire South except for Texas and with all of the other Kennedy states still win the election by one vote.

Is Quayle another JFK?

WASHINGTON — GOP vice presidential nominee Dan Quayle and his supporters often deflect questions about whether he could assume the presidency on a moment's notice by arguing that he is just as qualified as John Kennedy was in 1960.

As Quayle himself puts it when the question of his experience, or lack of it, is raised: "I've had 12 years of service, the same years of service that Jack Kennedy had before he ran for president, and I will happily compare my legislative record with his accomplishments."

When John F. Kennedy ran for president in 1960 he was clearly one of his party's leading lights. He had made a serious run for the Democratic vice presidential nomination in 1956, narrowly losing to Sen. Estes Kefauver. In the intervening four years, Kennedy remained centerstage as he battled Lyndon Johnson for the 1960 nomination. Kennedy developed an extensive national following and became a dominant force in public life.

Quayle, by contrast, has spent few moments in the spotlight or under close public scrutiny. When chosen by George Bush, Quayle was little known outside his native Indiana. Even within the Indiana delegation, he played second fiddle to the state's senior senator, former Indianapolis Mayor Richard Lugar.

For the Kennedy comparison to have any validity. Quayle and his supporters must rely almost entirely on the argument of legislative accomplishment. As a senator. Jack Kennedy did not author much legislation.

Quayle's defenders quickly pounce upon this fact and then brag that their man has a solid record of accomplishment, sponsoring legislation in education, health care and job training and emerging as a Senate "expert" in defense matters.

Are these claims of a solid record of legislative accomplishment by Quayle valid? Not according to many observers on Capitol Hill.

For instance, Quayle's office points to the senator's sponsorship of two education bills—the Adult Education Act Amendments of 1984 and the Student Financial Technical Corrections Act of 1986—as primary examples of his leadership role in education.

But the 1984 bill was simply a reauthorization bill for an existing program, while the 1986 law was a series of technical amendments to the federal government's ongoing student financial aid program. They were actually authored by the Education Department and then introduced by Quayle. As for his record on health care, a spokesman for the Senate Labor says an examination of committee records fails to show that Quayle ever authored or introduced any significant health-care, legislation that eventually became law.

In 1984 Quayle did introduce a bill that authorized and funded, under the National Academy of Science, a "Council on Health Care" to study and evaluate the cost-effectiveness of various health-care procedures. About the only other health-care bill authored by Quayle, which became law, was one that gave a group of Indiana hospitals

Recently a pollasked key Senate staffers to rate the effectiveness and ability of senators. Quayle was right in the middle — No. 55 out of 100. He got his highest marks for his work as a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee.

Quayle has emerged on the committee as one of the staunchest defenders of the Reagan defense plan and budgets. He has been at the forefront of eve

at the forefront of every debate over funding for new weapon systems requested by the Pentagon.

He has also been a major proponent of the renewed production of chemical weapons. In 1983 he helped lead the fight for the GOP-sponsored bill allowing new chemical and biological weapon production. In 1986 he led the fight to prevent that law from being overturned.

Quayle spearheaded the fight for the appointment of conservative Indiana lawyer Daniel Manion to the court of appeals.

Quayle was a leader among a small group of conservatives that fought to prevent the cut-off of federal funds to educational institutions accused of discriminating on the basis of race, sex or religious preference.

Vice President Bush and other Quayle supporters say the Indiana senator's authorship of the 1982 Job Training Partnership as the right stuff. But evidence is starting to pile up that this much-heralded program is a failure.

Three allies dump 'Duke'

BOSTON — Gov. Michael Dukakis has styled himself as a man of integrity, full of political courage and a committed environmentalist. But there are three prominent men in Massachusetts, all former Dukakis bossiers, who say he is none of the above.

The men are former Boston Celtics star Dave Cowens journalist Harvey Robbins and college professor Robert L. Keighton-Together they spearheaded a seven year battle to save a historic farm in Massachusetts, with Dukakis cheering them along the way.

But the trio told us they saw the real Dukakts reveal himself as a man who abused their friendship, betrayed their cause and broke every promise he made to them.

At issue was the scenic and historic 55-acre Prowse Farm at the foot of the Great Blue Hill near Boston. It was from the Doty Tavera, on this spot that Paul Revere took the famed Suffolk Resolves to the First Continental Congress in Philadelphia. The

Resolves were the inspiration for the Declaration of Independence

Martha Peabody Prowse acquired the farm as a wedding gift in the 1920s but left no provision for its preservation when she died in 1975. Cowens. Robbins and Keighton formed Friends of the Prowse Farm in 1976 and began working to block any develop-

In 1977, Codex Corp., a subsidiary of Motorola, bought the farm and announced plans to build its world headquarters there. The state lost the first round of a court battle to take the farm by eminent domain.

Dukakis suffered a humilizing defeat to Democrat Ed King in his bid for a second term as governor in 1978. When he ran again four years later, Dukakis asked the Friends of Prowse Farm for help. In return he pledged to preserve the farm.

Cowens, a legend in Boston, appeared in Dukakis television ads. Prowse Farm activitists put in hundreds of hours electioneering. Meanwhile, they were spending tens of thousands of dollars in legal fees to keep Codex from developing the property until Dukakis could get in office and save the

Robbins began to smell a rat when Dukakis called him in late August 1980 asking him not to mail letters saying he supported Prowse Farm preservation.

Dukakis won the election, and the Friends asked him to make good on his pledge. But now he asked the Friends, at their own expense, to do the state's work — find the legal authority for the state to take the farm through a civil suit.

A year went by, the Friends were broke and getting nowhere and Codex started building a steel structure on the farm, it was time for Cowens to buitonhole Dukakis. He met with the governor in his office and said Dukakis told him, "I promise I'll take the farm if I have the authority — steel or no steel."

When the Supreme Court of Massachusetts sided with the Friends in 1984 and declared the state had the right to take Prowse Farm by eminent domain. Dukakis had to get off the fence. He told the Friends he would have to think about it. This was the first major indication in seven years that Dukakis might back down to business interests. Dukakis never ordered the state to take the farm, and Codex built its headquarters.

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Poll shows Dukakis trailing in South

United Press International

With less than a month before Election Day, Democrat Michael Dukakis is hoping that starting on today's Columbus Day holfday. Americans will give him the momentum he needs to surge past Republican George Bush.

But Dukakis's job appears bigger as the clock ticks away on the general election campaign; a poll taken in 15 Southern states published Sunday snows the incumbent vice president widening his lead in Dixle.

Today, the presidential candidates take note of the holiday honoring Christopher Cofumbus: Dukakis plans to march in New York City's parade after addressing a Long Island high school, and Bush scheduled an address before the Knights of Columbus in Trenton, N.J.

The coming week could provide a watershed campaign event as Bush and Dukakis square off in their second debate. Thursday in Los Angeles to take up where they left off Sept. 25. their first debate of the cam-

Democratic pollster l'eter Hart said Dukakis still has time to tighten the race because voters haven't learned to love George

Appearing on NBC's "Meet the Press." Hart and pollster Kevin Phillips also said Dukakis can capitalize on impressions from Wednesday's vice presidential debate - picked up by snap polls after the event - that Bush's running mate, Sen. Dan. Quayle of Indiana does not strike Americans as being qualified to sit in the Oval Office.

But Hart warned that Dukakis cannot bet the rest of his carnpaign on Quayle and must hammer away on what polls show is a general uneasiness about the economy.

Beyond what you call peace and prosperity, there are a lot of uncertainties, and Michael Dukakis has started to raise them," Hart said "Even with those issues working for the Republicans, (the race (s) open and it's close enough."

Phillips said there is a "funny situation" in addressing the economy: "You've got very good superficial numbers and people are pleased - but they're uncertain about what's lurking behind the superficial num-

Sens Albert Gore, D.Tenn., and Alan Simpson, R-Wyo., addressing the Quayle question on the NBC program, naturally disagreed over the import of the junior senator on the general campaign.

The Wyoming Republican said he had no "qualms" about Quayle and added. "You know. we've had a lot of presidents in U.S. history, some of whom were absolute duds.... And Dan Quayle is not a dud."

Gore, who ran for the Democratic nomination this year, said the very selection of Quayle, 41, for the GOP ticket speaks to the qualifications of Bush himself.

The real issue is Bush's judgment in picking Dan Quayle," Gore said. "He had months (to choose a running mate), he had a wealth of talent, If he'd picked Al Simpson, there wouldn't be any question."

They'd rip me up the same way." Simpson said with a smile.

The copyright poll published Sunday by the Atlanta Journal Constitution found Bush has gained 9 points in two weeks in the South and now leads Dukakis 49 percent to 37 percent with 12 percent undecided. The figures do not add up to 100 percent because the poll 'rounded down'' the numbers.

The Oct. 1-7 telephone poll of 2.102 registered voters found liush leading in all the 15 Southern and border states surveyed — Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware. Florida. Georgia.

Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, North Carolina. Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas. Virginia and West Virginia

The survey had a 2 percent margin of error.

The poll said Bush has the support of 73 percent of those who voted for Reagan in 1984. including 40 percent of the "Reagan Democrats" = Democrats who voted for Reagan in 1980 and 1984

Dukakia, who must recapture Reagan Democrats to have a chance of winning in the South. has the support of 45 percent of that group - more than Bush. but not enough to break the GOP hold on the South

A poll of Ohio voters published Sunday by The Columbus Dispatch found Bush with a slight lead over Dukakts. The mail pollof 1.571 registered voters between Oct. 1-6 found 47 percent of respondents supporting Bush and 43 percent backing Dokakis.

A United Press International 50 state survey showed Bush leading or holding a slight edge In states with enough electoral votes to win the presidency.

To win the presidency, a candidate needs 270 votes in the Electoral College, and the UPI survey found Bush has aubstantial leads in 16 states worth 106 electoral votes and smaller. sometimes tiny, leads in 17 other states worth 204 electoral votes. If those leads hold, Hush would win 310 electoral votes.

Deadly cylinder destroyed

NITRO, W.Va. - The orchestrated destruction of a cylinder containing deadly hydrogen cyanide went off without a hitch, and officials said the town, altuated in the heart of one of the nation's leading petro-chemical corridors. is back to normal.

A crew of environmental technicians exploded the steel drum Sunday after weighing it to determine if the chemical inside was the deadly eyanide and how much it contained.

Charges placed strategically on the cylinder shattered the canister with a loud boom at the rundown Fike-Artei Chemical plant, while half the town of

8,000 was evacuated. Air samples showed only one part per million, and an all-clear was sounded 1 is hours after the detonation, allowing displaced residents to return home as the highly poisonous chemical burned away inside a bunker. 6 feet deep and surrounded by a 3-foot layer of sandbags.

"We're all quite relieved." Police Sgt. David Dean said from a command post at a nearly deserted city hall. "The cylinder has been destroyed. It went just

like clockwork. Everything is back to normal. We're glad it's

Hours later, a scientist studied a videotape of the explosion and verified for the Environmental Protection Agency that the chemical was hydrogen cyanide. Capable of causing instant death, is used in pesticides and in executing criminals in gas chambers.

"At the point of explosion,

there was a brief, actually one television frame, in which it was evident that the upper third of the flair was a magenta flash," said EPA spokesman Harold Yutes. "The representative of American Cyanamid, when we played back the tape and stopped it at that frame, said

Reactor shutdown may hurt nation's defense

United Press International

WASHINGTON - Nuclear reactors at the Savannah River Plant, closed since August for safety reasons, may be out of service so long the United States will be unable to maintain all its nuclear weapons at operational readiness, The New York Times reports.

Quoting senior administration officials, the newspaper said Sunday if the two-month suspension continues at the nation's only manufacturer of a vital material for nuclear warheads, the United States might be forced to start deactivating nuclear warheads.

The paper said deactivating supervisors the warheads would allow the recovery of radioactive elements for use in high priority weapons.

"It is very important that we restore reactors to safe operation reactors, the Times said. soon," Robert Barker, the senior Pentagon official for atomic energy matters, told the Times. "If we don't there will be very serious consequences for our ability to maintain our nuclear deterrent."

Three reactors at the Savannah River Plant in Aiken. S.C., were shut down in August because of concerns for equipment safety, the adequacy of operating procedures and the qualifications of technicians and

The suspension is the longest period since 1944 that the nation has gone without being able to operate its weapon production

The Times said administration officials are concerned with the production of tritium, a radioactive gas that boosts the explosive power of nuclear weapons and has enabled weapons designers to shrink the size of warheads.

The paper noted that tritium decays at the rate of 5.5 percent a year and at some point exactly when is secret - enough tritium decays to render the weapon inoperative.

Filipino authorities fear new coup

MANILA. Philippines - Authorities have ordered security tightened at government armories following reports that renegade soldiers plotting to oust President Corazon Aquine are receiving firearms from military sympathizers, officials said

Maj. Gen. Ramon Montano, chief of the Philippine Constabulary and the Integrated National Police (INP), has sent a radio message to field commanders to double security in armories across the nation and to conduct an inventory, said police spokesman Col. Manuel Oxales.

Military officials earlier announced the capture of at least 74 renegade soldiers in connection with a new plot to overthrow Aquino, who has put down five coup attempts since she took power in a popularly backed military revolt in February 1986.

Among those captured were two aides of dismissed army Col. Gregorio "Gringo" Honasan, who led an Aug. 28, 1987, mutiny that left 53 people dead and nearly toppled Aquino.

Czechs expected to approve changes

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia -- Sources close to the government say Czechoslovakian Communist Party members are prepared to approve one of the biggest personnel shakeups since the 1966 Warsaw Pact invasion.

The sources said Sunday the changes, to be discussed at a Communist Party meeting beginning today, would affect both progressives and hard-liners in the government and the party and apparently are meant to eliminate many leaders deemed responsible for the country's economic decline.

But Western observers noted that other oldtimers - such as Communist Party leader Milos Jakes, former leader Gustav Husak and Polithuro members Jan Foittk and Karel Hoffmann apparently will remain in power.

Prime Minister Lubomir Strongal is expected to be replaced by Deputy Premier Vladislaw Adamee, who also is prime minister of the Czech republic, the sources said. Czechoslovakia is composed of the Czech and Slovak republica.

Foreign Minister Bohuslav Chnoupek, one of the leading reformers in the government, also is expected to be retired, as is hard-liner Vasil Bilak, the party's chief ideologist. There was speculation Chnoupek's departure could be mainly for health

Three die as West Bank unrest enters 11th month

JERUSALEM - Soldiers raided more than 30 villages in the occupied West Bank in an attempt to prevent violence on the day the Palestinian uprising entered its 11th month, but a patrol opened fire in one village and killed two Palestinians.

Also, an israelt border guard shot and killed a Palestinian student who stabbed him Sunday at a checkpoint along the Egyptian frontier

At least 277 Palestinians have been killed since the start of the uprising against 21 years of Israeli occupation. Three Israelis also have been killed in the violence that began Dec. 9.

Sunday's violence erupted as Palestinian merchants staged a general strike to mark the start of the 11th month of the Palestinian sprising. The strike. called by the underground leadership of the uprising, shut down commerce in Arab East Jerusalem and the West Bank and Gaza Strtp.

Soldiers raided more than 30 villages in the occupied West Bank in an offensive aimed at preventing violence during the

A Palestinian man traveling on a bus between Egypt and the Gaza Strip stabbed an Israelt guard who boarded the vehicle at a frontier checkpoint, the army said. The border guard fired three bullets with his weapon, killing his attacker and lightly wounding another Palestinian.

PLO approves plans to renounce terrorism

CAIRO, Egypt - PLO leaders meeting in Tunisia approved plans to renounce terrorism and proclaim an independent Palestinian state in the the Israeli-occupied territories, the Middle East News Agency reported Sunday.

Egypt's state-run news agency quoted PLO Executive Committee member Abdullah El-Horani as saying Palestine Liberation Organization leaders ratified a 'document of independence and sovereignty of the Palestinian people over their soil" in the West Bank and Gaza Strip. occupied since 1967

In the dispatch from the Tunisian capital of Tunis, the agency said the document approved at a two-day meeting. would be debated at a session of the PLO's parliament-in-exile to be held in Algiers this month or early next month.

The PLO announcement evoked only slight reaction in

"We are trying to define political principles that the PLO as a whole can endorse and that at the same time should be accepted by the international community and make the Americans less hostile," PLO roving ambassador Khaled Hassan said.

El-Horant said the independence document was drawn up by a PLO legal committee assisted by Arab legal experts. while another committee worked on the political program of the proposed provisional govern-

He said the political program. which will take at least a week to be completed, will affirm the PLO's "renunciation of terrorism but will draw a distinction between terrorism and the legitimate struggle of liberation movements.

The program also will address such issues as a proposed international conference on Middle East peace.

El-Horani said the debate by the PLO legislative body, known as the Palestine National Council, would be held "prior to the proclamation of a Palestinian state and the formation of a provisional government.

45 Sinhalese reportedly killed

Tamil rebels attack village in Sri Lanka

COLOMBO, Srt Lanka - Suspected Tamil rebels attacked a village of majority Sinhalese in northern Sri Lanka early today and dragged men, women and children from their beds, killing at least 45, military and hospital sources said.

In the south of ethnically divided Sri Lanka, police enforcing a curiew opened fire on about 1.006 anti-government demonstrators, killing one and wounding six others, officials

Military sources in Colomboand the Northeastern province town of Vavuniya, 130 miles northeast of the capital, said an unknown number of assailants at about 1 a.m. attacked Makongaskada, a village of about 140 families belonging to the Island's majority Buddhist Sinhalese ethnic group.

The attackers woke residents up, dragged them from their homes and shot or knifed to death at least 21 men. 12 women and 11 children, aged two to 10 years old, the sources

central city of Annuradhapura said seven wounded were brought to the facility and one, a 5-year-old boy, died of his wounds.

The military sources said officials believed the alleged massacre was staged by guerrillas of the Liberation Tigers of Tamil Eclam, which is demanding independence for the northeast where most of the 3 million predominantly Hindu Tamil minority live.

There were no further details.

The slaying came on the first anniversary of an Indian military offensive that drove the rebels from their one-time northern bastion of Jaffna and left hundreds of Tamil civilian casu-

Although badly hurt by the Jaffna offensive, the Tamil rebels have continued to fight for independence from the Sinhalese-controlled central government in Colombo.

There are now more than 60,000 Indian troops in the northeast of the Island formerly called Ceylon. They have suffered more than 500 fatalities in combat with the Tiger rebels. whose casualties are not known.

Up to 200 dead in Algeria

ALGIERS, Algeria - Doctors, witnesses and Western diplomats say at least 50 and possibly as many as 200 people have been killed in five days of rioting over government austerity measures.

Sporadic gunfire could be heard in parts of the capital Sunday, and there were unconfirmed reports that the rioting sparked by protests over food shortages might move to the heavily guarded diplomatic quarter of the city.

Journalists trying to reach certain auburbs of the capital found telephone lines disconnected in several areas with strong Moslem fundamentalist sympathies, including the sub-

urb of Chevalley. Soldiers have prevented foreign television crews from sending out much of their own footage, but authorities have offered foreign stations shots of rioting with scenes of military equipment and long bread lines censored out.

Doctors and witnesses said at least 50 people had been killed since the violence erupted Tuesday night, and some reports cited by Western diplomats estimated the death toll to be as high as 200.

Without specifying figures, the government acknowledged Friday that demonstrators and soldiers had been killed in the violence that followed government austerity measures. The rioting has been the worst in the North African nation since Algeria gained independence from France in 1962.

Authorities arrested two cameramen working for Independent Sunday as they filmed tanks in Algiers on the fifth day of rioting that climaxed weeks of protests over skyrocketing prices.

overcrowded housing and the austerity program, which pro--voked food shortages.

The two Egyptian cameramen were arrested while filming tanks in the Place du Premier Mai, a main square of the city that has been the scene of several demonstrations since Tuesday. The men were detained for four hours and released after their film was confiscated.

After a 10 p.m. governmentimposed curfew Saturday night. soldiers fired into crowds of demonstrators, whose shouts of 'God is Great!'' could be heard between rounds of gunfire.

Soldiers clashed with demonstrators in the center of the city and in at least three suburban locations, witnesses said.

Soldiers fired into a crowd in the city's main shopping street. the Rue Didouche Mourad, and left bodies lying motionless on the ground, one witness said.

Interior Minister El Hedi Khediri acknowledged late Saturday on an Algerian television broadcast that there also had been violence and deaths in other parts of the country.

We will take all necessary actions to restore calm and end the acts of vandalism that have taken place in four cities," he said, naming only Annaba. about 279 miles east of the capital.

President Chadli Bendjedid declared a state of slege Thursday. The violence spread Friday to the port city of Oran. Algeria's second-largest city.

In Oran, 217 miles west of Algiers, rioters went on a rampage for a second day Saturday. Some looting was reported in the city's main shopping district.

Yugoslav leader warns strife is 'extraordinary'

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia -President Raif Dizdarevic appealed for an end to demonatrations that have shaken his ethnically diverse nation, warning that the government would not allow the country to be torn apart by civil strife.

The Yugoslav leader warned Sunday the tense political situation may lead to 'extraordinary conditions." an apparent allusion to a possible crackdown on mass protests similar to police strongarm tactics in Titograd Saturday.

Authorities "will do everything the Constitution and law permit so as to protect the public order and peace, the security of citizens and their property and the constitutional order." he said.

"We appeal to all citizens to refrain from activities and such expressions of dissatisfaction which may have unwanted consequences and harm their security." Dizdarevic said in a speech broadcast nationwide.

We shall not permit, the people will not permit, the tearing down of flate President Josip Brozi Tito's federal, socialist, democratic Yugoslavia."

Dizdarevic said the Yugoslav collective leadership will do all in its power to safeguard the constitution and called on the citizens to democratic methods to ask for reforms and the replacement of incompetent

Dizdarevic's 35-minute speech followed more violent mass protests over the weekend and was the first such appeal by a Yugoslav leader since June 1968, when Tito spoke on television and radio to ask striking students to end weeklong protests.

Shortly after Dizdarevic's speech, Belgrade Radio reported that about 10,000 people demonstrated Sunday evening in the southern Yugoslav town of Niksic protesting use of force by police over the weekend.

Dizdarevic, 62, conceded in the broadcast that Yugoslavia is in a grave economic and political crists and said he understands that people are deeply worried and dissatisfied.


But he said government reforms aimed at introducing free-market rules in the Yugoslav system of worker self-management are the only way out of the crists.

His speech came as police patrolled the southern city of Titograd with orders to block further demonstrations after violent clashes Saturday between authorities and protesters demanding the resignation of Communist Party

University students in three cities issued statements denouncing the use of force in quelling growing unrest in two of Yugoslavia's six republics and echoing workers' demands for leadership changes and relief from spiralling inflation and de-

teriorating living standards. In Titograd, capital of the southern Republic of Montenegro, police patrolled in pairs to guard against a repeat of Saturday's violence.





The Dodgers, who won just one of 11 games against New York during the regular season, regained the home-field edge they lost by splitting the first two games in Los-Angeles.

"After a tough ballgame we come back and play well." Mets Manager Davey Johnson said. "It's definitely a tough loss."

Game 5 is Monday at noon EDT with the Mets sending Sid Fernandez probably against Game 2 starter Tim Belcher.

Monday was originally supposed to be an off-day, but Game 3 was rained out Friday. The Dodgers' victory Sunday guaranteed the teams will have to fly Monday night back to Los Angeles, where Game 6 is scheduled Tuesday night.

The Mets, who won a major league-high 56 games at home, had their 12 game Shea Stadium winning streak snapped.

Earlier Sunday, the Dodgers learned they had lost ace reliever Jay Howell for three days. NL President A. Bartlett Giamatti suspended Howel because he was found with an illegal substance on his glove in Game 3. Howell said be might appeal Monday.

Johnson, 26, repeatedly has denied knowingly taking any illegal

When I read how (Johnson's) so innocent and Charlie is so guilty. I want to scream at Ben to tell the truth. Stop lying and tell everyone you take steroids and you know you take steroids," said Issajenko, 30.

Johnson won the 100-meter race in Scoul, South Korea, on Sept. 24 in a record 9.79 seconds. But he later was stripped of the record and the Olympic gold when traces of the banned anabolic steroid stanorolol were found in his urine.

Test results from the International Olympic Committee indicated long-term use of the musclebuilding drug.

An inquiry into the affair was launched last week by the Canadian government, and an agency that supervises doctors is investigating allegations that Astaphan supplied sterolds to Olympic athletes. Astaphan has said he gave Johnson a form of steroids not forbidden by Olympic rules.

the victory.


