## ORLANDO FIRM ACQUIRES CITY BONDS FOR PAR

261,000 Refinancing Issue Purchased At Private Sale Monday By Wright, Varlow

City Heads Well - Pleased With Bid Price Highest Local Bonds Have Brought In Past Two Years

For the first time in many months Sanford municipal bonds have brought a price per dollar for dollars. The City Commission meeting in special session Monday afternoon negotiated the sale of \$261,000 in refinancing bonds at the rate of 98 percent.

The bonds will bear interest at the rate of 5 percent. It was the best price Sanford bonds have ever brought. The sale was made through the Sanford Municipal Bond Commission.

Members of the commission, headed by Mayor E. F. Hunsbarger, were pleased with the results of the sale. The bonds were sold to the Sanford Municipal Bond Commission at a price of 98 percent.

## DUTTON PLANT SENATE TO FIX NOW RUNNING DISPOSITION OF IN FULL BLAST POWER PLANT

Washing And Pre-Cooling Arrangement Furnishes Better Product And Demands Bigger Price Than Ordinary Celery

Interesting Process Followed In Plant Celery Washed And Wrapped, Pre-Cooled By Water, Then Put In Refrigerating Cars

Few people outside the agricultural industry are familiar with the progress that has been made in producing celery for market, but a visit to the pre-cooling plant of the F. F. Dutton and Company will convince anyone that much has been accomplished in bringing about improved methods in this line.

Many of the improvements are due to the company's long experience in the celery business and one of the leading celery marketing experts of the United States. It was Mr. Dutton who designed, equipped and managed the first commercial pre-cooling plant in Florida, soon after the advantages of pre-cooling were ascertained.

At the huge plant on Sipes Avenue, the Dutton Company not only pre-cools celery but it washes, dries and wraps it with paraffin paper, to aid in preserving its natural state. The demand for celery thus prepared exceeds the plant's output and there are always orders on the waiting list. Markets for the product are supplied by the local plant, even points in Canada expressing a preference for the washed and pre-cooled product.

The Dutton plant is equipped to process 15 cars a day and facilities for washing and wrapping are arranged on a small amount. Every plant is designed to insure a pre-cooling of the celery until it reaches the consumer. To bring this about, Mr. Dutton has constantly endeavored to transport the celery under most ideal conditions.

The bill for the settlement of war claims and the return of the sequestered private property of former enemy nationals went to conference today, after having passed the Senate last yesterday. The measure passed by the House on Dec. 22.

It is expected that these difficulties will be adjusted, none of which affects the major portion of the legislation, and that this bill, thus agreed to, will be reported to the President within 10 days or less. ## "Flivver Plane" Leaves On Proposed Non-Stop Flight Linking Detroit And Miami

DETROIT, Feb. 21.—(INS)— With the thermometer near zero, Harry Brooks, chief test pilot of the Ford Motor Company, hopped off today in the Ford "Flivver" plane in a second effort to make a non-stop flight to Miami, Fla., a distance of 1,120 miles.

The sky was clear and there was little wind. Edsel Ford, president of the Ford Motor Company, and E. E. Martin, general manager, watched the tiny five-cylinder plane soar into the air and disappear southward.

Brooks hopes to establish a distance and endurance record for light planes. He expects to arrive in Miami about 9:30 tonight. Brooks' course is over Fairfield, Ohio, Lexington, Ky., Winfield, Tenn., Macon and Atlanta, Ga., Jacksonville, St. Augustine and Daytona Beach, Fla.

In his first attempt several weeks ago to make the flight Brooks was forced down near Asheville, N. C. Brooks set a new American distance record for light planes in his first flight but failed to break the world record of 873 miles held by a Frenchman.

The flivver plane is equipped with a 36-horse power engine, designed by the Ford Company. It is five feet high, 16 feet long and weighs 550 pounds. It can be landed safely almost anywhere. The plane carried 51 1-2 gallons of gasoline.

## HUMAN TORCH DISCOVERED IN JERSEY WOODS

Woman With Clothes Ablaze Is Found By Man Who Smothers Fire And Seeks Help Tragedy Is Laid To Foul Play

Victim's Garments Had Been Covered With Gasoline It Is Said

MORRISTOWN, N. J., Feb. 21.—(INS)—An unidentified woman who was found in the woods near here last night with her clothing enveloped in flames, died early today in All Saints' Hospital here. State police investigating the tragedy suspect foul play.

They said she apparently had been knocked down and set afire, and that her clothing had been saturated with gasoline.

Leno Campbell, of Bernardsville, N. J., saw the "human torch" and heard the woman's screams while driving along the state highway. He covered the woman's body with snow and drove to Bernardsville, where he notified policeman Charles Canaugh. When the pair returned, the woman's clothing was again burning.

Campbell again extinguished the flames and the woman was rushed to the hospital, but physicians were unable to save her life. Police questioned Campbell as to why he did not take the woman to the hospital when he first saw her, instead of waiting until he had summoned aid.

It is believed the woman may have lived in Buffalo, N. Y. She wore a seakink coat which bore the label "Louis, Furrier, Buffalo, N. Y." She was well dressed. Her hat bore the label "Bedell's, Paris."

The victim was about forty years old, with gray hair. She wore gold glasses, and on her left arm was a gold wrist watch. There were no definite clues as to her identity or to a possible assailant.

## Chicago To Launch Drive To Free City Of Bomb Terrorists

CHICAGO, Feb. 21.—(INS)—The drive to rid Chicago of bomb terrorists was pushed with renewed vigor today following an attack last night on the home of Lawrence C. Crowe, secretary to State Attorney Robert E. Crowe, who is a brother-in-law of the state's attorney, is the fourth political figure to become a target for bombers within the past month. Other officials whose homes were bombed are City Comptroller Charles C. Fitzmorris, Dr. William H. Reid and municipal Judge John A. Sarbaro, all actively identified with the political organization of Mayor William Hale Thompson and State Attorney Crowe.

As in the other three explosions, no one was injured, but considerable property damage was done. They're trying to bomb me out of politics," said State's Attorney Crowe.

Mrs. Hoge, Lynchburg, Va., national secretary; and Mrs. Sara Nellie G. Burger, Springfield, Mo., assistant secretary, were guests of honor at today's meetings.

Mrs. Hoge gave the keynote address upon the opening of the convention today. She was followed by Mrs. Florence E. Atherton, of Atlanta, who addressed her audience on the subject, "Laying Foundations, Law Observance."

## Police Seek To Unravel Mystery Of 'Suicide Discovered In Virginia Hotel

ALEXANDRIA, Va., Feb. 21.—(INS)—The aid of Los Angeles and Omaha police was sought today to unravel the mystery surrounding a pretty, well-dressed woman who committed suicide in the George Mason hotel here late yesterday by shooting herself.

She registered at noon as "Mrs. Beth Reed, Los Angeles." A maid found the body yesterday evening. It lay upon the floor, near a chair on which was a .32 calibre revolver. One bullet had been fired, lodging above the heart.

On the dresser was a note which said: "To whom it may concern: please don't try to find out who I am. What good will it do? There is nothing in life for me but unhappiness. Don't let people come in and stare at me after I am dead."

Without Racing

From Jacksonville comes the information that Florida travel from the North during the last ten days, as far as the Atlantic Coast line railway is concerned, has been much heavier than for the same period last year.

An article in the Miami Herald yesterday stated that thirty-eight hundred persons reached Miami last week by boat alone. The Clyde Line alone brought in over twenty-six hundred persons, while the Merchants and Miners, Eastern Steamships, and Munson lines handled the rest.

1888—Average year. Started below normal but, in spite of politics, gained steadily and closed above normal.

1892—Ten per cent above normal.

1896—Below normal, possibly partly due to Bryan's "free silver" campaign, though the period of depression of which this year formed a part lasted over into the second year following.

1900—An average year. Considerably above normal in the early months; a little below at the year's close.

1904—Below normal.

1908—Started with carry-over from the depression of 1907, but improved later in the year in spite of its being a presidential year.

1912—Good year. Between 5 and 10 per cent above normal.

1916—A real boom year, averaging 10 to 15 per cent above normal.

1920—Considerably above normal until last three months of year, when post-war economic readjustment began.

1924—Below normal during middle of year recovering at close.

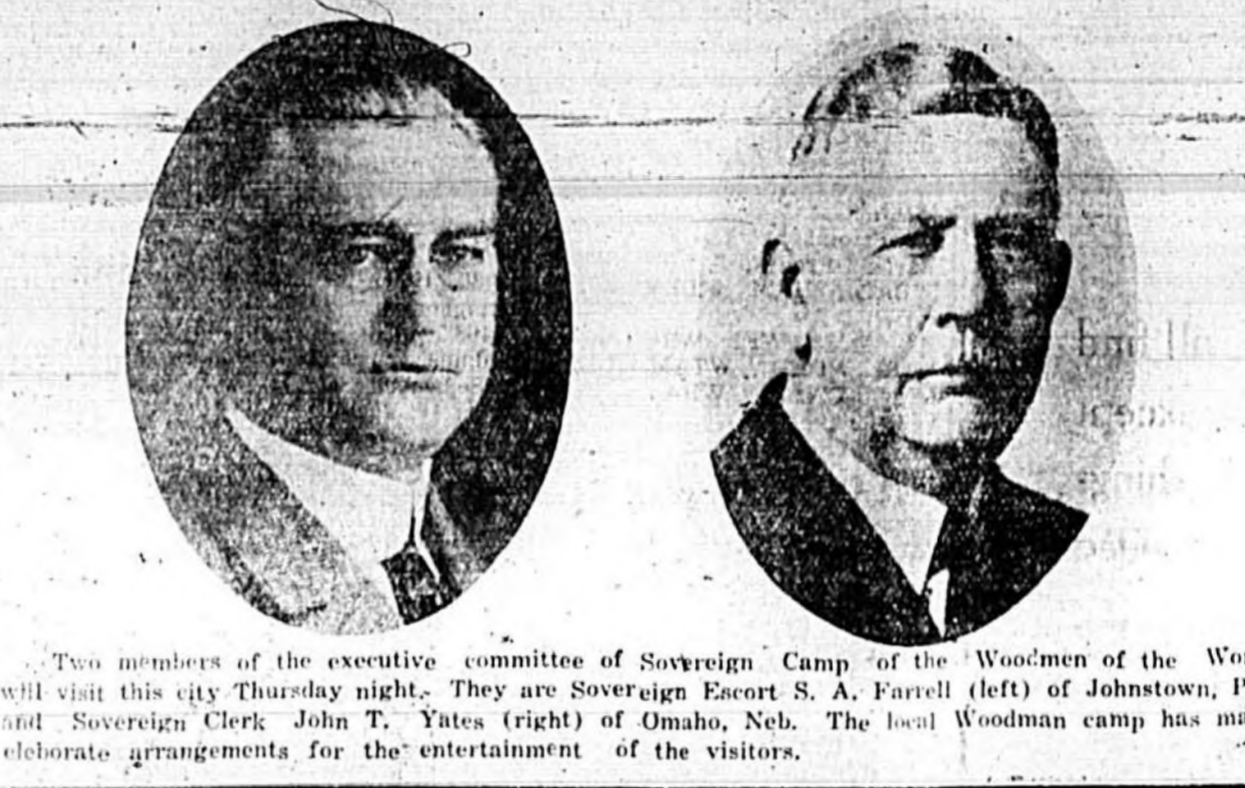
