

WASHINGTON (# - A Senate Commerce subcommittee plans to start hearings Jan. 19 into what Sen. Monroney (D-Okla) terms "factory mistreatmet" of car

dealers. Monroney said the hearings will deal with automobile bottlegging excessive credit and other alleged abuses. Monroney heads the sub-

committee. He said the group already has collected considerable preliminary information, including replies to questionnaires from about 20,000 of the coutry's approximately 42,-000 retail automobile dealers. He said these replies indicate

that dealers are concerned about what they call mistreatment by menufacturers, including "pressure . . to take more cars than needed" and the assumption of "all financial risk from the time the car leaves the factory until buyer, sometimes a period of three years or more."
