(Continued From Page One) until September. At that time, the funds were transferred to demand accounts in the banks which held them. That made them eligible for withdrawal immediately and at the same time cut off the half of one percent interest the State was getting. Today's action pulled out nearly all the time accounts. The money now will go into the seven banks which hold State money readily available for checking. Larson said the money was distributed among so many banks that the big withdrawal will not adversely affect anyone. He said "current expenditures are running approximately \$4,750,000 per month more than current collections. The present crisis in our financial picture is the most critical

I have seen since I became state treasurer in January, 1941. "Especially does this present an alarming picture when we consider the fact that state services, such as schools, health, welfare and institutions of higher learning were increased by many millions of dollars in the appropriation bill effective July 1. "One point I would like to make clear is the fact that even if there were no increases in the appropriation for the next two years, we still would have a deficit because we have been using up the reserve which we had built up several years ago. "In other words, we have reached the bottom of the barrel and the state cannot operate on a deficit. Brazil is somewhat larger than the United States and three times the size of Argentina.

tration bill, and they will make the decision. But he said he certainly would like to see such a measure brought out.

To a question whether the Administration is considering any move to halt the longshoremen's strike in Hawaii, he replied no such move can be made under existing law.

Asked about a bill Senator Knowland (R-Calif.) planned to introduce today to give him temporary power to intervene in the Hawaiian shipping crisis, Mr. Truman said he did not know whether he wanted such power.

The President, commenting on the suggestion of Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) that he lead a new crusade for peace, said he has been doing just that ever since he took office in April, 1945, and will continue to do so.

matter now before the United Nations and, until an atomic bomb control plan is agreed to, disarmament talk must be delayed. Does this mean that the world is not heading toward peace? No, Mr. Truman replied. He said it is moving slowly and gradually toward this goal and he expressed confidence we will gradually get it.

He brushed aside fears expressed by Rep. Vinson (D-Ga.) that the Senate-approved bill to tighten the present arm services unification act may lead to a defense director. He described such views as perfectly absurd.

As long as the Constitution makes the President commander-in-chief, he said, he does not think anyone else can take over the armed forces' leadership.

The President said he will express his opinions freely in the Missouri senatorial election next year since this is his home state.

But he added he may not take a stand for any candidate in the Democratic primary. He said he will not take a hand in the special senatorial election in New York in November to fill a vacancy created by the resignation of Senator Wagner (D-N.Y.). This is the business of the great state of New York, not his, Mr. Truman said.

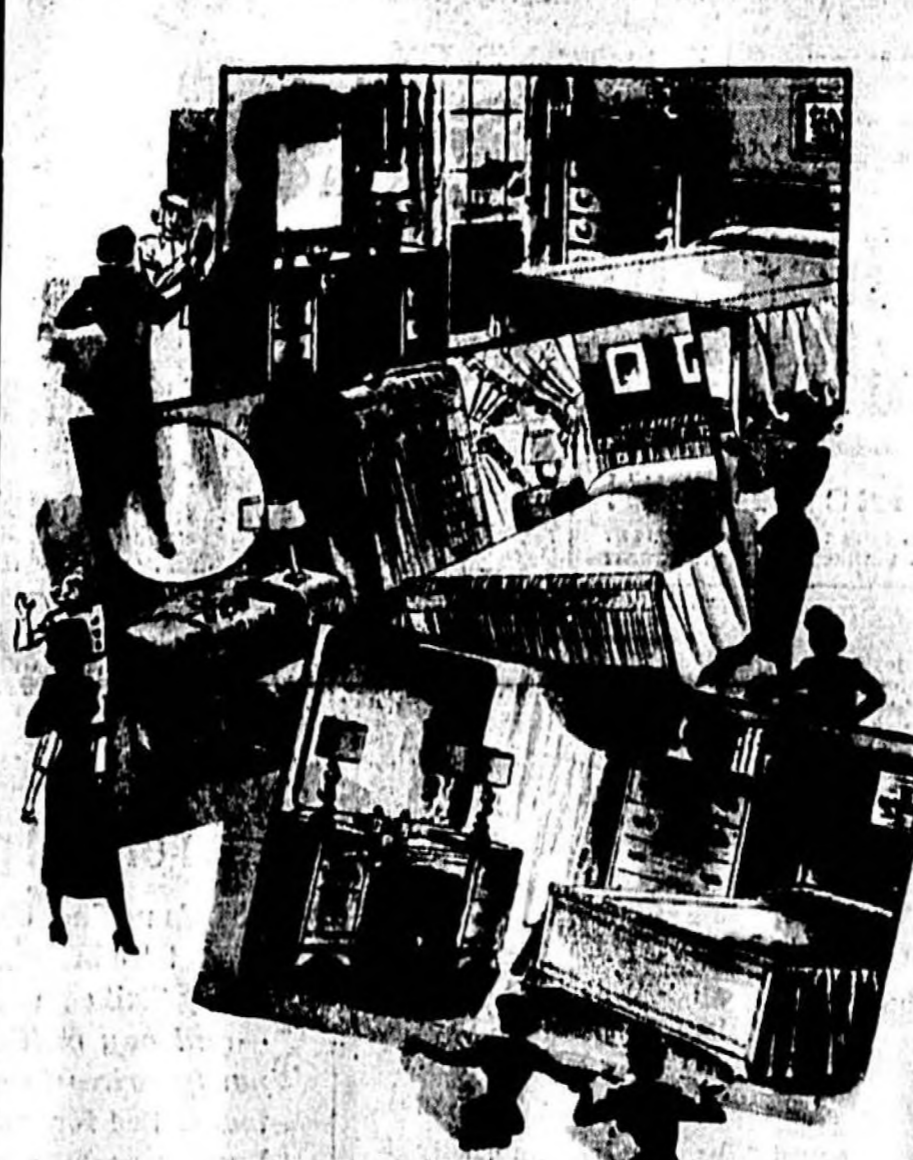
