Author shares strange tales

SANFORD - Weirdness just seems to find Sanford native Charlie Carlson.

Executives with Barnes and Noble Books recognized that and offered the historian anexpense account to travel around Florida documenting strange stories for a book. Carlson said he took at least a split second to ponder the offer.

Credits help city weather stormwater

SANFORD - In the city of Sanford's quest to redevelop downtown, city officials face a number of hurdles. One of the more complex challenges is how new projects will handle stormwater issues.

In Central Florida any new development must be approved by the St. John's Water Management District to ensure there are adequate drainage and pollutant controls for stormwater.

Normally, a developer would need to build a retention pond or an underground stormwater storage unit to meet guidelines for stormwater drainage on the property. In downtown Sanford there is limited land left and on a piece of land, a retention pond can take up 15 to 20 percent of the property.

The city of Sanford and the See Water, Page 3A

Water Management District have come up with a new plan for using an existing pond from one area of downtown to give credits to developers so that they do not have to build a stormwater unit on their property.

These stormwater credits are sold by the Community Redevelopment Agency, which is currently determining a systematic method of charging for the credits.

The existing pond near Mill Creek is for flood control and it discharges into Lake Monroe. In finding that the pond had the capability for water quality improvements, the city of Sanford and CPH Engineering, Inc., worked together to study and estimate the pollutant loading removals within the existing pond.



State reviews plans to restore marina beach

SANFORD -City officials are moving forward with project guidelines and a joint funding agreement in order to bring back waves, sand, and sailing to the north shore of Marina Isle.

Last March city officials announced the proposal to rebuild the beach, which existed until the constant erosion forced the city to protect the shoreline instead of the beach.

The project, which is set to begin Phase One this summer, is in the early engineering and permitting stages and city project manager Chris Smith said there are "a lot hurdles."

A new plan will protect the

shoreline, as a main priority, while bringing a beach back to Sanford residents for recreational marina activities, but not for swimming purposes.

Smith said they want to begin the project during the time of the year with the lowest water levels, which occurs in June or July.

"The most challenging thing I hear is the water level," Smith said.

The Project is divided into two phases. The first phase is the construction of approximately 1,000 feet of aluminum seawall with a concrete cap and tie back system. The wall will be constructed with three bump-in segments approximately 12 feet deep and 20 feet wide with concrete stairs. The stairs will eventually be

used to accommodate a boat landing access. Around 200 feet of new beach area will be established on the east end of the project. A city boat ramp will also be constructed on the east side of the property. The last part of Phase 1 will include landscaping and irri-

At the CRA meeting, Smith gave an update of the project to members.

"DEP has made its first request for information," Smith told CRA members.

The Department Environmental Protection is reviewing the plans for navigational, environmental, educational and engineering purposes, as well as other public

The first time I met Al Grisshaber was minutes after the Sanford City Commission hired him as city manager in June 2003. During our brief conversation, I was impressed that he remembered not only the date but the exact time within 10 minutes that first visited The Herald office, I also liked that he expressed his believe in an active press and promised to be forthcoming with information.

That was then. Today my opinion is Grieshaber is selective with both his memory and his openness.

My doubts began last May after the RiverWalk grand opening. Instead of estimating the number of people who attended the event, Grieshaber provided a specific number. I don't remember the specific number, but it was more than 65,000 people. That figure seemed extremely high to me. I questioned the city manager about his accuracy, and he assured me he had counted. A bit taken a back, I asked him again and he explained that he had counted the number of

stickers the city handed out. I still didn't think that was very accurate but decided to drop the matter.

A month later, the city was considering purchasing the Wachovia Bank building and possibly using it for City Hall. Upon Grieshaber's recommendation, the commission directed city staff to study the mat-

ter report back in July. In late July the matter went away when the commission allowed it's option to expire with no discussion.

After the meeting I asked Grieshaber why the city decided not to purchase the building. He said the building did not fit into any of the city's future plans. That was obvious by the commission's lack of action. What I wanted to know was why it didn't fit into the city's plans. No matter how I asked the question, Grieshaber responded with the same answer. I then asked for a copy of the report the city had compiled to make its decision. There was no report, Grieshaber responded. I reminded him that under Florida's public records law, almost all information generated by a public official — including notes and rough drafts — are open to the public. The city manager continued to insist there were no tangible documents.

Two weeks later I had coffee with an acquaintance. He asked if I had seen the city's report on the Wachovia building. Astonished, I told him the city had denied there was a report. An hour later he gave mehis copy of the 100-plus page document.

I confronted Grieshaber about the report.

He apologized and said he forgot about the report. The man who can remember the exact minute he first entered The Herald building suddenly could not recall a report on whether the city should spend \$1.6 million to buy a six-story building for a new City Hall. It was unbelievable, and I told him so.

I wasn't the only person Grieshaber tried to hide documents from. Turns out, he was hiding things from city commissioners. In a note The Herald uncovered this week, Grieshaber directed the city attorney to keep information from city commissioners.

On Nov. 17, Grieshaber sent a rough draft of his final decision in the Van Gaale personnel matter to City Attorney Bill Colbert. Grieshaber included a handwritten note which read in part, "Please do not share it with the mayor, vice-mayor or commission-

The package was returned to Grieshaber with the following memo from City Attorney Leanie Groot:

"Upon reading the note that you directed to us, we did not review the attached documents. We have caused those documents to be placed in an envelope to be returned to you, unread, in conjunction with this memorandum. ... We cannot operate under such direction. Section 4.03 of the City Charter, as you know, prescribes the duties and functions of the City Attorney and the honoring of your request would not, in our view, comport with our obligations to the City Commission. Additionally, as I am certain you understand, there are public records

issues that arise from the request." During his first day on the job, Grieshaber held a meeting with his department directors in which he laid out his management philosophies. One of the items on the agenda was Grieshaber's expectations for ethical

"If any action can not be exposed to the light of day or a public meeting, it does not need to be done," Grieshaber wrote.

He also wrote, "We are fiduciaries of public trust and we will not violate that trust." Grisshaber has violated that trust. It's time for the city commission to relieve him of his



CRA wants input from residents near Fort Mellon Park

SANFORD — The Sanford Community Redevelopment Agency discussed a FRDAP grant from the state of Florida for Ft. Mellon Park April 6.

Certain elements must be included in the park in order to receive the grant money, which is close to \$200,000, including restrooms, playground equipment, and either basketball courts, tennis courts, or volleyball courts.

Ground was already broken early this year, on a play fort, which will cover the playground requirement for the grant.

Residents who live within about a mile proximity to Ft. Mellon Park, should be receiving a survey in the near future asking what they would like to see put in the park.

"We need to go to the people," CRA Chairman Bob Parsell Jr. said.

Whether or not the park should be recreational or passive, is another aspect the CRA is

According to Chris Smith, city Project Manager, the drawings for everything but the play fort is in pencil form right now, until they decide what else to put in Ft. Mellon.

The FRDAP grant is not flexible with the amenities, but some of the park elements, the CRA could receive reimbursement for is a bike trail, light improvements, a tot-lot, picnic pavilions, restrooms, fort playground and basketball renovations.

Parsell said during the end of the discussions that, "We're basically asking what else do

you want in the park."

The surveys, which would be distributed in water bills, are near completion and are said to have a good return rate.

Robert Kuhn, CRA member said of himself and CRA member Charles Rowe, "Charles and I want to see activities."

The survey will take into account the community's input, and if there is a strong desire for certain elements that cannot be implemented at Ft. Mellon Park, that data will be used in future park restoration projects.

similar creature. As a 14-year-old boy, Carlson and some friends camped out on West State Road 46 not far from the Wekiya River. As boys will do, they ran around in the woods having a great time, when they saw something standing in the middle of the road in

the moonlight. "It was seven or eight feet tall," Carlson recalled. "It crashed through the swamp." The boys hunkered down in their tents with every flashlight burning. The next morning, they found orange peels in the road where the creature had stood.

"There are credible people,

telling incredible stories," he said. "There have been serious studies on whether or not

these things exist." Carlson will share some of the these stories and his new book at a "Weird Florida: Unleashed!" party scheduled for Saturday, April 30 at 7 p.m. at The Blue Dahlia, 112 E. First St. He said it was very important for him to kick off a book tour in his hometown.

The public is invited to the free party which will feature prizes such as the actual map used by the author in his 2,500-mile quest to find strange tales in Florida. Personalities featured in the book will attend. One person has even promised to bring a live skunk ape, Carlson said. There is a \$10,000 reward for a genuine live Florida skunk ape. The offer expires April 30, the same day as the party, according to a promotional

"I'm kind of partial to Sanford," Carlson said. "The promotion people wanted to do it in Orlando, but I said I'm going to do it in my hometown." The promotion department also has him talking with newspapers with a miniCarlson made-a special visit to Orlando. The Herald.

He added that he "snuck" in 13 stories from Seminole County into the Weird Florida

book. He tells about the 1-4 Dead zone where the graves of four German immigrants were paved over by the Florida Department

Transportation. They lie in the Lake Monroe area between the railroad track and 17-92 under the interstate.

His first novel is titled, "Ashley's Shadow." Carlson describes it as a murder mystery, romance, ghost story. It is based on the hauntings at Ashley Tavern in Rockledge.

Sounds kind of weird, but that's what Carlson's life has become. He said his interest in history and strange things started with Bill Vincent, the father of Herald photographer

New measures

With Sanford Mayor Linda Kuhn sworn into office this week s well as incumbent Commissioners Velma Williams and Art Woodruff, the city appears renewed to move forward in its development. But what measures over the next few years will indicate success for the new commission?

Both Kuhn and Woodruff emphasized Sanford's need for a master plan. That effort alone will serve as the single, most important indicator of success for this commission. If at the end of its term, the city still operates under what Kuhn has called a crisis management culture, then progress will continue haphazardly and the city cannot afford that. Residents expect action from this commission. Enough discussion about a master plan has taken place, now is the time to put one in place. Not to do so will surely be termed a failure.

The master plan should include the city's desires for downtown. We want diversity of business. We need investors who care about the city and about their business appearance. We need fewer absentee landlords, and more places for people to live in comfort and safety. Second story residences in downtown would make sense and develop a real sense of community. With a master plan, developers will know what the city wants and how they can meet standards. It will help them design plans that satisfy the city, while avoiding lengthy approval processes that have caused frustration and conflict in the past.

The same goes for our parks, especially Fort Mellon Park. Our parks are the jewels that make Sanford shine. The master plan must also address the city's requirements for the waterfront. No inland Central Florida city borders such a grand scene as Lake Monroe and the St. Johns River. All of this will make Sanford attractive to residents, businesses, and visitors. Planning will

make or break the progress already begun. Once plans are in place, code enforcement will protect their integrity. Both Kuhn and Woodruff made code enforcement a linchpin of their campaigns. Sanford needs better enforcement of codes already in place, but just as important is a proactive stance on solving problems. We don't want a Gestapo, but ideas such as switching from liens to fines for some violations will create more bite in enforcement. Code enforcement with the teeth to be effective will be a true measure of success for this commission.


A new public safety building would serve as a visible sign of success. Without one, the growing police and fire presence in Sanford will suffer. Anyone who works in the current building will tell you how cramped things have become. A modern facility will provide a home for our newly accredited police department. In order to obtain further accreditation that could open opportunities for the department, a new public safety building is crucial.

The turmoil surrounding the city manager's office since last summer must be resolved quickly in order for Sanford to move forward with any plans. It is important that stability and trust be established in the city's top administrative position.

The key to all of this will be citizen participation. It is practically unheard of that more people vote in a runoff election than the general election. Yet that is what occurred here. The low initial voter turnout questioned the resolve of Sanford residents for their future. But they responded positively. To build on that momentum, residents must have clear channels to voice their opinions to city leaders and have opportunity for taking part in the progress that will affect all of us.

With the election over, it is time for Kuhn and Woodruff to follow through with campaign promises.

We wish them, and the commission, well as they work to make Sanford a better place.


But consider - what if Germany and Japan had won World War II and taken over our allowed to keep their horses and nation? What kind of governgo free. Confederate officers ment would we have today?

Arts Center...it's downtown, in a great location with ample park-2 - Demolish the Citrus Bowl


and utilize the land for a new Magic sports center. 3 - Have Orlando, Orange







The Way We Were: **Directory collection** at Sanford Museum

The Sanford Museum has a large collection of Sanford city directories, the earliest being for the years 1909-1917. Other early ones are from 1887 (Orange County), 1925, 1926 and 1947. We are not sure whether they were published during the intervening years, but do know they weren't printed during the 1930s. The Sanford Museum is always looking for city directories and donations.

One can find lots of information in the city directories. I thought you might be interested in some of these things. Of course the main purpose of a city directory is

the listing of per-

sons living in

Sanford along with

their addresses.

These are listed in

two ways; alpha-



betical and by address. If you wanted to find out who lived at a certain address in 1954, look up that Stinecipher address in the 1954

directory. If you wanted to know where Joe Blow lived in 1925, look up his name in the 1925 directory.

Some directories have information on the city and/or county in the first few pages and there is usually a listing of businesses by category.

The following will give you an idea of what can be found in the 1917 Sanford dty directory:

Seminole County officials included County Judge E.F. Housholder; Sheriff E.E. Brady; Clerk of Circuit Court E.A. Douglas; Superintendent of Public Instruction T.W. Lawton; County Solicitor Shelle Maines; County Surveyor W.A. Ginn; Assessor of Taxes Alex Vaughn; Tax Collector John Jenkins; Supervisor of Registration H.C. DuBose.

Those on the Board of Public Instruction were F.P. Forster, C.A. Dallas and C.F. Harrison.

County Commissioners were L.A. brumley of Sanford; L.P. Hagan of Sanford; C.W. Entzminger of Longwood; O.P. Swope of Oviedo; and E.H. Kilbee of Geneva.

City officials included Mayor J.D. Davison; clerk and collector J.C. Roberts; treasurer and assessor R.C. Maxwell; Chief of Police W.A. Tillis; Fire Chief G.P. Paxon; City Attorney George A. DeCottes; City Physician Dr. O.J. Miller; and Sanitary Inspector A.D. Smith.

City Schools

B.F. Ezele was Supervising Principal with the following school principals: Miss Hazel Stevens, high school; Mr. C.B. Dickinson, grammar achool; Miss Lily Farnsworth, Eastside Primary; Mrs. Stells Arrinton, Westside Primary; J.N. Crooms, high school, Montez Harris grammar school and Marie Wilson, Goldsboro Primary.

In addition to Sanford residents, there are listings of persons living in other towns in the county. In counting these, I found that there were 42 living in Altamonte Springs, 95 in Chuluota, 117 in Geneva, 40 in Lake Mary, 85 in Longwood, 211 in Oviedo, 37 in Paola and 12 in Wagner.

In the business section, there were three blacksmiths listed; all located on Sanford Avenue. These were R.T. Delligall, W.O. Green and D.C. Howard.

Attorneys were George Decottes, Dickinson and Dickinson, George Herring, Shelle Maines, Wilson and Housholder.

There were three boarding houses: Gate City House at 112 Myrtle Avenue, Lakeview House at 319 E. Pirst Street, and Ohio House at 219 East First Street.

Those listed as hotels were Bye-Low at 300 Magnolia Avenue, Mrs. M. E. Manning, 323 Palmetto Avenue; the Oaks, 401 Magnolia; Comfort Cottage 318 Magnolia; Empire Hotel at 402 W. Pirst Street; Hotel Carnes at 211 E. mercial; Pico Hotel at 110 West mercial; Seminole Hotel at 119 Park and Seminole Inn a 104 N.







teacher that will talk with you

helps too." Their teacher is Evonne Cohen, who works with Seminole High School literacy specialist Kevin Smith. Together with two other teachers and two assistants, they work with students who struggle the most

with reading. Cohen said she conferences with the students quite a bit to emphasize skills they need to improve. She wants the students to connect with themselves and each other.

"We really build community and push confidence in read-

ing," Cohen said. Principal Walt Griffin was prepared for the school's D grade from the state last year. The lowest performing reading students did not improve enough and that hurt the final grade.

Seminole dropped to a D, and Lake Brantley High School dropped to a C. Both schools and Lyman High School now have literacy specialists, or as Smith refers to himself, reading

A variety of factors rates these students as Level 1 readers. There are six levels with six being the highest.

Some never learned decoding or working with phonics to recognize syllables, others struggle with comprehension and vocabulary. The district brought in people like Smith to work with the lowest quartile of readers.

Seminole County Public Schools also volunteered to develop a pilot program for the state on boosting reading scores. The district will test three programs, all three of which are part of the Seminole curriculum. Smith said.

Those programs are starting and will increase next year, Smith said. Every high school will have reading specialists starting in August, he added.

A change in the state grading formula this year has Smith wondering how school grades will be impacted.

Instead of just the lowest 25 percent of the student population having to show 50 percent gains in reading, three classes of learning disabled students will

be included.

Specific Learning Disabled (SLD), Emotionally Disabled (ED), and Educationally Mentally Disabled students will have to show improvement as

"That's going to change the whole dynamic," Smith said.

Some may assume that the students with disabilities will bring grades down, but often they generate sizeable improvements in a year, which could help a school's overall grade.

Eventually, Smith said one goal is to have all Level 1 and Level 2 reading students in intensive courses. Only some of the Level 2 students are getting help right now, he said

Coming from Millennium Middle School, Smith once worked with Griffin, who used to be principal there. He has also worked with about 60 percent of the students in the intensive

One difference in the age lev-

els is that in high school the students realize they have a problem and are more willing to accept that, Smith said. "I have students come to me

here and say, 'Put me in a reading class,'" he said, adding that had never happened in middle school.

Some may say that the schools are teaching to pass the FCAT, but Smith said the assessment test is completely aligned with what is taught in the curriculum.

True, you want the students

to pass FCAT, but you are also teaching the skills you should

teach anyway," he said. Each student is different with different obstacles. Some never read outside of school. A book exchange program is underway to alleviate that problem. (See

separate article.) "I tell the students that it's run onto a football field or bas-

like sports. You wouldn't just ketball court and start playing without any practice," he said. Smith also said he a recent

trend toward parents becoming more involved in reading with their children is very encourag-

An idea that has really panned out, Smith said, is having junior and senior leadership students work with ninth and 10th graders. He pairs students and the older ones read 20 percent while the struggling students read 80 percent.

This again is building community. He sees friendships forming and both levels are learning from each other. Thirty pairs of students have read one novel and have begun a second, Smith said.

More students will be

"This has been one of the best programs I have ever started," he said, somewhat surprised at the level of success.

Smith asks adults to be role models of reading, and he is always looking for volunteers.

"If they never see people reading, they won't think it's important," Smith said. "Hopefully students won't just see adults watching TV." If they see people reading newspapers, books and magazines, then they will follow that attitude.

Jerome Chandler has grown an affinity for reading. The ninth grader from Cohen's class said he never had an interest in books before this year.

"I'd see a book and pass by it," he said. "I didn't want to read books."


Now he reads all the time, he said.

The last book he read is "Darkness Before Dawn." That has led to another new interest - writing.



The Foundation's Top Ten Tipe for filling up at the pump

1. Know how much fuel your boat holds and how much fuel you need. This will help you avoid overfilling your tanks.

2. Turn off engines, electronics, and extinguish all open flames such as stoves or ciga-

3. Before you start pumping. put passengers ashore and close all hatches, ports and

doors so fumes do not collect in the bilge or cabin. 4. Maintein consistent contact between the fuel nozzle

and the deck fill - and if refilling a portable fuel tank. remove it from the boat and fill it on the dock. Both measures prevent sparking. Use an absorbent pad or

donut around the deck fill to catch backsplash and attach a temporary collection device to your hull to catch overflow from the tank vent.

6. Hold on to the nozzle and don't rely on the hands-free

clip or automatic shut-off device. They often don't seect in time

7. Fuel slowly, and listen for a change in tone as the tank gets full.

8. Fuel stored underground at the marine and pum into your boat's tanks will expand on a hot summer day, so resist topping off.

9. If a few drops hit the water, do not use determents to disperse a spill. This is more harmful to the environment than if left untreated. Besides, it's against the law.

10. After fueling, turn your blower on for three to five minutes and sniff for fumes. The BoatU.S Foundation for


