





Chinese Communists **Make Offensive Drive**

By HAROLD MILKS NANKING, June 4 (AP)-Chinese communist troops swept toward Mukden today in an offensive against Nationalist positions in Manchuria. Press dispatches placed Red forces beyond Kalyuan, 50 miles north of Mukden, with some elements reaching the coal-mine rify of Fushan, only 20 miles east of the big Japanese-develoid in-

dustrial center. Hollington Tong, government nformation director, described the situation in Manchuria as "un-changed," in contrast with reports of pro-government newspapers that the communists were driving steadily toward Mukden. Military observers here believe Mukden is not likely to fall but faces severe harassing action. These sources said the govern-ment's failure to halt the communists' belated apring offensive in Manchuria was sublecting Chiang Kai Shek and his Kuominlang government with a great loss of "face" throughout China. Hain Blin Pao's correspondent said government 'defenders ' had and government defenders had evacuated Kalyuan and its im-portant tall station at noon yes-terday. From-Peiping, Associated Press correspondent John Rod-erick reported Nationalists and Communists battling for control of the Chinese Changehun rail-road north and south of Szeping-kal.

Chinese dispatches said the Mukden-Changchun railroad was op-erating only to Tiebling, 36 miles southwest of Changchun, capi-tal of Manchuria. Qualified, opinion here is that
