A statement by the president of the American Waterways Operators, Inc., pointed up the necessity of an accelerated effort toward completing the Sanford Docks and Terminals project.

"Development of the transportation industries is just as essential to the economic stability or expansion of the United States as are invention, science, manufacturing and salesmanship." Chester C. Thompson said in a Transportation Week statement. "Goods must not only be delivered, but

they must be delivered at a price," the Washington D. C. spokesman for the barge and towing vessel industry pointed out. The statement continued: With three million miles of highways,

pipelines railroads, inland waterways and airways this country has the largest and most efficient transportation system in the world, and yet there are areas deficient in transportation.

"Proper distribution of the nation's products is the principal domestic problem of our time, and low-cost transportation is essential to its solution.

"Since its birth, this Nation has adhered strictly to the policy of encouraging the economic development of the countrystate by state and region by region. This encouragement usually has been extended through improved transportation.

Where and when one form of transportation fails to fully develop the industry, commerce or agriculture of vast areas that are rich in natural resources and capable of absorbing the overflow of overcrowded cities, it is the duty and obligation of the government to bring those regions and their meople transportation suited to the conditions.

There are areas to which, under present conditions, only low-cost inland waterway transportation can bring an expand-

(Continued from Page 1) orked out, it sould then be presented to the area residents by the committee and to the City Commission by the Manager It a from this point that discussions could materialise. The Manager believes that this method of approach would go a long ways towards avoiding long and bitter arguments that tend only to create hard feelings and misunderstandings. A period of 30 to 60 days would probably be needed for this portion of the undertaking.

The third step would be to inform and educate all the residents of the area as to what the program contains and what it will mean to them and to the city.

The fourth step would be for the City Commission to determine the specific boundaries of any fringe area that would be acceptable for annexation. By this it is meant to designate areas whereby the city could furnish city services to the residents of that area as present city residents are now receiving plus those needed under the above mentioned workable plan of expansion.

It is cautioned that these steps should not be undertaken as mere promises that may or may not be fulfilled but, instead, should be actually planned budgetory expanditures. There is little doubt that the entire program would require three to five years for some of the costly capital improve-ments that will no doubt be requested and needed. 


