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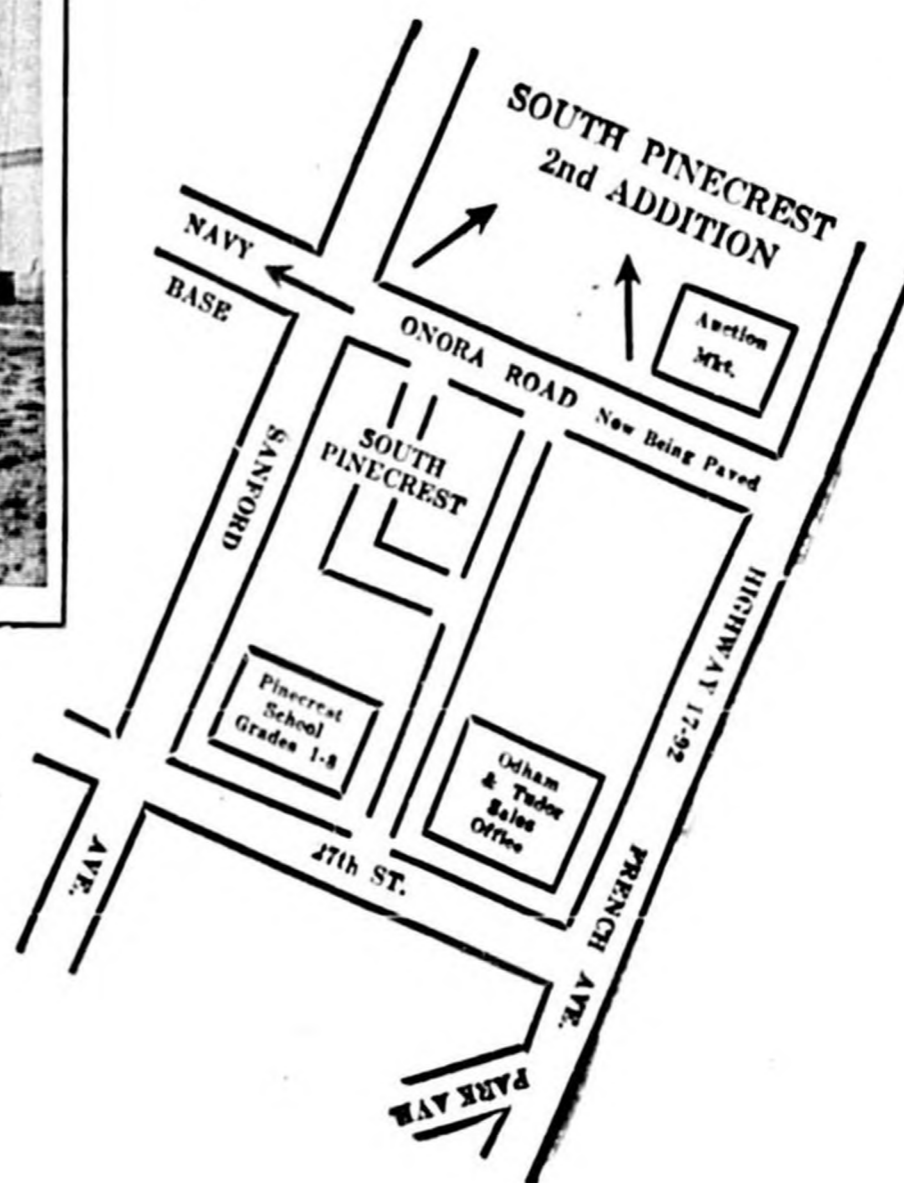

How To Normalize Your Indigestion

Digesting food isn't a single process, but several processes. One of these is "conscious," which you can control. The others are not. The first, conscious process is when you eat. You may gulp in huge bites, and eat fast, or you may chew thoroughly and slowly. If you do the latter, the food, well-mixed with the secretions of the mouth, stomach, and small intestine, become semi-liquid. If well masticated, quickly, and without emotional upset, it is ready for the second process.
The second step is involuntary. The semi-liquid filters through the lining of the small intestine into the bloodstream, on its way to the millions of cells in the body. This is followed by absorption, the third involuntary stage. The cells now pick up and use the nourishment, and this is assimilation. There is no nutritive value until food is assimilated.
Six simple rules assure good digestion:
1. Chew thoroughly.
2. Eat tasty, well prepared food.
3. Eat moderately—don't stuff.
4. Eat a few varieties of food—not a conglomeration.
5. Never work hard after eating.
6. Avoid arguments or tension when eating.

For the occasion the living room was decorated in gala pink and green streamers forming a carousel design, from which floated balloons.

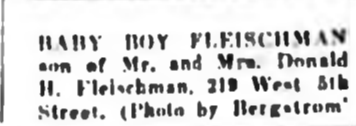

Industry Launches Research Program

NEW YORK — Private industry has launched a research program to harness the awesome power of the hydrogen bomb for the production of electricity, it has been announced.

The four-year, 10 million dollar research effort is a joint undertaking of 11 privately owned Texas utility companies and the General Atomic Division, of the General Dynamics Corp., the announcement said.

The development holds added significance in light of a statement last month by the Atomic Energy Commission that a controlled hydrogen reaction was "no longer in the stage of wishful thinking."

The research will be conducted at General Atomic's, new laboratories in San Diego, Calif. The announcement was made by General Dynamics and the 11-company Texas Atomic Energy Research Foundation.

SAC General Says Florida 'Juicy' Target For Attack

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. — A Strategic Air Command general warns that Florida is "one of the juiciest target areas in case of enemy attack."

Maj. Gen. George W. Mundy, commander of the Second Air Force Strategic Air Command headquarters at Shreveport, La., said that Florida could be considered a prime target because of its three SAC bases and several other important military installations.

The general pointed out that only Texas and California have as many SAC bases.

But he criticized Floridians for making an unfair profit by renting "hovels" to Air Force personnel. He said that some Air Force men are forced to pay as high as \$200 a month for a garage converted into a house.

He warned that poor housing conditions are causing SAC to lose many qualified men and he said unless something is done the situation may become "catastrophic."

Veterans Corner

Here are authoritative answers from the Veterans Administration to questions of current interest to former servicemen and their families:

Q I have just retired from the Armed Forces after 30 years of service. Would it be possible for my GI insurance premiums to be paid by allotment from my retirement pay?

A Yes. However, authorization must be registered with your branch of service.

Q Is it possible to take college extension courses by correspondence under the War Orphans Education program?

A No. Correspondence courses are prohibited by the War Orphans Education law.

Q I am a disabled Korean veteran and I am planning to take vocational training under Public Law 604. What is the maximum length of time I will be allowed to train?

A You will be authorized whatever length of time is needed to rehabilitate you so that you can earn a living in spite of your handicap. Generally, however, the maximum is four years.

Q I understand that a World War II veteran must file his application for a GI loan by July 25, 1958. Just what steps have to be taken by that date?

A By that date, a lender must at least have agreed to make the loan and must have requested

VA's approval. The law allows up to an additional year, after the deadline, to complete the deal.

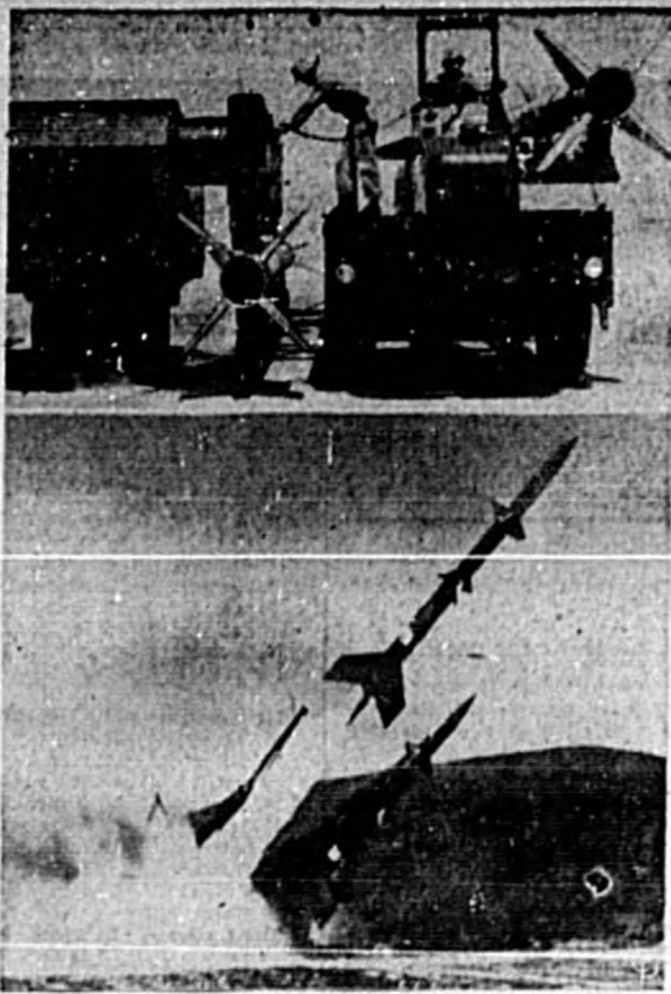

worked out, it could then be presented to the area residents by the committee and to the City Commission by the Manager. It is from this point that discussions could materialize. The Manager believes that this method of approach would go a long way towards avoiding long and bitter arguments that tend only to create hard feelings and misunderstandings. A period of 30 to 60 days would probably be needed for this portion of the undertaking.

The third step would be to inform and educate all the residents of the area as to what the program contains and what it will mean to them and to the city.

The fourth step would be for the City Commission to determine the specific boundaries of any fringe area that would be acceptable for annexation. By this it is meant to designate areas where by the city could furnish city services to the residents of that area as present city residents are now receiving plus those needed under the above mentioned workable plan of expansion.

It is cautioned that these steps should not be undertaken as mere promises that may or may not be fulfilled but, instead, should be actually planned budgetary expenditures. There is little doubt that the entire program would require three to five years for some of the costly capital improvements that will no doubt be requested and needed. It is important to realize that this program will require several thousands of dollars that will not be recovered except very slowly over many years.

The fifth step would then be for the actual annexation mechanism to be undertaken with the required petitions. It is hoped that by this time a majority of the fringe area residents will know that the City of Sanford is sincere in wishing them to become a part of the community and that they will also wish to join with a clear cut blueprint of services and advantages before them.

The City Manager recommends that the City of Sanford does not undertake any annexation in a rush and without adequate plans and understanding by the residents in the fringe area.

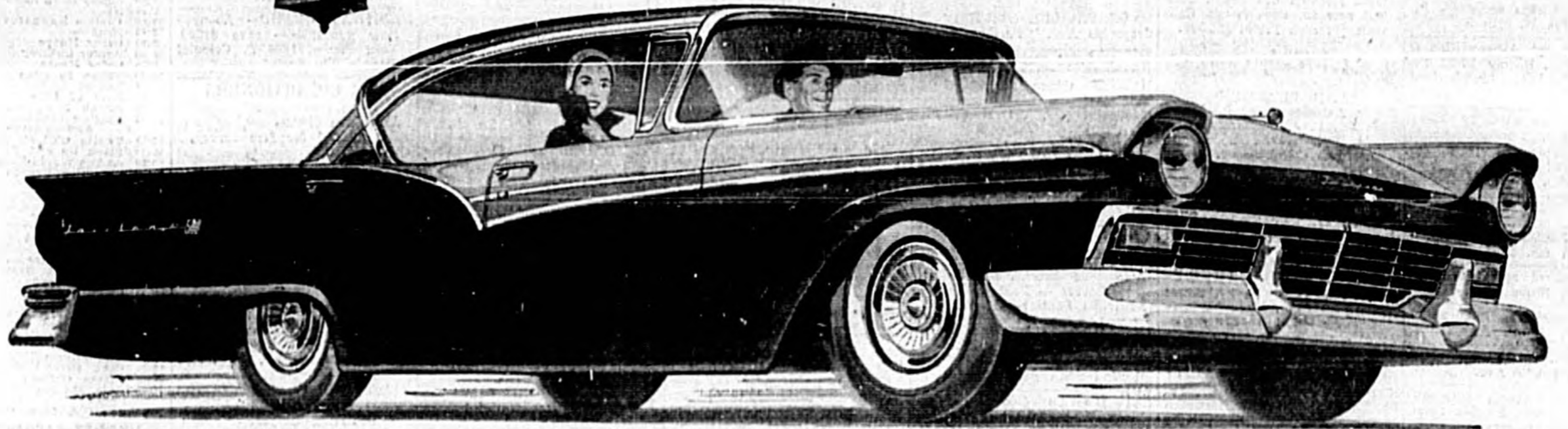

Bulgarian Hints Time For East-West Meet

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev warned the West today against "balancing on the brink" of war in the Middle East crisis. He hinted the time is now ripe for a new personal meeting between leaders of East and West.

The Soviet leader, speaking to a Kremlin mass meeting, declared the Soviet Union has "no special interests" in the Middle East other than seeing that peace and stability of Arab nations are guaranteed.

But he warned that the West must choose between this price and the "way of war."

Bulgaria surveyed foreign affairs in the Kremlin meeting that followed talks between Soviet leaders and a visiting government delegation from Mongolia.

He said that international tension has relaxed somewhat recently, making the time more propitious for new East-West negotiations on international problems. He said he favored personal contacts with foreign leaders to discuss questions of peace.

Regional Telephone Accounting Center To Be Established

Plans to establish a new regional telephone accounting center in Orlando were announced today by John Cooper, Southern Bell District Manager.

Cooper said details of the plans have not been finalized but it is expected that some 75 people will be employed initially. All except six or eight key men will be employed locally, he said.

The decision to move a portion of our accounting work to the Central Florida Area has been under consideration for some time.

He said the tremendous growth of the area and its greater anticipated future growth made it necessary to consider such a move. This will enable us to serve our customers even more efficiently than in the past.

Will Cause Serious Trouble

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Eisenhower warned Congress today not to trifle with the defense of the country by making large budget cuts.

His warning, issued at his weekly news conference followed up his nationwide radio-television appeal to the American people to sacrifice dollars rather than their sons and cities as the "price for peace" in a world threatened by atomic-armed communism.

Eisenhower told reporters that he acknowledged honest differences of opinion between the executive and legislative branches of government. But he said that if Congress trifles with the defense budget, this country will be in serious trouble.

Big Defense Cut
But Congress seemed in no mood to retreat in its economy drive.

A House Appropriations Subcommittee was reported to have tentatively approved a cut of some \$2,500,000,000 in Eisenhower's defense budget for next year. Members insisted the cut would not imperil the defense program.

Other news conference highlights: The President said he believes one of the reasons Russia apparently is considering disarmament more seriously than in the past is that it is beginning to feel the pinch of supporting a heavy armaments budget.

He said unification of the armed services has not taken place in quite the form he expected. He added that this was one of the basic problems involved in making a minimum federal budget.

He asserted that use of force by Israel to send a ship through the Suez Canal would be reprehensible.

Bill To Ratify Harness Track Introduced Today

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The Seminole County House delegation introduced a bill today "by request" to ratify a disputed harness racing track in Seminole County.

The track, approved by county voters last November, is now the subject of a suit by the Sanford Orlando Kennel Club which contends the law prohibits another track within 100 miles of an existing facility.

Sen. Douglas Stenstrom of Sanford introduced a similar bill in the Senate.

He said he opposed the suit track but the people of his county voted for it and "this is a case where my personal convictions must give way to duty."

Breckenridge Will Head State CofC Executive Assn.

Word has been received that Forrest Breckenridge, former Seminole County Chamber of Commerce manager, has been elected president of the Florida C of C Executive Assn.

Breckenridge was named to head the group at the annual meeting in Tampa. He will serve in the post for one year.

Breckenridge is now executive director of the DeLand Chamber of Commerce.

Hospitals Cared For Over 21 Million Patients Last Year

There are about 7,000 hospitals in the United States, which last year cared for more than 21,000,000 patients—the greatest number in any year of hospital history. These hospitals were staffed by more than 1,300,000 fulltime workers who received an annual payroll of more than \$3.5 billion. During the past decade, hospital beds increased 12 per cent, admissions increased 34 per cent, and total personnel increased 37 per cent.

Among the hospital personnel reported by United States hospitals last year were 260,000 nurses, 9,700 dietitians, 8,800 medical record librarians, 30,600 medical technologists, 13,400 x-ray technicians, 5,350 pharmacists, 5,600 medical social workers, 4,750 occupational therapists and 5,800 physical therapists.

Expenses per patient day in non-profit short-term general hospitals rose 141 per cent in the last ten years. These hospitals spent an average of \$24.13 per day to care for each patient last year.

On any given day, there are on the average more than 1,360,000 persons and more than 49,000 newborn infants in the nation's hospitals. More than 3,413,000 children were born in United States hospitals last year. One out of every eight persons will go to a hospital this year. The average patient stay in the short-term general hospital is 7.9 days.

The nation's hospitals have a total of more than 1,600,000 beds, and their total assets are almost \$12 billion.

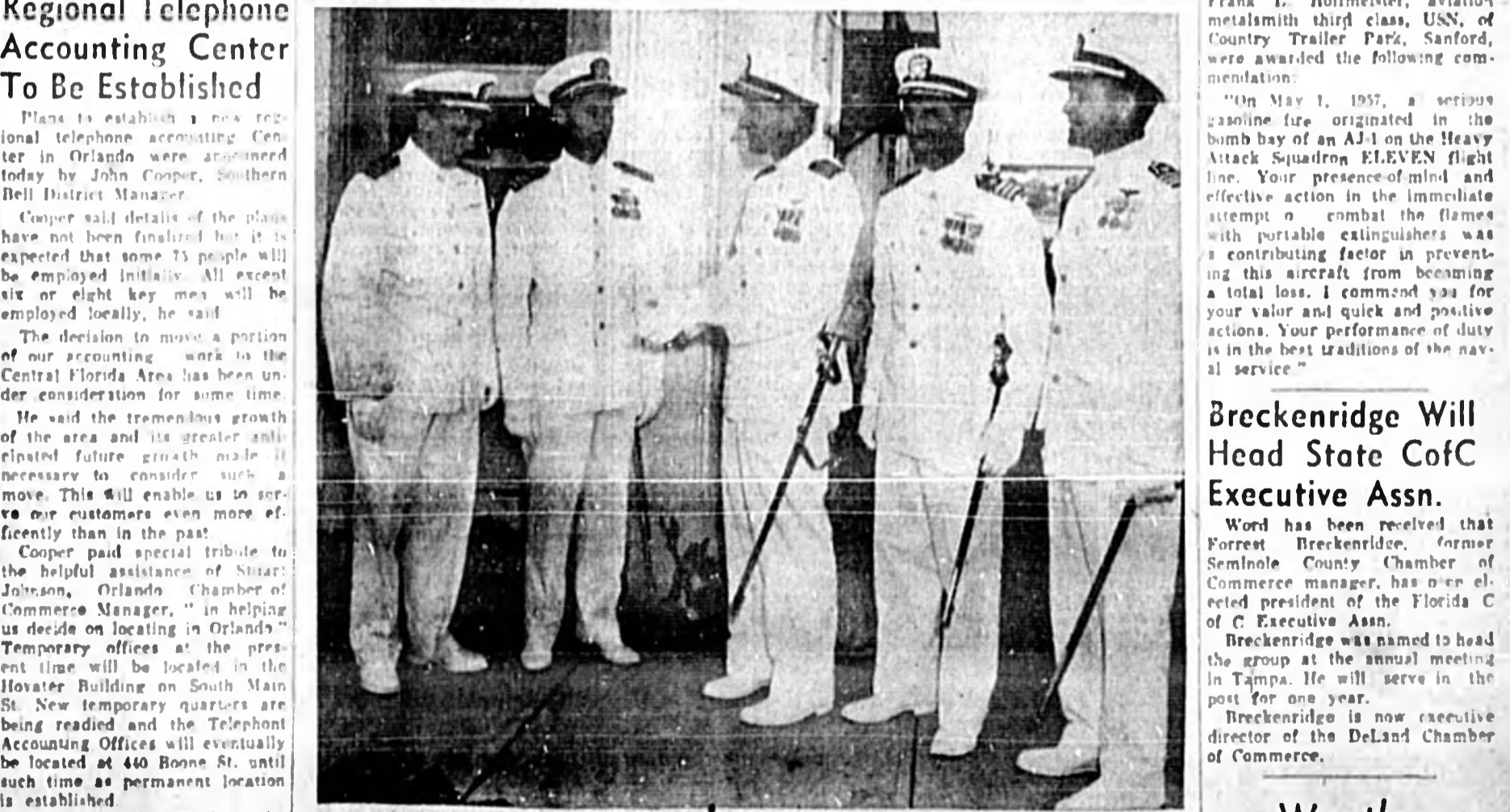
