...of mine but they've all saved in the Sheriff's office in one capacity or another. Road blocks, patrols, sheriffs' posse are all standard equipment. The Sheriff's office belongs to the people and for nine-thousand dollars a year you should get a good job."

Ollie G. Owens, a former chief deputy sheriff, pointed out to the press "A man should be honest with a determination to stay honest. If elected, I will enforce all the laws of the county and State with no partiality to anyone. I will pay duplicate salaries sufficient to live on and I will cooperate with all law enforcement officers for the betterment of the county. I know I can't whitewash this county but I will clean it up and keep it clean to the best of my ability," he said.

"The flare of tempers came when a question from the floor, directed to the candidates, asked whether personal accounts will be made public if you are elected sheriff," O. G. Owens said. "Certainly, I'll be glad to do that. I will keep records of my personal accounts and they will be open to public inspection. I'll promise the people I'll do that."

Porter Lansing said "I'll do it and make it public with a notice published for I have to make an annual statement anyway."

Charlie Beck stated that he would make available records of his personal financial accounts.

Denver Cordell, however, said "The records of that office are public and you can look at them any time you want to but those of my business are personal accounts."

To the question regarding the detention of juveniles in the county jail, candidates revealed that each of them prefer detention homes but that a juvenile is detained and jailed only on order from the Juvenile Judge. Ollie Owens stated "A sheriff has no right to put a juvenile in jail without instructions from the Juvenile Judge."

A question about the "fee system," whether for or against, brought varying answers from the four candidates.

Ollie Owens said "I've always been against the fee system. I would recommend that the fee system be done away with. I've been sued at and sometimes lost my religion about the matter. But, Owens said "people think that the sheriff gets all of that money. There are others on the fee system too, with the judge, the clerk of court, the prosecutor all getting a part of the fee."

Porter Lansing revealed "I'm against the fee system. Every at-

Collins should advise bus company operators "in no uncertain terms" that state law requires that buses be segregated and that bus companies "must operate in compliance with our state laws" despite the recent U. S. Supreme Court ruling banning segregation on intrastate buses.

The Tampa businessman also accused Collins of "go-slow, pussy-foot, do-nothing leadership" in not protesting plans for Negroes to use white hotel in Miami Beach for a church convention starting May 2.

"This is a deliberate step toward integration of the races in our state," he said.

Lowry's 8-year-old daughter Lynn attended a fish fry with her father and at his instructions stood up on the platform.

"That's my little girl," Lowry said. "Now what kind of a man would I be if I didn't stand up and fight for a little girl like that?"

Collins and Bryant spoke from the same platform at Deerfield Beach.

Bryant goes on a handshaking tour of five communities south of Miami and makes a night television talk there. He also will make a flying campaign trip to Key West.

Citrus Mutual Will Start Membership Campaign May 1

An all-out campaign to bring another 500 or more growers into Florida Citrus Mutual, which would give the super-cooperative a total membership of 8,000, will start May 1 and continue through June, it was announced today by Les. T. Bryan, Altamonte Springs veteran mutual grower member and chairman of the Seminole Grower Council unit.

Joining in the announcement were Frank Russell, co-chairman of the Council unit, Fern Park, and J. R. Stewart, Sanford, secretary.

"Without Mutual, Florida citrus growers would be helpless to combat the price-depressing propaganda which is constantly being circulated," Bryan emphasized.

"With Mutual, the growers know what is actually happening—not what some persons would like to have the growers think is happening."

He pointed to the millions of extra dollars which Mutual has added to orange growers' returns this season by forecasting in May last year that there would not be a bit of a frost of frozen concentrate when the new season started on December 1.

De Baryites Boo Absent Official S. E. Stone, Deland

A query as to why a Sanford bank should be the repository of funds deposited by Volusia county commissioner S. E. Stone was one of the highlights of the Democratic rally in De Bary Friday night.

Chairman Ed Healey showed a photostatic copy of one check as proof that this is happening to funds entrusted to the De Bary bank. A copy of the check will be sent to S. E. Stone, Healey promised. Since the De Bary people have contributed \$24,000 from their own pockets for betterment of roads in their town, Healey said, they are vitally interested in the outgo of their money.

A letter of March 30 was read in which Stone promised to visit Friday night's rally; then one of April 25 in which he stated his duties came first and he could not attend. This was met by boos from the audience.

Healey also showed the campaign promises of Stone to assist with the smaller district and his first obligation to see that better roads would be built "It has been three years and three months since then," Healey stated, "and nothing done until now in this campaign season, Stone urged the claying of the school bus route."

In Seminole County Stone spoke glowingly of the proposed causeway over Lake Monroe, enthusiastically giving his approval in Volusia County the next day, Healey said, Stone insisted that his aim was all for a four lane highway through De Bary.

Sheriff Tucker arrived as the audience was evidencing their opinion of Stone. Snuffing dryly, he addressed them as "fellow Philistines." He spoke of his abolition of the fee system which, he said, smacked of the Robin Hood days, Paul Caldwell and Roy McWilliams, candidates for commissioners of the Third District received ovations as they described the clique which is handling out cards for each other in the hope of continuing on the gravy train. Emergency Landing Renders Slight Damage To AJ-2

Friday at 8:10 p. m. Lt. Lewis M. Millsaps of VAH-7 effected a successful night landing at the Naval Air Station despite the fact that he was unable to lower the nose wheel of his AJ-2 "SAVAGE".

Using excellent pilot technique, Lt. Millsaps eased his 17 ton aircraft into the emergency arresting gear on the runway and made what was later termed by his crew as "a landing softer than most carrier landings."

The drama had seen its beginning nearly five hours before when Lt. Millsaps of Ashboro, N. C., his 3rd, Crewman A13 B. C. Blair, of Cronon, Pa. and two 3rd crew trainees, A13 F. Chasard of Lanford, Pa. and A13 M. S. Placey of Pensacola, took off on what was to be a brief training flight. Upon their return to the field for landing, it was discovered that the nose wheel could not be lowered by normal means.

While the crew exercised the prescribed emergency procedures a group of squadron officers headed by their commanding officer, Cdr. L. B. Libbey, gathered in the N.A.A.S. Control tower to offer advice to pilot Millsaps.

In the mean time 3rd crewman Blair had removed a portion of the cabin flight deck and had gained access to the malfunctioning nose wheel. For nearly three hours, with the upper part of his body hanging in space, he struggled to release the jammed wheel.

At 9:30 p. m. it was deemed as an even greater threat decided to put the big plane into the arresting gear. Thanks to Lt. Millsaps' skillful execution of the landing, the plane suffered only slight damage and the crew escaped without injury.

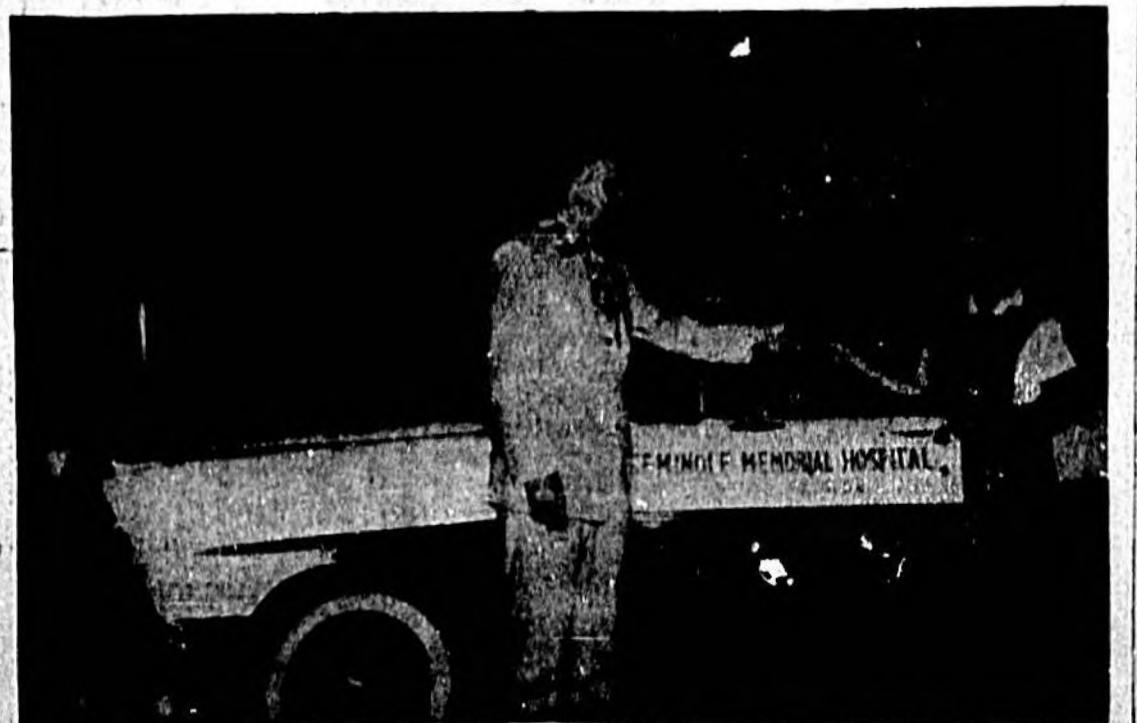

J. H. Hicks, 65, died at his home at 6:27 a. m. Friday morning after a lingering illness.

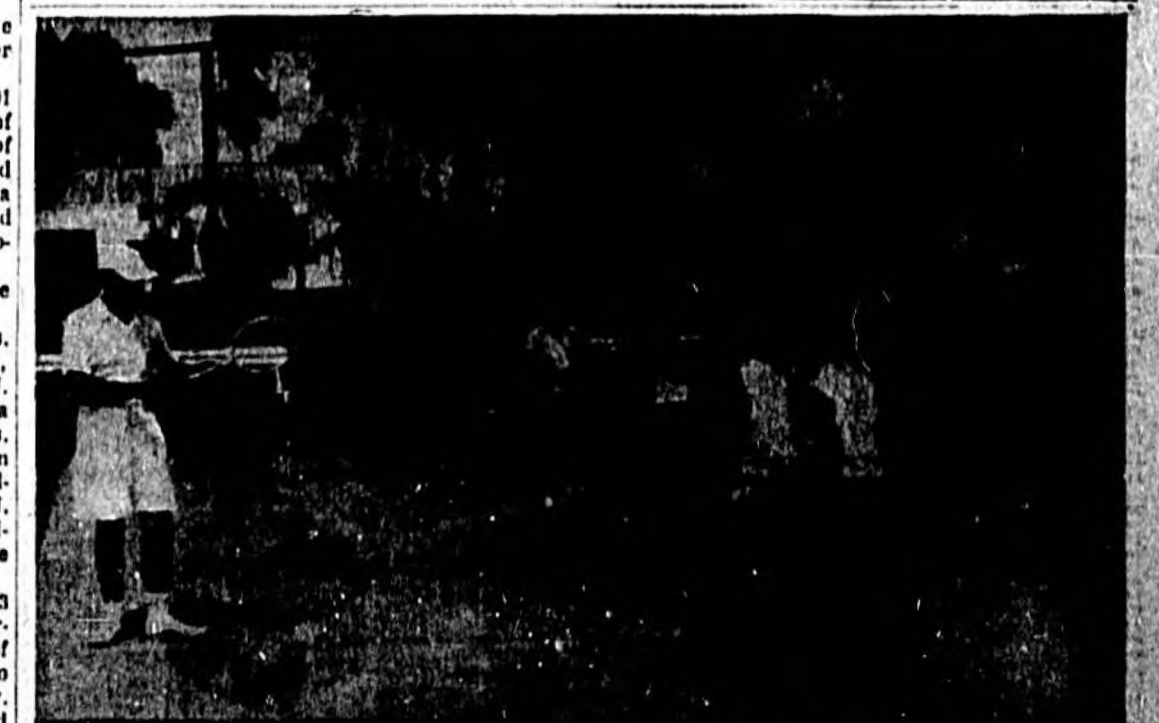

He had been employed by the ACL for the past 20 years.

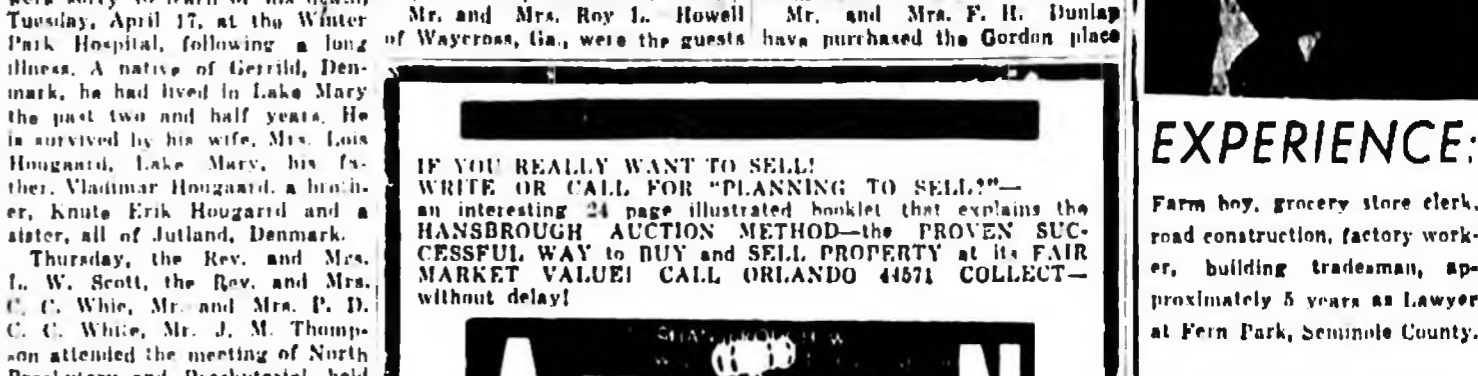
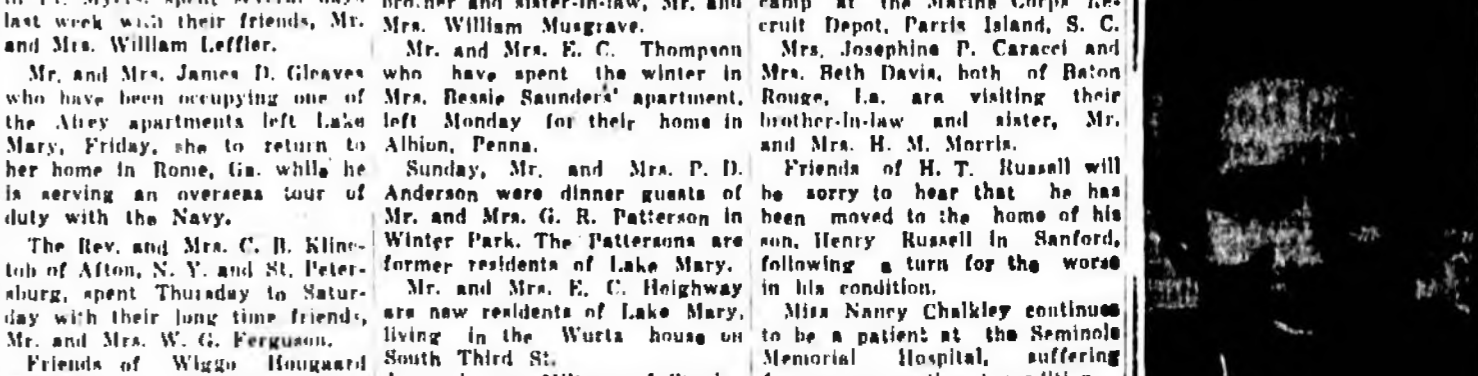
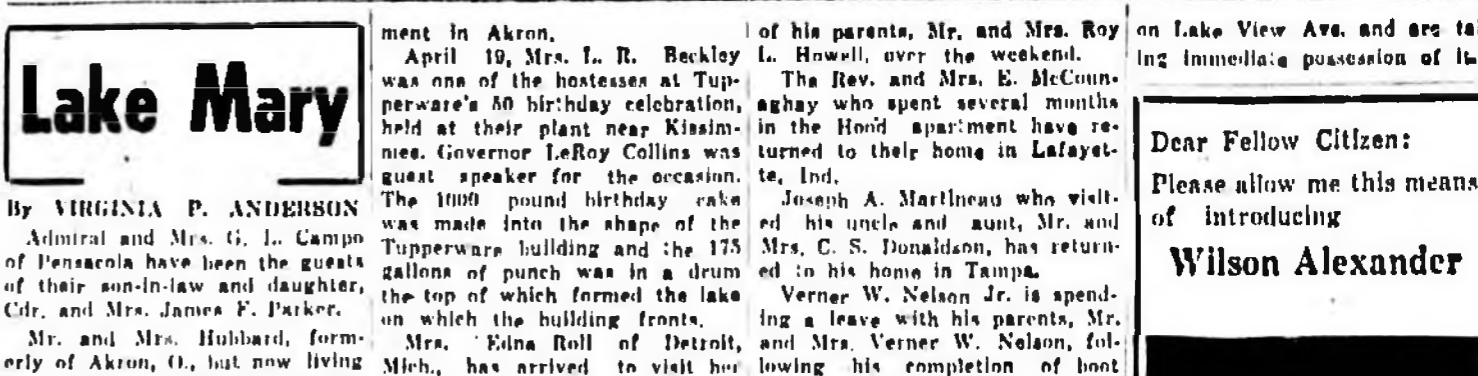

GOOD LUNCH
Adapted from Italian cooking, this quick and easy way with shrimp makes a fine dish.

Ingredients: 1 pound shrimp, 1 cup butter, 1 clove garlic, salt, mixed parsley (if desired).

Melt butter and turn into 9 inch pie plate or pan; or melt butter right in plate in oven or in pan on top of range. Mince and crush garlic or put through press and stir into melted butter. Turn shrimp in butter so they are coated; spread in one layer. Turn oven regulator to broil; if you have no oven regulator, turn broiler on full. Preheat broiler 10 minutes or as manufacturer directs. Place plate or pan about 3 inches from heat; broil 3 minutes; turn shrimp and broil another 3 minutes or until opaque and cooked through; shrimp should be touched with brown. Sprinkle with salt and with parsley if used. Serve shrimp with butter and juices in pan, along with French bread for dunking. Makes 2 to 3 servings.

Little gave brief resumes of their platform.

Schmah said "I entered this race at the request of my friends. If you want leadership I think I can give it to you with the courage of a bear hunter."

Little said "If elected, I will work with your county commissioner and see if we can't do something about State Road 46."

Lawrence Swafford, a candidate for the Board of County Commissioners, District 3, said "I believe I know the problems of the people, especially in the small communities."

I favor a good, sound road program to be turned over to the engineers to take care of. If elected, I will work closely with the school board to improve our school program.

Otis Pourakre commented "It has been a pleasure to serve you for six years. I have worked for good roads and more equalization of the tax structure for the benefit of the people. We've had just so much money and it could only go so far."

In the campaign for the office of Clerk of Circuit Court, the four candidates spoke at length on their platforms and outlined the complete time given them.

O. P. Herndon struck sharply at his opposition. However, he said "I am happy to appear on the ballot this year to find out if the people are satisfied. There are no issues so far and my opponents' platforms are the flimsiest."

"One gentleman has a platform so trivial that it would crash at the least provocation," said Her-

ndon. "Even his bookkeeping is a little out of gear," he said.

A. O. Roberts told the rally audience that "I have been interested in the growth of Seminole County and due to the rapid growth I feel that young, aggressive businessmen are needed in the county offices."

Pitt Varnes commented "I entered this race as an independent candidate on my own. I felt that there was a need for a man with experience and background to handle the duties of the office of Clerk of Court. The clerk's office is for the service of the people and not for the convenience of the clerk and employees. Let's not get into a rut and believe that the service cannot be improved."

Robert A. Cobb explained, "I have nothing personal against Mr. Herndon—it just happens that myself and two other candidates would like to have the job. I promise to handle the affairs of the clerk's office and not handle the business of other officials."

All five candidates for the office of Seminole County Assessor of Taxes spoke in their behalf. Jack Stemper asked the audience to investigate the reappraisals of adjoining counties. "Reappraisal means but one thing," he said, "increase in taxes. My plan is the permit system and through the permit system new people come into the tax rolls." Stemper said "I am for fair, square and equal taxes for all."

Miss Mary Earle slammed back at other candidates in the race for the first time. She said "During the campaign there has been several misstatements—one in Ovidio—one in Sanford—and one in Lake Monroe."

According to the statement "a group of farmers appeared before the Board of Seminole County Commissioners, sitting as an assessment Board and requested lower taxes." Miss Earle fairly shouted "The Tax Assessor made that reduction and no one else." And she added, according to the minutes of the board the farmer appeared to request the reduction and no action was taken.

Miss Earle further came back at her opponents when she said "People are being misled by the statement 'I will give you a permanent homestead exemption system.' The law sets out that each person must present himself at the assessor's office and apply on the prescribed forms."

Raleigh King explained his candidacy by saying "There are five of us who aspire to be the Tax Assessor of Seminole County. I admired each of them but only one of us can win. I feel that I am the only one qualified to take over the duties of the office."

John Meisch explained "Two weeks ago an issue was injected into this campaign—an issue I have been working on for 3 1/2 years. There are five people running for the most important job in the county. I haven't ducked the issue and I have spoken of my platform each and every time that I have appeared before voters of Seminole County."

Meisch quoted from statements carried in recent issues of The Sanford Herald when candidates for the office of Tax Assessor had addressed either luncheon meetings or rally gatherings.

Rudy Sloan continued to pound away on his homestead exemption system by a card method. He said, "If elected, I promise you—and I do promise you, a new homestead exemption system by a card method."

Sheriff candidates appeared next at the Geneva Rally to speak on their platforms. O. G. Owens, the first speaker, said "I take credit for the efficient way the sheriff's office was handled." And then he concluded, "I covet your prayers—I ask you to pray over this matter and the selection of the proper candidates for public office."

Charlie Beck gave his second longest speech of the ten rallies. He said, "I'm a candidate for the office of Seminole County Sheriff for I believe the people want an honest, hardworking sheriff."

J. Denver Cordell commented, "I have had 100 percent cooperation from all of the law enforcement agencies of the county and I believe I will continue to have their cooperation. I believe the people in the outlying districts need protection as well as the larger communities."

J. L. Hobby explained his absence from a previous appearance and defended his performance in office as sheriff. "I did my best," he said, "and I am not ashamed of it at all."

He said, "It's been said that to elect a person to public office is to make a crook out of him. There's no use to subject these four men to Hades. Just re-elect me as sheriff and let me continue to serve you."

Porter Lansing said "If you elect me your sheriff we're going to enforce all of the laws. We're going to help enforce the game and fish laws as well as the forestry laws. To my knowledge there's never been an arrest in Seminole County for violating these laws."

W. Hugh Duncan, candidate for Justice of Peace, said "I ask you to support me in this small, humble, judicial office. I have tried to make the office available to all of the people and officials and have been fair and square in my dealings."

Lewis Tate commented "I was criticized at Paola for poking fun at my opponent. Hugh Duncan is a friend of mine. I won't say anything that would cast a reflection on Mr. Duncan. I apologize if any one feels that it was a reflection. I don't believe there are any reports in the Justice of the Peace office that I can't handle."

"I'll move the Justice of the Peace office out of a filling station into the courthouse."

Senator Douglas Stenstrom stated, in his appeal for support for his candidacy for the State Senate, "I want you to consider carefully, not where I or my opponent is from, but which of the two candidates would be capable of standing on the Senate floor to represent you."

Bob Holley explained that candidate Paul Miller could not attend the rally and that he was making an appearance to represent him. "He hopes to see you personally when he returns to Sanford a week from tonight," Holley said.

In the race for House of Representatives Don Bales lead off for the four candidates.

He said "My contention is that we should send a businessman to Tallahassee. I will work for better schools, industrial expansion of the State, increased aid to our senior citizens, and for better roads."

Gordon Frederick explained "You should consider the ability of the candidate rather than the business they're from. The attorneys who represent you in Tallahassee do not charge you for their services." Frederick emphasized that "attorneys are businessmen too!" I have made no promises to anyone—and then pointedly said "It's up to you folks to find out which candidates have strings attached to them."

Thomas Stringer said "I've always tried to be of service to the

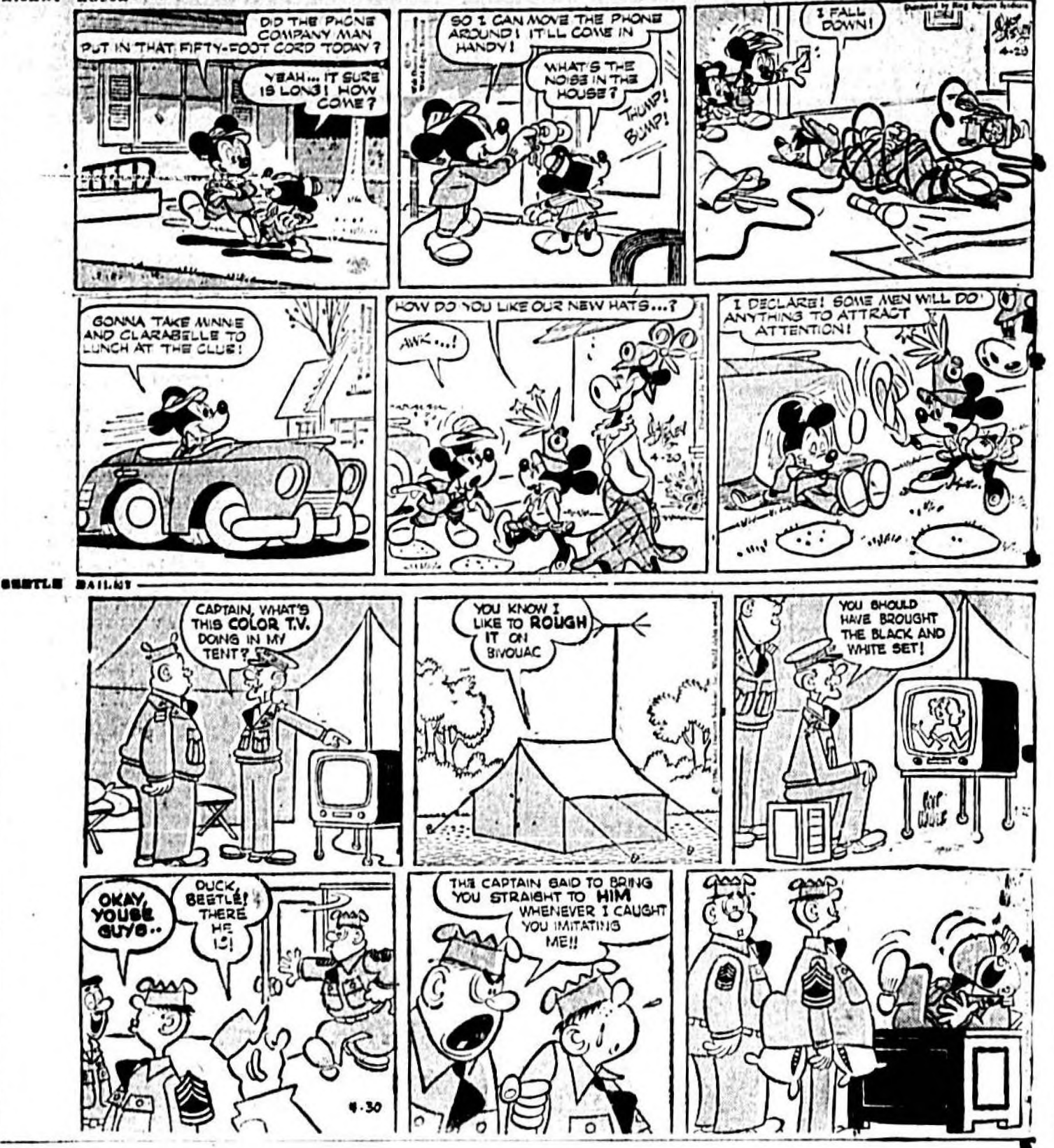

Funeral Services Are Set Tomorrow For Sen. Barkley

LEXINGTON, Va. (AP)—Sen. Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky, former vice president of the United States, collapsed and died yesterday on the speaker's platform at a university political gathering.

Barkley, 78, slumped to the floor after a keynote address to Washington and Lee University students assembled in a mock Democratic National Convention.

Dr. Robert Munger, who arrived seven minutes later as ambulance attendants were attempting to administer oxygen, said he died of a heart attack.

Today the "Veep" of the Truman administration made his final journey to Washington. Four students from Washington and Lee and four from nearby Virginia Military Institute accompanied the body.

In accord with Barkley's wishes, a funeral service will be held tomorrow morning in Foundry Methodist Church, Washington, conducted by the Rev. Dr. Frederick Brown Harris, chaplain of the Senate. Burial will be Friday in Barkley's home town, Paducah, Ky.

Peaslee Streets, the Lake Park constable who is running for governor, yesterday wired Farris Bryant a pledge of support in the event Bryant and Governor Collins wind up in a runoff.

"If you are in the runoff against Collins I will travel the State to help you, but not barefoot like the windbag from Sanford promised Collins because my feet are tender," Streets said.

Streets apparently referred to Uralley Odham of Sanford who had offered to stomp the State barefooted for Collins.

Streets acknowledged that he had little chance to gain a berth in the runoff. He is the only one of the six candidates to take a stand in favor of racial integration.

In other political activities around the state:

Sumter L. Lowry claimed in a televised talk at Pensacola that he had climbed into the lead and that Fuller Warren's organization was "falling apart all over the state."

Last week it was Warren who was talking about Lowry. The former governor appealed to his audience at Panama City not to "waste your vote on Sumter Lowry" and contended he was the only candidate who could beat Gov. Collins in a runoff.

Warren, who is spending practically the entire week in Dale County, hurled another challenge at Collins to debate campaign issues. He said that since they would follow each other on a Miami television station Saturday night that they should debate in the Hayfork Park bandshell there afterwards.

There was no immediate response from Collins but earlier in Orlando Collins explained why he hadn't accepted debate challenges of his various opponents.

"The other candidates have demonstrated such a degree of recklessness and disregard for the truth that any debate would only develop into a series of unfounded and distorted claims."

In a speech to the Junior Chamber of Commerce at Orlando, Collins said his administration had raised the standard of state government and advanced the welfare of all its people.

Collins said that Lowry was a man "who admittedly knows nothing of the vast problems and issues with which he would be confronted in this important office, a man who pitches his entire campaign on his ability by lies and misrepresentations to incite hate and anarchy and disorder and violence."

Lowry, in a talk yesterday at the courthouse at Clearwater, repeated charges that Collins, Warren and Bryant were "all in favor of gradual race integration."

He declared that "there is plenty of law already on the books" to stop integration.

Warren, who went handshaking in Miami Beach yesterday, shifted to Miami today.

Lowry campaigned in Central Florida and will make a night TV talk at Orlando.

Collins was busy with the Cabinet and other state business. He makes a night TV talk in Tallahassee.

Mrs. Farris Bryant has appeared on television, visited several towns and spoken to numbers of women on behalf of her husband.

Mrs. Fuller Warren has attended teas and coffees, appeared in several cities and campaigned among women's groups.

Mrs. Sumter Lowry, busy with the care of an 8-year-old daughter, is sitting the campaign out, however.

The activity of the wives is perhaps the most vigorous effort ever seen in Florida to woo the women's vote.

If you are unpacking your household possessions in your new De Bary home, it's a safe bet that your first pang of homesickness will be dispelled by a knock at your door and a cheery greeting "Hello, folks, this is your neighbor down the road, just stopping in to say we're glad to have you here. My name is Wallace Gabler. What's yours?"

This good neighbor's salutation stems from the time when Wallace was a free lance operator, seeing America first and liking it; working where his fancy listed and enjoying "folk" everywhere. But as time went on and he acquired a pretty wife and a hostful of children, he was moored to a stationary residence.

Now that he and his wife, Harriet, are retired he finds time again for his twin hobbies, repairing of antique clocks and calling on folks. We might say three hobbies except for the fact that his third interest is deeper than that; it's a burning desire to make a place in the sun for the picturesque church of Enterprise which, in weathering many storms of ages past, finally began to fall into decrepitude until, when the Gablers came to De Bary, there were less than a dozen communicants. The State Road Board also tentatively approved \$121,000 in its primary road maintenance program for the paving of 2 1/2 miles of Park Ave. in Sanford at a cost of \$415,000 and 0.8 miles of State Road 46 from the Lake Jessup bridge to the Volusia County line at a cost of \$70,000; and 0.3 of a mile of State Road 46 on West First St. from Park Ave. to French Ave.

A total of \$250,000 was approved in the secondary road projects for the repaving of eight miles of the Longwood to Markham road and \$66,000 for the repaving of two miles of Lake Mary Boulevard.

A small paving project around the State Farmers Market was approved at a cost of \$3,000.

Lending optimism to the possible project across Lake Monroe from French Ave. to Volusia County was the approval of the four-laning of 17-02 in the Volusia County projects from Orange City to the Seminole County line at a cost of \$500,000.

Also included in the Volusia county budget was \$600,000 for the repaving of State Road 415 from two miles north of the Osteen Bridge to State Road 40 (Sanford to New Smyrna Beach Road).

4-Laning To Orange City Set

William H. Dial, fifth district Road Board member said that the final approval of the budget will be made on May 31 in Tallahassee.

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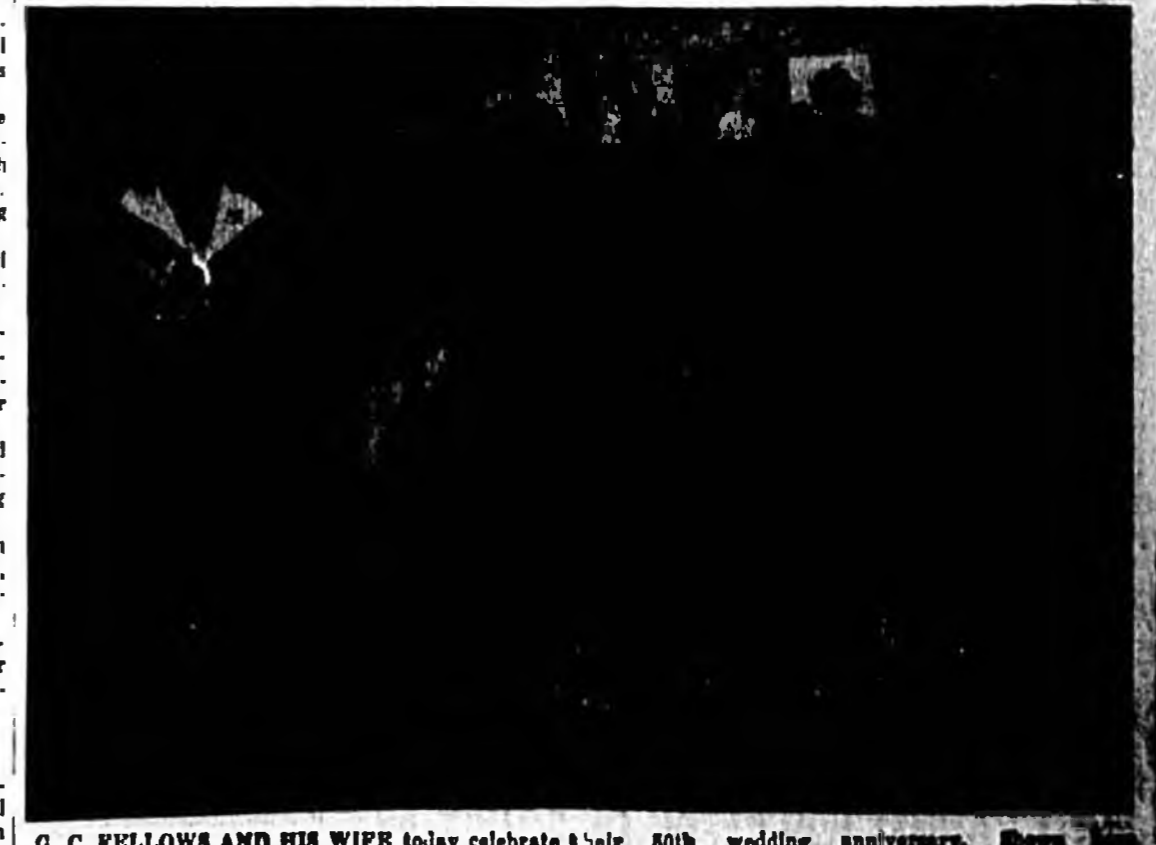
