# SJC Due \$880,851

Sanford Junior College will be on their way toward reality with expected approval of a federal grant under title one of the higher education act of 1965 totaling \$880,851 in late December or early January, R. T. Milwee, college director of administrative affairs said today.

The Junior college began its temporary portable buildings. Facilities to be constructed include a learning resource center, two science wings, faculty offices, a technical-vocational building and a utilities building.

The Junior college began its second year in September. More than half of the enrollment is from out of Seminole County while nine are from out of state.

# 'Sick' SIC Gags Press?

Another hard look at the problems and possibilities of downtown Sanford will be taken tomorrow when the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce holds a luncheon at the House of Beef. At that time a group of 40 leading citizens will be asked to form a sponsoring organization to finance the erection of a hi-rise apartment for senior citizens.

Fighting hard to bring about a truly victory dinner on Oct. 31 when the campaign of the United Fund of Seminole County for a \$50,000 war chest ends, the UF had some bright spots to report today. Tomorrow in Seminole Plaza the final report luncheon is expected to push close to the 100 per cent mark.

### Pancakes With Chicken, Ripe Olive Stuffing

By CECILY BROWNE, AP Food Editor

Once upon a time baked stuffed pancakes couldn't be found on the American dining scene.

But nowadays clever cooks have taken a leaf from French cuisine and can turn them out with a twist of the wrist.

When it comes to filling these thin and tender pancakes (called crepes in France), we like to add our own touch. For example, in the following recipe, the filling is made of chicken and ripe olives in a delicious creamy sauce, enlivened with domestic sauternes and cheese.

These pancakes make a fine main course for lunch or an elegant first course for a company dinner.

A couple of hints about making the pancakes:

If you have an eight-inch frying pan, you'll find it an enormous help in frying the pancakes with the filling. Before trying—no matter what kind of a skillet you use—it's a good idea to melt a little butter and have it on hand for greasing the skillet. You can then dip a pastry brush—bestproof, please—in the melted butter and brush it over the bottom of the skillet before you pour in the batter.

Because all the batter has to be poured in at one time, use a small ladle. Your silver drawer may boast one that holds exactly three tablespoons—the amount needed for each of these crepes.

**FRENCH PANCAKES WITH CHICKEN AND RIPE OLIVE STUFFING**

5 tablespoons butter  
4 tablespoons sifted regular flour  
1 container (8 ounces) heavy cream  
1 cup chicken broth  
1/2 cup medium-sweet domestic sauternes  
1/4 pound Swiss cheese, grated medium-fine (1 cup)  
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
2 tablespoons minced parsley  
Salt and white pepper to taste  
2 cups diced cooked chicken  
1 cup canned pitted ripe olives, sliced  
8 French Pancakes (see recipe)  
Paprika  
Avocado slices and whole ripe olives, if desired

In a 1-quart saucepan, over low heat, melt the butter and stir in the flour. Add cream, chicken broth, and sauternes. Cook, stirring constantly until mixture thickens and boils. Off heat, stir in 1/2 cup of the cheese. Worcestershire sauce, parsley, salt and pepper. Mix 1 cup of the sauce with the chicken and olives. Place batter (about 1-3rd cup for each) in center of pancakes. Roll pancakes, and place in a buttered cooking glass baking dish (about 13 by 8 by 2 inches) or similar utensil. Top with remaining sauce and cheese. Sprinkle with paprika. Bake in a 375-degree oven until hot and bubbly—about 8 minutes. Place under broiler a minute or two to brown top. Garnish, if you like, with avocado slices and whole ripe olives. Enough for dinner for four or appetizers for eight.

**FRENCH PANCAKES**

2 large eggs  
2/3 cup milk  
1/2 cup sifted regular flour  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 tablespoon butter, melted

In a 1-quart mixing bowl, beat eggs until yolks and whites are combined. Add milk; beat to combine. Add flour and salt; beat (if using electric beater, set at medium speed) until smooth—there should be no lumps. Stir in the butter.

Lightly butter an 8-inch skillet and heat thoroughly—butter should not brown; hold skillet off heat and pour in (at one time) 3 tablespoons of the batter; swirl to mixture covers bottom of skillet. Quickly return to medium heat and lightly brown bottom side; turn over and lightly brown reverse side. Turn out on wax paper. Lightly grease skillet and heat before making each pancake. Do not stack pancakes. Makes 8. Use as directed in recipe for Baked French Pancakes with Chicken and Ripe Olive Stuffing.

For stuffed tomatoes, cut each tomato into sixths from the top to the bottom—without actually cutting through the bottom. The tomato will have a star shape and will hold a salad filling. For the filling you might like to use chicken, turkey, tuna or salmon along with celery and mayonnaise. Serve the stuffed tomatoes on salad greens.

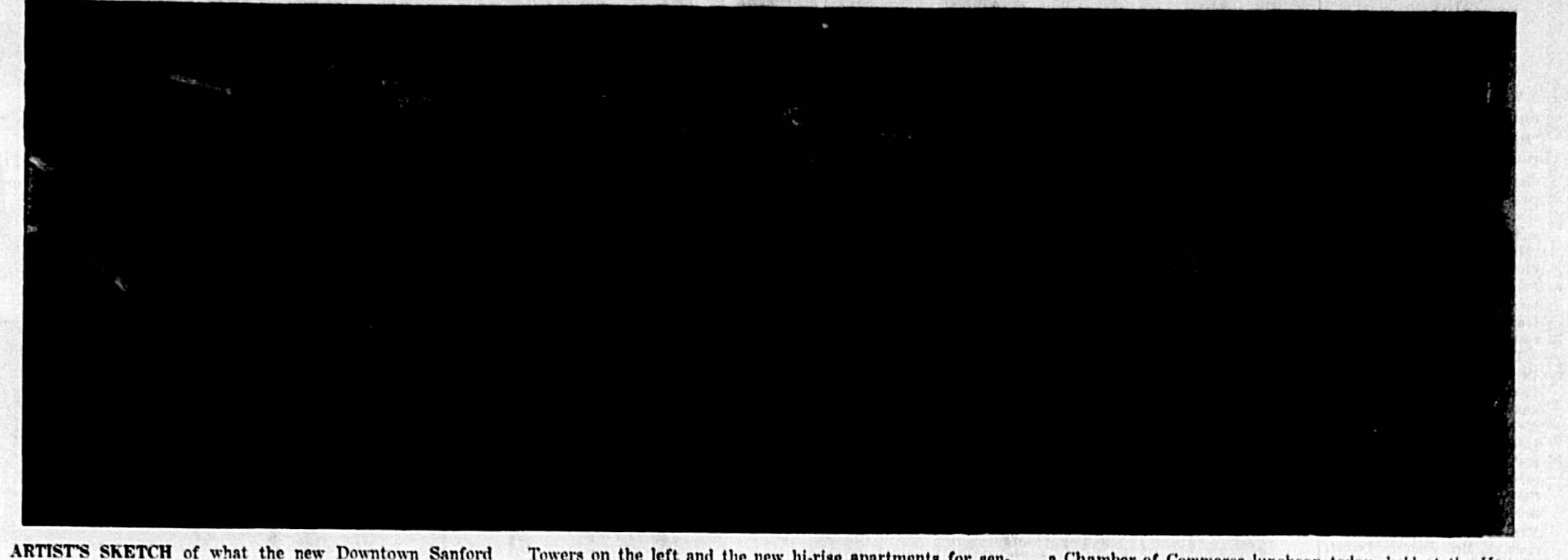
