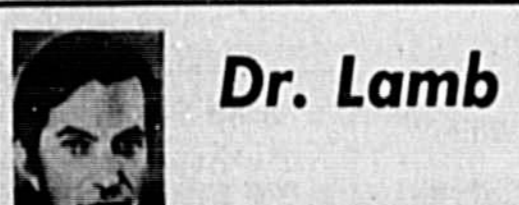

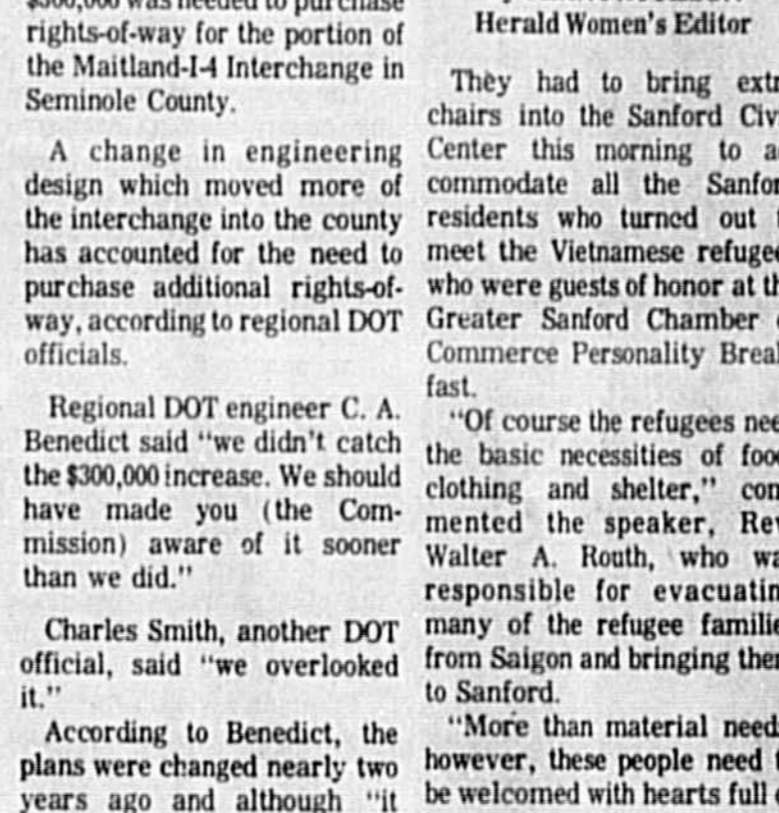

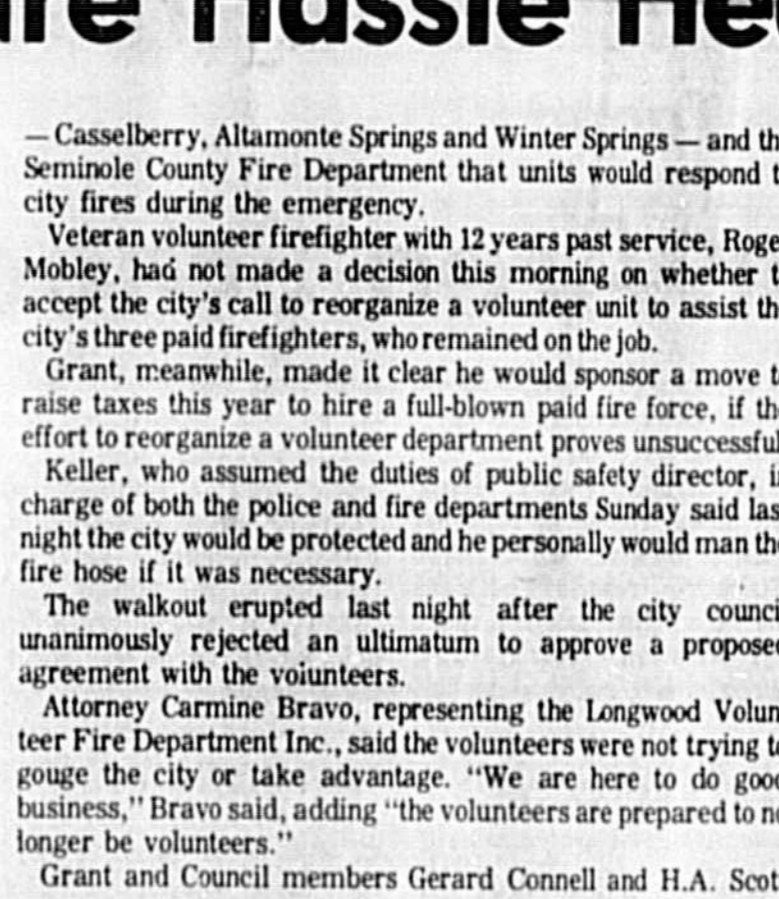

## One Still Missing In Capsized Oil Rig

GALLIANO, La. (AP) — For 26 hours, Joe Ballard perched desperately on a valve handle to keep his head inside a bubble of life-saving air. He was trapped 50 feet underwater in an upside-down offshore oil rig. One minute he was asleep in his bunk in the air-conditioned crew's quarters atop the mammoth \$5 million oil well workover rig, Progress Marine No. 2, which was being towed slowly across a placid sea. Then, suddenly, the four men were scrambling in water and pitch-dark confusion, their air pocket fouled with spilled diesel oil and made hideous with the sound of the rig's stress and strain. "I was just about gone when I saw a light," said Ballard. "Then the diver came through. I thought, 'Hallelujah!'" Ballard and two other men were rescued from the overturned hulk and a company spokesman said seven divers walked "every inch" of the sunken hulk early today looking for one man still missing.

## Aides To Defend Veto

WASHINGTON (AP) — Administration officials are going before a House panel to try to document President Ford's arguments for vetoing a bill that would protect the environment against strip mining. Federal Energy Administrator Frank G. Zarb and six Interior Department officials were scheduled to appear later today to explain the veto. Ford defended that the bill would cost 36,000 jobs, mean higher utility costs for consumers and increase U.S. reliance on imported oil. Backers of the veto bill challenged the White House claims and today's unusual post-veto session resulted. Rep. Morris K. Udall, D-Ariz., floor manager for the bill, said he is confident the hearing before a joint session of two Interior Committee subcommittees will prove the administration figures "have been grossly inflated."

## Drug Price Ads Supported

WASHINGTON (AP) — Drug stores would be able to advertise prices of prescription drugs and customers thus could shop for the cheapest price if the Federal Trade Commission adopts a proposed regulation. However, a survey of the 16 states and the District of Columbia where drug-price advertising already is allowed shows that not all druggists and drug companies are eager to advertise prices, even when it's legal. The FTC, in making the proposal Monday, asserted that comparison shopping for prescription drugs would save consumers more than \$13 million a year.

## CIA Plot Charged

MIAMI (AP) — A Miami man says a CIA-sponsored operation to assassinate Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro was aborted and U.S. would-be assassins were abandoned before reaching Cuba. Max Gorman Gonzalez said Monday that he and his attorney will file a million-dollar suit against the intelligence agency, charging that Gonzalez was "used unwittingly, without his consent or knowledge by the CIA" in the alleged 1968 plot.

At Crooms High School, 13th Street and Persimmon Avenue, Sanford, police reported buildings were entered and a vending machine in the teachers' lounge battered with a claw hammer taken from the woodworking shop. A fire extinguisher was sprayed over a classroom. Damage was estimated at \$300.

Across town at Lakeview Middle School off Airport Boulevard \$10 in change was taken when vandals ransacked an office. Also entered, police said, were the teachers' lounge and the library.

At nearby Seminole High School lockers were ransacked and obscenities scrawled on walls and posters, police said.

# Opinion Kills Bid On Refuse System

A proposed exclusive refuse franchising system, designed to provide county residents in unincorporated areas with better garbage service, blew up in Seminole County Commission's face yesterday when County Attorney Tom Freeman said the proposed system would not be legal.

Freeman's advice came during a Commission workshop session and was a stinging rebuff to a plan that had been developed by the county and was ready for Commission action.

"It's a blow into a million pieces," Vilhen said.

The attorney's opinion apparently stilled hopes of implementing a franchise system for refuse firms, unless Commission decides to step back to a franchising plan it had modified or come up with another plan.

The original system called for the county granting exclusive franchises to firms which would operate in designated areas of the county, and no other firms would be permitted to service those certain areas.

This idea, however, when first proposed was quickly opposed by county residents concerned about not being able to select the firm by which they would be serviced.

The citizens' complaints caused Commission to modify the plan to where franchises would be granted but no certain areas would be set.

Freeman advised against the modified system. He said that to have exclusive franchises, only one company would be permitted to operate in a certain area. This would mean that one company served the entire county, or that the county was cut up into areas and firms were told which areas to serve, Freeman said.

Freeman said the other alternative would be to maintain a list of all qualified television who follows at the present.

## City Airport Given Boost

NEW ORLEANS — The South is the top regional destination for 39 per cent — of the 70 million adults planning vacation tours this year, according to a survey revealed at the First Discover America National Travel Mart and Conference held here this past week.

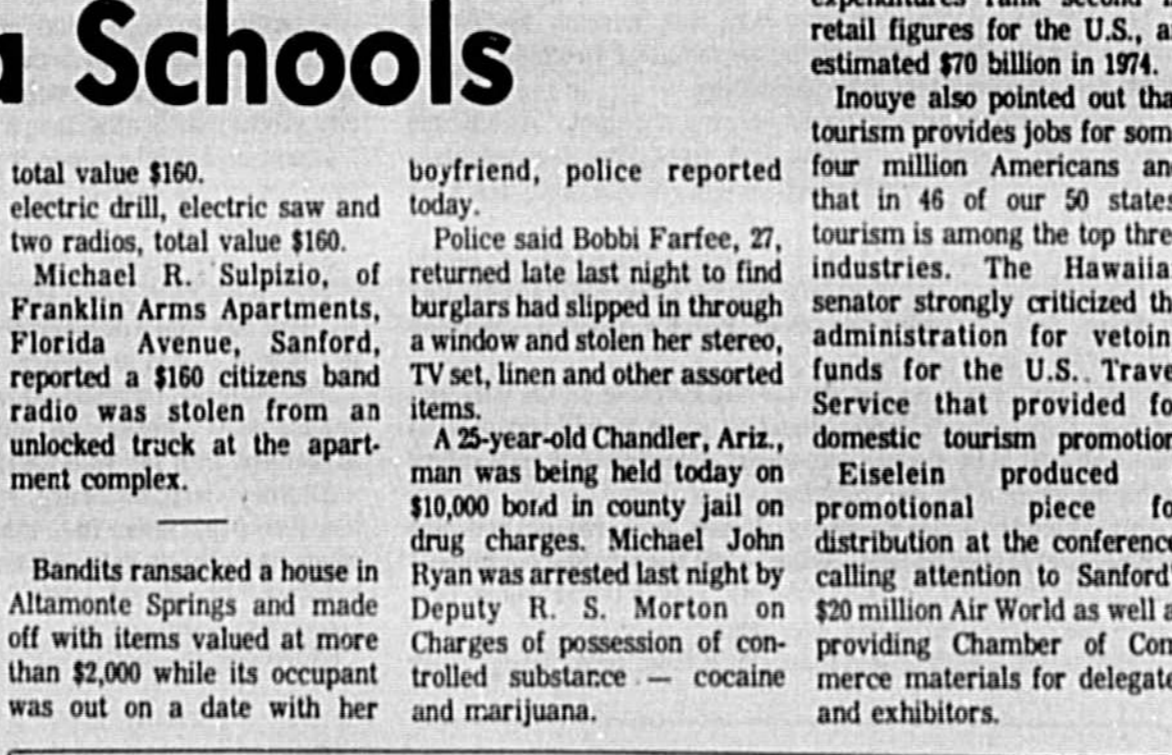
The Sanford public relations professional was the only Florida delegate to hold press credentials as contributing editor for the new Florida Aviation Journal.

## Gurney Denied Guilt, Grand Jury Report Shows

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — "I'm an honest man; I've done no wronging," former Sen. Edward Gurney once told a federal grand jury investigating allegations of fund raising improprieties.

"As God is my witness, I never received one red cent of these monies," he said.

Prosecutors in the bribery conspiracy trial of the ex-senator and four others finished reading a 300-page transcript Monday of Gurney's May 1974 testimony before a Jacksonville grand jury.

The government was to call its next witness today following arguments on trial matters to be heard before U.S. District Judge Ben Krentzman outside the presence of the 12-member jury.

Gurney, ex-Sen. Groce and Joseph Bastien, plus former federal housing officers K. Wayne Swiggert and Ralph Koontz, are charged with conspiracy to build an illegal slush fund through influence peddling.

## Disney Salute Aids Kids

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — Hundreds of high school students are beating a tight job market and earning school credits by taking part in Walt Disney's salute to the nation's 200th birthday.

With Mickey Mouse, Goofy and Donald Duck leading the way, some 300 students, ages 15 to 17, will be marching along Walt Disney World's Main Street twice a day for the next year in a special bicentennial parade.

"America on Parade" will begin Saturday at the Disney attraction near Orlando and Disneyland in California. Some 1,200 performances will be given before the final parade is held in September 1976.

The students will get a halfhour of credit for each nine-week session and will be paid \$7.40 a parade.

"It is part of a work experience program developed between Disney and schools in Anaheim, Calif., and Orlando," said Dick Ross, director of entertainment at Disney World.

## Shevin Wants Lease Hearing

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin was to ask the Cabinet today to order a public hearing on the proposed leasing of 8,160 acres of the Everglades to a sugar firm.

Shevin made the announcement Monday in an opinion to go to the Cabinet without a public hearing.

The Shevin opinion appeared to clear one controversial environmental issue from the Cabinet agenda. But heated arguments were expected on a proposal that the state impose land-use guidelines for the Green Swamp.

State planners urged the Cabinet to write the regulations because officials in Polk and Lake counties failed to write them within six months after the swamp was declared an area of critical state concern.

## Pot Penalty Stiffened

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The Senate has voted to stiffen the penalty for possessing more than 2.2 pounds of marijuana but has shelved an attempt to ease the penalties for possession of between .5 and 12 grams.

On a voice vote, the Senate defeated an amendment Monday by Sen. Jack Gordon, D-Miami Beach, and Kenneth Myers, D-Miami, that would have made possession of 12 grams or less subject to one year in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

The present law makes persons convicted of possessing five grams or less subject to \$1,000 fine and one year in jail. Persons convicted of possessing more than five grams are now subject to a five-year prison term and \$5,000 fine.

# Christian Sentenced; O'Malley Impeached

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — Former Education Commissioner Floyd Christian has been ordered to prison for income tax evasion and Insurance Commissioner-Treasurer Thomas O'Malley has been impeached.

Also on Monday, Alan C. Sundberg, 41, was sworn in as a state Supreme Court justice to succeed Hal P. Dekle, who resigned under threat of impeachment.

Christian, 50, the first Florida Cabinet officer sent to prison, was sentenced by U.S. District Judge Clarence W. Allgood and ordered to report to the medium security prison in Texarkana, Tex., on July 1.

Allgood said that after a 90-day study of Christian's activities, background and health, he would determine whether Christian should be released or serve more of the maximum five year sentence. Christian also could be fined up to \$5,000.

Christian pleaded guilty April 22 to not reporting \$30,000 income from kickbacks on state education contracts and evading \$15,751 in federal income taxes. He resigned in April 1974 when a House impeachment committee was named after his indictment in state court on 19

charges of bribery, conspiracy and perjury.

Found guilty of conspiracy, perjury and receiving \$49,000 in kickbacks, he was fined \$11,000, placed on probation for seven years and ordered to pay the state \$22,000 for money lost when he awarded a mobile classroom contract to a friend's company.

The House of Representatives voted impeachment of O'Malley, 41, on charges of obtaining some \$72,000 in financial favors. It was the first impeachment of a state cabinet officer since 1897.

O'Malley was accused of tak-

ing more than \$70,000 from his former law partners in Miami in return for diverting insurance company business to them. He was also charged with a multimillion-dollar utility tax case.

Dekle quit in February during an investigation of his receiving a secret memorandum from a utilities lawyer in a million-dollar utility tax case.

A fourth justice must be named to succeed Justice David McCain, who resigned effective Aug. 31 after a House committee recommended his impeachment on charges of helping friends in court cases.

# County Pares Road Budget, Includes Longwood Paving

\$25,000 for sidewalks for several elementary schools.

Commissioners were aided in their discussion by Director of Public Works Bob Andrews, County Engineer Bill Bush and J.C. Lavender, head of the road department.

Andrews, recently hired by the county, proposed the compromise with the \$10,000 figure and satisfied four of the five commissioners. Commissioner Mike Hattaway was out of the conference room when the four-member consensus was taken.

Specific projects still need to be detailed, Andrews said.

Commissioner John Kimbrough was instrumental in seeing that enough money was to be budgeted to include reworking Longwood Hills Road to handle the expected traffic surge when Scott Electronics opens.

Commissioners pushed and pulled on dollar signs and priority projects in a work session and whittled the total cost of the program down from over \$330,000 to the \$310,000 figure.

The county road program, which still requires formal approval by the Commission, deletes \$10,000 from \$25,000 to handle school board requests. But, already included in the program's budget is close to

and the City of Longwood. Kimbrough said he has postponed including the Longwood Hills Road project in the program for three years, but now that Scott Electronics in Lake Mary is preparing to open, the road needs to be reworked.

He said he expected a great deal of traffic to travel on the road to and from the plant. Kimbrough, who lives on Longwood Hills Road, is district commissioner representing the area.

Andrews estimated the cost for the project to require the county pay \$42,000 and Longwood to pay \$25,000.

Commissioners Hattaway, Harry Kwiatkowski and Dick Williams all said they wanted to keep the road program cost close to \$30,000 as possible.

Commissioner Mike Hattaway, who yesterday was in favor of capping the road program at \$300,000, voted against adoption of the program this morning because it included widening 6A. He said because of the large oak trees along the roadway the road should not be widened because it would mean cutting down the trees.

In the resolution proposed by Commissioner John Kimbrough, the county requests that Sanford City Manager Warren 'Pete' Knowles take full responsibility for the removal of the oak trees and if Knowles does not comply then the county will take the 6A project out of its road program.

Commissioner Williams also voted against the resolution.

## McIntosh Removes Name From List

Sanford Attorney Ken McIntosh today removed his name from consideration as a candidate for appointment to the 18th Judicial Circuit Court seat being vacated by Judge William Arkridge.

"I noticed this morning that a news story had given the entire picture linking my name to the 18th Circuit Court judgeship and I want to make it clear that, while flattered to be considered, I am not filing and application for the job," McIntosh said.

The Sanford attorney said he had not talked with "any news reporter from any paper" regarding the possibility of his seeking the position.

"I want to say that I had considered filing an application when Judge Arkridge first announced his plans to retire, but after consulting with my family and giving the entire picture a complete study, I have decided it would not be in the best interests of my family to seek the seat on the bench," McIntosh said.

McIntosh said this did not close the door to his seeking a position as a judge "at some future time."

New U.S. 'Role' For 'Red' Asia

Non-Communist Asia is uneasy in the wake of Viet take-overs in Cambodia, Laos, North Vietnam. Laos apparently and Thailand conceivably.

And South Korea is in the forefront of concern. The Red China government in Peking is openly encouraging its allies to "unify" Korea by force.

Currently, some 38,000 American troops in South Korea tend to dampen the Communist enthusiasm for a military invasion from the north.

But the doubts expressed by Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew of Singapore over U.S. foreign policy reflect those of other Asian nations dependent upon the American security blanket.

True, President Ford has reaffirmed U.S. alliances with Japan and the defense treaty with South Korea and has acknowledged the importance of military bases in the Philippines.

The mood of a Congress determined to have a major policy voice in future diplomacy, however, is far from certain.

Congress, endeavoring to read the will of the American people, is reluctant to endorse the concept of further American troop involvement in remote corners of the world.

But Korea is important to Japan. It is important to the Philippines. And both Japan and the Philippines are significant to U.S. security in the Pacific.

Former South Vietnamese Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky has interpreted correctly the congressional apathy toward Korea — and the importance of an independent South Korea to the future of Asia.

He has urged Congress to bolster the South Korean government with more military aid and arms to avoid a test of the congressional will.

Kinks In Kindness

The House and Senate finally have reached agreement on a \$405 million appropriation to cover the cost of evacuation and resettlement of Vietnam refugees.

Congressional action in providing funds to cover the refugee program has been unsteady slow, but it turns out that the resettlement effort is lagging for another reason.

Five separate federal agencies are involved in investigating and clearing individual refugees. It is bad enough that our multibureaucratic bureaucracy slows down so much of the official business of our country.

A special task force on refugee resettlement is trying to smooth out the kinks in the procedure. Some of those kinks have existed all too long in the processing of immigration applications and it is time they were straightened out.

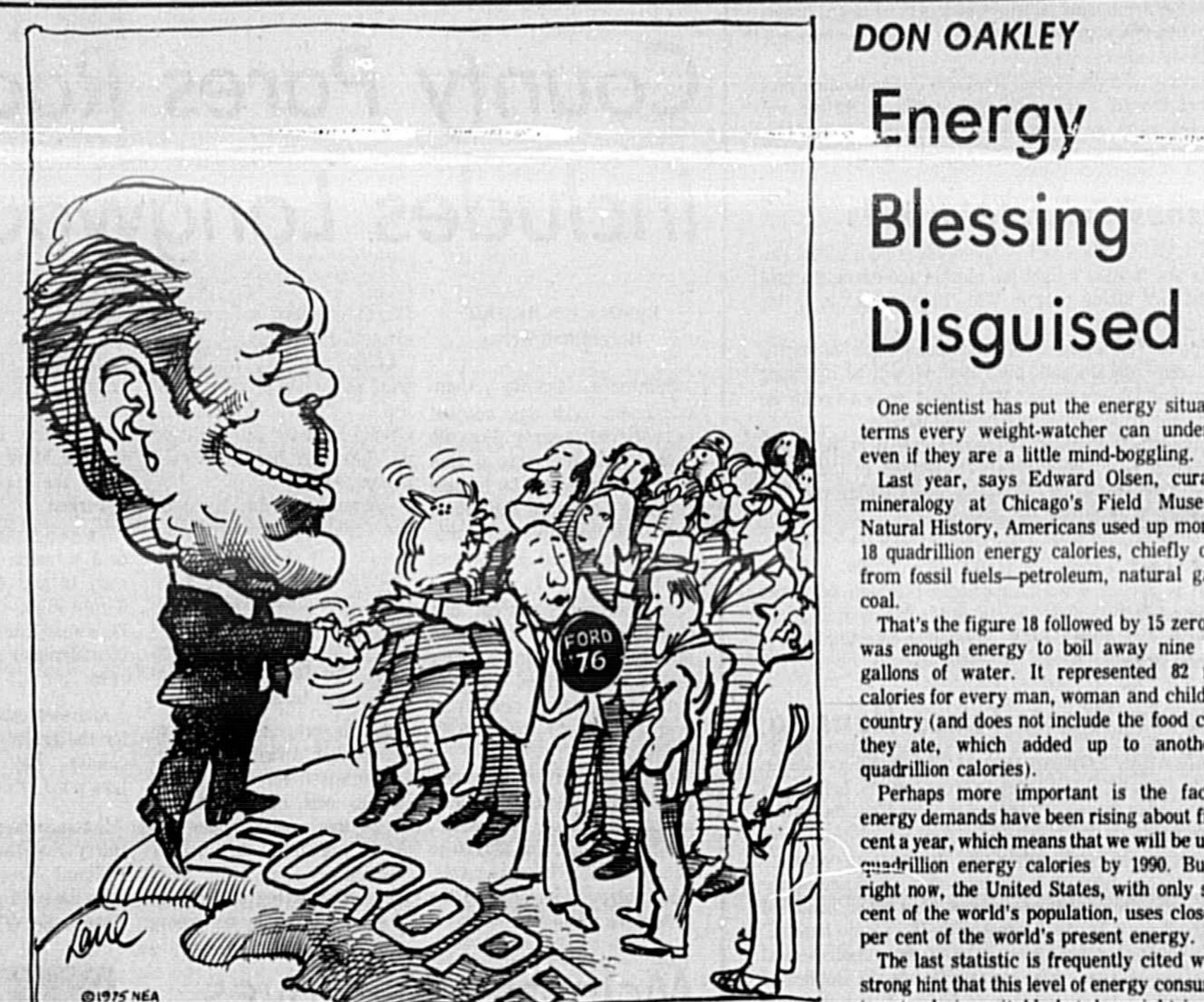

BEN HOGAN Will He Play Tournament Golf Again?

If I could ever cure my cranky knee, maybe I could play sometime again. But I'm afraid it would take an operation and I don't want to go through that again.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Ben Hogan, one of golf's greatest shot-makers, has been away from competition for four years and will probably never again play tournament golf. In the first of a three-part series, Hogan looks back on his glory days and why he doesn't play now.) By DENNE H. FREEMAN AP Sports Writer FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — Goling great Ben Hogan not only has retired from competitive golf, but he now finds it hard to enjoy even a casual round. He ventured out for nine holes recently at Shady Oaks here, the well-manicured, exclusive club where he practices daily. "I would hit one thin and another heavy. That takes the pleasure out of it," he said in an interview. "I had to use a scooler. The knee still hurts. I can do everything but play golf. I can't go through the ball like you must. So much in golf is dependent on your left side." Almost as an afterthought, he said, "But everybody has their little problems." "If I could ever cure my cranky knee, maybe I could play sometime again," Hogan said. "But I'm afraid it would take an operation and I don't want to go through that again."

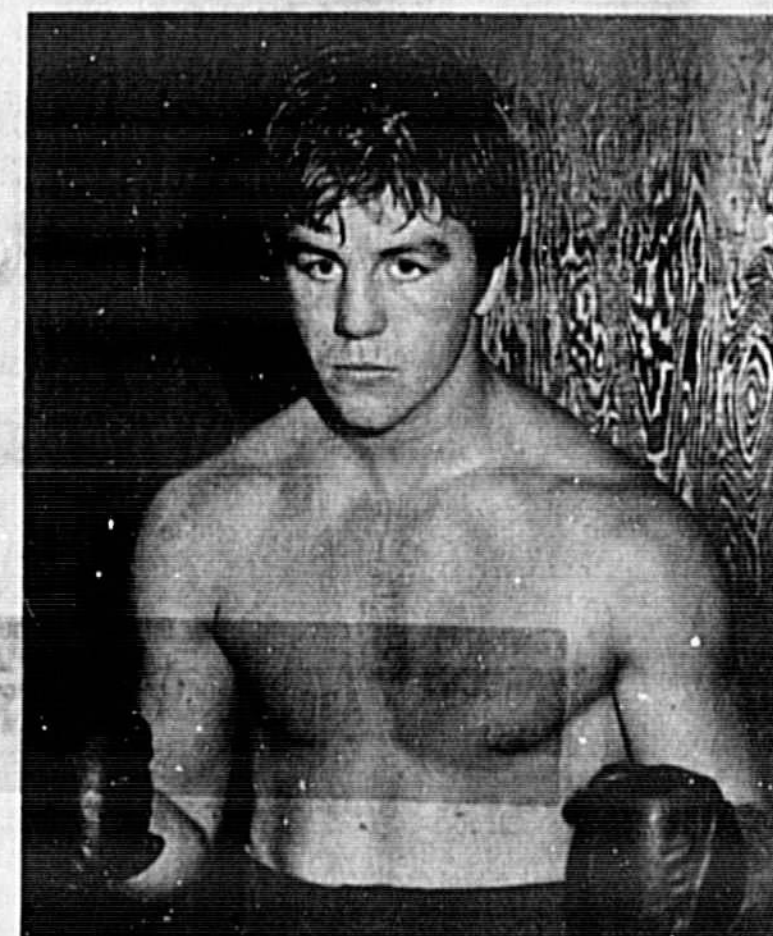
"quit" because the word is not in his vocabulary. It was typical that he confirmed his retirement from competitive golf without fanfare in a private interview, rather than at a press conference. Hogan relaxed in his office, where he directs the manufacture of golf equipment bearing his name, Hogan, now 62, is almost as trim as when he made his big assault in the 1950s. Gray now marks his temples. Four years ago, he stood at the par-three No. 4 at the Champions Golf Course outside Houston with a three-iron. The perils of the hole included a ravine yawning some 175 yards out, protecting the trap-flanked green. Hogan had avoided such hazards easily in thousands of golf swings on hundreds of golf courses. That day, he sent shock waves through the tournament gallery. One ball in the ravine. Two in the ravine. Three in the ravine. Hogan, who had inspired the game's followers just a few years before with a dramatic 66 in the final round of the 1967 Masters, staggered off with a nine, six strokes over par. He gamely finished the front nine in 44, but then went double-bogey and bogey before reaching the 12th tee. He hit the drive solid. Down the middle. That was the last competitive golf shot Hogan would play. He

sent his caddy after the ball and he took a cart to the clubhouse. All he said after the round was: "As long as I've been playing golf, I knew anything could happen." That day took nothing away from 65 tournament victories, including nine major championships. It took nothing away from the legend of golf's perfectionist in the always-present white cap who moved with eyes straight ahead, bearing down totally on the next shot. It didn't harm a story that is a fiction writer's dream—the Dublin, Tex., native who won his first tournament in 1940 and was at the top of his golfing prowess when he was nearly killed in an auto crash in 1949. He returned to win three more U.S. Opens. Doctors have been unable to heal fully Hogan's injured left knee—a solvent from the accident that occurred near Van Horn, Tex., when a bus crossed the center line and brusque head-on into his car. He suffered a double fracture of the pelvis, a fractured collar bone, broken leg and other injuries. He hurled himself in front of his wife, Valerie, who was not seriously injured. Hogan, who might not have walked again, recovered miraculously. In 11 months, he tied Sam Snead in the Los Angeles

Open and won the playoff. That summer brought his second of four U.S. Open titles. "That was the greatest thing that ever happened to me," Hogan said. "I think I even surprised myself." Next, in his golfing career, Hogan would rank the 66 in the 1967 Masters. "I received an ovation at almost every hole. It made you feel very humble for people to appreciate what you were doing." "I realize I might have won more tournaments and more money if I hadn't spent three years in the service or if I hadn't been in the accident," said Hogan, who turned pro in 1931. "Everybody is always wanting five years more. Please, let's not make a big thing out of my leg injury. I've been lucky and I wouldn't want to do anything over again differently." His feat of winning the U.S. Open, the Masters and the British Open in 1953 is considered one of golf's great accomplishments. No other player has come that close to winning the "Grand Slam," and Hogan did not compete in the fourth event in 1953—the PGA championship. "It was the next week and match play back in those days," he said. "You had to play something like seven matches to make it over 36 holes. That would have been too much." Hogan said his reputation as being dour and brusque "bothered me some. Some people just didn't understand. I guess I twisted the word 'modesty' in reverse." He said he often wished he could joke or be witty after a round. "But I'm not Bob Hope. When I was on a golf course, I was there to play golf. I gave my very best at playing golf, and nothing else."

He needs an impressive win over McIntosh to stay in the title picture. In his last outing, Quarry dropped a controversial decision to Indian Yagui Lopez in Stockton, California. In featured preliminary action, eighth-ranked heavyweight Jody Ballard made his fourth appearance in Florida as he tangles with Gainesville's Tommy Howard. Ballard has defeated Rod Bobick in Miami Beach, Leon Shaw and Bob Ellis in the local ring. The Tampa middleweight is a hard puncher. His only broken finger several months ago when he ran out of gas against Edgar "Mad Dog" Ross in the fifth round. Up to that point, Ellis was leading on all the official scorecards. Ellis turned pro this year after winning the Golden Gloves in 1974. His wins include Saw Pretty, Charles Thornton "Wild" Willie Chaney and Cedus Rowe. Vincent is 11-1-1 with seven KO's and hopes to use Ellis as a springboard to a main event on June 17 with "Thunder" Thornton and then possibly on to a showdown with Sanford's Victor "Taco" Perez. Ross will be seeking his eighth straight win in another bout that is set for six rounds tonight. The "Mad Dog" will cross gloves with Walter Newell of Eustis.

Kwalick Shuns NFL; Inks Pact With WFL

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Ted Kwalick, one of the best tight ends in pro football with the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League, has jumped to the Philadelphia Bell of the rival World Football League. The 26-year-old Kwalick, a No. 1 draft choice of the 49ers in 1969 after an all-American career at Penn State, signed a three-year contract reportedly calling for a sizeable bonus and a salary far in excess of what he was earning at San Francisco. Kwalick said he had no doubts about jumping to a league that took a financial bath last year, and whose credibility was highly questioned in pro football circles. "Up to six months ago I had my doubts," Kwalick said in a news conference announcing his jump. "This is a totally different league now," said the 226-pound end who sat on the 49ers' bench last season because he indicated he would go to the new league, and played out his NFL option at a 10 per cent cut in pay. "The WFL is being run now by responsible people," Kwalick said. "I feel very confident about it." The previous three seasons, Kwalick caught 139 passes for 2,147 yards and 19 TDs. He played in three consecutive Pro Bowl games, starting in 1971. In 1973, he led 49ers' receivers, was fourth in receptions in his conference and seventh in the entire NFL. After five seasons Kwalick had a record of 151 passes caught for 2,224 yards and 21 TDs, a 15.4-yard average per catch. Kwalick's agent, Lowell Morse, said he negotiated with five NFL teams, but noted that they either wouldn't meet Kwalick's salary demand, or were afraid of what they would lose under the Rozelle Rule. Under the rule, now being attacked in court, a team signing a player whose option has expired could be forced to give up a player of equal quality selected by commissioner Pete Rozelle. "It was difficult to make any headway in the NFL because of this archaic rule," Morse said.

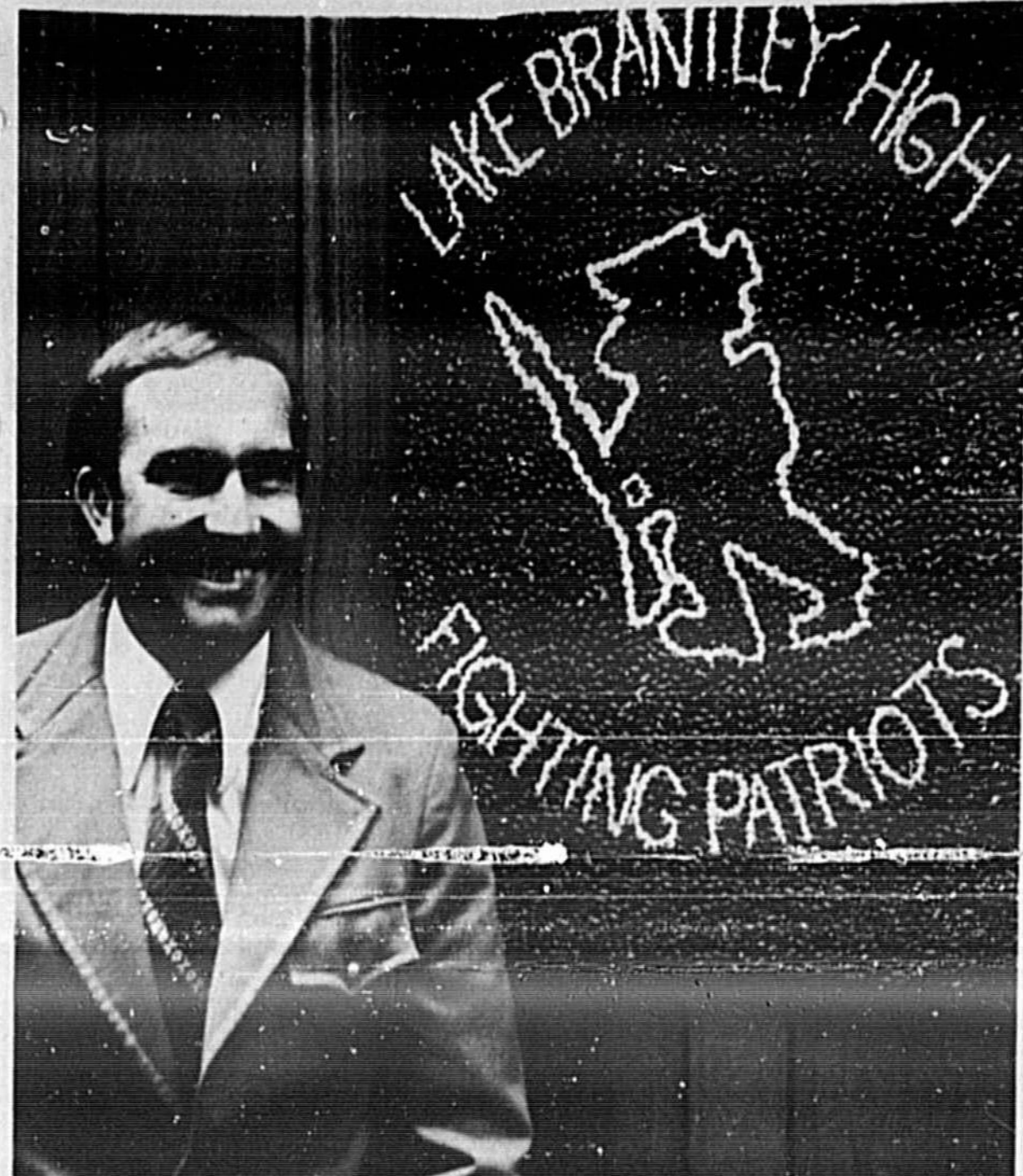
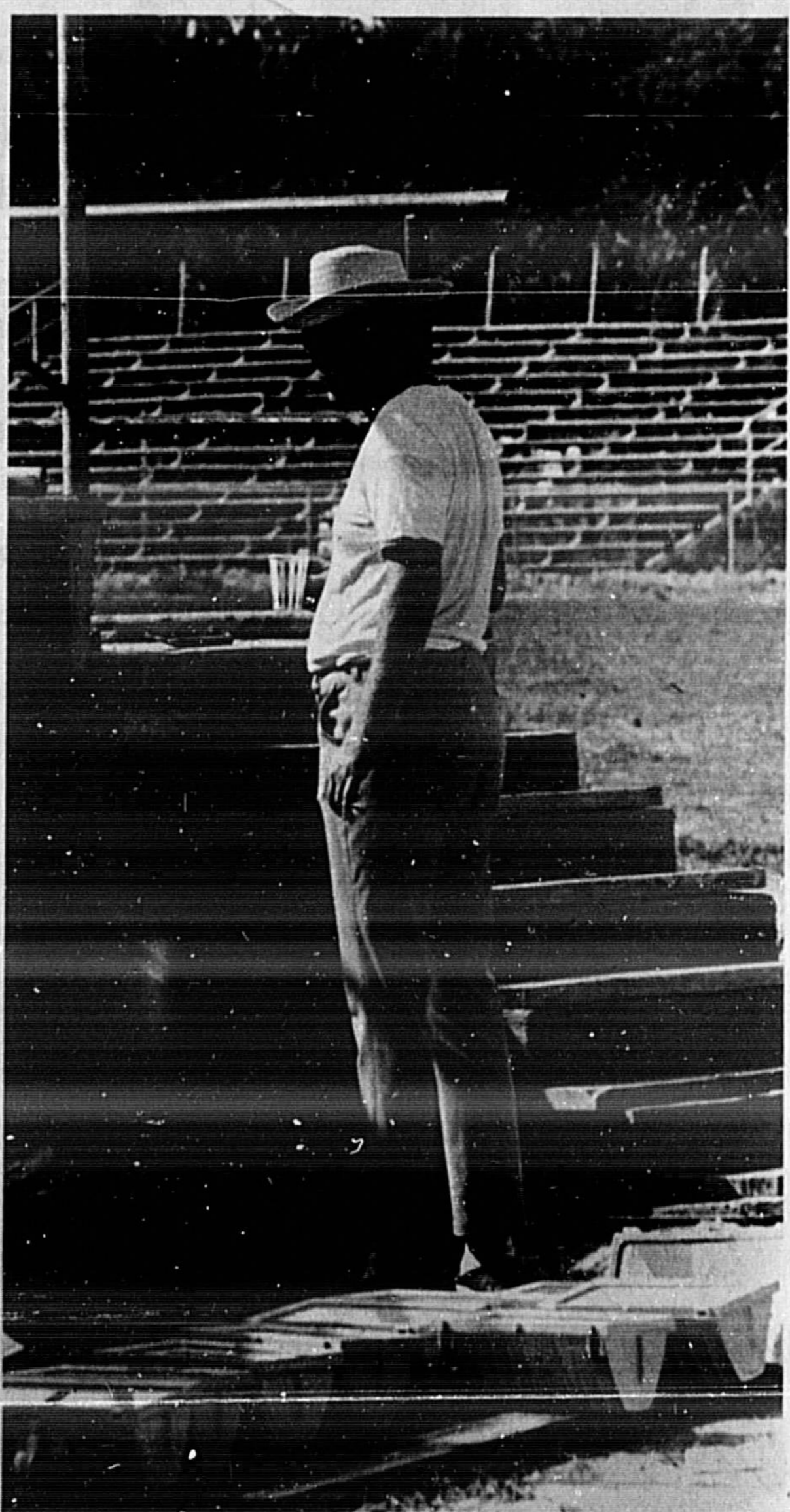

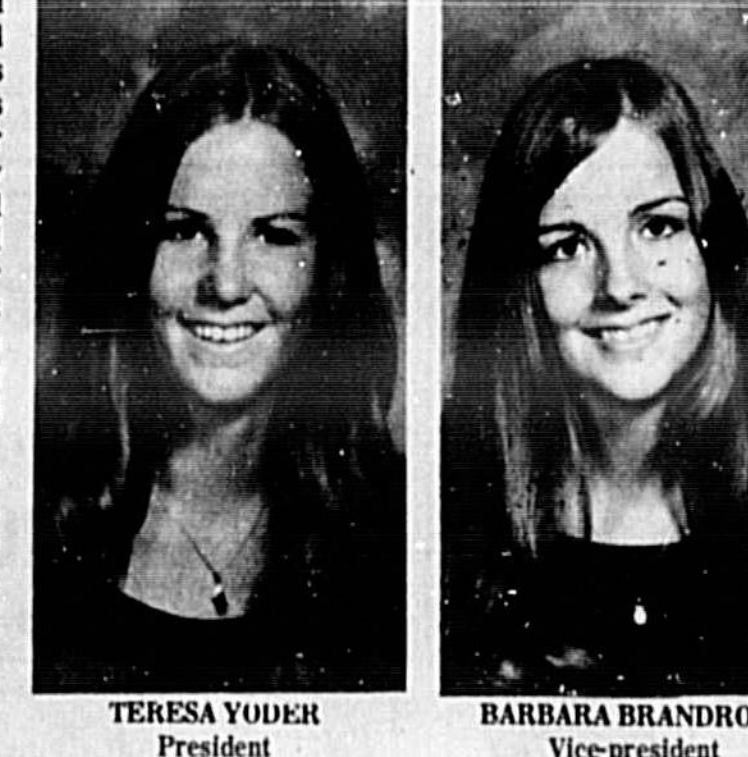
**FOOTBALL**

## Longwood Fire Hassle Ends; Keller Applies 'Gag' Rule

LONGWOOD — Local television stations on the 11 o'clock news last night were broadcasting stories about the fire protection crisis in this city, caused when volunteers firefighters walked out Monday night. The media was unaware the volunteers in a meeting some time prior to 11 had voted to return en masse. Repeated calls to Keller at the police station this morning were answered with the statement that Keller was out-of-town attending a police chief's meeting and it was unknown what time he would return. Sources said the gag rule, imposed by Keller on his third day on the job, was intended to control the news emanating from the police and fire departments so that citizens would not be unnecessarily upset. The sources could not explain why Keller had not released the information that the city was no longer in danger from fires since the volunteers had returned to duty, which would have alleviated citizen concern. Mayor James Lormann also could not be reached by telephone.

## Altamonte Accepts Orienta Plan

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS — A plan for providing bicycle paths for school children who will attend the new Lake Orienta Elementary School in the fall was accepted by the city commission last night, after a lengthy workshop on the matter yesterday afternoon. The plan, estimated to cost \$13,350, calls for a bike path from Orienta to Arlington and another from Woodling to Maitland Avenue. This plan includes the necessity of acquiring rights-of-way. The bike paths are to be paid from federal revenue sharing funds formerly allocated for construction of a tennis court at the civic center recreation area. City crews are to provide labor for the project, resulting in a substantial saving, Mayor Norman Floyd said. Floyd submitted seven separate plans for commission consideration. Commissioners said in addition to the plan approved two others should be done if funding is available. The other routes which commissioners indicated they favored were: Arlington to the school fence; Tivoli to the school fence; Pershing to the school fence; and Highland to Elsworth. The city week received a resolution from county commissioners indicating the county officials have no intention of taking any action to provide paving, walkways, crossings and other school related projects within cities. The resolution, directed to the School Board and School Superintendent W. P. (Bud) Layer, notes budgetary complications are created when school requests are received at random throughout the year. The policy created in the resolution asks the school board to make all requests in the future prior to the annual budget session, and by May 1.
