Commissioners' Salaries

They Don't Want To Set Their Own Pay, But May Have To

The Seminole County commissioners aren't exactly thrilled over the prospect of setting their own salaries - something they may have to do if the Florida House of Representatives

The House earlier this week, on a 78-32 vote, passed a bill calling for a constitutional amendment to be placed on the 1982 general-election ballot shifting this responsibility from the Legislature to the local county commissions.

The bill, if it clears the Senate and wins the approval of the voters in November, would allow county commissioners to fix their own salaries. Their pay scales are now set by the Legislature according to population.

Seminole County, which falls in the population range of

100,000 to 199,999, pays its five commissioners \$23,069 each. Seminole's population is 179,000

State Rep. Winston "Bud" Gardner, D-Titusville, during debate on the bill, said, "Let's give them (the commissions) the opportunity to lower the salaries."

County Commissioner Bill Kirchhoff said the Legislature "has been raising and lowering our salaries for years. I'd like to be able to raise and lower their (legislators') salaries. They ought to turn it about and give us that opportunity."

Kirchhoff said that in certain charter counties, such as Volusia, a big increase from the current \$6,000-to-\$7,000-a-year pay can be expected if salaries can be set in the various

As far as he is personally concerned, Kirchhoff said he would like to wait and see whether the bill passes before he takes a

position. "If the Legislature lets us set their salaries and ours " too, I'd really be interested," he said.

Commissioner Sandra Glenn said it might also be a good idea if all constitutional officers - the sheriff, supervisor of elections, clerk of the circuit court, tax collector and property appraiser - could set their own salaries.

"I don't understand why the legislators are choosing one elected group to set its salaries and not all elected groups," Mrs. Glenn said, adding that while city commissioners set their own salaries, County Commission operations are different in that they are an arm of state government.

Why are they choosing only one group!" she asked. Commissioner Barbara Christensen's attitude was somewhat different from Mrs. Glenn's and Kirchhoff's. Mrs. Christensen said, "I don't think it's a bad idea. It would our salaries or keep them the same. I rather doubt the salaries

Commissioner Bob Sturm said the public is beginning to realize that government management requires business expertise to be run properly.

"In many cases, if salaries are not sufficient, the people are going to continually end up with second-and third-class officials who shouldn't be in office," he said, adding that he doesn't have "any feeling one way or the other on the commissioners setting their own salaries."

He said, "in relation to salary, if I didn't have outside income from investments and another job, I couldn't afford to work in government as a commissioner."

Sees 'Rapport' With Cabinet

Anti-Power-Line Group Feels It's Made Headway

A five-member cilizens group -People Against Power Intrusion (PAPI) returned to their northeastern Seminole and eastern Orange County homes today, satisfied that the majority of the Florida Cabinet is sympathetic to

"We felt there was a rapport and understanding with the Cabinet members," said Sidney Kraftsow of Geneva today.

The group met with representatives of Gov. Bob Graham and four members of the Cabinet on Thursday to plead their cause against the Florida Power & Light Co's (FP&L) plan to construct a highvoltage power line in a mile-wide corridor through Osteen in Volusia County, Geneva and Chuluota in

Seminole, and Christmas in Orange. State Rep. Robert Hattaway, D-Altamonte Springs, arranged the Cubinet meeting with the group.

Among those attending the meeting, in addition to Kraftsow, were Dr. Hugh L. Green of Chuluuta, I., Voorhees of Geneva, Mrs. JoAnn Morgan of Lake Harney and Mrs. Debbie Edleston of Christmas.

"In our presentation, we told them all the things that were bothering us about the transmission line," Kraftsow said today. He said the area planned by FP&L through Seminole travels through 300 separate parcels of property on which are located 85 homes.

Gov. Bob Graham and the Cabinet later this year are to make a decision on where FP&L can place the 500-kilovolt line. The line is part of a \$450 million system FP&L is building to Martin County on Florida's east coast. The system is designed to bring less expensive power from coal-burning plants in Georgia to a grid connected to the southern part of the state.

Although residents in the Geneva area and county officials attempted to testify on the Issue before a state hearing examiner in Daytona Beach in January, Kraftsow said the examiner was only willing to listen to what he called "proven.

"The towers to be installed will be 115 feet high, taller than a 10-story building, Kraftsow said. He added that the Geneva group means business and has organized for the sole purpose of defeating the

"We think we made our case with the Cabinet," he said.

Kraftsow noted that petitions opposing the project now contain more than 4,200 signatures, and more are being collected.

"It's insane to put power lines near people at least until the potential biological hazards from electromagnetic fields have been researched. "We have no argument with FP&L about the need for power," he said, -DONNA ESTES

County Gives Jim Easton Raise And Career Status

Assistant Seminole County Administrator Jim Easton has been given career status and a 5 percent merit raise by the County Commission.

The commission lifted Easton's sixmonth probationary status on the County recommendation of Administrator Roger Nelawender.

Easton assumed the \$32,000 post last May. His pay increase will be retroactive to six months from his hiring date.

The delay in promoting Easton to career status was called an oversight due to Neiswender's heavy workload. Although the six-month probation is mandatory, the time for adjusting the status is discretionary.

He came here from Winter Raven. where he was city manager, to fill the post, which had been vacant since the resignation of Jeff Etchberger six months earlier. Etchberger left the position in November 1960 to take over as city manager in Altamonte Springs.

The commission praised Easton for his work. One of the tasks he has been working on is finding out just what President Reagan's "New Federalism" will mean to the county.



Lake Mary Bookkeeping **Enters Computer Age**

The city of Lake Mary is set to enter Papa, secretary Carol Spotts and utility. the computer age with its municipal bookkeeping.

Information Management Services will be installing a computer at City Hall, 158 N. Country Club Road, within the next 45 days. All that is left for the City Council to do is decide which bank it wants to finance the purchase.

And with a five-year repayment plan, the \$13,300 computer system will pay for itself. When it is installed, the city will no longer need to pay the \$3,000 it has been spending annually for Computer Utilities, a private firm, to do the city's utility billing, said City Treasurer Madeleine Paps.

The new system will be used to do all the city's water and newer utility billing. payroll, accounts payable, budget analysis and general ledger for both the utilities and general fund operations, Mrs. Papa said.

Three city staff members - Mrs.

clerk Barbara Gorman - will be trained to operate the computer.

Information Management Services was selected to provide the computer hardware and software package on the recommendation of Councilmen Ray Fox and Gene McDonald, who studied computer firms and proposals for six months before arriving at their choice.

The council last week unanimously

approved their recommendation The possibility of acquiring a computer system has been under consideration by the council for the last two years.

The city of Longwood aiready is using an Information Management Services computer and software. The Ormond Beach firm is also preparing a similar system for Apopka.

The new computer will be installed in a small office adjacent to the Water Department at City Hall.

Williams Quits, Works On Staying Out Of Jail

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Harrison A. Williams Jr., having failed in his fight to remain in the Senate, now may likely concentrate his efforts on staying out of jail.

Williams resigned Thursday rather than face certain expulsion for his 1981 Abscam bribery conviction. He is appealing that guilty verdict, the accompanying three-year sentence and \$50,000 fine.

UAW-GM Reopen Talks

DETROIT (UPI) — United Auto Workers leaders have overwhelmingly approved a reopening of stalled contract talks with General Motors, and both sides decided immediately to go to the bargaining table today.

Concerned over GM's plant closings but buoyed by the promises of profit sharing and job security in the new pact with Ford Motor Co., the GM Council of the UAW voted, 299-15, Thursday to reopen the negotiations broken off in January.

Flu Epidemic Coming?

ATLANTA (UPI) — A new strain of Asian flu virus is developing — an event that could mean an upcoming major epidemic — but scientists said today there is no evidence yet of increased outbreaks.

The national Centers for Disease Control said the strain, dubbed A-Shanghai, represents an antigenic "drift" from previous A-type flu viruses.

Freeway Killer To Die

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Convicted Freeway Killer William Bonin was sentenced to death today for the homosexual-torture slayings of 10 youths.

The same jury that convicted Bonin Jan. 6 on 10 murder counts and 10 robbery counts decided in the trial's penalty phase the former truck driver should be executed in California's gas chamber.

Bonin, a twice-paroled sex offender, admitted in a jailhouse interview he killed 21 young men and boys in a series of sex slayings, scattering his victims' nude bodies near Southern California freeways.

Oviedo Man Guilty Of Cocaine Charge

An Oviedo man, arrested in Fargo, N.D. on drug-related charges in December, has pleaded guilty to distributing cocaine and is awaiting sentencing in the Cass County (N.D.)

Fred J. McConeghy, 58, an Oviedo roofing contractor, was arrested Dec. 20, along with Alex Lee Tindall, 43, of Oviedo, and Buford Higgs, 27, of West Palm Beach, as suspects in a North Dakota drug operation, U.S. Attorney Rod Webb said.

The three men were arrested shortly after the twin-engine plane in which they were traveling landed at Fargo's Hector Airport. Webb said about 18 ounces of cocaine with a street value of about \$250,000 was seized.

McConeghy recently pleaded guilty to a charge of distributing cocaine before U.S. District Judge Paul Benson in Fargo and is awalting sentencing, police said.

He faces up to 15 years in state prison, a \$25,000 fine, or both. Tindall is currently free on bond, while Higgs is being held at the Cass County Jail on \$200,000 bond, police said.

Pay Overdue Child Support Or Go To Jail, Court Says

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - A law giving the state the right to sue a responsible parent to collect overdue child support as reimbursement of public assistance benefits is constitutional, the Supreme Court says.

The ruling reversed the Third District Court of Appeal, which had held that parts of the law letting the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services bring civil contempt proceedings in such cases infringed upon the constitutional right to be free from imprisonment for debt.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The next move is up to the Senate on whether to legalize a controversial cancer treatment known as IAT in Florida.

After one of its members revealed he has cancer and would like IAT legalized, the House voted Thursday to override Gov. Bob Graham's veto last year of a bill that would clear the way for use of the treatment.

WASHINGTON (UPI) - With declining gasoline prices leading the way, wholesale prices dropped 0.1 percent in February, marking the first time in six years the wholesale index has gone down instead of up, the government reported today. The report meant wholesale price inflation disappeared last

The Labor Department said that large decreases in energy prices and a decline in automobile prices wiped out a half percent increase in food costs to bring the overall Producer Price Index down, after seasonal adjustment.

Gasoline got 2.7 percent cheaper in February alone and all energy products together fell 1.8 percent in price, the first time that has happened since January 1976.

Many analysts say that the recession is the biggest factor making it difficult for suppliers to mark up prices. The pressure of slackening demand combined with the world oil glut and better weather conditions for meat deliveries has given dealers an unexpected break, which may moderate consumer prices in the weeks and months ahead

The rare boon for buyers was broadly based. The department said that for the first time since February 1975 prices were down throughout the entire wholesale supply pipeline, for finished goods, those being prepared for sale and for raw

The mid-1970s were marked by the last decade's most serious recession but even then declines in the wholesale price index were extremely uncommon. In the past 10 years of monthly statistics, wholesale prices have gone down only eight times, department analysts said.

In the unlikely event that February's performance could be repeated for the next twelve months, wholesale prices would decline at an annual rate of 1.7 percent, the department said. In contrast wholesale prices went up by 7 percent in 1981.

The Producer Price Index for February was set at 277.4. which before seasonal adjustment was the same as in January. A sample market basket of goods that cost dealers \$100 in 1967 would therefore cost \$277.40 last month

Although gasoline prices have been dropping in recent months the decline in another major category, capital equipment, was a surprise. Auto prices went down 1.3 percent, light truck prices plummeted by 7.9 percent and several varieties of factory equipment went down, taking the overall capital goods sector down 0.4 percent, its first drop since October 1972

The 0.5 percent increase in food prices followed a much steeper rise in December of 1.1 percent. Fish, cooking oils and vegetables got cheaper for dealers and one of the most widely used ingredients in processed foods, refined sugar, went down in price by 3.9 percent, the department said.

However some foods bucked the moderating trend, with eggs increasing in price by a whopping 8 percent for the month alone, price increases accelerating for other dairy products as well as beef and yeal.

Prices went down for alcoholic beverages, leather footwear, gold jewelry while they went up for cosmetics, prescription drugs, tires, light bulbs and tobacco, the department said.

Taxed For Their Toil

When Romania recently became the second Soviet bloc country to fall behind in its payments to Western banks, including those in the United States, the American people saw another example of the economic lunacy that has prevailed for so long in the Free World.

As it did in bailing out Poland earlier this month to prevent the declaration of default, the Reagan administration wrote one check for nearly \$5.5 million and another for about \$320,000 to U.S. banks which Romania failed to pay.

The decision to make good on another Commodity Credit Corp. guarantee to private U.S. banks holding unpaid Soviet bloc debts fuels the controversy and increases the administration's embarrassment, just now waning from the Polish bail-out.

But this is only the beginning Unpaid U.S. government loans and loan guarantees to Poland total almost \$2 billion and Romania's debts are thought to be as large or larger. Moreover, there are numerous other communist loans almost as

The loans to Soviet bloc countries by U.S. banks, now being serviced by U.S. taxpayers, were used to purchase American agricultural products, manufactured goods, and technology.

Talk about a no-win situation: Americans, who have labored in farm and factory to provide food and goods to communist countries must now be taxed for their own toil because of defaulted loans to Soviet-bloc nations. Even worse, the U.S.

Government, with its long affliction of mounting deficits, has pursued an insane policy of borrowing or printing money in support of such

Thus have we debased our currency in order to subsidize rigid, inefficient communist economies and to underwrite the Soviet Union's threatening military buildup, the most massive in history.

President Reagan provided a little redeeming relief in all of this when he rejected yet another \$65 million commodity credit loan scheduled for

He did this over the objections of the State Department and the Department of Agriculture.

The aborted loan was for the purchase of U.S. corn and soybean meal to feed what was the granary of Europe before communism took over.

In his little-heralded rejection of further credit to Romania, the President is reported to have simply advised the State and Agriculture people that if prospective borrowers can't pay their bills, "Let's not extend them credit." Let's not indeed.

With total Soviet and East European debt to non-communist banks and governments estimated at more than \$80 billion and communist economies in increasing disorder, the likelihood of a massive default increases with each passing due

Unavoidably, the administration is obliged to contrive a response to this problem and soon. Obviously, there are limits to the time that can be purchased through staying off formal default.

Governors Were Courted

WASHINGTON (NEA) - The nation's governors wound up their recent mid-winter meeting in Washington with a lavish black-tie dinner at the White House.

As President Reagan and Gov. Richard Snelling, the Vermont Republican who chairs the National Governors' Association, exchanged corulal toasts, members of the White House staff were breathing sighs of relief.

Four days of intensive lobbying had enabled them to prevent a political disaster for the president.

Past administrations, whether Democratic or Republican, often barely noticed the anmust February gathering of the governors.

Usually the responsibility for entertaining the state executives fell to a few middle-level administration officials. The president, if he was in town, would get together with at least some of the governors in what was more a photo opportunity for the press corps than a substantive business meeting.

But things were different this year. You EDWARD J. WALSH could hardly walk 10 feet at the governors meeting without tripping over another member of the Cabinet.

To the surprise of the governors, for example, Secretary of State Alexander Haig not only asked to address their Committee on International Trade but insisted on sitting through its two-hour luncheon meeting on subjects such as tourism and coal exports that have never been of great concern at high levels of the State Department.

In short, the Reagan administration could not do enough for the governors. Someone from the White House or a Cabinet department was always on hand to respond to a governor's slightest request. This attention culminated in the almost-state dinner for the governors on their last night in town. Why all the attention?

The simple fact of the matter is that the Reagan administration needs the active

cooperation of the governors if it is to have any chance of getting its "New Federalism" through Congress. White House lobbyists were afraid that the governors were going to turn thumbs down on the program at this

So, the White House lobbyists were out in force under the direction of Richard Williamson, the president's liaison for intergovernmental relations.

Their job was to prevent the governors from adopting any blanket resolution against the New Federalism that would give Congress an excuse to bury the president's proposal and instead turn its full attention to the budget and its growing deficit.

The centerpiece of the New Federalism is an exchange of programs between Washington and the states. The federal government will take over Medicald if the states will agree to take over a plethora of other programs currently administered from Washington. Those programs include food stamps and Aid to Families with Dependent Children as well as many transportation programa.

Press And El Salvador

When the major media set about covering U.S. government policies, one expects the reporters, editors, and commentators to be skeptical. It has been a long time since public officials got a free ride on the network news or in the major dailies. Indeed, we have traveled far from the days when reporters wrote only news. Today, they spice it with a strong dose of opinion, invariably liberal opinion.

That alone would seem to account for the hostile treatment the Reagan administration's policy on El Salvador is getting in the press, But, one would think, the press's natural skepticism would apply to all spokesmen for public policy. It doesn't when the "spokesman" is a bearded Salvadoran guerrilla toting an automatic

NBC News recently bought some film from Jon Alpert, a freelance journalist who went to live with the guerrillas fighting the U.S. supported government in El Salvador, Aired first in December and again recently, Alpert's clips how smiling young men, appropriately clad in ragged civillan clothes, who chat amiably about their activities, which appear to be camping out in the mountains, and occasionally taking potshots at government-occupied towns.

The weapons they displayed were ancient carbines and shotguns, with a few U.S.-and European-made semi-automatics, Alpert asked --repeat, asked them: "Where are all the Soviet weapons?" The young insurgents seemed hurt at the idea.

All this makes cute pictures on the evening news, but it doesn't say much for the network's claim to objectivity as a news medium. NBC, however, is not alone in buying propaganda. The New York Times and the Washington Post also sent correspondents to spend time among the

guerrillas. Both produced stories making them out as romantic freedom fighters, not terrorists. The Times reporter did report on the classes in Marxist ideology conducted by political commissars. But the tone of all of this sort of thing has been that the leftist guerrillas in El Salvador are no worse than adventurous Boy Scouts. In Alpert's film. they are hammering sharpened stakes into a concealed pit, reminiscent of the Viet Cong's "punji sticks" that impaled U.S. soldlers in Vietnam. Alpert reports this as if it were a childish prank.

The liberals are right on El Salvador, as far as news coverage is concerned: it's Vietnam all over again. In other words, the communist guerrillas are okay guys and gals; the U.S. is on the side of the devil.

Meanwhile human rights abuses by rightwing death squads and extremist factions of the government forces are played up; atrocities by the guerrillas, like the massacre of civilians reported by the government February 2 are practically ignored. We see sickening footage of the government's victims, but get one-sentence reports of similar acts by the Left.

One wonders: are these intrepid reporters so naive as to think the guerrillas would carry Soviet-made weapons? In the State Department White Paper on El Salvador of February 1981, documented proof was supplied of the Salvadoran communists' negotiations for weapons with nearly every Soviet bloc country. But the weapons actually funneled to the guerrillas through Cuba and its Central American puppet, Nicaragua, have been exclusively of non-communist manufacture. U.S.-made M-16s lost in Vietnam have been turning up in El Salvador.

As far as human rights violations are concerned, they occur every day in El Salvador.

Study On Diabetes **Underway**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Recent advances in diabetes treatment enable diabetics to maintain tighter rein on their amounts of blood sugar. But still unanswered is whether those improvements will prevent the cornplications of diabetes.

The National Institute of Arthritis, Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases is beginning a major, nationwide study that may take 10 to 15 years — aimed at finding the agawer to that critical question.

Dr. Lester Falans, acting director of the institute, said the relationship between blood sugar control and the complications of the metabolic disorder has been the single most important and controversial issue facing diabetes researchers.

"If it turns out to be positive; that is, that" you can reverse or prevent these things from occurring, why of course that will have a major impact on the disease and the cost of the disease in terms of human suffering and death and cost to the economy," Salans said. Diabetes, which affects 11 million

Americans, is basically a failure of the pancreas to manufacture enough insulin for the body's normal utilisation of car-bohydrates. Without adequate insulin, the blood of a diabetic becomes overloaded with sugar, a potentially fatal condition. But even with insulin injections and special

diets, diabetes still have been killing about 35,000 Americans a year. Its side effects, which can include stroke, blindness, heart disease, kidney failure, gangrene and nerve damage, affect tens of thousands more. Development of the insulin pump has

enabled diabetics to achieve tight blood glucose control. The portable pumps automatically deliver, around the clock, a continuous flow of insulin of the blo

Tests have shown insulin levels as well as other aspects of blood chemistry are very close to normal in patients using insulin

The new government-sponsored study will examine whether tight control of blood glucose levels can prevent, delay or decrease development of the early complications that affect blood vessels. Disbetic retinopathy damage to blood vessels in the eye - will be the primary complication to be assessed.

Twenty-one medical institutions will participate. Limited studies of about 200 insulin-dependent diabetic volunteers will be done first to confirm that diabetics on a tight control program can maintain better blood sugar control than those on conventional insulin injections.

If so, the plan is to move into the main phase which will involve 400 to 600 volunteers, half with no evidence of retinopathy and the other half with early signs of this disorder.

Participants will be assigned randomly to either the tight control or the conventional treatment group.

Soviets Gain Upper Hand In Iran

LPGA magazine?"

WASHINGTON - The Russian presence in Iran has come a long way since the day a Tehran mob stormed the Russian Embassy and slaughtered 38 diplomats and three Armenians who had taken refuge there.

That happened in 1829, and relations between the two neighbors have fluctuated ever since. Now, American intelligence analysis believe, the Russians are enjoying more influence in Iran than at any time since World War II.

In fact, a secret CIA cable from Tehran in November 1978 warned that the Soviets were working behind the scenes for the shah's overthrow, which actually occurred a few weeks later.

The cable mentioned a Czech offer of arms to the shah's opposition, and noted that the Communist Tudeh Party was quite willing to "cooperate with Iranian religious leaders in overthrowing the shah, if the opposition called for the shah's resignation and the legalization of all political parties, and advocated waging an armed struggle if the shah did not resign."

Two months later, the shah was gone and Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini was the new Iranian strongman. The Soviets were not pleased with the holy man at first; he denounced the Soviets as imperialists second only to the United States.

Moscow-directed Communists demonstrated against Khoemini in January and February 1979, and instigated strikes in the Khuzistan oliflekis.

But the Soviets, recognizing the reality of Khomeini's power, have subsequently made their accommodation with the mullah, on the surface at least. At the same time, in the Soviet tradition of playing both ends against the middle, hard-core Communist elements went underground and became part of the leftist guerrillas responsible for assaminating dozens of Khomeini's henchmen.

A secret CIA report shown to my associate Dale Van Atta notes that the Soviets have been skillfully exploiting Iran's isolation from the West. Members of the Tudeh Party, which is estimated to number 18,000 have attained influential middle-level positions in the

Khomeini government, and have begun infiltrating at the higher levels as well.

The Communists may hold as many as onethird of the top John in communications, the banking and oil industries and some key ministries, according to intelligence reports. They ingratiate themselves with the theocratic regime by dutifully—if cynically observing Moslem religious rituals. And they gave Khomeini their enthusiastic support during the bloodbath that followed the shah's

ouster. Tudeh's stalwarts have been augmented by anywhere from 2,000 to 5,000 Soviet advisers, including M Farst-speaking KGB officials who were invited by Khomeini to beef up his security forces last October. After uncovering a homb planted in their digs at the Tehran Hilton, the KGB experts moved their school for spies to Saltanatabad, a Tehran suburb that was once the headquarters of SAVAK, the shah's dreaded secret police.

Western intelligence analysts suspect the Sovieta are working determinedly to gain control of the Iranian intelligence and security forces against the day when the

systollah dies. That would put them in the cathird seat for the ensuing power struggle. There are other ominous signs of growing Soviet influence in Iran:

Soviet weapons, including Katyusha rocket launchers, are flowing into the country, along with Soviet military instructors.

- Khomeini has made contact with the Cubans, and is considering opening an embeary in Havana.

-- Soviet advisers have urged him to replace the dubiously loyal Iranian Army with his dedicated Revolutionary Guarda, and have helped build a training camp in Khorasan province that can accommodate 2.500 recruits.

- The Kremlin has also been amuseling clandestine agents into Iran, some of whom apparently have orders to kill leaders of the anti-Khomeini underground who are also anti-Communist.

- More than half of Iran's trade is now with the Soviet bloc. Trade between the Sovict Union and Iran last year amounted to more than \$1 billion.

Bench Making Transition To Hot Corner

TAMPA, Fis. (UPI) - Johnny Bench is no Brooks Robinson - but then, he knows that.

Playing third base for the Cincinnati Reds, he's still the best catcher they ever had. Great hands, good reflexes, fine throwing arm and he'll need them all at his new position.

Watching him trying to put a cap on it brings back memories of Pepper Martin, who played for the old St. Louis Cardinals' Gashouse Gang. Pepper's best position was the outfield. He'd try anything, though. That included third base and when he came in to play it, some people were afraid to look. They thought he'd get killed.

But he fooled them all and did a pretty fair job. Whatever balls he couldn't grab, he'd knock down with some part of his body, then usually throw

Johnny Bench, you might say, belongs to the Pepper Martin school. He isn't the least bit intimidated by his new assignment.

Without showing much concern, he said, "I'm confident I'm gonna face some tough plays. I like playing third base. I don't think I'll ever catch anymore. At

least, I hope it doesn't come to that." The switching of Bench, if you remember, all came about last year. He caught for the Reda for 13 years,

catching more games than any receiver in history except Al Lopez, and he had won the National League's MVP award twice, as well as being tapped for 13 All-Star games and participating in four World Series when he told the Reds he was tired of catching.

That didn't go over too well with management but it gave him a chance to play first base and he was doing all right there until he fractured his left ankle sliding into second in May. He returned to the lineup in September and wound up

hitting 309, his best mark ever. While Bench was sidelined last year, Dan Driessen reclaimed the first base job, one he felt was his, anyway, and the only other spot left for Bench was third. Everybody's really been helpful to me," Bench said with regard to the switch, "They realize it's new for me and that I wanna do the best I can.'

Actually, Bench isn't handling third base for the first time for the Reds. He has done so before although the last time he played there was five years ago.

"You get a much different perspective t third than you do when you're catching," said the 34-year-old slugger, who won 10 straight Gold Gloves from 1968 to 1977. "When you're behind the plate, you're squatting down and the ball is angled down to you.

"At third base, you're in a standing up position and the ball is generally hit on the ground to you. I can signal the pitcher what to throw when I'm catching but I can't tell the hitter where to hit the ball at

Dave Concepcion, the Reda' All-Star shortstop, has been especially helpful to Bench.

In the Reds' spring training opener Wednesday against the Pirates in Bradenton, Bench got his first chance in the second inning. He went into the hole to grab Willie Montanez's sharply hit two-bouncer and threw him out at first. "That's one," Concepcion encouraged

him. "I'm gonna count 'em this year." Bench got his next chance in the fifth. The ball was hit into the hole again, and once again he made the play to first for the putout.

"See that," Concepcion said to him, "I didn't even come over there. I knew you had it all the time."

Bench couldn't help but smile. With a little help from a good friend and a great glove like Concepcion, he may make 'em forget all about l'epper

Florida Weather Haunts PGA At Inverrary

LAUDERHILL, Fla. (UPI) - Florida weather has been playing havor with the men's pro golf tour.

In last week's Bay Hill Classic, it took two days to play the second round and the tournament didn't end until Monday

after a scheduled 36-hole Sunday finale was halved by rain. This week's Inverrary Classic could be facing a worse fate. The Inverrary's opening round, scheduled for Thursday, had to be postponed until today after seven hours of heavy rain left

the course unplayable. And although officials don't expect more rain this weekend, they didn't expect Thursday's either. "Weather in south Florida this time of year is so unpredictable that sometimes it sneaks up on the forecasters," said a tournament spokesman. "The forecast for Thursday was for a 30 percent chance of showers, which is common

around here. Nobody expected it to rain as much as it did." The rain began at 1 a.m. EST Thursday and didn't let up until 8. Everything was held in abeyance until 9:30 when officials threw in the towel.

Present plans, weather permitting, are to play the 18-hole first and second rounds today and Saturday and - as was planned at Bay Hill -- to trim the 144-man field to the low 60 scorers for a 36-hole windup Sunday.

If the revised schedule holds up, this could be the most glamourous tournament at Inverrary since the Tournament Players Championship was held here in 1976.

Jack Nicklaus committed to play at the last moment, Tom Watson showed up for the first time since 1977, and defending champion Tom Kite, last year's leading money winner on the tour, beat Nicklaus and Denis Watson in a sudden-death playoff Monday to win at Bay Hill.

The only major absentees are Craig Stadler, this year's leading money winner; Tom Weiskopf; 1979 Inverrary champ Larry Nelson, and former U.S. Open champ Jerry Pate, who

had planned to play until illness forced him to withdraw Wenesday.

Ray Floyd, who will be defending his Tournament Players Championship title next week outside of Jacksonville, Fla., said the fact that the Inverrary purse has been increased by \$100,000 to \$400,000 had nothing to do with the star-spangled field.

"I don't play a tournament because of the purse," said Floyd. "If I didn't like the golf course, we could be playing for \$1 million and I wouldn't show up. I bet half of the top 20 players here couldn't tell you what the purse is."

Floyd said a better reason for playing this week is to get ready for the \$500,000 Tournament Players Championship, which is being held for the first time this year on the new Players Club built by the tour members.

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

Soaring

The Next Best Thing To Sprouting Wings

It's a hobby that has been approved by the U.S. government. Otherwise, why would they be sending the space shuttle Columbia on it's third mission March 22?

The hobby is gliding, or soaring as some prefer to call it.

"The world's largest glider is the space shuttle," says
Knut Kjenslie, owner of the Seminole Flying Ranch, Highway 419, Oviedo. "When it reenters the earth's atmosphere it has no power of its own. The shuttle floats
through the air relying on the wind and thermals to keep it

on course. It is a glider."

But while piloting the space shuttle has been reserved for a few select astronauts, piloting the more traditionalsized glider is a sport open to almost anyone.

"Right now we have about 20-25 students who are learning to fly on the training gliders," Kjenslie says. "We also have students who are flying our high performance gliders and engine-powered planes but that takes a little more training."

Kjenslie, who until recently was an engineer in Colorado, says he inoved to Oviedo and purchased the flying ranch to "do something that I've loved doing for a long time — fly ... fulltime.

"There's nothing like flying," says the Norwegian-born pilot, instructor and flying ranch owner. "When you get up there, under those clouds, it is so peaceful, so quiet and relaxing. You can get away from it all. And the beauty of a glider is that you don't even have the roar of an engine. It's just you and the sky, like a bird."

Kjensile, who has about 10 years of flying to his credit, operates the Oviedo ranch with the assistance of in-See FLY, Page 2

structors Ken Goshorn and Roger Gottschall, both who have been flying for 30 years.

"Ken flies like most people walk," says James Alton, 23, of Titusville, as he completed his second glider flight under Goshorn's tutelage. "It's second nature to him."

"I fly engine-powered planes and gliders," says student Gary Adair, 29, of Winter Springs. "The big difference in the two is that in a glider you have to remind yourself that you aren't supposed to hear engines, so you don't worry when it's quiet. I enjoy flying both planes.'

"Gliders work on the principal of the earth warming the air, causing thermals or uplifting winds, which pick the plane up, thrust it upwards and sail it along," Kjenslie says. "On an overcast day, with a good number of clouds, you're bound to get some good thermals and enjoy a good



"To get the glider off the ground, we have two tow planes," he adds. "We hook the glider to the plane with a long cord and pull it along behind until both pilots are comfortable with their position. Then either of the pilots can release the glider and it's on its own."

But how safe is a glider? What if the wind stops? Will the glider "drop" from the sky like a rock?

"Actually gliders are much safer than engine-powered planes," Kjenslie says. "They are built of lighter materials, are smaller than most engined planes and can be set down relatively easily.

"One thing you should remember about a glider," he says. "You start without an engine and you come back without an engine. You don't have that same expectation in an engine-powered flight. Oh, once in awhile you'll hear of a glider pilot landing in an airport other than the one he wanted to land in because he ran out of wind. But that's really no problem. You rarely hear of a glider fatality, though."

Kjenslie says on days when weather conditions are good, glider pilots can take their crafts up to about 7,000 to 8,000 feet, reaching speeds of over 60 mph.

"Here at the flying ranch we'll teach anyone who wants to learn," Kjenslie says. "If a person is under age, we must have his parent's consent before we'll train him."

The Seminole Flying Ranch is open everyday but Thursdays from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. However, Kjenslie suggests interested persons call the ranch to check weather conditions before making the drive.

The cost of the glider training is about \$800, "for someone learning to fly from scratch," Kjenslie says. "That gives you about 20 training flights, including seven

'We also offer rides to those who don't want to pilot the planes but just want to enjoy flying," he adds. "In the basic two-seated trainer gliders, it cost \$20 per person for about 20 minutes of flight and for about 30 minutes in the high performance glider it costs \$35.

"We teach the facts here," Kjenslle says. "We can't teach common sense. We can only hope the person piloting the craft will treat it responsibly. If so, there's nothing more challenging or more rewarding than flying. You've never felt so free than when you're up there," he said, looking toward the sky. "You're up there soaring with the

Blood Drips Coldly From 'Strike Force'

By DAVID HANDLER "Strike Force" on ABC doesn't so much exploit violence as it does our fear of it. This show preys on its audience in precisely the same way its weekly mass murderers prey on the innocent citizens of Los

Angeles. It is oversimplified, manipulative and morally repugnant. Blood drips from its fangs.

Each episode finds L.A. in the grip of terror. In one episode, someone is walking out of discos with innocent young women and brutally killing them - five in the last three weeks. In another episode, a Manson-like religious cult has savagely murdered 18 people in their homes, leaving the phrase "The day of my wrath has come" scrawled in blood on kitchen walls.

In yet another episode, three guys are terrorizing senior citizens by shoving them to the ground, stabbing them and stealing their money and jewelry.

Left with no recourse, the police department calls in its elite Strike Force team,

(Robert Stack), Murphy, who is divorced, often works late and sleeps on the office sofa. The other members of his paramilitary unit are ready to work around the clock, too. They live to fight crime. There's Strobber (Dorian Harewood), who's black; Gunzer (Richard Romanus), who's ethnic; Osborn (Michael Goodwin), who's not: and Rosie (Trisha Noble), who's a woman.

What defines "Strike Force" as exploitation is that it never bothers to explain why our weekly urban terrorists do what they do.

These are wind-up lunatics not flesh and blood. They simply exist to scare us and to be plot catalysts. As for our heroes, they are mere plot devices, too. It is their role to go on the weekly manhunt.

We see the crime take place. A suave hipster picks up a girl at a disco, invites her to a party. She is sweet. innocent, lonely. "He really seems to like me," she tells a

The hipster takes her to a headed by square-jawed mansion, deserted except for

thought you were taking me to a party," she says, nervous. "You are the party, sweetheart," he laughs. She tries to escape. They grab her, beat her, hold her captive for several days, rape her, kill her and dump her body on the nearest heach

We don't see all the violence - though you get the feeling the producers would show it if they could get away with it. We do see her bloodled corpse being zipped into a body bag, and Murphy's jaw tensing in righteous indignation as he observes.

"Crime gets uglier every time," he grunts. "It used to be rape. Now it's gang rape. The world is off its axis." Strobber nods in agreement. "It's a world gone mad, Frank Lady mud wrestlers, male strippers..." These bits of taxicab philosophy are common.

Then the chase is on. Our heroes follow a predictable course of stolen credit cards, stake-outs and lucky hunches. They get their villains, and they aren't soft about it.
