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Mother charged in death of daughter, friend

Deputies from the Seminole County Sheriff's Office arrested Mary Hill at her Jacana Court home Tuesday after she refused to turn herself in.

Hill is charged with two counts of vehicular homicide for the death her daughter, Amanda, 13, and her 14-year-old friend Carrie Brown. On Aug. 7, 2000, the first

According to a Florida Highway Patrol (FHP) investigation, Hill crossed the centerline, overcorrected and

Civic Center gets catty

More than 200 cats expected at Saturday's show

SANFORD — Hundreds of cats will strut their stuff in front of the judges this weekend during the second City Beautiful Cat Club's Spring Fling cat show.

About 200 cats of various breeds will compete in the Cat Fanciers' Association (CFA) sanctioned show Saturday and Sunday in the Civic Center. The felines will be judged in one of three areas — kittens, adults and premiers.

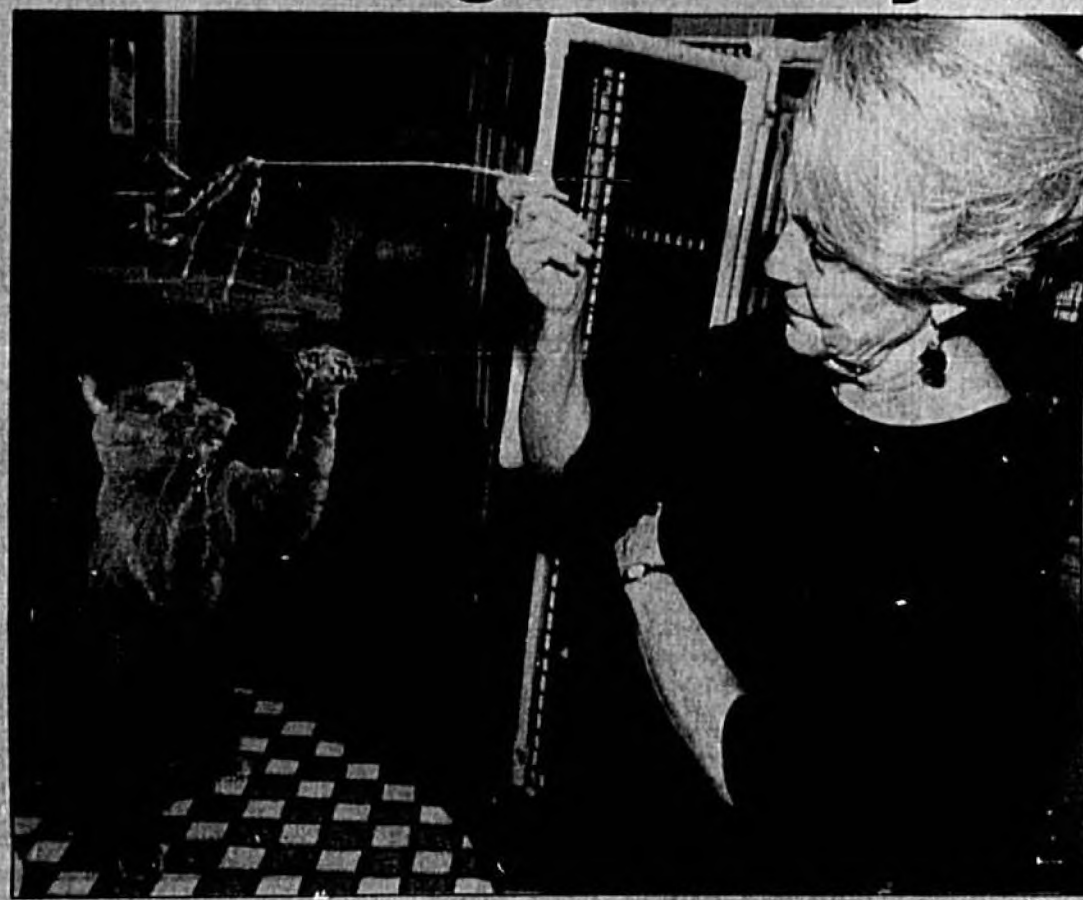
Show manager Emily Turner of Longwood plans on showing several of her British short hairs, including Harts Desire and Bodacious. Both come from a long line of champions, and Turner believes both should do well in this weekend's show.

"Harts Desire has done well at previous shows," Turner said. "She has had one of the most successful litters of British short hairs bred in this country."

Turner's love for British short hairs began about 10 years ago when two of the furry felines joined her household.

"We looked through various cat books and decided on the British short hair," Turner said. "They are a very affectionate cat and are considered the Golden Retriever of the cat world."

A decade later, Turner's cat family has grown, and so has her hobby for exhibiting and breeding British short hairs. Last year, she organized the first City Beautiful Cat Club Spring Fling cat show in Sanford.

"The Cat Club started looking around for a place to do the show, and I truly fell in love with the Sanford Civic Center," Turner said. "I never worked with friendlier people than the people from Sanford. I never heard anyone say no to me. It has been great."

So great, in fact, Turner has already made reservations for next year — even before the doors open for this year's show.

This weekend's show begins Friday when participants start setting up cages for their beloved felines. On Saturday morning, the cats begin arriv-

ing and will start entering the ring at 10 a.m. to be judged.

The judges will look at every animal in each area and choose their top 10 based on a written set of standards determined by the CFA, which is the largest cat registry in the world. According to Turner, cat shows, unlike their canine counterparts, do not award a single top honor, but award points depending on how well a cat meets the CFA standards.

The CFA is a non-profit organization founded in 1906 when it held its first licensed shows in Buffalo and Detroit. Today, more than 400 shows are held

annually worldwide under CFA guidelines.

The CFA, which can be found on the Internet at www.cfainc.org, presently recognizes 33 pedigreed breeds in the championship class, two breeds in the provisional class and five breeds in the miscellaneous class. Breeds include the popular Persian, the American short hair, the Devon Rex and the Javanese.

According to Turner, this weekend's cat show isn't just for feline exhibitors and breeders. Anyone who likes cats

Airport to restructure debt, pay off loan from city

SANFORD — Sanford Aviation Authority board members voted unanimously Tuesday morning to consolidate the facility's debt and immediately repay the city of Sanford the balance of a \$1 million loan granted to SAA in 1998.

Outgoing Sanford Mayor Larry Dale, scheduled to preside over his final Sanford City Commission meeting later Tuesday evening, said he planned to make a motion to the city commission to earmark the repayment for future development of the airport's commerce park.

Loan documentation and closing on the debt restructuring will likely be completed by late April. Airport Director Victor White said market conditions and current interest rates on borrowed money make for a timely combination for loan consolidation. The SAA currently has eight loans outstanding with an approximate balance of \$4 million, including approximately \$951,000 owed to Sanford.

Since the original five year loan from the City was taken out in 1998, the SAA has been making monthly payments of \$5,000 on the principal of the loan.

"The board plans to consolidate the eight loans into one," said White at the conclusion of Tuesday's meeting.

"We'll be getting a better interest rate and a lower month-

MADD honors Seminole deputies

SANFORD — Five Seminole County Sheriff's Deputies were honored this week by the State offices of Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) for their local efforts in combating the problem of drunk drivers.

With scores of law enforcement officials from around the state gathered in Tallahassee, deputies Dave Kohn, Mike Cannaday, James Ingram, Bill Morris, Jr., and Raines Freeman were honored in a ceremony on the steps of the Old Capitol Building.

The quintet accounted for more than 500 DUI arrests last year in Seminole County. Kohn wracked up the most DUI collars with 156 while Cannaday made 110 DUI arrests, Ingram 108, and Morris and Freeman 102 each. Seminole County Sheriff's

Office Chief Deputy Steve Harriett said the remarkable thing about the group's DUI arrest numbers is that they are executed in addition to the deputy's regular patrol duties.

"Unlike some counties that have dedicated DUI patrol units, our officers approach it as all part of a day's work," Harriett stated.

"Frankly we execute more DUI arrests than other agencies that dedicate patrols specifically for DUI offenders. The untold story about this year's award is that we have many other

deputies that make 40 or 50 DUI arrests per year but are under MADD's criteria of 100 arrests. It's a total team effort."

Harriett said the Sheriff's office is responsible for about half of the 2,000 DUI arrests within the County in a normal year. Agencies such as the Florida Highway Patrol and police departments within the County's seven municipalities account for the other half. According to Harriett DUI arrest numbers around

Task force hopes to prevent child abuse

April has been designated as National Child Abuse Prevention Month. The goal is to raise public awareness of child abuse issues and to teach parents and caregivers how to prevent this continuing tragedy.

People in northern Seminole County are well aware of this problem. Recently, a 33 year old Sanford man was arrested for

the beating death of a two year old boy.

Cleo Cohen at the Sanford Police Department said the child was severely beaten, that this was not just a one-time striking. The boy had bruises to his head, face, abdomen, pelvic area, back, arms and legs.

Figures for the first three months of this year are not available yet, but in 1999, 85,803 chil-

County tests high-tech courtroom hearings

SANFORD — Call it Seminole County's version of "Court TV."

Officials within the Seminole County judicial system began new procedures this week in which the first court appearances of adult prisoners held at the John E. Polk Correctional Facility are done via a television link between the jail and the Seminole County Courthouse in

downtown Sanford.

If all goes well in a trial run with one judge testing the system this week, other judges may sign on to using the television system for first appearances as well.

Horace McMorrow, Seminole County Deputy Court Administrator, explained the new procedure is designed to streamline the initial hearing

## Turn on your lights

My nephew in Ohio inherited a small collection of antique automobiles many years ago, one of which was a 1918 Sears. While I wouldn't try to drive it on Interstate-4, it was able, at one time, to reach speeds of possibly 15 to 20 miles per hour. It had a kerosene lamp in the front, and a small one covered in red glass in the rear. They were the forerunners of headlights and tail lights.

The tail light didn't shine more brightly when one applied the brakes — it wasn't a stop light. That was added to automobiles many years later. Looking at that front light, it was more to show that the vehicle was coming toward you than to light up the road. Most people wouldn't dare drive at night in that vehicle anyway. These days, we have running lights, high and low beam headlights, fog lamps, and parking lights in the front, tail lights, stop lights and parking lights in the back. And for both front and back, we have directional lights. Except for the headlights, every one of them is to alert other drivers. That's nothing new, we should all be aware of that.

For many drivers these days, the headlights are the only ones they believe are necessary, and that is for THEM to see at night. All too many motorists fail to turn them on at other times to let people know they are there. This is especially true in the rain or fog.

For many drivers, the lack of courtesy by other drivers in using the lights on their vehicles makes them angry, and very often, in peril.

I recently waited to make a left turn onto U.S. Highway 17-92 from Fulton Street in Sanford, with a car coming toward me from the other side of the highway, not using any directionals. I waited and waited for him to drive across the highway, which is what people do when they don't indicate turn signals. But this driver made a left turn anyway, never turning on his directionals. It irritated me. What was even more irritating was that this was one of our higher ranking police officers in his private vehicle.

As far as I am concerned, parking lights can go by the wayside. I see no use for them. But directionals, stop lights, and running lights, or headlights on during the early or late hours, foggy conditions or rain — are necessary.

I want to see cars coming my way. I want to know when someone plans to turn. I want other motorists to show some concern for the well-being of others on the road.

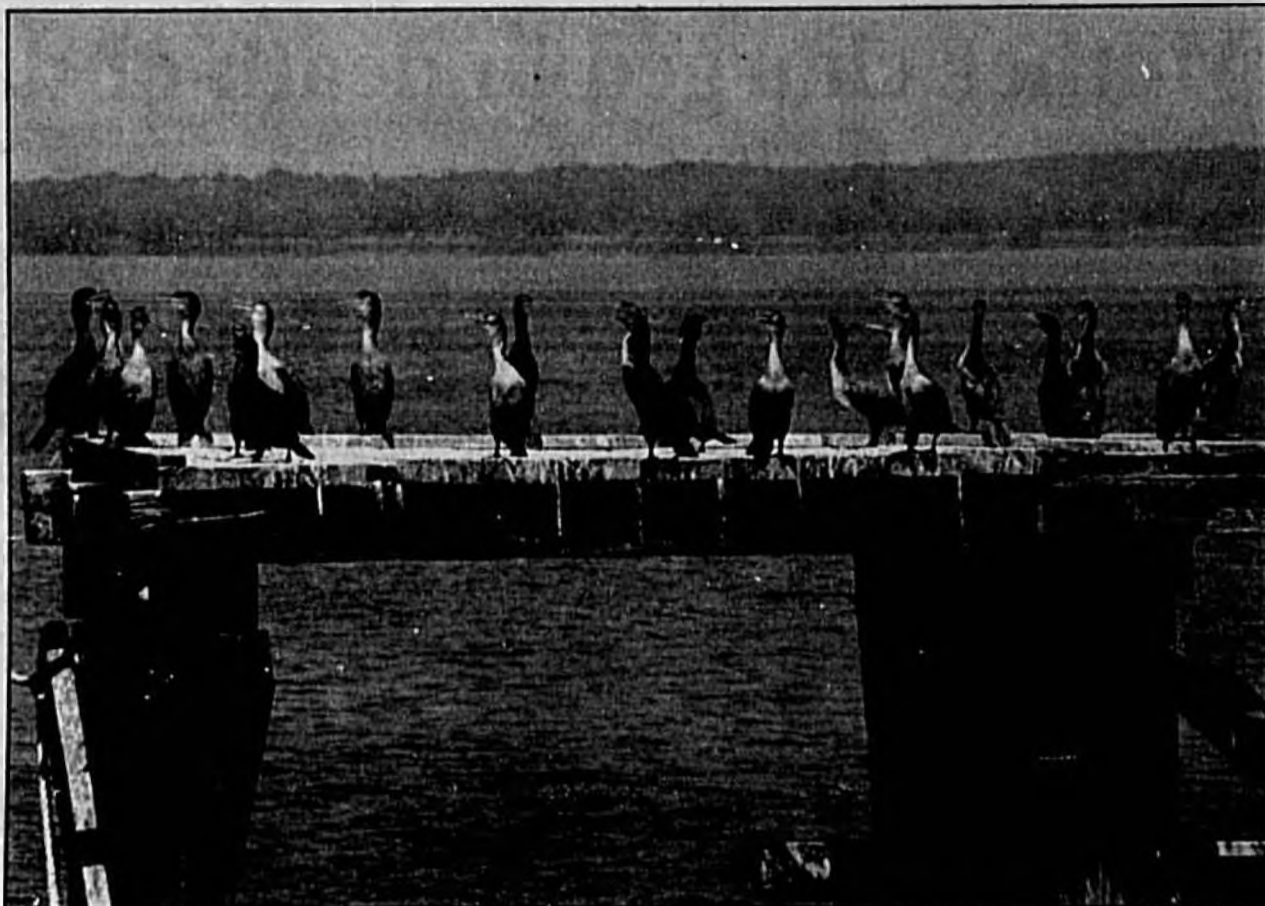
That's what I want, but chances of getting it are slim.

In Nova Scotia, and other areas of the Americas and the world, running lights or low beam headlights are REQUIRED BY LAW at ALL times when a vehicle is moving day and night. I like this and wish our nation would adopt a similar requirement. Auto manufacturers install switches that automatically turn on running lights the minute the engine is started. This would really save lives in our state and nation.

Why don't they? Is it a matter of cost? Heck, they could eliminate parking lights which would help alleviate the cost.

Oh well, these are just my observations. Keep coming at me without lights or directionals, and we'll probably meet somewhere along the way — in what I hope would be nothing more than a fender-bender.

## Cloning: It denies our uniqueness

Last Sunday, my son asked why he had to go to church when he was having a perfectly good time watching "Scooby Doo." The main reason, I told him, was to understand that God went to the trouble of creating him as a person unlike anyone else who ever lived and that

He put him on this Earth for a reason. (The other reason he had to go to church was because I said so.)

I thought about this incident when I read that the members of Congress had heard expert testimony on human cloning this week. Now that several groups are trying to produce a human baby, the cloning debate has shifted from ethics classes to Capitol Hill offices.

One group, headed by a Kentucky professor and an Italian fertility doctor, says it expects to clone a baby within the next 12 to 24 months. A cult leader who says humans were created in a space-alien lab leads another group. This group is trying to clone the dead 10-month-old son of a grief-stricken couple.

The cloning attempts feel like a race, as if the scientists were creating a revolutionary new drug instead of a human being. It doesn't seem to matter that the risks are still enormous.

A recent New York Times story pointed out that, four years after scientists cloned Dolly the sheep, cloned animals still have a high rate of developmental delays, heart defects, lung problems and malfunctioning immune systems. Indeed, fewer than 3 percent of all animal cloning efforts succeed.

Rael, the cult leader, explains away such concerns. If defects are detected in the fetus, it will be aborted and another surrogate will immediately be implanted with another embryo. Rael doesn't acknowledge that certain defects cannot be seen at birth. Some cloned mice, for example, appeared normal but then grew grotesquely fat as young adults.

Based on health risks alone, a ban on human cloning is an easy call. But what about when the glitches are fixed?

People cringed at in vitro fertilization, too, when it was first introduced, making comparisons to Frankenstein's monster. Now, thousands of babies are born every year through the process.

Some say cloning should be allowed in a nation that values individual choices. "I don't think the federal government has the constitutional authority to regulate how I have children," one philosophy professor said.

If our problem with cloning is that it denies the genealogical uniqueness of individuals, well, we already have such humans in identical twins.

Yet, I can't help thinking about my conversation with my son. I like to believe there is something of the divine in every human, that some gentle hand purposefully mixes an infinite variety of ingredients to create something the world has never seen. I remember last year when researchers announced they had finally mapped the human genome and discovered that the number and type of genes in a human and a common field mouse were not that different. In other words, the mystery of who we are and what we become was not solved, but deepened.

Cloning, it seems, brings us closer than we have ever come to removing what makes us truly human. It would seem to turn babies into objects to be custom-built and paid for by check or credit card.

Perhaps someday we will find good reasons to clone humans. Until then, I want to believe there is a divine hand in our creation. I want to feel assured that when we say a baby is "created in His image," I know who we're talking about.

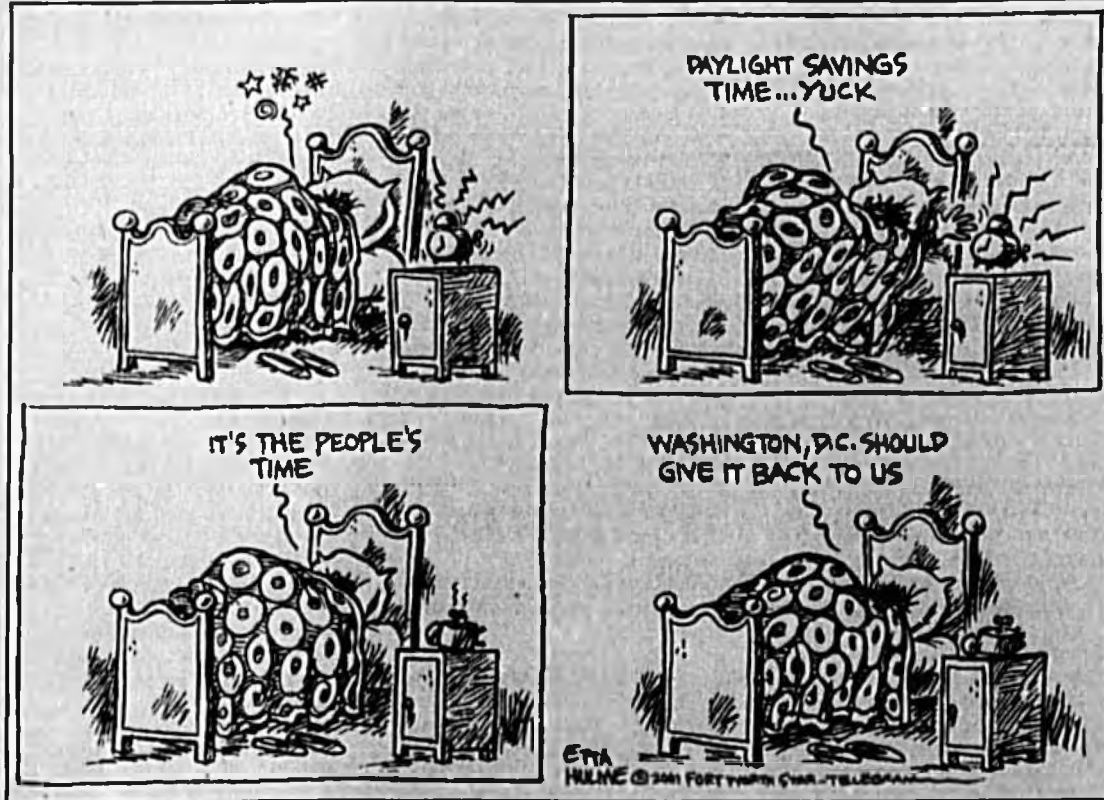

## The environmentalists' big blunder

The environmentalists have had a long run as one of liberalism's most successful fronts, battling triumphantly for an Edenic vision of America against the evil forces of corporate capitalism that (allegedly) wanted to pollute it, or even simply destroy it, in the name of profits. But there are signs that the environmental lobby may have overplayed its hand, at least in one important category, and that it may shortly start losing some of its hitherto dependable popularity.

Let me begin by distinguishing the environmental lobbyists I am talking about from the many Americans who have a basic instinctive sympathy for such indisputable goods as clean water, clean air, and the myriad furry and feathery things with which we share the earth. Such people are, inevitably, easy prey for the big organizations that run the environmentalist show, call the shots, and raise huge sums of money for causes that sound much better than they really are. But it is important to distinguish the two categories nevertheless, and to stress that I am talking only about the hard-bitten professionals and their nuttier followers who spend years living in

the tops of allegedly endangered trees.

For decades, one of the standard targets of what Rush Limbaugh calls "the environmentalist wackos" has been any utility that dared to propose building an electric power plant. Nuclear power was, of course, completely out of the question, on the theory that one could explode at any moment and kill hundreds of thousands of people by radiation poisoning. As it happens, this is one of those rare things that simply cannot physically occur, but the fear of a nuclear holocaust — or, worse yet, of a stealthy death by invisible rays — has stopped the American nuclear power industry in its tracks. (France and Japan, to take only two examples, are smarter, deriving the bulk of their electric power from this clean and remarkably safe source.)

But oil and coal — the dependable old "fossil fuels" — are also untouchable because of the pollutants they supposedly belch into the atmosphere. As for hydroelectric dams, you can depend on it that any patch of ground that will be flooded by the construction of one will turn out to be the last known habitat

of some species of animal, bird, or (far more often) insect you have never heard of before but which turns out to be a precious gem in the diadem of creation.

That leaves natural gas, which is already stretched to capacity under existing regulations (and requires, in any case, transportation through pipelines allegedly intolerable to wildlife), or wind or solar power, neither of which is either economical enough or capable of generating enough energy to justify relying on it.

You have probably long since guessed where this is heading. The state of California, whose citizens are sensitive to every vibration in the great web of life, hasn't allowed the building of a single new power plant in over 20 years — while its population has been skyrocketing, and new industries (in Silicon Valley and elsewhere) have come on line, demanding more and more electric power. About two months ago, the irresistible force of this growing demand for power finally smashed into the immovable object of California's hostility to power plants, and the good people of California were treated to the novel experience of "rolling blackouts," as one region of the state after another was temporarily deprived of electricity. What's more, the situation is predictably going to get

far worse this summer, when air conditioners become essential to make huge sections of the state livable.

California's politicians, whose only firm policy has been to keep energy costs low for consumers (i.e. voters), have panicked, and are paying huge sums to buy electricity out-of-state. That it will have to be paid for by either the consumers (heaven forbid!) or the taxpayers is a grim fact that, when it dawns on the voters, will probably end the presidential ambitions of the Democratic governor, Gray Davis.

And let us hope that it will also end Californians' long, unrequited love affair with blind environmentalism. It takes years to build a power plant of any kind, so they will have plenty of time, during the next eight or 10 steamy summers, to sit in the dark, when their turn comes, reading their electricity bill (or their tax bill) by candlelight and deciding whether they can bear the thought of depriving the red-striped pickleworm of its favorite habitat, if that's what a new dam would require. My guess is that they will decide to sacrifice the pickleworm — and a lot of loud-mouthed "environmentalists" too.

ly payment."

White said the majority of remaining loans outside of the Sanford city loan are with Bank of America.

"Most of the loans are due in the next two or three years and some of them are callable loans," said White.

He added that the debt consolidation would also include a line of credit with Bank of America for \$1.5 million, and that the SAA would save approximately \$30,000 to 50,000 in additional money with Bank of America waiving origination fees and closing costs on a new financing package that will stretch the pay-

off period over 15 years.

"I think earmarking the money for development of the commerce park makes good sense," said Dale. "And I think there will be a consensus from the Sanford city board to move in that direction."

Also during Tuesday's meeting, the board gently declined a request by a development group in West Orange County for a letter of support from the SAA.

The development group is proposing to build from scratch an airport in that portion of Orange County.

White said he had mixed emotions about the issue.


"As a lifetime airport manager

my philosophical mind set is the more airports the better," White said. "But this group has publicly stated one of their goals is to lure the Comair flight training academy away from Orlando Sanford International."

Board member Ken Wright said the development group's better route for support should be through Metro Plan Orlando (MPO).

Dale more succinctly summed up the SAA's lukewarm response for the letter of support.

"The development group has no airport, but has a seat on the MPO board. We have an airport, but have no seat on the MPO board," Dale said.

process in a number of ways and improve public safety concerns.

"The security of the citizens of Seminole County was part of the reason for the switch," said McMorrow. "The Courthouse was not really designed as a courthouse, it was originally designed as a County Service building. There is limited holding cell space and when we transport inmates here from the jail they are forced to share public corridor space with the general public and juries.

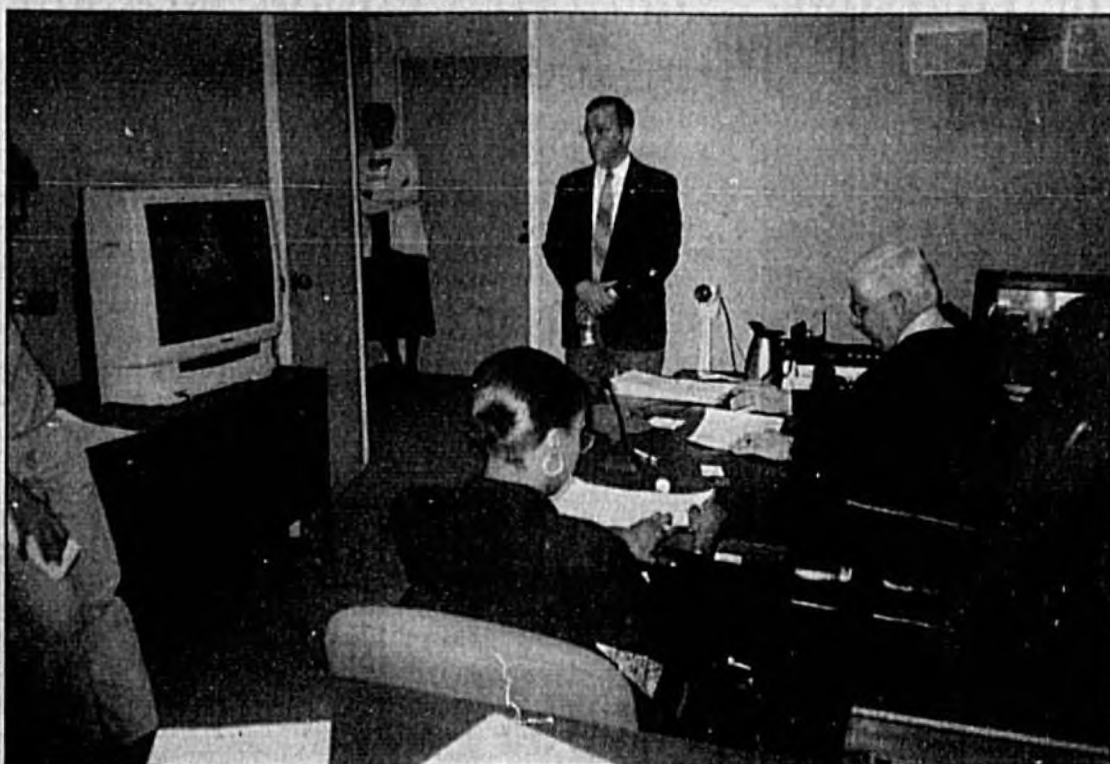
"The second reason behind the change is to bring about more affective utilization of time for court staff and judges."

McMorrow said by video processing initial hearings an hour of judge travel time is saved each day, and hour of State Attorney travel time is saved. Additional time savings are experienced with court administrative personnel.

The use of the television link precludes the necessity for contraband searches of inmates as they leave the jail, again upon their arrival at the court house, and upon their return to the Polk Correctional Facility.

On Monday afternoon Seminole County Court Judge Carmine Bravo appeared to smoothly adapt to the televised initial hearings as he communicated by audio and video with inmates while processing a number of initial hearings.

Meanwhile, in the public viewing room a video monitor offered a picture within a picture, using a split screen to show both Bravo's action on camera as well as inmate responses and pleas from the jail.

During the trial period this week, media and public access to view first hearing proceedings will be done by using a television monitor located at the Seminole County Courthouse. A second television monitor, located in the public area of the jail facility will eventually become the primary viewing site once that monitor is completely installed and fully operational.

McMorrow said the television approach is the result of a great deal of cooperation between Seminole County Court Administration, County Judges, the Sheriff's Office, Public Defender's Office, the State Attorney and the Clerk of

the Court's Office.

"We worked to establish a system that better serves the public while insuring the constitutional rights of those incarcerated," said McMorrow.

An audio tape of all hearings will be made and archived and the new video system automatically records the minutes of each hearing and can be down loaded in a matter of seconds, helping stem the flow of paperwork generated by each hearing.

McMorrow said the video system is designed to handle arraignments, parole violation hearings, pre-trial conferences, bond hearings and extradition hearings. If it continues to be

as successful as the first day's operation, Circuit Judges will likely begin using it in the near future as well.

"All things considered, it went very smoothly the first day," said McMorrow. "There were no major glitches and the process was speeded up at the jail end because inmates view a video tape explaining the new procedure and sign consent forms indicating they understand the process."

A broadcast multi-box will be added to the video link in the near future to allow radio and television stations covering trials and court proceedings to take direct audio and video feeds from the system.

see any and everything that surrounds the ship," he said.

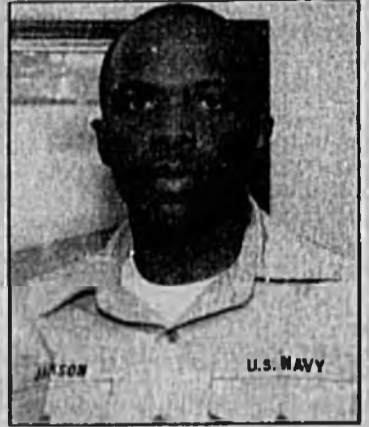
Some of the most exciting rewards about serving in the Navy are the different ports you get to see around the world.

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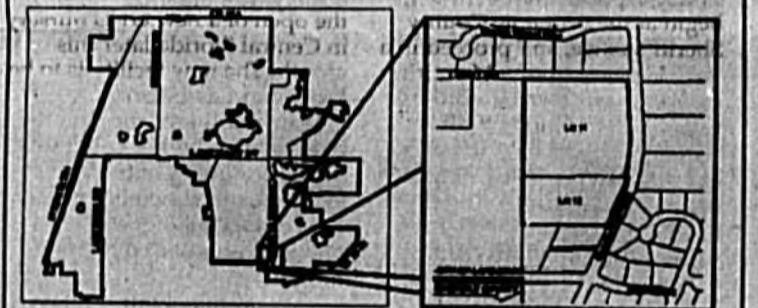

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# Pesky Jadera bug actually harmless

Maybe because of their red color or maybe because of the large quantities of bugs crawling everywhere, but many people become alarmed when large numbers of black and red colored bugs appear in their yards and gardens.

They can be found in central Florida every month of the year, with a peak occurring during the month of May. Mothers often become upset over their children's clothes becoming stained red from the squashed bodies of Jadera when their children play on infested lawns. The bugs actually aggregate to feed on seeds that have dropped to the ground from trees overhead, especially the goldenrain tree.

This bug is the perfect example of an insect that gives the impression of being a serious pest but is actually harmless.

Adults females deposit eggs in cracks and crevices of tree bark in the spring, about the time buds begin to open. Although they suck plant juices while feeding, they usually do not cause any harm to the trees on which they feed.

**Host Plants**  
 Jadera feeds mainly on seeds of the goldenrain tree, in south Florida they seem to prefer the balloonvine. Other plants in the soapberry family that includes the Litchi and the Longan, are reported as host for this insect. This insect has been found on a number of plants, such as chin-aberry, Althaea and Ficus, but the role these plants play in its life cycle is not very well known.

**Control**  
 In most situations, it is not necessary to control Jadera. Raking to remove the seeds on which they feed can be helpful to reduce the number of insects in your yard. A small concentration of insects on a plant can be destroyed by hand collecting.

If chemical control is necessary, use a low toxic insecticide such as malathion or sevin, applied to young, exposed bugs found on host trees. Repeat the application in 10-12 days if necessary, and always following the label indications.

**Biological Control**  
 Laboratory studies at the University of Texas in 1996, showed that Jadera and the boxelder bug can be controlled by using a spore dilution of the fungus Beauveria bassiana, a common insect pathogen. In the experiments 100% of the insects were killed in 8 days.

Biological controls such as the fungus Beauveria will make it possible that in the near future these pests could be controlled with biological insecticides, that are safe to use by homeowners and have a low environmental impact.

**Behavior**  
 Insects commonly hide in cracks and crevices in walls, door and window casings, and around foundations, as well as in tree holes and in large accumulations of debris. Adults are likely to come out of hiding and appear on light or white painted surfaces during warm days of winter or early spring.

**Insect Names**  
 This insect does not have a common name but is usually called the goldenrain tree bug. Jadera is the accepted name for this insect that has been mistakenly called by some people cotton stainer or boxelder bug.

Actually, the boxelder bug and Jadera are very closely related insects and it takes careful examination with a hand lens to tell them apart. In Texas, this insect is known as the red shouldered bug.

**Description**  
 Nymph or immature insects are predominantly reddish in color, with the thorax, antennae, beak, and legs brown. An adult Jadera is 0.4 to 0.5 inches long and 0.1 inches wide, with a black or brownish-black color, with bright red eyes, and stripes along the sides of the head and area in back of the head.

Jadera bugs are included in a group of insects called "scentless plant bugs", that produce little or no odor when crushed.

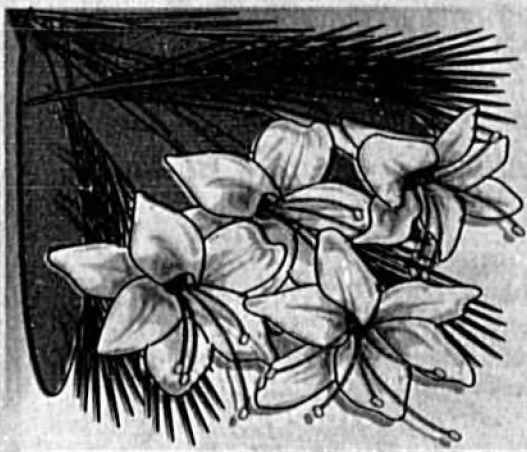

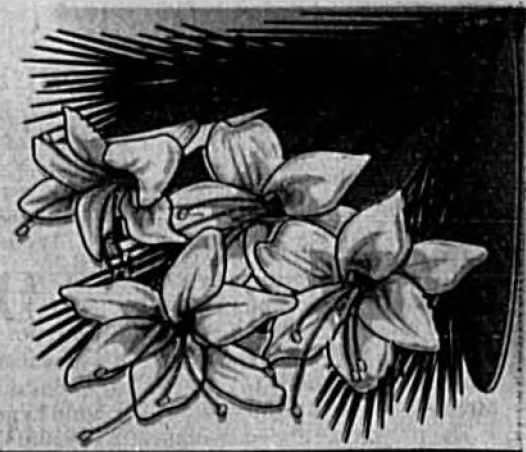

The Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) has set aside this weekend (April 7 and 8) as Free Freshwater Fishing Weekend in Florida.

During the free freshwater fishing weekend, anyone, including non-residents, can sportfish in any public freshwater lake or river in Florida without a fishing license. The Free Freshwater Fishing Weekend does not apply to anglers fishing in saltwater.

"The free fishing weekend provides anglers an opportunity to experience Florida's extraordinary fisheries," Ed Moyer, director of the FWC's Division of Fisheries, said. "It also can serve as a reminder to those who haven't been fishing in a while that it is a healthy, fun, outdoor experience."

During the free fishing period all other fishing laws and regulations will remain in effect. A copy of the Florida Freshwater Sport Fishing Guide and Regulations Summary is available at no cost from any fishing license vendor or FWC office.

Uriah Kimmig bounced back from a tough start last Monday to scattering five hits, while striking out five and walking no one, over five innings to raise his record to 2-1.

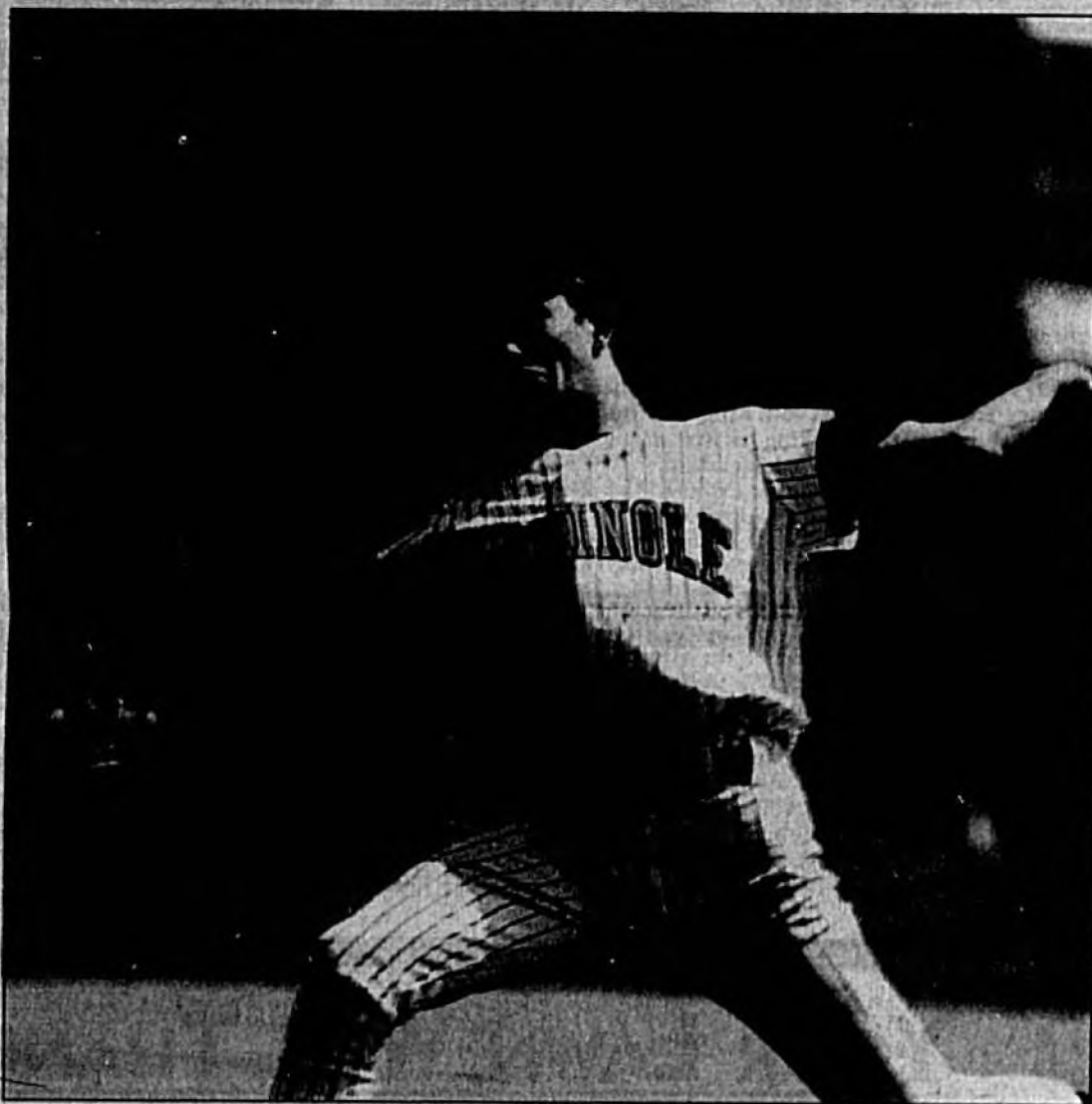
Victor Gilbert allowed two hits over the final two innings to close out the win.

Lake Brantley trailed 3-1, before battling back to tie the game at 3-3 at the end of regulation and explode for six runs on six hits in the top of the ninth inning.

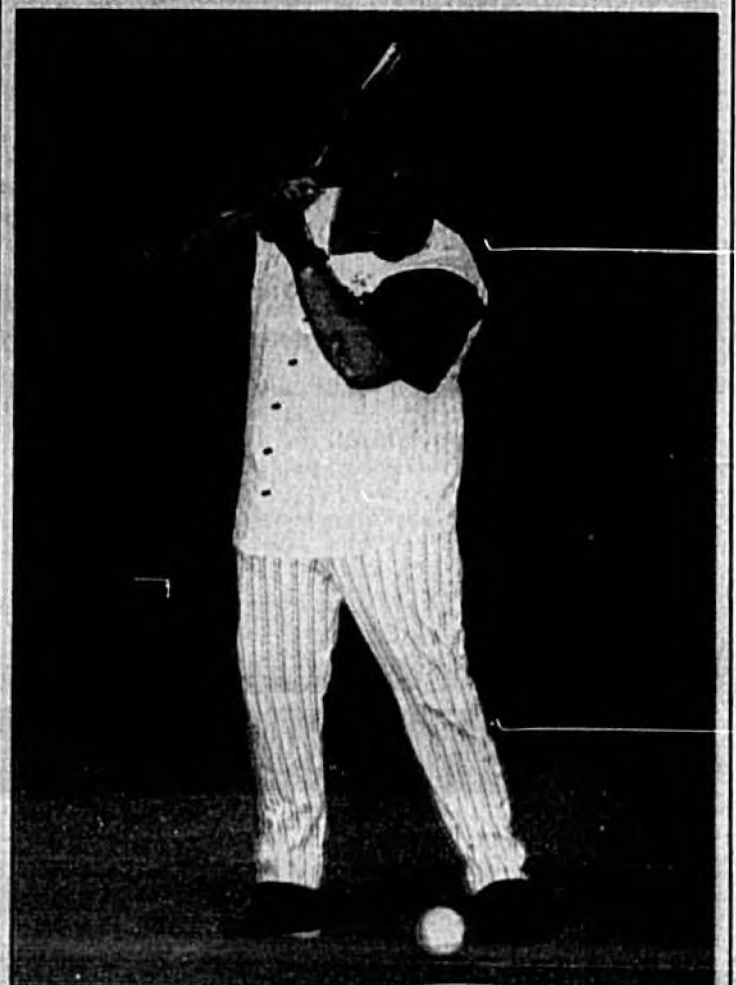
Brandner led the Patriots attack with four hits, including the game's only extra base hit, a double. Horal chipped in with three hits and three RBI.

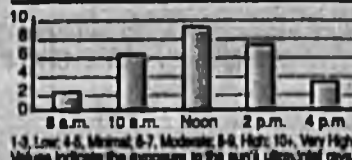

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
