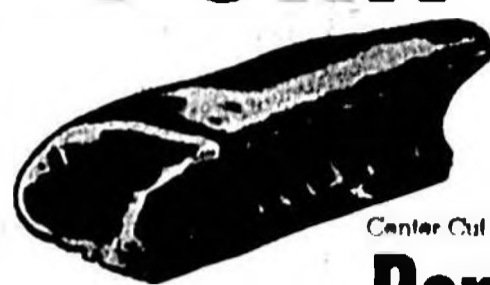

Donor Names Will Be Told By Stevenson

Governor Says He's Contacting Them With View To Making Names Public

SPRINGFIELD, Ill. (AP) — Gov. Adlai Stevenson said today he is contacting contributors to his much discussed fund, for supporting state salaries, with a view to making their names public.

The Democratic nominee said he was having trouble with his campaign because there were "so many" donors. He did not indicate when the names might be made known.

Before boarding his airplane for another campaign tour, Stevenson told newsmen "eight or nine" key state employees benefited from the fund, and he had been in touch with all of them.

The campaign tour, to last two days, takes Stevenson to Evansville, Ind., Indianapolis, Paducah, Ky., and Louisville.

Stevenson's new statement regarding his controversial fund for adding to salaries of Illinois officials followed his promise Thursday night to speak up and give more details.

He made the announcement as he took the line for 11,538 miles of rugged campaigning through 17 states.

The Democratic presidential nominee, starting the semi-finals of his campaign with a dash into Indiana, also had an opportunity to open up on the political alliance between Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Hoosier Sen. Willam E. Jenner.

The word from Wilson Wyatt Stevenson's campaign manager was that the Illinois governor definitely "will have something further to say" about the special fund that has become a target for a heavy daily barrage of criticism from the Republican camp.

Wyatt wasn't going so far as saying the Democratic candidate for the White House was really worried about repeated GOP charges that Stevenson may have "something to hide." Yet the fact that the governor agreed to say something more indicated that Stevenson was acquiring a bit under the Republican heading.

Sanford Budget Is Adopted By City Commission

Total Budget Amounting To \$428,616 Is Hike Of \$63,478.00

Final figures adopted by the City Commission on the 1952-53 City operating budget showed \$428,616, or \$63,478 more than the 1951-52 budget. The total amount of \$428,616, City Manager Tom Lemon announced this morning.

This difference, however, will be made up by the fact that the total debt service for the coming year is \$102,775 as compared with \$154,125 this year. The increase is due to the fact that the interest rate has been increased one-fourth of one percent, starting on Sept. 1. The debt service levy is due to bring \$140,000, and the Utility Service Tax, \$20,000.

Total miscellaneous revenues are put at \$248,411. A total of \$40,200 will be received from the tax lot operating levy. Water utility revenues are estimated at \$184,000, and the City of Sanford is expected to bring in \$32,000, and sale of real estate, \$12,000.

The Police Department budget is set at \$72,840 and the Fire Department \$49,054.

Hurricane Located About 430 Miles East Of Florida

MIAMI (AP)—Upstart Charlie, the season's third hurricane, developed, heading 115 miles per hour winds today as it began a gradual swing away from the mainland.

Grady Norton, chief storm forecaster at the Miami weather bureau, said "The present course of the hurricane indicates it will not hit land."

Norton said the tropical weather was about 130 miles east of St. Augustine at 11 a. m. (EST). Some increase in intensity and continued movement in a north-easterly direction during the next 12 hours was expected, with the hurricane eventually passing between Cape Hatteras, N. C., and Bermuda.

The 11 p. m. advisory said dangerous winds were not expected on shore. Small craft along the coast of the Carolinas were warned not to venture far into the Atlantic and ships were told to avoid the hurricane.

Hurricane hunting planes located the storm's center near latitude 30.2 north and longitude 71.0 west. Strong winds were estimated at 115 miles an hour with hurricane force winds—75 miles per hour or more—extending 30 miles from the center. Gale extended 125 miles north and 50 miles south of the center.

Court Test Seen On Barring Reds In Public Houses

WASHINGTON (AP)—The American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) may decide to test in court the constitutionality of a new congressional attack on disloyalty, the barring of subversives from public housing projects.

A government housing attorney said that Herbert M. Levy, an attorney for ACLU, indicated the possibility that such court action might be instituted in the near future here and San Francisco.

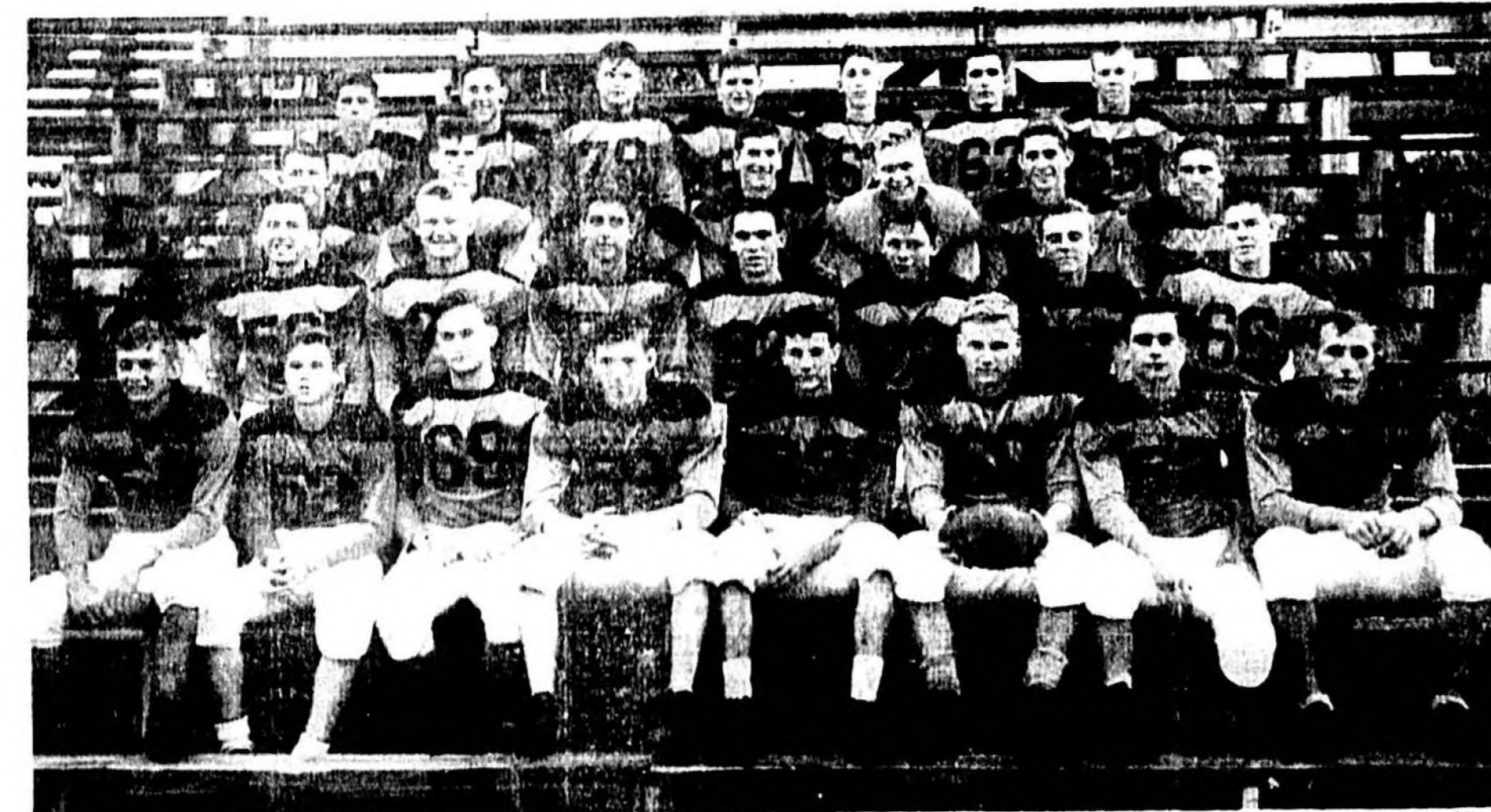

Dan McCarty Talks To Vegetable Men On Flood Control

MIAMI BEACH — Dan McCarty, Democratic nominee for governor, told members of the Florida Fruit and Vegetable Association Thursday he planned to push a program of flood control when he takes office.

"It seems to me there is no point in building flood control levees without providing some place for the water to go," McCarty said. "As governor, I am going to push a program to build outlets and pumping stations built as the levee construction progresses.

"We have been building levees for some four years, but have not paid attention to outlets for the water that would be dammed up by the Everglades. We should have a reputation of the heavy rains of 1947."

"Two other speakers predicted a prosperous season for Florida crops. The forecast on increased consumer demand, bigger crops and higher buying power.

Dr. Edward W. Calk of the University of Florida Extension Division and Kenneth W. Schabale of the U. S. Department of Agriculture said there would be bigger crops of Florida potatoes, cabbage snap beans, celery, sweet corn and tomatoes.

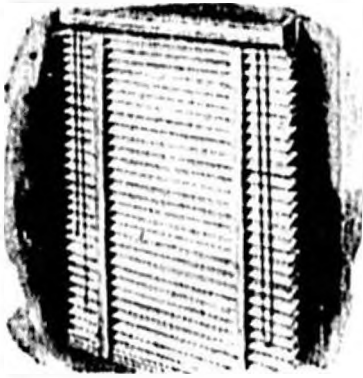

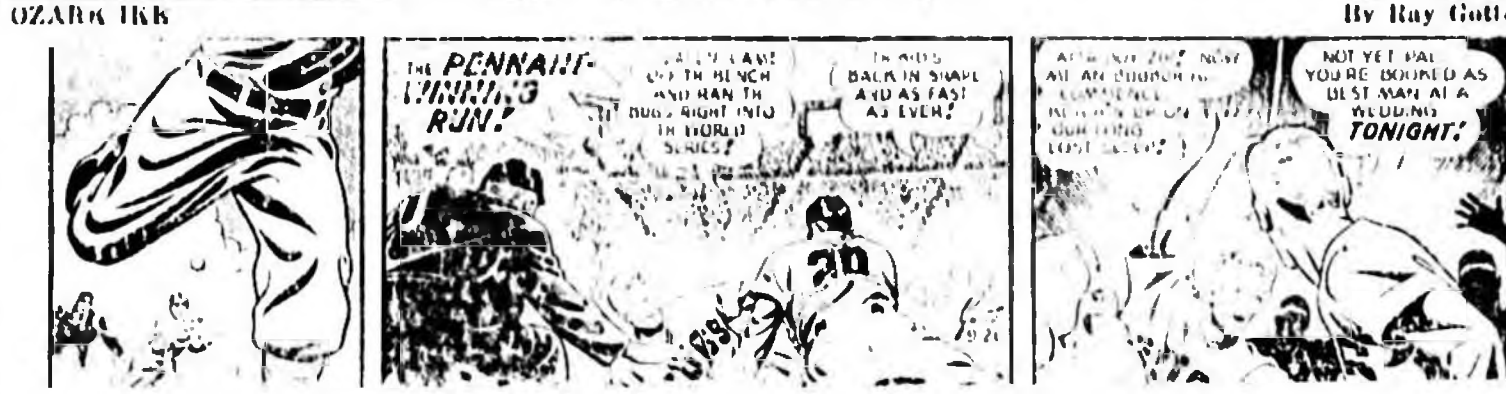

Seminoles Open Grid Season With Eustis Here Tonight

1000 Are Expected To See Battle in Memorial Stadium; Panthers Favored

Seminole High School's youth rebuilding program will receive the acid test tonight when the 1952 edition of the Celery Fed gridiron team makes its season debut in Memorial Stadium at 8:00 o'clock against the undefeated Eustis Panthers.

The Feds will be a six-point underdog on the basis of Eustis' 7-6 triumph over the Apopka Blue Darters last week. The Panthers also boast of a heavy returning offensive from last year's eleven, who pack additional weight both in the forward wall and the backfield.

Over 1000 fans are expected to be on hand for the kickoff in Memorial Stadium's converted baseball palace. Attired in sterling new orange, black and white uniforms, 32 Sanford varsity players will be ready for the call from Coaches Bill Fleming and Fred Ganas.

Sanford will field a starting line weighing slightly more than 162 pounds and the initial backfield contingent will tip the scales at 187 plus. It will be a lighter Fed eleven team than 1951 but to offset this will be a bench that has size, youth and spirit.

Last year's second highest scorer and ground gainer, Junior Metts, will be the key to the Seminole offensive attack both in the air and on the ground. Sanford will be operating out of an unbalanced single-wing formation with Center Terry Cordell and halfback Ed Lockett calling the signals in the novel Ganas-Fleming version of the Notre Dame huddle.

Coach Charlie Broadway's Panthers will also be using a single-wing offensive lineup with Tommy Branton, 200-pound full conference prospect, being the key man in both the ground and aerial offensive. Broadway's eleven will out-weight the Feds both in the line and in the backfield by some five pounds per man.

Tackle Dick Conklin and center Bill Hanson pack 400 pounds of beef between them and will be formidable stalwarts in the Panther forward wall.

Sanford will have 165-pound tackle Joe Pickens and all-EPFC Center Cordell spearhead the Celery Fed forward wall. Junior Nolley Nance, 170-pounder, will be playing his first varsity game for the Feds tonight. Nance has all the tools and is a tough customer.

Hubba "Lefty" Hibeer, 165-pound graduate from the B squad last year will man one of the guard spots with Ross Hannum, voted the most promising athlete at SHS in 1951, having his 163 pounds ready to go at the other guard post.

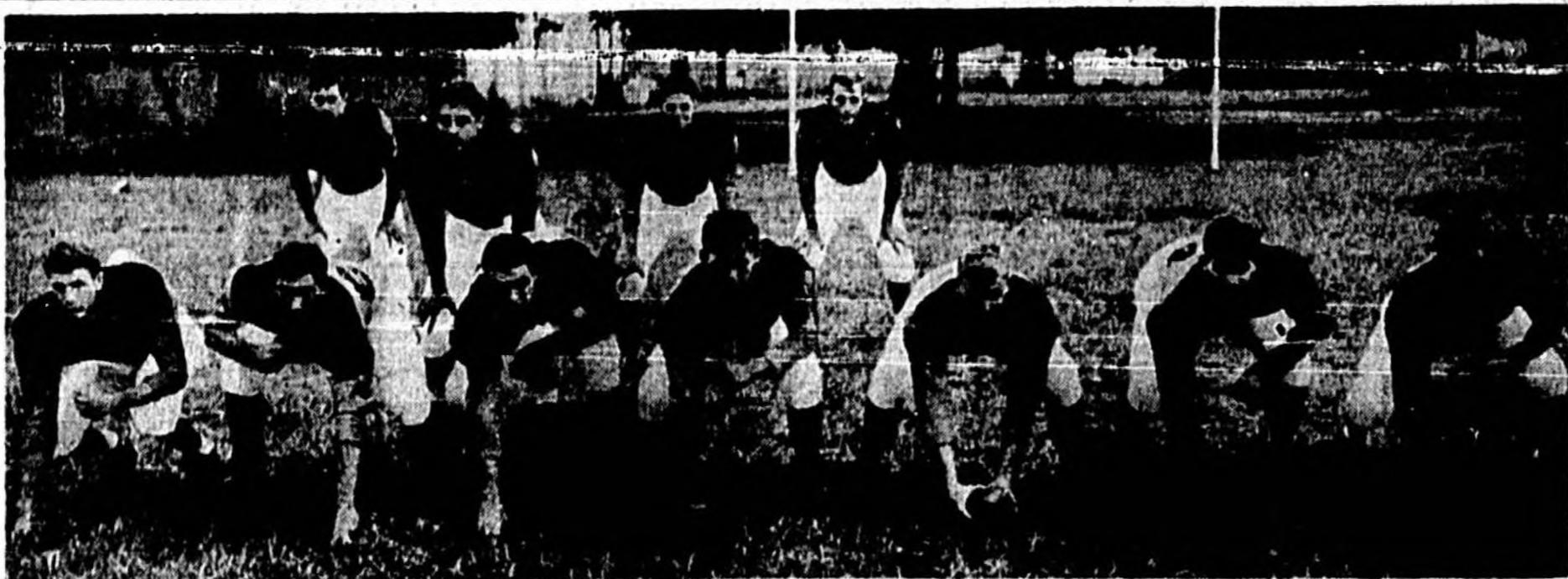
Cecil Sheppard, 160-pound starting with not a single year of football experience will command one of the end slots with Calvin Wright, a 145-pound light weight and backfield senior, at the other flank position.

In the backfield Ray Davis will have the tough assignment to fill Ed Gordon's shoes at the starting fullback spot. Joe Hutchison will be at the blocking quarterback position with flashy running Lockett and dependable Metts taking charge of the halfback posts.

In predicting his charges would be the underdogs, Coach wryly said, holding back a grin, "How can we be favored? I've lost almost my complete team from last year and Eustis defeated Apopka last week."

Last season the Celery Feds mesmerized the Panthers from Eustis by a 14-0 score. This year, however, pre-game fever points toward a different outcome.
