County Animal Contro Officer Bruce Clark said today he will recommend the county begin an animal inoculation program at the Seminole County Animal Pound.

Clark's recommendation ollows what he says is a nor nal number of distemper cases reported at the facility.

Clark said distemper shots will cost \$2 apiece. The normal animal population at the pound is about 300, with the number rising to 500 during peak periods, according to Clark.

He recommends all animals dogs and cats — get the shots. He said the adoption fee will probably be raised from \$13 to \$15 to cover inoculation costs.

Clark said he will bring the matter before the county commission on Tuesday. Meanwhile, area veterinarians were scheduled to give distemper shots to animals presently housed at the pound.

Clark said two puppies died over the weekend from distemper. And, he said some animals at the pound are infected. He also pointed out when one animal is infected, the virus remains active for as long as 90 days.



### Pentagon To Strengthen U.S. Nuclear Weapons Sites

WASHINGTON (AP) - Pentagon officials estimate i may cost \$250 million to strengthen protection of U.S. nuclear weapons sites around the world against possible raids by terrorists.

The storage sites, containing thousands of nuclear warheads, will be converted into virtual fortresses. Officials hope much of the cost will be borne by member nations of NATO because many of the sites are located in Western Europe for nuclear defense of that area.

The Pentagon's concern about the security of its nuclear weapons storage sites was triggered by increasing terrorism in recent years.

### **Reagan Outspends Ford**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Republican challenger Ronald Reagan outspent President Ford last month in early primary states and had slightly better luck attracting private political contributions, the latest campaigr finance reports show.

The gap was most evident in Florida, site of the nation's third presidential primary on March 9. Reagan spent \$152,126 there during January, nearly four times the \$42,586 put out by the Ford campaign

### **CIA To Change Policy**

WASHINGTON (AP) - The new CIA director says he is halting the agency's long-established practice of using some employes of U.S. news organizations as undercover agents overseas.

The CIA also said it has "nc secret paid or contractual relationship with any American clergyman or missionary" and that "this practice will be continued as a matter of policy." At the same time, the CIA said it would welcome information volunteered by representatives of the news

media and the clergy and promised not to reveal the names of any American who cooperates with the agency.

The Freeport News, a weekly newspaper in Freeport, the Bahamas, reported that Hughes and his aides boarded three jets at Freeport International Airport early Wednesday and took off for Mexico City.

An air traffic supervisor at the airport confirmed early today that three unscheduled aircraft did leave there for Mexico at 2 a.m. Wednesday. He declined to give his name and refused further comment. Other officials could neither

confirm nor deny the report. Terry Lieber, a spokesman for Hughes' Summa Corp., said in Las Vegas that he did not know if the 70-year-old billionaire had gone to the Mexican resort town. If he did, Lieber said, Summa was not notified.

An anonymous tipster suggested to reporters in New York that Hughes might have moved to a hotel in Acapulco. But sources at that hotel, the

Acapulco Princess, said Hughes was not registered there and that they knew of no plans for his arrival.

William Mulder, general manager of the Xanadu Princess Hotel in Freeport, where Hughes was reportedly occuping the top two floors, disclaimed any knowledge of Hughes' whereabouts to begin with.

"We never knew if Mr. Hughes was in the hotel so how could we know if he checked out?" he asked. "We have no knowlege of Mr. Hughes." However, he said the to

## **Election Laws Threaten Process**

The U.S. Supreme Court has taken a major step toward protecting the American political process from election reform laws that would create advantages for incumbents and infringe on individual rights of political expression.

Sen. James L. Buckley and former Sen. Eugene McCarthy, who carried their challenge of the 1974 federal election reform act to the high court, achieved only a partial victory but a significant one. Although they lost their case against the public financing of presidential elections, the court appears to have upheld their argument that statutory limits on campaign spending create artificial advantages for some candidates and amount to infringement on rights of free speech and freedom of the press.

Only three justices expressed concurrence on all points set forth in the court's unsigned majority opinion. Obviously there is a fine line of philosophical disagreement on the court in establishing how far a government can go in its intrusion into a free election process without making it something less than free. The court is saying that the public interest is served by limiting what an individual can contribute to a political candidate, but would be harmed by limiting what individuals in the aggregate can raise and spend on his behalf.

While the Supreme Court has now cleared the udicial track for federal funds to be used in financing this year's presidential campaigns, it has raised at least a temporary roadblock by cutting the props out from under the Federal Election Commission. In ruling that Congress must revise the law promptly to establish that the commission is an enforcement agency of the executive branch, the court may also have opened the door to challenges of other recent attempts by Congress to assume powers that traditionally fall within executive responsibility.

And still other doors have been opened. The constitutional principles applied to this test of a federal election law can surely be applied to state and local campaign reform laws which nave been put on the books in this post-Watergate era.

There will be a scurrying in Congress to meet the 30-day deadline for revising the composition of the Federal Election Commission so presidential candidates can continue to receive their promised subsidies. There may well be some scurrying, too, at the state and local level to determine whether the U.S. Supreme Court has cast a constitutional shadow over new rules affecting other election campaigns unfolding across America in 1976.



## RAY CROMLEY **New Laws** Encourage Extremists

WASHINGTON - There's an office here where five members have an unwritten agreement. When one, who we'll call Brown, contributes to his candidate, each of the other four donates an equal amount. When Smith gives to his man, the other four follow suit, and so on down the list.

In some campaigns this enables the candidates to keep their records clean with "small" donations. In others it enables each man to exceed the limit of his legal campaign donation. This example will, of course, surprise no one and that is the point - how easily the new

federal clean election law is evaded. Because the new rules put a straight jacket on nonest men, they give clear advantage campaigners who cut corners.

Equally bad, today's federal and state laws and new party rules encourage extremist candidates of both left and right. They so weaken party control and discipline there's little to keep candidates in hand. As tradition wears thin there is serious danger both major parties will wither, further eroding political responsibility and leaving campaigns in the hands of "in-andouters." We saw samplings of the mischief such campaigns are capable of in the Kennedy, Johnson and Nixon years, espeically when given favored official posts.

The complex and conflicting financial regulations - rules which tend to separate the candidate from party control - and the growing distrust of political parties, openly encourage Watergate shenanigans and extend an open invitation to charlatans to seek high office.

Though I am emotionally opposed to reliance on large donations and committed to the principle of funding campaigns from small donations by many, it is clear that in a nationwide race for the presidential nomination, it is the man with way-out dogmatic views which arouse strong emotions in thousands of voters. This draws enough small donations in sufficient states to qualify the candidate early for matching federal funds who is thereby able to hit the first primaries with vigor.

> DON OAKLEY Some Ideas To Reduce **Energy Bills**

Not only has the high cost of housing placed some ownership out of reach for millions of Americans, but many people who already own homes are finding the cost of running them taking increasingly large chunks out of their household budgets.

Addressing a meeting of the National Association of Home Builders in Dallas the other day, Guy O. Mabry, vice president of Owens-Corning Fiberglass Corp., cited the case of a New Jersey homeowner whose annual fuel bills were almost as high as his mortgage payments and warned that "heating and cooling a house may soon become a luxury, unless the nation's builders take immediate steps to effectively reduce home energy consumption."

Mabry calls for a home energy efficiency rating system, similar to Detroit's miles-pergallon designation, to help consumers. Just as m.p.g. has become the watchword of new car buyers, "e.p.m." (energy-per-month) costs are fast becoming the major concern of today's new home buyer, he says.

For starters, a doubling of current Federal Housing Administration minimum standards for insulation in attics, walls and floors "would have an immediate impact in lowering home energy consumption."

This, of course, would mean more business for the makers of insulation and less business for the energy utilities. But the latter are in little danger of running out of customers for all the energy they can provide in the foreseeable

There are also other energy-saving steps builders can take, such as double-paned winstripping and tighter construction to reduce air infiltration.

Nor need the low "e.p.m." house cost more. says Mabry. For instance, the use of 2-by-6 studs on 24-inch centers, instead of the traditional 2-by-4 studs on 16-inch centers, would both accommodate thicker insulation and save significantly on lumber costs.

In addition, because of a more efficient "thermal envelope," heating, ventilating and air-conditioning equipment could be a much lower capacity. There is a public as well as a private stake in

the more efficient use of our energy resources. axpayers are turning down bond issues. Schools are closed to community use during offhours. Public buildings must close early. Not all of this is due to the cost of energy, to be sure, but energy is an important factor.

It will take ingenuity if money-short communities are to survive this era of scarce and meet the challenge, as well as making more use

# **IN BRIEF** Lockheed Scandal Bars

ROME (AP) - Premier Aldo Moro has formed a new cabinet made up of most of the men in his previous government but excluding a minister accused of receiving money from the Lockheed Aircraft Corp. Luigi Gui, the interior minister in the cabinet that resigned Jan. 7, has denied charges in the Italian press that he took a Lockheed payoff for the government's purchase of 14 C130 cargo planes in 1970 while he was defense minister. He has asked the state prosecutor to investigate the allegations. In the new government, Defense Minister Arnaldo Forlani will also supervise the interior ministry temporarily. Former Premier Mariano Rumor continues as foreign minister, and Francesco Paolo Bonifacio, a former president of the constitutional court, took over the Justice Ministry.

### Special Envoy Suggested

MIAMI (AP) - President Ford should appoint a special envoy to the Middle East in an new attempt to resolve the problem of Palestinian representation in talks with Israel, says Sen. Robert' Byrd, DW.Va. "A special envoy would have the advantage of conducting a quieter, more low-key, and therefore potentially more effective diplomacy than could the secretary of state," Byrd said in a speech to a Miami political club Wednesday.

Byrd, a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination, said the envoy proposal "would have to be acceptable to all parties - Israel, as well as Egypt, Jordan, Syria and the Palestinians.

Ancient Treasures Damaged GUATEMALA CITY, Guatemala (AP) - Some of Guatemala's ancient archeological treasures and colonial monuments were badly damaged by the earthquake last week but the ruins of the Mayan city of Tikal were not affected, the director of the National Institute of Anthropology reports.

"The cultural heritage of Guatemala suffered considerable losses in the earthquake," said Luis Lujan Munos after a preliminary survey of the preColumbian and Spanish Colonial treasures that bring thousands of tourists and scholars to Guatemala. "We hope that international organizations like UNESCO and the Organization of American States, friendly governments and private scientific institutions will give us financial and technical help to save these valuable cultural heritages of mankind."
