# Cardinal To Hire Only Non-Smokers

If you smoke and you're looking for a job, you need not apply to Cardinal Industries in Sanford.

The modular housing manufacturer's companywide policy was laid down Jan. 1: Hire

non-smokers only. And for those who work for the company who do smoke, including its president? Quit smoking by Jan. 1, 1987 or start looking for another job.

The non-smoking policy was an economic decision, according to John Jolinski, director of media relations for the Sanford-based company that makes prefabricated housing for sale in 23

Jolinski said the company's president, Austin Guirlinger, ordered the change after reviewing reports from health organizations and insurance companys about how smoking increases a company's cost.

It lessens productivity, contributes to absenteeism and increases overhead and insurance premiums, Jolinski said.

"I think we're following a trend. You will see more and more companies following the trend.

# School Zone Plans Get Group Nod

After months of work, the County-Wide Middle School Zone Task Force, a committee charged with the responsibility of redrawing the Seminole County middle school boundries, selected two plans it will recommend to Superintendent of Schools Robert W. Hughes.

The rezoning of the middle school boundries is necessitated by the growing student population, and the addition of Greenwood Lakes Middle School in Lake Mary, which is set to open for the 1986-87 school year.

The task force, comprised of parent and administrative representatives from each of the nine schools, is recommending Hughes consider Plans C and G. Task force chairman Sandy Robinson, a Lakeview Middle School parent, made the announcement at the conclusion Tuesday's rezoning committee meeting at the Velma Mitchell Annex.

Plan G was the top vote-getter among the 18-member committee, garnering approval 16-2.

One of the features of that plan is that students attending Rock Meps of top 2 plans, \$A

Lake, Teague, and Lake Mary Middle Schools would continue to walk to schools in their neighborhoods.

The second highest vote-getter of the four plans was Plan C.

One aspect of that plan is that Rock Lake, Teague, and Lake Mary students would be bused to schools out of their neighborhoods. Hughes will first see the recommendations at the superintendent's work session on January 30.

The student population projections for each school under each plan recommended are as follows:

# Oil Prices **Plummet**

#### Consumer Unlikely To Get Big Break

By United Press International Crude oil prices have plunged below the critical \$20-a-barrel mark on world markets amid rumors of an oil-pricing war, but industry analysts say it is unlikely there will be corresponding drops in fuel prices for U.S. consumers.

"To make a direct calculation from the drop in the imagined value of a barrel is simplistic." Dan Lundberg, publisher of the Lundberg Survey, which tracks gasoline prices, said Tuesday. "Just how falling crude prices will work their way through to the pump lies beyond easy quantification."

The White House Tuesday said the lower oil prices would have a "favorable" impact on "the U.S. economy and particularly on U.S. consumers"

and ruled out an oil import fee. 'Joseph Tovey of Tovey & Co., a New York investment firm. said consumers may reap somebenefits from the nearly Lakes Middle School bused to two months, but predicted "a good part may be taken by the

U.S. government in the form of Other energy specialists said consumer benefits may not be seen because of existing stocks of more expensive oil, the higher cost of making gasoline and the possibility of new taxes.

On Monday, the price of a major crude - Britain's Brent broke through the \$20-a-barrel barrier on the North Sea market for the first time since the Iranian Revolution set the stage for the second OPEC oil price shock in 1979.

Brent fell to \$19.70 a barrel Tuesday, and West Texas intermediate - the key U.S. crude skidded to \$19.85 a barrel during the day on the New York Mercantile Exchange before finishing at an all-time low of \$20.59.

During the past week, crude prices have plunged by about \$5 a barrel because the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries is producing an estimated I million barrels a day of surplus oil despite lower worldwide demand.

Traders have said oil markets were rife with rumors Saudi Arabia, OPEC's principal producer, is driving down prices to force Britain to lead a move among non-OPEC members to curb production. OPEC decided in December to raise production and cut prices to regain its share of the world market.

In theory, each \$1-a-barrel decline in crude prices means a 2.3 cent-a-gallon reduction in gasoline and home-heating oil for the consumer. A barrel con-

# Pickets And Troops Face Off In Snowstorm

AUSTIN, Minn. (UPI) - National perature was 27 degrees and winds Guardsmen and striking meatpackers faced each other in a driving snowstorm today, awaiting another attempt by the Geo. A. Hormel Co. to open its headquarters plant with non-union workers.

There was no real indication what might happen when the new workers began arriving at the main gates of the \$100 million plant - the company would not even say when they were supposed to show up.

In the meantime, spotlights illuminated an certe scene at the gates. As many as 250 National Guard military policemen, armed only with 3-foot wooden batons and bundled awkwardly in arctic parkas and bright white vapor-barrier boots, stood in rows in front of the gates.

Across the street, huddled around fires burning in barrels, was a handful of strikers in bright, downstuffed snowmobile sults. The tem-

gusting up to 25 mph blew clouds of snow into drifts. Three to 5 inches of new snow was expected overnight. At a union meeting Tuesday night.

Local P-9 President Jim Guyette would not tell news reporters his strategy. He would only say the union would "have a presence at the gate." That was what he said Monday night, and a hundred strikers showed up in the darkness at 4 a.m., arriving well ahead of the Guard buses from St. Paul and blocking the gates with

The company shut down the plant Tuesday and agreed not to reopen until today.

Tuesday night, Guyette sald, "I'd never tell anyone to block the streets." In the same breath, he noted that 500 National Guardsmen were in lown, and another 300 on the way. and "we're fighting for our jobs."

Ray Rogers, a New Jersey union

specialist hired by the local, told the strikers at the union hall, "Tomorrow we'll have to do things different. We'll have to be non-violent. We'll have to be more peaceful."

Plant manager Deryl Arnold told reporters late Tuesday, "We agreed not to open today to give the Guard adequate time to put the necessary programs and procedures in place that they felt it would take to give us the assurance that our people would be protected."

Arnold would not say how many non-union workers he expected, but issued another appeal to strikers to resume their jobs. At the union meeting, there were indications of concern over that, with repeated pleas to observe the picket lines and maintain solidarity.

The 1,500 members of Local P-9 have disregarded the pleas of their

#### Protests Mark 13th Anniversary Of Supreme Court Abortion Ruling

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Abortion opponents, gathering their moral strength and their political clout, are taking their 13-year-old crusade to end legal abortions to Capitol Hill and the Supreme Court.

Abortion opponents said they hope to raily tens of thousands of demonstrators for the annual March for Life today. President Reagan is expected to address the throng. who will gather on the Ellipse, over a radio hook-up and meet later in the day with leaders of the movement.

But equally vociferous supporters of the 1973 Supreme Court decision that legalized most abortions are also marking the anniversary of the ruling in demonstrations scheduled across the nation.

The two days of protests, rames sittes and news conferences began Tuesday when leaders of the Planned Parenthood Federation, National Abortion Rights Action League and the National Organization for Women all held news conferences to denounce the escalating violence that has accompanied bitter debate over the emotional issue.

#### Worst-Dressed Include Royalty

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (UPI) - A princess of Monaco and the queen of prime-time soap operas are the headliners on Mr. Blackwell's annual list of the world's 10 Worst-Dressed

The Los Angeles-based fashion designer announced his 26th annual awards Tuesday, listing Princess Stephanic of Monaco in first place for a "royal unisex wardrobe" that he said entitles her "to use either bathroom."

Joan Collins, star of ABC's "Dynasty," took second place on the dishonor list.

Third-place this year went to singer Madonna, who Blackwell called "Skid Row's nomination for a poverty party centerpiece contest." She was followed by Tina Turner and Michele Lee, who Blackwell said "looks like King Kong's mother-in-law."

The second five included Whoopi Goldberg, Cybill Shepherd ("a turkey on its way to slaughter"). Lisa Hartman ("a reject from the shah's harem"). Apollonia and Heather Thomas ("an exploding overstuffed cabbage").

#### Star Denies Song Spurred Suicide

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - British heavy metal rock star Ozzy Osbourne is a family man who would never encourage his fans to commit suicide, his attorney says, and the musician denies his music drove a troubled 19-year-old youth to kill himself.

Responding Tuesday to a lawsuit filed by the family of a youth who shot himself after brooding for several hours while listening to Osbourne albums, the singer told reporters. "I'm very sorry, but I think the young man was obviously ill before it happened.

"I know what the lyrics mean, I wrote them," said Osbourne, whose music and performances have often been linked to death and violence. "You can twist anything around. You can hear what you want to hear."

The suit claims the "satanic" influence of Osbourne's music - especially a song titled "Suicide Solution" drove John McCollum. 19, over the brink of depression to suicide in October 1984.

#### Mortgage Fraud Pattern Spotted

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Federal investigators, uncovering a nationwide pattern of home loan abuses, are closely checking government-backed mortgages for fraud and expect indictments soon, housing officials say.

The investigation by the Housing and Urban Development and Justice departments - probing the use of false documents to obtain mortgages backed by HUD's Federal Housing Administration — has expanded to include at least

Janet Hale, acting assistant secretary at HUD, said Tuesday the agency is troubled by an emerging pattern of fraud abuses. "We do think it's extensive." she said. "It's not in just one region.

Although investigators do not think the scams are nationally coordinated, there is evidence some private real estate seminars. "held by people that we don't think are reputable," are informing people how to cheat on the loans. Hale said.

#### Japanese Detainees Can Sue

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Thousands of Japanese-Americans who were forced from their homes and herded into guarded camps during World War II can sue the government for compensation, a federal appeals court

In a 2-1 decision Tuesday, a panel of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia removed a legal hurdle facing camp survivors trying to win \$25 billion in legal claims against the federal government.

#### Airing 'Deer Hunter' Unedited **Controversial For Channel 35**

Can free TV air programs containing explicit violence and sex just like the pay TV channels? The answer is yes, according to an Orlando television station promotion director.

WOFL-TV 35's unedited airing of the violent R-rated film "The Deer Hunter." which began Tuesday night and continues tonight, has been controversial, but legal, according to the station's Director of Advertising and Promotions Chris Wolf.

The film, depicting graphic war scenes, violence, and vulgar language, is being aired unedited because, according to Wolf, "to alter it in any way would not do the film justice."

Wolf says pay TV networks like HBO and Showtime could offer explicit material because its subscribers paid for the service. and not commercial advertisers. He said the trend toward airing that type of material on free TV F DeNiro in the Deer will continue, based on the I after merits of the films. He said putting similar once reserved for the subscription networks on free TV "is not as unacceptable as it was."

The Deer Hunter won five academy awards. Wolf said after pay-TV ran it, networks and public television networks failed to pick up the film, and it was put into syndication.

WOFL aired the first segment Tuesday night from 8-10 p.m., and will air the conclusion in the same time slot tonight.

"We have promoted it so people would have to make a choice," Wolf said. The station has purchased print ads, and used their own ads promoting the movie with a disclaimer that the film is very violent in nature. and that it "is not fit to be viewed by children." Wolf said.

During the actual airing of the film, warnings of the content were to be placed during each commercial break, and announcements were also set to be made by the station's general manager before and during the

Wolf says that the airing is not in violation of any FCC stan-

"They have left decisions about this type of film up to the individual stations." he said.

He also said that telephone calls about the showing of the film were running 2-to-1 to 3-to-1 in favor.

We've had hundreds of calls." Wolf said, "and the mafority are in favor of showing it. There have been church groups and others complain, but that is to be expected."

Wolf said that the station did not wish to offend anyone, and that with all the warnings before and during the presentation of the film, those not wishing to see it should not watch.



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
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

## Money Needed; Not Junk Bonds

It's illegal for an investor to buy a stock on 10 percent margin, as was done in the 1920s. But it's been legal for a hostile raider to buy a

corporation on margin — with junk bonds. That contradiction distorted the financial markets, fueling merger mania. Last year saw huge corporations gobbling each other up like greedy fish. Staggering sums were borrowed in order to shift ownership. But analysts questioned whether the deals improved the productivity or profits of the corporations Many may have resulted in a loss of efficiency, independence and stability.

Buying on 10 percent margin was a key factor that led to the stock market crash of 1929. A person with a dollar could buy \$10 of stock. The \$10 stock would soar to \$20. But in reality, it was only worth what it could be bought for - \$2. Finally the inflated market collapsed, crushing millions of investors and hurtling the country into the worst depression in this century.

In the Depression, the government moved to prevent further crashes by ensuring that people bought stocks with hard money - not overgenerous credit. This has stabilized the stock market, protected investors from wild fluctuations and protected jobs, by shielding corporations from financial finagling.

But corporations have come under attack from a new direction in recent years - the hostile takeover. A well-run company, like CBS, can be targeted for takeover by an outsider. Well and good: A company that sells stock must take the chance of having its shares bought and of losing control. But what if, as in the case of the CBS takeover attempt by Ted Turner, the raider doesn't have the money to buy the stock? What if he wants to use complicated paper transactions, called junk bonds, to leverage the deal?

CBS fought off Ted Turner by worsening its financial situation. Why? In order to make the takeover less attractive. CBS preserved its identity but decreased its efficiency. So much for redeeming value.

On Jan. 8, the Federal Reserve Board decided to extend the same restriction on margin buying to corporate takeovers. Junk bonds no longer will be usable for hostile takeovers, but will be available for some mergers in which both sides consent.

The Reagan administration opposed this measure as needless government intervention in the financial markets. But the Fed's chairman. Paul Volcker, supported it as consistent with stock rules.

We stand behind Volcker. The same rules that apply to small investors should apply to corporate raiders. If you want to buy a company, buy it with real money - not junk

Mergers are individual deals, with individual merits and demerits. The financial marketplace works best when the government meddles least. But there are limits to the ability of the marketplace to prevent the cycle of boom and bust, which characterized it before security regulation banned 10 percent margin stock buying. Despite the ban on junk-bond takeovers, many mergers still will be able to proceed. But those least likely to succeed, those based on the least sound financing, will no longer be permitted. And that's good for the companies, good for the financial security of America.

his opponents determination to save the remnants of the New Deal, Fair Deal. New Frontier and Great Society, the government is running 12-digit deficits of a magnitude that would have popped the eyes of such spend and spend' Democratic presidents as Franklin D. Roosevelt or Lyndon Johnson

Congress demonstrated to the country and to itself in the last couple of years that it cannot face up to \$200 billion deficits. Its idea of compromise during the Reagan first term was, with a few exceptions, to say yes to everyone today and, like Searlett O'Hara worry about it worround

Tomorrow arrived in the form of a national debt soon to reach \$2 trillion and the Gramm-Rudman law, by which members of Congress, like the brave lolk who paid others to substitute for them in the military during the Civil War.

# Big Brother's Big Ears

WASHINGTON (NEA) -Sophisticated electronic equipment installed in New York, San Francisco and Washington enables the government to intercept, monitor Now between Reagan's tax re- and record thousands of citizens' ductions and detense increases and telephone conversations every day.

The targets of that blatantly unconstitutional invasion of privacy are U.S. residents - but the government engaging in the cavesdropping is the Soviet Union.

Although this country's national security officials long have been aware of the extensive scope of the Soviet Union's wiretapping operations, they repeatedly have resisted suggestions that they restrain the practice.

The campaign for remedial action is being led by Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D.N.Y., who says he first learned of the disturbing situation when he was appointed U.S. ambassador to the United Nations in

Vice President Nelson Rockefeller "told me the first thing I must know about the U.N. is that the Soviets would be listening to every telephone call I made" from either the U.S. mission or the U.S. ambassador's residence.

Indeed. Rockefeller was chairman of a government commission on intelligence activities whose 1975 report said:

"The communist countries appear to have developed electronic collection of intelligence to an extraordinary degree of technology and sophistication for use in the United States and elsewhere.... We believe that these countries can monitor and record thousands of private telephone conversations.

"Americans have a right to be uneasy if not seriously disturbed at the real possibility that their personal and business activities. which they discuss freely over the telephone, could be recorded and analyzed by agents of foreign

In the ensuing years, various federal officials have explicitly or tacitly confirmed that the Soviet Union is engaged in wholesale. systematic eavesdropping at several diplomatic missions in New York. its consulate in San Francisco and its embassy in Washington.

In 1981, the special agent in charge of the FBI's Washington field office estimated that 40 percent of the embassy personnel here were involved in intercepting telephone conversations. Since then, the National Security

Agency has purchased 500 tele-

phone scramblers at a cost of \$35,000 each, and telephones in government limousines used by senior federal officials are equipped with scramblers. The Defense Department last year

awarded development contracts for a new generation of secure telephones that will cost about \$2,000 apiece and are expected to become available in spring 1987. The federal government is consid-

ering purchasing as many of 500,000 of that advanced model, compared with approximately 4.000 of an earlier version now in

The response to Soviet eavesdropping on the part of officials in the executive branch is to protect themselves, especially those performing national security functions, while leaving everybody else including members of the legislative and judicial branches vulnerable.

The Senate last year twice approved Moynthan initiatives that would have required offensive as well as defensive action against the telephone tapping.

In both instances, however, they were killed by House-Senate conference committees apparently acting at the behest of the CIA and the State Department.

# Scientists Exploring By Robot

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) - After eight years and 3 billion miles, a television robot on a grand tour of the outskirts of the solar system is approaching a bizarre world enveloped by a greenish haze. ringed by black particles and patroled by icy moons.

The American Voyager 2 spacecraft has set its sights on Uranus, a planet half the size of Saturn and twice as far from the sun.

At 1 p.m. EST Friday, the probe will cruise within 50,000 miles of the Uranian cloud tops, radioing back the first close-up pictures of the seventh planet out from the sun. It will scout the planet's five big moons, examine its rings and sail on to an even more distant ren-

dezvous with Neptune in 1989. The spacecraft already has; spotted seven tiny moons, much; smaller than the live previously known satellites, and more such!

finds are anticipated. Voyager 2, which left Cape Canaveral in 1977, already has a rich history of exploration. The spacecraft and a twin surveyed: giant Jupiter in 1979 and found. three previously unknown satellites. active volcanism on another and thin rings of dust and ice encircling the planet.

They then went on to exploreringed Saturn where they discovered additional moons, Voyager 1 swung by the big satellite Titan and found an atmosphere made up largely of nitrogen, like Earth, and containing organic compounds that may be precursors to life.

Both Jupiter and Saturn, however, had been thoroughly studied by telescopes from Earth and by the pathfinding Pioneer spacecraft a few years earlier. Uranus has never before been visited by a man-made probe and even the largest telescopes are unable to see much of the distant planet.

"As a result, the opportunities for discovery and surprise are even greater," said Voyager chief scientist Edward Stone, who will be monitoring Voyager's 2 agonizingly slow radio reports at the Jet Propulsion Laboratory control center.

Burton Edelson, associate NASA administrator for space science. could not predict what will be found at Uranus, but said, "We do know it will be different than anything we've seen so far.'

Uranus is so difficult to study from Earth that scientists do not even kmow the length of an Uranian

# Rebels Also Fight To Escape Their Pasts

HONDURAN BORDER (UPD - The rebel officer finally laughed out loud, breaking the quiet of a dark night in the mountain base camp.

"I can't tell you because he won't." the young officer finally said in answer to a fourth question about the meaning of "Three-Eighty." the nom de guerre of Enrique Bermudez, commander of the Stearaguan Democratic Force.

"I wouldn't even bother asking him." the officer said. "The last reporters who came here did, and he ended up getting a little mad."

Bermudez war altas hides a past he is reluctant to reveal - his graduation as the 380th cadet to pass through the Military Academy of U.S.-backed dictator Anastasio Somoza Garcia: The school trained officers of Somoza's brutal National

The Reagan administration's attempt to round up congressional support for the Contras has focused in part on cleaning up the image of the FDN, the largest rebel group, as thugs of a deposed dictator. Reagan has led the public rela-

tions battle, depicting the rebels trying to overthrow the government in Managua as "freedom fighters" - democratic former Sandinistas who balked at Marxist-Leninist to-

As the propaganda war has heated up with the approach of a congressional vote on \$14 million in aid. Reagan has called the rebels "our brothers" and compared them to the American "founding fathers."

The FDN itself has changed. Originally a band of extled Guard members, it is still led by former Guard members but it has drawn increasing numbers of peasants and small farmers and now has 14,000 fighters, according to rebel and Sandinista officials.

Eden Pastora, the famed "Com-

mander Zero" of the Sandinista rebellion, has steadfastly refused to ally his force, the Democratic Revolutionary Alliance(ARDE), with the

Pastora claims he quit as Sandinista vice minister of defense because his former comrades were "Marxist-Leninist totalitarians," and paints FDN commanderst as bloodthirsty reactionaries who could never win popular backing.

Pastora split with his political leader, Alfonso Robelo, in part over that issue. Robelo, a wealthy businessman who served on the first Sandinista junta after the revolution, has since allied himself with the FDN.

Known for his charisma and volatile nature, Pastora has stuck for more than two years of guerrilla war to his view - which, by U.S. and rebel accouts, has driven Reagan administration officials up the wall.

A one-time anti-Somoza activist in

the Conservative Party and later in the Sandinista guerrilla faction led by President Daniel Ortega, Pastora advocates revolutionary change.

Although the administration's public relations strategy - unite the rebels, stress their ties to the Sandinistas, minimize links to Somoza and win popular support +, has not attracted Pastora, it has

transformed the FDN. The change began in earnest in November 1982, when a CIA officer who called himself "Tony Feldman" interviewed and selected members of the FDN's new directorate in Miami.

#### Poland To Put Walesa On Trial In Square-Off With Solidarity

WARSAW. Poland (UPI) — The government, squaring off against the outlawed Solidarity trade union, vowed to put its founder. Lech Walesa, on trial for slander and announced the arrests of three other activists.

Walesa faces slander charges for saying voter turnout in a Oct. 13 election was 60 percent — not 79 percent as the government said. If convicted, the 42-year-old Nobel Peace Prize winner could be imprisoned for up to two years.

Walesa said the Gdansk regional court told him it was handling his case. No trial date was set.

Walcsa called for a boycott of the election because communist authorities controlled selection of candidates. In challenging turnout figures, he quoted union monitoring of polling places.

#### **Mexico Denies Drug Connection**

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — Attorney General Sergio Garcia Ramirez vehemently denied a congressman's charges that government corruption aids drug trafficking and that a drug kingpin jailed in the slaying of a U.S. agent is allowed to leave prison at will.

Garcia Ramirez, in a statement issued Tuesday, labeled the charges "absurd."

Rep. Charles Rangel, D-N.Y., charged on his return from a fact-finding visit that corruption in the Medican

government aids drug trafficking and hampers efforts to curb the drug trade.

He also said corruption was so ingrained that drug kingpin Rafael Caro Quintero, accused in the kidnap-

He also said corruption was so ingrained that drug kingpin Rafael Caro Quintero, accused in the kidnap-slaying of U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration agent Enrique Camarena, "frequently" leaves prison to dine in restaurants.

#### Gandhi Assassins To Be Hanged

NEW DELHI. India (UPI) — Three Sikhs who thought the appearance of a falcon signified a divine order to kill Prime Minister Indira Gandhi and avenge the desceration of a Sikh shrine were convicted and sentenced to death today for her assassination.

Satwant Singh, accused of being one of the triggermen, Kehar Singh, and Balbir Singh, charged with plotting the murder, were found guilty. Judge Mahesh Chandra sentenced all three to be hanged for their roles in the Oct. 31, 1984 assassination, the Press Trust of India reported.

Security forces in New Delhi and Punjab state were placed on alert to prevent a possible outbreak of Sikh extremist violence prompted by the verdicts.

#### Military Boss Defects To Aquino

MANILA. Philippines (UPI) — A high-ranking military commander today resigned his commission and defected to the presidential campaign of Corazon Aquino saying the Philippines "is in a state of emergency.

"I believe now is the time for all of us to do what we can to make sure the country is in the hands of people who can unify us and lead us out of this grave crisis," Col. Mariana Santiago said.

Santiago, a commander who also served as director of the Bureau of Land Transportation under President Ferdinand Marcos, told a news conference he was joining the opposition because the nation "Is in a state of emergency.

# Historians Pondering Ike's Farewell Warning

WASHINGTON (UPI) — It was just after 8:30 p.m. Jan. 17, 1961, when Dwight D. Eisenhower, about to move out of the White House after two terms, startled the nation by broadcasting a warning about the "unwarranted influence" of the military-industrial complex.

Now, 25 years after that cautionary farewell address, historians, including his grandson David Eisenhower, are trying to figure out exactly what the soldier-statesman meant and why he said it.

Other people, including businessmen, are trying to figure if he was right in his somber warnings and what to do about it.

Eisenhower took over the presidency at the height of the Korean War and even when he left office there were 3.5 million people directly engaged in the military services.

The United States was still reeling in the wake of the Berlin crisis and the Sputnik shock of being beaten into space by the Soviets. Against that background - a nation technically at peace but already engaged in a military and scientific Cold War with the Soviet Union -Eisenhower spoke to the nation about his disturbing vision of an armaments industry unable to control itself, but capable, by its sheer size, of dominating the nation:

"Until the latest of our world conflicts, the United States had no armaments industry. American makers of plowshares could, with time and as required, make swords as well. But now we can no longer risk emergency improvisation of a national defense; we have been compelled to create a permanent armaments industry of vast proportions. Added to this, 3½ million men and women are directly engaged in the defense establishment.

"We annually spend on military security more than the net income of all U.S. corporations.

'This conjunction of an

immense military establish-

ment and a large arms industry is new in the American
experience. The total influence
— economic, political, even
spiritual — is felt in every city,
every statehouse, every office
of the federal government. We

recognize the Imperative need for this development. Yet we must not fail to comprehend its grave implications. Our toil, resources and livelihood are all involved; so is the very structure of our society.

"In the councils of government, we must guard against the acquisition of unwarranted influence, whether sought or unsought, by the military-industrial complex. The potential for the disastrous rise of misplaced power exists and will persist."

Statistically, the world may not have turned out to be as dangerous as like warned, although only future historians will be able to say whether it was his warning that helped prevent that.

When Eisenhower took over as president in 1953, at the height of the Korean War, the U.S. defense budget (all figures in 1986 constant dollars, supplied by the Center for Defense Information, a Washington "think tank") was at an historic peak, \$283 billion.

That was a figure not reached even in the Vietnam War and one that will not be reached again until 1987.

When Ike left office, with the Korean War ended but the Cold War competition in intercontinental nuclear missiles starting, the defense budget was \$214 billion.

In 1961, when Ike spoke, there were 6.1 million people employed in the "military-industrial complex," although this does not include the universities where much defense-related work is done on contracts.

Twenty-five years later, there are slightly more, 6.6, million, but the size of the total U.S. labor force has grown in that time by about 60 percent.

In percentage terms, the number of people in the military-industrial complex has dropped from about 8 percent in 1961 to less than 6 percent in 1985.

David Eisenhower, now at work on a three-volume history of his grandfather and his times, said he has found at least three drafts of the "military-industrial complex" text in Eisenhower's presidential papers.

papers.
"The first draft was very

ominous. The second was almost apologetic and the third, final, draft was more philosophical."

The speech, says David Eisenhower, was an accurate reflection of Ike's thinking at the time.

"In effect, he had lost the election of 1960. He had succeeded in cutting back conventional military forces and was hoping for an agreement with the Soviets that would head off the enormous expense of a race with the Soviets involving intercontinental ballistic missiles.


"But then the Spuitnik came along in 1957, and my grand-father found himself under enormous domestic pressure, which placed him on the defensive. The impact of the Sputnik led to a lot of exaggerated talk and there was a sense of insubordination at the Pentagon," where the military leaders feared losing the technological race to the Soviets.

As David Eisenhower interprets the speech, lke "was not saying dismantle the military-industrial complex. He believed it was inescapable, given the situation at the time. He was just saying, 'Be aware of it."

Rep. William Whitehurst. R-Va., a member of the Armed Services committee and a former history professor, said. "It's amusing that those people who were hostile to everything else in Eisenhower's career hark back to this one speech, where he was trying to draw attention to what he considered a partnership between the military and industry, not a conspiracy.

"Tve seen things which have distressed me," Whitehurst said, "including cost overruns, sweetheart deals and the rest, but I believe that the business of America is business, as Coolidge said, and this is especially true in the defense industry."

The immediate nationwide reaction to Ike's farewell address was muted, even puzzled, according to David Eisenhower, and it is not until some six months after the speech that notes begin to show up in Ike's private papers describing how he tried to explain what he meant to friends and dinner guests.

Stanley Weiss, a businessman, was so impressed by the prophetic quality of lke's speech that he set up an organization. Business Executives for National Security (BENS), three years ago to "rediscover the insights Eisenhower gave the country he so admirably served."

BENS now has about 4.000 business members, about evenly divided. Weiss said, between liberal Democrats, conservative Republicans and non-affiliated people.

The intent is "to expand the center ground" where there can be the kind of balance that Eisenhower was trying to achieve between defense and other national priorities.

Weiss thinks lke's ominous vision was more than realized.

"There is a powerful complex — an "iron triangle" which has become the military-industrial-congre ssional-academic-union complex, all bringing pressure for more defense spending. "We're not opposed to any of

these groups, but we think it's dangerous when they all get together in an incestuous relationship to make policy."

Robert Lamson, an economist "ho works with BENS, said. "The complex has grown as much as lke feared. We're not opposed to spending on national security: we're opposed to pork-barrelling, and that's what it has become," with members of Congress, especially those on the armed services committees, reacting to pressure from their districts.

Weiss said, "A cartoon I saw the other day summed it up. A general is talking to the secretary of defense: "It's the unstoppable weapon: parts are made in every one of the 435 congressional districts."

#### Cabinet Bucks Graham's Advice And Votes To Buy Island

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - The Cabinet Tuesday ended a three-year stand-off when it defied Gov. Bob Graham and voted to buy a major portion of Bay County's Shell Island for \$10 million, almost twice the appraisal price set in 1983.

The Cabinet also continued a growing debate over the embattled merit teacher pay program.

Tallahassee developer E. Lamar Bailey, who owns most of Shell Island, said he would accept the Cabinet's offer, but blasted Graham for "unethical" practices.

"Gov. Graham has acted, in my opinion, as unethical as anybody could possibly act in acquiring property," Bailey said. "It's obvious the governor wanted the state to spend the money in South Florida and not with the people of North Florida."

#### Solon Says Laws Hurt Elderly

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) - Local government zoning laws are keeping elderly residents from maintaining their independence, an influential legislator says.

Rep. Elaine Gordon told a conference on problems of the elderly Tuesday that zoning laws prohibiting congregate living - that is, several people living in one building with common facilities - keep elderly people from combining their limited incomes to rent housing. In many cases, Gordon says, that leaves older citizens with no alternative but nursing homes.

Gordon also says there will be little money for Florida's elderly this year unless the Legislature repeals a long list of sales tax exemptions. Without tax reforms, she said, it will take "creative decisions" to avoid cutting programs for the

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

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

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

Ray also reads anything he can on horticulture, including conventions relating to his prolession. "I'm kind of an organic gardner. I'm not too crazy about poisons," says Ray. "I think it's ruining our environment. You can take a mild soap water and just spray it on tomato plants and get ride of the bugs. Or sometimes a little crushed garlic in the water will repel them. There are so many things you can do on a small scale organicily."

On a grand scale, Ray shares with us some of his finest recipes, which he has somewhat personalized to his own tastes, but will surely become a part of your own collection.

#### ROAST DUCK

(Southern Living, altered by Ray Sage)

Because ducks are usually so fat, it is desirable to eliminate as much fat as possible before they

are roasted. The following is the suggested method for two (4 to 5 lb.) ducks, or a 7 to 8 pound

Clean and dry ducks thoroughly. Truss by pressing wings close to body of duck and tving twine around entire upper portion. Tuck neck skin under the twine. Tie legs together. Place in open roasting pan. Stuff inside cavity with one cut-up apple and 2 chopped celery stalks for each duck. Prick with a fork over the entire surface of the ducks, pricking every inch. Roast at 350 degrees for 1 hour with a piece of foil loosely placed over ducks to prevent their becoming dry. Pour off fat that accumulates in pan, twice during cooking at 20 and 40

Meanwhile, in a small bowl, combine the following:

1 tablespoon salt

¼ teaspoon pepper

I teaspoon seasoned salt ⅓ geaspoon garlie powder.


I teaspoon poultry seasoning 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

2 to 3 dashes cayenne pepper Note: If cooking only one duck. use half the amount of spices.

# Eggs Require Special Technique

Eggs can be successfully microwave cooked and turned into many nutritious and easily prepared dishes if you follow a few special cooking techniques. Many recipes for eggs need to be covered when cooked with a lid. plastic wrap or waxed paper to encourage more even cooking. For best results cook the egg on a 70% power setting. The yolk of the egg cooks faster than the white due to the higher far content of the yolk. Never cook eggs in the shell. Pierce the membrane of the yolk with a tooth pick. This will prevent the bursting of the yolk due to build-up of steam. To hard cook eggs in the microwave oven. separate 3 eggs and place in 2 lightly buttered bowls. Stir the yolks with a fork. Cover each bowl with plastic wrap-Microwave on 50% power. Microwave the volks for 45 seconds to 14 minutes and microwave the whites  $2 - 2^{i_2}$ minutes. Remove when underdone. Let stand, covered for 2-3 minutes. The eggs can then be used in the recipes calling for hard-cooked eggs.

To scramble eggs in the microwave oven: place I teaspoon butter in a micro-soft dish. seconds or until butter melts. Add milk and eggs. Stir well with a fork or flat bottom wire wisk. Microwave for half of the cooking time. Stir eggs well. Eggs around the edge of the dish are beginning to set. Sur to move the eggs from the center to the outside of the container. Microwave on 100% to power the remaining time. Remove the eggs while they are still soft and moist. Let stand 1-3 minutes. Stir again before serving

DEAR READER — I think your husband should be evaluated for circulation problems. Although arthritis can affect the feet, the pain is usually in the joints, not on the soles.
