Earthquake shakes five states

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — A moderate earthquake along the infamous New Madrid fault made downtown skyacrapers vibrate "like tuning forks" and shook the ground in five states, panicking residents but injuring no one, officials said.

The earthquaise, which hit at 11:48 s.m. CDT Thursday with a magnitude of 4.7 on the Richter scale, was centered about 10 miles northeast of Blytheville, Ark., and felt 300 miles away in Paducah, Ky., the U.S. Geological Survey reported.

Recreation survey: Sanford taxpayers say they're not getting their money's worth

SANFORD — A majority of Sanford taxpayers don't think they are getting their money's worth from city recreational programming and facilities, according to a recreation task force study.

The results of the study were released yesterday at a meeting of the task force, which


was established earlier this year to make recommendations to the city commission.

The surveys were distributed at Sanford schools, and completed by parents and students.

Of the 137 respondents, 64 percent said their tax dollars were not "being properly administered to provide for parkland and recreational programs." Another 31 percent said they

Fifty-six percent said the city commission and staff are not "taking comprehensive steps to insure that the recreational needs in our rapidly growing community are being met." Nearly 40 percent said the city is taking those steps.

Pair of former P&Z members could be fined

SANFORD — The Florida Commission on Ethics has recommended two former Seminole County Planning and Zoning Commissioners should be fined for violations of state laws requiring public officials to file annual financial disclosure forms.

Joe Creamons and James Weinberg, both former P&Z members who left the board in early 1988, were found in violation of state laws by the ethics commission earlier this month.

Complaints had been filed against Creamons and Weinberg by the same five people within three days of each other in December 1987. The complaintants were Glen and Nancy Roth, Linda Zapitz, Carmon Stapleton and Will Jordan. Martha Adeyemo, ethics complaint corrdinator, said the five people filed the same complaints against each man.

The ethics commission found that Creamons had not filed his 1986-1987 financial disclosure form by July 1, 1987 when it was due, nor by the Sept. 1, 1987 "grace period" deadline. As a result, on April 13 they recommended county commissioners fine hime \$200.

Shuttle fueled, ready for 2:24 p.m. launch

CAPE CANAVERAL — Launch pad crews fueled the shuttle Atlantis for blasto Y today on a flight to dispatch the unmanned Magellan spacecraft to Venus and put America at the forefront of interplanetary exploration.

NASA reported no serious technical problems and, with good weather expected, Atlantis's five-member crew was cleared for an afternoon launch of the 29th shuttle flight, the second this year.

Technicians began pumping a half-million gallons of supercold rocket fuel into the ship's external tank shortly before dawn and completed the job about 8:30 a.m. today. The countdown then entered a planned two-hour "hold" to give technicians a chance to make sure the frigid fuel had not caused any ice to form on the spaceship.

"The countdown has gone very smoothly," NASA spokesman George Diller said. "Weatherwise and from a standpoint of the space shuttle Atlantis, everything is go."

The crew of commander David Walker, 44, co-pilot Ronald Grabe, 43, astronauts Mary Cleave, 42, Mark Lee, 36, and Norman Thagard, 45, was to board the craft at at 10:40 a m. "We're ready to go fly." said

Rear Adm. Richard Truly, the former astronaul nominated by President Bush to serve as administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.


But because of a variety of technical issues. NASA had only 23 minutes to launch Atlantis Friday or the flight would face a 24-hour delay. In the 28 previous shuttle flights, only two had shorter "launch windows."

The flight plan called for Lee to release Magellan, built by Martin Marietta Astronautics Group of Denver, from the shuttle's 60-foot payload bay at 8:42 p.m., six hours and 18 minutes after launch.

An hour after that, the probe's \$45 million "inertial upper stage" booster, built by Boeing Aerospace Corp. of Seattle, was scheduled to fire to begin the probe's \$5-month voyage to Venus, with an arrival date of Aug. 10, 1990.

A number of American and foreign dignituries were expected for Atlantis's launch, including Russian researchers who will help analyze the radar data from Magellan and Igor Volk, the chief test pilot of the Soviet space shuttle Buran, which has yet to make a manned flight.

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Court strikes down one death sentence

TALLAHASSEE — The Supreme Court upheld one death sentence Thursday but struck down the second given to a man

convicted of killing an elderly Deland couple in 1986.

According to court records, Roger Lee Cherry broke into the Deland home of Leonard and Eather Wayne late on the evening of June 27, 1966. The break-in fied been well planned: Cherry cut a telephone wire and carefully removed panes from the window he used to gain entrance.

Once inside, Cherry brutally beat Eather Wayne to death. Leonard Wayne died of a heart attack brought on by Cherry's

actions.

Cherry was sententeed to death for each of the murders. On cherry was sententeed to death for each of the murders. On

appeal, however, the court ruled that it would be unfair to execute Cherry for Leonard Wayne's heart attack.

"We cannot conclude that death is a proportionate punishment when the victim dies of a heart attack during a felony in the absence of any deliberate attempt to cause the heart attack." Justice Rosemary Barkett wrote in the

unanimous ruling.

The court upheld the death sentence given to Cherry for Eather Wayne's murder, as well as his convictions for burglary.

The justices upheld Cherry's conviction for the murder of Leonard Wayne, but ordered that his sentence be reduced to life without eligibility for parole for 25 years.

Most Floridians unaware of clean air law

TALLAHASSEE — Most Floridians are unaware of the 1968 Clean Outdoor Air Law aimed at reducing air pollution from automobiles, and 41 percent believe removing anti-poliution devices in cars improves mileage and performance, a statewide survey released Thursday showed.

The Florida State University survey found a alight increase in the percentage of people who believe the devices help control air pollution, 80 percent compared to 74 percent in 1986, but said people with an income of \$15,000 or less are more likely to believe removal of the devices will not increase air pollution.

A total of 41 percent of the people who answered the random telephone survey believed removing the anti-pollution devices would improve mileage or performance in cars, with college graduates more likely to believe this than other education

groups.
"Further, only 16 percent of adult Floridians have heard or read anything about the 1986 Clean Outdoor Air Law," researchers with the FSU Research Laboratory said in a prepared statement.

Judge: No more courtroom Santeria

MIAMI — A federal judge warned that he would tolerate no more courtroom Santeria ceremonies after a drug suspect's wife sprinkled the court with a white powder in a rite performed to bring good luck at trial.

Initial concern over the nature of the white powder was quelled when it was identified as casarine, pulverized egashell

commonly used in purification ceremonies.

But U.S. District Judge William Hoeveler apparently felt his courtroom was pure enough already.

"We don't need that sort of thing around this court."

Hoeveler told the defense lawyers outside the jury's presence.

Hoeveler said the incident occurred early Wednesday before the trial began for eight men charged with conspiring to smuggle thousands of pounds of marijuans into the United

The wife of one defendant stepped into the courtroom "with

some white powder in her hands, cupped her hands under her mouth and blew," Hoeveler said.

A marshal saw the woman sprinkle the powder and told the court reporter, who notified the judge. Later, other court employees found more white powder on the ladies' room floor.

TAMPA — A mentally retarded 7-year-old girl with AIDS who a judge said could attend public school and sit alongside other students attended her first day of class Thursday and received a hug from one of her classmates.

Eliana Martines, wearing a pink dress and bows in her hair and carrying a knapsack containing her medicine, looked shy and withdrawn as she was escorted into Manhattan Elementary School without incident by achool officials and a security officer. Her mother, Rosa Martinez, also accompanied her

'She just rushed in (to class) and the children came around her," Mrs. Martinez told reporters. "One of them hugged her." U.S. District Judge Elizabeth A. Kovachevich ruled Aug. 8 that Eliana could not attend a special class for the mentally retarded unless she remained isolated in a Plexiglas booth. Kovachevich said Eliana had to be separated from other students because she sucked her thumb and was not tollet

potential grand jury witness working for Gulf Power to die or disappear in the last five but unreco months.

Pilots Mike Holmes and John Major, both of Gulfport, Miss., also died in the crash.

"Yeah, you can stop investigating Gulf Power now. We took care of that for them this afternoon," said the man who called the Escambia County Sheriff's Office just hours after the twin-engine plane crashed into an apartment complex. No one on the ground was seriously injured.

Sheriff Charlie Johnson said hopefully someone will recognize the twangy drawl of the man's voice and notify

The call, and another similar but unrecorded one made to the Pensacola airport control tower. was the only evidence pointing to sabotage in the crash, Johnson said, but investigators want to follow all clues.

Federal investigators also have said there is no firm indication the crash was anything but an accident, although they have determined there was a fire of some kind in the cockpit before the crash. The sheriff said a certified

stress analyst examined the tape and concluded the caller was telling the truth. He made no inferences from that, however.

The Southern Co. owns

Georgia Power, Mississippi Power and Savannah Power. Horton was en route to Atlanta for a meeting at Southern Co.

headquarters. Ray Howell. a graphics artist who performed contract work for Gulf Power, disappeared Dec. 8 from an Atlanta hotel room shortly before he was to testify

before the grand jury. He is still

missing.

Former Gulf Power board member Robert McRae, 72, and his wife Kathyrn, 70, were found dead Jan. 29 on the kitchen floor of their home in Graceville, north of Panama City on the Alabama line. Both had been shot once in the head. Their slayings remain unsolved.





C of C: Red Bug should be six lanes

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS -The board of directors of the Greater Seminole County Chamber of Commerce urged Seminole County commissioners to reverse their decision to limit contruction of portions of Red Bug Lake Road to four lanes.

Even though a majority of commissioners authorized the redesign of the road Jan. 24 from a six- to four-lane plan at a potential additional cost of up to \$300,000, chamber vice president Bob Lewis said it isn't too late to go back to a four-lane design allowing for six lanes at a later time.

"Would you rather waste a few weeks work now or spend \$5 million down the road?." Lewis

now and prepare for six lanes."

The board of directors of the 1.700-member chamber voted unanimously Wednesday to urge commissioners to revert to the original six-lane plan.

County plans for several years have called for widening the congested Red Bug Lake Road from the current two lanes to four lanes, but allow enough expansion room in the center median to add two more lanes when needed.

County traffic projections show that within 20 years. Red Bug will have about 50,000 cars travelling on it daily, more than even a six-lane road can carry. The Duda office park planned near the eastern end of Red Bug



Ethics package has holes

Integrity has no need of rules, Albert Camus wrote, But, George Bush might add, public officials do.

public officials do.

The other day, the president proposed an ethics legislation package that would make uniform rules for Congress, the executive. branch and the judiciary. It offers a little something for everyone, particularly Congress, but not quite enough for all.

The president blinked, for example, when it came to recommending an end to honoraria for members of Congress, usually, that lawmakers accept from lobbyists with an interest in particular legislation.

interest in particular legislation.

ethics commission that bonoraria ought to be bunned, but he believes the ban should be accompanied by a congressional pay raise.

Kartier this year, Congress rejected a pay raise for itself after the public complained.

Both the president and members of Congress see a ban on honoraria as a pay cut. We suggest that a ban on honoraria would burnish Congress' public image, thus making

burnish Congress' public image, thus making a pay raise more palatable.

On another matter involving Congress.

Bush called for a ban on campaign contribu-tions by political-action committees. Con-gress, recognizing the inflated influence PAC money wields over the election process, has played around the past couple of sessions with limiting PAC contributions, but it just

can't bring itself to cut off the flow.

Bush, unfortunately, failed to suggest any specific legislative proposal for cutting off PAC money.

On yet another matter involving Congress, the president missed the point. He recommended that members of Congress be covered by the same independent-counsel law that manifes to alleged wrongstoing in the executive branch. "If Washington is to be a level playing field," he said, "then every player should be treated the same."

That sounds reasonable, except for the fact that the independent-counsel law was established to correct a pronounced tilt.

The independent counsel investigates the executive branch because of that branch's inability to investigate and prosecute itself without an intrinsic conflict of interest. The executive branch has no such conflict when it comes to investigating Congress.

The president also proposes, in effect, to undermine the current independent-counsel law. He wants the court charged with appointing an independent counsel to choose from a list of 15 selected by the attorney general. The attorney general, of course, is the very official who cannot conduct the prosecution because of the inherent conflict. The president also would limit an indepen-

dent counsel's power to appoint his own staff. The independent counsel ideas deserve to

Also useful is a proposal that members of Congress and their aides be required to wait a year after leaving government before being allowed to lobby their former colleagues.

Bush has spoken out strongly on the need for strengthened ethical standards, even before he was elected. His ethics package doesn't measure up to his strong public positions, but at least it offers Congress a starting point. Lawmakers, their minds focused by the bitter debate about Speaker Jim Wright's ethical lapses, perhaps can improve on the president's handiwork.

The most recent figures showed the U.S. trade deficit growing deeper again. The usual suspects have tak-taked that America is a debtor nation. that everyone everywhere is out-competing us, that we're not innovative enough or productive enough, that Japan is a rising sun, that America

In France the movie theaters basically show French movies and American movies.

"Rambo" to "Rain Man" — are very popular around the world. In 1988, foreigners paid \$1.1 billion dollars for the rights to show American

A chain of fusion-related events

WASHINGTON — It is devoutly to be hoped here and among Alaska's caribou, if not in Saudi Arabia - that we are witnessing this week what historians one hundred years hence will see as a lovely convergence of

The Bush administration, casting caution to the wind, is contemplating intruding itself into the most intimate of relationships, that between the American and his automobile. As the cleanup of the Alaskan oil spill continues, Congress is making amends to all creatures great and small (although some bipeds may dissent) by preventing exploration for oil in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR). In parched Kansas, farmers are doing what farmers have been condemned to do since prehistoric man first tilled soil: They are looking heavenward and worring about rain.

And in a red picnic cooler at Stanford University, something is happening. A scientist says, laconically, this: "We're running excess heat above and beyone any chemical

He and others in hot pursuit of cold fusion could be on the verge of mankind's most life-transforming development since the discovery of electricity, or even since the great lighting-up recorded in Genesis.

Let's back up and take it from the top, beginning with the administration's reported Intention to toughen CAFE (corporate automotive fuel economy) standards for automobiles.

CAFE standards were products of the 1970s energy crisis and were a casualty of the Reagan administration's deregulatory impulse. Reagan improved the energy-supply picture by decontrolling parts of the industry. And beginning in 1986, the Reagan adminsitration acceded to auto-industry requests for relaxed standards. Some people now are arguing for tougher mileage requirements because of (pick one reason, pick many) the oil spill, air pollution, the greenhouse effect, national security, the trade deficit. automobilephobia.

It is, of course, true that if we burn less oil, we need to ship less of it across water. But this, too, is true: One of today's principal political skills is advancing pet projects by piggybacking them on passing crises. This requires the reflexes of a trout and the nimbleness of a mountain goat because crises come like lightning (remember the Chilean grapes? Chile, which lost 1.5 percent of its GNP, does) and do not linger (remember the Apple Terror?). Changes in CAFE should not be connected with all current crises.

Besides, better automobile mileage usually involves less automobile mass, the mass often is a correlate of safety. Some safety experts say higher CAFE standards will cost thousands of lives. It would be nice to be able to dodge such choices. It would be nice if the future were being incubated in that piente cooler.

Fusion is the process of uniting two light atoms into one heavy atom in a way that releases energy. The dream has been for a way of doing the uniting cheaply and captur-ing the released

energy for the production of electricity. Hitherto, attempts at fusion have in-volved huge, complex, expensive dearticles to 50 militon degrees. Cold fusion might involve relatively simple technologies operating at room temperature with fuel derived from seawater, fuel that would be inexpensive and virtually limitiess.

If such fusion has a practical future in. say, the next quarter

century, then: Saudi Arabia is so much sand covering a devalued asset. Oil expensive enough —

perhaps \$40 a barrel — to justify development in ANWR may not be as inevitable, or inevitable nearly as soon, as some people say. The greenhouse effect (the warming of the planet by trapped gases released from burning fossil fuels) and the inundations of coastal areas and other projected catastrophes may be postponed indefinitely. Desalination of seawater and delivery of it to suburban Phoenix lawn sprinklers and — who knows? even to Kansas may be ecomomically feasible.

Sound atrange? Stranger than going from sailing ships to nuclear submarines in the lifetime of some sailors?

Perhaps no new energy revolution could mean as much as mere electrification of the countryside meant to farm families, and especially women, as recent as six decades ago. Electrification lifted so many burdens, not least that of loneliness, which was partially dispelled by radio.

Women, round-shouldered from lifting hundreds of tons of water from wells and carrying it scores of mile to their houses, could testify to the burdens before electricity. Other testimony was in the characteristic increases between women's eyebrows from squinting to read by kerosene lamps.

However, a new source of abundant, inexpensive energy would change a wide range of public and private choices.

Government ignored S&L crisis warning

WASHINGTON — American taxpayers will asked to dig deep in their pockets for as much as \$200 billion to bail out hundreds of savings and loans that were run into the ground by crap-shoot management. You can send your thank-you notes to Federal Home Loan Bank Board Chairman Danny Wall, former Treasury Secretary James Baker and the spineless members of Congress who were in the pocket of special interests.

The sait to rub into the taxpayers' wound is the fact that a bailout would have cost only

about \$10 billion relative pocket change - if government officials had acted when experts were still smelling smoke. Here's one glaring

example. In early 1965, William Isaac, who was then chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., implored Baker to make solvtop priority. On June 5, 1985, a letter stamped "highly confidential" was sent by Issac to Baker, who had re-cently been named

Treasury secretary, It read: "When we got together a few months ago in your office, I told you that

one of my principal concerns about the financial system was the condition of the thrift industry and the ability of the (depositor insurance fund) to cope with the problems. About that time, I requested our staff to prepare an analysis of the thrift industry. ... (T)he study concludes that the problems of the thrift industry are of such proportions that they will soon overwhelm the ability of the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance

Corp. to deal with them unless something major is done to shore up the FSLIC."

lasac was in a ticklish position to be sounding the alarm. He ran the FDIC, which insures commercial bank deposits. He was smart enough to know that something was grossly wrong at his sister agency, the FSLIC. which insures savings and loan deposits. But he didn't want to look like a meddler. So he prepared his study secretly and sent it to Baker with a note that it was done "without benefit of direct access to the FSLIC which does not know that we have done this work." isaac parenthetically added that he "did not want to stir up any more political concerns than necessary at this time."

What was Baker's response to Isaac's financial S.O.S.?

According to our sources, the unspoken policy was that if a crisis was brewing, make sure it didn't crupt on Ronald Reagan's watch. In other words, save it for the next president. That turned out to be Baker's good friend George Bush, who may be wondering now what triends are for. Had Baker used some of his legendary savvy to resolve the thrift crisis then, the cost would have been a fraction of what it will be today.

When Baker's Treasury Department belatedly kicked into gear, it simply put its finger in the dike and lobbled for the recapitalisation of the depositor insurance fund. Baker let a much lower man on the totem pole, Edwin Gray, propose tough reforms in the industry and take the heat for those proposals. Gray was Wall's predecessor as chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank

In July 1987, Wall took over that job and all hope of reform flew out the window. Where Gray yelled "fire" from the rooftops. Wall couldn't even smell the smoke. Where Gray refused to let the industry call the shots, Wall laid down to be their welcome mat.

Wall quickly lost the respect of some of his staff, some General Accounting Office investigators and key members of Congress.




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Soviet spy satellites reported

LOS ANGELES — Nuclear-powered Soviet spy satellites capable of zeroing in on U.S. submarines have been detected emitting powerful gamma rays that interfere with space communication, scientists reported.

The accidental discovery occurred last year but was reported Thursday in the current issue of the British journal Science, which this week focuses on what before had been a highly classified government concern.

Researchers from the University of California-Riverside pinpointed the spy satellites by way of a telescope strapped to a high-flying space balloon during a mission aimed at getting a bird's-eye view of the stars.

But Vaughan said he could not confirm accounts of a non-union truck driver brandishing a pistol at miners who blocked the roads to Pittston Coal Group operations.

Vaughan said a total of 1,059 arrests and 122 felonies have been reported in the 3-week-old walkout, which some unionists are calling the most significant selective strike of the decade.

FAA missed United violations

SEATTLE — Federal Aviation Administration officials conceded that the agency did not catch United Airlines' violations of approved inspection procedures for Boeing 747 cargo doors like the one that burst open on a United flight in February.

Thursday's testimony of FAA maintenance inspector Robert Sanchez before the National Transportation Safety Board panel investigating the door failure that killed nine people added to evidence that coordinating and communicating maintenance procedures is a growing problem in the airline industry.

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Landfills contaminating water "Corrective action measures may have to

WASHINGTON - About 70 percent of commercial toxic waste landfills are known or believed to be contaminating ground water, posing cleanup costs rivaling the \$8.5 billion Superfund effort for abandoned dumps, officials said.

Despite the massive problem, the Environmental Protection Agency has not only failed to adequately enforce ground water monitoring requirements but issued operating permits to landfills with serious deficiencies, congressional investigators told Congress on Thursday.

In addition, lawmakers charged top EPA officials sought to repress critical comments about the agency's ground water program.

about the agency's ground water program by an internal EPA task force that studied conditions at 24 landfills.

At a House hearing, Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., released internal Environmental Protection Agency documents that estimated the cost of cleaning up contamination from landfills could go as high as

be initiated at 60-70 percent of these facilities," said a "draft corrective action outyear strategy" document authored by EPA regional and headquarters officials.

"Whatever the estimate, it is clear that the

(landfill) corrective action program could potentially equal or exceed the magnitude of the Superfund program."

Dingell, chairman of the House Energy and Commerce Committee's subcommittee on oversight and investigation, said EPA officials had told his panel's investigators that 70 to 80 percent of the 1,447 land disposal facilities in the nation are known or suspected of leaking toxic waste into ground

"Yet, only a small percentage of such facilities have assessed the rate, magnitude and extent of contamination, and very few

have initiated cleanup action," Dingell said.

The hearing focused on commercial toxic waste landfills regulated under the federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act.

which is separate from the EPA's Superfund toxic waste cleanup program aimed at abandoned dump sites.

EPA officials say that while federal and state governments have hundreds of millions of dollars to spend on cleaning up Superfund sites, only about \$30 million a year is budgeted for addressing contamination at commercial landfills.

About 1,100 landfills have closed in recent years as federal regulations have tightened and the ground water monitoring requirements are regarded as among the most problematic for the industry.

Richard Hembra, an investigator with the General Accounting Office, the auditing arm of Congress, told lawmakers EPA had failed to give landfill operators sufficient guidance on how to carry out technically complex ground water monitoring and sampling

As a result, Hembra said much monitor-ing data was of dubious reliability and accuracy, leaving the EPA in the dark about actual conditions at many landfills.

The committee voted 18-6 Thursday in favor of the \$1.16 trillion budget resolution and sent it to the House floor, where it is expected to be considered next week.

Last week, the Senate Budget Committee passed its version of the fiscal 1990 budget resolution and the full Senate is expected to begin its debate next week as well.

The House resolution establishes a fiscal 1990 deficit of 899.7 billion — just under the \$100 billion deficit cap imposed by the Gramm-Rudman balanced budget law.

KABUL, Afghanistan — Rebels pounded Kabul with more than 50 rockets, killing 23 people and wounding 60 to arraylong attack on the 11th anniversary of the 1978 military coup that brought President Najibullah's Sovietbacked party to power, official radio said,

Chinese and Soviets plan summit

BELJING - China and the Soviet Union concluded a week of talks Friday that scaled major preparations for next month's historic Sino-Soviet summit, but failed to narrow differences on a actilement for occupied Cambodia, East-bloc diplomats said.

The diplomats said a compromise is expected on at least one of the two chief outstanding disputes on Cambodia during talks next week between China and Vietnam, whose troops have occupied Cambodia since 1978 with Soviet backing.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Igor Rogachev, who arrived in Beiling last Saturday, left the Chinese capitals on an afternoon flight after the week of

talks with Chinese officials.

The Eastern diplomats, who were informed on the talks but asked not to be identified were put on preparations for the May 15-18 visit to China by Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, including work on a joint public statement.

Gorbachev will meet with Deng Xiaoping and other Chinese leaders for the first Sino-Soviet summit since 1959. The visit will lead to a normalization of relations between the communist superpowers for the first time in more than two decades.

Relations between Beijing and Moscow collapsed in the early 1960s over political and territorial disputes, but have steadily improved since the early 1980s.

The diplomats said Gorbachev will arrive on the afternoon of May 15, hold talks and sightsee in Beijing and visit another city, probably Shanghai, on May 18 before an afternoon departure.

The Shanghai stop is nearly certain but has not been formalized because of concern in Moscow over a port call to Shanghai by the U.S. Navy that also begins May 18, they said.

Diplomata said Rogachev and Chinese officials made no further progress on a settlement in Cambodia, the last of "three obstacles" the Chinese had demanded be solved before ties were normalised.


China is the chief supporter of the three-faction Cambodian resistance, including the communist Khmer Rouge, fighting a decade-old guerrilla war against Vietnam and the Phnom Penh government Hanoi Installed after the invasion.

Although Vietnam has pledged to withdraw all its remaining troops from Cambodia by Sept. 30, negotiations between the resistance and Phnom Penh have stalled over international supervision of the pullout and the means of forming an interim government afterward.

But the diplomats said they expected a compromise on the supervision issue when Vietnamese Vice Foreign Minister Dinh Ngo Liem visits Beijing next week for a new round of direct talks with Chinese officials on Cambodia. They did not

claborate. The resistance, backed by China, has demanded an international peacekeeping force under United Nations auspices and the dissolution of the Hanoi-installed government of Prime Minister Hun Sen.



State park is sanctuary for city dwellers

Replace metropolitan high-rise buildings with tall trees, cars with canoes, and stoves with campfires. Suddenly, life seems considerably less complicated.

With a visit to Wekiwa Springs State Park, located off Wekiva Springs Road at 1800 Wekiwa Circle, Apopka, one can get back to the basics and explore 6,400 acres in a Timucuan Indian's moccasins.

"It's an island of wilderness in a sea of urbanity," said

Catherine Florko, park officer.
"We have all kinds of recreational facilities-swimming. canoeing, hiking, camping and fishing," said Barry Burch. assistant park manager.

For an admission cost of \$1 per car driver and 50 cents for each additional passenger (children under 5 are free), one can swim or snorkel in the spring of Wekiwa Springs. One may even uncover an artifact of the Timucuan Indians who previously inhabited the area.

The spring's fresh water maintains a constant tempera-ture of 68°F to 72°F. For those who would rather work on their tans, however, there is a grassy area facing the spring for sunbathing.

many types of fish, alligators and plant life call the park their "One of the most outstanding

features about the park is our variety of plant communities," Murrian said.

Modern-day explorers also can rent a three-person canoe and paddle down the Wekiva River. which Murrian described as. one of the few pristine rivers left in the state of Florida."

A \$12 deposit is required for canoe rental, and the rates are \$6 for two hours, \$7 for three, \$9 for four, and \$12 for a full day. In addition, overnight, educational canoe trips are available for groups. If interested in canoeing. contact Lorraine or Eddie Williford at 889-7799.

Happy campers can blow the dust off their tents for a visit to Wekiwa Springs State Park. The park offers 60 campsites, ranging from the most primitive to those with electricity. It offers two centrally located bathrooms. as well as hot and cold running water. Rates vary, but all are

"It's to protect the large wilderness," Burch said, "And it's not like the park's running the show-they are.

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

Pope appeals for peace in Lebanon, beatifies five

VATICAN CITY - Pope John Paul II, departing from a prepared homily in beatifica-tion ceremonies Sunday, uttered a "cry of prayer to God and men" for peace in Lebanon.

The pontiff urged those gathered for mass in St. Peter's Square to pray that "the Lebanese people, which is living in anguish and in agony, returns to the tranquility of living.

It was John Paul's third appeal in a week for resolution of the 14-year Lebanese civil war, which since March has put the population of Beirut under incessant artillery fire.

Last week the pope called for cease-fire efforts by the United Nations and the Arab League. Appeals also have come from the Roman Catholic Synod of Bishops and other Vatican offices.

John Paul appealed to the human conscience of the governments and armed forces clashing in Lebanon.

"I repeat again," he said in remarks departing from the prepared homily text, "this is a cry of alarm."

in the ceremony, John Paul proclaimed the beatification of two Spanish priests martyred in Japan in the 17th century, a French nun of the same era. and two women - one Polish. the other Italian - who founded religious orders in the 1800s.

Beatification is a preliminary step toward sainthood and confers the title of "Blessed" on those so honored by the Catholic Church for their heroic practice of virtue or martyrdom.

The five people beatified Sunday were:

• Maria Margherita Caiani (1863-1921), of Italy, founder of the Sisters Minims of the Sacred Heart.

OMaria Di Gesu' Buon Pastore (born Francesca Siedliska in Poland), founder of the Sistern of the Holy Family of Nazareth.

• Maria Caterina di Sant' Agostino of France (1632-1668), of the Augustinian Order of the Mercy of Jesue.

• Martino Di San Nicola (1598-1632) and Melchiorre Di Sant'Agostino (1599-1632), Spaniards of the Order of Augustinian Recollects burned alive in Japan.

Churches studying debt crisis

Karl Barth, one of the giants of post-World War II neo-orthodox theology, used to talk about the need for pastors to preach with the Bible in one hand and the newspaper in the other.

These days, the preachers and theologians are looking increasingly to the business pages and wondering how the complex. perhaps even areane, issue of the Third World debt crisis relates to their message of faith, salvation and justice.

At least two major denominations — the Roman Catholic Church and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America have recently announced they are undertaking major studies of the issue.

Another, the Episcopal Church, recently held an ecumenical session to hear leaders from the All Africa Council of Churches talk about the crisis

and its impact on their region. And in Washington, Interfaith Action for Economic Justice, has monitored the issue since it first began to emerge as a crisis for nations, bankers and policymakers in 1982, providing information and study material for churches, synagogues and others.

On one level the issue is simple: The poor nations who make up the developing or Third World owe more than \$1.3 trillion to governments, international institutions and commer-cial banks in the West and can't afford to pay it off.

Indeed, they can't always make the interest or service payments on the debt. In 1987, the payments to service the debt resulted in a net transfer of more than \$43 billion from the poor countries to their creditors. Over the past five years, such transfers have totaled \$142.1 billion - without making a significant

dent in the debt or improvement were falling on its perpetrators in their economics.

"Largely as a result of it." the Rev. J. Bryan Hehir, testifying for the U.S. Catholic Conference. told Congress earlier this year. "unemployment has increased in the developing countries in the 1980s, per capita incomes have fallen, economic growth has slowed and there has been an appailing social cost particularly in the least developed countries and among the poor throughout the Third

Religious officials looking at the crisis have so far refrained from pointing fingers of blame.
"The fact that so much of

today's staggering debt was irresponsibly lent and ir-responsibly borrowed," Richard Jolly, deputy executive director of the United Nation's Children's Fund, told the Episcopal session on Africa, "would matter less if the consequences of such folly

"Yet now, when the party is over and the bills are coming in. it is the poor who are being asked to pay," he added.

It is the impact on the poor that has driven to churches into

Unlike some issues in the past, however, the churches aren't rushing to judgment with preachy pronouncements and simplistic solutions.

Directors of the U.S. Catholic Conference study, for example, say they not only want to develop moral and policy criteria for the bishops to speak on the issue but also want to encourage dialogue among individual Catholics involved in the question from differing perspectives.

The Lutherans, whose work will be guided by its Commission for Church in Society, also are taking a prudent approach to the Issue.

Churches responding to Sudan famine

In just a week or so, the rainy season will come to the southern part of Sudan, making roads and airstrips in the civil war-torn region of the north African country impassable.

The rains will also put at risk - through starvation and illness - the lives of hundreds of thousands of Sudanese.

North American and European churches, joining with non-governmental agencies such as the Red Cross and — finally — the United Nations and the U.S. government, have mounted a major relief effort aimed at saving those lives.

But the effort is complicated by political, military and religious obstacles that continuously threaten the delivery of food, medicine and other relief material.

According to the United Nations, in 1988 an estimated 250,000 people died from faminerelated causes in the Sudan - a famine caused not just by drought but also by a bloody civil war between Moslem Arabs in the northern part of the country and black African tribes in the southern. many of whom are Christian.

The civil war, according to church and international agency officials, has created 2 million to 3 million refugees in the south and has prevented food from reaching them.

"The dislocation of tribal people from their nomad lands is devastating," said Dean Hancock. an executive with the United Mehtodist Committee on Relief.

Hancock, who recently visited the Sudan and a number of the refugee camps, described a grim situation - meager food, sheets of plastic for shelter, little water - and then added: "I was only seeing the good parts of Sudan. Nobody's been allowed in the middle of South Sudan ... where the food has been cut."

But he cited one grim clue: the discovery of 8,000 bodies of those trying to escape Sudan found along the routes to liang, a town in neighboring Ethiopia.

In mid-April, the United Nation's Operation Lifeline Sudan, said Western nation's had pledged \$133 million to fight the famine.

A number of church groups, including Church World Service, Lutheran World Relief, the Mennonite Central Committee, Catholic Relief Services and World Vision have been involved for years in the relief effort and are expected to play critical roles in the distribution effort.

In addition, a number of the church groups are pushing for changes in U.S policy that could increase and speed delivery of U.S. aid to the troubled area and prepare for long-term development when peace does come.
