

## Roosevelt Refuses Resignation Of His Treasury Secretary

### Woodin Given Lengthy Leave Of Absence; Morgenthau Takes Over Responsibility

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(A.P.)—President Roosevelt today announced that Secretary Woodin would begin a "complete leave of absence" at the end of the week and that pending his return Henry Morgenthau, Jr. would be acting secretary of the treasury.

Under-secretary Dean Acheson has resigned and Morgenthau will be appointed to that post. Woodin tendered his resignation to the President several days ago but Mr. Roosevelt declined to accept it, suggesting instead that the Secretary be completely freed from all governmental responsibilities while he takes a complete rest.

He had been suffering from throat infection, which has required constant treatment by New York specialists. Mr. Woodin will receive no remuneration during his absence.

### Drop In Value Of U.S. Bonds Being Studied By Treasury Officials

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Treasury government bond prices today reflected the ad- vance in the national credit market. The national credit market was attempting to move upward by its gold buying operations today. The price of gold today stood at \$35.00 a pound, far below the dollar price of \$35.00. The dollar meanwhile fell to 5.97 1/2 at the London opening.

Parities of the metal here and abroad have been accompanied by definite price increases and a sharp dollar depreciation in relation to the pound. Yesterday the dollar closed at \$2.22 in London and \$2.26 in New York in contrast with the exchange rate of \$4.75 to \$4.80 that prevailed when the gold operations were undertaken.

However, sharp declines in the dollar have induced a simultaneous slump in government bonds, a situation described as occasioning administration fiscal officers no little uneasiness. The nub of the problem lay in the fact that the government probably must borrow more than \$800,000,000 to finance the public works program and other phases of the recovery drive.

Officials asserted yesterday that if faced with a choice between raising commodity prices by the gold method and maintaining government security prices, the decision undoubtedly would be the abandonment of the gold program.

### Bold Robbery Staged On Charlotte Street

CHARLOTTE, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Four bandits used two automobiles to block off a United States mail truck in the business district here today, mounted a machine gun in the street to hold interlopers at bay, and escaped with an undetermined amount of loot. First reports said one registered mail pouch and four first class pouches were included in the haul.

### Court Approves Collier Plea For Moratorium

TAMPA, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Barrow G. Collier's petition for a three-year moratorium on approximately \$17,000,000 in debts was approved in the United States district court here today and Judge Alexander A. Harlan will issue a confirmation order shortly. Approximately \$20,000,000 was behind the liabilities of the banker, his attorneys insisted.

### REPEAL DELEGATES END TASK IN ONLY 3 HOURS

TALLAHASSEE, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Florida yesterday became the thirty-first state to move by convention to strike the 18th Amendment from the national constitution, but the official recognition of the electorate's choice was only an empty gesture as far as the state safe of liquor was concerned.

Stringent state liquor laws passed long before national prohibition, do not come before the voters until the Nov. 15, 1934, general election, when article 10, the "bone dry" amendments to the without further vote.
